Back in October of 2005, I presented you with a Heisey sales promotional brochure that used the theme "Gifts that make their eyes light up..." That was a single fold brochure with two panels on a side. The dating of that brochure would have been in 1948 or after because of the presence of a 1467 Plantation ice lip jug on the

cover. The brochure that I give you this month would have come earlier than that brochure. It is quite possible that this was a retail brochure that complimented the Wartime Salesman which was a wholesale brochure used to sell Heisey at a time when salesmen were not able to make the rounds to their customers because of war time rationing of gasoline. There were four of these Wartime Salesman, one each for 1503 Crystolite, 507 Orchid, 1540 Lariat, and gift

items. Most of the items shown in the "Gift for any Occasion" brochure show up in the gift items Salesman. I would date the brochure to around 1942. You can see the whole gift Wartime Salesman in the July 1998 Heisey News.

This brochure is a triple fold giving us four panels on each side. A dark blue color is used to enhance the brochure, although it is not used on any of the glassware. It is only used to tint some of the background and for the bottom of the pamphlet as it is folded. Something very different from all of the other brochures we have looked at has been utilized on this brochure. Rather than looking at all the panels in a vertical position, most must be looked at by turning the brochure 90 degrees. Also, not all of the panels are the same width on this brochure which has allowed them to present the front of the brochure




Gift Brochure - Second Unfolding

in a very clever way. The four panels measure in width 2 ½", 3 ½", 3 ½", and 3". When the brochure is folded the result is the cover which is actually made up of parts of three different overlaid panels.

The cover of this Newsletter shows what I am calling the cover of the brochure. The caption reads "1489 CAMELIA BOWL (Puritan) AND CANDLE BLOCKS. The chastely simple lines achieve the very maximum in decorative effect." The bowl is shown with three camellia flowers floating in it. As with all of the items in this brochure, there is a number associated with the piece printed by the glass item. The console set is labeled 1. The caption "Gifts for any occasion" is actually on the bottom of the third and fourth panels on the same side of the brochure as the console bowl. Over that, we see "Crystal by Heisey" and the cabochon style trademark. This is actually at the bottom of the opposite side of the brochure. Opening at either of these breaks in the front panel reveals additional offered items in brochure.

We will first look at the double panel picture that is captioned "Gifts for any occasion." All of the items on this page are animal related. We will go in order of the numeric designations on the pieces. Although I see no number by the Horsehead bookends, we can assume that they are 2 because that number does not appear in the brochure. They are captioned "#1 HORSE HEAD BOOK ENDS. A very practical set of Book Ends that always attract favorable attention."

A Puritan cigarette box (3) is captioned "1489 ½ CIGARETTE BOX WITH HORSE HEAD COVER. A smart receptacle for the 'longer' cigarettes."

The colt set is shown in the upper right, "1529 BALKING COLT, 1527 KICKING COLT and 1522 COLT. Here is what people are saying about them: 'The cutest set of crystal ornaments ever made.'" They are numbered 4 balking, 5 standing, and 6 kicking. A group of animals in the lower left are labeled, "1540 'OSCAR,' 1541 SEALYHAM and 1538 RABBIT. Captivating figures of Heisey's pure crystal are unique and universally appealing." The Oscar/Sparky/Plug Horse (7), Sealyham/Scotty (8), and Rabbit Paperweight (9) are shown. Finally the fighting

rooster (10) in the lower right is described, "CHANTICLEER. A pair of these skillfully executed table ornaments, facing each other, gaily 'decorates' any table."

Going back to the cover and pulling on the "Crystal by Heisey" tab and fully extending the brochure reveals the back of the brochure. This is treated as a whole and presents five groupings of glassware vertically. Starting at the top we have "Smart accessories for milady's dressing table. Cologne and puff sets in either the square or Crystolite design, enable you to see the contents." Shown are the 1489 Puritan cologne (11) and small candy box (12). It would appear that the candy box doubled as a puff for the sake of this brochure (the Wartime Salesman also uses both descriptions for the same piece). In the same picture we see pieces of 1504 Regency even though the text reads Crystolite. Regency pattern was viewed as an extension of the 1503 Crystolite pattern. Shown are a pair of Regency colognes and the puffbox (all labeled 13).

The picture below is described as "Extremely useful and distinctive Heisey pieces. All will bring enduring satisfaction in your home or will gladden the hearts of your friends to whom you send them as gifts." Shown are the 1503 Crystolite 2 compartment mayonnaise with spoon (16), 1503 Crystolite covered candy box (14), 5012 Urn vase (15), 301 Old Williamsburg hurricane (17), 1428 Warwick cornucopia vase (18), and 1503 Crystolite 4 compartment cloverleaf relish (19).

The middle picture has this caption: "For hospitality with a 'know-how' manner, these smart accessories add charm and graciousness." The items shown are the 1503 Crystolite punch set complete with ladle (20), 4036 ½ Marshall bowling ball decanter (21), 3311 Velvedere sherry (22), 5023 Continental cocktail (23), 4036 Marshall cocktail shaker (24), 4054 Coronation tankard (25), and 4054 Coronaltion slim jim (26).

The next grouping is described with "Flowers and soft candle-light! Here are some clever helps in

achieving this magic for any table." Displayed are a 4044 New Era candelabrum (27), 1503 Regency two light candlesticks (28) flanking a 1503 Crystolite 12" oval shallow bowl (29), 1519 Waverly horn vase (30), and two pairs of 1503 Crystolite rosette candleblocks (31).

The bottom picture is of two smoking sets. The caption reads, "SMOKING SETS that never go out of style are always useful. Here are two of these sets that are very popular." The sets shown are a 1503 Crystolite (32) and 1489 Puritan (33). Both sets have small cigarette boxes and four square ashtrays. The Puritan cigarette box is the plain one without the horse head finial.

The back page of the brochure is the only page that is oriented in the usual vertical alignment. At the top, two additional items are show. There is the 1495 Fern twin mayonnaise with underplate and two mayonnaise spoons (34) and a 3408 Jamestown dinner bell (35). There is below them a blank area in which the retail establishment could put its own name and address. Finally, there is an order form in which an order for the items in the brochure could be submitted. The items could be identified using the "photo number" that accompanied the pictures in the brochure. There is an interesting line at the bottom of the form that reads "Prices shown on enclosed price list subject to local tax, if any." This states that there would be a price list that would accompany the brochure. We have no separate price lists for any of the brochures which we have at the Museum. I would imagine that the Company would want to update these periodically without replacing the Therefore, as a price list became brochure. obsolete it would have been destroyed. price list would also have supplied the information on item identification which is rather sparse in this brochure.

This brochure certainly provided the shopper with a lot of interesting ideas to satisfy her gift buying needs. Maybe you will be similarly inspired to use it to find some Heisey to give as gifts, also. ◆


337 TOURAINE, OPTICS


A. H. Heisey & Company introduced the 337 Touraine pattern in early 1902. Touraine is one of the larger lines produced by the company for use in homes, hotels, or restaurants. I will divide the production into two categories: the tableware items and the stemware items. There were about 80 different items in tableware and about 40 items in the stemware category (see last month's Newsletter for a listing of items available in this Production of the tableware items pattern). ended in about 1909 as there was no 337 tableware items offered in Heisey Price List #155 (1910). However, the stemware items continued many years. There were about 50 stemware items in Heisey Catalog and Price List #75 (1913). Several stemware items lasted into the 1930s.



A vertical, narrow optic was added to the 337 Touraine stemware line in 1908. Price List #142 offers 32 items in optic plus three non-stemware items. They are the 2 oz. bar tumbler, 8 oz. tumbler, and a finger bowl. The price list refers to 337 Plain Touraine stemware and 337 Optic Touraine stemware. Heisey also added to the Touraine stemware a spiral optic. This line was given its own pattern number: 438. Heisey Catalog #75 (1913) shows a nice comparison of the three stemware lines on pages 49, 50, and 62. They are pictured with this article, as well as the page from Price List #142. There are more 337 stemware items in Catalog #75 that are not shown on the three catalog pages mentioned above. A 4 1/2 oz. low footed sherbet with a larger opening at the top and the same item with a stuck handle were added to the three lines. However, they were given numbers 337 1/2 and 438 1/2. I really learned a lot about Touraine through my review of this pattern. •

337 TOURAINE DECORATIONS

The plainness of the 337 Touraine pattern lends itself to decorations. Heisey Price List #60 (1902) was the first to offer Plain Touraine. The Touraine pattern covered 13 pages of that Price List. Four pages for items in the pattern, three for engraving #39, three for engraving #40, and three pages for decorations #56 and #63. The best I could tell was that the engravings and decorations were put on all pieces of the Touraine pattern except for the oyster cocktails. Later came decorations #65, #67, and #68. Decorations by other companies include the ruby stain edge and wide band of ruby near the top of the pieces.

Unfortunately, we do not have pictures of what the #39 and #40 engravings entail. The Museum does own a table set in 337 Touraine that is engraved. This is a decoration that is seen occasionally on the Touraine pattern. It is quite possible that the engraving is either the #39 or #40.

Decoration #50 is a gold edge on the items with a single wide band and two narrow bands around the bulge or larger diameter of the piece. Decoration #60 is the same as #50 except the single wide band is green rather than gold.

Decoration #65 is ruby luster on the bowls, #67 is light amber, and #68 is dark amber.

The simplicity of the pattern is enhanced by any of these decorations. All decorated pieces of 337 Touraine are scarce. ◆

1164/1165 FINGER BOWLS

When I was looking through Heisey Catalog #75 (1913), the 1164 finger bowl caught my eye. These were pressed finger bowls that predated Heisey's elegant blown finger bowls of the 1920s and 1930s. A finger bowl you might think of as a common, uninteresting item. What really intrigued me was that it came in six different forms.

- 1. Plain, straight
- 2. Plain, flared
- 3. Plain, crimped
- 4. Optic, straight
- 5. Optic, flared
- 6. Optic, crimped

The 1164 finger bowl first appeared in Heisey Price List 142 (1908) and only the plain, straight and the optic, straight were offered at that time. In Price List #150 (1909), the plain, flared and the optic, flared were offered. It was not until Price List #155 (1910) that all six forms were offered. They then appear up until Price List #205 (6/15/19). In the next price list, #206 (1/1/22), all six items are gone. Thus, production life was around 13 years.

Put a matching small tumbler/large bar glass in the finger bowl and you have a two piece oyster cocktail set. Only the four styles were offered: plain, flared; plain, crimped; optic, flared; and optic, crimped. The sets were given a new number (1165) because the finger bowls had a positioning ring molded into the inside bottom to receive the tumbler. •

If you have any ideas let me know.

In this issue of the Heisey News, you will find a consignor's packing list and the auction contract. We also hope to soon have these on our website (www.heiseymuseum.org) for you to download and use. As before, each member and household member can donate unlimited amounts of Heisey glassware and can consign up to forty (40) lots each. (Please use another copy of the packing list to list items 26 through 40.) There is no limit to the number of items in each lot and we are encouraging each consignor to size each lot so it is valued at more than \$25. The auction committee reserves the right to modify lots, but will do so sparingly. Please note that we have expanded the glass we will accept. In the past we accepted only glass made by A. H. Heisey & Company. This year we are also accepting glass made from Heisey moulds by other manufacturers. Glass not made from Heisey moulds will not be sold and will be returned at the consignor's expense or become a donation to HCA.

Please read over the auction agreement carefully, as these are the rules that govern the auction. Please use the packing list to list items and group them into lots as you wish them to be sold. Remember to put a "D" beside the lot number(s) on the packing lists for those lots you wish to donate to HCA. Please be certain the packing list includes ALL of your items, that you fill in each line completely - Pattern number/name, description, decoration, color, if marked, and provide the condition. Don't forget to sign and date the auction contract and submit it along with your packing lists. Both should be in your box of consigned or donated glass.

The success of this auction depends on the quality and quantity of glass consigned and donated. We are requesting you to send (donate, consign) GOOD DAMAGE-FREE GLASS. Please look through your Heisey and consign some to us to help support YOUR Museum. Consignments and donations for the auction must be received by January 15, 2009. The sooner your items are received the better since they must be checked in, inspected, cataloged, and repacked for the auction by volunteers.

Four things make for a great auction: great facilities, great help from volunteers, great glass, and a great group of buyers with deep pockets to purchase the glass. We have the first thing - we hope to get the last three. Please look through your Heisey and consign or donate good glass to us to help support your Museum. Please reserve the April 17-18 dates on your calendar and plan on attending this great event!

Many dedicated HCA members, including most board members, volunteer to help make this auction a success. We, as always, need help to prepare for the auction, at the auction itself, and after the auction to cleanup and take glass back to the Museum for successful absentee bidders. If you would like to volunteer please contact the Museum or me. We are counting on your participation to make this auction the best ever!

Consignments:

All items consigned for sale or donated are to be made by A. H. Heisey and Company or by other manufacturers using Heisey moulds. The owner/ consignor / member, hereafter referred to as the owner, agrees to accept all responsibility for providing merchantable title for all glass sold.

Each owner may consign a maximum of forty (40) lots to the auction. A list of glass being consigned or donated and prepared by the owner is attached as an integral part of this contract. There is no limit on the number of items in each lot, but HCA retains the right to increase/decrease size/make up of each lot. Each owner may donate an unlimited number of lots to HCA for sale at the auction. HCA, however, at its discretion, will consign donated items for auction, add donated items to the Museum collection, and/or sell donated items in the Museum Shop.

The HCA Auction Committee is authorized to reject any glass not deemed acceptable to HCA standards for this auction. These items may be returned to the consignor, if they desire, at their expense. Otherwise, these items become the property of HCA.

Commission:

Owners of glassware to this sale will be charged on the following sliding scale of commission per lot: \$5.00-\$50.00= 40%; \$50.01-\$200.00= 30%; \$200.01-\$400.00= 20%; \$400.01-\$750.00= 15%; \$750.01 and over= 10%.

Settlement:

Settlement for glass sold will be made in full not later than fifteen days after the completed auction from the HCA Auction escrow account. Said account is set up and operated consistent with ORC Section 4707.024. Collection of funds, bad checks, debts, and unpaid auction lots is the responsibility of HCA.

Responsibility:

It is the responsibility of the owner to deliver the glassware to the National Heisey Glass Museum on or by January 15, 2009. HCA accepts responsibility for the glass after it is received at the Museum and until it is sold, except that any glass damaged in shipment to the Museum will be referred to the shipper and owner. All glass damaged or lost while in the

possession of HCA prior to sale will be valued by a qualified appraiser or appraisers and the owner will be paid on this basis, less commission.

Bidding:

The minimum opening bid on a lot will be at least \$5. The minimum incremental bid increase will be \$2.50. In the event no bid is received on a lot, that lot becomes a donation to HCA.

The owner and HCA both agree that absentee bids will be accepted by HCA. Per HCA policy, the minimum absentee bid on a lot will be \$15 with a minimum opening bid of \$5. Absentee bids are bids left by buyers prior to the auction and are executed in a competitive manner. We do not use the full bid amount as a starting bid. Bidding is initiated in the audience and then offered on behalf of the absentee bidder at the next increment continuously until bidding has stopped. HCA reserves the right to accept or reject any and all absentee bids. Example: Absentee bidder leaves a bid with a maximum amount of \$500. After item is sold through competitive bidding, the absentee bidder is successful for \$325. HCA is not responsible for misfiled bids that are not executed.

Absolute Auction:

All items are to be sold at an **absolute auction** and not at a reserve auction **except** HCA and the owner agree there will be a minimum opening amount (see Bidding above) on all lots without exception. Owners cannot bid or have others bid on their behalf on their own items.

"Absolute Auction" and "Reserve Auction" as defined by ORC. 4707.01:

"Absolute Auction" means an auction of real or personal property to which all of the following apply:

- 1) The property is sold to the highest bidder without reserve.
- 2) The auction does not require a minimum bid.
- 3) The auction does not require competing bids of any type by the seller or an agent of the seller.
- 4) The seller of property cannot withdraw the property from auction after the auction is opened and there is a public solicitation or calling of bids.

"Reserve Auction" means an auction in which the seller or an agent of the seller reserves the right to establish a minimum bid, the right to reject or accept any or all bids, or the right to withdraw the real or personal property at any time prior to the completion of the auction by the auctioneer.

General Auction Terms and Conditions:

- 1) Payment: Cash, travelers check, certified check, or personal check (if approved by HCA). MasterCard and Visa cards are accepted. 5% buyers premium. Buyers premium deleted for cash or check payment. Cash only payment may be specified for individual bidders at HCA's request.
- 2) HCA has endeavored to describe all items to the best of their ability, however this is not a warranty.
- 3) All items are sold as is and where is. The auctioneer has the right to make any verbal corrections at the time of sale and to provide additional information. Inspection is welcomed during preview and anytime before the item is sold.
- 4) In the case of a disputed bid the auctioneers have the authority to settle disputes to the best of their ability and their decision(s) is/are final.
- 5) The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid raise not in line with established bid increments.
- 6) All sales are final and all items must be paid for each day of sale.
- 7) Live telephone bidding may be available at HCA's option and under special terms (contact HCA).
- 8) HCA is licensed as an auction firm by the Ohio Department of Agriculture and bonded in favor of the state.
- 9) HCA will provide auctioneers licensed by the Ohio Department of Agriculture and bonded in favor of the state.
- 10) Buyers assume full responsibility for items once they are sold unless otherwise specified by HCA.
- 11) Bidding on any item indicates acceptance of these terms.

Olympus Etch

(Editor's Note: The following article is reprinted from "All About Glass," the magazine of the West Virginia Museum of American Glass.)

The "Bubble Girl" or "Bubble Blower" etch on [pink] Depression Era glassware has been a mystery for a long time. Fig. 1 is a close-up of the etch on an HC Fry Glass champagne. Fig. 2 is the entire stem.




Figure 3: Catalog Page from Wallenstein Mayer Co, 1928

One mystery is what decorating company did this particular etch. Unfortunately this article won't answer that question. But we will answer some other questions about the etch. Helping us with the answers is a page (Fig. 3) from a 1928 Annual Catalogue of the Wallenstein Mayer Co. They were a wholesale jewelers located at 31 to 39 East Fourth Street in Cincinnati, Ohio.

On what glass company blanks does this etch appear? The stemware and tumblers on the catalog page were made by the HC Fry Glass Co. The handled pieces and console set were made by the AH Heisey Glass Co. Note that the captions on the handled jelly and bon bon are Even original documentation has errors of which we need to be aware! The plate on the catalog page doesn't have enough features distinguishing to point manufacturer. The etch has also been found on pieces of Cambridge and Fostoria. And perhaps blanks of other glass companies will turn up with the etch as well.

What is the name of the etch? The catalog page calls it "Olympus" pattern. We at least now have a documented name.

When was the etch done? Well, circa 1928 seems a good estimate since it appears in a 1928 catalog!

What decorating company made the etch? This is still just speculation until further documentation is discovered. Are the line numbers under each piece a clue to the decorator? We don't know. But just for "slice of history" fun, note the original wholesale prices for each item.

A bonus is the small line of cut pieces at the top of the page. Made by? Cut by? Same decorating company? Once again we don't know. We just know it's #306 pattern.

(Editor's note: Heisey collectors will recognize the 2 handled cheese, bon bon, and jelly as part of Heisey's 1229 Octagon pattern. The candlesticks are the 113 Mars and the floral bowl is the 1202 Paneled Octagon. The plate may be a 1184 Yeoman plate, but they could just as well be from any number of other manufacturers. They all made generic round plates in color during this time period. The Diamond H does not appear on 1184 Yeoman plates.) ◆

2008 SELECT AUCTION REVIEW

Have you looked at your 2008 Select Auction Catalog that was published in the September 2008 Heisey News? The list is just awesome. Without a doubt this is the best Select Auction that HCA has put on since we started it in 2005. There is a huge assortment of different items, including many rarities. There are items to appeal to any collector's taste, from the beginner to the specialist. If you are able to drop by the Museum, you may see all of the auction items on display in the Multi-Purpose Room. Two cases are full of auction glass and it all will be up for bids on Saturday, October 18, 2008, right there in the Multi-Purpose Room. On that day all items will be removed from the cases and you will be able to fully examine the items during the Preview from 12:30 p.m. to 2:00 p.m. The auction itself will begin at 2:00.

There are three corrections to the catalog that I want to mention here. Lot 113 should read "393 Narrow Flute ind domino sugar H." It is not part of the 394 Wide Flat Panel pattern. Also, lot 164 should read "1485 Saturn cruet Limelight" and lot 204 similarly should be "1485 Saturn cruet Dawn."

Because of the size of this auction we are able to set out the items in logical groups as we catalog the items (This is different from the Benefit Auction where the items are cataloged as we go, so they are grouped by consignor.) So, I will pick out some of the highlights following the order of the catalog.

The first grouping is of what we old-timers call "little things." These are the small items that are so easy to fit into any collection because they take up so little space. We have some good examples including the 1000 Maezene marmalade with lid (lot 7), a nice 310 Ring Band souvenir toothpick in Custard (11), a set of two 379 Urn individual salts (16), and a 1540 Lariat

Cologne (18). Lot 19 is an interesting lot of four 2052 2 ½ oz. bar glasses still in the original Heisey tissue paper. There is a very nice 515 Flamingo Taper cologne (21) and a set of the 16 Colonial puff box and hair receiver (22).



Case 1

Next up are a group of 6 Heisey baskets (lots 23-28) including a 417 Flamingo Double Rib and Panel (24) and a 461 Banded Picket in Moongleam (27). This is followed by a grouping of pieces in some of Heisey's earliest patterns. There is a beautiful 1250 Groove and Slash covered cracker jar (29). The lid is the original Heisey flat glass lid that is so hard to find. Also, in this group are a 343 Sunburst footed jelly (31) and a pair of 305 Punty and Diamond Point #2 salt and pepper shakers (32).

A small group of Flamingo items follow including two comports, one in 3362 Charter Oak (36) and the other in 1252 Twist with the attractive cattail cutting (37). We have a great assortment of jugs and tankards including three different sizes of 451 Cross Line Flute (40-42) and an unusual 385 Grid and Square tankard with heavy silver overlay on the top band (45). In the jar section that follows, we have two 3 lb. 465 Recessed Panel candy jars, one plain (47) and one with gold and enameled trim (48). A 16 oz. Flat Panel lavender jar (51) is also included in this group.

A nice grouping of favor vases (52-58) follows including 5 of the 6 varieties in Crystal and two Cobalt ones. Other Cobalt items come next including a 3390 Carcassonne ftd. bar (62) and two 2323 Navy 8 oz. sodas (63). Pieces from Heisey's later patterns are highlighted with two hard to find 1425 Victorian items, the footed twin-mayonnaise (66) and the three ball footed jelly compote (67).

Many lots of Moongleam are available in the auction. Some of the outstanding items are a 367 Prism Band decanter (78), 352 Flat Panel humidor (81) in perfect condition, and 8005 Galaxy goblet (82) and champagne (83). The smoking item collector will be enticed with the 359 Chesterfield Moongleam ashtray (76). Transitioning into our Hawthorne section is the perfect transition piece, a 3361 Charlotte champagne (90) with Hawthorne bowl and Moongleam stem and foot. Among the fine Hawthorne items is a fabulous 353 Medium Flat Panel toothbrush holder (92) – this is the only one of those that I am aware of.

Among the nice colonial items that we have in the auction are four sets of 150 Banded Flute oyster cocktail sets (95) consisting of bar glass and finger bowl with ring. In 493 Raised Loop we have one lot combining an egg cup with a 4" nappy (101). There are footed jellies in 1776 Kalonyal (106) and 339 Continental (107). The 393 Narrow Flute biscuit tray (109) or cottage cheese dish (110) would be a nice addition to any collection.

We have a grouping of 3 lots of interesting paper items next. There are three sheets of A.H. Heisey blank letterhead (115), an original 1952 Price List #31 that belonged to Heisey cutter William Groves (116), and sample monograms designs done by R.F. Maidel (117). These items are just before a beautiful 343 Sunburst punch bowl with stand (119).

In 1469 Ridgeleigh, we are offering the 10" cylinder vase (124), cologne (128), and a set of salts in their original box (130). The next item is the very unusual 8086 decanter with a cutting.

This is the decanter that is shaped just like the Ridgeleigh icicle decanter only this one has no vertical ribbing. The proper Heisey number for this decanter has never been found.

Leading off a group of Sahara items is a beautiful 1420 Tulip vase (132). Other Sahara items include a 1252 Twist 4 oz. oil (135) and 1252 Twist ice bucket with gold washed handle. The animal items in the auction include small (143) and middle (144) elephants, balking colt (146), and all three mallards (148 – half, 149 - up, 150 – down). The only non-Heisey item in the auction is an Imperial Amber Flying Mare on the bust off (152).



Case 2

The highlight of the candlesticks being offered is the unusual 1619 Block Five with a center vase (156). In addition there are a pair of 1509 individual Queen Ann candleholders with dolphin feet (159) and a pair of 1489 Puritan candleblocks with original paper labels (160).

In Limelight, we have a 1485 Saturn cruet (164) while in Zircon, we have multiples of several pieces of 4083 Stanhope: 5 goblets (165), 2 champagnes (166), and 5 cocktails (167). Among the items with 507 Orchid etching are the 1 quart 4225 Cobel cocktail shaker (170). Other etched pieces include two 3394 Universal goblets with 9023 Fred Harvey etch (lots 177 and 178) and a pair of 1515 Flame candlesticks with 515 Heisey Rose etch. Another Fred

Harvey item being offered is a 353 Medium Flat Panel footed soda in Amber (192). Also in amber, but in this case Heisey's Sultana are footed 6092 Cabochon pieces: 3 footed tumblers (194) and 8 footed juices (195).

We have several beautifully cut pieces that we are offering including a 1519 Waverly oval compote with 965 Narcissus cutting (200), a 429 Plain Panel Recessed water set with very deep cutting possibly done by Tuthill (200A), and an elaborately cut 3408 Jamestown goblet (201). There is only one Dawn item in the auction but it is a beauty, a 1485 Saturn cruet (204). In Alexandrite, we are offering in 3390 Carcassonne a high goblet (205) and a cordial (206).

Obviously, I have not covered every item in the auction. There are many other great items in your list. So, mark down your favorites and come to the auction here in the Museum on October 18. If you can not make it to the auction, do send in an absentee bid. Dave Spahr has outlined the procedure for absentee bids found in the September Newsletter immediately following the catalog.

This will be a great event for HCA and collectors, too. No previous Select Auction had offered so many different and unusual items. I think no one will be disappointed with this auction – unless they miss it. I hope to see you there. •

Eight members were present and after approval of the minutes, we moved the discussion to the establishment of our web site. Eileen Bergren gave a comprehensive report of various current web sites of Heisey study clubs. She analyzed the web sites for the group's reflection in preparation of our own web site.

The October Glass and Pottery Show will occur on Saturday and Sunday, October 25 - 26. The members present at the meeting decided to set up a display of Heisey (glass and books) for information and advertising of our club. The NCHSG met at the home of Sibyl and Ned Lavengood in Wilmington, NC, for our September meeting. There was a wonderful lunch provided by the Lavengoods and Cleo Lancaster. After dessert, the Group conducted a short business meeting then had Show and Tell. Items shown included a 423 Diamond Band custard cup, a 315 Paneled Cane nappy with applied gold, a 300 Peerless tumbler, three cookbooks with photographs of Heisey pieces used to display the food or decorate the table, a 1183 Revere low footed cake salver with cutting, a 150 Banded Flute cake salver, a 3404 Spanish finger bowl in Cobalt, a 343 Sunburst individual cream and sugar set, a 1225/109 Petticoat Dolphin / Ridge and Star comport in Flamingo, a 1205 Fancy Loop ice bucket, a 1485 Saturn mayonnaise in Zircon, and a group of 1201 Fandango pieces including a square nappy, oil, cream and sugar, and spooner.

The real treat of the day was a visit to a local store front specializing in watch/clock repair and glass blowing. You can imagine which one we were interested in knowing more about!! The owner of the store narrated as a gentleman gathered glass from the furnace on the end of a pre-heated blow pipe and proceeded to create a handkerchief bowl in front of our eyes. She explained step by step exactly what he was doing with the glass as he worked his magic. We watched as he took the initial bit of molten glass and skillfully sat at the bench manipulating the glass using the blow pipe, wooden blocks, and paddles to create the bubble. He then gathered more molten glass from the

furnace and rolled it in a container of frit (crushed pieces of glass) to add color to the piece. After reheating the glass in the glory hole, he rolled the glass on the marver, in this instance a flat slab of marble, then applied a larger size frit to create dots of color in the piece. As the glass cooled, it changed colors and was returned to the glory hole for reheating. Returning to the bench, he continued to shape the piece, then blew it to its final size. A punty rod was used to gather a small amount of molten glass to transfer the piece from the blow pipe, and then the top opening was created. The glass was returned to the glory hole and emerged as a flattened piece of molten glass that was quickly dangled and turned to create the handkerchief bowl shape. The punty was removed and the bowl was placed in the annealer to allow the glass to slowly cool. We were then invited to enter the furnace area. The heat was intense even in this small operation, so we could only imagine how hot it was when the Heisey plant was in full operation.

Our next meeting will be held at 12 Noon on November 8, 2008, at Replacements, LTD in Greensboro, NC. Nothin' would be finer than to be in Carolina....so come join us!!!! ◆

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
