

SAHARA BROCHURE

In 1930, Heisey introduced the new Sahara color. This was a much softer yellow than Marigold which Heisey introduced in 1929. The Marigold color was vibrant and a bit brassy. It made a real statement on the table. Marigold was popular with the public, but production problems in making the glass doomed the color to only a short existence. The Sahara color became a replacement for Marigold. This color was more in keeping with the pastel yellows that other companies were producing at this time. Concurrent with the introduction of Sahara is the introduction of the 1401 Empress pattern. Empress was sold in Sahara either plain or with the 448 Old Colony etching.

To publicize these new innovations in 1930, Heisey published a new brochure devoted to the Sahara color. This brochure is a double fold giving it three panels on either side of the brochure. All glassware shown in the brochure are either from the 1401 Empress line or the 3380 Old Dominion line with 448 Old Colony etching. The brochure obviously uses a yellow color to emphasize the color of the glassware, but, in addition, this is the only brochure that Heisey produced that uses a different paper





stock than the plain white stock we see in the other brochures. Instead, we have a light beige stock in a slightly heavier weight giving the brochure a little more stiffness. The dimensions of the brochure are also slightly different than other brochures that Heisey produced. This one is the standard 3 ¼" wide per panel, but it is 6 ¼" high instead of the standard 6 1/8".

The artwork on the cover is very striking. A camel caravan passes two pyramids while wending its way through the desert. A small oasis with three palm trees lies at the base of the foremost pyramid. Elongated shadows cast by the pyramids and the camels emphasize the idea of the heat and isolation. The word "Sahara" goes across the top of the page. The caption

below reads "Glorious Sand-Tinted Glass by Heisey."


Opening up the brochure you are presented with two rows of items in the 1401 Empress pattern including 14 pieces from the line. The bottom row is on an upward tilt allowing for the insertion between the rows on the left of a small drawing of a desert scene including camel, palms, and pyramid. The heading on the page reads "Sahara" Tint: The Exquisite New 1401 Line." On the bottom of the page is the only promotional blurb in the brochure. It reads, "A careful review of the items listed on the back page of this folder will demonstrate that every table need is met in this wonderful line. And then its completeness is fully matched by its unusual beauty of design and color - an equipment to delight any woman's heart." You will note that the Empress name is not applied to the pattern in this brochure. There

would be an ads published in which the pattern is described as the "Lilies of France" and "Fleur de Lis." But neither of these names stuck. It was not until later that the name Empress was attached to the pattern. The pattern name Empress was applied both to the 1401 pressed line and the 447 Empress etching. Both of these were produced during the same time, although the etching does predate the pressed line by a year. The 447 etching never appears on 1401 ware, instead you will find 448 Old Colony etching on Empress.

On the overflap is the listing of pieces in the 1401 pattern that were available. A total of 64

items are listed (58 if you group things as sets). Even at this it is a very extensive pattern, larger than any that Heisey had introduced up to this time. But not all items made in the pattern are listed, again indicating how early in the development of both Sahara and Empress that this brochure was produced. Among the items not listed are the square dinner plate, the Thandled relish and center handled sandwiches, alternative compotes and relishes, the punch cup, the frappe bowl, 2 handled candlesticks, 8" vase, marmalade, lemon, ashtray, and ice tub. Heisey was entering into the age of the super-pattern where they provided all items that the hostess could want for entertaining.

The back of the brochure has the heading, "Three Choice Items from our No. 3380 Line Etched 448." Displayed are the 3380 Old Dominion goblet, sherbet, and champagne, all with 448 Old Colony etching. The use of the yellow color enhancement on all the pieces of glass in the brochure provides a very good rendering of what Heisey's Sahara color looks like.

Sahara would remain in Heisey's line until 1937 and be used extensively in the 1404 Old Sandwich and 1405 Ipswich lines. It could also be found in 1425 Victorian, 1469 Ridgeleigh, and 1447 Rococo. Other stemware lines made in Sahara included 3390 Carcassonne and 3389 Duquesne.

The 1401 Empress pattern in Sahara was made in great quantities and is readily available even today. It will take a bit of effort to accumulate a whole set but it certainly can be done. You will have a beautiful but practical set of glassware that, just as back in 1930, will meet all your wants as an elegant host or hostess of today. •

12 DOUBLE ROW SLASH AND PANEL

In about 1898, A. H. Heisey and Company began production of a group of three patterns that were given numbers 8, 9, and 12. What happened to numbers 10 and 11? Perhaps they were assigned to other items. Names of the three patterns were assigned by Clarence Vogel, early researcher into Heisey.

- 8 Vertical Bead and Panel
- 9 Single Row Slash and Panel
- 12 Double Row Slash and Panel

All three were small patterns with only 13 items in #8, 13 items in #9, and 11 items in #12. An article I wrote on pattern 8 Vertical Bead and Panel was published in the June 2002 issue of the Heisey News and on pattern 9 Single Row Slash and Panel appeared in the July 2002 issue. The purpose of this article is a write-up on the 12 Double Row Slash and Panel pattern.

The pattern design consists of two rows of slashes that are separated by a cut or sharp groove. Each set of two slashes and a groove is separated by a plain panel. The slashes, grooves, and panels extend from the bottom to the top of each item. The top of each panel has an arch.

Information on 12 Double Row Slash and Panel was obtained from Heisey Price Lists #60 (1900), #60 Supplement (1902), #100 (1903), and #120 (1906). The pattern was not found in Price List #142 (1908). Based on the disappearance of the pattern from the price list, production of 12 Double Row Slash and Panel ended in about 1907. The other question is, "When did production of #12 begin?"

In early 1900, Heisey started using the Diamond H trademark. Pattern 12 Double Row Slash and Panel is not signed with a Diamond H, so it is assumed that production started before 1900. There are no references for when the pattern started. I estimate that it started in early 1898. This would make the production period for the pattern as 1898 to 1907, or about 10 years.

The 12 Double Row Slash and Panel pattern was made in crystal only. Nine of the 11 items are show in the pictures with this article.

12 Double Row Slash and Panel

- 1. nappy, 4"
- 2. nappy, 4 ½", flared
- 3. nappy, 4 ½", shallow
- 4. nappy, 8"
- 5. nappy, 8", crimped
- 6. nappy, 9", flared
- 7. nappy, 10", shallow
- 8. plate, 5 1/2"
- 9. plate,11"
- 10. lily bowl
- 11. rose bowl, 6"

A look at the list and the picture of the pieces and you will find a lot of similarity in the pieces. I am pretty sure that all of the pieces in this pattern came out of only two molds, the 4" nappy and the 8" nappy. The different pieces were made by hand-tooling the glass while it was still hot into the desired shape. The three smaller nappies and the 5 ½" plate came from the small nappy mold, all other pieces were made from the large nappy mold. ◆

1250 Groove and Slash Joe Lokay

Pattern 1250 Groove and Slash was introduced in about 1898. In early 1899, the pattern was advertised for the first time in the trade journals. Reference was made to opal decorated in one ad. Did Heisey mean opal glass, opal decoration, or what? I do not know the answer. No piece in Opal has ever been reported. The pattern was named by Clarence Vogel.

The design consists of a single vertical row of slashes separated by a vertical groove. The slashes alternate with a large slash and then a small slash. The vertical groove always comes to a point at the top. The pattern can be found marked or unmarked. Since the pattern started about three years before the Diamond H was introduced, I would say that most items are unmarked.

Early price list (1898), Price List #60 (1902), Price List #60 Supplement (1904), Price List #120 (1904), and Price List #142 (1908) all list the 1250 pattern. Price List #155 (1910) does not offer the pattern. I would estimate that production of 1250 Groove and Slash ended in 1909. Thus production life (1898 to 1909) was for 11 years. Heisey catalog, circa 1901, has pictures of 1250 Groove and Slash. Vogel's books I and IV have themost and best pictures of 1250 Groove and Slash. His pictures came from an early catalog of flyer that the Museum does not have in its archives.

There are 43 items (45 if you include stopper variations on the cruet) in the production list for 1250 Groove and Slash. I covered the sources listed in the references to prepare that list. In the event you come across an item not in the list, let me or HCA know, so it can be added to the list. Examining what is in the various price lists shows that production of the rose bowls, tankards, ice bowl nappies, and the salad bowls was very short. So these items will be hard to find in the pattern.

There is one item in the list that poses an enigma, a condensed milk jar and cover. Under the illustration for the flat topped cracker jar shown in Vogel IV, page 115, is the additional notation, "We also make Condensed Milk Jar and Cover." This would seem to imply that the condensed milk jar is a variation on the cracker jar, possibly with a different type of lid or maybe with a pouring spout. The actual condensed milk jar is not shown in any of the sources that we have and 1250 Groove and Slash is the only pattern that lists such a piece. What does this piece really look like? A check on the history of condensed milk shows that it was a major product by the 1860s, so it was not new to the marketplace in the 1890s when 1250 Groove and Slash was developed. The condensed milk jar is another interesting product of the Heisey company that we would like to find out more about.





Murder at the Heisey Museum Sharon Orienter

Our Wednesday night Convention activity, designed to help Convention goers get to know the Museum collection a little better and maybe discover something they had not seen before, involved a little bit of mystery and espionage.

After being told that there was "a murder in the Museum," people arrived to find a crime scene complete with a body outline, a bloody hat, and some unidentified objects, in the Docent's Lounge.

Clues were distributed throughout the Museum and participants were asked to answer four questions: What are the objects found with the body? Who is the victim? Who murdered the victim? With what glass object (that is to identify the possible murder weapons, all glass objects in the Museum)?.

The objects found with the "body" are a genuine Heisey mystery. They are two wooden models for something. What? We don't know. Both models were painted black and had a Diamond H mark pressed into the wood. One also bears the number 213. There was lots of speculation about what the models could be for, presumably glass objects of some kind, possibly some kind of gauges. In any event we decided that they were "Top Secret Wooden Models, vital to the war effort."

The victim or "body" was John Cullet, an industrial spy working for the Axis powers. Our WWI hero, Col. Cobalt is the murderer and the murder weapon was the Cobalt 110 Sandwich Dolphin candlestick.

Possible weapons were: a Cobalt dolphin candlestick, a Horsehead bookend, a crystal base of the Emerald Sunburst punchbowl, a Fandango pitcher, a piece of Moongleam cullet, or a Lodestar ashtray.

The winners solved the mystery correctly and had the most additional information about characters, weapons, motive, and crime.

The grand prize (sponsorship of a card and two free decks of the new Heisey Playing Cards featuring the Heisey animals and animal related pieces) winner is the team of Phil Deetz and Leo Hedden. Three additional teams: Bucky & the Plains People, The Spahrs, and Ken & Maxine Bartlett were runners-up and will each receive a deck of the new Animal Cards.

CONVENTION 2008 – MEMBERS' DISPLAY

The Members' Display that we inaugurated at the 2007 Convention was such a huge success that we decided to repeat it again this year. Under the able supervision of Amy Jo Jones, the membership was asked to bring in a special piece of Heisey that we could display in the Museum during Convention. A section of one of the nappy display cases in the Multi-Purpose Room

was set aside and we eagerly waited to see what treasures were brought to us this year. The members did not disappoint us, anyone who stopped in at the Convention Canteen had the added bonus to see some rarely seen Heisey pieces.

Bring in pieces to display this year were:

Right off the bat we got in the first ever seen example of the 11 Canterbury candlestick. There may have been a crack in the candlecup but when a piece has never been seen before it does not matter. It looks exactly like the catalog drawing so if these were at all plentiful one would have turned up before now; after all it has been over 100 years since this piece was made. To tantalize others, the owner left the \$.50 price sticker on the piece. Do you think he asked if the dealer could do better?

This was followed by the extremely rare 341 Puritan scalloped sherbet in Ivorina Verde. A small set of these showed up years ago at an auction in Newark and they were divided up among a small group of collectors. No others have ever shown up, too bad because they are really beautiful.

Other early pieces included a 353 Medium Flat Panel large almond in Flamingo. The individual size is quite common, but the larger one is elusive. They usually are not marked so a bargain is possible with this piece. A 357 Prison Stripe 8" crimped nappy was brought in. Nappies are not unusual in Prison Stripe, but a crimped one sure is. It is not a pattern that would be easily crimped, so it is possible that Heisey never put this variation into production.

From the middle period of Heisey production we had some nice color representation. The 1433 Thumbprint and Panel two light candlesticks in Flamingo and a rarely seen 4045 7" Ball vase in Moongleam were beautiful pieces to show.

Color pieces with cuttings are very unusual but we had three different pieces brought in for display. A gorgeously cut 461 Banded Picket basket in Hawthorne was the first one to show up. This had a very deep cutting possibly done by the Chicago firm of Lewis and Neblett who cut so much Heisey in the 1910s and 1920s. Next to appear was a 4206 Optic Tooth vase with Moongleam foot. This had an elaborate floral cutting with draped garlands. Wouldn't you know it, a little while later this was topped by another 4206 Optic Tooth vase, only this time in Hawthorne with a Moongleam foot. This also had a beautiful cutting on it - these vases with the Hawthorne/Moongleam combination almost never show up, and to have a cut example was truly outstanding. To see the two vases side by side took your breath away.

Other items from the 20s and 30s included an 1184 Yeoman cocktail shaker with 5003 Nimrod carving. This is the shaker that takes a metal top and looks like a slightly flared cylinder. It is marked so that helps you when you come across one because there are similar ones made by other companies. There was also a 1488 Kohinoor platter which was made by flattening the floral bowl. The bowls (2 variations) as well as the platter are hard to find pieces in this pattern.

We had three beautiful etched pieces on display. There was a 3304 Universal icer and liner with 503 Minuet etch which showed the etching to good advantage. In 507 Orchid etching, we had two extremely rare pieces. There was the 4036 footed Marshal decanter and the 1951 Cabochon cheese compote.

From the 40s we had two rarities: the 1540 Lariat candy dish with the horsehead finial and a 4004 Impromptu cocktail shaker.

Some of my favorite items to collect are the whimseys or possible feasibility items that came out of the Heisey factory. These are pieces that may have been experimented on to see how they would look for possible production or items that a worker fashioned from a production piece for his own use. We had three wonderful examples of Heisey whimseys. A 1404 Old Sandwich 5" flared vase was made out of a footed tumbler and made a totally different item, a 1509 Queen Ann violet vase fashioned from the mayonnaise, and a 1632 Lodestar 8" crimped bowl in Dawn was made from the flared 8" bowl.

The display was available for all to see throughout Convention and we received some great comments on it. We want to thank all of the members who brought in their treasures to share with us. •
