MUSEUM NEWS

It's been another busy month at the Museum. At a special meeting on May 7, the Board of Directors voted to officially start the Strategic Planning Program offered by the Ohio Association of Historical Societies and Museums (OAHSM). The planning process begins with two different focus groups, each meeting for three hours, identifying the internal and external strengths and weaknesses of the Museum. Using the information gathered by the focus groups, members of the Board and staff will meet with Andy Verhoff, our facilitator from the Ohio Historical Society, once a month for six months to come up with the strategic plan. We hope to have the focus group meetings in July. I'll be sure to give you all an update in the next newsletter.

Tour groups are arriving regularly now, so naturally we are sometimes in need of tour guides. I'd like to thank Mary Homlquist, Dick & Ginny Marsh, Jack Metcalf, Jenny Priest, Betsy Schnell, and Dick Smith for lending a hand.

Some of us took a break from our regular museum duties on a Monday afternoon to plant flowers in front of the Museum. Chuck and Amy Jo Jones even made a special trip to Newark to help us with this undertaking. Thanks! The grounds should be beautiful for Convention.

Speaking of Convention, we have some last minute updates (as always!):

Banquet Speaker: Our speaker will be Don Hall of Rochester, New York and his topic will be Depression glass. Don began collecting Depression glass in 1972 and is an authority on collectible glass and antique American art pottery, frequently contributing articles to various antiques publications.

Seminar Topics: Joe Lokay has graciously agreed to lend his time and talent again this year to do the seminars. The Thursday seminar, which Joe will be co-presenting with Georgia Otten, will be a color comparison between Heisey and Cambridge glass. The Friday seminar will be a look at patterns #339 Continental and 429 Plain Panel Recess.

Factory Tours: Please note that as this newsletter goes to press, six of the eight factory tours are already full (Sat.'s 9 & 9:45 tours still have openings). If you wish to register for a tour, please do so as soon as possible, and please indicate your first and second choices.

Swap, Blind Auction & Dinner: Note that this year, this event includes a boxed dinner. This is the reason for the \$5 cost. BOOK REVIEW: CHINA AND GLASS IN AMERICA 1880-1980: FROM TABLETOP TO TV TRAY WALTER LUDWIG

China and Glass in America 1880-1980: From Tabletop to TV Tray by Charles L. Venable et al, photographs by Tom Jenkins, published by the Dallas Museum of Art, copyright 2000, distributed by Harry N Abrams, Inc. 496 pages including catalogue documentation, references and index. Suggested retail price \$49.50.

I will begin by saying that this is an impressive, well-researched book that adds much to the appreciation and knowledge of the subject matter. This book serves as a companion piece to a museum exhibition now featured at the Newark (NJ) Museum of Art through June 18, 2000, and then travelling to the Dallas Museum of Art from July 23, 2000 to January 7, 2001. The exhibit was mounted by the Dallas museum using their collection with additional loans.

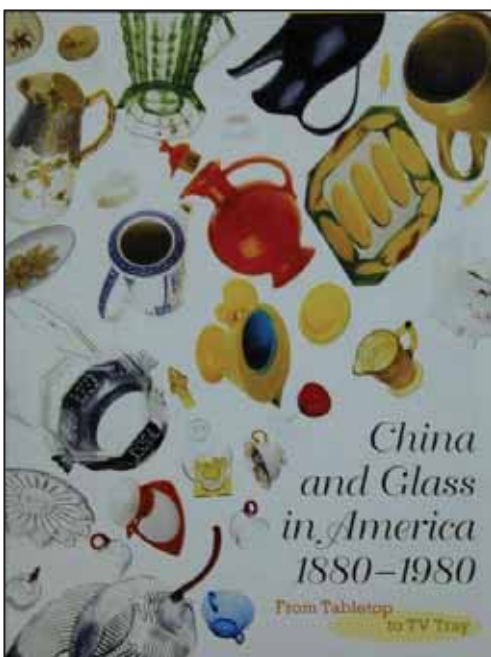
The book is intended to be a survey of the manufacturing, marketing, and home usage of china and glass over approximately the last century. For us who have collected in this field for any period of time the book can be an additional resource but it also can be very frustrating. In trying to cover such a wide field both in terms of subject matter and chronology it has meant that there is no depth in the coverage of any particular area. The inclusion of both china and glass as well as covering both domestic and imported wares leads the reader to wish that the focus of the book had been narrowed. Heisey glass gets several mentions within the text as well as one full page picture of pieces of New Era and two shared pictures - one showing a New Era plate with Sea Glade amongst china pieces featuring other naturalistic decoration. The other picture shows pieces of cobalt Moderntone by Hazel Atlas paired with a Stanhope cup and saucer and two pieces that are identified as Ridgeleigh with silver backing. In actuality, the pieces are Ridge

and Star plates with that treatment. Cambridge glass is represented with no pictures while Duncan and Morgantown both fared better. Fostoria and Libby were chosen to do profiles representing the manufacturing in all glass plants of the time.

The book focuses on pieces with what I would call a "high design" profile. Pieces with an Art Deco or "modern" look were chosen over more conventional lines. China gets more coverage than glass so there tends to be a more representations of traditional ware while still featuring the more "designed" pieces.

In spite of the drawbacks I would recommend the book. There is a fascinating chapter on the marketing of tableware that gives great insight into how goods moved from the plants to the tables of American homes. The inclusion of foreign wares allows for a true picture of the range of competition that the American companies faced. The book even goes into the introduction of competing materials like plastic that presented another threat to the manufacturers.

The extensive photography of examples of both china and glass included in the book is of such a high quality that one could wish that all books covering this field could achieve this level. This alone makes the book a valuable addition to any collector's library. ♦

FIRST SHOW OF THE HEISEY SEASON

Once again it was one of those "you had to be there" occasions - the annual All Heisey Show and Sale held in March put on by the National Capital Heisey Collectors Club. This show is almost impossible for a Heisey collector to describe. With an overabundance of Heisey available there, some of us kind of lose it. I had every intention of being very professional with my reporting duties, but it's hard to take notes on a pad you've drooled all over. Next time I'll use one of those pens that write underwater.

For the second year the show was held at the Bohrer Park Activity Center in Gaithersburg, Maryland. It's an ideal facility for an antiques show, dealer friendly (no stairs) and antiquer friendly (easy parking near the entrance - good for running back and forth to stash your purchases). The folks of the NCHCC who put the show together do a great job. This should not come as a surprise, after all they've had 28 chances to get it right (though I think they got it right from the very first try).

Even better than the nice people running the show is the array of magnificent glass presented there. At the risk of appearing prejudiced, I will state unequivocally that this antiques show contained the finest American glass you are apt to find anywhere. Just about any pattern in Heisey you have a yen for could be found. All production colors were available. Though Limelight and Dawn were not abundant, there was an ample supply of everything else.

This show is known for its pre-show inspection to insure that all items offered for sale are Heisey. And inspect they did! There weren't many pretenders but what was found, was removed (I watched a Mikasa "Ridgeleigh" ash tray go the way of all phonies). The one exception was the Leerdam Glass orange apple made in Holland that had been accepted in most Heisey Circles as Heisey's Tangerine Ivy Vase for many years. There may have been a half

dozen sprinkled around the show floor and they were permitted to remain. I spoke to a couple of the "authenticators" and the feeling was that they didn't want to rock the boat on this issue. I must note that one "apple" was very red - unlike the more orange Leerdam apples. Heisey?

Here's just some of the treasures seen there. There were Recessed Panel candy jars in every size from the little ¼ pounder to the overwhelming 8 pounder. You could find Spanish stems with Sahara bowls decorated with the Titania etch. Or how about Egyptian Candlesticks or an Old Williamsburg Orange Bowl? A Moongleam Ipswich Candy Jar was nothing to sneeze at either. The same goes for a pair of Revere 4 lite candlesticks beautifully frosted. And, if you're into Colonial candelabra, there was every size from one light to five lite and a few in Sahara and some with cobalt accents to boot. No sense going on and on – flip through the pages of a Heisey book and you'll have some idea of the variety offered at this show.

I did see a 14" Beehive plate in Flamingo on the show floor – that adds one more color to the Crystal and Moongleam Beehives previously verified. Update your books.

I usually embarrass myself because I'm great at remembering faces but I usually draw a blank about the names that go with them (I've been known to address my wife as, "hey, lady"). I would have never believed the process could work in reverse. Nice people I met on the Internet said they would be visiting the show in Gaithersburg so I worried - I knew their names but not their faces. I tried to solve the problem by smiling at everybody until my face hurt. Well, my Internet friends, the Dalton kids, showed up and I recognized them easily by their enthusiasm.

If you've been following the Heisey sighting reports in this space, I'm pleased to report that others are catching on to this inexpensive hobby. HCAer Joey Codgill faxed an ad from the Crayola Kids magazine. The picture shows fat cookies or muffins decorated to look like hippos sitting on a Lariat plate (if the picture was a little larger I could have had the recipe). What a great way

to get kids interested in Heisey early. Then Ginny Pratt, a former HCA Board member, came to the show with a copy of *Woman's World* magazine. A feature article on decorating Easter eggs had an accompanying photo that showed their lovely eggs in and around Heisey's beautiful No. 460 basket. Thanks to Ginny and Joey for helping me fill my Heisey field guide.

Don't bother reporting Martha Stewart's Banded Flute punch bowl - I've had multiple reports on that one.

I'm looking forward to seeing you all in June at our convention. If I don't recognize you, don't feel bad, I didn't recognize HCA ex-President, Tom Bischoff the last time I saw him and he has a beard. Or was it ex-ex-ex Prez Amy Jo Jones who had the beard? Don't write, I'm sure Chuck Jones will let me know. ♦

In February the topic was Covered Boxes where we viewed pieces including cigarette boxes in Stanhope, Waverly & Crystolite Zircon; chocolate boxes in Athena, Empress (Flamingo) and Lariat. We also discussed "Black Light" tests – the pros and

cons – and tested several different glass manufacturers’ items with a black light tube. We concluded that these lights are useful to detect overall quality of the glass (will see florescence glow in elegant glass) and to find cracks and/or repairs and glue.

In March the topic was Syrups & Cruets where we again saw fine pieces from members’ collections. We discussed the importance of proper care of our glassware – do not store vinegar in the cruets (or perfume in bottles or salt/pepper in shakers). Also we saw first-hand how a Cabachon juice glass had been heat-damaged because of dishwasher use.

In April our topic was Art Deco, and we had our own personal expert, Sharon Orienter, present a lesson on the subject along with a showing of glassware from her personal collection of Heisey’s Art Deco patterns including Twist, Twentieth Century, Ridgeleigh, Stanhope, Crystolite, and New Era.

Bill Heron returned from the HCA Benefit Auction and delivered “goodies” purchased for club members, including Plantation Ivy sugar & creamer, Ipswitch candle vase with insert and prisms, Saturn and Empress mustards, and Ridgeleigh & Empress (Marigold) nut cups. 
