406, 407, AND 408 COARSE RIB

Two new patterns were introduced by A. H. Heisey and Company at the Glass Exhibition held in Pittsburgh, Pa in January 1923. One of the new lines was pattern 407 Coarse Rib (pattern numbers 406 and 408 were used to differentiate certain pieces that were made in different ways, e.g. two different styles of hotel sugars and cream sets or two different styles of tumblers). The factory only referenced the pattern number. The name Coarse Rib was designated later by Vogel, an early Heisey glass researcher. As described in the January 22, 1923 and again in the January 14, 1924 issues of China, Glass & Lamps, a complete line of tableware was offered in this new pattern. Thus, production of the Coarse Rib pattern started in 1922.

Applications for three design patents for 407 were filed by A. H. Heisey and Company in March 1923. Patent #66,630 for a plate was granted on February 17, 1925, patent #66,853 for the round sided nappy was granted on March 24, 1925 and patent #72,064 for the high footed jelly or compote was granted on February 22, 1927.

The predominant feature of the Coarse Rib design is the rib effect. Each rib has a convex or outward rounded surface, producing a surface design which could best be described as logs placed side by side. The ribs are smaller and not as bold or thick as those found in the 1503 Crystolite pattern which would be produced later by the company. Most of the items in the pattern have ground bottoms. The rib design carries through to the top edge on just about all the items except those which have a plain band around the top edge. There are two distinct features which differentiate and identify the 406 pieces from the 407 pieces. The 406 pieces have a plain band around the top edge while the same pieces in 407 do not have the band. The

nappies in 406 have straight sides while the two nappies in 407 have rounded sides. The only item in the 408 pattern is a half gallon jug which is identical to the 407 half gallon jug except that an ice lip has been hand tooled into the pouring spout.

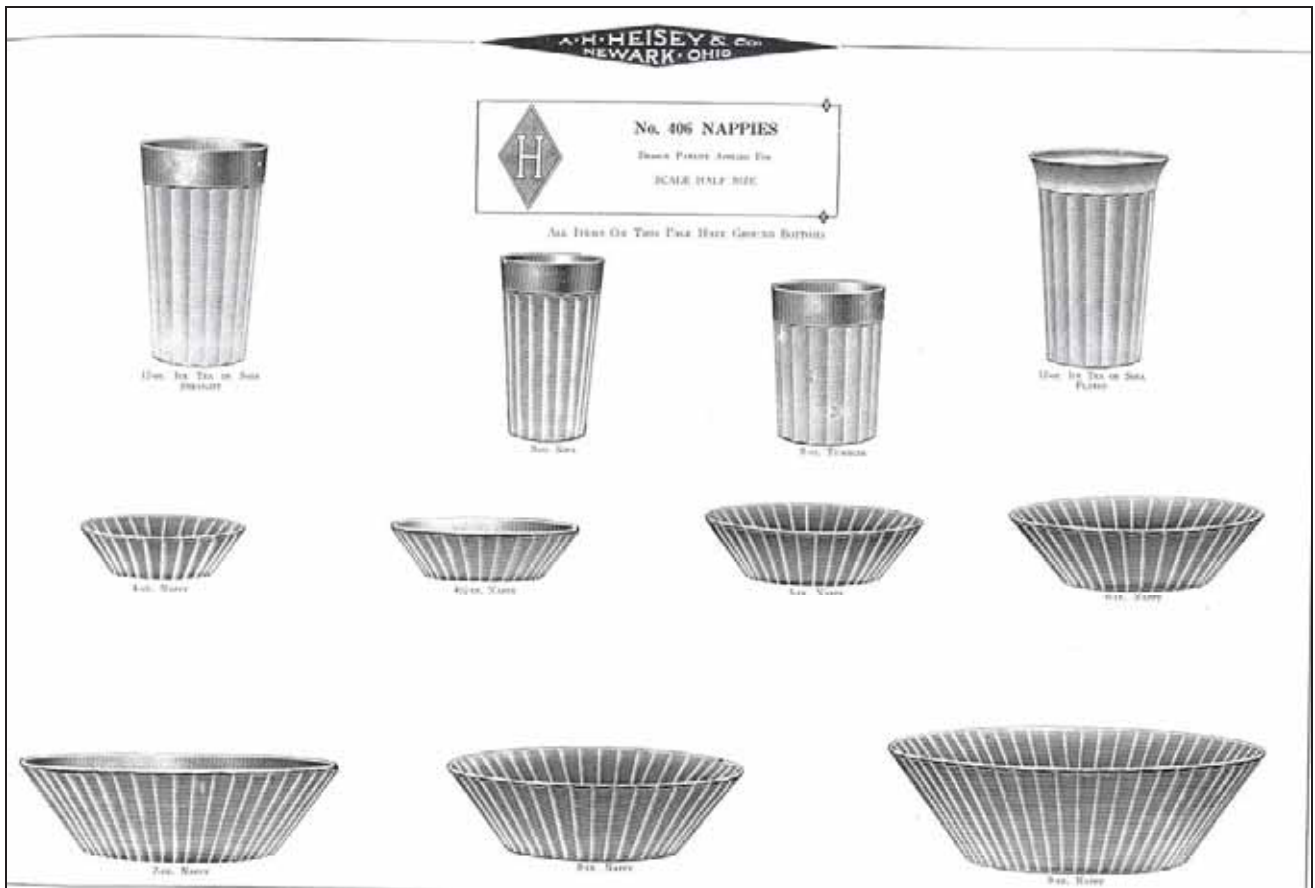
There were a total of 60 items in the Coarse Rib pattern. Most are shown in Vogel II, pages 87 to 90. There were 13 items in 406, 46 items in 407, and one in 408. There are only three items for the stemware collector. No toothpick was made (they had gone out of fashion by the time this pattern was produced), but there is an oil bottle or cruet.

Coarse Rib was made in crystal, and there are some pieces that were made in Flamingo, Moongleam, and Hawthorne. More pieces seemed to be made in Moongleam than in the other colors including plates, 406 nappies, 406 hotel cream and sugar, pickles/celeries, lemon dish, footed jellies, and ice tub. Of the pieces made in Moongleam, I have never seen the lemon dish or the high footed jelly in Flamingo. The only pieces I know to be made in Hawthorne were 406 hotel cream and sugar, plates, and the low footed jelly. The pickle, two celeries, and the mustard exist in a marigold stain over crystal. At least one of the jugs has been seen with the same marigold stain and the addition of silver overlay around the top.

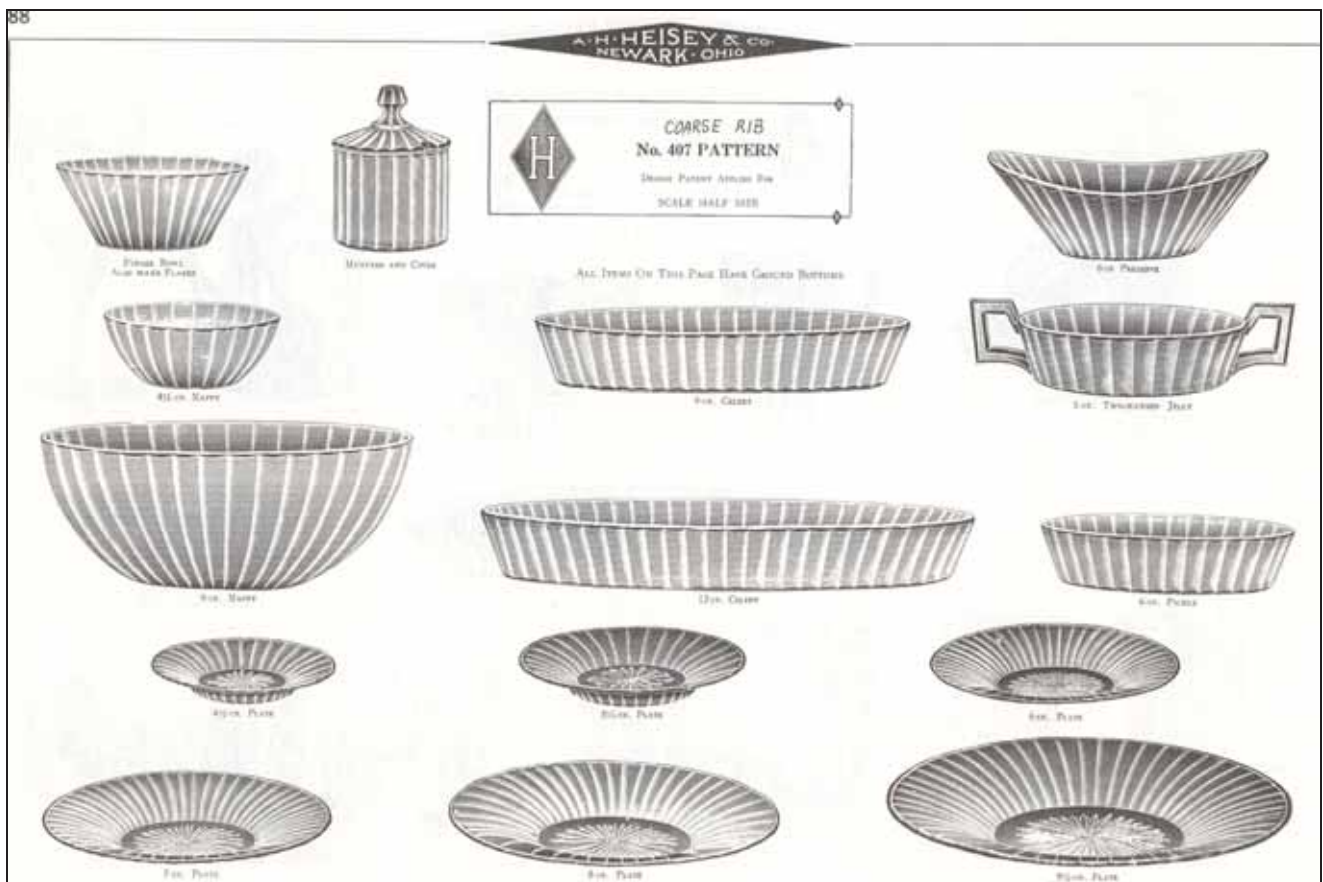
The Museum does have a low footed cake salver that was probably made from the low footed bowl mold.

The Coarse Rib pattern did not appear in Heisey Catalog 212, circa 1937 or price lists after that date. Thus, production ended in about 1936, giving the pattern a life of about 15 years.

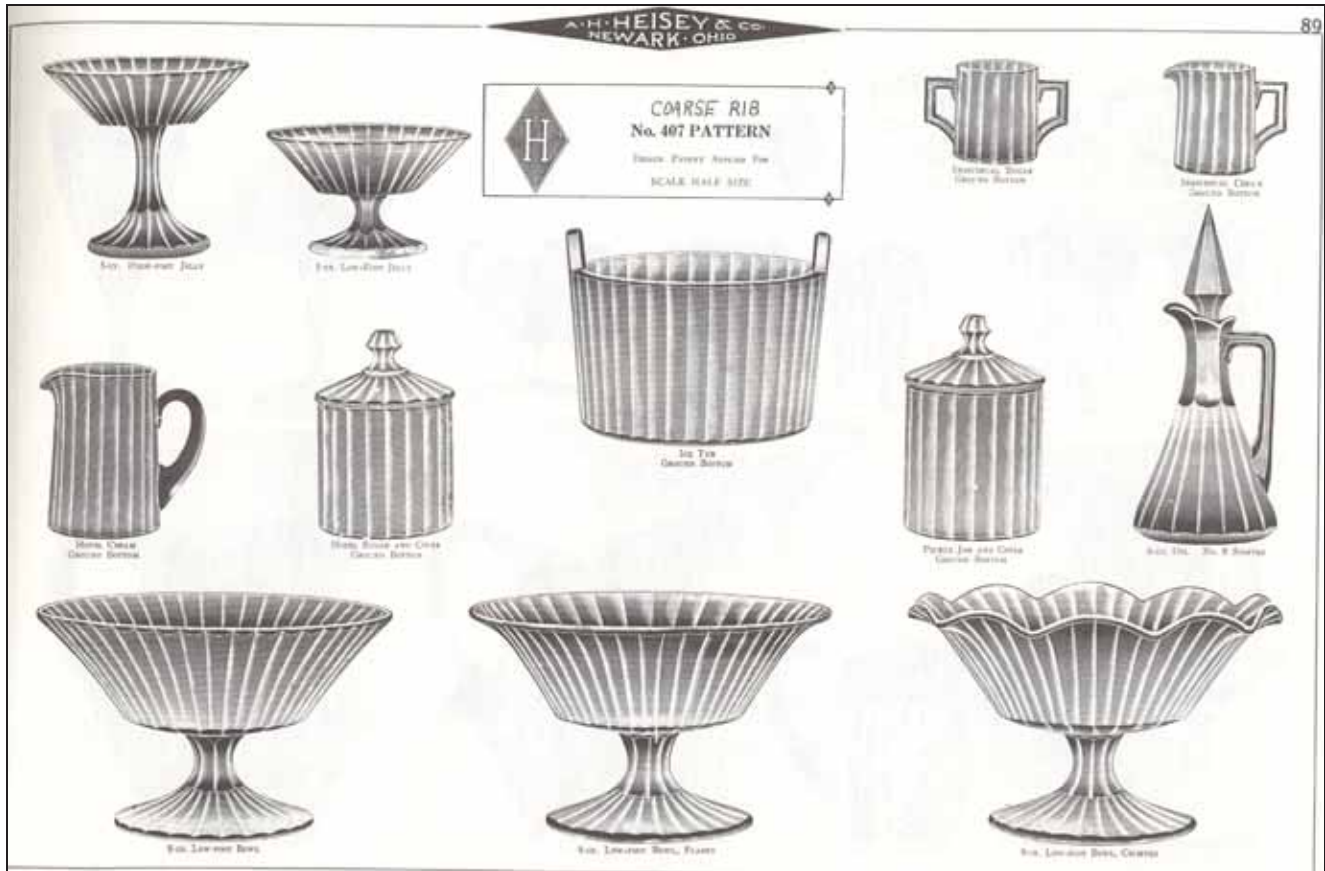
Coarse Rib is a very interesting pattern with some very unusual pieces. Given its long life span, I would expect to be able to find a lot more of it available today. But many of these pieces are extremely elusive and are hard to acquire. Be on the lookout for this pattern when you are out shopping for Heisey.



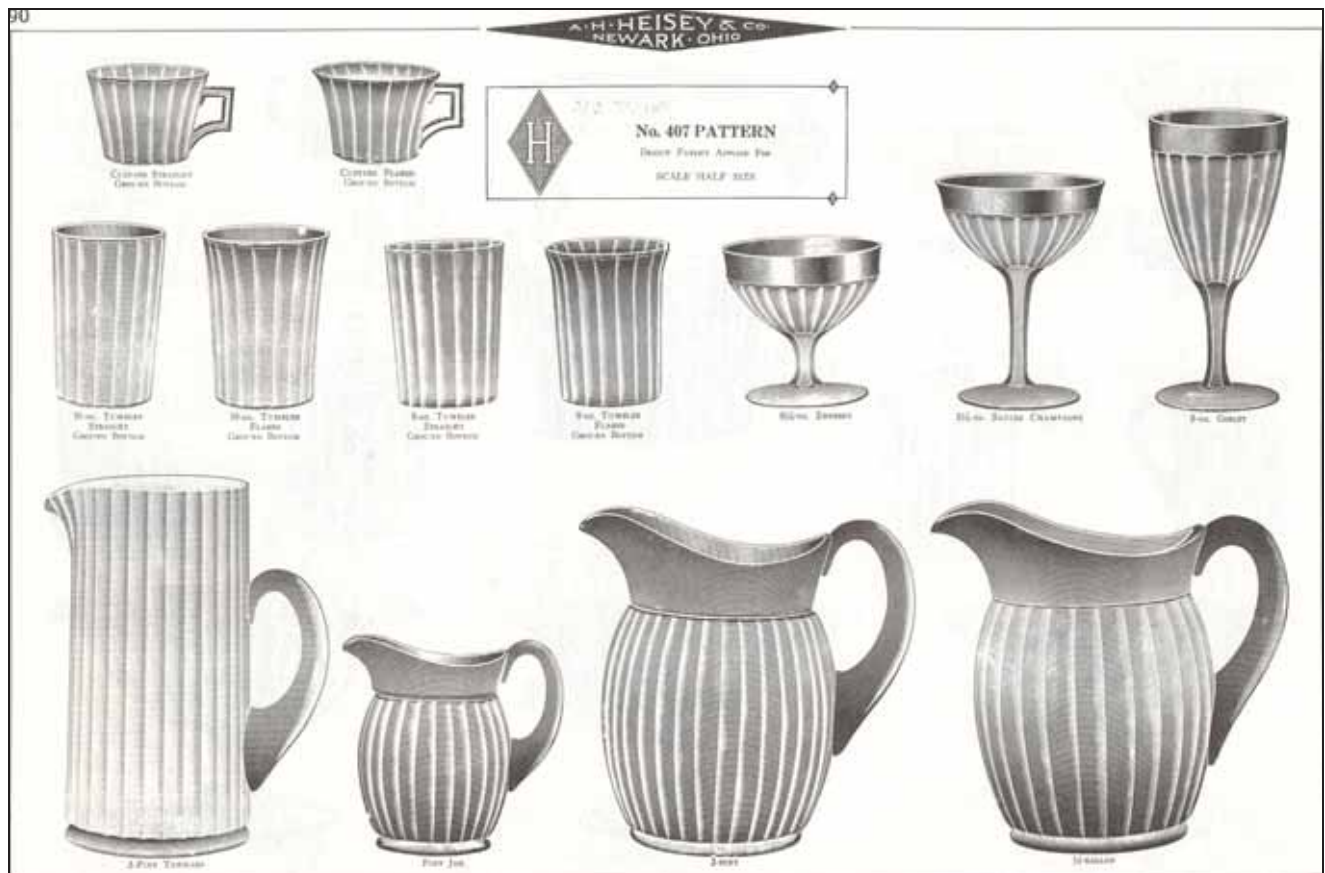

TABLE TALK – MARCH 1927

"Table Talk" was a magazine that Heisey first started to publish in 1926 that allowed the company to communicate with its customers, telling about the latest developments of the company. We have many originals of these magazines in our Archives

This issue focused on Heisey's business in the Southeast part of the U.S. There are stories about the Battery Park Hotel in Ashville, NC; Charles C. Cullen & Company, Knoxville, TN; and J.M. Other stories included the Granville Inn, Granville, OH; a look at the year ahead with regard to glass sales; and the availability of the company brochure "Gifts of Glassware." ♦

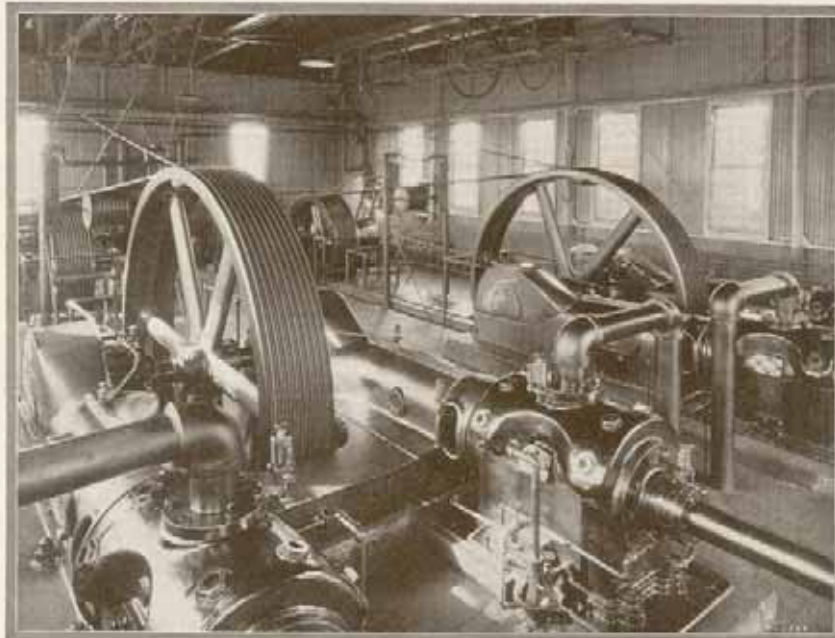

2010 BENEFIT AUCTION PREVIEW

Walter Ludwig

Have you looked at the 2010 Benefit Auction Catalog (available at www.HeiseyMuseum.org)? I have and I can truly say that this is an auction that has something for everyone in it. There are some great pieces from old patterns, great pieces of color, items for the specialty collector, some truly rare items, plus a whole lot of beautiful glass.

The auction starts out with 51 lots of 1469 Ridgeleigh (Lots 2-52) that should have something to please any collector of that pattern. There are many pieces of 1503 Crystolite, 515 Heisey Rose, and 507 Orchid scattered throughout the auction for those that collect those patterns.

If it is the old patterns that turn you on, then the selection of 1280 Winged Scroll items this year is well worth your trip here to the auction. Besides the extremely elusive Custard ring tree (548), there is a great selection of items from the smoking sets. One lot includes both the tobacco jar with lid and the cigar holder in Custard (738), while another lot includes an ash holder and a match holder in Custard (740). The cigar holder and cigarette holder in Emerald are together in Lot 739. There is an Opal match holder (741) and an Emerald ash holder (742). Other items in the dresser set in Emerald include a 13" tray (568), cologne (569), 5" pin tray (570), and puff box with cover (571). An Emerald tankard will be found in lot 731. There is even a crystal lot, a pair of No. 1 salt and peppers (748).

Other pieces in old patterns include a rarely seen 11" plate in 365 Queen Ann (76), 1776 Kalonyal 4 ounce oil (178), and a 305 Puntty and Diamond Point mucilage (322). There is a lovely 1225 Plain Band child's set with ruby stain, souvenir "Colorado Springs" (374). Another souvenir piece is the 8047 Cane and

Bar creamer "Clay Center Kans" (455). No documentation of this pattern has ever turned up – but it is hard to argue with a piece that has the Diamond H mark.

There are a few interesting punch bowls this year including a 1235 Beaded Panel Sunburst one with 24 cups (1003), as well as a 343 Sunburst one with 12 cups and ladle (68). There is an 1183 Revere shrub punch bowl with elaborate cutting (87). This one is rarely seen and not well documented in the books on Heisey. It is a one piece small bowl with foot that when found almost always has an interesting cutting on it.

The candlestick collector has his choice of rare sets and individual candlesticks and candelabra. The first ones that caught my eye was a pair of 1483 Stanhopes with 881 Kashmir cutting (190). There is a pair of 1570 Lotus Leaf candleblocks (282) and a pair of 111 Cherubs with frosted finish (383). It is unusual to have an example of a 104 Bertha candlestick in any sale, but this sale has two. There is a crystal one with 754 Seville cutting (651) and a Moongleam one (650). There is a pair of crystal (380) and a single Sahara (379) 300-1 12" 1-light Old Williamsburg candelabrum. The single 5 Patrician four-light candelabrum is a stunner (381). In the super rare category are a pair of 1540 Lariat blackout lamps with original Heisey globes (566).

If vases are your thing, we have a really nice assortment in this auction. There is a 1420 Tulip in Sahara (193), a 1511 Toujours footed 5 1/2" (200), and a 4202 Bamboo in Moongleam (370). In Zircon we have a 4085 6" ball vase (536) as well as two 1485 Saturn 8" vases, one straight (854) and one flared (853). We also offer the larger size 4220 Janice vase, 7", in Alexandrite (865). There is a great selection of favor vases in this auction with some in the rarer colors: 4230 Flamingo (866), 4229 Flamingo (581), and 4232 Tangerine (583), 4227 Cobalt (579), and 4231 Sahara (582). Another great

vase is the 444 12" (852) which is a colonial vase that stands on three arches.

Among the rarer items in some of the standard patterns are 1540 Lariat round egg plate (218), 1404 Old Sandwich cigarette holder (222), 1506 Whirlpool mustard (537), and a 1503 Crystolite pressed goblet (885). In 507 Orchid etch there is a 3304 Universal cocktail icer with liner (523), a 4037 Clarence oval sherry with sterling top (787), and a 1187 Yeoman Epergne candleholder with 4233 vase (857).

Some of the other unusual items in color are a 4080 finger bowl with saturn optic in Zircon (540), 1184 Yeoman bouillon in Vaseline (732), 473 Narrow Flute with Rim French dressing underplate in Vaseline (733), 300 Peerless 12 oz. schoepfen in Flamingo (848), 3381 Creole finger bowl in Alexandrite (871), 337 Touraine sherbet in Amberina (886), and 341 Old Williamsburg goblet in Dawn (884). There are also several lots of 1425 Victorian in the hard to find Sahara color: goblet (820), claret (821), two oyster cocktails (822), and cream and sugar set (737).

There are a few really good pieces with deep plate etches including a 4002 Aqua Caliente with 465 Golf Scene (198) and four 1184 Yeoman flat ice teas with 467 Tally Ho, 460 Club Drinking, 462 Fox Chase, and 459 Fisherman etches (lots 723-726).

The animal collector is hardly ignored with many good animals and animal related items. Among the more interesting are a 1550 Fish bowl (1083), a 1601 Sleeping Fox ashtray (208), a full set of elephants (lots 624-626), and a 14 Kingfisher floral block in Hawthorne (867). The most unusual animal lot is the 2 Medium Elephant in a dark amber color (1084). There are also several lots of figural stems including two 5058 Goose stem sherries (215) and a wine (216), as well as a 5065 Colt Stem cocktail (199).

If advertising is your specialty there are original Heisey display signs, both the mirror sign (574) and the 50 Cabochon (584). We also offer a

large framed ad from the late 1920s featuring Flamingo, Moongleam, and Hawthorne.

We do have a few really unusual lots this year. There are three lots of shoe holders that were made using the candlecups of Aristocrat candelabrum (576-578). There are two tools that were used at the Heisey factory (lots 500A and 800A). There is also a lot with four Sahara plates that are in a pattern that has never been identified (743) similar to the 1406 Fleur de Lis plates only having a different edge treatment.

Besides all of this we have baskets, candy jars (all sizes of the 465 Recessed Panel except the ¼ lb), cruets, stemware, etc. This is a truly great auction that you do not want to miss out on. I look forward to seeing you here in Newark for the event.

One correction to the auction list has been found: in lot 336 the pattern number should be 1511 instead of 511. ♦

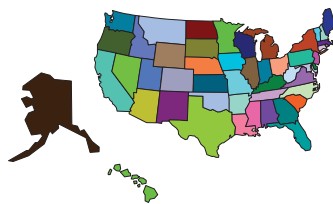

This event has been a success for consignors and those purchasing the wonderful Heisey glass. Plan on attending and participating in this auction for the benefit of your Museum.

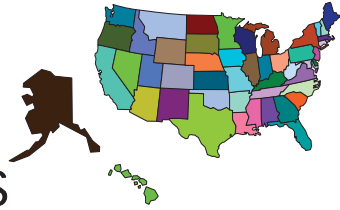

Our program was Heisey vases with pattern numbers higher than 4000. Many of them are not marked so you would have to know what you were looking for.



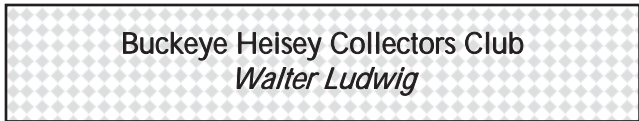
