

When I took this position, I strongly believed one of my major responsibilities was in relationship building. Relationships with the membership, staff, press, other association related groups and the public. This is how I feel those relationships are progressing:

Membership: the warm reception and well wishes I received during Convention week encouraged me. I was impressed at the dedication and devotion the members have to the Association and the Museum.

Staff: You have a group of very dedicated staff that is attempting to do as much as they can with the resources and people power available to them.

As you know, Cheri will be leaving next week. Cheri has carried a very big load. I appreciate the documentation she has prepared on how the newsletter is put together, printed and mailed. That process is becoming more familiar, wish I could say the same for learning web management. We were able to copy the Convention Pictures from the *Newsletter* to the website. I want to publicly thank her for all her efforts and patience in making this transition as easy as she could.

Thanks to the assistance of Connie Dall and Dave Spahr, we have been able to hire Lynn Weidner as the new Curator. Lynn will start August 12th. See more about Lynn in the Museum Report. Cheri will be coming back from time to time to help both Lynn and I during this transition.

Public Relations: We were fortunate to have several articles in the *Newark Advocate* the week of Convention. These articles brought HCA and the Heisey Museum to the attention of many people in the east central Ohio area

that the *Advocate* supplies stories to. In talking with several of the reporters, we learned that since we are a non-profit organization, we have permission to use any photo or article that appears in the *Advocate*. We have taken advantage of this opportunity with the cover story for the September *Heisey News* on the "Heisey Boys."

On July 10, 2002, Malissa Marsh from WBNS 10 TV visited with a videographer. She interviewed me and spent about 40 minutes walking through the museum shooting video. The piece aired on August 6th as part of a "Road Show."

On August 7th a crew was here from WSYX Channel 6 and did something very similar. They requested to meet with some local members to discuss collecting Heisey Glass. I want to thank Dick Smith, and Dick Marsh for their help during the taping.

Cheri has been very active in the Licking County Historical Alliance. This is an organization consisting of all the historical and educational venues in Licking County. This group has made plans for a month long history celebration in September. The National Heisey Glass Museum, in conjunction with other Newark attractions, will be featured the weekend of September 21. Our theme will be "Salute to our Veterans." It will feature glass made during the war era, Heisey employees that served during that time and how Heisey Glass dealt with those difficult times.

I have met with the Licking County
Convention and Visitors Bureau. I have
asked for their assistance in increasing
promotion and attendance at the Museum.
They have given me some good ideas to think
about and are willing to help all they can.
They offer signs to go on the 10 billboards
they have entering Licking County. I will
budget for these in next year's show budget.

The Executive Committee has approved a Halloween Open House in addition to our

normal Holiday Open House. We are also looking at a special marketing campaign to tour operators.

With the approval of the Executive Committee, we have joined the Greater Columbus Convention and Visitors Bureau. This will get our name out to a more national audience and I believe have a positive impact on Museum traffic. Of particular interest is the Motor Coach Council they have. This group specifically targets Motor Coach tour operators that are looking for venues.

On July 25th, I met with representatives of the Licking and Guernsey County Convention and Visitors Bureaus. The two CVBs want to form a partnership that would promote glass and pottery in the two counties. This is still in the infancy stage, but again it will help get the Heisey name before a potential new audience.

On July 16th, 25-Newark High School Summer School English Class students visited the Museum. While many of them had heard of Heisey, few had any knowledge of the history or impact the company had on Newark. The students really enjoyed the video on the history of Heisey and were impressed with the Museum collection. Many said they wanted to come back and spend more time in the Museum.

HCA and the Museum had a presence in the Newark Bicentennial Parade on August 16th. Our theme was "Honoring our History Makers." Letters were sent to all former Heisey Employees inviting them to ride in "special" cars in the parade. As of this writing we have seven riders. Look for more info and photos in the October Newsletters.

Opportunities: Volunteers have always been the lifeblood of this organization. Volunteers are needed now more than ever. These volunteers would not have to be Heisey collectors, but just courteous, cheerful individuals who could answer the phone and door so staff could stay on task. If you could spare some time to help, I'd appreciate hearing from you! ♥

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING APRIL 6, 2002 Amy Jo Jones, HCA Secretary

The meeting was called to order at 8:10 a.m. by the president, Charlie Wade, at Apple Tree Auction Center.

The reading of the minutes was waived of the previous general membership meeting in June.

The treasurer, Jack Metcalf, reported income for the previous quarter of \$78,451.56. Expenses were \$66,875.01. Approximately \$12,000 was transferred to the endowment fund as of March 31. The value of the fund is up over the last quarter to stand at the last report at \$1,374,881.72.

Motion by Ned Lavengood to approve the report; seconded by Phil Abrams. Approved unanimously. Charlie Wade reported on the changes at IIT, now known as

KnowledgeWorks. HCA has ended the association with them but will retain a Some of the equipment for the studio was purchased by KnowledgeWorks. Special Projects - Dick Smith. Longaberger is selling pink bunnies and the willow green Duckling to come. The Lavender Ice Pheasant is sold out with only a few seconds left. Few Roosters are available. Coming are Hens, Cygnets, and Chicks. The convention souvenir will be the black Cabochon sign. There are fewer than 500 total. Valley has expressed interest in producing another panther - plans are pending.

Charlie Wade expressed appreciation to Dick Smith for the enormous amount of time he has taken to coordinate business projects on behalf of HCA with Longaberger. Sam Schnaidt was thanked for the work he has done with Fenton.

The Percy and Vivian Moore Dinner will be held in Rochester, New York, September 21. It will be hosted by the Rochester club. More details to follow.

Dick Smith, Nominating Chairman, announced the candidates for election to the board of directors. They are Mike Maxwell, Palmer Haffner, Dave Spahr, William McKelvey, and Sharon Orienter. Charlie Wade asked for nominations from the floor. Being none, Sam Schnaidt moved that nominations be closed. Seconded by Ned Lavengood. Approved. Wade thanked the board of directors, Dick Marsh, Bob Ryan, and members of study clubs for conducting the auction.

The North Carolina Study Club set forth a challenge to other study clubs to donate money to the operating fund. Their kick-off donation was \$1,000.

The meeting was adjourned.

FROM THE ARCHIVES: Visible Cooking Ware

VICKI MEEHAN

The July 2002 issue of Heisey News provided Heisey's catalog and price list for visible cooking ware. accompanying article noted that Heisey was sued by Corning and didn't make these products for very long. I recently found in the archives two agreements from 1919 and 1920 between A. H. Heisey & Co. and a Mr. M. Meth regarding the acquisition of a formula for a "transparent, heat-resisting glass" that is "equal to the heat-resisting product of the Corning Glass Works." I believe that the first agreement, dated September 29, 1919, was signed by A. H., himself. The second agreement is a bit ambiguous as Mr. Meth agreed to furnish Heisey with a license from Corning that would permit Heisey to manufacture glassware under Corning's patent OR for cooking ware that "as been made and manufactured, sold and used in Germany some years before the Corning Glass Co., secured its patents. "◆



We hereby agree to purchase from Mr.M.Heth, his formula for transparent, heat-resisting glass, which he is to demonstrate to our entire satisfaction. That is, to produce a heat-resisting commercial article equal to the heast-resisting product of the Corning Glass Works Borning, N.Y. Upon acceptance of same, we agree to pay Mr.Meth One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00)

We further agree not to divulge 30 any one other than our trusted employes, any information relating to this formula.



Newark, Ohio, Feb2nd, 1920

For and in consideration of the sum of FiweHundred Dollars, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, I hereby agree to accept this sum in full consideration of all demands for any and all receipts that I have furnished, or given A.H.Heisey & Co..

It is further understood that in case A.H.Heiser & Cosecure the right from the Corning Glass Co., in case of my failure to secure same, that A.H.Heisey & Co. will pay me a further consideration of Five Hundred Dollars.

It is further understood that in case I secure a license from the Corning Glass Co., to permit A.H. Heisey & Co., to manufacture, without any further consideration, cooking ware under the Corning Glass Company's patent, that A.H. Heisey & Co., will pay me a further consideration of Five Hundred Dollars.

How Things Got Started

Dick Marsh provided the following letter. It deals with the acquisition of the King House. We hope you newer members will enjoy this and you veterans enjoy a blast from the past.

July 13, 1973

To All Voting Members:

An emergency meeting of all voting members of the HCA has been called for Sunday, July 22nd at 1:00 p.m. at the Buckingham House, corner of 6th and Main Streets, Newark.

A house built in 1831, which now must be moved to make way for a motel, or it will be torn down, has been offered to the HCA free of charge. The Museum Committee has looked at the house and is favorable to accepting it.

This house can be moved to the Sixth Street Park, where Licking County Historical Society already has two houses, at no cost for the land. The house must, of course, be restored. It is a large house and has many attractive features, including a spiral staircase.

You will have an opportunity to view the house after we gather at the Buckingham House.

Time is of the essence. Once the owner of the house moves out it will immediately be torn down unless we have accepted it. She is to move on July 23rd. We have at least \$20,000 presently available for this purpose. This is probably the most important decision we will ever have to make. We hope that you can attend this meeting.

HEISEY BALL VASES

When I think of a Heisey ball vase I visualize their number 4045 Ball pattern vase. Secondly I think of the Saturn ball vase which is number 4085. Both of these were mould blown in several sizes. Heisey also made ball vases in some of their tableware pattern lines which we will mention later on in this article.

The pattern 4045 Ball vases were made from 1936 to 1944. It is known that Heisey made them in the following five colors: crystal, moongleam, alexandrite, sahara and cobalt. It is thought that they were also done in flamingo and tangerine. Although I have yet to find one in flamingo or tangerine after twenty years of searching. They came in six different sizes: 3 inch, 4-, 6-, 7-, 9- and 12-There are a few two-inch Ball vases known in cobalt. We believe this to be true as Neila Bredehoft told me that she had found a notation in the archives, while researching the Roundelay pattern, that the Roundelay salt and pepper were made from the 4045 two inch Ball vase mould. The 3inch size is very illusive and may have only

been produced in a few colors and that for only a very short period of time. This measurement is the diameter of the ball at its widest part.

These 4045 Ball vases were all mould blown with a wide optic on the inside of the glass which can be both felt and seen. The optic was added to the interior by first blowing the

gather of glass into a special optic mould and then into the final mould which would give it its shape and smooth the outside surface leaving the optic only on the inside. Because of the way they were made they were never marked with the moulded Diamond H. The top rim of the 4045 Ball vase is always ground smooth which presents a sharp crisp edge.

The number of optics is one of the important factors in determining if the vase is Heisey. The number of optics varies depending on the size of the ball as follows: two inch, three, four, six and seven inch sixes each have 10 optics in them and the nine and twelve inch sizes have 12 optic.

As with so many other patterns of glass, a few other companies made ball vases which are extremely similar to Heisey's. Except for the

ones with the Waterford acid etched signature on the bottom it is very difficult to tell the difference between some of these and the Heisey originals.

Color is not a very good deciding factor as many of the colors are too similar to Heisey's. Of course, there are clear crystal ones to be found but beware of the blue (which is not quite a deep enough tone to be Heisey's cobalt) there is a light blue which is similar to Heisey's experimental blue and particularly the pink ones (which are an almost perfect match for Heisey flamingo). I have seen three of these in England. Amber is another color you will see but Heisey did not make a ball vase in that color. An amber ball vase was found with a Made in Belgium signature on it.

Quality can not be used as a guide as most of the non-Heisey ones are of good to very good quality. Size is difficult too, as they are so close to Heisey's.

Weight can be a useful clue as the Heisey Ball vase has a good bit of weight for its size. Other words, it should NOT be a feather weight.

The characteristic which I have learned to be the best identifying factor (after the correct number of optics is determined and other than a Heisey etching, etc.) is shape. This is particularly true of the curve at the top of the ball. The Heisey Ball vase is not perfectly round like a basketball but more honey dew melon shaped. At the top of the ball, near the opening, the sides start to go up higher rather than continue the arch to make it perfectly round. Like so many other things in the world of glass collecting this is subtitle and not an easy thing to learn.

The easiest ones to positively identify as Heisey are those with a known etching, a production cutting or engraving. Some of Heisey's production cuttings as well as special cuttings, etchings and engravings

were used to great advantage on the plain rounded, almost sphere like, bodies of their ball vases. There is also a listing in the original factory documents for three carvings on all six sizes. They are Stripes, Stars and Stripes and Nymph and Satyr. I have never seen the Nymph and Satyr carving on a Ball vase, have you?

There is mention of at least seven production cuttings in the factory records. They are Sea Glade (as seen in the _Crockery and Glass Journal_, May, 1934), Madeira, Sheffield, Churchill, Pembroke, Berkeley Square and Saratoga. I have never personally seen any of these.

There is also documentation of at least three etchings. Mermaid in listed on all six sizes, some of which are seen on occasion with the six-inch being the most frequently found. Orchid is listed on the 7-inch size only and has been seen. Jack Frost (an all over carving treatment which causes a total frosted effect) is listed on all six sizes but I don't recall having ever seen it in any size.

Copper wheel engravings on ball vases were primarily done by Emil Krall. We have seen several ball vases that had a simple monogram on them. These, I believe, were done by him as a demo while you watched in various prestigious department stores during his tour in the 1930s. The more elaborate engravings were, I believe, done on a special order bases and are few and far between. These are usually signed in script E. Krall.



Amongst these are Water Lily (shown above), Bird and Rose, Robin in the Tree and Light House and Boat. There was an ad sheet sent by the Heisey factory to the retailers showing these on the 4045 Ball as well as the 4085 Saturn Ball vases in crystal and zircon. (see photo near the end of the article) Prices ranged \$18.00 to \$200.00 for sizes from 3 inches to 12 inches. That was approximately 1937 and the price quote is for a dozen!!!

Not many Heisey Ball vases are found today. Clear crystal ones, in the six-inch size, do come up from time to time. Also, you do see 4 inch Alexandrite ones at the Heisey shows with some regularity. Cobalt and Sahara in 4 and 6-inch sizes appear on occasion. You don't see the 12 inch one very often at all. Most of the sizes and colors are fairly illusive to extremely illusive. This is especially true of any of those with Heisey decorations.

The other mould blown ball vase that was made by Heisey was the number 4085 Saturn Ball vase. It is the 4085 Saturn because it is blown and not the 1485 Saturn which is pressed. Production dates were in the late 1930s. The Saturn Ball Vase was made only in clear crystal and zircon. The top rim of the vase in this pattern is also ground smooth with a sharp edge. I am only personally aware of the 4, 6, 7 and 9-inch sizes. The number of optics is important here too! The four and six inch sizes have 5 optics and the seven and nine-inch sizes have seven optics

in them. You see the six-inch size with some frequency. The 4-inch Saturn Ball Vase should not be confused with the violet vase made in the 1485 Saturn pattern. It is smaller, slumps in at the top and does not have a ground rim. A similar ball vase was made by at least one other company in both clear and a zircon like color but the optics are a little different.

Not as many decorations are found on the Saturn Ball Vase as on the 4045. I believe this to be true due to the nature of the optics. They really completely decorate the vase without further embellishments. Having said that, I should really clarify that the four copper wheel engravings mentioned earlier are listed as having been done on the 4085 Saturn Ball vase in the 4 inch, 6, 7 and nine inch sizes. I also should note that I have seen at least three examples of these.

Ball vases in Heisey tableware patterns Ridgeleigh, Crystolite and Stanhope were mould pressed with no optic and the Impromptu one was mould blown but still without an optic. Instead a bellybutton type decoration was hand tooled on the outside of the vase. In the Ridgeleigh and Crystolite lines the ball vases were made in a seven inch size only and the Impromptu was made in nine inch size only.

Violet vases and rose bowls are of a different form from ball vases and therefore are not included here. A violet vase is usually approximately 4 inches in size and the shape is quite slumped toward the top which has a rounded tooled lip. While violet vases are round they are far less ball shaped. Rose bowls too are a different shape than ball vases. While they range in size from about six to nine inches a rose bowl is not ball shaped at all with the exception of the nine inch Pillows rose bowl which is very round. Also, rose bowls appear in early Heisey patterns.

Imperial Glass Corporation of Bellaire, Ohio did use three of the Heisey Ball vase moulds

after Heisey closed, but their product, for the most part, looks quite different from the Heisey original. They made the 4-inch vase in plum, ultra blue, sunshine yellow and clear but with eighteen vertical optics. They also made the 9-inch vase in the same colors plus emerald. Additionally they made the 9-inch vase in emerald and blue satin finish and without optics. They also reproduced the Ridgeleigh 7-inch ball vase in clear, plum, sunshine yellow and ultra blue.

Duncan made two sizes of their ball vase in the Radiance pattern which looks like Heisey's Crystolite.

These Heisey glass bubbles all make an incredible presentation. They are unusual shapes for vases which make for interestingly different floral arrangements. Any of them would be a great addition to a Heisey collection.

Mary Allbaugh Reed - 1936-38, 48-56 --Worked in the Etching Dept. as a touch-up girl--also worked behind grinders and when they finished polishing glass, she received it and packed it--remembers working on #340, #341, Orchid Etch, Dancing Girl, and special order etches.

Joe Meisenhelder - 1942-56 --Worked in the Blow Dept.--remembers working on the #5025 Line, among others--after Heisey, he worked at Tiffin, then Rodifer Glass in Bellaire, then Lancaster.

Homer Pierce - 1946-50--Worked in the Carpenter Shop--made pieces like benches, stools, making repairs--also worked at the Heisey home.

Shirley Glover - 1942-51--Worked in the office-figured out salesmens' commissions, ling.

Mary Jane O'Neal - 1942-46--Worked in the Etching Room as a touch-up girl.

Audrey Levingston - 1945-51--Pinned bobeches-packed--inspected after grinding-- gathered samples for salesmen--washed up samples.

Kenneth Jenkins - Summers of 1940, 41, and 42--started when he was 11-years old-- worked in the Press Shop with Joe Brogen--worked in the Blow Shop with Homer Ferelle--carrying in—carrying over--cleaning up-- carrying water.

Roy Thompson - 1940-41--Polisher in Finishing Dept.--worked on pressed ware-- polished ground bottoms.

Forrest Laughman - 1933-40--was a foot finisher in the Blow Shop--was a Utility Man-- worked with Pat Giblin Nellie Gildow - 1942-55-- Worked in Bookkeeping.

Frances Holten Smith - 1945-55--Warmed in in the factory--remembers making giraffes, tumblers, nappies, pheasants, and dogs.

Eileen Pierce - 1948-49--Helped mark things before they were cut—washed bottles.

Annalou Campbell - 1947-52--Worked in the Order Dept.--typed orders—worked in the mailing room--took care of returned merchandise.

John Campbell - 1946-50--Stationary Engineer and electrician in factory--started out cleaning in the Mould Room

Betty Seaman - 1942-44--Worked in Advertising--sent out letters telling people who inquired where they could buy Heisey--also worked in Order Dept.

Norma Londot - 1950-54--Secretary to Harold Dunham, Sales Manager

Thomas Snedeker - 1946-54--Mouldmaker-remembers making moulds for elephant mug, nappies, and plates. ◆
