


### FROM THE ARCHIVES VICKI MEEHAN

Recently I came across an original design for a brochure of "Ye Olde Sandwich Glass." Most of the designs pictured are for plates. In The Collector's Encyclopedia of Heisey Glass, I found mention of this brochure on pages 362 and 364. The brochure shows #1238 on the cover and the dolphin candlesticks, as well as #1240, #1234, #1238, and #1236 plates, on the inside. The #1236 and #1238 plates are painted a lovely shade of green (Moongleam). Next to the brochure, I found a striking drawing of the marked Diamond" #1234 "Stippled plate. See the Encyclopedia (pp. 11-12) for more information on Sandwich glass reproductions done by Heisey.

As has been noted before, during the course of business, A. H. Heisey & Co. became the recipient of some of the original wooden models (not molds) from Sandwich Glass Company, and the company created lines for glassware, including Old Sandwich and Ipswitch, based on these models. The models are estimated to have been made between 1850 and 1870. According to a 1996 *Heisey News* article, the models have been found. The Museum continues to display the #110 Sandwich dolphin candlestick model. I haven't quite figured out what became of the rest of the Sandwich wooden models. Of course, I haven't quite figured out what became of the old Heisey models either. Now they would make nice

displays.

### HEISEY NOVELTIES JOE LOKAY

The Heisey Company started producing their opal novelties in about 1897. The January 1899 issue of *The National Glass Budget* mentioned the A. H. Heisey & Co. as an extensive producer of opal specialties. There were six other companies also listed as extensive producers.

Heisey produced 11 novelties. This is not counting any small Winged Scroll items that are sometimes included in the novelty list. The eleven items are:

A shipping order to the Oriental Glass Company dated June 24, 1899, lists 10 of the 11 novelties. The Oriental Glass Company was a decorating company located in Pittsburgh, PA. Heisey's business with Oriental was either (1) as a supplier of glassware to them, or (2) to use them as a decorator of ware that was sent to Oriental for decorating and then back to Heisey for their sales programs. More on the Oriental Company can be found in the *Heisey News*, February 1976.

Page 19 in #60 Heisey Price List dated 1901, lists the opal novelties that were for sale at that time. The list also states that the novelties were available "with assorted decorations." Either Heisey or Oriental may have applied the decorations. Included in this list are 11 novelty items and 14 #1280 Winged Scroll items.

The question is: "How are the novelty items marked?" First, let's look at the beginning of the Diamond H mark.

On June 21, 1901, the Heisey Company filed an application at the U.S. Patent Office to register their trademark for pressed glass. On August 6, 1901, the Patent Office granted registration of the Diamond H to Heisey as trademark #36,860. Heisey's registration letter to the Patent Office stated, "Be it



known that the Heisey Company has adopted this trademark for use on its glassware." The registration statement also stated that the Company had been using this trademark since November 1, 1900. More on the Diamond H trademark can be found in the *Heisey News*, April 1975.

So that leaves the questions: "What about novelty items made in 1898? How are they marked?" Production started in 1897, a full list was available in 1901, and production may have continued to perhaps, 1905. The novelties in the Museum are marked with both the stock number and the Diamond H. For example, the Pin Tray would be marked with a 40 and a Diamond H. The novelty plate I found was marked with a 46 and a Diamond H.

What about items made in 1898? My feeling is that a stock number was placed on a novelty at its beginning, and not when the Diamond H started to be used by Heisey. That means, if you can find an opal novelty with a number 40, 41, 46, 47, 51 or 56-61 on it, it's most likely a Heisey piece. If you find one, compare it to what's in the Museum for positive identification.

The Winged Scroll novelty items do not have a stock number on them because they are from an extensive pattern line that had a pattern number, namely #1280.

### A CIGARETTE, SWEET MUSIC AND YOU

#### BILL HERON

Only people who are very ancient, such as Carl Sparacio or myself, will recall Fred Waring and his Pennsylvanians. They were a popular band in their time, and during the Forties, Monday-Friday, they did a fifteen-minute radio show that was sponsored by Chesterfield. "A Cigarette, Sweet Music and You" was the theme song.

When I got the idea of looking into Heisey's containers for cigarettes, it brought the Fred Waring show to mind. As I pursued the subject, the theme song ran around in my head; it was a soothing influence, as once again, when studying what the Heisey people did, I ran into things that were surprising and somewhat mystifying.

Heisey made a number of different items that had to do with smoking. There were ashtrays of all sorts. There were match holders, and there were combination ashtrays and match stands. In addition, there were cigarette lighters in both Whirlpool and Crystolite. The subject of this piece is containers made by Heisey that were intended to hold a supply of cigarettes. Some of these were strictly cigarette containers, but a few were combination cigarette containers and ashtrays. Some had covers while others did not.

The earliest pattern for which I found a cigarette container listed is Winged Scroll. The last Heisey cigarette containers came out in 1949. That's quite a time span, but not every pattern from Winged Scroll through 1949 had a cigarette container. In fact, there were at least two very notable omissions, as will be seen in the list I pulled together from the various references on Heisey glass such as the Vogel and Bredehoft books.

In total, I found 19 Heisey patterns for which one or more cigarette containers are listed. For some patterns, more than one cigarette container is listed. Thus, in total, there are 33 cigarette containers. There are two main types of cigarette containers. Some are boxes with covers. Others are holders with no covers. Of the 33 containers, 17 are boxes with covers and 11 are holders. The rest are something else, e.g., the Victorian individual cigarette holder and ashtray combination.

Ridgeleigh is the champion with seven different cigarette containers. Puritan, (new) and

Crystolite also did fairly well, with each scoring four different cigarette containers. It strikes me as quite odd that there is no cigarette container listed for either Empress or Twist. After all, these were two of Heisey's most successful patterns, and a wide range of items was included in them--but no cigarette container. Does anyone know why?

Another rather glaring omission is the entire range of colonial patterns. There are no cigarette containers to be found in Priscilla, Puritan, Narrow Flute or any of the other colonial patterns. One characteristic of the Heisey Company that stands out clearly as one looks at the range of items they made, is the company's willingness to pursue sales dollars wherever they might be found, whether it be soap dishes, toothbrush holders, mail boxes or glass lenses for automobile headlights. Why then did they not provide at least one cigarette container in some of their most popular lines?

Also, one stemware line, Carcassonne, shows a cigarette container, yet none of the other stemware lines do so. If Carcassonne, then why not, for example, Gascony? Strange, very strange. One other thing might be of note. Some of the cigarette containers are very easy to find. Others don't seem to turn up very often. For example, how often do you see a Rococo cigarette box?

Now it's time to look at what I found. Here they are, listed in the order of the year in which the pattern is believed to have come out.

### VIVIAN & PERCY MOORE DINNER

This year's Vivian & Percy Moore dinner will be hosted by the Heisey Collectors of the Rochester Area in Rochester, NY. The dinner is set for Saturday, September 22 at 6:30 P.M. and will take place in the Reading Garden & Gleason Auditorium in the Bausch & Lomb Public Library Building of the Central Library of Rochester & Monroe County, 115 South Avenue, Rochester, NY.

Admission to the 30th Annual Show and Sale of the Depression Glass Club of Greater Rochester will be included in the price of the dinner, which will be \$25.00. There will be a wine and cheese reception before dinner and a buffet dinner consisting of two main dishes, salads, side vegetable and pasta dishes, rolls & butter, coffee, tea, etc., and some kind of local dessert.

There is convenient parking for the dinner in the Court Street ramp garage, immediately adjacent to the building and connected to it by a walkway. The show is held in the Eisenhart Auditorium of Rochester Museum & Science Center at the corner of East Avenue and Goodman Street, 10-5 on Saturday and 11-4:30 on Sunday. There is convenient free parking in surface lots on the Museum campus.

You'll find that there's one big advantage in buying established patterns of quality glassware. Such patterns remain in open stock and you can be certain of being able to add to your original set as time goes on.


You may wish to begin with the obvious essentials. Goblets are first among these, Buy service for four, six, eight or twelve persons depending on your budget — and on the size of your dining room table!

Next in importance are sherbets and wine glasses. High sherbets are also known as saucer champagnes and, indeed, are used for this bubbly vintage although serving more often for the mousse or chilled fruit of your dessert. There are several types of wine glasses, used for sherry, Rhine wine and other wines. Lower footed stemware and glasses without feet are for juices and other beverages.

You'll want matching glass plates, for use with sherbets, to truly dramatize your table for special occasions. Your next choice may be iced tea glasses, which can do double duty for highballs or frosted drinks. And high on your list will be a water pitcher.

These are but a few of the many pieces of tableware and decorative accessories, such as candelabra, candlesticks, bowls, etc., available in almost all Heisey patterns. Other pieces to be added later to your Heisey collection may be complete bar ensembles including cocktail glasses and shaker, old fashioneds, highballs, liquor glasses, and ice cube bowl.

Sketched below are the basic pieces of stemware available in a given Heisey pattern — however, the pattern itself will determine the shape of the stemware "bowls."


