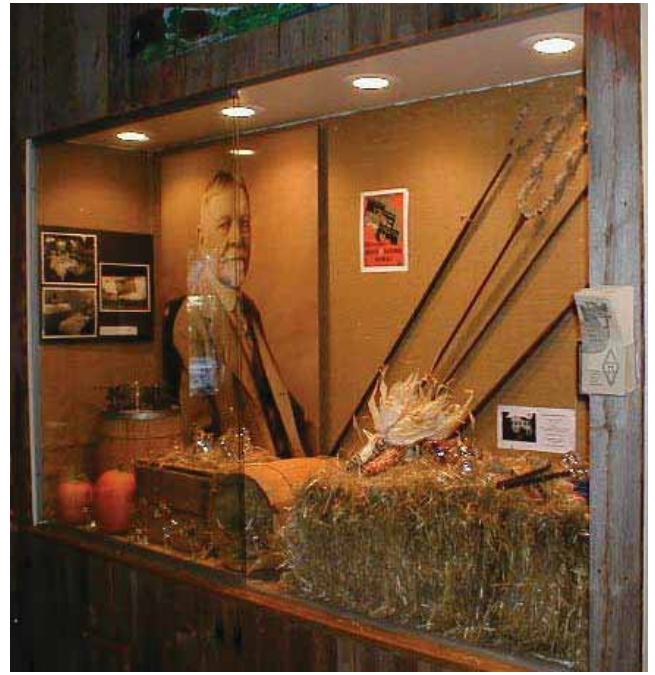

TREASURERS REPORT

We have now put to bed the first three-quarters of 2003! It has been a good year for HCA! On other pages of the newsletter you will find the Budget Vs. Actual report through September 30, 2003, and a report on the Endowment Fund.

Thanks to our most recent special project-producing pieces for Longaberger which netted us over \$26,000, we have finished the three quarters of 2003 in the black and have brought in \$12,584 more than we have spent. Most of our fund-raising projects are now complete and we have exceeded our total 2003 budgeted revenue by over 4%. Our expenses are running about 5% behind at 70.10% versus 75.00%, which has helped. Hopefully we'll finish the year in a positive cash position.

The HCA Endowment fund has grown by \$26,032.29 to a new total of \$1,381,351.93 since June 30, 2003. This was after we transferred \$30,000 of earned income from the endowment fund (consistent with the approved budget) and placed it in a separate money market account to provide adequate cash reserves for operations and special projects in the future. We are truly fortunate to dedicated members and clubs who donate monies for the endowment fund to help assure our future.

We are now beginning to work on the 2004 budget. If there are special items or things you wish considered, please contact a board member. The budget represents an action plan for your association and will be carefully considered as we continue to face challenging times. We have been fortunate this year as our main projects came in better than we anticipated. This will not always be the case.

Thank you for your interest in HCA finances and we want to take steps to strengthen the organization and provide the services you desire. Your continued financial support and volunteerism makes the museum a great showplace and educational facility for all members to use.

AN OUT OF SIGHT SIGHTING

When is a "sighting" not a "Sighting?" One would assume you'd have to see a special piece of Heisey to register it as a sighting but we've just changed the rules.

One of the best non-sightings (actually the only one) I've ever received came recently from George Shamel. If you don't know George you haven't been into Heisey very long. Among other things, George was at one time President of the Heisey Collectors of America – no small feat.

George Schamel reported that in a novel called "Death at the Door" by K.C. Greely there is a Heisey reference. "Death at the Door" is a story of thefts at summer homes on an island off the coast of Michigan (in the lake, I presume). The homes on this island are burglarized in the winter when no

one is about. In one home (the centerpiece of the novel) the thieves made off with a ton of art glass – Lalique, Daum, Tiffany etc. – and among the items stolen were, “120 pieces of Heisey animals!” Ain’t that a kick in the head? That author knows art glass.

The author, K.C. Greely (of indeterminate sex), was born in West Virginia and now lives in Nebraska. The West Virginia connection would explain Ms/Mr. K. C. Greely’s acquaintance with Heisey. West Virginia is a glass production center in this country. I wonder if K.C. was a collector? Could someone check the membership list?

I found this fascinating. Has anyone else ever come across Heisey in a book? Don’t report on anything by Vogel, Bredehoff or Yeakly, you smart alecs. I mean a work of fiction. Sure, price guides may also be works of fiction but that’s not what I mean.

Not a work of fiction and definitely a sighting is a piece submitted by Craig Kratchovil. Craig is a serious Heisey collector and, among other things, he collects cocktail shakers. Heisey’s shakers are an important part of his collection. It’s not enough that he has a representation of each of Heisey’s cocktail shakers – no, this fellow has to have them with assorted cuttings and etchings.

As you know, Heisey did a number of cuttings and etchings for various organizations, colleges and universities, and I suspect we’ll never know them all, and Craig will probably go bonkers trying to collect them all anyway. No matter, Craig came up with a winner – the No. 4225 Cobel Cocktail shaker decorated with the Harvard emblem!

I’ll tell you right off that the decoration is not a cutting or etching, it’s a decal, but you can’t tell that from our photo. The Harvard shield is in red and within it are three open books, each with letters that when put together spell “Veritas.” This is Latin for “Truth,” the Harvard motto (unfortunately, once a student graduates and works his way up to CEO of a company – truth goes out the window). Underneath the shield is the name Harvard spelled out within a decorative vine.

I’m not aware of many decals on Heisey glass (the bitters bottles come to mind) but I wouldn’t turn my nose up at this one. It’s a fine addition to a great collection. ♥

IDENTIFICATION OF HEISEY ALEXANDRITE COLOR

Editors Note: This article appeared in the 1974 June Issue # 6 of the Heisley News on Page 6.

Alexandrite is one of Heisey's more interesting colors. It was derived by adding the rare-earth element, neodymium, to the glass formula. The characteristic delicate purple color of a neodymium glass might look to the untrained observer like Hawthorne, Amethyst, Orchid, Lavender, sun colored purple, a combination of pink and blue glass colorants, etc. However, when glasses in question are examined first under incandescent light (regular light bulb) and then under fluorescent light, the neodymium-containing Alexandrite glass can be easily and readily identified. The observer will be impressed by the color difference under the two light sources.

The identifying feature is the "dichroism" of neodymium glasses. Dichroism means that there are two color sensations depending on the type of illumination. Under incandescent light, neodymium glass has a red color, under fluorescent light, it has a blue color. A simple explanation is as follows. Incandescent light is strong in the red and yellow color ranges and weak in the blue color range. Since neodymium Alexandrite glass completely absorbs the yellow color range, the result is that the red color predominately remains under the incandescent light and thus the glass looks red. The blue color predominately remains under the fluorescent light and thus the glass looks blue. In natural daylight, the predominate color is blue.

This color play exhibited by neodymium glass has sometimes been referred to as the "alexandrite effect." The precious stone, Alexandrite, is famous for its property of changing color with the type of illumination. The mineral is green under fluorescent light and dark red under incandescent light.

So, if you have a piece of glass of a Heisey pattern that you think is Alexandrite, check its color under the two different light sources. Make the test in some degree of shade or darkness so that the natural

light or light from other sources does not overpower and washout your test light source. Also, it is important that the glass piece be held close to the incandescent light to get the full predominance of the red color. If there are two color sensations, the glass color is Alexandrite.

Since neodymium is a scarce element and then once obtained, it is difficult to concentrate and purify; it is a costly ingredient to buy for use in glass. Thus, Alexandrite was an expensive glass to make. This could be one of the reasons for the short production period of Alexandrite glass by Heisey (late 1920's to the early 1930's). ♦

DAYTON CLUB SPONSORS "FROM FIRE TO DESIRE"

The flame has been extinguished on the "From Fire to Desire" exhibit of Heisey glass at the Carillon Historical Park in Dayton, Ohio. This display was part of our clubs' Percy and Vivian Moore Dinner held on October 4. The display had been open to the public since September 9 and drew over 1600 visitors. So it was no wonder that we were saddened to see the glass packed away and the sun was now only shining on an empty room, which will once again become the training room at Carillon Park. The brilliance of the display will linger on only in our memories and pictures

This project which was just a flicker of flame a few years ago really ignited and enchanted the young, the old, the collector, the non-collector and even our own HCA members who came to Dayton for the Percy and Vivian Moore events our club had planned.

The sounds of ooh, the ahs "oh, look at this" and other comments like "I had no idea they made so many colors", " I think I have one of those", "is it still made today", oh, what is this piece used for, "is this all one collection", will ring in the ears of those members who docented the display each day from September 9 through October 12,

Other events that coincided with our "From Fire to Desire" display of Heisey glass were a wine and cheese for Carillon Park members only on September 8, This event was attended by 150 and rave reviews were given on our clubs' display. Frank Wollenhaupt on the "History of Glass Making" Bob Ryan spoke on the history of Heisey. The Carillon Park sponsored a luncheon on September 22 for its' members and Georgia Otten presented the program on "Serving it up with Heisey." During her presentation she showed us all how much more elegant to serve using Heisey pieces – cottage cheese, mustards, French dressing bowls, cake salvers, nut dishes, and more rather than how we in our rushed lives just tend to put the ketchup, mustard, dressing bottles directly on the table. Each table had a flower centerpiece that was arranged in

Heisey bowls. Two people went home from this event with a piece of Heisey that was given as door prizes. On Saturday, October 11, the Carillon Park sponsored a Road Show – glass ID and verbal appraisal for \$5 per item. Over 130 pieces of glass were identified and appraised. There were some people who went home, satisfied enough that they came back a second time to have even more glass appraised. This was not just a Heisey glass appraisal, it was any glass that people felt they wanted to know more about – we all have our treasures!

During our wine and cheese preview and silent auction on Friday evening, Oct 3 we offered 30 items up for auction. The 80 + who attended this event shared our enthusiasm of the display and managed to take home some Heisey to add to their collections. We now have one new enthusiastic collector, Nancy Horlacher, curator of the Carillon Historical Park. She was the successful bidder on the Yeoman cruet and somehow in the period of two days acquired seven pieces of Heisey. The dinner on October 4 was attended by eighty-three (83) persons – most HCA members but some new people who expressed an interest in our events and wanted to take part in them. In lieu of a souvenir piece made especially for this event, each guest was presented a real Heisey champagne glass with champagne (these had been collected by our members over a three year period and donated to the club for this event) and a toast was given by Mike Maxwell, HCA president and Ned Lavengood from North Carolina. A hush fell over the room as the waitress started serving the champagne. I don't recall ever hearing such a quiet room of Heisey collectors. Tom Bischoff played auctioneer for a lively auction of several Heisey feasibility items.

On both Friday and Saturday evenings – a room "sell and swap" was held by several people staying at the Wellsley Inn Dayton South. I heard that people were able to purchase/swap several items and were well pleased with this event as well as the others. During the day on Saturday, people were traveling to Lebanon, Waynesville and Springfield to check out the antique shops/malls in those areas. Some even took advantage of the outlet mall, which is in Jeffersonville. There was not a lack of things to do or places to go for those who ventured out.

Not only was Nancy inspired to join us Heisey collectors – because we were “all just so friendly and willing to share”, the flame of interest in our beautiful display will surely spark some new members in HCA. We gave out lots of brochures on the museum and membership applications to HCA.

There are so many people to thank for the success of this display and the Percy and Vivian Moore dinner I hope I don't miss anyone. First of all – all the members of the Dayton Heisey Collectors Club – each and every one was supportive and took part in all the events, offered their glass for use in the display, tended the display daily, donated items for the wine and cheese as well as collecting and donating champagne glasses. It could not have been done without them and I enjoyed working with all of them. Next – the people at the Carillon Historical Park – Mary Matthews, Director, Nancy Horlacher, Curator, Shawn Miller, Events Director, Betsey Knapp, Museum Registrar; Pam Ribic, Administrative Director; Alec Heckman, Education Director; all the volunteers who manned the front registration desk; Patti and the maintenance staff cannot be forgotten. Patti cleaned the cubes and cases at least every other day and always found something she had not seen previously. The maintenance staff was worked out several times setting up tables/chairs, etc. It took each and every one of them and we truly appreciate their help and support. The staff at the museum kept records of those who were attending supplied us with literature and moral support. We thank you one and all. Greg Moore did an outstanding job on the handout about how Percy and Vivian were so instrumental to HCA in getting this great organization off to a good start. We should be ever grateful to all those who were so dedicated in the early days. Many of those same people are still active today and we thank them for their continued support.

As I said earlier the flame has been extinguished on the “From Fire to Desire” display and the events of the Percy and Vivian Moore weekend, but we are now passing the torch for this annual event to Ned Lavengood and the North Carolina Club. HCA, however, at its discretion, will consign items for auction, add items to the museum collection, and/or sell items in the museum shop.

Each member may consign a maximum of (20) twenty lots to the sale. There is no limit on the number of items in each lot, but HCA retains the right to increase/decrease size/make up of each lot.

Consignors of glassware to this sale will be charged on the following sliding scale of commission per lot: \$5.00-\$49.99=30%; \$50.00-\$199.99=25%; \$200.00-\$399.99=20%; \$400.00-\$749.99=15%; \$750.00 and over = 10%. Settlement for glass sold will be made in full within (10) business days of completed auction, together with a donation slip for commissions charged. All monies received from the sale are held and paid from the HCA Trust Account.

Glassware for the Benefit Auction will be accepted at any time with a cut-off date for the 2004 Auction being January 15, 2004. Glassware will be catalogued in the order it is received.

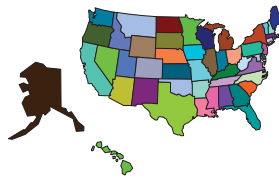

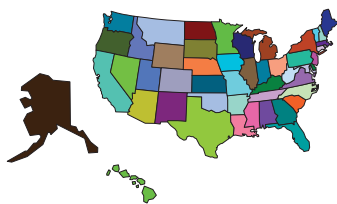

- Use multiple tabs or spaces to make things line up
- Use small fonts that are hard to read

Do:

- Use at least a 12 point font or larger. This is easier to read and the scanner can pick things up better
- Use two spaces after a period within a paragraph
- Use a plain font such as Arial, or CG Omega if possible
- Send as word document if sending as an attachment
- Send pictures in a JPEG format whenever possible

ARE YOU HAVING PROBLEMS RECEIVING YOUR NEWSLETTER?

Every month we get calls from members who do not receive their Newsletters. Several things may account for this.

We get nearly a dozen Newsletters returned to us because we have bad addresses. We have to pay 70 cents each to have these returned with the corrected address from the Post Office. We then have to send out a second Newsletter and pay first class postage.

HCA pays what is called a "Periodical Postage" rate. According to our Representative at the Post Office "...items sent periodical postage should be delivered after first class, and BEFORE other normal bulk mail." He agrees, not all carriers understand or comply with this procedure.

If you do not receive your Newsletter, contact your local Post Master and bring it to their attention and ask they make sure their carriers understand this and comply with it.

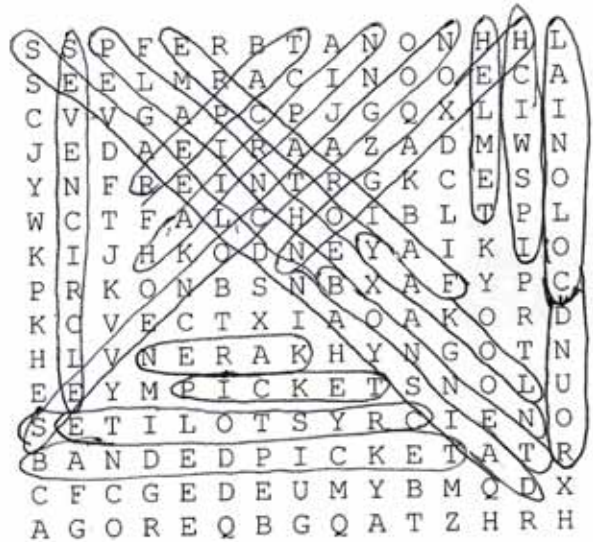
