

First off, thanks to all of you who participated in the Benefit Auction--consignors, bidders, the Dayton Area Heisey Collectors Club, Apple Tree Auction Center, and of course all of the volunteers who helped catalog, transport, display, auction and pack the glass. Once again, you made this event possible and raised needed funds for the Museum. Thanks also to members of the Acquisitions Committee, who obtained the following items for our collection: #3389 Duquesne tangerine 10 oz. soda, #1485 Saturn 10" gardenia bowl in zircon, and #1225 Plain Band child's table set, etch dated 1898.

We have spoken with several members who received their Auction catalogs late (in a few cases, at the same time as the April newsletter) or didn't receive them at all. The Auction catalogs were mailed on Thursday, March 16, the April newsletters on Tuesday, March 28. If you did not receive your catalog in a timely manner, please contact your local Post Office and make them aware of the problem. In the March issue, I discussed our participation in the American Association of Museums (AAM)'s Museum Assessment Program (MAP). We recently received our 39-page MAP I final report from AAM. Needless to say, we won't be printing the report in the newsletter, but our surveyor Jon Austin did have some very good First and suggestions I wanted to mention. foremost is the need for HCA to launch a formal long-range planning process. Such a process will allow us to identify and prioritize goals and outline steps we can take to achieve them. It will also help us address and implement some of Jon's other recommendations, such as expanding programming at the HCA Glass Studio, developing new programs and materials to draw new visitors (and consequently new supporters and members) into the Museum, and, of course, raising funds through grants and giving programs to help pay for such programming.

Implementing the recommendations in our MAP I final report will take some time. For now, the staff, Executive Committee and Board are investigating the Strategic Planning Program offered through the Ohio Association of Historical Societies and Museums (OAHSM) to help us get started.

I'd like to end by saying "thanks" and "best wishes" to our Administrative Assistant and membership person Jean Thornton, whose last day at the Museum was March 22 and "welcome" to our new Assistant, Dawn Anderson.

1252 TWIST, Part 1 Walter Ludwig

The 1252 line was new to Heisey in 1928. It was popular at the time and continues to be a popular collectable now. It is usually called by the name conferred on it by Clarence Vogel, an early researcher in Heisey, which was "Twist." This is a very apt name because the pieces look like they came out of the mold and were given a twist by the glass worker making a very distinctive pattern. Of course, the twists were put into the molds - not done by the worker - showing the ingenuity of the glass designers of the day.

The purpose of this series of articles is to give you everything I know and have researched about this pattern. This may be more than you really care to know, it is up to you to pick and choose what you care to remember. I have been gathering pieces of this pattern now for over 25 years. To me it is one of Heisey's great patterns, a merger of great design with practicality. It is a rewarding pattern to collect because of the availability of many of the basic pieces, but you will find it a challenge to be able to complete a set.

Pattern Development

Let's begin with the basics - the origin of the Heisey had done three patterns in the preceding years which you could consider sets. Yeoman (1184) was an amalgam of very plain pieces, many of which had been part of the Revere line. Plainness is what sets Yeoman apart from other patterns. The other patterns, Pleat and Panel (1170) and Ribbed Octagon (1229), had only a limited number of pieces. But what makes these patterns different from earlier Heisey patterns was that they included both a dinner plate and a cup and saucer. A new era in entertaining had dawned in which the use of glass as the primary material on the table had become commonplace. Prior to 1925 Heisey's patterns consisted of matching pieces that were to complement china on the table or were utilitarian in themselves. You could have glass serving pieces, but it was not considered proper to actually eat off of glass plates and drink from glass cups (to have a tumbler though in anything, but glass was unusual). It was the introduction of color that seemed to make this new means of dining and entertaining more acceptable and fun. There was also the introduction of a more informal style of entertaining at this time that the new colored glassware complemented. The bridge or Mah Jongg party became the perfect opportunity for the hostess to use these new "sets" of glassware.

If you check an index of Heisey pattern numbers, you will find that pattern numbers 1218 through 1251 represent patterns based on plates. It looks like the factory was meeting a new demand for basic tableware items at this time. The 1252 plate was part of this effort. I feel that Heisey was looking to develop new lines and these plates were a starting point to see what could be done. Most of these patterns never had more than the plate, a few had plates made into bowls. The 1231 plate was picked earlier to develop into a small line that we now call But Heisey saw even Ribbed Octagon. greater potential for the 1252 plate. So much so that this is the only one of the plate designs that a design patent was applied for. Records show that on Sept. 10, 1928, Heisey filed papers for the granting of a design patent for a new plate listing T. Clarence Heisey as the assignor. The actual patent was not granted until Oct. 29, 1929 as number 79,716, but, as was the practice of the time, Heisey went ahead and developed their new line before the patent was granted. A second design patent application was filed on May 1, 1929, for the four footed floral bowl which was granted on Nov. 12, 1929 as number 79,885.

Introduction and Advertisement

Heisey introduced this pattern at its sales offices in January of 1929 and allowed its salesmen to show commercial customers samples of the pattern at that time. Heisey would have accepted orders for the new ware then and full-scale production of the line began. Heisey's first commercial advertising of the pattern was in the March 1929 issues of Good Housekeeping and Voque magazines. The ad was part of the "Glass Secrets" campaign that Heisey was running in 1928 and 1929. It featured plates and the four footed floral bowl in 1252 shown with stemware from the Albemarle (3368) line (see

cover illustration). This ad was also run in the April House and Garden. This was followed with a second "Glass Secrets" advertisement that featured several sizes of footed sodas, the oyster cocktail, and the ice bucket in 1252. This second ad ran in May issues of Good Housekeeping and Voque, and in June issues of Woman's Home Companion and House and Garden. A final ad appeared in the September 20, 1929 issue of Voque and October 1929 issues of Good Housekeeping and House and Garden. It was not a part of the "Glass Secrets" campaign but retained the "Glass Perfected" Through the Secrets of 4000 Years" tag line that was developed for the "Glass Secrets" ads. This ad featured the round nasturtium bowl, cup/saucer, cream soup/liner, and what appears to be a 12" plate. A Tricorn (129) candlestick and an Old Dominion (3380) goblet completed the presentation.

Table Talk was Heisey's four-page magazine which was produced for Heisey's retail customers to give them "news and ideas that will be of assistance to you in merchandising glassware." The May 1929 issue was used to promote the new 1252 line (pages 1-3 of the issue are reproduced on the next three pages of this newsletter). Part of the text reads "There is a verve and a boldness about this pattern that sets it off among the most outstanding of any to be offered this year.... It is a design up-to-date, modern, and absolutely in tune with the vogue of today.... Note the unique spiral effect, the interesting twists and turns of the design, the zig-zag handles and the modish rectangles of stems and feet. Modernistic in the best sense, here are items that you will find it a delight to present in your community."

The issue shows "realistic drawings" of 50 items from the line stating that this was not all of the items available. One interesting note is that the captions indicate that the Kraft cheese is one of the items pictured when in actuality it is the 8" handled cheese that is shown. The back page of this issue of *Table Talk* reproduces the second of the Glass Secrets ads that featured the 1252 line.

Again we wish to remind our friends of the trade of our usual custom of closing down our plants during two weeks of July. This is a part of our employee policy. While the plants are closed orders cannot immediately be handled and after re-opening, normal production cannot be reached for a time, due to natural conditions in glassmaking. It will, therefore, work out to the best advantage to place orders early for summer. requirements, perferably in May. Orders in June will receive the utmost attention, but to be on the safe side, we recommend ordering summer stocks in May.



Some of the pieces displayed by members were: two pitchers--one decorated with a gold band, a covered bowl, toothpick holder with enamel flowers, a hotel sugar with red bands, and a cordial with tatting etch.

The next presentation was by Don Rabourn. Continental was the pattern and it was produced from about 1903 through 1913. This pattern was made in crystal only, sometimes with gold decorations. Following are some of the items displayed: pitcher, compote, short stem sherbert, tall stem sherbert, salt and pepper shakers, a tumbler, water goblet, and a pitcher with gold trim.

The color of the day was flamingo. Tom Taylor gave the presentation. The production period was 1925-35 and was the most produced color. The color ranges from a light pink to almost a peach depending on the thickness of the glass. A few pieces had paper labels with a picture of a flamingo. These labels are rarely seen. A tulip vase, pleat and panel pitcher and covered compote, a twist mustard and cup and saucer, an empress oyster cocktail, an Irwin smoke set, and a Caswell creamer and sugar shaker are just a few of the items displayed.

Lucille and Fred Duhm provided delicious refreshments to end our meeting. We thank them very much.

Needless to say, we are looking forward to our next meeting June 3. We hope to see all the members there plus some new faces who are interested in learning more about Heisey. •


