EPERGNETTE BROCHURE (TWO) Walter Ludwig

On the cover of the January 2006 issue of the Heisey News, we featured a brochure on Heisey Epergnettes. This was an elaborate three fold brochure that featured many different flower arrangements using the Heisey epergnettes. In this current issue, we feature another brochure that Heisey published on the epergnette. It is my feeling that this brochure pre-dates the previously featured brochure because it seems to only feature the 341 Williamsburg epergnette which started Old production in 1948. The 1519 Waverly epergnettes are not pictured; they started production in 1949. It also has under the heading "Heisey Epergnette" the addition "(Patent Pending)". The patents for the Epergnettes were granted in 1949 to Ann Lee Dillon and Mary G. Dillon of North Carolina who assigned the patents to A. H. Heisey & Company.

This brochure is a single fold utilizing a very pale green as a background color. The cover shows a 1503 Crystolite two light candelabrum with a 341 Old Williamsburg epergnette about to be put into one of the candle sockets. The heading reads, "Put new magic in your Candlelight with the Heisey Epergnette* (Patent Pending)." Below the * is explained as "A simple crystal 'saucer' to fit your candlesticks and to lend them the magic of Merlin."

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT Bryan Baker

Have you made your plans to attend the Percy and Vivian Moore Memorial Weekend and Dinner? You still have time! This event is scheduled September 26 & 27 in Jackson, Michigan. I continue to hear more and more of the exciting events and all around fun planned for this all important weekend. The Heisey Collectors Club of Michigan is rolling out the red carpet for this one - see you there!

I mentioned in last month's report that the Board of Directors was about to hold its annual planning session. I'm happy to report that that meeting has taken place. First, let me divulge the names of our new 2009 Convention Chairs; Judy Rhoads and Mary Ann Spahr. Judy and Mary Ann bring with them an enthusiasm that I find very contagious. They are already busy making plans for next year; I'm confident the 2009 HCA Convention will be fresh and exciting. Please join me in thanking Judy and Mary Ann for taking on such a large project.

One front we will be tackling is our warehouse it is time to do some housekeeping. I took the board on a tour and we all agree that it has gotten a bit cluttered in there. One area I wish us to pursue is to get some of the more interesting items (non-moulds) out of the warehouse, and into our Museum. Granted we can't get it all in the Museum, but I have to ask - why have some of these neat things if we can't (or don't) have them on display for our members and public at large? To be specific - there are two bins of etching plates in the warehouse. I've already asked that they be moved into the Museum so we can begin the process of getting them catalogued, cleaned . . . and on display. Some of these would be great to make rubbings with, for example for tours, etc. Other items in the warehouse can be rotated in and out of the

Museum as well. Yes, a daunting project; but very worth it in my opinion.

Next task: our website. I have met with a design and development group who will be taking on the redesign of our website. A very productive meeting, to say the least. This company has experience in websites similar to ours (i.e. nonprofits, glassware, etc.). Our first mission is to give a facelift to our existing website. We will then be incorporating features such as a "members only section," searchable archives, virtual touring, enhanced educational sections, on-line charitable giving, etc. We really need to take advantage of our "virtual presence." This glass may be added to our existing Benefit Auction, and/or we may hold more than one 'benefit auction' per year. On page 11 is our newly approved auction policy - I encourage you to read it for specifics.

Our annual Benefit Auction is a substantial fundraiser for HCA; I'm sure you can appreciate the significance of this new auctioning policy to HCA. I want to thank the HCA Board of Directors for valuing its importance and approving this policy. To emphasize, this is a members-only benefit and does not impact our non-profit status. With declining sources of revenue, I hope you see that this new policy can be a shot in the arm, so to speak, for us. Please contact me, Dave Spahr, or any other board member with any questions you may have. I am very excited to provide this new service to our HCA members. On page 10, you will find an order blank for our election year special. Mosser has made the 1 Donkey in Cobalt and the 3 Baby Elephant in Ruby for us in the original Heisey molds. Please place your order now because the production of these items is very limited.

In closing, I must report the passing of Carl Sparacio of New Jersey and Marge Harper of Wisconsin; both were longtime supporters of HCA. Our thoughts and sympathies go out to the families and friends of Carl and Marge.



The banner over the top of the inside pages reads, "The Heisey Epergnette – A versatile, new decorating accessory designed for use with your 'candlelight.'" The ad copy reads, "Created to add color and beauty to your table and gay as the flowers it will embrace, this blithe crystal saucer will fit your own candlesticks, candelabra, or candleblocks ... crystal or silver.

"There are two styles – one that holds a candle and flowers and one for flowers alone. Five inches in

diameter, either is deep enough to hold water for your choice of floral arrangements. In this folder we've shown a few combinations possible with the Epergnettes, but there's no limit to the decorating possibilities to fit the season."

The ad copy is of the usual exuberant type but it does mention something that is a bit puzzling. It talks of two types of epergnettes, one with a candle insert and one without. To my knowledge Heisey never marketed a 341 Old Williamsburg epergnette without a candlecup as part of the piece. This is something that Heisey did with the later 1619 Block Five epergnette which was available both with and without a candlecup. These were produced in 1951. They are very similar to the plain epergnettes that Cambridge produced for their Cambridge Arms line. It would be interesting to know if anyone has ever seen a 341 epergnette without a candlecup.

Inside on the left is shown a 1567 Plantation three light candelabrum with two 341 Old Williamsburg epergnettes. The accompanying caption reads, "It's simple – take a 3 light candelabra, for example, add two Epergnettes, and then decorate with flowers to suit your mood. You'll get an effect of unusual beauty like this."

On the right of the open brochure are five displays utilizing the epergnette each with its own caption. The first (a) is a 1503 Crystolite two light candelabrum captioned, "Gay flowers bedeck this crystal candelabra, giving it new, undreamed of beauty."

Next we have (b) showing three Heisey decanters (1589, 1593 Prism, and 4036 ½ Marshall) with their stoppers removed and replaced with an epergnette. The caption reads, "Even decanters and bottle bow to the limitless versatility of Heisey Epergnette."


"IF you've a flair for the unusual, substitute fresh strawberries or ripe cherries for the flowers," accompanies the third (c) picture of a 1504 Regency two light candlestick with two epergnettes used as described.

A 1513 Baroque candelabrum is in the next (d) vignette described by, "A bit of ivy winding 'round the candle puts added glamor in this floral setting."

Finally, we have (e) a 1570 Lotus Leaf candlestick, a 1566 Banded Crystolite candleblock, and a 1567 Plantation candleblock all with inserted epergnettes. "The Epergnette turns these Cinderella candleblocks into lovely fairy princesses."

Across the bottom of the inside page is a tribute to the inventor of the epergnette. It reads, "Annie Lee Dillion, prominent Garden Club member of High Point and Raleigh, N.C., originated the idea of the Heisey Epergnette. Other members everywhere have been quick to praise the decorative versatility of the Epergnette."

On the back we see a sterling silver candelabrum utilizing Heisey epergnettes. Under the heading "Use the Epergnette with Your Candlesticks and Candelabra" we read " With the Heisey Epergnette, you'll find a new thrill in using your candelabra and candlesticks, because you'll be able to make beautiful and dramatic settings never before possible.

"You'll use your Epergnettes often ... and so will your friends who receive them as gifts ... because many a decorating reputation will be enhanced a hundredfold by this new Heisey crystal accessory.

"Ask your Heisey dealer to show you the Epergnette and his selection of hand-wrought crystal candlesticks and candelabra."

It is obvious that Heisey was very successful in promoting this new flower decorating accessory because they are fairly easy to find now. The 1519 Waverly varieties are a little more common than the 341 Old Williamsburg ones. Heisey originally sold them with rubber fittings to make a secure fit in the candleholders. Occasionally you will find a set still with these fittings, although than can be fabricated from rubber tubing. Harder to find are sets that still have the wire coils that facilitated the creation of floral arrangements. While the garden is still producing some beautiful blooms, get out your Heisey epergnettes and brighten up your table with Heisey candelabra with fresh flowers. ◆

337 PLAIN TOURAINE Joe Lokay

The Plain Touraine pattern was introduced in early 1902. It was first advertised in February 1902. At the same time, Heisey also introduced the 335 Prince of Wales Plumes pattern. In comparison, Touraine is one of Heisey's plainest patterns while Prince of Wales Plumes is a very ornate design. The only design in the Touraine pattern is the star in the bottom of the pieces. Even the bottom star is different and not like other Heisey uniform star bottoms. In Touraine, the rays of the star are in alternating graduated sizes and in the other patterns the rays of the star are uniform in size. The name Heisey gave to the pattern refers to it as Plain Line. Its surface is completely plain and the identifying features is a swelling bulge as you approach the top.

Touraine is one of the larger lines produced by A. H. Heisey & Company for use in homes, hotels, or restaurants. Over 120 items were in the pattern line of which 40 were stemware items. The line included a table set, 20 different nappies, 4 sizes of plates, 6 jellies, 12 footed bowls, 4 sizes of oil bottles, etc. Some of the stemware items were dual purpose. For example, the 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tall champagne was also offered as a 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. parfait. The open bowls, spooner, toothpick, etc. had plain top rims. Most, if not all, have the diamond H trademark.


One reference indicates that, in an early catalog, Cambridge offered an identical stemware line that was called 300 Touraine. So, look for the Diamond H mark.

Around 1933, about five items in Touraine were revived and produced in Amber as special orders for the Fred Harvey restaurants. HCA, in their mold inventory, owns some molds in Touraine.

Heisey offered the Touraine pattern with several decorations, and offered some stemware with an optic. I will discuss these in a later article.

(Editor's Note: The name Touraine (or more explicitly Plain Touraine) appears on the catalog pages and advertisements for the 337 line. This is at a time when very few patterns carry factory designated names. As Joe has pointed out, Cambridge had a stem line that they called Touraine. The name appears to be a generic name for the bowl shape of the stemware. This gentle curving shape was made by many factories and was a staple of the hotel and restaurant trade. Heisey extended the design from the stemware and created a whole pattern based on this shape.

You see many variations in the same pieces in this line. The number of actual molds in the line would be fairly small, but the factory was able to make a multitude of pieces from them. The term flared for the bowls seems a misnomer because it appears that it is the bowl itself that is stretched and flattened, rather than the rim.) ◆

NEW AUCTION POLICY FOR ACCEPTING MEMBERS GLASS Dave Spahr

In response to recent requests from many HCA members, the Board of Directors has approved a new auction policy on accepting member's glass for consignment to benefit HCA and support the Museum.

In the past, HCA had limited the quantity of glass accepted for auction to 40 lots per year per member with no limits to the number of lots that were pure donations. Our new policy allows HCA to accept unlimited quantities of glass consigned or donated from our members. Depending on the size of the consignment/collection, HCA may spread the glass over several auctions, not to exceed two years.

Finally, in the past, we limited glass we would accept to only pieces made by the A. H. Heisey & Company. We will be accepting consignments and/or donations of glass made by any company using a Heisey mould.

The policy in its entirety appears below. Please clip it for reference. If you have any questions, please contact me by telephone (937-372-7166) or e-mail (masdgs@aol.com) or any Board member.

1) It is the policy of the Board of Directors to accept consignments of glass made by the A. H. Heisey Company and glass made by other companies from Heisey moulds for sale from members* of HCA for the benefit of HCA and the National Heisey Glass Museum.

a) Consignment of 40 lots or less per member will be accepted and the member will follow the rules and procedures approved by the board for the HCA Benefit auction.

b) If the consignment is larger than 40 lots per member, the member will be referred to the Auction Committee (Executive Committee). The Executive Committee will designate an individual to follow up with the member and establish tentative conditions for the consignment. The individual will report back to the Auction Committee that will accept or reject the consignment in whole or in part and establish conditions it deems appropriate for the consignment.

c) If glass is to be received from an estate or from a collection downsizing or dispersal, HCA will work with the member to bring about the sale of the member's glass. All proceeds going to HCA after

expenses will benefit the National Heisey Glass Museum.

d) HCA will conduct an auction(s) in which the glass will be sold. Glass will be auctioned off in a timely manner not to exceed two calendar years from the date of delivery of glass to the HCA Museum. Once glass is sold at an auction, HCA will provide a consignment settlement for the glass sold not later than fifteen days after the auction.

e) HCA currently holds two auctions yearly. The HCA Auction Committee will determine the auction (or auctions) at which the glass will be sold and may place a member's glass into one or more auctions if to do so is in the best interests of HCA, as determined by the committee.

f) The Auction Committee will determine commission rates on consignments greater than 40 lots per member.

2) As a general rule, glass will be accepted under following conditions:

a) The member agrees to accept all responsibility for providing a merchantable title for all the glass to be sold.

b) The member is responsible for delivery of the glass to the National Heisey Glass Museum. HCA accepts responsibility for the glass once it is received by the Museum, except any glass received that is damaged will be referred back to the shipper and member.

c) The Auction Committee is authorized to reject any glass made by the A H Heisey & Company and glass made by other companies from Heisey moulds not deemed acceptable for sale in accordance with HCA standards. These rejected items may be returned to the member if they desire, at their expense. If the owner does not want the item(s) returned or refuses to pay for shipping, the item(s) become the property of HCA.

d) It is the responsibility of the member to provide an inventory list of glass with the consignment. If no such list is made available to HCA, the HCA Auction Committee may, at its convenience; inventory said glass and prepare an accurate inventory. Said inventory will be sent to the member and stand as an accurate accounting of glass received by the HCA. If no inventory list is prepared, the glass will be sold at auction(s) with a consignment check(s), but no inventory list, provided to the member.

*For the purposes of this policy, the term "member" means member, member's representative, executor or executrix of member's estate, or such other person legally responsible to make decisions on the sale of member's glass.
