

FROM THE ARCHIVES

VICKI MEEHAN

Did you know that the A. H. Heisey & Co. advertised on the radio? Here are two of the scripts that were read on the air. They were created by the Howard Swink Advertising Agency. These scripts would have been sent to stores that carried Heisey crystal, so that they could place the advertisement on the radio, with a reference to the specific store.

This one was created March 22, 1949.

(NOTE TO ANNOUNCER: The "s" in "Heisey" is soft -- "High-C.")

ANNOUNCER: Listen to this perfect High-C...

SINGER: (Runs up the scale to High-C, then holds note)

ANNOUNCER: (comes in over sound of High-C note) That's what you call striking the perfect note. High-C! When you want to strike the perfect note in beautiful crystal for your table or gifts, ask for hand-wrought glassware by Heisey, spelled H-E-I-S-E-Y. You'll find Heisey crystal here in (city) at (your name and address). Stop in!

And this one was created in April 1947. I thought the language was particularly amusing.

SOUND: VIOLIN: (Girl practicing scales.) CONTINUES THROUGH FOLLOWING

FATHER: (VOICE COMING IN) Oh, there you are, daughter. Practicing, eh.

DAUGHTER: Uh-huh.

FATHER: Jane, I've been wondering what to get your mother for her birthday ... something special ...

DAUGHTER: Gosh, I didn't know, Daddy ...

SOUND: VIOLIN HITS HIGH-C. NOTE HOLDS, CLEAR AND SHARP.

FATHER: (exclaiming) Say that's good! A perfect High-C, isn't it?

DAUGHTER: Yes ... (SOUND OUT) Wait, Daddy! I've got it - High-C crystal for mother!

(Announcer picks up with Commercial #1 – General - 30-second or 1-minute copy)

Howdy Pardners! Word from "The West" is that all cowgirls and cowboys are wanted for a Heisey "Round-up" at the Town Hall, (commonly known as Hopewell Hall on the OSU campus in Newark, Ohio). Hopewell Hall is located adjacent to Adena Hall, which will be housing all that pretty, glittery glass.

Our first "theme" Swap Meet - Blind Auction evening proved to be a great success last year. First time convention guests as well as charter HCA members gathered for a fun casual, "Caribbean Paradise" evening of Heisey fellowship. All dinner tickets were "sold out" and we had a standing room only crowd for the Blind Auction. The Swap Meet of "old" was renewed by encouraging matching tops and bottoms, cruets and stoppers, creamers with sugars etc. Treasures of 20 boxes of Heisey glass were claimed during a spirited Blind Auction, with boxes selling from \$175.00 to \$410.00 per box, generating a total of \$4,595.00. Other income of \$1,790.00 from auctioning several feasibility items, a 50-50 drawing and profits from the dinner made the total income for the evening \$6,385.00. Since this HCA Convention "Fun-Fund" raising event indeed proved to be a fun, profitable evening for HCA and guests, we have agreed to co-chair this year's Heisey "Round-Up."

This year's evening of fun, chuckwagon chow, swappin' and buyin' begins at sundown (6:00 PM), Thursday, June 14, 2001 as part of the HCA Convention. Moving the "Round-Up" Swap Meet - Blind Auction to Hopewell Hall will give us more room and allow us to offer more chow tickets for sale. There will also be plenty of "at the

door" parking for you to circle your wagons and hitch your horses.

Our "Cooky Ron" is cookin' up chuckwagon chow (shredded beef BBQ, baked beans, slaw, chips and soft drinks). Two-hundred chow tickets will be offered on a first come, first served basis to be reserved with your convention registration for a \$6.50 gold nugget each. If any of the 200 tickets are left after registration, they will be offered for sale on a first come, first served basis at the door.

Grab your ten gallon hat and pack your Western duds, (all six shooters will be checked at the door), as prizes will be offered for best Western attire.

BENEFIT AUCTION 2001 DICK MARSH

This year's auction, while not as large as in the past, still contains many items for the novice and advanced collector.

Having been around from the start of the club, sometimes I'm a bit jaded with all of the rare items I've seen, but the following are a few of the items that caught my eye.

For the Colonial Era collector, we have a couple of #150 Banded Flute match boxes and covers, Amber sodas, a measuring cup, and a Banded Flute root beer mug. The cordial collector will find Creole in alexandrite, Park Lane with Briar Cliff cutting and a Barbara Fritchie brandy with Alexandrite bowl.

The zoo has a number of items with some of the more interesting being a set of elephants, hen, rooster and chick set, a swan, a sow and both piglets, a couple of show horses plus a number of others. There is a fighting rooster mounted in a metal frame to make a lamp.

The stem collector is in for goodies. A Spanish goblet with a Cobalt bowl, #3361 Charlotte sherbet with a Hawthorne bowl and Moongleam foot and stem, and a rare #5065 Colt stem cocktail. Also a double whammy, an experimental Plantation goblet with the pineapples on the side of the bowl and a Bantam Rooster cocktail.

The candlestick collectors will be hoping the IRS has sent their returns. Check this out, a single Jack-be-Nimble in Sahara, #130 Acorn 1-lite in Moongleam, a pair of Cherubs in Flamingo, and two pair of #107 Wellington, one each in Flamingo and Moongleam. If these are not enough, how about a pair of #7175 Egyptian and a pair of #127 Twisted stem in Moongleam? Both are very rare.

From here we have a real mixed bag. Two unusual etchings are a Bethel decanter with the Circus Lion Tamer and two Newton sodas with B&O RR etch. The couple of the pitchers of note are a Pleat and Panel in Moongleam and a #1503 '/z swan. A #461 Banded Picket basket in

Flamingo should bring some interest. Did someone say vases? Well a #4230 favor vase in cobalt, #1420 Tulip vase in Cobalt, and 6" and 3 '/2" Saturn vases in Limelight should answer that question, and if not, there are many others.

There are a number of colognes including a large 3 oz., but the goodie being one in Plain Band. In Tangerine we have a number of pieces including a couple of different patterns that are on the red side.

This sale has more Plantation that I've seen at one time with many unusual items.

A #1506 Whirlpool footed candy in Limelight is pretty. Lastly, in this listing only, is a #1469 Ridgeleigh decanter made from the 10" vase. This is not a production item.

HAVE SOME "WHINE AND JEEZ" GEORGIA G. OTTE N

(Author's Note: A slightly different version of this article, with this same title, was published in the March 2001 Cambridge Crystal Ball. The articles are based on true events from my life as a collector of both Cambridge and Heisey glass and therefore applicable to both clubs. Proof positive that I don't make glass collecting mistakes exclusively in one study club! There are plenty to go around!)

The Dayton Area Heisey Collectors study club meets in a library and as in most libraries, food and beverages are not permitted. However, I have noticed that on occasion at a meeting, something is being served. It is "whine and jeez."

I am a proponent of study clubs and have the good fortune to belong to one of the best. There are collectors currently trying to form new study clubs in other cities and states and they are to be encouraged. I have heard people say they "do not know enough" to belong to a glass study club. But that is the point, isn't it? To learn about the glass? If you

care about Heisey glass, and want to learn, a study club is invaluable!

There are numerous reasons why people begin collecting glass. They like a color, it was something Mother received as a gift, they want to match a candlestick and it just keeps going! Whatever the reason, I do not know any one glass collector who knows everything about any one glass company. There is always something to learn!

I can recall attending my first several Heisey study club meetings. There Mac and I were with something from the Plantation line for show and tell, and there were other members bringing in colored glass, pitchers, candlesticks, perfume bottles and decanters. All Heisey glass. My question was, "How do you know that is Heisey?" I felt so uninformed!

But guess what happened? As the programs continued, more items were brought in for discussion and show and tell and there were items that were *not* Heisey glass. There were items easily confused with true Heisey. You know, the look-a-likes. I would venture to say that each one of us has bought, with great delight, a piece of glass we "thought" was Heisey, only to find out, through the knowledge of others, that it was a repro, reissue or a look alike right off the boat from some foreign shore. And what happens at this point?

The "jeez and whine!" "Jeez, I thought it was Heisey! Are you SURE it isn't Heisey? How do you KNOW it isn't Heisey? I WANT it to be Heisey! PLEASE tell me it is Heisey!" I had this experience, not my first and probably not my last, with a Ridgeleigh cigarette holder and the matching ashtrays in 'Dawn.' I did not know my colors or items made by another glass company using a Heisey mold. So I took those pieces home with me determined not to let *that* happen again.

There are many good reasons to belong to a study club. The most obvious, it is hands on and eyes on. One learns to recognize those reissues and the Heisey colors and the fact that a 'Diamond H' does

not necessarily make it Heisey! Knowledge shared, knowledge gained.

However, a word of warning: being a member of a study club does not guarantee your ability to deal with a major factor of collecting, a factor which must be addressed if one wishes to avoid the "jeez and whine." It is the EF, the EXCITEMENT FACTOR. You spot an item in a shop or mall and you believe it to be Heisey. Your heart pounds. You want it! The price is good, you are pretty sure you have seen it in a book. You buy it. You are happy! You take it to the next club meeting for show and tell and ... guess what?

It's "jeez and whine" time, and you are hosting! But it will never happen again! Right?

BOOK REVIEW: HEISEY GLASS, THE EARLY YEARS: 1896-1924 BY SHIRLEY DUNBAR DOROTHY KAMM

Heisey glassware ranks among the finest ever manufactured in the United States. The company, which was founded in 1896 and remained in business until 1957, managed to successfully combine the utilitarian with the decorative, producing hand-wrought tableware designed for daily use. Their products are as appreciated by collectors today as they were by thousands of households nearly a century ago. Because so much of Heisey's early glassware was unmarked, author, antique dealer, and award-winning Pen Woman Shirley Dunbar realized the need for a reliable reference that would simplify the identification of the various glass patterns and colors. Her book does exactly that, pairing over 300 examples with pattern descriptions, and providing values for each item that is pictured.

There are detailed discussions of Heisey's early production runs of colored glassware, opal being among the most desirable because of its iridescence.

Photographs illustrate the many variations in hues collectors might find when searching for Heisey glass. Dunbar also covers the limited patterns in which the experimental rose color was used, to clarify the difference between that color and the later pink glass.

The scope of the book is thorough, encompassing more than merely identification. In the story of the history of A. H. Heisey & Co., there is intrigue mixed in with the sand and lead and potash. Competition among manufacturers was fierce, and allegations of patent infringements flew between companies. Even Heisey was not above subtly changing mold designs of successful glass lines of their competitors. Dunbar includes a biography of founder Augustus H. Heisey, a German immigrant who served in the Civil War. Glass making and grades of glass, guidelines for buying glassware, and its care also are covered.

Molasses containers, which are now obsolete, as well as cracker and crushed fruit jars and humidors are given separate chapters. Dunbar writes that small containers for a variety of household products, such as molasses, were required since they were purchased in bulk. Molasses was the common sweetener until the price of white sugar, which was preferred for its color, and ease of use and storage, dropped. In the Victorian era, fancy glass cracker jars were preferable to tin. Then, too, how many of us know that crushed fruit jars were used to make mixed fruit compotes, or that in these antismoking times, humidors once held imported cigars or fine tobacco for pipe smoking?

This extensively researched, indexed, and illustrated 176-page book, the first guide to Heisey's early productions ever published, is guaranteed to become the foremost reference of its kind.

Dear Study Clubs & Individual Members:

This year, the theme for the Heisey Display during Convention, June 13-16, 2001, is "A Heisey Garden."

This theme could be worked into display of floral bowls, baskets, nul cups/dishes, bar sets, stems and/or a pattern of etch with a floral or garden name.

Some examples are: Bamboo, Crocus, Daisy & Leaves, Fairacre, Fandango, Oakleaf, Paneled Cane, Pineapple & Fan, Plantation, Rose, Sunflower, Waverly, Prince of Wales Plumes, Greek Key, Raindrop, Eagle/beehiVE plates, Victorian, Sunflowers, Daffodil and many cuttings and etchings such as rose, orchid, chintz, narcissus, maytime, and ivy.

The rectangular tables are three feet by eight feet. The round tables are four feet in diameter. For a round table, you do not need four place settings, two with serving pieces i5 adequate.

The HCA club will provide table covers, risers and for the round tables, napkins, silverware and floral arrangement (we need to know the floral bowl you will be using, if any, to get the right size of arrangement).

The Display glass is set up on Tuesday and/or Wednesday and security will be available from set-up to tear-down. Tear-down will be Saturday after the Show closes, as the Display will be in Adena Hall. If you need help carrying or setting up or packing the glass, please let me know.

All glass must be Heisey-no reproductions or fakes.

Bay State Heisey Collectors Susan Pescatore

The February meeting of The Bay State Heisey Club was held in Lexington, Mass on the 13". President Steve Pescatore conducted a streamlined business meeting and we then began Show and Tell.

Our sharp-eyed members were in their usual excellent form: a scarce #331 Colonial 1/2 gallon jug (huge!); an #1170 and a #1252 (twist) flamingo cruet; a Marigold #1184 oval vegetable; in the small-but-cute department, a #32 5" handled chamberstick, as well as a #400 individual sugar ("Peerless without a skirt"); for real drama, there were a pair of #1463 Quator 8" nappies in a Deco chrome and Lucite holder; Louis Lapilato submitted a wonderful selection of etchings - sodas with the Antarctic and

Lancaster etches, a #2401 Oakwood tumbler with the rare Circus/Cowboy etch, and a #4163 Whaley beer mug with the Club Drinking Scene.

In the non-Heisey category, there were a pair of unusual Cambridge pressed-stem Rosepoint wines, along with two pieces of early Duncan & Miller Scalloped Six Point: a large, gorgeous fruit bowl, and a mini rose bowl.

The evening's program was proudly presented by Steve Pescatore, who, through perseverance and zeal has amassed one of the definitive collections of #325 Pillows in the Heisey community. Steve opened with a graphic illustration of the design's geometry, and then gave a history of the Pillows pattern (originally just a Duncan & Sons cologne pattern but presumably reinvented when A. H. Heisey - a Duncan partner- opened his own company). Steve then described each piece of Pillows on the table, specifically as to form and function. Most interesting and noteworthy were multiple bowls and compotes, distinguished only by small size differences and edge treatment; three rose bowl types; three different pitchers (including the massive 3-quart); various bonbons and pickle dishes (same mold); egg cups (the only "stem" in the pattern); three jellies (out of five made); the toothpick; the individual salt and two forms of salt shakers; a syrup; a molasses can; a 6-oz oil and the very rare 2-oz oil (yours truly must confess to finding this piece two years ago on the second day of Granville "outside", less than one minute after Mr. Pillows passed by this dealer's table, missing it completely).

Steve's collection also contains the complete table set, the water bottle, the cake salver, the ice tub, the cracker jar, the mustard, and the punch set. But the most important example by far is the 'h gallon tankard in Rose, which we were fortunate enough to buy at the 1999 Benefit Auction. Steve offered a very lucid explanation of this color in Pillows and some other early patterns, based on the published knowledge we have available to us now (ie: new theories could turn up at any time). This pink color was almost certainly made in the first decade of this century (Flamingo was not introduced until 1925), since inventory lists from 1901-1903 have been found describing multiple pieces of Pillows in "Rose" on hand at the factory at that time, (other examples of early patterns known in Rose are the #1 Georgian candlestick and the #310 Ring Band spooner).

Pillows is a beautiful pattern under any circumstances, but to see so much of it all together in one place is truly dazzling.*



The predominant color is Woven Straw (a shade of beige). The outer edge is Apricot. In each corner inside the outer edge is a triangle of Lime Mist. In the center of the rug is a Diamond H. The Diamond is Lime Mist and the H is the predominant color. Of course, the H also stands for our initial-Hopkins. It is beautiful, and I love our Christmas Present from our son.

SUGGESTION FOR MEASURING VOLUME OF HEISEY "VESSELS" WITHOUT USING WATER TERRY SMITH

EDITOR'S NOTE: THIS PIECE IS IN RESPONSE TO CARL SPARACIO'S FANCY LOOP ARTICLE LAST MONTH.

YES, drying out any small necked item is a PAIN.

Most of us, however, have a "supply" of sugar (or salt) in the household larder. Using a funnel, fill your Heisey item with dry/granulated crystals. Then empty the item into a measuring cup. As long as there is no moisture in the Heisey item, all of the crystals should easily vacate your Heisey. Since the crystals have only been in two different, clean vessels, they can be returned to the larder for use on another day.






