2003 Benefit Auction "Mail Bid Summary" Dick Smith

The Auction was a huge success, thanks to the consignors, all the bidders, Dave Spahr, and all the Volunteers who helped put this on.

There were a total of 60 people who placed a mail bid. Of these 60, bids were place on a total of 495 lots. 86 of those lots had a successful bid. A total of 409 lots were unsuccessful.

Mail bidders placed bids for a total of \$50,000 on these 495 lots. There were \$41,000 losing bids and \$9,000 successful bids.

All mail bid items were inspected by several people to see if there was any damage not called in the catalog. If some significant damage was detected that was not cataloged, then we used our discretion and most likely did not execute your bid. This should explain why some things might have sold for less than your mail bid. There were a couple of cases where someone from the crowd was on your top price and we could not bid higher because we were out of money. Therefore, they purchased it at your top bid amount.

If you marked your bid "Mint Only" and there were any questions damage, pattern, color, etc., we did not bid.


