




## **965 NARCISSUS** Walter Ludwig, Curator

For the third in our series of promotional brochures I chose one to fit the season: 965 Narcissus cutting. This pamphlet is only a single page using a dark green color for background. The cover features the goblet and a caricature of a stylish hostess of the day using the goblet for toasting. On the reverse side it states, "Spring or no, a young woman's fancy turns to thoughts of love ... and to NARCISSUS, the exquisite Heisey rock crystal cutting. Hostesses fairly burst with pride at the beauty of a table set with NARCISSUS stemware, complemented by matching table accessories."

Narcissus was a Greek youth who was so taken by his beauty that while staring at his reflection in a pond he fell in and drowned. The copywriter is obviously downplaying this aspect of the name.

Narcissus was first introduced in 1941 and had a long run lasting until the factory closed at the end of 1957. The stemware used was the 3408 Jamestown line and many of the accessories pieces are in 1519 Waverly, although several other blanks were also used. Over 90 different pieces were cut with 965 Narcissus making it a very extensive pattern.

# PROPOSED CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS CHANGE

The following recommendation was approved during the Board Meeting on April 1, 2005:

That the number of HCA board members be reduced from sixteen (16) to twelve (12) by amending the Constitution, Article VI, Section 1 to read as follows:

Section 1 - The Board of Directors shall consist of (12) Directors elected by the voting members of the organization. Terms of office are to be as provided in the Bylaws. (Note: see Bylaws Art. VII, Sec. 4)

That the above be carried out by amending Bylaws Article VII, Section 4 to read as follows:

Section 4 - The Board of Directors shall consist of 12 members elected from the roll of voting members. The term of office shall be for four years. The number of consecutive four-year terms that a member may be elected to the Board of Directors shall be limited to two (Approved 6-20-82.)

To provide for a reduction in the number of directors from 16 to 12, only three persons shall be elected starting in the years 2006 through 2009 and thereafter.

The vote to accept or reject this proposal will be taken during the Annual Meeting at Convention. •

### THE AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF MUSEUMS WARNS OF POSSIBLE CHANGES TO THE CHARITABLE GIVING TAX TREATMENT

Editor's Note: The following is a synopsis of a letter the Museum received from Mr. Edward H. Able, Jr., President and CEO of the American Association of Museums

Mr. Able is deeply concerned about proposals being considered by the Senate Finance Committee, reversing the charitable tax treatment of gifts especially non-cash gifts such as art, collectibles, and real estate to non-profit organizations like the National Heisey Glass Museum.

The 1986 tax reform bill eliminated the fair-market value deduction of gifts of appreciated items, but the provision was successfully reinstated in 1993. AAM is concerned that if this deduction is removed, it will effectively stop gifts of art, property, and other collections to museums. Mr. Able feels the charitable community needs to mobilize to educate Congress about the dangers of eliminating or drastically altering current law governing charitable gifts of appreciated property.

AAM is leading the efforts on behalf of the charitable community to address both gifts of appreciated property and the larger issues of nonprofit accountability.

While legislation has yet to be introduced, Mr. Able anticipates that when Congress returns to Washington, the process of drafting legislation will begin. HCA members need to join with AAM in this effort by contacting your members of Congress. Please take the time to educate yourself regarding this important legislation. Now is the time for you to learn who are your Representatives and Senators, so when this comes for a vote, you can contact them with your comments and concerns. ◆

### STACK SETS IN #354, #356 AND #1184 Joe Lokay

A stack set is an individual sugar, an individual creamer and a butter pad placed on top of one another in a stack.

What is the purpose of stacking? Was it to save space at the table? I don't think so, as the three pieces had to be spread out to use them. Perhaps it was easier for the waiter to deliver them? Maybe! How about minimize storage space if say, 50 sets are prepared in advance of a meal.

The pictures show the sugar on the bottom, the cream next and the butter pad on top. Consideration must have been given to the design so that all three pieces fit together.

Could the cream be on the bottom and the sugar next? I don't know. I would have to take a set and try it. I think it would work. Notice the pictures show the cream and butter only if you don't want sugar. And the sugar and butter only if you don't want cream.

Over the life of the Company, Heisey produced a lot of items in various patterns for the individual. There were creams and sugars, butter dishes, salts, jellies, celery dips, tall celeries, almond or nut dishes, mustards, domino sugars, ash trays and knife rests. I believe these were mainly for the hotel or restaurant trade. Now you have paper or plastic packs of sugar, cream, butter, mustard, catsup, horseradish, nuts, etc. Even small candy bites.

There were individual cream and sugars in Heisey's first pattern and also in the last patterns. The stack sets were mainly in the colonial patterns, circa 1910 to *1920.* The stack sets pictured with this article are from Heisey Catalog #75, circa 1913. The patterns are: #354 Wide Flat Panel, #356 Colonial, #1184Yeoman. ♥

Saving that memory of the early evening is best kept in the #4033 Bar bottle with the Scotch carving on it, the #1469 Ridgeleigh Rock & Rye, or the #4044 New Era Rye bottle with #9044 Big Bad Wolf custom etching! Oh, don't have one of those? Well, let me put that disappointment into any one of the Heisey bitter bottles! Perhaps I'll select the #3417 bitters bottle with one of the circus etchings....that would sweeten things up a bit!



Each member may send a list of glass of no more than 20 lots (excluding donated glass) by May 15, 2005. Glass selected by HCA from the members list will be covered by this contract.

Consignors of glassware to this sale will be charged 20% commission per lot. Settlement for glass sold will be made in full within (10) business days of completed auction, together with a donation slip for commissions charged. All monies received from the sale are held and paid from the HCA Trust Account.

Glassware for the Percy & Vivian Moore Heisey Select Auction must be received at the HCA Museum by July 23, 2005

It is the responsibility of the consignor to deliver the glassware to the National Heisey Glass Museum. HCA accepts responsibility when glass is received at the Museum except that any glass damaged in shipment will be referred to the shipper and consignor. 
#### Show & Tell:


