

411 TUDOR BROCHURE Walter Ludwig

The 411 Tudor brochure is one of the earliest pattern folders that we have. It was probably produced at the same time as the one for 439 Pied Piper that we featured on the cover of the August 2006 issue of the Heisey News. This is a double fold brochure using an orange/yellow color for background and blue for some decorative flourishes as in the background of the old English T that starts the word Tudor on the cover. Prior to the discovery of this brochure, the 411 pattern had been referred to as Rib and Panel, a name that Clarence Vogel had given to the pattern. Catalog and price list references do not give this pattern a name.

The cover of the brochure features the 411 goblet within an architectural frame which resembles a Gothic cathedral window. The interior of the brochure spread over all three panels has pictures of seven pieces of the pattern within oval and round "windows." On the left is a 412 Tudor 12 ounce footed and handled ice tea, the 411 9" low footed comport with rolled edge, and the 412 1 quart tankard. The center has the mayonnaise and underplate,

As Bryan mentioned in his column, we hope to have the 1508 Heisey card case reproduced in Cobalt by Mosser to go along with the card decks. If we have the go ahead, the order form for this will also be included in next month's Newsletter.

interestingly with a sterling spoon rather than a Heisey glass ladle. On the right is a 5" high footed jelly, the footed compotier with flower block, and the 6" two handled mint. The text on the middle panel reads:

"The simple charm of the 411 pattern interprets not only the architecture but the spirit of unity and harmony that marks the reign of the powerful, yet romantic Tudor monarchs.

"More than that, this interpretation has been in terms of ideal table glassware, absolutely new and unbelievably light in weight. Most fascinating service yet produced by Heisey."

The other two panels of the brochure (back and interior fold) give a listing of pieces available in both 411 and 412 Tudor. Most of the pieces listed are standard to the

pattern. Under 412 Tudor are listed an 8" and 10" vase crimped, neither of which have I ever seen. The pattern was still under development when the brochure was published because there are a few pieces not listed. These include the 412, 413, and 414 stemware lines, the cigarette jars, and the sugar sifters.

Tudor is a very utilitarian pattern with many useful pieces. It is plainer than most Heisey patterns but this gives it some of its charm. The cost of pieces in this pattern tends to be quite modest. It is still relatively easy to find most of the pieces but it does have some rarities that will present a challenge. The individual almond and nut bowls are missing in most nut dish collections.

If you are looking for a great inexpensive pattern to collect, this might be the one for you.

FANCY LOOP TREASURES Walter Ludwig

Recently, two wonderful items in 1205 Fancy Loop were given to the Museum to honor one of our long-time members who is no longer with us. Helen Sparacio was a dear friend to many of us and was an early member of HCA along with her husband Carl. Helen avidly collected 1205 Fancy Loop and her collection was a special joy to her. Two special items were taken from her collection and given to the Museum so that we will always remember her.


Carl picked the very scarce Fancy Loop 1 ounce cologne as his gift in memory of Helen. This is shown on the right in the accompanying picture. It is 5 ¼" high including the stopper and 4" without.

The Heisey Heritage Society, which Carl and Helen helped found, chose the decanter which is on the left in the photo. This is a whimsey piece which was never made for production. It was made by pinching in the top of the 1205 Fancy Loop vase and then adding a stopper. The piece is 10 ½" high overall and measures 9 ¼" excluding the stopper. The stopper does not look like any stopper that I am aware of that Heisey made. It is quite possible that the stopper was just a convenient one that was found that fit the opening. It is also possible that it is a replacement for a faceted one that Heisey might have been using at the time but which was either broken or lost with time.



1205 Fancy Loop Whimsey Decanter And Cologne



351 Priscilla Footed Ales, Straight

351 PRISCILLA FOOTED ALES Joe Lokay

Pattern 351 was a major line in colonial style that began in about 1909. Priscilla was the original name given to the pattern by the company. Around 1913, the price lists and catalogs only referred to it as Colonial. We now refer to 351 by its original name Priscilla.



Several sizes of footed ales, or sometimes called Pilsners, were offered in the pattern. The footed ale design consisted of six wide panels extending upward from the bottom to a plain band at the top.

In Price List #142 (circa 1908), seven sizes of footed ales were offered in ounces 3, 4, 6, 8, 10, 12, and 14. The top edges of these seven ales were straight (i.e. not flared). The same set of seven footed ales was also offered with a sham. A sham is the extra glass at the bottom of the bowl. This made the stemware a little heavier. Note the extra line shown in the picture of the ale with sham. That is a total of 14 footed ales offered in various sizes.



In Price List #155 (circa 1910), flared footed ales were added to the ale line. The flared ones covered the same sizes: 3, 4, 6, 8, 10, 12, and

14 ounces and came with or without sham. Thus, a total of 28 351 footed ales were offered: 7 sizes straight, 7 flared, seven sizes straight with sham, and seven sizes flared with sham. The 351 footed ales were pictured in Heisey catalog #75 (circa 1913).

In Price List #179 (circa 1917), the 14 flared ales were dropped. In Price List #205 (circa 1919), the seven straight with sham were dropped. In Price List #208 (circa 1924), the last seven, the original straight ales, were dropped. Thus, production for the original straight footed ales was about 17 years. And, production for the flared ales was about eight years.

Even though we do not have catalog or price list listings later than 1924 for 351 footed ales, we do know that there was still some production of these because the 4 ounce and 12 ounce ales have been seen in Flamingo which did not start production until 1925. The 12 ounce ale has also been seen in Moongleam, Sahara, and Cobalt. Cobalt production did not start until 1933. Good luck finding a colored example. •

CATALOG 2B – MISCELLANEOUS STEMWARE Walter Ludwig

We will continue to examine the contents of Catalog 2B from 1921 which we started last month in the Heisey News. This month we will look at some pages which are labeled "Miscellaneous Goblets." These are patterns that, at the time of the catalog, were not full line; they only consisted of the goblet.

Page 27 of Catalog 2B (on page 9 of this issue) contains 12 images of goblets in 11 different patterns. Most of these are pulled stems so those will not carry the Heisey Diamond H mark and would be hard to identify as Heisey. Most were very short lived lines which never were decorated to assist in identification. All pattern names were assigned by researchers and are not original company names.

The top row consists of goblets in 3302 Warden (9 ounce), 3303 Ponchartrain (10 ounce), 3310 Van Cleve (9), 3313 Budapest (9) both plain and with medium optic, and 3326 Anne (8). The bottom row has 3327 Clara (9), 3329 Bell Bottom (10), 3334 Sexton (10), 3426 Maritime (10), 3427 Bourdon House (10), and 3429 Empire (10). Only the 3334 Sexton is readily identifiable and it is known to be marked. A champagne is also know and the stem is known with 154 Brunswick pantographic etch. Museum received as a donation several years ago many factory samples of several lines of stemware. Included was a champagne, cocktail, sherbet, and pousse cafe in 3313 Budapest. None of the remainder of the stems on this page are represented in the Museum collection.


Catalog 2b page 28 is shown on page 10. It consists of 12 goblets in 12 patterns. The top row is 3430 Brau Haus (10), 3431 Loraine (8), 3432 Conesque (8), 3433 Basque (9), 3434 Esther (10), and 3435 Le Caron (10). The bottom row shows 3436 Pigalle (9 ½), 3452 Claudine (10), 3453 Magdaline (10), 3454 Granada (11), 3455 Lady McBeth (10), and 3456 Granville (8). The only ones of these that are in

the collection are the 3453 Magdaline and 3454 Granada, The 3553 is marked and is decorated with 9001 Trefoil needle etch. The 3453 is not marked and has an unattributed etching.

The last miscellaneous goblet to appear in Catalog 2B is on page 60 of the catalog which is labeled "Miscellaneous." This is the 3438 Ironton (10). I guess it was a late addition so was put back here with a few other late additions. •




3438 Ironton





CATALOG 2B – WATER BOTTLES

Continuing our look at Heisey Catalog 2B from 1921, we will look at two pages that show a variety of blown water bottles. Catalog pages 31 and 32 are shown on pages 11 and 12 of this issue.

Catalog 2B page 31 shows seven different bottles starting with 4056 Frye, 4057 Schnaidt, 4058 (unnamed), 4059 Allen, 4060 (unnamed), 4062 (unnamed), and 4063 Oval. All names were assigned by researchers and are not original company names. The company would have only referred to these water bottles by pattern number. Two different views of the 4063, front and side, are shown so that one can see that it is not symmetric as the other bottles are. Instead, the 4063 is flattened so that it is much wider in frontal perspective than it is on the side.

On this page there are listings for several of the bottles giving which stem patterns the bottle was made to match. For the 4056 Frye bottle patterns 3307 Aloof, 3309 Petite, 3311 Velvedere, 3317 Drake, 3333 Old Glory, and 3336 Lady Leg are listed. The 4057 Schnaidt water bottle went with 3308 Bob White, 3312 Gayoso, 3320 Ritz, and 3330 Hanover lines. Water bottle 4058 was made to go with 3331 Statuesque and 3332 Six Side. The 4059 Allen water bottle is listed as going with 3304 Universal, 3316 Biltmore, 3318 Waldorf, and 3335 Lady Leg (different bowl shape than 3336 Lady Leg). The 4060 bottle is only listed with the 3315 Polonaise line.

Catalog 2B page 32 illustrates four different cutting treatments which were offered on water bottles. Cutting number 1 is illustrated on a 4060 and 4061 McPeek bottle. It consisted of cut flutes on the neck of the bottle. Cutting 2, which is much like cutting 1 only it starts lower

down on the neck, is shown on a 4057 Schnaidt bottle. Cutting 4 is illustrated on a 4058 bottle. It is cutting 1 with the addition of two horizontal cuts dividing the cut flutes in three roughly equal parts going around the neck. Cutting 3 is show on a 4059 Allen bottle and is like cutting 4 only now rather than two sets of single cuts there are two sets of double cuts.

The most interesting water bottle on this page is the 4061 McPeek which was not illustrated on the previous page. It is hard to tell from the illustration but the 4061 appears to be identical to the 4058 bottle except for the part around the opening of the bottle. This appears to have been modified to take a sanitary metal top very similar to the tops found on most Heisey syrups. The bottle has the indents just like the syrups do to snap on this top. The sanitary top is round rather than coming to a point as the syrup tops do, but it has the same spring mechanism that the syrups do. I would certainly like to see one of these water bottles.

HAWTHORNE - SUPPLEMENT 3B TO PRICE LIST 13B

Last month we went over the pressware items that were listed in Hawthorne in Heisey's Supplement 3 to Price List 208. At the same time that that supplement was published, Heisey put out Supplement 3B to Price List 13B to cover blownware items. These are the only factory price lists which list items which were made in Hawthorne.

I will list the blownware items which are reported in Supplement 3B as being made in Hawthorne. The supplement lists prices for Crystal, Moongleam, and Flamingo as well as Hawthorne. In most cases, Moongleam is slightly higher than crystal, and Flamingo and Hawthorne are at the same price, slightly higher than Moongleam. The 3362 Charter Oak

compote is listed as available for \$18.90 a dozen in Crystal. Moongleam is \$20/dozen, Flamingo is \$22.25/dozen, and Hawthorne is \$24.75/dozen. There are no big surprises in the listing but it is useful to know. Pattern names have been added to make it easier to identify items. DO means the pieces was made in diamond optic; CO means it was made in checkered optic.

Certainly, this is not all the Heisey blownware products that are found in Hawthorne. 3366 Trojan line is not listed as well as several blown vases including 4206 Optic Tooth and the 516 and 4162 lines. But this does show what was in production at the time of the publishing of this supplemental price list.

Putting together a collection of Hawthorne today is a challenging proposition, but with diligence it can be done and would be most rewarding. This lovely lavender shade makes for a beautiful table setting. Even a few accent pieces really add to a home décor. •

The 34th annual HCA All Heisey Benefit Auction benefiting the National Heisey Glass Museum is being planned to be held once again at the Apple Tree Auction Center in Newark, Ohio, probably in very late March or mid-April depending on auction center availability. The exact date has not yet been established and will be published when known. Many thanks again to HCA Board Member Sam Schnaidt and to David Schnaidt for the use of their first-class facility.

This HCA event is our largest fund-raiser. Many dedicated HCA volunteers put this event together for you. FYI, HCA makes its money from three sources - 100% of the consignment fees, the auctioning of donated glass (hint, hint), and from glass not sold at the auction but later in the Gift Shop. As always, we are looking into ways to improve and expand our auction to make it better for purchasers and consignors. We are also looking for activities that would fit nicely into the weekend, either at the auction center, the Museum, or another convenient location to make the weekend a great experience for those who can come! If you have some ideas, let me know.

Elsewhere in this Heisey Newsletter you will find a consignors packing list that you can use to send in the glass you wish to consign or donate (place a D in the appropriate column). As last year, you may consign up to 25 lots per member. There is no limit on donated glass. The **DEADLINE** for submitting your glass is **JANUARY 15, 2007**. The sooner your glass is received the better, since it must be checked in, inspected, cataloged, and repacked for the auction by your volunteers. You must be a member of HCA to consign glass to the auction.

You will also find in this Newsletter a two-page consignor auction contract for you to fill in,

execute, and send in IN DUPLICATE with your glass and packing list. We will sign and send you back one contract. As I mentioned earlier, HCA gets 100% of the consignment fees and to. hopefully, increase benefit to the Museum this year, we have put in a new schedule that increases consignment fees rates. It primarily impacts lots selling under \$200. That said, consignors might wish to consolidate small like items into lots. As always, the auction committee reserves the right to modify lots, but will do so sparingly. Also, note that non-Heisey items or Heisey by Imperial items will not be sold but returned at the consignor's expense or become a donation to HCA.

To make the jobs of our (your) volunteers easier, please be certain to list all the glass on the packing list and its pattern name, description, cut/etch, color, if marked, and importantly, the condition with damages noted. Also, again, to make it better for us to check in your glass, please include the packing list and two signed copies of the auction contract in the box of glass.

The success of the auction depends on four things - great facilities, great help from volunteers, great glass consigned and donated, and a great group of buyers to purchase the glass. We have the first thing, but need the other three! Please contact me or call the Museum if you would like to volunteer. always, we need help to catalog the glass, help at the auction itself (unpack, set up the glass, etc.), and to help cleanup the facilities after the auction. Next, we are again requesting you to consign or donate GOOD DAMAGE-FREE GLASS – I can't emphasize this enough! If we have the first three- a great group of buyers will come! Keep your calendar open in late March and early to mid-April for this auction!

Consignments:

All items consigned for sale or donated are made by A. H. Heisey and Company, no reproductions by Imperial or others will be accepted, except as consigned by HCA. The owner / consignor / member, hereafter referred to as the owner, agrees to accept all responsibility for providing merchantable title for all glass sold.

Each owner may consign a maximum of twenty-five (25) lots to the auction. A list of glass being consigned or donated and prepared by the owner is attached as an integral part of this contract. There is no limit on the number of items in each lot, but HCA retains the right to increase / decrease size / make up of each lot. Each owner may donate an unlimited number of lots to HCA for sale at the auction. HCA, however, at its discretion, will consign donated items for auction, add donated items to the museum collection, and/or sell donated items in the Museum Gift Shop.

The HCA Auction Committee is authorized to reject any glass not deemed acceptable to HCA standards for this auction, plus glass not made by A. H. Heisey and Company. These items may be returned to the consignor if they desire, at their expense. Otherwise, these items become the property of HCA.

Commission:

Owners of glassware to this sale will be charged on the following sliding scale of commission per lot: \$5.00-\$50.00= 40%; \$50.01-\$200.00= 30%; \$200.01-\$400.00= 20%; \$400.01-\$750.00= 15%; \$750.01 and over= 10%.

Settlement:

Settlement for glass sold will be made in full not later than fifteen days after the completed auction from the HCA Auction escrow account. Said account is set up and operated consistent with ORC Section 4707.024. Collection of funds, bad checks, debts, and unpaid auction lots is the responsibility of HCA.

Responsibility:

It is the responsibility of the owner to deliver the glassware to the National Heisey Glass Museum. HCA accepts responsibility for the glass after it is received at the Museum and until it is sold, except that any glass damaged in

shipment to the Museum will be referred to the shipper and owner. All glass damaged or lost while in the possession of HCA prior to sale will be valued by a qualified appraiser or appraisers and the owner will be paid on this basis, less commission.

Bidding:

The minimum opening bid on a lot will be at least \$5.00. The minimum incremental bid increase will be \$2.50. In the event no bid is received on a lot, that lot becomes a donation to HCA.

The owner and HCA both agree that absentee bids will be accepted by HCA. Per HCA policy, the minimum absentee bid on a lot will be \$15.00 with a minimum opening bid of \$5.00. Absentee bids are bids left by buyers prior to the auction and are executed in a competitive manner. We do not use the full bid amount as a starting bid. Bidding is initiated in the audience and then offered on behalf of the absentee bidder at the next increment continuously until bidding has stopped. HCA reserves the right to accept or reject any and all absentee bids. Example: Absentee bidder leaves a bid with a maximum amount of \$500.00. After item is sold through competitive bidding, the absentee bidder is successful for \$325.00. HCA is not responsible for misfiled bids that are not executed.

Absolute Auction:

All items are to be sold at an **absolute auction** and not at a reserve auction, **except** HCA and the owner agree there will be a minimum opening amount (see Bidding above) on all lots without exception. Owners cannot bid or have others bid on their behalf on their own items.

"Absolute Auction" and "Reserve Auction" as defined by ORC. 4707.01:

"Absolute Auction" means an auction of real or personal property to which all of the following apply:

- 1) The property is sold to the highest bidder without reserve.
- 2) The auction does not require a minimum bid.
- 3) The auction does not require competing bids of any type by the seller or an agent of the seller.
- 4) The seller of property cannot withdraw the property from auction after the auction is opened and there is a public solicitation or calling of bids.

"Reserve Auction" means an auction in which the seller or an agent of the seller reserves the right to establish a minimum bid, the right to reject or accept any or all bids, or the right to withdraw the real or personal property at any time prior to the completion of the auction by the auctioneer.

General Auction Terms and Conditions:

- 1) Payment: Cash, travelers check, certified check or personal check (if approved by HCA). MasterCard and Visa cards are accepted. 5% buyer's premium. Buyer's premium deleted for cash or check payment. Cash only payment may be specified for individual bidders at HCA's request.
- 2) HCA has endeavored to describe all items to the best of their ability; however this is not a warranty.
- 3) All items are sold as is and where is. The auctioneer has the right to make any verbal corrections at the time of sale and to provide additional information. Inspection is welcomed during preview and anytime before the item is sold.
- 4) In the case of a disputed bid the auctioneers have the authority to settle disputes to the best of their ability and their decision(s) is/are final.
- 5) The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid raise not in line with established bid increments.
- 6) All sales are final and all items must be paid for each day of sale.
- 7) All sales are subject to Ohio and Licking County sales tax unless purchased for resale and proper tax exemption form is signed with resale number.

I have been watching my Heisey Garden since last Spring. Snows were melting and the smart little Crocus 140 had shown their heads and promised more to come. I waited for the correct amount of Raindrop 1205 and soon Tulip 1420 (in shades of Flamingo and shimmering Opal) lined the pathways of my garden and the essence of Lilac 4211 filled the air. Soon to follow would be a brilliant display of Fleur De Lis 1406 in all colors imaginable (including Sahara and Alexandrite)their spear leaves had already begun poking through the ground. Throughout the garden, and along the border of the pathway, I realize the Petal 479 will not last long and the 1420, 4211 and 1406 would soon be gone.

The season continued. Growing in nice clumps well off the path is my ornamental grass of choice, Bamboo 117 (or maybe with another variety 4202). It has grown to just the right height for background. It is lovely, and of course is the precise shade of green (as Moongleam is precisely right) to contrast with the Fern 1495 and Ivy 4224. I do not even complain that some Cloverleaf 7089 has found its way into the garden. My Heisey Garden welcomes all patterns, I mean phylum!

Spring led to summer and concern had set in. My Heisey Garden was in need of more 1205. If it had not happened when it did, I would have had to consider a change to Cactus 1432 as my 'plant du jour.' I was also concerned for the Grape Cluster 1445 which would be harvested perhaps in late September. However, the Heisey Garden remained strong.

Cooler weather was soon upon the garden. Seasons kept changing. The Oak Leaf 10 was changing color and the Acorn 130 were falling. Fall plants are in full bloom and the field behind the garden is now filled with Pumpkin 4058. So brilliantly orange are these, they almost appear Tangerine!

Now that Winter is coming, the ground will soon be covered again by snow (for us Northerners, that is) so I contemplate the harvest of 1445 which has been turned into something special (after certain processing has taken place), and I pick a special Heisey stem (reference here is *not* to a plant!) With stem and contents in hand, I shall sit back, relax and make a plan to add something new to my Heisey Garden. It just keeps growing and growing! •
