A. H. HEISEY GLASS COMPANY, THE BEGINNING Joe Lokay

The text below is copied from an article in the China, Glass and Lamps Journal dated November 6, 1895

The new Model Glass Works of A. H. Heisey & Co. located in Newark, Ohio are nearing completion, and when finished will deserve their name, as they will in plan, convenience and equipment be second to none in the country. Mr. A. H. Heisey, the head of the firm, deserves the credit for all this, as he has drawn upon his knowledge of the business, the fruits of an experience of many years, to bring the new plant as nearly as possible to perfection. This same knowledge will come into advantageous play in the management of the new enterprise, which can be counted upon, under Mr. Heisey's direction, to win success by putting upon the market only first class goods in all lines covered by the output. Mr. Heisey is still young and vigorous, full of vim and energy, of well-balanced judgement, and possessing every qualification necessary to win success. A brief description of the new factory will interest the readers of China, Glass and Lamps. The new factory building is in size 90 x 90 feet, the working floor being12 feet above ground level. It will be equipped with one 16-inch pot furnace, arranged with 48-inch arches, and having four Nicholson gas producers

connected to it. The stack is 112 feet high from ground to top. The leers and glory holes are connected with one of the improved Nicholson gas producers. There are six leers, 56 feet long, with 60-inch pans. The leer and mold room will be 55 x 90 feet, with four brick arches underneath to be used for storage of materials, etc. The warehouse is 60 x 152 feet, three stories high; the mold shop 33 x 64 feet, three stories high. Fine offices will be located in a building separate from the factory. The roof on the factory, leer and mold rooms is of iron. All the lumber used, such as posts, joists, flooring, etc. are of native hard wood, principally oak, insuring the greatest security against fire. The entire plant will be heated by steam, and lighted by electricity from a plant installed in the works. The entire works are being constructed under supervision of John Nicholson, Jr., the original builder of the Nicholson gas producing furnaces. The works will be under roof by November 15, weather permitting, and are expected to be making glass by the middle of December. They will employ 250 hands. The present mold shop is located in one of the machine works of Newark, where twelve mold makers are busy at work on two handsome line of tableware for the spring trade. Everything about the works is conveniently arranged. The facilities for the receipt of raw materials and fuel and the shipment of ware are unsurpassed. A switch from the Panhandle Railroad reaches each side of the factory. The location is within the city limits, and is beautiful. Electric street cars run by the property, making it easy of access.

NEW IDENTIFICATION POLICY

The Executive Committee recommended and the Board approved a change in the Identification Policy for those requesting identification of glass. The following policy will take effect March 1st, 2003. The Policy will have no effect on HCA members.

Effective March 1st, 2003 the Heisey Collectors of America and the National Heisey Glass Museum will no longer provide free identification of glass to non-members. Complimentary identification will continue to be a valuable member benefit for HCA members.

Individuals may submit identification requests by visiting the Museum, regular mail, or E-mail to curator@heiseymuseum.org, please include or attach a photo of the item whenever possible. The fee to non-members for identification will be \$5.00 per item. Payment can be made by Master Card, VISA, Check, Money Order, or Cash. Requests received without payment information will be sent a reply informing them of the policy. Request will not be forwarded for identification until payment is received.

Identifications are made for informational and educational purposes of the requester only and are not to be used in advertising the item for sale.

HCA and the Museum will continue their policy of not providing appraisals or values of items presented for identification. If appraisals are needed, a Dealer Directory from the Heisey Newsletter will be provided for the requester's use.

Curator's Corner Bob Ryan



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


Mr. Walter B. Lindsay, room 167, is in charge of the new lines of glassware gotten out by the firm of A. H. Heisey & Co., Newark, Ohio. Mr. Heisey, the leading spirit of the new firm, is well and favorably known to the trade as a former member of the old Pittsburgh firm of George Duncan & Co., and was afterwards identified with the United States Glass Co., as superintendent of the sales department. The sets of tableware shown consist of pattern No. 1200, an imitation of cut baspand plain top, designed for plain and decorated sets, a combination of a cut star and diamond out figures, which has been very favorably received by buyers, and been praised by most of the salesman of the older firms as a very meritorious production. The No. 1201 pattern is also an imitation cut figure and shows up especially well in the larger pieces and the shape-lines of the various pieces comprising the set. The new firm has built one of the best equipped and most modern factories in this country, and with its Nicholson furnace, new presses and moulds, the best technical experts in every department, and years of experienced management, is in a position to offer bargains to the trade in new and handsome crystal tableware.



Examples of the 1201 Pattern








"The Story of The Heisey Baby Mug"

The original Child's Cup, now affectionately known as the "Baby Mug", started in March, 1946 as an office joke. Late one day we gathered in Clarence Heisey's office to go over some items I had drawn for production. After serious discussion had ended, talk turned to lighter subjects and there was light-hearted banter. At one point Rod Irwin, who was always slender, suggested to some of the portly officials cut down on their beer. This was typical office tease and after some laughter it w as soon forgotten. Several nights later I was working at home on some things for Rod. I recalled the joke, so I sketched a tiny beer mug and gave it to Rod the next morning. He posed in his office, with a few pertinent comments and became a standing joke for a while.




-HILD'S CUP. + KING 4-6-46

Sometime later when I was working with Clarence, he suddenly asked if I thought the beer mug would make a good child's cup. I suggested that the proportions were not suitable for a small child and the handle ought to be changed to something that would be more attractive to a child. I asked him to give me more time to think about it. I changed the shape to a square profile and then made a dozen attempts to design a handle. These were not satisfactory and I was about to give up on the project. A few days later I was going over animal books with my three young daughters. On one page was a standing elephant in profile with his trunk turned in, and I thought instantly of the child's cup - this was my handle at last. This is one of those numerous happenings which designers call "pop-skull" when an idea pops out of the air, and in a completely irrelevant situation.

I made a hasty sketch of the elephant handle, which charmed my daughters and appealed to Clarence, so I finished working on the drawings on April 6 and it went into production. It had eight plain panels, which intrigued Clarence, and he withdrew it after a short turn. He hit upon the idea of nursery rhymes and Mother Goose tales for the panels. I made some sketches. I thought it would be etched on, but Clarence decided relief work in the mold.

At this time I was very busy on seven major lines and eight or nine special novelty items. I spent 12 or 14 hours on the plain cup, and the illustrations promised to take as much time or more, so the cup was put to bed for nearly a year. There was a break in February 1947 and I started again on the illustrations. On March 25, after some 16 hours of work, I presented the final drawings for production. This was exactly one year after I had made the first sketches for the cup. I do not know how many illustrated cups reached the market, but I do recall that there were no more than 400 plain cups and I took about fifty or sixty for my own family and the rest for my many parents and friends. I now know of only a few of these are still around because babies do throw their cups and glass does break! This beautiful music to a glass house, but heart breaking for today's collector. I no longer have the drawings for the cups except for rough sketch of the illustrations, but I still have working drawings of a child's bowl to go with the cup. This drawing is dated September 5, 1948, but I do believe that it never went into production.



(Vogel's Book IV calls the cup "BED TIME STORY mug, child's, baby mug" and he shows a picture of it on page 61).

HCA 2003 BUDGET Connie Dall

The Board of Directors approved the HCA's operating budget for the 2003 year at the Board meeting on December 14, 2002. The approved budget and the year to date revenue and expenditures as of November 30, 2002 are shown in this issue of the Heisey News.

Some items to point out are how we have balanced the budget the last 2 years and how we plan on balancing in 2003. HCA has been operating in a deficit since 2000. Fortunately there was a "contingency fund" held in a money market for us to transfer into our checking account to pay the bills. This contingency fund was generated from past years of success when our revenue was greater than our expenses. The contingency fund at the beginning of 2000 was \$108,000. As of December 14, 2002 it is \$18,000. So you don't think this is because of runaway spending, I will tell you that our utilities have remained fairly consistent, our employee salaries have gone down each year, our insurance is up and repairs/maintenance fluctuate depending upon major events happening. A major event like having to replace the furnace in the King House. This \$2,100 expense is budgeted in 2003. The biggest reason for the deficit in the last 2 years is reduced sales in the Museum Shop and less business If you look at the Special with Longaberger. Projects/Royalties line item in 2002 it is short by \$13,895 and Longaberger has indicated they will not have any orders in 2003. Our sales in the Museum Shop in 1999 were \$100,000. They will be about \$85,000 in 2002. We are actively pursuing other entities to replace some of this lost Longaberger revenue. We are also pursuing other ways to market our gift shop inventory outside the Museum. You may have read about the effort at the Brass Armadillo Antique Mall in Cincinnati. Your assistance in securing additional retail outlets would be greatly appreciated.

The 2003 budget gives several assumptions upon which it is based. The expenses total \$231,200, which include the expense of the goods sold in the gift shop. This expense does not require cash in 2003 since the current items for sale in the gift shop have already been paid for so the Funds required for 2003 is \$201,200. The revenue generated in 2003 is

budgeted at \$167,200. To balance the budget there is a line item titled reserve transfer. If it is necessary, funds will be transferred from the "contingency fund". If the "contingency fund" is fully depleted, funds will be transferred from the earned income of the endowment fund. The board voted to make available the earned income earned in 2002 for use in 2003.

The endowment committee reviewed the original intent of the endowment fund and the policy as it was drawn up when the fund was started. The fund was established to pay for the operating costs of the Museum. The original policy also stated that the board should every year review whether to use the earned income for that year or not. This is the first year the Board has voted to make the Earned Income from the Endowment Fund available for payment of operating expenses. The amount available for 2002 is approximately \$30,000. We are not planning on using all of that and will only make a transfer from the Earned Income fund into the HCA checking account if it becomes absolutely necessary.




