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### A.H. HEISEY GLASS COMPANY, THE SECOND YEAR 1897 Joe Lokay

The text below is copied from an article in the China, Glass and Lamps Journal dated Sept. 8, 1897

We made brief reference last week to A.H. Heisey & Co.'s new pattern and have since received the illustrated catalogue representing it. They call it No. 1235 (Beaded Panel and Sunburst) and it is the most elegant design we have yet seen in pressed glassware. The pieces are ornamental with fluting supplemented by chrysanthemums, which are as perfect representations of those pretty flowers as it is possible to make in glass. Besides the set there are hotel sugars and creams, individual sugars and creams, celery's, tumblers, pitchers of different sizes and shapes, tankard, berries from 4 to 10 inch, nappies from 4 1/2 to 8 inch, handled jellies, pickle tray, celery tray, oils, catsup, molasses can, salts and peppers, mustard and cover, toothpick, goblet, bar tumbler, salvers, cracker jar, and cover, cake basket, water bottle, low foot bowls, footed jelly, 8 inch plate, high foot bowls, handled decanters, 9 inch plate and a full assortment of wine glasses, about 65 pieces in all. The glass is of clear, bright metal and taking it all around the pattern has a tasteful and showy effect which cannot fail to impress buyers favorably. We anticipate a big demand for this line, as it possesses all the requisites of the first class seller.

### A.H. HEISEY GLASS COMPANY, THE THIRD YEAR 1898 Joe Lokay

The text below is copied from an article in the China, Glass and Lamps Journal date Jan. 12, 1898

A. H. Heisey & Co., of Newark, Ohio, have their exhibits in room 23 and Walter B. Lindsay has charge there. Their new pattern, No. 1255 (Pineapple and Fan), of which there is a full line of about 80 pieces, must be allowed a foremost place among the season's novelties, as it is probably the finest the firm ever got out, and they have made many big successes in their time. There are in this line five sizes of pitchers, three of crackers, six of rose bowls, and four of vases running up from six to twelve inch, besides all the other articles that go make a complete assortment of table glass. They have this elegant pattern decorated in green and gold as well as in plain, and it is taking better than anything they had for a long time. They have the 1225 line (Plain Band or Sawtooth Band) in new decorations of gold band and engraved and it is having a big run; the 1235, Chrysanthemum, line also keeping well to the front in favor. There are four new designs in gas and electric globes and a lot of novelties in miscellaneous goods, besides a full line of pressed bar ware, the whole constituting an assortment that is replete with everything needful in the lines covered.

NOTE: The reference to room 23 is the Heisey display room at the Glassware Manufacturers Exposition held every year in January at the Monongahela House in Pittsburgh, PA. ♦

I really should not even attempt to tell you what is in the auction because I will forget something, but remember I did not get to see everything that came out of the boxes. The people working the other table kept some of the great stuff to themselves, so I too will be surprised come late March, but I guarantee you the Good Lord willing I will be there. My mind recalls some of the great items and here goes, fasten your seat belt. I want no one falling off the couch while reading and crippling themselves before coming to Newark. Just breathe deeply, exhale and continue slowly. Have a cell phone nearby for emergencies. Neither the Heisey Collector's Club nor I are responsible for any accidents as a result of reading this article or parts of it. That said I will start to list some of the items in this auction.

An almost complete small nappy collection with all the rare old patterns grouped so that you can buy what you want. I'm not going to name all the patterns, as they are all there.

#1183 18" Revere under plate with an all over early cutting. It's the largest Heisey cut piece I have seen.

#1509 Queen Ann 14" torte plate with Everglade cutting, 14" plate with a beautiful cutting lots of cross-hatching, gorgeous! While we are talking about cuttings I did not get to handle this piece but it is tremendous.

#1486 Coleport oval 12" floral bowl with the Delft cutting. Now folks this bowl is cut with lots of cross-hatching, absolutely beautiful.

#110 Dolphin candlesticks in Moongleam, a pair that have been made into lamps, only bases offered, very deep Moongleam. Also there is same fish, different color, same variety lamp base with a shade and in Cobalt. Yep! I saw it with my good eye ... Cobalt .... Sid are you OK ?

#31 Jack Be Nimble in Moongleam, a single something to look for and pair up. A challenge.

I saw this one once in a display at the convention. Talk about beautiful # 1445 Grape Cluster 2 light in Sahara. That is correct in Sahara. Hm. . . can you candlestick collectors stand more ?

I will continue anyway. Another item I was not allowed to see #30I candelabra with Alexandrite. I am not sure if the Alexandrite is the bobeches or what the catalog will tell you so this is something to look for.

I recall a #117 Bamboo stick with a Flamingo candlesocket. Sorry folks that's all of the candlesticks I remember. I know there are Ridgeleigh sticks and a beautiful pair of Moongleam #126 Trophy sticks, and more.

Big ball vases in Alexandrite, small ones in Sahara, Cobalt and Zircon and a medium in Cobalt #1428 Pristine bowl with #477 Japanese Scene etching WOW!

Mugs. #3407 Overdorf crystal with a Sahara handle. Now that is an unusual one indeed.

#1404 Old Sandwich in Sultana Amber to go with the two Cobalt ones reported last month.

An absolutely pristine Custard ring tree in Winged Scroll #1280. A fine one. Also a cologne in the same pattern in Custard.

#348I Glenford soda in Flamingo with a Moongleam foot.

How about a Flamingo 8-oz tumbler in #7007 Angular Criss-Cross. That's what I call really rare.

#6009A Roundelay oil bottle in Dawn. Very rare! For you people who collect the old patterns you are not forgotten. #379 Urn large jug.... magnificent.... Urn Toothpicks, too... a lot of the rare tooth picks . . . #325 Pillows .... # 1776 Kalonyal.... #433 Greek Key cordial too in this pattern and cheese and cracker .... #1255 Pineapple and Fan tooth pick and a very rare Vase in Black /Green ... Very unusual and very rare #335 Prince of Wales Bitters Bottle and while we are imbibing how about these treasures. . .

#4026 Spencer decanter in Flamingo.

#4028 Robinson Decanter in Moongleam. So what! It has some watermarks. It is just about the most uncommonly seen item in this auction!

#1420 Tulip vase in Cobalt.

#4045 7" crystal ball vase with the Mermaid deep plate etching.

This is tough guys and dolls especially when you are as old as I am so have some pity. I can't forget the basket collectors with this whimsey basket. A #350 Pinwheel & Fan 10" basket flared. You got to see this one. This was on display once upon a time. Now you can own it. There's only one guys, so please be gentlemen while jousting for it.

Did I say that this auction could very well be the Condiment auction? Such an array of toothpicks, mustards, mayo spoons, cruets, salts and peppers colored and old ones and some interesting relishes too. How about this scarcely seen item?

#1483 Stanhope Sahara 4 part relish with ivory handles. If you have one you have the second one known! Exquisitely rare.

Stanhope covered cigarette box and a cigarette box in Sahara #1496 Mahabar.

Talking about cuttings I almost forgot this #4036.5 Marshal decanter with an elaborate cutting. Special item indeed. Everyone who collects decanters will die for this one. The finest example of Heisey's workmanship.

Have I told you about the experimental Trial Blue sherbet in #3404 Spanish with a Trial Blue stem? Not many of these around. This is your chance for Trial Blue.

A couple pieces of Vaseline. A # 1184 Bouillion and a #473 7" oval plate.

When I was talking about the mugs I forgot the most infrequently seen Old Sandwich mug of all. . . a 12oz Flamingo one.

Back to the mustards. Yeoman mustard pots in Flamingo and Sahara. Twist Mustards in all colors, one in Marigold with a Marigold spoon. Sahara, Moongleam and Flamingo mustards in #1401 Empress.

#1252 Twist Marigold cruet, Flamingo and Moongleam, too

#140I Empress cruets in color. Aalso a Moongleam stopper and footed cruets.

Dinner plates. How about 12" Orchid dinner plates. Many other Orchid pieces and several Heisey Rose etched pieces. Folks I am getting nauseous! Too many fantastic Heisey pieces, but I have to suck it up and report.

#341 Puritan Flamingo jug. Only one known of folks. I don't know what to tell you. Solomon divided the kid so maybe we can divide the jug up. A piece here. . . a piece there. . . as long as you pay for it, that is all that matters.

Now for the piece de resistance, #8019 Oriental Poppy jug - unbelievable!

Salt and pepper shakers, Sahara ones, Hawthorne, Moongleam, Alexandrite and an Emerald #1255 salt dip; only about a dozen of these around.

In closing, #1183 Revere 8" plate with George Washington sample Ultrasonic carved bust.

Now folks rare is rare and I can't top this, so I am telling you I have not listed some of the other one of a kinds because you just have to come to Newark to see all of this marvelous Heisey Glass. There are amber bobeches, Rose Etched bobeches, Alexandrite bobeches. There is something for everyone. Participate, come see, meet old friends, and make some new ones.

Read your catalog well. It is loaded with wonderful glass. There is no way I could write an article without a list that would not miss something like an amber baby elephant.

I got to go. My head is swimming. Read all about it in your Heisey Benefit Auction Catalog and let me be the first to thank all the wonderful collectors who heard Dave's plea and answered it so wonderfully. We all thank you. We thank you for every last lot. All the pieces are greatly needed to have a well-rounded auction. You did yourselves proud. Not only do I thank you but also I congratulate you.

See you all in Newark on the 27th, 28th and 29th. Travel safely, bring money, and please don't bid against me. Ha! That will be the day. P.S. I know that punch cup collectors never have anything to look for after they find a Flamingo Greek Key and a #423 Diamond Band cup so I wanted to separate this item from the main text so you would all dive for it. Are you ready?

#8015 Stippled Thumbprint Sultana Amber punch cup. Only two known of. Go for it! See you there!

P.P.S. If you are sick in bed and can't get out from under the covers we will bid for you but please send your bids in early so we don't miss them. We have expert bidders doing the absentee bidding. Subtle Dick Smith and Sly Nod Bob Rarey. So you are in good hands. Your bids from All States will be handled competitively. ◆

### The Eyes Have It Georgia G. Otten

I have the good fortune of belonging to one of the Heisey study clubs. That means, in my case, that I have the pleasure of spending one night a month with a group of Heisey collectors and enthusiasts. I am also a benefactor of programs put on each month by one of the members. We have had some very interesting programs over the years. Education is our goal and fun can go right along with that!

Recently the program portion of our meeting was a combination of show and tell or bring and brag but with a twist and not 1252! People were to bring in their favorite piece of Heisey and be prepared to discuss that piece. And then to bring along another piece of Heisey they deemed either poorly designed, or not quite so elegant...I hesitate to use the word 'ugly' in the same sentence with Heisey, but 'tis true, there is some ugly Heisey out there. The old adage is, 'beauty is in the eye of the beholder' and so it went......my favorite Heisey.

This particular night was not a night to be thin skinned. What one person thought not so attractive was beautiful to others. At least one of our members said there was no such thing as ugly Heisey and that was echoed with another saying, "We have never bought any ugly Heisey." Again, all in the eye of the beholder! These two people did not bring in anything but wonderful, wonderful lamp finials, one in Moongleam and one in Sahara, made from the Steeple stopper! That's not ugly!

There was agreement on two pieces brought in as being 'poorly designed.' One was a #5078 Park Avenue stem....too hard to hold.....that flat stem! The other was the #125 Leaf Design candleholder which looks like an errant blob of glass that just oozed from a place unknown and hardened into an unpleasant shape......not attractive at all. Adding a candle would not help it.... And I know someone is reading this paragraph and is saying, "What, Park Avenue ugly? I don't think so" and another saying the same about the leaf blob! Again, what is not so attractive to one is lovely to another.

Two items brought in as 'ugly' were so perhaps because a decoration had been added to them. There was a New Era double light, okay by itself, but not so okay with an orangey-red enamel line decoration that might have been done with a magic marker?....Nail polish would never have come in that color! ### A.H. HEISEY GLASS COMPANY, THE FOURTH YEAR 1899 Joe Lokay

The text below is copied from an article in the National Glass Budgeted dated Jan. 21, 1899

A new line of manufacture may be said to have been added to the glass industry, and yet, while it is not, strictly speaking, new, it has reached proportions and been engaged in by amply financed firms during recent weeks to an extent that entitles it to special mention. We refer now to colored and opal specialties, such as are now being made by A. H. Heisey & Co. and many others. The product consists in decorated opal novelties, such as plates, vases, stoppered bottles, bouquet holders, puff and powder boxes, glove, cuff and handkerchief boxes, pin trays, match safes, card holders, and ornamental glass ware of various blown and pressed shapes. The enlarged manufacture of this class of goods is a departure in domestic glass making, and marks the beginning of a new line.

The text below is copied from an article in the China, Glass and Lamps Journal dated Aug. 10, 1899

A.H. Heisey & Co., Newark, O., report a splendid demand for their various lines of glassware. Their handsome imitation cut No. 1250 Pattern (Groove and Slash) has been the admiration of everybody who has seen it ever since it was placed on the market last winter. It has staying qualities and is commanding a good sale today. This firm is making a magnificent 14-inch punch bowl in opal, with foot or without, which is having an excellent sale. They also make it in Ivorina Verde, emerald and crystal, plain and decorated. The prospects for a heavy fall demand were never better.

The text below is copied from an article in the China, Glass and Lamps Journal dated Sept. 21, 1899

A.H. Heisey & Co., of Newark, O., known among the makers of fine pressed crystal and opal glassware in the United States, have departed boldly and radically from the beaten path in designing their new line of crystal tableware, which they call No. 300 (Peerless). The line is severely plain being a reproduction of the

old pure lead flint cut glassware of our fathers, with its limpid honest crystal, its broad cut flute, and regularly scalloped edge. There is good weight and strength in the set line, the inward cut curved line of colonial glassware being preserved, which shows off the fine quality of the metal the set is in. After so many attempts to do something out of the ordinary rut in glassware designing and the monotonous repetition of the small light in-cut of modern cut glassware, it is pleasant to turn to an honest and unpretentious reproduction of the old and simple forms of antiquity, since one feels at once that only a metal maker capable of producing pure, fine crystal, would be bold enough to adopt a heavy cutware pattern with broad flute. We predict a large sale for Heisey's new No. 300 line.

The text below is copied from an article in the China, Glass and Lamps Journal dated Oct. 19, 1899

The new imitation cut pattern, No. 300 (Peerless), of A. H. Heisey & Co. Newark, O., is one of richest and prettiest things offered the trade for some time. It is made of the purest crystal glass and the shape is a decidedly pretty one. They are receiving the endorsement of the public for good taste and sound judgment in the way of fine orders and it is certain that this line will be one of the most popular things brought out this season. ♦

## Heisey Glass Desired for Elegance, Quality & Function

Heisey glass is some of the finest elegant tableware ever produced in America. Many people still hunt for that last Orchid claret stem to complete their best table setting, although the company has been out of business for the better half of a century! The very usefulness of their wares is part of the appeal, though Heisey is often hard to find and not inexpensive.

There is something special about not just collecting, but being able to use the antiques you've amassed. Not many people are going to put water and roses into a 100 year old Weller vase, but if you have a collection of beautiful Heisey stems, many collectors do use them on some occasions. I had one collector tell me that he even used his rare Rose dinner plates, though only with plastic cutlery.

The A. H. Heisey company produced elegant glassware for practical usage from 1896 to 1957 in Newark, Ohio. The glass they created was not cheap when it was made, and it showed up in many a bride's registry. They began producing press-molded glass from older 'Early American Pattern Glass' molds, and moved on to make the beautiful, delicate glass that people often term crystal\* today. While some of the colors the company produced resemble so-called "Depression glass", and they did produce glass in the Depression, Heisey glass could not be more different from the dimestore giveaway stuff that collectors now search out and term Depression glass. Heisey is "Elegant glass", stuff that wasn't cheap when it was made and had considerable hand finishing that went into its production, from blown portions to fire polishing, making its quality inherent. Unmelted 'seeds' of sand are unusual, and bubbles are rare. The thin walls of cups and stems also tell a different tale than the clunky, often imperfect Depression glass.

Judging by requests in our malls over the course of several years, my opinion is that Heisey's Orchid pattern is the most popular today. Some casual collectors (who've maybe inherited Grandma's wedding crystal) are unaware that the etching #507, called Orchid, appeared on several different "blanks" or shapes. Some of the blank glass shapes that received the Orchid etching were Cynthia, Tyrolean, Lariat, Waverly and Graceful, the latter two being the most plentiful. So, a collector could purchase an Orchid sherbet only to go home and realize that it was a completely different shape than the rest of their set! This is true of lots of other etchings, not just in Heisey's production but in most other elegant American glass producers.

One common myth I have heard is that "all Heisey is marked". Not true. Most of it is, with their famous diamond enclosed H, but not all of it. The mark is sometimes extremely well hidden; for example, tiny cordials often have an equally tiny mark hidden on the upper half of the stem. Most of their stemware has blown bowls and feet, applied by hand to the pressed stem- thus, the mark, which was pressed into the glass, had to be on the press molded portion of the piece, which was the stem.

Speaking of cordials, that is one truly hot area of the Heisey market. Collectors love them because cordials are cute, easy to display, and a great area to collect in- if it doesn't break your bank. Miniscule Favor vases are also a popular specialized area of Heisey collecting; incidentally, most of them are unmarked. Colored Favor vases are especially rare. Heisey animal figurines are also a non-functional tableware area to look at-they made numerous horse figures, geese, pigeons, giraffes, elephants, and others. Heisey only produced a very, very few colored animals, primarily in shades of amber. Most "Heisey" animals in color are actually made by the Imperial company, which owned the Heisey molds for a time. Most of the Imperial animals are marked as such with a scrolling, somewhat illegible twined logo, so its difficult for an educated collector to confuse the two. The Heisey Collectors' Association also produced some colored, marked figurines from the molds; look for their HCA stamp.

While colored Heisey glassware is tougher to find than the clear, it does exist. The pink and yellow, Flamingo and Sahara respectively, are the most

common. Moongleam is probably the next most common; a light mint green mostly, though it does vary in intensity, and Hawthorne, a pale pinkish purple, also turns up reasonably often. The most interesting color they came up with, in my opinion, is Alexandrite; it changes color in different lights just like the eponymous gemstone, from light purplish blue to intense pink. It is rare, as is Tangerine- a very intense dark orange that can range up to red. Steigel Blue, a Cobalt color, is often the rarest to find in many shapes, but occasionally is the common piece, with the Warwick cornucopia being the best Marigold- a bright, sunny yellow- was example. replaced by the more stable Sahara, and is not terribly easy to find, but not particularly popular, either. Tangerine, most Steigel Blue pieces, and Alexandrite are usually the prize finds, though Moongleam is a close fourth in some shapes. I am quite fond of their later Dawn color, a short-lived smoke glass which looks purple in the bunched areas. However, even though it's not easy to find, it's not particularly popular or expensive as compared to most other colors. Light amber appears to be a color primarily used for the very occasional colored horse figurine. Zircon is a light, clear sea green color often found in the Saturn pattern, and is quite desirable. Custard, called by the company Ivorina Verde, is a color which fluoresces under blacklight, due to radioactive compounds used in its production, and is mostly found in the early production of Heisey glass, often with gold or painted floral decoration. There were a few other colors they produced, but none that stand out more to most collectors than those mentioned. Besides the Imperial reissues of some items, the collector needs to learn what a repair looks and feels like. Especially the rims of stemware can have all but undetectable repairs. First, if you've found a few matching stems, compare height. They should be fairly close, but since they were hand worked, expect variation naturally. Next, get used to running your finger around the rim. If you don't feel a chip (feeling is usually easier than seeing one) ask vourself

if the rim is smooth and slightly rounded, or sharp and angular. If it's sharp, does it have a slight grain to it that drags at your hand? That's a pretty good indication a professional ground the piece down to remove a nick. Also feel the foot in the same way. A couple of good resources exist to the fan of Heisey glass. A new book was published fairly recently, Heisey Glass 1896-1957 Identification and Value Guide by Neila and Tom Bredehoft. Its probably the 16 best resource, though the older Collector's Encyclopedia of Heisey Glass 1925-1938 by the same authors is more exhaustive and has more catalogue reprints.

Heisey failed to spark interest in post-war America, as the formal dinner party was not as common an event. The smoky grey Dawn color was one attempt to change with the times, but it wasn't of much interest to the speedy new throwaway society in the making. Heisey closed their doors in 1957, but collector interest in this elegant glassware has only increased with time.

\*Crystal is basically a marketing term, and doesn't refer to any particular composition in elegant glass, though sometimes glass with high lead content is to what the term refers. Heisey's glassware didn't have a high lead content, nor do most stems that most people call crystal. -Holly Regan Shop for Heisey and 15,500 other antiques on our website: •

### The Making of a HEISEYHOLIC Margie Satryan

My first introduction to the world of Heisey was 50 years ago when I was invited to my boyfriend's (now my husband of 49 years) home for Christmas dinner. Green dishes that had been sitting in the china closet since the previous Christmas, had to be washed and dried before they could be used. Then, of course, they had to be washed and dried after dinner to be placed back in the china cupboard, to be used again the next Christmas. I was told they were Heisey dishes only used on special occasions. I was one of the chief participants in this ritual for many years to come and did not particularly enjoy it. Through the years, I learned that two of my husband's aunts also had sets of Heisey dishes, but theirs were pink in color. One aunt lived in Newark, Ohio near the Heisey plant where her next door neighbor worked and got these dishes for the three sisters.

I had received some beautiful stemware with roses etched on them as a wedding gift in 1954 and told my mother-in-law some years later that I thought I remembered there was a little brochure in the box saying they were Heisey. She told me they couldn't be since there was no trademark (diamond H) on them like that on her dishes. It wasn't until 1983, when I was at an antique show and saw a piece of stemware I thought looked just like mine and asked the dealer what it was. She informed me that it was Heisey Rose and indicated where the diamond H was located. I couldn't wait to get home to look on my stemware to see if the diamond H was there and, to my delight, every piece had that little diamond H impressed on the leaf of the stem.

That discovery piqued my interest in learning about Heisey and from a brochure I picked up at that antique show, I found out there was an organization called Heisey Collector's of America. I sent my dues in figuring what did I have to lose for \$10 and started receiving the Heisey News. I quickly came to realize that there was a study club in my area. I wrote to Louise Ream and asked for information about that club and she in turn put me in contact with Joe Lokay, who, I was told, could answer any question about Heisey. I joined the Gateway Heisey Collectors Club and with the excellent tutoring of Joe and the rest of the members of that club, I became a "HEISEYHOLIC", according to my husband. Belonging to a study club and putting a little time and effort in studying the various books that are available about Heisey gives one a good background and enables one to identify Heisey glass whether they see that diamond H or not.

In my first few years of collecting Heisey, I think I purchased every piece I found at estate sales and antique shops, but I have become more selective as the years have passed and now limit my purchases. Those green dishes that I helped wash and dry every Christmas now belong to my sister-in-law. But, I was the grateful recipient of some Flamingo Twist dishes from my husband's aunt and over the years I have added to that gift, so now I have a complete service for twelve and have at least one of all but three items made in the Flamingo Twist pattern. In addition to the Rose stemware and the Flamingo Twist, my Heisey collection also consists of an extensive collection of Beaded Panel and Sunburst items and my fireplace mantle contains an array of Heisey animals. Of course, I have many other "special" Heisey items I have come across in the twenty years I have been an active "HEISEYHOLIC".

Now, one of my greatest pleasures is washing and drying all of my Heisey! ◆






