

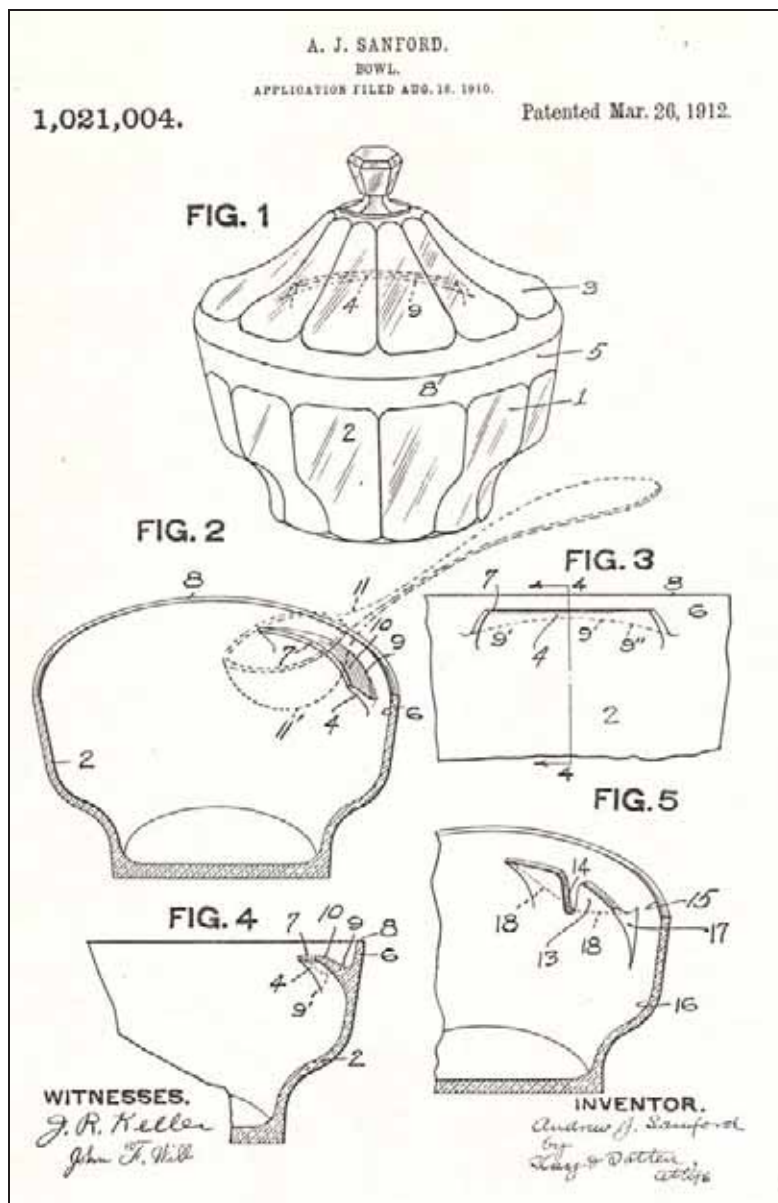

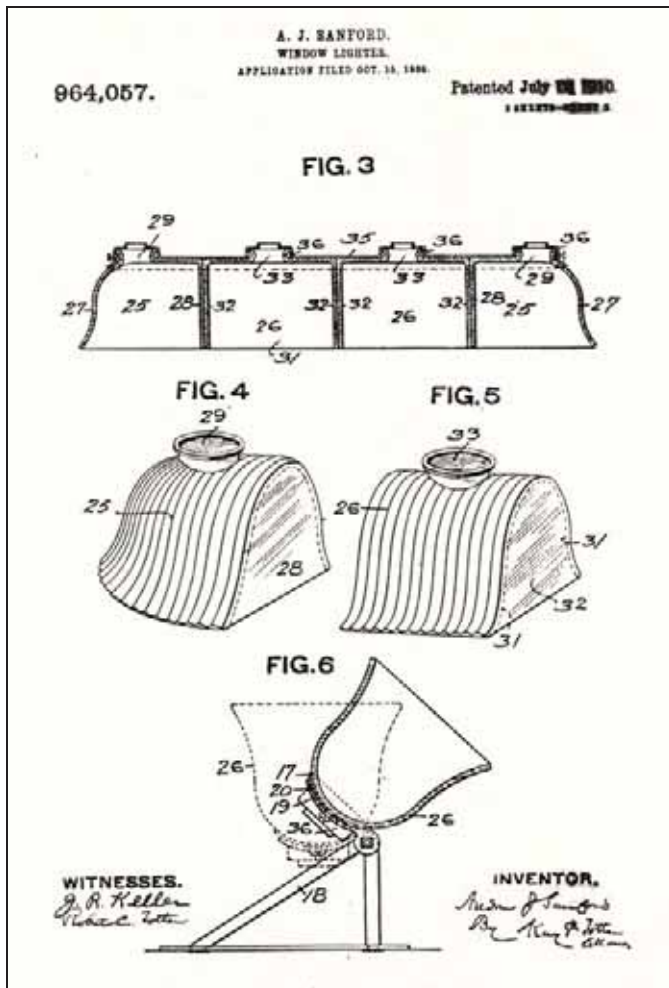

UTILITY PATENTS ASSOCIATED WITH A.H. HEISEY & COMPANY (PART 4)

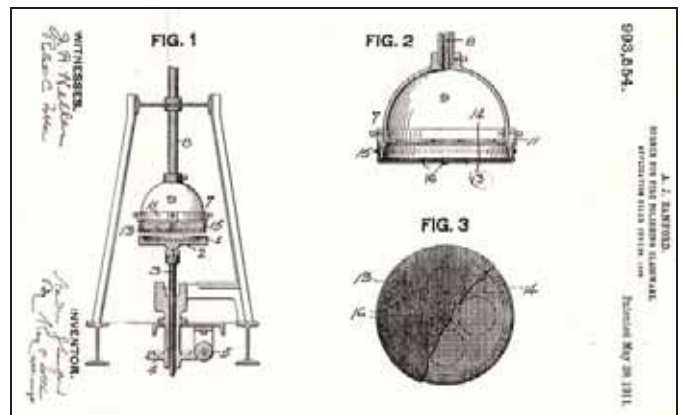
Our next series of utility patents were granted in the period 1909 to 1912. They range from basic improvements in the fire polishing of glassware to lighting fixtures. There is even one for an innovation to the crushed fruit design for which you can see the patent illustration on the cover of this issue.

The first patent we will look at is Patent 964,057 which was granted to Andrew J. Sanford of Newark, OH, assignor to the A.H. Heisey & Co, Inc., of Newark, OH. The patent was applied for on October 15, 1909 and was granted on July

12, 1910. This patent covers an innovation in a window-lighter.

The text says that, "my invention relates to glass shades and supporting devices therefore, and especially to that type employed for lighting window, pictures and the like. Its object is to provide a device of the character described, hereinafter termed a window lighter, suitable for carrying more than one electric light so as to distribute the light thoroughly in the desired direction, and to provide a shade in the device of simple construction and of desired length." The device consists of "an oblong glass shade, or oblong integral shade adapted to carry a plurality of lights or bulbs in a convenient manner and provide with a plurality of necks corresponding to the number of bulbs and adapted to support the same and to be attached to the improved shade carrying and adjusting device in my invention constituting with the shade the complete window lighter."

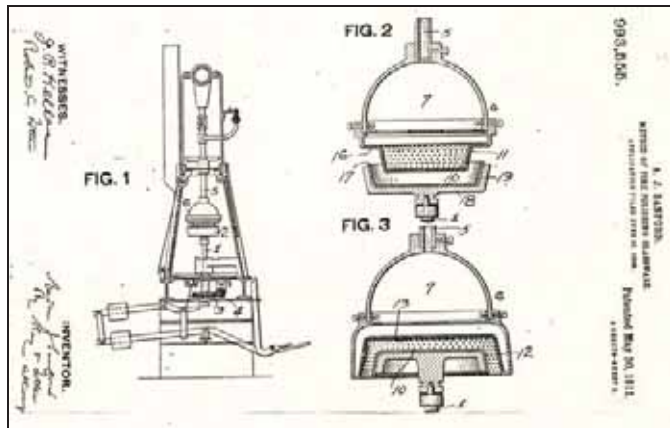
As you can see from the illustrations this looks like a shade that might have been made by the Holophane Company. We do know that in this period Heisey was making the Holophane shades, so it is possible that Sanford and Heisey were coming up with some innovations that were marketed by Holophane. The illustrations make the devices appear bigger than they would be if they were only intended to surmount a picture frame. I, personally, have never seen anything like what is illustrated.



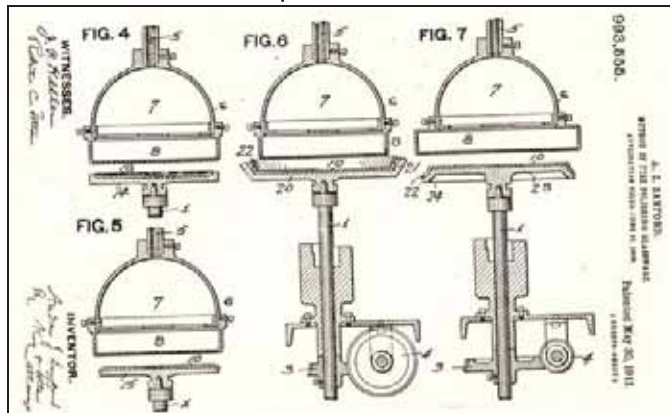

Next, we have two patents that were granted on May 30, 1911, for a burner for fire-polishing glassware (Patent 993,554) and for a method of fire polishing glassware (Patent 993,555). Again Andrew J. Sanford assignor to A. H. Heisey & Co is listed as the inventor.

The new burner "comprises a suitable burner body and a burner face supported thereby and adapted to provide multitudinous jet orifices for the flame jets consisting in asbestos cloth in combination with and supported by a sheet of wire netting attached to the burner body."



Patent 993,555 – Illustration 1

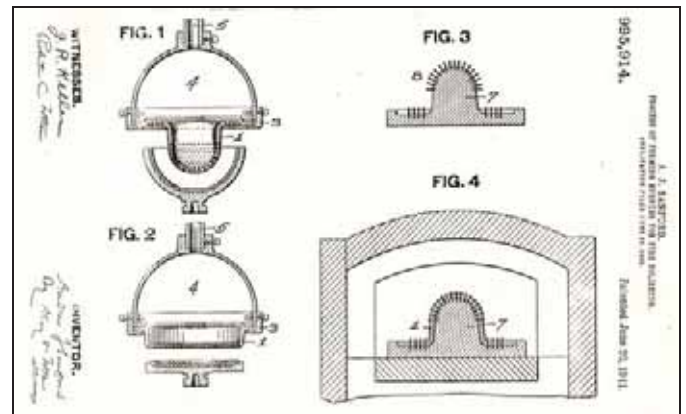


Patent 993,555 – Illustration 2

The new method of fire polishing dealt with "flat articles or articles having flat body portions with shallow upwardly projecting rims or sides" and the fire polishing of both the upper and lower surfaces. The article would be supported "upon a suitable former and first exposing the top surface thereof to a downwardly projecting fire polishing flame, and then reversing the article and fire polishing the bottom face thereof."

"It also consists in fire polishing such articles having flat body portions while so supporting the entire flat body portion and thereby preventing the sagging or stretching of the mid-portion of the flat body."

"It also consists in so fire polishing the top face of articles having upwardly projecting rims and at the same time rotating the articles so as to flare the rim portions outwardly, and then supporting the blank with its bottom face upward upon a former corresponding to the exact shape of the interior of the finished article and by the heat of the flame causing the rim portion of the article to conform to such outer portion of the former and produce an article of the exact shape desired."

The final patent that dealt with fire polishing in this period was Patent 995,914 granted on June 20, 1911 to Andrew J Sanford assignor to A. H. Heisey and Co. The title of the patent is "Process of Forming Burners for Fire-Polishing." In this patent the goal was to make "a durable burner of the type which will withstand the very high heat generated upon the jet face thereof, for use for example, in connection with a method of fire polishing" as explained in the two previous patents presented here. The burner shall have "multitudinous jet orifices formed therein so as to provide for a multitude of small jet flames which can be projected directly against the surface to be polished, and the object of the present invention is provide a burner formed of refractory material such as

plumbago, or like baked clay, to withstand high heats."



353 Medium Flat Panel Crushed Fruit

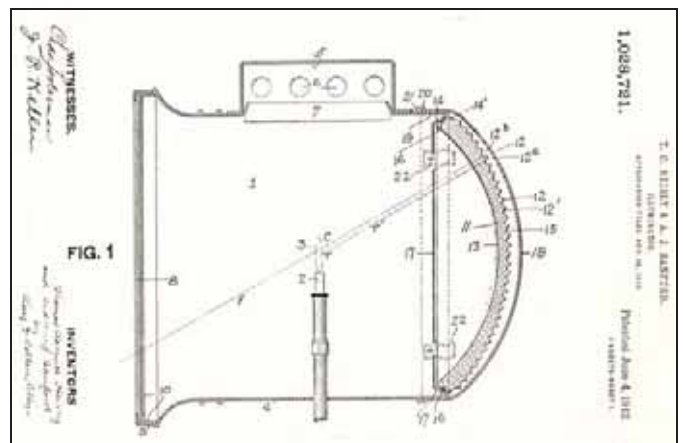
The next utility patent is probably the most interesting of the ones we have looked at to this date. You will find the illustration for Patent 1,021,004 on the cover of this issue. The patent was applied for on August 16, 1910 but was not granted until March 26, 1912. The item being patented is simply described as, "Bowl." Andrew J. Sanford is again listed as the inventor with the invention assigned to A. H. Heisey & Co. The description follows:

"My invention relates to bowls or jars and particularly to those employed for carrying crushed fruit, preserves and the like. Its object is to provide an improved receptacle of this nature, ordinarily employed to carry crushed fruit and sticky or semi-liquid food, and with which a ladle or spoon is necessarily employed in removing the contents, which vessel is provided with means for removing the surplus fruit or the like from the bottom of the ladle, and returning it to the body of the bowl, thereby preventing waste and keeping the upper part or edge of the bowl clean.

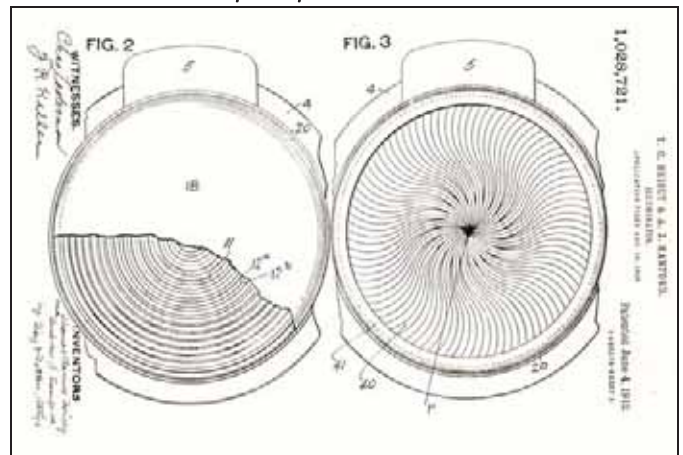
"To these ends my invention consists, generally stated, in a bowl of this character provided with

a flange carried in its side portion and preferably having one or more inclined sides and other means hereinafter described to provide for the return of the surplus fruit or the like to the body of the bowl."

We do know that Heisey did produce a 2 quart sanitary crushed fruit based on this patent. The actual piece does not look identical to the patent drawing but is much more in keeping with the esthetic of Heisey's colonial lines. This crushed fruit is in the 353 Medium Flat Panel pattern. It is much harder to find than the more common 352 Flat Panel crushed fruits.

Our final utility patent that we will discuss in this article is Patent 1,028,721 which was granted on June 4, 1912 and is listed as an Illuminator. The inventors of this item are noted as Thomas Clarence Heisey and Andrew J. Sanford, both of Newark, OH, and assigned to A. H. Heisey & Company. This is the first time

that we note T. Clarence's name on any of the patents which we have looked at. He would have been 28 when this patent was applied for in 1910.

"Our invention relates to illuminators in general, and particularly to that class of illuminators used as head lights or search lights for automobiles, motor boats, or locomotives. Its object is to dispense with the metallic or mirrored reflector hitherto employed in the rear of the source of light to direct the rearwardly emitted rays forwardly through the glass pane or other diffusing device employed, and to substitute therefore a reflector which dispenses entirely with a mercury or other mirror, and has a relatively indestructible reflecting surface.

"To this end our invention comprises an illuminator having a casing with an annular flange at its rear portion, a reflector provided with an annular edge similar in shape to said flange, and a gasket of elastic material between the flange and the reflector edge."

We have no record of this "illuminator" ever being produced. This would have no connection to the prototype headlight lenses that we do know that the company made but which were never put into production. These probably date to the 1920s, at least ten years after this patent was granted.

We have one more installment on the utility patents to finish off this series of articles. The last one we have records of was granted in 1917. Next month we will cover a patent on the sanitary syrup and several on electro-portable lamps. ♦

429 PLAIN PANEL RECESSED

Production of 429 Plain Panel Recessed started about 1909 and ended about 1926. A total of 37 different items were offered over the life of the pattern. The first Heisey Price List (1910) to include 429 offered only seven items. By 1913,

33 items were offered in the pattern. In about 1915, 3 punch bowls, either with a base or without, were added to the pattern, and a 4 oz. parfait was added in 1916. From here, items were periodically discontinued until the pattern ended.

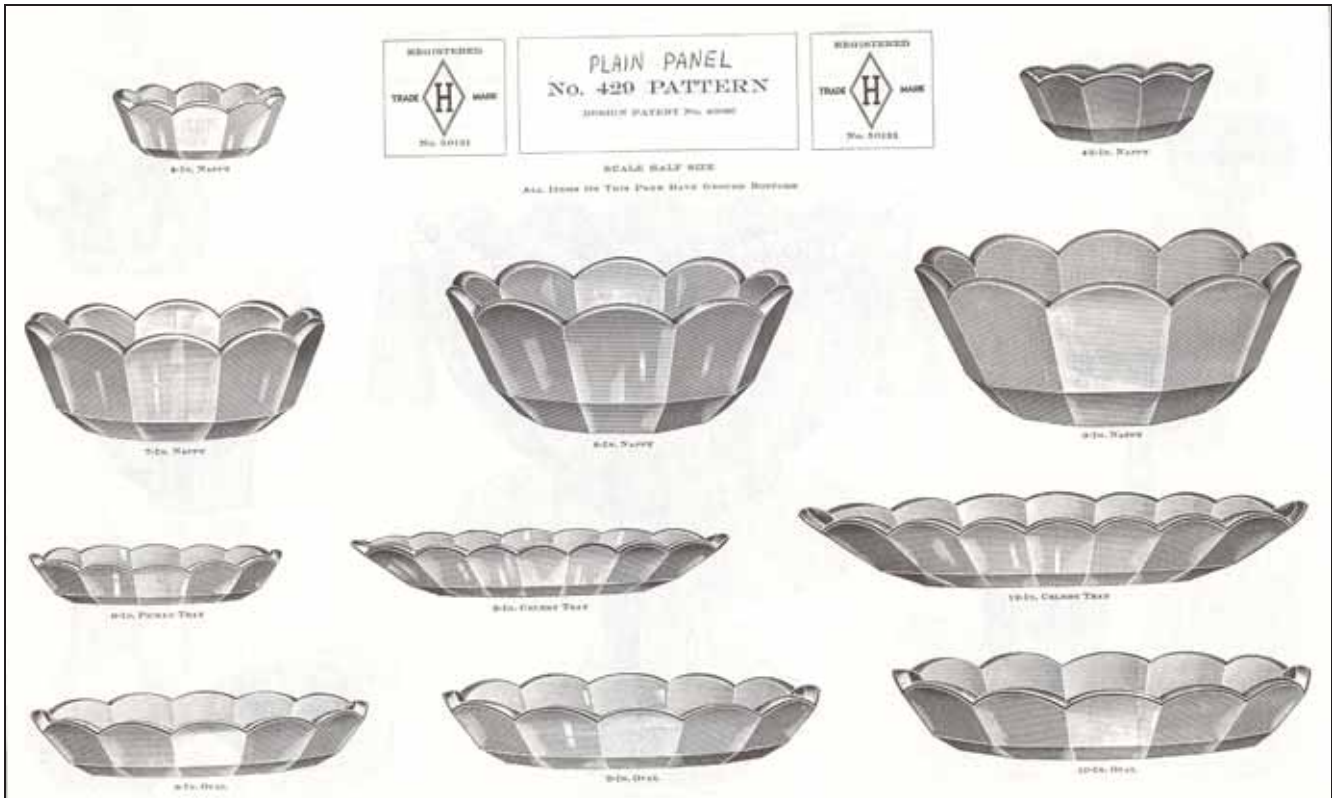
Among the interesting items in this pattern were the crushed fruit jars. They were offered in two sizes, one quart and two quart. A second set of crushed fruit Jars was offered in the same sizes, 1 and 2 quart, and they were given number 429 ½. From the price lists one can not tell the difference between the two types of jars. The 429 crushed fruits are in the same proportions as the 352 Flat Panel crushed fruits, but the 429 ½ versions are squat versions with the same designs. Heisey made two similar versions of the 602 crushed fruit.

The pattern offered 11 nappies and trays, 4 sizes of jugs, a tumbler and ice tea, four pieces of stemware, salt or pepper with four different tops, a footed individual salt, and punch cup (custard) and 3 punch bowls. There was no four piece table set, only a hotel cream and sugar with cover.

Plain Panel Recessed was unusual in that there were four design patents applied for and granted for this pattern. The first was applied for on March 10, 1910, and was granted on May 10, 1910, as Patent #40,686 for the hotel sugar. The cover was not included in the patent picture.

The second was Design Patent #43,437 for the crushed fruit Jar. The third was Design Patent #43,703 for the tumbler. The last was Design Patent #43,853 granted on April 15, 1913, for the oil bottle or cruet. The #28 salt shaker which has a design very similar to 429 Plain Panel Recessed was patented with Design Patent #43,781. It was never included in pattern 429, however. In the salt or pepper lists in Heisey Catalog #75, it was included as just #28. (See Heisey News, October 2007 for an article on this interesting salt shaker.)

Heisey's pattern 429 Plain Panel Recessed is a typical colonial pattern with wide flat panels, sometimes with scallops around the top edge. This plainness may have helped in selecting a name for the pattern. The main identifying feature of the pattern is the sharply defined inward angle near the bottom as you approach the bottom of each panel. Where applicable, a Heisey star is in the bottom of the item. This pattern was made only in Crystal and is typically signed with the Diamond H. The Heisey Company did not name the pattern. It was named by Clarence Vogel, early Heisey researcher.

This is a pattern that is neglected by many collectors, but there are some interesting pieces in it. Maybe you can find a bargain when you are Heisey hunting with a piece of 429.

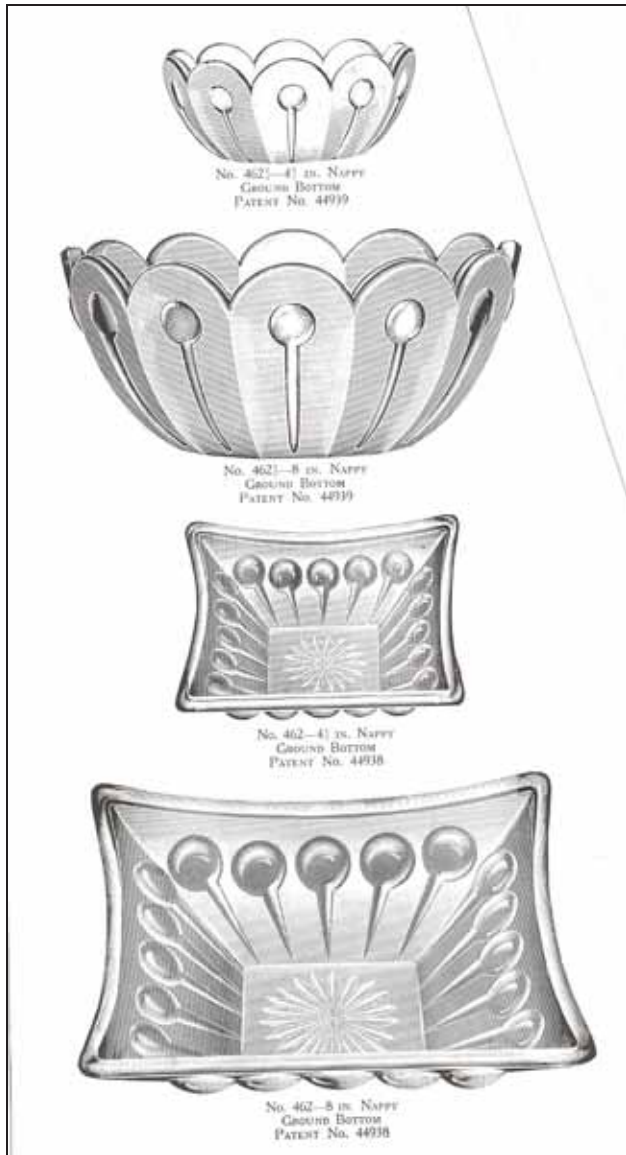

462 and 462 ½ Nail Nappies

The 462 Nail pattern was a very small line consisting of only four nappies, two round and two square. The pattern was not offered in any of the Heisey Price Lists that we know about. It was first pictured in Heisey Catalog #76, circa 1915. Catalog #76 is a small supplement to Heisey's big Catalog #75, circa 1913. Heisey filed for two design patents in this pattern, one for the square nappy and the second one for the round nappy. The two applications were filed on October 8, 1913, and both were granted on November 25, 1913. The square nappy is design

patent #44,938 and the round nappy is design patent #44,939. The square nappies were given pattern number 462, while the round nappies assigned number 462 ½. Both styles may be seen on display in the Museum.

Given the patent information, it is estimated that production of the Nail pattern started in 1914. Nail was not in Heisey Price List #179, circa 1-1-1917. So it is estimated that production ended in 1916. Thus, the pattern life was about 2-3 years.

The overall design is plain as there are no colonial features such as panels or scallops. The design elements around the body are raised areas that look like nails or ice cream cones. There is no other design except for the typical Heisey star in the bottom. They were made in crystal only, and are signed with the Diamond H. Clarence Vogel named the pattern Nail.

There are two vases that have the same nail design, but Heisey gave them different catalog numbers. They are also pictured in Heisey Catalog #76. The production life of the two vases was also for 2-3 years.

Heisey also used number 462 for the Plain Hexagon 8" basket. The basket body is 6-sided, and there are no nail designs. This basket was not part of the Nail pattern. Production of the basket started in 1916 and ended in 1932. It was made in crystal only and is signed with the Diamond H. It is unusual for Heisey to recycle a pattern number so quickly, but this may be the exception to the rule.

371 SCALLOPED TOP CURVED

371 Scalloped Top Curved Nappies

The 371 Scalloped Top Curved pattern is only a line of nappies and plates. There are a total of 32 nappies and 16 plates.

- 8 regular nappies, 4 to 10 in., star bottom
- 8 cupped nappies, 4 to 10 in., star bottom
- 8 regular nappies, 4 to 10 in., plain bottom
- 8 cupped nappies, 4 to 10 in., plain bottom

- 8 plates, 4 ½" to 11", star bottom
- 8 plates, 4 ½" to 11", plain bottom

One nappy and a plate form a set. A set could have star bottoms or plain bottoms or mixed. A set could have a regular nappy or a cupped nappy.

Pattern 371 appeared in two Heisey Price Lists; #142 (1908) and #155 (1910). The pattern ended in about 1912. Thus, the production life of the pattern was about 5 years.

The pattern was a plain design with scallops around the top edge. There were no vertical panel lines with each scallop giving a plain, continuous surface around the inside and outside of the nappy. It was made in crystal only, and is signed with the diamond H. The pattern was named by Clarence Vogel.

The number 371 was used again by Heisey for a syrup that was shown in Heisey's 1924 Catalog. This syrup was registered by Heisey under design patent #60,378 granted in February 1922. This syrup was not part of the 371 pattern, but exists on its own.

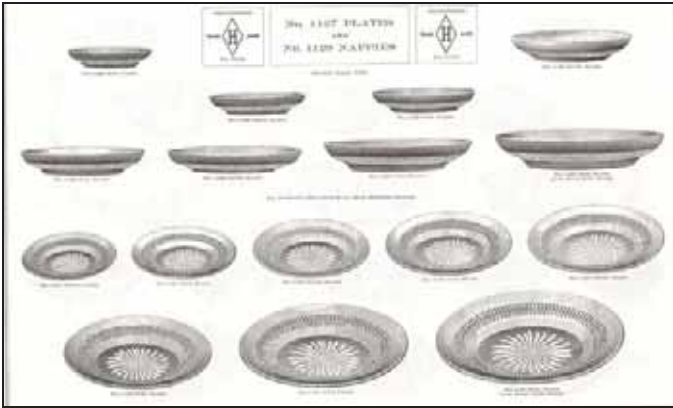
445, 1127, AND 1129 FINE TOOTH

445 Nappies

This is a group of patterns with only nappies and plates. The three patterns are identical in decorative design except Heisey gave them separate pattern numbers. They are now all known by the name Fine tooth. You will see the

similarity when you look at the pictures for each pattern. The patterns are composed of:

- 445 - 5 nappies, 4 to 9"., star bottom
- 445 - 5 nappies, Shallow, 4 ¾ to 10", star bottom
- 1127 - 9 plates, 4 ½ to 10", star bottom
- 1129 - 9 nappies, 4 to 9", star bottom

The sides of the 445 nappies curve out like a half grapefruit. The sides of the 1129 nappies curve in first for about ½ way up the height and then curve out to the top. One mold would be used to produce the nappies and plates with the plates being slightly larger in diameter. The factory would have used a metal former to achieve the desired curve on the sides of the bowls. All the pieces have star and ground bottoms. They were made in crystal only, and are signed with the Diamond H. One nappy and a plate form a set. A set could have a regular nappy or a cupped nappy.

The three patterns appeared in only one Heisey Price List; #175 (1913) and in only one Heisey Catalog #75 (1913). The pattern ended in about 1915. Thus, the life of the patterns was about 4 years.

The pattern was a plain design with what looks like a cut horizontal line with finger flutes cut across this line. Of course, this is a molded pattern and no cutting was done to achieve the effect. There were no vertical panel lines or scallops giving a plain, continuous surface from the circumference of the bottom diameter to the

top or outer edge for the fine tooth band. The Heisey Price List makes reference to the pattern with sawtooth bands. Vogel named the patterns Fine Tooth.
