



AN INTERESTING PIECE OF HEISEY GLASSWARE

FROM THE MUSEUM COLLECTION Walter Ludwig, Curator

6060 Country Club Ice Bucket

The Country Club line came out in 1950 offering a blown barware line with a more modern feel. The sides of the pieces have a graceful convex curve making them feel natural when using them. Often the pieces come with a heavy sham giving the pieces extra sturdiness. None of the ware is marked with the diamond H, so recognition of the pieces in the line is difficult, unless a known Heisey decoration is on the piece. Lucky is the collector who has a piece of Country Club with 517 Winchester '73 etch on it.

The ice tub is listed in the 1953 catalog, but not pictured. The 1956 catalog does picture the piece. Neila and Tom Bredehoft in their book, Heisey Glass, 1896-1957, shows an ice bucket with an Eva Zeisel designed cutting on page 331.

The ice bucket in the Museum collection has Jungle Flower cutting on it. The bucket is 5.34" tall with a 1" sham at the base of the bucket. The bucket measures 6.14" across the top and 4.12" across the bottom. The extra wide sham gives the piece quite a bit of heft weighing just over 2 pounds 11 ounces.

To view the piece in the Museum, see it currently on the main floor in case G1 C23/L. It is in good company in this case with the gold decorated items that were never production items.

This piece would not be easily identifiable as a product of the Heisey factory giving you another opportunity to pick up a desirable piece at a bargain price the next time you are out looking for Heisey at your favorite antique store, show, or flea market.

Mom's Thumbprint Candlestick "Vases" Jack Metcalf



Sahara Thumbprint & Panel #1433


HEISEY'S A, B, AND C PRISMS Joe Lokay





In 1915, Candelabrum #61 was offered with either A or C prisms. It was called a Candelabrum rather than a single candlestick because it was composed of multiple parts. No. 61 contained the 9-inch tall base, the No. 6 square candle holder, the No. 51 ferrule, the No. 9 square bobache, and 12 prisms. The ferrule holds the base and candle holder together. The No. 61 Candelabrum pictures with this article were taken from Heisey Catalog #76, circa 1915. Information also came from the *Heisey Candlesticks, Candelabra, and Lamps* book by Tom Felt and Bob O'Grady.

PRISM A: This was the first and most commonly used prism. Heisey began importing this prism from Europe in about 1901 and used it on many of their Candelabrums. The prism is composed of a faceted button and a faceted spear held together by a wire. Another wire with a small hook at the end was used to attach it to the bobache. This prism was used until the plant closed in 1956.

PRISM B: This prism is the same as Prism A except that the design is fancier. As well as the faceted bottom and faceted spear, there is a row of small punties on six of the eight panels of the spear. This prism was used from 1907 to 1919.

PRISM C: This was the second most commonly used prism. Heisey began importing this prism from Europe in about 1907. Prism C was available in six lengths – 4, 4 $\frac{1}{2}$, 5, 5 $\frac{1}{2}$, 6, and 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches. The prism is composed of a squared button and rectangular spear held together and attached by wires. This prism was used until 1941. After the war, it was only used in the 4-inch length.

HEISEY GLASS CUT WITH CORN FLOWER Walter T. Lemiski, M.A.

The Hughes Corn Flower cut pattern is distinctive with its 12-petalled flower, grid-like interior and elegant sweeping stems. Corn Flower glass was produced for nearly three-quarters of a century. The founder of the W.J. Hughes Corn Flower Company, William John Hughes (1881-1951), was born in Dufferin County, Ontario, Canada. As a young man he was employed by Roden Brothers silversmiths of Toronto around 1900. Fortunately for him and for glass collectors, when that firm expanded their lines to include cut lead glass,Hughes was asked to learn the art of cutting. Hughes family oral history suggests that starting in 1912, he began to experiment at his home with his own original "grey" cut glass patterns (shallower cuts on lighter glass). Existing documentation leads one to believe that Hughes started to cut Corn Flower full time around 1916.

As of yet there have emerged no examples of Corn Flower cut glassware that can be definitively dated any earlier than 1925. So far, any of the identified glass blanks that were in production early enough to have been cut in the teens by W.J. Hughes were still being produced decades later. For example, Hughes cut Corn Flower on A.H. Heisey's #1184 Yeoman line which was in production from 1913 through to 1957. Dating of any items to within the first ten years of Corn Flower cutting must be purely by conjecture.

One can recognize the earlier items by their fuller cutting, larger flowers and tendency towards a wreathing effect with the leaves surrounding the floral pattern. Many earlier blanks also display "beading" - a series of cuts, like a pie-crust, found at the edges, handles and bases of pieces. On smaller cutting surfaces one might also find a "bud" variant – a round portion with three fringed petals. The added details that lower labor costs allowed and the delightful palette of colors from the mid-1920s through to the 1940s, add a further dimension for Corn Flower lovers.


Through the first few decades of Hughes Corn Flower production, the blanks ordered for cutting primarily from the tri-state area came of Pennsylvania, Ohio and West Virginia. These three states were home to all the major American glass producers and accounted for over 90 percent of glass production in North America throughout this period. Essential for the Corn Flower decoration that Hughes cut was fine quality glassware. Hughes looked for quality glassware and for blanks that were uncluttered in design leaving large clear surfaces on which to better showcase his original Corn Flower design. Most of the companies that supplied glass to Hughes were major players in the American glass field including Cambridge, Duncan and Miller, Fostoria, Heisey, Imperial, Indiana, Jeannette, Lancaster, New Martinsville, Paden City, Tiffin, Viking, and West Virginia Specialty glass companies. No Canadian glass companies were producing the quality of glass that Hughes required for his decorating.

W.J. Hughes ordered from a number of Heisey's glass lines including: #1401 Empress, #1184 Yeoman, #1229 Octagon, #1483 Stanhope, and #4044 New Era. He purchased a wide variety of pieces such as: baskets, bonbons, candlesticks, celeries, colognes, flower bowls, relishes and other items. It is believed that Heisey may well have been

the first source of glass blanks for W.J. Hughes starting in the mid-teens. We are still seeking definitive information to confirm this hypothesis. The Heisey Glass Company was certainly an important source for the high quality glassware that W.J. Hughes required for production of his much sought after Corn Flower cutting.





The major public holdings of Corn Flower glass and archival materials are found at the Dufferin County Museum and Archives. Presently the DCMA holds approximately 1,000 pieces of Corn Flower cut glassware. The DCMA is home to the annual Corn Flower Festival each June and also publishes the "Corn Flower Chronicle." 
TRAY OR CENTER PIECE Use As You Want Joe Lokay

There are three pieces that I like because they are different than the usual style of trays, large plates, or serving bowls. They are used often when we set up a buffet for a holiday or at any time when it suits. The three items are round and large. The sides around the circumference of the base are perpendicular to the circular base. The three pieces are the #393 Narrow Flute Japanese Garden Tray, the #1469 Ridgeleigh Center Piece, and the #1503 Crystolite Center Piece. See the pictures below.




#393 Narrow Flute Japanese Garden Tray

The Japanese Garden Tray comes in three sizes - 10, 12, and 14 inches in diameter. The side is about 2 inches tall and is flared at the top. It is signed with a large Diamond H. Production of this tray started in about 1915.



#1469 Ridgeleigh Center Piece

The Ridgeleigh Center Piece comes in two sizes - 8 and 11 inches in diameter. The side is about 2 inches tall and is not flared at the top. It is signed with a small Diamond H. Production of this tray started in about 1935.



#1503 Crystolite Center Piece

The Crystolite Center Piece comes in only one size -11 inches in diameter. The side is about 2 inches tall and is not flared at the top. It is signed with a small Diamond H. Production of this tray started in about 1939. ♥

THE LIFE OF A HEISEY EMPLOYEE... Michael Maher

The following is the story of my great-grandfather's life and how it intermingled with the Heisey glass industry. My great-grandfather Roy Rector Smith, started working at the A.H. Heisey company in 1919, when he was only 15 years old. After much hard work, he soon became the foreman mould cleaner. He would have to carry moulds from one side of the plant to the other. After seeing many of the original moulds, it really makes me appreciate how hard this must have been, not to mention how hot it was as well! Grandpa must have enjoyed either the work, or the pay because he stayed with Heisey's until they closed sadly in 1957. He had worked for Heisey's for 38 years.

Roy and his wife Nellie lived on Wing Street in Newark Ohio, just footsteps away from the Heisey plant. In fact you could see the Heisey smoke stacks and roofline from their back yard, as the photo shows. Living so close to the Heisey company was an ideal opportunity to work there. Even Roy's sons became Heisey employees! One of those sons being my grandfather. While my grandfather, and soon to be grandmother, were dating as teenagers in the early 1950s, my grandfather would meet my grandmother at the front of the factory gates of the Heisey company, while he was on break.

When the Heisey company closed in December of 1957, Roy lost the only job that he had ever had, but at least he had his many friends and the memories that he had helped to create during his time at the A.H. Heisey glass company in the small little town of Newark, Ohio.

FRENCH COMBINATION VASE Joe Lokay

The Heisey Company developed a new math in 1913. It was One plus One equals Three. They produced two items from which three items were offered for sale.

The first item was a #351 Rose Bowl. It was in colonial style, had ten panels, and is five inches tall.

There was a short foot at the bottom, and the top edge was cut to insure a flat surface.

The second item was a #355 Vase. It also was in colonial style, had only eight panels with arch tops, and is eight inches tall. About four inches from the bottom there is a rim of glass that goes completely around the perimeter.



#335 Vase

A third item was formed by putting the #355 Vase inside the #351 Rose Bowl. Thus, the third item was a composite of the first two items. It was called a French Combination Vase. It is about nine inches tall. Note that the rim of glass around the middle of the vase positions the vase in place against the top of the rose bowl.
