



March Update on Door Panels

The panels for the new front doors are progressing nicely. So far, many glass pieces have been sorted for all four panels, but there is a need for about fifty per cent more glass for the completion of all the panels. The first upper panel has the most pieces already in place as well as the outer zinc framework. What I need most right now are stemware bases. Flamingo, Moongleam and Sahara colors are in use. Some Dawn would be nice. I want to include as many etchings as possible also. So far I have Pied Piper, Leaf, etch #447, and the promise of Orchid and Heisey Rose. So far there are no Greek Key parts in the mix.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 2016 SPRING AUCTION

We have finished cataloging the items for the 2016 Spring HCA Auction. We are getting better at it – it only took four full days this year. We ended up with 1,309 lots of glass representing the full range of production of the Heisey Glass Company from their beginnings until the doors closed in 1957. There is something for everyone in this auction from the standard production to true rarities that you seldom are given a chance to buy.



This is the auction to come to if you would like to start a collection, find the ideal wedding gift, or if you are a long time collector needing to add a special piece to your collection. The auction abounds in those old standbys of 1469 Ridgeleigh, 1503 and 5003 Crystolite, 1540 and 5004 Lariat, 1567 and 5067 Plantation, 507 Orchid etch, and 515 Heisey Rose etch. This is an auction rich in candlesticks and baskets, but also this year we have an outstanding number of water bottles and punch bowls.

The animal collector will not be disappointed with the wide array of offerings including an Amber Flying Mare (Lot 843) which does have damage but they just do not come around that often. Also to be considered Swan (846), Filly head back and forward (879 and 880), Mother Rabbit (1117), and Wood Duck (1118). There are two 1540 Plug Horses in Amber (359 and 1120).

Among the old patterns there are some nice pieces of 1776 Kalonyal – two toothpicks (105 and 719) and 8" high footed compote (696), 365 Queen Anne – punch bowl and base (299) and 9" shallow compote (640), and 325 Pillows – a ½ gallon jug (324). One of the nicest pieces of Emerald I have seen in a while is a 1266 Pineapple and Fan 8" oval berry (395). There is a great selection of Custard 1280 Winged Scroll in lots 676 - 680 including puff box, 6" vase, pin tray, 8" tray, and cruet.





Nice colonial lots include a 341 Puritan 5 pound candy (981), two 351 Priscilla pilsners in Cobalt (972 and 1155), a 339 Continental low footed 7" compote with lid (694), and a complete 473 Narrow Flute with Rim griddle set (975). The barware collector will also like the 412 Tudor mug (552), a 4054 Coronation ice bucket (757), and a 2323 Navy bar with double sham and Cobalt base (88). Other nice lots of Cobalt include a 4044 New Era luncheon plate (973), 1420 Tulip vase (307), and many lots of Spanish stemware including two cordials (966 and 967).


There is a great selection of rare color items including in Flamingo a 4034 Seven Circle cologne with Duck stopper (720) and a 3379 Pyramid champagne (979). An Amber 1519 Waverly oval compote (1182) and a 1401 Empress 8" round plate in Alexandrite with a fantastic cutting (512) would both make nice additions to any collection. We have two favor vases in this auction: a Sahara 4227 (360) and a Moongleam 4330 (361). There is a 1488 Kohinoor two light candlestick in Zircon (1121) as well as a 6060 Country Club 18 ounce soda in Limelight with screen optic (1125). In Vaseline we have a 160 Locket on Chain butter bottom (332), a 1186 Yeoman 9" oyster plate (829), as well as a 411 Tudor jelly in a distinctive Moongleam/Vaseline color (4). The great rarity in this auction is a 134 Trident two light candlestick in Trial Blue (1274).





Other interesting individual items include a 10 Carter inkwell (961), a 1186 Yeoman puff box with a flat cover (31), 1184 Yeoman two handled footed, covered candy (653), a 1540 Lariat oval egg plate (372), and a pair of 1503 Crystolite hurricane lamps with 300 shades with 917 Sarasota cut (881).

Space limitations prevent me from going on, but as you can see there is plenty for offer in the auction. I hope you will be able to join me and all of your Heisey friends for this great event. I look forward to seeing you.



Plain Beer Mugs

EARLY BEER MUGS

In about 1898, the Heisey Company came out with two sets of beer mugs. The first set of four mugs was given numbers 600 to 603. The mugs were called Plain. The name Plain relates to the simpleness of the pattern. The second set of four mugs was given the numbers 607 to 610. These mugs were called St. Louis. Why St. Louis? I do not know. What about numbers 604 to 606? I do not know why they were not used. The St. Louis mugs are similar to the Plain mugs except for the eight flutes around the bottom third of the mug. The names Plain and St. Louis were used when the mugs were shown in the various company price lists.

The mug sizes for the 600 to 603 set were 6, 8, 10, and 12 ounces. The mug sizes for the 607 to 610 set were 5, 8, 10, and 12 ounces. Only the small size differs with 600 having 6 ounces and 607 having 5.

A fifth mug was added to the St. Louis set. It had a size of 16 ounces and was given number 615. Did the beer drinkers complain that a 12 oz. mug was too small? The 615 mug was listed as Squat. I am not sure why this word was added. The pictures show its height about the same as the 12 oz. mug. If the

heights were the same, then the diameter of the 615 is larger to get a larger volume. Perhaps this gives a squat appearance.

St. Louis Beer Mugs

In about 1902, a sham was added to the 16 oz. 615 mug. This reduced its volume to 12 oz. So, 615 was offered as normal or with sham. A copy of Price List #142 (circa 1908) accompanies this article.

production of the mugs was for about 12 years. The mugs started before the Diamond H, so the early ones are unmarked. Later ones

may be marked. Does anyone have one or more of these mugs? Are they marked?

(Editor's Note: The name St. Louis could very well be a generic name used throughout the glass industry for this type of beer mug. The Museum has in its collection three of these mugs and they are all marked with a large Diamond H. They can be seen in Room 2 of the King House. We have 601 and 602 Plain as well as 610 St. Louis. Take a look again at the pictures of the 600 to 603 Plain mugs. Note that the handle on the 602 is distinctly different from the others. On the 602 there is a flat thumb rest at the top of the handle while the other three all come to a slight point in that position. All of the original St. Louis style mugs also have this point at the top of the handle. In the picture of the 615 the point is less prominent.) ◆

2016 Percy & Vivian Moore Weekend



September 30 - October 2, 2016 Grapevine, Texas





The Texas Hill Country begins north of Austin, continues south to San Antonio and to the west 200 miles. Cities include San Antonio, Bandera, Kerrville, Luckenbach, Fredericksburg, Austin and New Braunfels. A hill country trip is as much about the scenic drive as it is about these wonderful towns. The area is also home to more than 30 wineries. Please see our website www.heiseycollectorsoftexas.org for links to more information about the Texas hill country.

San Antonio is a five-hour drive from Dallas Texas, so this is not a one-day trip. The second largest city in Texas with 1.4 million people, San Antonio is also the top tourist attraction in Texas. Attractions include The Alamo, Riverwalk, Historic Spanish Missions, El Mercado and King William Historic District.





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Kerrville Texas is the first leg of the hill country journey. The city is best known for its beautiful parks that line the Guadalupe River, which runs directly through the town. Another major attraction there is the James Avery factory and visitor center.

Luckenback Texas hosts a musical festival each weekend and was the location Willie Nelson's Fourth of July picnic from 1995 through 1999. Listed as one of the top 25 unusual treasures of Texas, Luckenback is located a few miles east of Fredericksburg.





Fredericksburg is a popular tourist destination that offers a number of attractions. The National Museum of the Pacific War, Admiral Nimitz Foundation, Enchanted Rock State Natural Area, LBJ Ranch and three local churches and cathedrals, St. Mary's Catholic Church, San Fernando Cathedral and the Presbyterian Church. Fredericksburg is on the western edge of an area of Texas known for its German ancestry and their churches. The Painted Churches of Texas is a tour of 15 churches on the National Register of Historic places that starts in Fredericksburg and ends in the Schulenburg-Round Top area. The first week of October 2016 will be the Fredericksburg Oktoberfest and the second week will be the Texas Mesquite Arts Festival.

Austin is located about 3.5 hours south of Dallas, and is known for its restaurants and live music scene. September 30th of this year will be the start of a week long Austin City Limits Musical Festival. Austin is also home to the University of Texas, LBJ Presidential Library and the Congress Avenue Bridge Bat Colony. Nightly from March to November up to 1.5 million bats emerge from under the bridge to feed.



HCA's 2015 Financial Results

A profit and loss statement for HCA's 2015 operational results is presented here for your enjoyment. It is not too often that anyone can say that a financial statement is for you enjoyment, but in this case, WE CAN! We had a year where every major operational program delivered better than budgeted financial results. In addition to this, we had the following non-operational donations:

* Acquisition Fund \$100 * Capital Fund \$7,780 * Endowment Fund \$38,255

I am also pleased to report that our balance sheet ended the year in strong shape. As of December 31st, we had an operating cash balance of \$55,024 and a zero balance owed on our line of credit.

No one word can explain all the reason for all of these results, but there is one that can explain the biggest driver of our success; BEADS! As 2015 progressed, the bead program moved into the stages of the rarer colors which sold well at higher prices and higher margins. The sale of donated real Heisey out of the gift shop generated over \$13,000 of sales. All of this revenue goes straight to the bottom line. Both the Benefit and Select Auctions produced terrific results thanks to your consignments, donations and of course, your bidding. Kudos to the NorthWest Heisey Study Club for not only a great Percy & Vivian Moore Weekend to participate in, it was a tremendous financial success. And what a superb Convention we had this past June. The Convention Committee found new ways to generate income and at the same time kept expenses under control.

Our hard working crew at the Museum made significant contributions to our financial success. All the bead and real Heisey sales require a lot of work, but the group worked smartly to provide the coverage in the Gift Shop without going overboard in hours. Also during 2015, credit card sales were converted to using a "chipped" card reader, which helps to protect our business. Other cost saving projects completed or initiated include replacing our aged printer with a less costly model that actually delivers greater functionality, replacing our postage machine and analyzing our credit card activity to see if we could save expenses with a vendor switch.

The Benefit Auction coming up in April will be our first big event of 2016. The glass is already in so, now we need everyone to send in an absentee bid or, even better, attend in person. I recommend that you start each session with a slice of pie so that you have plenty of energy to raise your paddle.

Our 43rd Annual Spring Benefit Auction will be held **April 15 & 16, 2016** at last year's location, the GMP Local #244 Union Hall at 350 Hudson Ave. in Newark, Ohio. We finished cataloging the glass after the last month's newsletter deadline and have 1309 lots from 57 consigners. Craig Connelly and his crew will again call our auction and hopefully the "Pie Man" will be there too!

We have received some wonderful glass for the auction. Walter Ludwig's article elsewhere in this newsletter will give you a full preview of our auction glass and he always mentions some of our more interesting lots. You can now visit the museum and see some of the best pieces in the auction on display in the case just inside the Museum entrance and also in a case near the library.

The auction catalog, preview hours, auction hours, absentee bid instructions, absentee bid form, bidding information, and most importantly the list of sale items will be on our website- www.HeiseyMuseum.org/, on or about March 5th and hopefully sooner. This will give you a full month of looking and evaluating items and preparing for this great auction! Names, addresses, and telephone numbers of area hotels/motels is being published in this newsletter to assist you in making reservations. You will want to arrive in time to attend the one and one half hour preview on Friday April 15, 2016, 10:30 AM to 12:00 PM with the auction beginning at 12:00 PM. On Saturday April 16, 2016, the doors will open at 8:30 AM, the annual membership meeting will be held at 9:00 AM with the auction beginning at 9:30 AM.

We have again not having a full mailing of the auction catalog. We will mail copies on or about March 5th (sooner if possible) to members who consigned glass, purchased glass, or put in absentee bids in 2014 and/or 2015. We will also provide a copy to any member who wishes one- you need to call the museum after March 12th to get your copy. If you were a consignor, buyer, or absentee bidder wait a few days before you call- give time for your copy to arrive in the mail.

As you know, the Spring Benefit Auction is HCA's largest annual fundraiser and all funds received after expenses go 100% to support the Museum. If you can't make it to Newark for the auction this year I encourage you to look on line at the list of great glass and put in an absentee bid. This is a way for **every member** to support your association. Forms and instructions are available on the website as well.

Absentee bidders listen up!! We have included the absentee bid instructions and the bid form in this newsletter for you to look over and use including shipping information. Please note they need to be submitted by Saturday, April 9, 2016, by 4:00 PM EST. We are continuing a successful change in that we are having absentee bidders make their own arrangements to have their glass shipped. The absentee glass will be available for pickup at the Museum on Tuesday, April 19, 2016, after 10:00AM. Absentee bidders will have to pay their shippers directly. We will cooperate with your shipper and assist where we can. HCA simply does not have the volunteers, materials on hand, and staffing capability to do this task. We have listed these shippers in the past and have heard no complaints however HCA does not endorse them nor is HCA responsible for their performance.

As you read this newsletter I will be looking for help at the auction- for "Vannas" to hold up the glass, for folks to help move glass during the auction, and to help clean up after the auction. If you would like to help, please contact me. It is a great way to learn about the glass and meet some great volunteers.

2016 Heisey Spring Benefit Auction Absentee Bid Instructions

As absentee bidders, we will bid competitively for you at the HCA Spring Benefit Auction, April 15-16, 2016. In case of duplicate bids, the earliest postmark wins. Bids must reflect the listing in the catalog as to lot number, pattern, description, and condition. Please use the absentee bid form on page 31 of this catalog. The minimum absentee bid per lot is \$15.

You set the maximum amount you are willing to pay on each lot. If successful, the remainder will be refunded. Please use good judgment in arriving at your maximum bid figure. Remember, there are minimum limits to raises that the auctioneer will accept (smaller items \$2.50, larger items \$5, \$10 or as much as \$25). Lots containing multiple items will be as one lot to the successful bidder. Normally, these are not split up, however, there may be some exceptions to this.

Please indicate on your bid the desired condition of the item on which you are bidding. We have endeavored to describe all items to the best of our ability and a bid on an item reflects your acceptance of the condition as listed. (As you know, if no flaws are noted, that means the glass is in generally good condition.) If you mark your bid "near mint only," we will use no discretion in your bid. If there is a variance on a lot not called in the catalog (such as unlisted damage or a difference in the number of items in a lot), we will not bid on that lot for you. Please use the form (or a copy) available in the *Heisey News*, or from this catalog, or from our website www.HeiseyMuseum.org to submit your bid. Absentee bids can be submitted by e-mail, fax, or postal service.

PAYMENT Cash, check, cashier's check, or money order payable to HCA Auction, and Visa/MasterCard/DiscoverCard accepted. A 5% buyer's premium will be added. Buyer's premium is deleted for cash, cashier's check, money order, or approved check payments. You may send a separate check for each lot or you may send one check covering the maximum amount of all bids. Absentee Bidders must make their own shipping arrangements. See Shipping section below for further information.

In addition, if you would like to pay by check, **Please** consider leaving the amount blank. Designate in the memo blank of your check an amount not to exceed the total amount of your bids. The Auction Manager or HCA Treasurer will fill in the exact amount of your purchase, thus greatly cutting back on refunds. Surplus bid money will be refunded. Send in a self-addressed, stamped envelope to return your checks. HCA reserves the right to reject any bid.

SHIPPING Buyers must make their own shipping arrangements including payments for shipping directly to the shipper. Glass is available to be picked up by your shipper on Tuesday, April 19, 2016, after 10:00 AM at the National Heisey Glass Museum, 169 W. Church St., Newark, OH 43055. HCA is aware of the following area shippers: Express Pack and Ship: 740-366-1325, Pakmail: 740-522-2564, and UPS Store 3910: 614-939-5195. HCA is not responsible for any services provided by these venders. HCA will work with these venders to make sure your glass is available.

BID SUBMISSION Absentee bids must be **received no later than Saturday, April 9, 2016, at 4:00 p.m. Eastern Standard Time.** When using a credit card number, bids must be faxed to 740-345-9638 using the absentee bidding form. 



Carvings By and On Heisey

Heisey first produced glassware decorated with carvings in 1934, with some production continuing until 1944. Many of the Heisey carvings had Art Deco style designs and were very popular. Based on its availability today and long production period (1934-1944), the no. 5003 Nimrod carving (photo, p. 5) was Heisey's most popular decoration of this type.

Carvings have an appearance similar to that of etchings but were produced in an entirely different way: by sandblasting instead of acid etching. The process began with coating the glass with a rubbery material, called a "maskant." The maskant is resistant to the sandblast and protects the glass from abrasion. With the use of a stencil, the area to be carved was cut into the maskant and peeled away, exposing the glass surface to be carved. The carving operation was done in a sandblast chamber, using high air pressure. The impact of the sand carves the exposed surface, giving the glass the appearance of having been etched. When the carving operation was complete, the remaining maskant was removed, revealing the clear, unaffected area. A wide variety of complex patterns can be produced by controlling the depth of the carving.

Heisey produced a total of nineteen known carvings. They are often found on barware such as soda or

highball glasses, shot glasses, bitters bottles, and bar bottles and decanters. They are also found on serving pieces such as the no. 500 Octagon variety tray, and the no. 1466 Star relish and several vases. Multiple items in the no. 4044 New Era line were offered with the no. 5010 Vanity Fair carving.

Carvings were not exclusive to Heisey. Other companies, including Fostoria, Duncan Miller, and Tiffin, produced carvings. Some decorating artists also worked with sand carvings. Two notable glass artists who used Heisey blanks for carvings were Dorothy Thorpe and Frank Oda. The technique of sand carving glass is still used by glass artists today.

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
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
