Another month has come and gone. I can't believe how quickly time passes here at the Museum. By the time you read this, I will have been here for over six months already!

Among the special projects that have been taking place over the past month are even more changes for our web site. If the site was not yet updated the last time you checked, please take another look. As you might have noticed on the inside front cover, there's even a new place to look: www.heiseymuseum.org. Our former domain name (www.ahheisey.com) will stay in place for several months and point visitors to our new domain. We will soon be contacting all of those sites that we know of that link to us to notify them of the change, but, as always, we'd appreciate your help in spreading the word.

Along with our new domain name, we have obtained a new secure account that will allow us to take credit cards online. In the first two weeks of having the online membership option, we received twelve new members from eight different households, along with one request for more membership information. Of course, you can also use the page to renew your membership, if any of you receiving renewal notices this month would like to try it out. Visitors to the site will soon be able to order items from the Museum Shop and register for Convention online as well. As I mentioned last month, please feel free to send in your comments and suggestions for the site at any time.

Another "new" for the Museum is the copier that will allow us to produce the newsletter in-house for considerably less than it costs us to have them professionally printed. While we may

Q: (E-mail received August, 1999) Do you have any information on the horse head bookends that surfaced a few years ago? There is a pair in the Museum animal cabinet. The head is flat on the base, rather than having a neck. When they showed up I remember there was quite a bit of controversy due to the quality of the glass. I can't remember the basis for the decision that they are Heisey (mold? company records?). If you can help me with this I would appreciate it.

A: (We replied to the above e-mail some time ago explaining that there still is some controversy about this item. The basis for determining it was Heisey, was that the mold turned up in those HCA purchased from Imperial and one of the bookends came out of the Heisey estate. When we received the e-mail below, we thought our readers would find it interesting.)

Been meaning to write for some time, but just plain forgot. Thought you might be interested in an experience I had at Springfield (Clark county fairgrounds) at the October show. Saw an elderly gentleman who had several pairs of

what I'll refer to as the "flat" horse head bookend. You have one on display in the museum and supposedly it was never released for retail. The numbered mold showed up at Imperial. I have a clear (no greenish cast) pair I brought into the museum for comparison last winter and was allowed to remove the one from the case for comparison. They were identical except for base height so there are two molds in existence, but no one has known the origin of the other except it was supposedly Corning out of Pittsburgh. Well I struck up a conversation with this gentleman and I have **no reason** to disbelieve what he told me. He jokingly said "I probably made those on 3rd shift a long time ago." He was from I believe the Muncie, Indiana area. Know why almost all these have that greenish cast to them? It's all so simple really. The "old" Ball glass canning jar Company. That's where the "green & aqua" coloration comes from. They used to from time to time produce these on their 3rd shift when they had enough orders years and years ago with the same "gob" used in the jars. Isn't that a riot! Well just had to let you know of my experience.

Q: I have inherited a two strand pearl necklace from my grandmother, the pearls are fake (I've been told worth about \$100.00) however, on the back of the clasp is the Heisey symbol, the Diamond H. My mother is a collector of Heisey glass and has never seen or heard of this. Can you tell me any information or where I could find more information?

A: Since Heisey's Diamond H was a registered trademark for glassware, it is possible that a jewelry company had a similar trademark. We suggest contacting jewelers and jewelry collectors for more information. Has anyone else come across something like this?♦

HEISEY AND MARTHA STEWART

In the past I've mentioned that one of my many hobbies is spotting pictures of pieces of Heisey where you least expect them. I hunt on current TV shows and in magazines, newspapers, and new & old movies. I search the media intently because spotting just one Heisey item will make my day for a week. Only this morning an ad for *Cool Whip*, an imitation whipped cream product, flashed across my TV screen and I swear I saw a Heisey New Era Champagne glass filled with the stuff. I couldn't be sure so I watched intently to see if the ad came up again. It did, but it wasn't until two shows later. My Mrs. asked, rather haughtily as she waved her "honey do" list in front of my eyes, why I was spending Saturday morning lounging in front of the TV set. When I explained that I was doing research for the *Heisey News* you can imagine how quickly she begged forgiveness.

When the *Cool Whip* ad came on again the New Era look alike champagne whizzed by just as fast as it did the first time. I still can't be sure but I'm going to enter it as a sighting in my Heisey identification book anyway.

You're probably wondering where I'm going with this or, perhaps, where I'm coming from. It came about when my brother Vince (whom I affectionately call, "the clone,") knowing I am a fanatical Heisey spotter, called me all excited one day to tell me I must watch the Martha Stewart program the next day. I questioned his sanity because Martha Stewart is not the kind of program I watch. Let's face it, she's no *Antiques Road Show*. Besides, lacking it myself, I hate perfection and, if anyone comes off as "Miss Perfection" it is Martha Stewart.

He explained that he'd seen a TV promotion for her upcoming show and in it was what he thought looked like a Wedding Band (No. 150, Banded Flute) punch bowl. I don't have an entry in my sighting book for Wedding Band so I was not going to miss this opportunity. The next day at the proper time I settled in front of the TV and right on cue Martha came on and lit the screen with her

smile (she does that "aw shucks" grin so well). She stood in front of shelves loaded with *Jadite*, that heavy opaque greenish Depression glass she single handedly caused a run on which, in turn, led to it being reproduced.

Martha (we're on a first name basis) introduced her guest, a Scandinavian woman who was going to show us how to make Scandinavian Christmas cookies. I am nothing if not patient. My guess was that perhaps eventually this might lead to everyone on the show munching cookies and sipping punch around the Wedding Band punch bowl and I'd have my sighting. They didn't and neither did I.

As the program came to a close and I became more despondent about wasting an hour (no offense to my Scandinavian friends, I love cookies even if they are cooked under the midnight sun while standing out on the permafrost) things suddenly brightened. Martha and her guest began placing the Christmas cookies they'd made onto a platter and the platter they were using was a 14" Heisey No. 1238 Beehive plate partially decorated with purple flashing! It was as if I'd died and gone to Heisey sighting heaven. What's interesting is that Heisey's Beehive pattern was last made over 60 years ago and, from the flashing, I'd guess that this one went all the way back to the 1920s. We had an identical 14" plate at one time and we still have a similar flashed plate that's 8". I've photographed it for this article but the flashing is light (not at all like Martha's) so I doubt that it will show well.

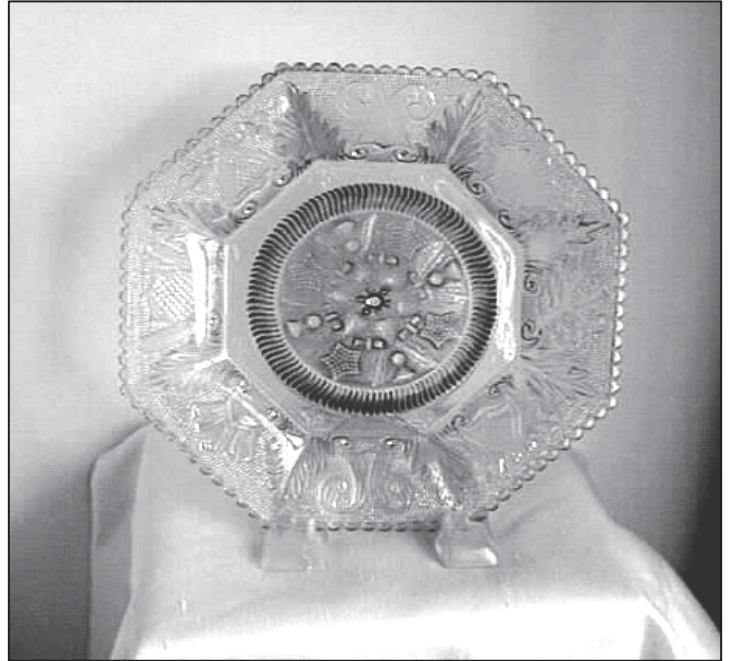
A few years back I wrote about the Beehive plate because, at that time, it bugged me that no reference acknowledged that this pattern was available in Heisey's Amber. So, since the subject has come up again, let's recap a bit.

No. 1238 Beehive is one of several Sandwich Glass Company designs Heisey reproduced and introduced in 1925. Plates are the only items in this pattern. They were made in 5", 8", and 14" sizes. The 14" platter is very imposing and, now that Martha owns one, I wish we still had ours.

This pattern came in a number of colors and a collection of them makes a wonderful display of Heisey's colors. Our National Heisey Museum displays most of the colors made in the Beehive plates (they don't have Amber) but they don't show well against the wood of the display cabinet. A white background would show them off better.

I can say without fear of contradiction that the 8" size was made in Crystal, Moongleam, Flamingo, Hawthorne, Zircon, and Amber (we're missing Sahara). I've seen the 5" size in Crystal, Moongleam, Flamingo and Zircon and I can only recall the 14" size in Crystal and Flamingo. Bredehoff's book, *The Collector's Encyclopedia of Heisey Glass 1925-1928*, says not all sizes were made in all colors but, since I don't know which sizes came in what colors, I'll keep hunting for them all.

On the bright side, I've gained new respect for Martha Stewart - using Heisey lends an air of class to her program. She's come a long way, baby, from her *Jadite* days. ♦

FROM THE ARCHIVES

DON VALDES

Let's face it. Some jobs are boring. Registering names, addresses, departments, etc. of former employees is one of those "should keep at it" tasks that begs diversion. So I succumbed. There is a small box on aisle 3, section C, shelf 2 that I had, way back, only glanced through and labeled "Pattern Photos." Believe me, after a day or two copying employee names, checking to see if they had been previously recorded, noting if they had changed departments over their Heisey careers I was ready to start identifying glassware. But a surprise was in store. When I had labeled the box I knew next to nothing of the museum, its collection or its history. It is interesting how much more we see when we know what we are looking at.

This time I looked at the contents of the box and saw much more than pictures of various pieces of glass objects. On the very first envelope of pictures was a note: "Ready for Louise to check." Whether or not Louise (I assume Ream) checked them, I do not know. Inside the envelope was a photograph, very well done, of a 411 Tudor parfait accompanied by a card on which was written, "only a few known, probably made ca. 1933 by Heisey." A carefully and expertly drawn sketch of the decoration accompanied the photo and the card. The second envelope was similar. The contents included a photograph of a goblet with an accompanying card that stated: "1184 YEOMAN goblet - certainly a Heisey cutting. Probably done after 1933 since there are evidences of Krall design elements. May have been cut by someone other than the Kralls, however."



And so it went, 55 envelopes, more than that number of photographs. At some point, neigh onto the mid-point of my recording, I thought I might take a break and look at some of these pieces. I opened the data base for the museum's holdings and, much to my surprise, very few of these pieces seems to be in the museum collection. I found the group of six Stanhope goblets and a Park Lane goblet in the collection.



Once again I turn to "the old guard." Can anyone tell me the story on these pictures of cuttings? Who took the pictures? Where are the pieces? Are we holding pictures of unknown cuttings because they are on Heisey glass even though the cutter may not have been part of the organization? ♦

CONVENTION 2000 LOOKING FORWARD, LOOKING BACK

Well we are safely into the new century. I will not say the new Milli... because personally I'm tired of hearing about it, and second, I'm really not sure how to spell it. But we can all agree that we are in a new century. And that is significant because this is the **third** century for Heisey glassware. One point that most people agree on is that this new millennium/century is a time for reflecting on the past and a time for pondering the future. Thus the convention committee has chosen the theme for this year as "Looking Forward, Looking Back."

I am confident that there are some who have been collecting Heisey glassware for 50 or more years, having started while Heisey was still in production. In any event, it will soon be a truism that the collection and appreciation of Heisey glassware will span more time than the production period. And the appreciation of Heisey glassware has never been higher. No longer are our children allowed to shoot at the animals with their BB guns, or perhaps to use a saw in a game of stickball. Some of us have even stopped putting the common stuff in the dishwasher. If anyone doubts the extent of the fervor for Heisey, let them check the volume which goes through eBay. So there are some big plans in the works for this convention. A souvenir item, which will stand on its own, and which also will have a tie in with other project items, wine and cheese at the preview, and even perhaps a special peek at the Heisey House. Keep watch with your HCA Newsletter, where all will be revealed as the plans are finalized. But for now, mark your calendars for June 13th, a Tuesday, through Saturday, June 17th. ♦

DECEMBER RESULTS

19. 2D (3D ALSO ACCEPTED) You have no idea where this hand is going to be played. Keep the level low until you find a fit- a two over one bid should never be passed. Those of you who said 3 diamonds have a point (show suit and strength at the same time) so I will accept that bid but I prefer 2 diamonds.

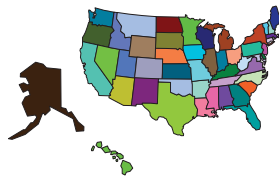
20. PASS- You only have 3 points and no fit with partner. No reason to bid on this hand.

21. 1 NT- You have 6 points and an honor in partner's suit- you need to bid -1 NT is the best choice. 2 diamonds requires 10 points and you should have at least 3 spades to bid 2 spades.

22. 2D- Here you have enough points to show your suit. You also have some support in partner's suit. You want to make a positive bid to keep the bidding open.

23. 2H- Again, you want to keep the bidding low so you can show both of your suits (always bid the highest first) without the bidding getting too high. You can always jump at your next turn to bid.

24. 2 NT- You need to show your strength and have no fit in partner's suit or any suit of your own. ♦

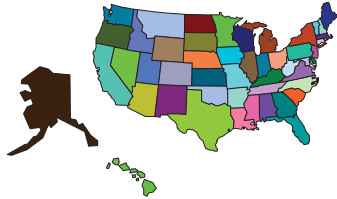

There were two Spanish goblets with the Florentine cutting, two tumblers with Tally Ho etch and 12 Lariat goblets with Moonglo cutting. A Victory etched decanter had two matching old fashion tumblers. There was a Wedding Band covered tankard, a Bethel decanter, an Old Queen Ann bon bon and a Locket on Chain spooner. There was much more but just the highlights are listed.
