1252 TWIST, PART 6

WHIMSIES

The HCA Museum is currently displaying two rather dramatic whimsies in Twist. A whimsy is a piece that was not made for production. Usually it is a worker's flight of fancy that he may have done without the factory's knowledge. It may have left the factory in the infamous "lunch pail." Whatever the origins of these



pieces, they are true works of art today. The first piece was made from a Moongleam four-footed

bowl. Rather than flaring this piece out into a 12" floral or cupping it in to make a nasturtium, this piece was flattened out completely to make a giant charger.

The second piece was made from the 2-compartment relish and the piece is just as it came out of the mold. What makes the piece special is that one compartment of the relish is Moongleam and the other is Sahara. I know of no other piece of Heisey that combines these two colors. It is a truly lovely piece and one could only wish there were other examples. It was made

by putting two separate gathers of hot glass into the two sides of the mold. The cooling of the piece had to be done very carefully.

I was recently privileged to be shown another whimsy made from a production piece of Crystal Twist. In this



case, the bottom of the mustard had a spout tooled on one side and a handle was applied to the opposite side making a creamer totally different than any of the production creamers. I suppose a topless mustard jar could be put with this piece to make a complete cream/sugar set. This piece was really lovely and one wonders if it might not have been a prototype for an individual cream/sugar set that was never put into production.

The *Heisey News* recently reported another Twist whimsy. One of the study clubs in their report of their Show and Tell session reported a Moongleam Twist chamber pot. This would imply a bowl with a handle attached on one side. They did not report which mold the piece was made from – possibly a round nasturtium bowl?

TURN BOOKS

The turn books are a record of the actual production in the Heisey factory. These books show by "shop" what a group of employees produced during a "turn." The shop's day was divided into turns and the shop was paid according to how many sellable items were produced. A shop consisted of several workers each with a specific job to do in the manufacture of glass.

These books give detailed records on production but, unfortunately, only a few of these books have survived and are in the possession of HCA. These books have been turned into microfilm that is viewable in the HCA research library. I spent some time going through one of these microfilms. We have one, which covers the period from 1920 to 1940. I believe this must have been only one of the books, which covers this period. It only covers the pressed shop and does not reflect additional production, which must have

occurred to support the patterns being produced at that time.

This is the only turn book that covers the period when 1252 was in production. At this time, production would have been strictly to fill specific orders, because Twist's introductory phase would have by this time already been done. Orders would have to be filled with stock on hand or new production. I found no entries for stemware except for the grapefruit and oyster cocktails (but it is possible that other shops not covered in the book might have specialized in stems). Production in Twist in October and November of 1930 was rather heavy compared to the 1931 production. Many weeks in 1931 saw less than 5 turns of 1252 items produced.

Let's look at the list of 1252 items that were produced in the week of Oct. 11, 1930.

3 pt. jug green (1 ¾ hr)
Twin pickle + olive (2 hrs)
French dressing bottle
Ftd grapefruit fitted
2" CS (2-½ hr) - interpreted as candlestick
12 oz. ftd. soda green (3 ½ hrs)
4 ½" nappy green
1253 3 hdd mint rose
Mustard cover green (1 ½ hr)
Mustard green
Comb pickle + olive Sahara
Mustard green (2 hrs)
9" celery tray rose
Tumbler (2 ¾ hrs)
5 oz. soda rose (2 ¾ hrs)
12" floral bowl – ½ cupped
12" rd floral bowl green

Some comments on the list. Colors: "rose" refers to Flamingo, "green" to Moongleam, "Sahara" is Sahara, if not mentioned, it was Crystal. A turn was probably 1 hour – any deviation from that

was reported in the book. Two-piece articles (e.g. mustard and mustard cover) were produced in separate turns. The notation under 12" floral that ½ were cupped refers to the nasturtium bowl. The book gives no indication of how many of each item was produced in a turn – there were separate reporting slips that gave that information to the Heisey office. Unfortunately, they did not survive.

The biggest area of production in this period is for relish dishes and tumblers. The French dressing and 1253 mint were also quite common in this period. There are entries for plates, individual nut, ftd almonds, 8" low ftd bowl, nappies, muffin, cup/saucers, and oil bottles during this time. An entry for the week of April 11, 1931 reads "Ice Tub Alex" – this is the only entry for 1252 in Alexandrite I found. An interesting entry for the week of November 1, 1930 reads "1252 ftd salt all colors new." This could be the first production of the footed salt shaker. I only wish that more of these records were available for us today.

MOLDS

In 1958 when Heisey went out of business all of the assets of the company were acquired by the Imperial Glass Company of Belaire, Ohio. Among these assets were all molds belonging to the Heisey Company. A limited number of molds in the Twist pattern were still existing at that time. Some molds may have been adapted for use in other patterns, and many were scrapped during the wartime effort to reclaim metals.

Imperial actually used only one of these molds to produce glass. That was the 4" nappy, which Heisey was still using at the time of its closing.

When Imperial declared bankruptcy in 1984, HCA was fortunate to be able to acquire all Heisey molds in Imperial's possession at that time. The list of 1252

molds compiled by HCA from the actual molds HCA owns:

7" plate
9" plate
10 ½" plate
12" plate
12" oval platter
2-handled 6" cheese plate (no plunger)
6" mint dish
7" pickle/relish/celery
7" pickle/relish/celery (2-sided)
2 for the 1-compartment Mayo (bowls only)
1-compartment Mayo (complete?)
2 for 4" bowl/nappy
4 3/8" bowl nappy
8" bowl/nappy (foot only)
8" bowl/nappy
13" bowl/nappy
6" compote
Cruet
Table sugar
5 oz. soda
12 oz. soda
Champagne
Low sherbet (no ring or plunger)
Grapefruit juice
2 for the oyster cocktail
Cocktail shaker bottle
3 pint jug

The list could be refined to more fully identify some of the molds and the pieces made from them. It is interesting that there is both a cheese plate and mint dish listed – but one could be a former that allows glass coming out of a mold to be shaped in a particular way. Most of the molds would not be usable today because of missing parts, worn condition, and rust.

CONCLUSIONS

I am sure by now you have read more about the 1252 pattern than you ever wanted to know. It has been my pleasure to share the knowledge I have gathered in 25

years of collecting this pattern. If any of you have anything you would like to share on this pattern please do not hesitate to contact me through the Museum. If I receive enough comments of general interest, I will write a follow-up article to this series. And now to all of you I wish happy hunting for 1252 Twist. ♦

OF FEATHERS, FUR AND FINS

I think it would be fair to say that the animals made by the Heisey Glass Company are well known within the glass-collecting world. There are, I am sure, many people who specifically collect the animals and have a story as to why and how their collection started.

I believe it would also be fair to say that the collectors of Heisey glass, whether they specialize in animals or not, have a favorite Heisey glass animal. I think the Show Horse comes to mind for many collectors! And what a wonderful item it is! In fact, I would venture to say that as a group, horses come to mind when first thinking about the animals. "Goodness Gracious," we know the Heisey family was a group of dedicated sports enthusiasts. Their interests ranged from riding and hunting to boating and fishing. Their love for sports and animals was mirrored in much of the Heisey glass production. It would be reflected in both animal production and utilitarian pieces that might include an animal decoration or an etching of an animal. For example, the Lion trinket box or an Old Fashion with Polo Player deep plate etch.

I am not a "statistical" person. In fact, my main interest in numbers is to make sure there is a reasonable balance in the checkbook before heading to a show or to the antique malls! However, on occasion my mind wanders and I find I have an interest in

the most obscure of information! And that will put a person into the "look it up and find out" mode! Such was the case with a program given on the Heisey animals.

Several years ago, I was to present a program at one of our Dayton Area Heisey Study club meetings. My program was to be on the glass animals. We are fortunate in our club to have members with varied personal collections and who are willing to pack it up and bring it in! A definite plus when having to give a program! And as we all know, "hands on and eyes on" is the best form of education and any grouping of Heisey glass is always impressive. The display that particular evening was spectacular!

I began the program with a time line of the glass animal production. Quickly now, which was the *first* Heisey animal produced?



Okay, if you said it was the Horse Head bookend you are correct. That was 1937. Heisey continued producing various glass animals

through 1951. The last production glass animal was also the largest of the animals, the Flying Mare. Unfortunately, we did not have an example of a Heisey Flying Mare at the meeting.

The program continued with information on how the animals are measured and why those measurements may vary, the colors Heisey used for production of some of the animals and special treatments on animals such as frosting. And we discussed the Diamond H mark on the animals and the terms "when, if, and seldom" in conjunction with the marking. All of this information is readily available for the collectors in various publications. Now to the obscure information I mentioned earlier!

As I said, the horse, or horses, might be the first to come to mind when thinking about the Heisey animals; however, in actuality, of the 54 animals produced, only twelve, 22% of the animals were horses and that is including the Donkey. 37% of the

animals have feathers and 18% have fur or fins! That is five with fins and five with fur! I have grouped the 12 remaining animals as "others" and they account for the balance. So better than half of the Heisey animal production was NOT in the horse family! H-m-m-m...

At a different study club meeting, Bob and Joyce Dickman presented a program on the silhouette or deep plate etchings so I have peeked into that information to see if the animal related items would change the percentages. I expected to find a lot more horses! You know, there is Fox Chase, Equestrian, Lancaster, Tally-Ho and more. I looked at fifteen deep plate etchings. 20% were more of our fine feathered friends including the robin in the Good Morning etch; 13% were in the fin category which includes the Mermaid etch; 53% were horse related and 20% were in the "others" category which included the camel, lion and elephant from the circus etches.



Now I have a total of 69 items that are animals or etchings! The percentages become 33% feathers, 17% fur and fins, 29% horses and 20% other! I mentioned earlier the Lion trinket box and have not yet considered those animal-related items produced by Heisey, which would include that box, the Sleeping Fox ashtray and others...that will have to be another program! Perhaps the percentages will change.

So, do you think this was rather trivial information? Yes? Well I just could not help myself. I am one of those people who thought of horses first when considering the Heisey animals. I thought there were more horses than any other animal grouping. Now some of you readers may consider this all a bunch of bull...but that simply cannot be true because in actuality when counting the Heisey animals, there is only *one* bull!♦

FROM THE ARCHIVES

DON VALDES

I'm a fan of Agatha Christie's Hercule Poirot. A&E has one of those mysteries every Monday night and, thanks to our trusty VCR, if we know we are going to miss a Monday night or someone calls in the middle of the program we can always tape it for later consumption. And one of the bonuses of old age - even if we have seen a particular episode we usually have forgotten how it ended, therefore viewing again is no problem! For those of you who are unacquainted with this marvelous Belgian detective and his two sidekicks, Captain Hastings the automobile buff and Miss Lemon the secretary with the unassailable filing system, I urge you to try it - Monday nights at nine.

All this to share with you the problems inherent in filing systems. It would seem that unless you have a Library of Congress guiding you every step of the way, who knows what system one might devise. Clearly, my predecessors followed a different star than mine. Today I came across a packet of photocopied letters, the originals of which I had not seen. For the most part they represent communication of one sort or another between T. Clarence Heisey and Rod Irwin. For the uninitiated, the latter was a salesman and eventually sales manager for the company. Why the originals are not with the bulk of T. Clarence's correspondence I do not know. My guess is that these were copied from a bundle of letters given from Rod Irwin's estate. Of course, I haven't begun to tackle that filing cabinet loaded with, I am sure, all sorts of gems.

Forgive me if some of what follows has already been covered in some previous *Heisey News*. Of all the correspondence, these several letters were photocopied, obviously for some purpose. But, as my faithful readers know, I have become something of a T. Clarence Heisey fan and these epistles contain some real gems. There is a letter written to Rod Irwin in January of 1933, the depths of the depression. Irwin is working out of the Merchandise Mart in Chicago. It begins:

Dear Sir:

As a further curtailment of expense, we have been shooting our people who have been traveling by machine on the 5¢ a mile basis. In this, we have consulted with not only the companies here that are using machines on the road, but some of our friends in the trade, and in no place do we find them paying more than 5¢ a mile.

T.C. goes on to break down hypothetical expenses. You might enjoy comparing cost of travel by automobile then and now. The underlining and italics are mine. I quote:

To figure this out from a proper analytical basis, we have taken a unit of 30,000 miles. You will probably use 2,000 gallons of gasoline, which at 20¢ per gallon (and we can buy all the gas in the world here for 14¢) would amount to \$400.00. We also estimate that you will use 300 Qts. of Oil at 30¢ per Quart, or about \$90.00 worth of oil during that period. Washing Car \$50.00; Storage \$150.00; Tires, 2 sets, \$80.00 ; Repairs, \$200.00, making \$970.00 Total. 30,000 miles at 5¢ a mile is \$1500.00, which leaves you a balance to make a trade-in on your car, \$530.00, which seems to us more than ample when the 30,000 miles has been finished. ♦

FOCUS GROUP RESULTS

As you'll recall, the Museum began its strategic planning process back in August with two focus groups in which participants representing HCA and other local museums discussed what they saw the Museum's strengths and weakness, as well as external threats and opportunities, to be. The results were then tabulated and organized into the following report by Andy Verhoff, our facilitator from the Ohio Historical Society.

Similar items from the morning and afternoon groups were combined and the scores added together. Results are ranked according to the number of votes in focus groups, and strengths and weaknesses have also been arranged according to functional areas (shown in bold, lowercase letters).

Settlement for glass sold will be made in full within (10) business days of completed auction, together with a donation slip for commissions charged. All monies received from the sale are held and paid from the HCA Trust Account.

Glassware for the Benefit Auction will be accepted at any time with a cut-off date for the 2001 Auction being January 1, 2001.

HCA accepts responsibility when glass is received at the Museum, except that of any glass that is damaged in shipment, which will be referred to the shipper and consignor. 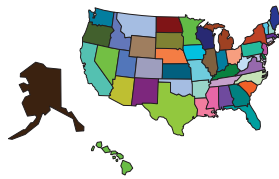

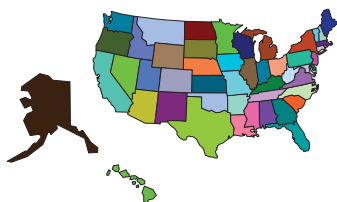

Flamingo, Moongleam, Sahara, Amber flashed, Amethyst flashed, and silver overlay were among the colors he chose to display. The following patterns are just a small segment of the whole collection: Plume, Flame, World, a 3-light Waverly, Trident, New Era, Thumbprint and Panel, Twist, and Grape Cluster are among Don's favorite patterns.
