All of us staff members have been working on projects such as compiling a database of all HCA reproductions made, organizing the many closets throughout the Museum, double checking the recently updated inventory of the Museum's glassware, reorganizing the HCA library and updating our lending library of slide shows.

With respect to this last task, I'd like to give a special thanks to Membership Clerk Beth Bennett. She's spent hours scanning and editing hard copies of the slide show presentation scripts we have found. Many of these scripts are at least ten years old and may be in need of updating, so we're appealing to the knowledge and generosity of HCA members for help. THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT FANCY LOOP

No. 1205 Fancy Loop is like most other "old" patterns: as beautiful as they are and as much as we love to collect them, there's something ho-hum about them, sort of a "what you see is what you get" quality. There are few surprises. You don't expect them to be more than what you see in a reference book – particularly Vogel's. The Vogel books contain more reprints of the early patterns' catalog pages than any other reference available. It's the place to go.

Give or take a nappy or two, you will find all of the reported 122 pieces made in Fancy Loop in Vogel's books I and IV. Close to a third of the extensive Fancy Loop line was offered as nappies (bowls). Considering the number of nappies made throughout the life of the Heisey Company, you'll have no trouble picturing A.H. Heisey standing atop a large bowl, a la Leonardo DiCaprio, and yelling, "I'm the king of the Nappy World!"

What we are certain of is that Fancy Loop was made only in crystal and Emerald and both were decorated in an assortment of gold decorations. There doesn't seem to be any consistency, however, as to where on each piece the gold decoration was applied – sometimes around the rims, sometimes around the loops, and sometimes both.

Well known is the fact that Fancy Loop was produced in two distinct designs: regular (with loops) and as a variant (without loops). We can safely say that every piece of Fancy Loop stemware made was made



as a variant. Tumblers, however, were switch hitters. They were produced in both regular and variant.

A note here about what we're calling "regular" (with loops): there doesn't seem to be any rhyme or reason either to whether the loops are up or down. They were produced both ways. We'll have to assume that the shape of the piece is what determined which way the loops faced though it seems strange that all the pitchers made by Heisey, with the exception of the Claret Jug (a variant), were made with drooped loops (down) while non-variant tumblers that would best accompany these pitchers have loops going in the other direction. It also doesn't make sense that stemware pieces (goblets, etc.) you'd expect to accompany a pitcher were, unlike the loopy pitchers, all variant.

If you collect Fancy Loop, you should



know that its cruet was made in more than the 6 oz. size shown in Vogel's. We've pictured two obviously different size

cruets here to illustrate two sizes. I didn't measure how much the smaller one holds because I hate drying out a cruet after I've poured water into it. A similar situation exists with the pepper and saltshakers. Two styles are shown in Vogel's when in reality, three were made. Again, they are pictured below for your edification.



If you're following along and looking at the catalog reprint pages, check out the water bottles. One says, "Water Bottle," and the other says, "Water Bottle, Squat." They are pictured side by side and, for the life of me, I can't see the difference between them. In the past we've owned more than one and they, too, could have passed for twins.

Another interesting thing about Fancy Loop is that it is the only pattern to offer both a punch cup and a punch glass, seen here. The punch glass is very distinctive and, though not near as common as the punch cups, it's worth the hunt to assemble a set – you won't even need a punch bowl. The



The punch glasses are elegant enough to serve wine to guests (they hold more than a punch cups worth) – they feel great in the hand and are a welcome change from the effete skinny stemmed pieces used for wine on most tables today.

Another fact we've noted before in this space is that Fancy Loop and Fandango share the same lid on their respective mustard pots. You can tell from the cover's design that it was originally made for Fandango, but, in an area as small as a mustard cover, it's easily accepted as Fancy Loop too.

Much of the Fancy Loop line was made by the Heisey Company around the turn of the last century and, consequently, it once was rather easy to find. Now, however, it has become scarcer and more difficult to come by. If we had to



choose one piece of Fancy Loop as the rarest, we would choose the 1 oz. Cologne, shown at the bottom of the previous column. We've only seen two in a lifetime of collecting.

It takes no stretch of the imagination to say that there are whimsies available in Fancy Loop. We've not seen many, but we do have a favorite. It's a bottle

fashioned from one of the Fancy Loop 10" vases, shown here. The neck of the vase was narrowed while the metal was still hot and a stopper was fashioned to fit. It's a fun piece with a sad story. We've had it for more years than I care to remember and it has spent all that time in a china cabinet protected



from the world. Recently, it was brought out to show off to our Heisey study group. It was then we discovered a rather obvious stress crack running from bottom to top for almost the full length of the piece. We look at it philosophically now, however, and we are thankful for the many years we've had it to enjoy (I don't cry as often anymore – only when the moon is full).

One last note, all references say that Fancy Loop was never marked with Heisey's Diamond H and I admit that I have never found otherwise. However, if memory serves, many years ago it was said that a tumbler had been found with the Heisey mark. The folks involved were respected members of the Heisey fraternity so I had no reason to doubt it then nor do I even now. Because my memory is no longer anything to brag about – I won't embarrass anyone by mentioning names and I'll let it stand as another Heisey mystery. ♦

FROM THE ARCHIVES

I am rounding out four weeks here in the Archives. I realize that the amount I do not know is enormous. There are many, many items in the Archives that have no specific home yet. They need to be refoldered, reboxed, and otherwise preserved. I am in the process of taking an inventory of the collection to find everything that has not been cataloged while trying to become familiar with what is here and what is currently cataloged. So much needs to be done still, after all these years! Of course, I'm also trying to become familiar with Heisey patterns, etchings, cuttings, etc., not to mention learning about glassmaking, in general. *What is a lehr? What was the glory hole? Why do they call it rock crystal?* All questions I had a burning desire to answer.

I have looked through many back issues of *Heisey News* and hope my "finds" are actually new to you, although I can't promise that there won't be any repeats. The *Heisey News Index* has been quite helpful though.

While looking through some of the items donated by Harold Dunham, one-time sales representative, as well as advertising and sales promotion manager for the A.H. Heisey and Co., I found two items of interest to report on this month. In the spirit of Don, the first fits into the "My, how times have changed" category. (One learns a lot about a person from reading several years of his *Heisey News* articles.)

The year was 1952 and the company announced its "Heisey Pattern Contest Exclusively for Readers of *Seventeen*." One of the objectives of the contest was to launch a campaign designed to urge "teen-agers to choose their Heisey Crystal pattern early" and "to build preference for Heisey Crystal among a vast group of soon-to-be brides and hostesses."

I don't know if any of you have looked at a *Seventeen* magazine lately, but I can assure you that crystal patterns are far from the topic of conversation. Today's magazine deals with beauty, boys, and fashion, with perhaps a

sprinkling of "serious" issues, glassware not being one of them. Can you imagine any teenagers you know choosing a crystal pattern? Do any of you know teenagers who have hope chests in which to save their crystal? I think that most teenagers who do marry these days have different things on their minds. At any rate, I cannot find any ads from *Seventeen* in the archives. Perhaps another reference will surface.

The second item to report are notes from the A.H. Heisey & Co. Sales and Planning Conference of the same year. The focus of the conference was "Get the Business," with the guest speaker being Mrs. Frederika Fox, the consumer industry editor for *House Beautiful* magazine. Her topic? Fashion trends in glass. T. Clarence Heisey gave the address of welcome. According to Dunham's notes, T. Clarence stated that the company was not selling as much as the competitors, but on a more positive note, this could be remedied by working together. Howard C. Mueller, Vice President, followed up by stating that the company was not getting its share of overall business. For the population of 150 million people, if the company were to get one \$2.50 sale for every 60 people, that would net \$5 million retail. T. C. Heisey, Jr., said, among describing other happenings in the glass industry, that the father-son tradition was ending and that good men leave in bad times of "slack." He advocated making the glass trade attractive for apprenticeship.

Much more was said at this meeting. Rod Irwin stated that there were too many patterns and cuttings. Apparently a discussion of the patterns followed and the salesmen voted on the patterns to cut. Conrad Woelfel, manager of the Chicago office asked whether there were too many items to a pattern. The answer scribbled in the salesman's book is yes. Cabochon and 1567 are also scribbled underneath.

I doubt that sales conferences have changed much since then.

"AFTER AUCTION MADNESS" HAS BEEN CHANGED TO "BEFORE AUCTION MADNESS"

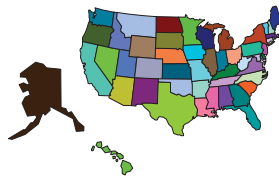

All proceeds from the flea market will benefit the HCA Endowment Fund. We look forward to seeing you there and thank you for your support. ♦



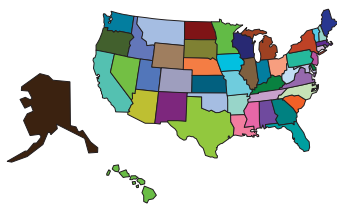

Among other items, there was a 3366 Trojan goblet with Moongleam stem and a 1483 Stanhope luncheon goblet with a wonderful cutting. There was a boudoir stick lamp made from Crystalite parts, along with an unusual 1503 Queen Ann 3-footed 8" flat tray, plus the Rococo/Queen Ann cheese in Orchid. Yours truly brought a very scarce 338 nasturtium bowl (truly happy to have found this rather odd-ball item), plus a very rare 3416 Barbara Fritchie rhine wine with Manhattan cutting. (Note: a "rhine wine" is a stem with a specific bowl shape designed to enhance the enjoyment of rhine wine, a dry white wine from

Germany). Heisey made only three of these stems--The Barbara Fritchie, its sister pattern Kenilworth, and the earlier 3304 Universal. A fantastic Christmas gift!

In the non-Heisey category, there was a (presumed) D&M "Grecian" urn vase in Ruby (which turned out to be Pairpoint, and new, at that). Finally, there was a lovely Fostoria water pitcher and tumbler(s) with the "Nectar" etch (grapes and leaves).

For this evening's program, we brought in a "hired gun"--Jay Martin--collector, dealer and raconteur. Extremely knowledgeable and well-known, Jay presented a talk with slides entitled "Treasures of the Heisey Museum." Conceding that choosing which pieces to include in this program was next to impossible, he nevertheless treated us to a selection of shots which truly represent the crème de la crème of the Museum.

Leading off with an interesting tale, it seems that Heisey was sued by Corning for patent infringement because of its "Visible Cookware" and was forced to drop the line. In roughly chronological order, Jay proceeded from there with the following gems: Fandango jug (the HCA symbol); Prison Stripe opalescent spooner; Priscilla bonbonniere in Vaseline; Pillows rose water bottle; Hairpin basket; the Heisey mail box, cut; Pineapple and Fan vase in experimental Ink Blue; Ribbon Candy pitcher; recessed Panel candy, and Patrician candelabra, both in Moongleam; the Revere 4-light candleblock; Banded Picket basket, Hawthorne; the Horseshoe vase, cut, along with the Tulip vase in Flamingo; a shot of all 36 favor vases; an Edna candlestick in Sahara, plus the Trident 2-light in the Sahara and Alexandrite combination; in Cobalt, there was an Eagle plate (!) and a Ribbed Octagon rum pot (!), not to mention a Cobel shaker, cut to clear in Cobalt; Tangerine was represented by the Gascony decanter and the Overleaf mug (handle); in Dawn, an Empress triplex relish (WOW), along with a Roundelay decanter, designed by Eva Zeisel; in barware, there was a Country Club shaker with the Winchester etch, as well as a Ridgeleigh decanter variant with no ribs; and finally, in the animal category, we were treated to a rooster-head cocktail, a sleeping Fox ashtray, and a #2 Madonna.

Although Mr. Martin was a Connecticut import, the Bay State Heisey Club was certainly privileged to have him as their guest and speaker--a tough act to follow. ♦

FAKE AND MISLEADING ITEMS

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This article is a reprint from the April 1998 issue, pages 16-18.)

One of the most often asked questions by new collectors is, "How can I tell the difference between Heisey, Imperial and imposters?" Now, many of you longtime Heisey collectors know the answer to this question. For a new collector who hasn't seen much Heisey, if they find something marked with the famous Diamond H they will probably go out on a limb and purchase the item.

Of course, after years of studying reference books and looking at glassware, it becomes much easier to spot the real thing. Plain and simple, Heisey is just a better quality glassware and this is often very evident.

Many people swear by the black light to judge the authenticity of Heisey glassware. It is rumored that all Heisey glass will fluoresce yellow when placed in ultra violet light, and Imperial and other companies won't. I have to disagree with this statement, as I know others will too. I've seen other makes of glassware fluoresce yellow, not just Heisey. I don't buy into this theory. I've had Imperial glass fluoresce yellow as well as another company.

After searching through the *Heisey News* archives, I found several notorious fake and misleading items which still baffle new collectors.

1. Copy of a Winged Scroll butter, miniature size. Heisey never made the butter in this small size. This item has been seen in a pink opaque color and emerald. (Editor's Note: The Museum has one of each on display in the lower level of the King House.) It was reported that Robert Wetzel of Zanesville had this piece produced at the Guernsey Glass Company in Cambridge, Ohio. The base of the butter is marked "RW."
2. Copy of the Cabochon advertising sign. When sitting side by side, it's easy to tell the real from the fake. The differences arise in the lettering and the shape and size of the Diamond H.
3. Fake toothpick/candle votives, at least three or more types known. The poor quality of these items should tip you off

instantly, though the Diamond H mark is bound to add confusion.

- A. Stars and Stripes, marked with a (faint) Diamond H. Made in blue, green, pink, and crystal. Lines of stars run diagonally around the piece.
 - B. Don't let these pieces fool you, they are not Heisey. These were made by Harold Bennett at the Guernsey Glass Company. The toothpick and individual cream are generally found in crystal or milk glass with ruby stain. They are marked like souvenir pieces, A.H. or (A.J.) Heisey and Company Founded 1896. Look for the faint "B" marking on the bottom rim.
 - C. Strawberry toothpick. This is a Cambridge pattern, signed sometimes with a faint Diamond H. This was made in crystal, pink, cobalt and green.
 - D. This particular toothpick is a knockoff of Heisey's Beaded Swag, copied by the Mosser Glass Company of Cambridge. The first tip off to the fake is its color; Mosser made it in milk glass, a very white, dense color. Though Heisey produced an opal-milk glass color, the Mosser piece is much different, not all opalescent like Heisey. (No picture available.)
4. Creamer and nappy look-a-likes. These are machine made pieces of very poor quality. Though signed with the Diamond H, these are not genuine Heisey. Generally, the shape of the Diamond H is a tell-tale sign that the item is a fake. Make certain the diamond is indeed a diamond shape, not squatty. Don't overlook the size and shape of the H either.
 5. Small milk glass mug, signed with a Diamond H. This was never produced by A.H. Heisey and Company. This was reportedly made in the seventies by Guernsey Glass Company for a Newark man.
 6. The notorious animal covered dishes. Heisey never made a covered dish of this type. Someone in Japan produced the items, marked them with a Diamond H and shipped them off to the states. These are very common, so don't be fooled.

These are just a few of the misleading collectibles you might find. There are a few other items included, by picture only, following this article. Don't forget it's a buyer beware market. If you have more examples of fake or misleading items, please let us know. ♦

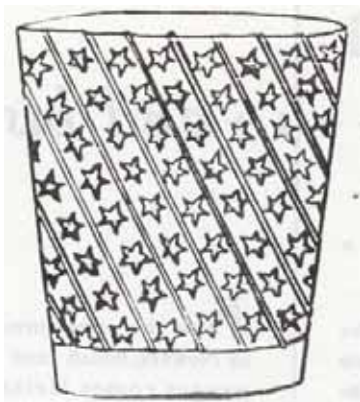

2001 HEISEY DISPLAY – “A HEISEY GARDEN”

Dear Study Clubs & Individual Members:

This year, the theme for the Heisey Display during Convention, June 13-16, 2001, is “A Heisey Garden.”

This theme could be worked into a display of floral bowls, baskets, nut cups/dishes, bar sets, stems and/or a pattern or etch with a floral or garden name.

Some examples are: Bamboo, Crocus, Daisy & Leaves, Fairacre, Fandango, Oakleaf, Paneled Cane, Pineapple & Fan, Plantation, Rose, Sunflower, Waverly, Prince of Wales Plumes, Greek Key, Raindrop, Eagle/beehive plates, Victorian, Sunflowers, Daffodil and many cuttings and etchings such as rose, orchid, chintz, narcissus, maytime, and ivy.

The rectangular tables are three feet by eight feet. The round tables are four feet in diameter. For a round table, you do not need four place settings, two with serving pieces is adequate.

The HCA club will provide table covers, risers and for the round tables, napkins, silverware and floral arrangement (we need to know the floral bowl you will be using, if any, to get the right size of arrangement).

The Display glass is set up on Tuesday and/or Wednesday and security will be available from set-up to tear-down. Tear-down will be Saturday after the Show closes, as the Display will be in Adena Hall. If you need help carrying or setting up or packing the glass, please let me know.

All glass must be Heisey--no reproductions or fakes.
