MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT MIKE MAXWELL

I hope that everyone had a safe Holiday season for 2003. With every new year comes the chance for a fresh start as we tackle what life dishes out to us. I look back at 2003 and feel as a whole, HCA and the Museum came through it fairly well.

A decision was made by the Board of Directors to install an awning at the entrance to the addition. It was installed before the Bicentennial Plaque dedication and Open House on December 13. It was very tastefully done and adds not only beauty but also function. No more standing in the rain or snow until a docent opens the door. This addition has been needed for several years and should serve us for many years to come. As we did when the furnace went out in the King House, we have set up a fund for study club or individual donations. The cost of the awning was right at \$2,500. If you or your club would like to make a donation to offset this expense, please send a check in the amount you wish to donate to the Museum. Be sure you earmark it for the awning fund. Your help will be appreciated.

Your Board of Directors met on December 13. I am happy to say that the 2004 budget was approved. We also made the decision to raise the admission cost to the Museum to \$4.00 with the usual discounts for AAA, tour groups, seniors and children intact. Bill Douglas presented the final version of the children's activity booklet that our Museum staff put together. It is very educational as well as fun. We hope to broaden the horizons by getting children interested at a young age. It was handed out to every child under the age of 12 that came to the open house in December. It will also be available in the gift shop for \$1.00. A discount will also be available to study clubs that wish to order in bulk. Several new reference books are now available in the gift shop. The Board of Directors approved the re-issue of the Doe Head Bookend as well as the Sparrow in Lavender Ice for 2004. The Doe Head will be a preorder item but the Sparrow will become a stock item sold in the gift shop.

HCA needs everyone to put on their collective thinking caps for 2004. I am sure you will probably

recall that I said something very similar in January of 2003. Much like 2003 we do not have any new fund raisers on the horizon. Thanks to several of your ideas, we did end up with some really good ideas that gave HCA some much-needed capital. Longaberger also came through for us in 2003 by purchasing Ruby colts from us for their fall spectacular. Due to inclement weather, it was not too spectacular for Longaberger. It is very doubtful that they will be working with us in 2004. If you or your study clubs have some ideas for fund-raising, please let us know. Your help is always greatly appreciated. Remember, this is your club and your Museum.

Convention 2004 planning is moving along. We chose a theme for it at our December meeting. The 2004 Convention for the Heisey Collectors of America will be called "The Family Reunion." We are going to try to keep most of the events we had last year while trying to change some times in order that more of our dealers may attend. I will give more information on the events as they become more firm. One of the events that everyone seemed to enjoy was the centerpiece auction at the Friday night dinner. We would like to keep this alive. When you next meet with your study club please see if you would like to participate. If we receive enough confirmations, we will include this event.

The Museum had our annual Open House in conjunction with the Christmas in the Park at Veterans Park. Attendance seemed down over last year but it was still a very successful day. We also officially dedicated our Ohio Bicentennial Marker on Saturday afternoon. I had a great time as the "Master of Ceremonies." Several dignitaries were present and offered their thoughts and good wishes for HCA. I met, for the first time, someone who may be the most enthusiastic Heisey collector in the world. I was afforded the pleasure of introducing 12 year old Tanner Temnick. He regaled us with his stories of collecting and what HCA means to him. Talk about a hard act to follow! Thank you Tanner for rejuvenating my own enthusiasm with your heartfelt speech. A big thank you also needs to go out to our Volunteers and Museum staff who worked so very hard to make this day a special one.


DECORATING

MARKER DEDICATION

As Mike said in his article, we dedicated the Ohio Historical Marker on December 13, 2003. This process started back in July of 2002 with the submission of a grant request. We learned of our acceptance in December of 2002. The final wording for the Marker had to be written and submitted for approval. After the wording was approved the Marker was cast and shipped to the Museum. Our original plan was to dedicate the Marker during Convention, but we were told it would not arrive until July. As luck would have it, the Marker arrived two days before Convention. Since we had no time to plan the dedication, the Marker was put on display in the Media Center so people could see it during their visits.

The Board started to investigate an appropriate date and the day of the Open House was selected.

The wording on the plaque is as follows:

The A.H. Heisey & Co. produced high quality, handwrought glass in Newark, Ohio beginning in 1896. Glass originally produced by pressing was intended to simulate cut glass making elegant glass affordable to more families. Heisey was an innovator in He introduced colors and production methods. different patterns of glass to meet the social habits of the era. Highly skilled craftsmen produced, cut, and etched glass in many styles. The plant closed in 1957 because of Heisey's refusal to produce an inferior machine-made product. The beauty and superior quality of this glass makes it a highly collectable item. The Heisey Collectors of America founded in 1971 opened The National Heisey Glass Museum in 1974. The Museum stands as a historical reminder and an educational resource to the heritage of the A.H. Heisey & Co.

AN INTERESTING PIECE OF HEISEY GLASSWARE

FROM THE MUSEUM COLLECTION Walter Ludwig

1489 Puritan Salt Shaker

These shakers are very difficult to find. They are not marked as most of the pieces in this pattern are not. The late puritan pattern consists of about 30 items that takes advantage of the beauty and clarity of Heisey glass in one of its simplest forms. Most of the pieces in the pattern are ashtrays or cigarette boxes of various sizes. The pattern was started in 1937 and produced until the company closed in 1957. The salt and pepper shakers were still listed in the 1956 catalog.

Each shaker has a 1 5/8" square base. The sides then slope up to a shoulder 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " above the bottom, each side of the shaker at this point is 1 3/8" wide. The total height of the shaker is 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " with the top, 2" without the top.

The 1956 catalog lists the shakers as available with either No. 58 or No. 59 tops. The No. 58 tops were considerably more expensive leading me to believe

these where glass tops. The pair in the museum has plastic tops that were probably the No. 59 tops.

You can find these shakers in the museum in the south front parlor of the King House. This room is on the left if you were to enter the King House from its front door. They are located in the lower section of case R2-C3. Look for them the next time you are in the museum.

Be on the lookout for these beauties the next time you are out looking to add a new item to your collection. ♥

HEISEY'S LITTLE THINGS AN INTRODUCTION Louise Ream

I hope that some of you at least have been out hunting for "Little Things" the past month. Back when I began collecting them they were fairly easy to find. I suppose that by now they are becoming more elusive as is much of the glass. This month we'll consider more of the early pattern.

1200 CUT BLOCK

This is Heisey's second pattern, first advertised in January, 1896, again like Fandango, even before the factory had opened. As has been mentioned before, samples were made at the Robinson Glass Company in Zanesville.

Sometimes this pattern is called "Square in Diamond Point, but HCA prefers "Cut Block" because it is easier to say and to write and also because it was given this name long before Vogel named it again. Neither name was original to the Heisey Company as they only gave numbers to their earlier patterns. Vogel shows a few items of the pattern in his books but HCA had the only known original catalog which showed the complete line and these pages were printed in Heisey News back in October, November and December of 1975. This catalog came from the attic of the Wilson Heisey home and was donated to us by the Spences who now own the home. Since that time we have acquired a couple of other small catalogs which also show the pattern.

There are only a few items which get into our "Little Things" category. The salt dip is very interesting as you can see by the picture. Ordinarily they are not plentiful but I once was able to buy six or eight at the same time which helped several people add it to their collection. I collect in pairs but many people want only one so it is fun to share with them.

The salt and pepper and toothpick are also quite nice. The toothpick in my collection is flared at the top, unlike the picture. It is also ruby-stained on the plain part above the band as is much of the #1200 line.

There is an individual cream and sugar which is usually seen in custard as souvenir glass, though it is also known in crystal. Sometimes in the years after 1900 many souvenir items were made in custard and opal and since they were using the mark by then some of these items are found marked.

The same of the individual sugar is often varied and mine has fairly straight sides with a slight flare at the top, rather than being cupped like the picture from the catalog. This set is not tiny as the sugar is 2-1/2" wide and 3" tall but it still is a "little thing." The creamer seems small by comparison to the sugar, even more so than the picture indicates.

Only one type of salt shaker was pictured in the catalog. In stemware, so far as we know, there is only a small wine. Does anyone have this? I can't recall having seen it.

Note that Cut Block comes with shallow engravings which really look more like etching than engraving.

1205 FANCY LOOP

First advertised in February, 1897, Fancy Loop apparently soon became a popular pattern and was a very extensive line. It is full of little goodies and I consider it to be my favorite of the early patterns. It was made in both crystal and emerald and in the latter color it ranks very high in desirability.

Fancy Loop has more variations than any other pattern as can be seen by the pictures. The regular patterns appear on the individual salt, butter pat, celery dips, individual cream and sugar and toothpick. The salt and peppers have the loops at the bottom instead of the top but otherwise are much the same. The cologne may not really be as small as you want in this category but it is really darling and we can fudge a little and call this a "little thing." It is a great addition to ANY collection. It also has the loops at the bottom. No matter how much the pattern varies it all has the same element of design – the loop, the cane and the fine cut or diamond point.

The sherry, wine, bar tumbler, and mustard jar are often not recognized as Fancy Loop because of the extreme variation. Note that the lid of the mustard jar is the same as that of the Fandango pattern. I've never seen most of these LITTLE pieces in emerald but have seen the bar glass, wine, toothpick, individual cream and sugar and large salt shaker in it. Let me know what YOU have in emerald in this category. Check Neila's article on Heisey Decorations – Volume X, No. 10, 1981, for possible decorations on Fancy Loop.

This month I had a rather unusual inquiry from a family member which led to our research and finding a new item in one of the Heisey Stemware patterns, #4091, Kimberly. Our Chris Cain came up with an eBay picture of pilseners in this pattern. We checked them out and lo and behold they were as advertised, Kimberly pilseners. They are beautiful and look great alongside the many goblets and ice teas in their cupboard. Great find Chris. You are now on the family panel of stemware judges. You stumped US.

January 15th deadline for receiving Heisey glass for the Benefit Auction is fast approaching and HCA needs about 1000 more lots of glass to approach last year's wonderful auction results. Now one person cannot send in all of this glass. It takes all of us checking our cupboards and boxes and sending in some great glass or maybe just some Heisey glass. HCA depends upon you making the effort. Many of you who live far away from Newark ask what can we do to help? Well, here is an opportunity. Take



SOMEONE HAD A QUESTION Dick Marsh

Editor's Note: For some time now we've been running a box asking people to share their stories or if they want to see a story on an item. We have received several of your stories and they have been great! We now have our first request for information.

Gary Lanksbury of Bellevue, Washington asked, "For some time I've been wanting to know why straw marks are called that, and how they occur?" He also wanted to know, "Are the Heisey molds really made of cast iron?" "How does one make a cast iron mold?" "I've seen references to re-using molds, presumably for similar patterns. How are the original molds altered?" Thanks, I look forward to the answers.

Well Gary, to get the answers to your questions, we went to Dick Marsh. Dick is one of our volunteer curators and is in charge of the molds and the warehouse. Here are Dick's answers to your questions:

The origin of the term "straw marks" is unknown to me but may be due to the size of the marks. They are caused from a cold spot in the molds and shears that were used to cut off the glass as it was being put in the mold. (Glass is gathered on a punty rod and held over an open mould and it slowly drips off the punty rod into the mold as hot taffy drips or strings from a stirring spoon it slowly sags and must be cut off when the right amount is in the mold. Yes the molds are made of cast iron. Pick up even a small one and one knows it's heavy, i.e., a colt mold most likely weighs in the neighborhood of 35 to 40 pounds, and the large ones cannot be lifted by hand.

The making of a mold in years past, a wooden or plaster model was made to use as a core for a sand casting. Damp sand is packed around the pattern in a two-part frame, which is opened, and the pattern is taken out leaving a cavity in the sand. This cavity is now poured full of molten iron making a reverse image of the pattern. The casting is then taken to a mold shop where the remainder of the detail work is completed by hand using very fine files. Today molds are sunk with a computer-controlled machine that makes a finished mold from a block of iron.

The reuse of molds was and is still common. They're very expensive to make. Some are re-cut using milling equipment or hand files. Others have inserts added to the mold, or a combination of any of the methods. The Whirlpool relish was made this way.

Gary, we hope this answers your questions?

THAT HEISEY DIAMOND H Virginia Johnson

We were novices; we just liked good glass and we were in Iowa Falls, IA (where my husband, Odell Johnson is from) visiting friends. One friend had a fine antique shop so we stopped to see Vern Newton and decided we wanted to buy something. Vern showed us a set of six sodas in a yellow color, a thumbprint and panel pattern with a Diamond H on the bottom. We liked them; they were just the right size for a drink of scotch. They were \$7.00 each and we thought that was a lot of money and wanted to know "why the price?" He told us they were HEISEY. That was November 23, 1971 and our first mistake as we only bought two instead of the six he had. We still have the receipt.

This purchase began our search for knowledge about Heisey Glass; we looked for books; we looked for glass with the Heisey mark; we visited Newark. That was before the Museum was there. We did see an exhibit of Heisey at a historical house on the grounds where the Museum is now located. Somewhere we learned about the Vogel books; we bought those (now tattered and torn) and we learned about pattern names, colors, and the history of Heisey glass. Since then we have purchased almost every book the Museum has sold and have a good referral library. The two sodas we had purchased were #1404 Old Sandwich and the color was Sahara! That was the beginning of our collection of Sahara Old Sandwich and when we sold it in 1998 we had 214 pieces. Moving from FL to MN we didn't have enough shelf space for all of our Heisey. We had such fun building this collection and we used many of the pieces and displayed some of the unusual ones such as the popcorn bowl. However, we kept two of the sodas; perhaps they are the original two we purchased? Odell collected animals and we have those on display behind glass or in our etagere. The first one we purchased was the standing colt.

I think we probably became members of HCA in 1975. In our travels with HCA we became voting members; served on HCA Boards, worked on committees, started two Clubs (FL and MN). We have collected, bought and sold. We have met many wonderful folks who love Heisey as we do. Louise Ream was such an inspiration, and working with her was always interesting and a learning process. I have just spent some time looking through the issues of the Heisey News, years 1972, 1973 and 1974, and many who were so active then are still working and supporting HCA. Our hope is that we can bring into HCA new members to learn about and appreciate Heisey Glass and our beautiful Museum. ♥

HCA 2004 BUDGET Dave Spahr

The Board of Directors approved the HCA's 2004 Operating Budget at the Board Meeting on December 13, 2003. The approved budget and the assumptions made to prepare it are shown elsewhere in this issue. I will include the 2003 year-end numbers in the next issue of Heisey News.

Past treasurer, Connie Dall, in the article concerning last year's budget, explained how we had balanced the budget in past years. We had a "contingency fund" built up over past years which was invested in a money market for us to draw from as needed. Because it was basically used up by the end of 2002, for the 2003 budget the Board approved for the first time using earned income (\$30,000) from the Endowment fund to support operations of HCA and the Museum. We are having a good year in 2003 and have at this time a balance in our cash account and money market account of approximately \$51,000, some of which will be used in December. Our 2004 budget shows a need for \$50,500, some of which will be 2003 endowment income being transferred to the money market account in 2004. The Board has approved the transfer to balance the budget and provide necessary cash flow for the organization. Any money drawn from the endowment is deposited directly into our interest bearing money market account until it is needed and transferred to our operating account.

The 2004 budget includes funds for a full time curator (a current vacant staff position) and to support the graduated implementation of the results from a security study. We have budgeted additional funds as a contingency to cover anticipated legal expenses and also provided funds for much needed brochures. We are not anticipating any growth in museum shop receipts and hope the convention events do well again in 2004. We have a modest increase projected in the benefit auction income, which may or may not come to pass-depends on consignments and donations from you! We are hoping to attract new members, and have increased admissions to the museum.

This budget shows a large dependence on the endowment income and reserve amounts to fund the organization and museum. We really need to come up with some innovative ways to increase revenues and reduce costs without cutting member services. The Board of Directors and our employees are trying to do their part. We can really use your help and ideas.

I also want to thank you for your interest in the finances of HCA and your continued support of HCA and the endowment fund. Your continued support and dedication allows our museum to be a first class showplace and educational facility for Heisey glass.

All items consigned for sale or donated are made by A. H. Heisey and Company, no reproductions by Imperial or others will be accepted, except as consigned by HCA. Owner (consignor) agrees to accept all responsibility for providing merchantable title for all glass sold. Each member may donate an unlimited number of lots to HCA. HCA, however, at its discretion, will consign items for auction, add items to the museum collection, and/or sell items in the museum shop.

Each member may consign a maximum of (20) twenty lots to the sale. There is no limit on the number of items in each lot, but HCA retains the right to increase/decrease size/make up of each lot.

Consignors of glassware to this sale will be charged on the following sliding scale of commission per lot: \$5.00-\$49.99=30%; \$50.00-\$199.99=25%; \$200.00-\$399.99=20%; \$400.00-\$749.99=15%; \$750.00 and over = 10%. Settlement for glass sold will be made in full within (10) business days of completed auction, together with a donation slip for commissions charged. All monies received from the sale are held and paid from the HCA Trust Account.

Glassware for the Benefit Auction will be accepted at any time with a cut-off date for the 2004 Auction being January 15, 2004. Glassware will be catalogued in the order it is received.

It is the responsibility of the consignor to deliver the glassware to the National Heisey Glass Museum. Two pieces from Louise Ream's collection (bought at the auction during convention) were a Flamingo Diana etch on King Arthur goblet and a Yeoman buffet plate with a Bacchus carving. Also an interesting Renaissance etched glass, missing its second etching. Two beautiful Verlys were brought by one of our visitors whose mother worked in the factory. Another visitor brought some of her "garage sale" finds. Two of the four shown pieces were identified as Heisey. What a shopper !! Also shown were a Helmet basket in Moongleam, and a wonderful rare find: a Plantation coupe plate. There also was a marked #10 Carter Inkwell. Another wonderful Louise Ream piece: a Hairpin plate was shared with There was also a Beaded and Panel everybody. Sunburst molasses jug and a shelf support, marked with an H and with a hole for a cord for a light. A Whaley mug with Athletic scenes in the border came next. There was a Ridgeleigh candlestick turned into a light (one of two). There was an interesting Cobalt Spanish champagne that had an "accident" during its assembly and ended up with a nasty crack in the bowl. The last piece to be shown was a beaut. It was a 12" Gardenia bowl, #150, Square on Round. It was finally identified in a copy of Vogel's fourth book.



ARE YOU HAVING PROBLEMS RECEIVING YOUR NEWSLETTER?

Every month we get calls from members who do not receive their Newsletters. Several things may account for this.

We get nearly a dozen Newsletters returned to us because we have bad addresses. We have to pay 70 cents each to have these returned with the corrected address from the Post Office. We then have to send out a second Newsletter and pay first class postage.

HCA pays what is called a "Periodical Postage" rate. According to our Representative at the Post Office "...items sent periodical postage should be delivered after first class, and BEFORE other normal bulk mail." He agrees, not all carriers understand or comply with this procedure.

If you do not receive your Newsletter, contact your local Post Master and bring it to their attention and ask they make sure their carriers understand this and comply with it.
