Words From Your Curator – Director

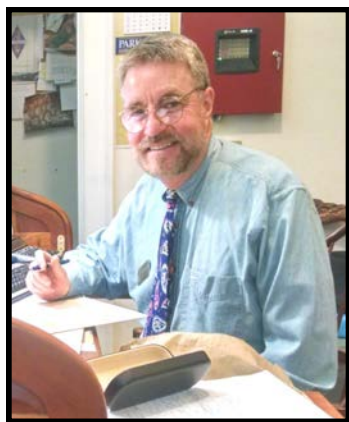

We had some 54 very excited youth participating in the fourth Annual Easter Egg Hunt sponsored by Buckeye Heisey Study Club, here on the grounds of your Museum and all of the eggs were found in just about 60 seconds. I would like to express a **BIG Thank-You** to all who worked so hard to give our guests such a positive Heisey experience.

In writing about very good Heisey happenings another event that showed off our favorite glassware to the best advantage was The Forty-Third All-Heisey Glass Show and Sale held in Annandale, VA in late March. As I waited to be allowed to enter the show with much childlike anticipation and excitement I was reminded of some of the reasons that we all are involved in this “collecting thing”, **IT IS Joyfully FUN !** How do we better share the invitation to join in on the enjoyment? The show was very well done as always and another **BIG Thank-You** must be expressed to all of the team and dealers who presented this offering with such style and grace!

We have been working on some of the lighting fixtures around our Museum. In the King House in particular we are attempting to outfit more of our fixtures with Heisey shades in order to better illustrate another, somewhat lesser known part, of our story. In the Collection we have one # 4 electric light shade, crimped (#160 Locket on Chain), one # 9 electric light shade, flared (#8 Vertical Bead and Panel), one #12 electric light shade, straight (Double Row Slash and Panel), and last but not least one # 4 electric light shade, straight (#160 Locket on Chain). The fixture in the King House dining room is currently outfitted with some rather sad ceiling fan shades that I would be very **HAPPY** to replace with a set of five matching Heisey shades. I know it is a long shot however if anyone knows of four shades to match any of the fore mentioned electric shades or has five other matching Heisey shades please let me know.

We have been saddened to learn of the passing of long time HCA members Jean Campbell Clark from Fremont Ohio a member since 1985, Robert F. Wolf from Vermont a member since 1997, and Blanche Smith from Pennsylvania a member since 1987.

April is here and the courtyard at the Museum is full of the beauty of new life. THE LOUISE REAM LIBRARY UPDATE



The Louise Ream Library update has come a long way. Restoration, along with the relocation of the library and its resources, allow our Members and guests better access to all Heisey related information. The custom oak, mission style bookcases are installed along with all of the furniture items and they look great! We are getting ready to start moving the books and educational materials downstairs, not all will fit, but that may be a good thing as some of the references in the current library are very out dated and will need to be sorted. There are copies of Heisey News available digitally, and we also have different copies of Schroeder antique value guides from the '70s/'80s, along with many other books and references. Great detail will be spent on ensuring the best and most relevant material will fill our new Library shelves.

What will happen to the remaining materials that are not chosen to be placed in the library, you ask? We intend to consolidate that information in one room, on the second floor of the Museum. This will become a resource center for older reference material. We want to focus the Library on the study of Heisey and other elegant glassware with the best info available.

This transition will call for a lot of volunteers, as we will be refiling all books in order to set up a searchable computer program. This program is expected to allow members to seek out books by author, by title, by subject, etc. We have completed phase 1 and 2 of this project and are now moving into finalizing the remaining details. Many members are interested in contributing to the new library so we have included a list of items that are still needed.

We will need the following items:

- A large flat screen T.V / DVD player, and wall mount: for the wall opposite of the fireplace. This will give us the flexibility of showing the introductory DVD to a small group/couple, or individual, in a warmer more private setting than the lower level/multipurpose room.
- A narrow depth display cabinet: for the entry into the Library which will draw guests around the corner, and into the Library. (see Curators choice)
- Small laptop computer to look up references
- Heisey lamps for reading lamps throughout the space
- A Mission style Pendulum wall clock

Funds are always an issue with any non profit museum (especially on a large scale project like this). If you would like to contribute monetarily to this project the funds are greatly needed and appreciated.

This project has come so far in such a short period of time and we need to thank all of the contributors who helped make this move possible. The Library is already used, almost every day, for extra work and meeting space, so this alteration has been extremely beneficial to the Museum in many ways.

We are in the final stretches and we wanted to thank all who have helped and all who continue to support this important project within YOUR Museum.

43rd ANNUAL 2016 ALL HEISEY SPRING BENEFIT AUCTION

Our 43rd Annual Spring Benefit Auction will be held **April 15 & 16, 2016** at the GMP Local #244 Union Hall at 350 Hudson Ave. in Newark, Ohio.

We have received 1309 lots of some wonderful glass for this auction from 57 consignors. Walter Ludwig, in the March edition of Heisey News and also on our website, has highlighted some of the wonderful glass we are auctioning off. We have displayed some of our better lots in the Museum- stop by and see them!

The auction catalog, absentee bid instructions, absentee bid form, bidding information, and most importantly the list of sale items are on our website- www.HeiseyMuseum.org. You have time to look and evaluate items and prepare for this great auction! There are also pictures of some of the special pieces you will be bidding on! You will want to arrive in time to attend the 1 ½ hour preview on Friday April 15, 2016 which is from 10:30 AM till noon. The auction will begin promptly at noon. Please note the early starting time!

On Saturday April 16, 2016, the doors will open at 8:30 AM, the annual membership meeting will be held at 9:00 AM with HCA President Roy Eggert presiding and with the auction beginning after the completion of the membership meeting at approximately 9:30 AM.

We mailed catalogs to members who consigned or bought glass in the past two years and for any member who asked for one. We will have copies available at the auction for a minimal fee of \$3.

If you can't make it to Newark for the auction this year I encourage you to and put in an absentee bid. Again, forms and instructions are available on our website. This is a way for every member to support **your** Association!

Finally, a special note to absentee bidders. All absentee bids **must** be received at the museum by Saturday April 9, 2016, 4:00 PM EST. **NO EXCEPTIONS**. Our volunteers must have adequate time to compile the bids.

We are again having absentee bidders make their own arrangements to have their glass shipped and included in the absentee bid instructions the area shippers and their telephone numbers. They will pick up the glass on Tuesday April 19, 2016 after 10:00 AM at the museum, package, and send your glass to you. Absentee bidders will have to pay their shippers directly. We will cooperate with your shipper and assist where we can.

As you read this newsletter I will be looking for help at the auction- for "Vannas" to hold up the glass, for folks to help move glass during the auction, and to clean up after the auction. If you would like to help, please contact me or see me or another volunteer at the auction. It is a great way to learn about the glass and meet some great volunteers.

More Heisey Bead Discoveries . . .

As you are probably aware we have finished all the Heisey Production colors and one experimental (gold) for our series release of the Heisey Beads made from damaged beyond repair real Heisey Glass color formulas. I have enjoyed this creative project of salvaging broken pieces of art and history, while raising money for our Museum, and making a product that our members and guests love and can use everyday. The most interesting thing to me is how the different colors and formulas perform under new fire. Before now we have been making solid color beads and they have all performed differently and provided several challenges to the ever talented Theresa Sharp, our bead artist. As I hope you have read and learned in my other articles on this subject in past Heisey News, colors that were hard to work with were: Cobalt, Opal, Custard and especially Dawn.

Now that we have completed and stock the Heisey production colors (15) we want to continue to offer additional Heisey beads. Theresa and I have become scientists and conducted many trials and errors to see what we can produce. Inspired by many of the successful bead companies that are so trendy right now like Troll and Pandora, we are so excited to be creating these wonderful designs all from damaged Heisey. Unfortunately with any experimentation our excitement was short lived. Theresa was able to make beautiful flowers and leaves in the beads using Alexandrite, Moongleam, Sahara, and Flamingo. The tricky part with this is, that we have to use a white base color so that the light pastels popped and showed through, not muddling together. As you can see in the photos the beads are absolutely beautiful, but unfortunately are not stable. The beads crack and splinter apart due to using the opal base. The formulas COE's (Co-efficiency of Expansion) are off and they do not bind or stick together effectively. They look good, but slowly crack and split apart. Using only the pastel colors, mentioned above, they work very well together as Heisey used them together (Alexandrite/Sahara trident candlestick, a Moongleam and Sahara dual colored 2 part relish in the Museum, and many stemware bowls and feet were cast in varying color combinations in the color era) Unfortunately Opal does not play well with the other colors, but was crucial in the appearance of the beads. We tried many different combinations, even trying to stick with the correct eras of the glass (we made a opal base, applied custard flowers and emerald leaves) but those had their internal stresses and we had to rethink.



With our Spring Bead that is so timely and beautiful failing me, I went to Heisey land to rethink and brainstorm as to what we could make that I would be happy presenting to you. Well gaining knowledge from the patterns and color combinations in the Museum we have successfully created Crystal based beads with small inclusions of Cobalt blue flowers for the Spring Bead release. The flowers are not as bold as you think of cobalt being, they lightened up with the small amount of Cobalt used and almost appear to be painted by watercolor. A perfect representation of Periwinkle blue and perfect for Spring. We also made Tangerine flowered beads proposed for the June Release at Convention and they surprisingly maintained a bold red color and are very dramatic, and are going to be great for the Circus themed Convention. The bold color reminds me of a carnival, and the red and blue combined together look fabulous.



I write this article to share the findings we have from working with the glass in a molten state, and to also express to you how much time and effort goes into creating these little treasures successfully. Theresa has worked very tirelessly and tried all of my suggestions of combinations to create a beautiful bead that we can offer to our members and guests. We are very excited to share the results. They are beautiful and we know you will enjoy them as much as we do. Wait till you see

Grapevine Texas

September 30- October 2



Approximately 60 miles south of Texarkana, along the Texas-Louisiana border, lies Caddo Lake. A 25,400-acre lake and wetland, Caddo Lake features the largest cypress forest in the world. The lake is also home to 71 species of fish. Accessible by steamboat and paddleboat from New Orleans, cities along the lake were successful ports during the mid eighteen hundreds. The Graceful Ghost, an authentic one-quarter replica of a steamboat currently offers rides on Caddo Lake. Jefferson Texas, once a booming port, lies on the west edge of Caddo Lake. A few miles south of Caddo Lake, near interstate 20, is Jonesville Texas, home of the T.C. Lindsey & Co. general store. In continuous operation since 1847, it is a time capsule. This and other items I have written about can be found on the Texas Bucket List link on our website.



West on I-20 takes you past Kilgore, Texas, home of the East Texas Oil Field and on to Tyler, Texas. Tyler, Texas is known as the Rose Capital of the world. Tyler also has the largest rose garden in America. October is Rose Festival month.

Lake Fork is a 26,000-acre reservoir located 65 miles east of Dallas. Known for its world-class largemouth bass fishing, Lake Fork holds 34 of the top 50 largemouth bass caught in Texas, including the state record. The lake is also known for its large population of Bald Eagles. The 2006 eagle count on the lake was 51. Day trips are available for both fishing and birding.



110 miles south of Dallas is Waco Texas. Home to Baylor University & Dr Pepper, Waco is also home to Chip & Joanna Gaines of HGTV Fixer Upper fame. With numerous businesses, including Magnolia Farms, Magnolia Homes, Magnolia Market and Magnolia Flour they are attracting thousands of visitors to Waco. So if you are interested in seeing the market, the silos or perhaps Harp Design, make the trip, it's about two hours from Dallas.

Finally, if truth isn't stranger than fiction, businessman Stephen Wynne has acquired the rights and all remaining inventory and is building DeLorean motorcars in Humble Texas north of Houston. Plans include an electric version. Great Scott!

We are announcing our Twelfth Annual Heisey Fall Select Auction! Thanks to the great support you all have given in the past for this event for HCA. We have set the date for the Auction as well- **October 15, 2016**. It will be held in Newark approximately two weeks after the Annual Percy & Vivian Moore Dinner which will be held this year on Sept 30-Oct. 2, 2016 in Grapevine, Texas.. There will more articles about that event in this and future newsletters.

The first thing you can do to participate in this Auction is to prepare a **list** of glass you would like us to **select** for this Auction. Please note that the blank list, on pages 14-15 of this newsletter, contain space for forty lots. Each member is allowed to submit **forty lots** for the committee to select from. Remember, this auction benefits **your** association. Consider making a donation of a piece-100% goes to support HCA and the Museum. Donations don't count towards your 40 lot limit. We hope Study Clubs will donate glass for the auction- a great project for them!

This year, as has been the case for each Fall Select Auction, the consignment fee for each lot will be 20% with a minimum consignment fee of \$5. This means anything that sells for under \$25 the consignment fee will be \$5. As you prepare your lists, please make them as descriptive as possible since the committee will be using your lists to select glass for the auction. It is very important that you carefully check for damage-we are selecting only undamaged glass for this special auction. The **deadline** for submitting your completed lists to us is **May 10, 2016**. Remember- send in the list- NO GLASS- of up to forty lots.

The committees target is to have an auction of 300 lots. How can you get your glass selected? Here are some clues. Consideration will be given to include diversity in color, etchings, cuttings, and patterns. A main goal in the selection will be not to have any duplication of lots. We would like glass for the experienced collector who wants that exotic piece of Heisey and also some glass available for the fledgling collector just starting out. As mentioned earlier, **we will not select damaged glass**.

The Select Committee will be busy after May 10th and contact you on or about June 1 to let you know the glass it has selected. Hopefully, you will be able to bring your glass to Newark and drop it off at the Museum when you come to the Convention being held June 15-18. Please look over your glass and begin your lists soon. May 10th will be here before you know it!

This event has been a success for consignors and buyers of wonderful Heisey glass. Please plan on attending and participating in this auction for the benefit of your Museum.

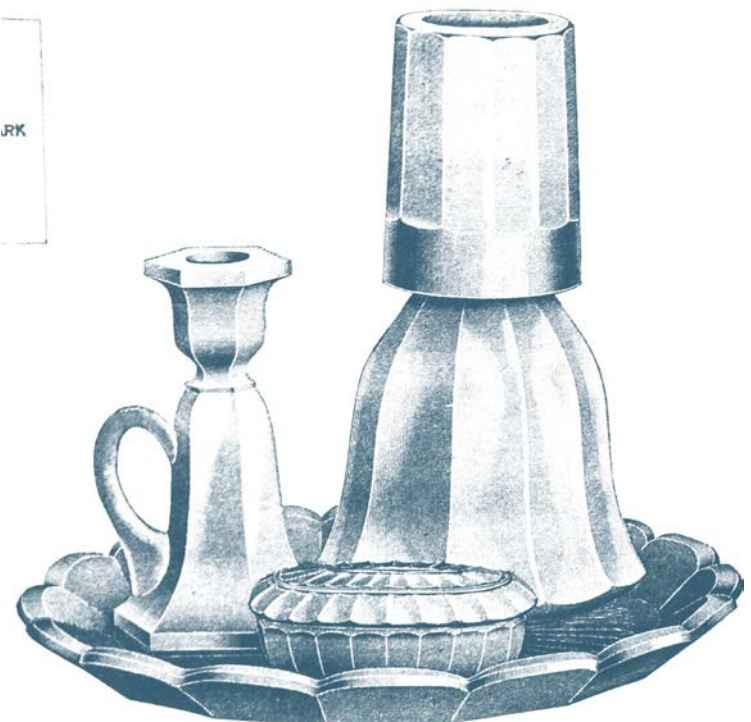

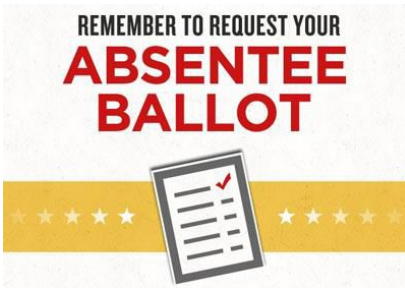

2016 HCA ABSENTEE VOTING INSTRUCTIONS for Electing HCA Board of Directors

All HCA Voting Members in good standing are eligible to cast votes at the Annual Meeting in June. We will be electing three people to serve on the HCA Board of Directors. Candidate information will be published in the May 2016 issue of the Heisey News. As your HCA Secretary, one of my duties is to oversee this election.

As a Voting Member, you may vote in person at the June Annual Meeting or by Absentee Ballot. The current HCA Voting Members list is published on pages 12-13 of the February 2016 issue of the Heisey News. Check your status on the list to be sure we have it correct. If you have any questions, please contact the Membership Clerk at the Museum.

You may request an Absentee Ballot any time after the beginning of the calendar year, however the Absentee Ballots will not be prepared until after the slate of candidates has been adopted at the quarterly membership meeting held at the Benefit Auction in April. Absentee Ballots will be available after May 1, 2016. You may pick up a ballot at the Museum *or* mail your request to:

Along with your written request, be sure to include a self-addressed envelope. If you affix a stamp too, it would help to defray expenses. As your request arrives at the Museum, it will be assigned a voting number. When the Absentee Ballots are available, a blank corresponding-numbered Absentee Ballot will be placed in a new envelope, with your name and voting number written on the outside. This new envelope will be put into the self-addressed envelope you provided and mailed back to you.

When you receive your Absentee Ballot, remove it from the envelope, cast your vote, place the Absentee Ballot back into the envelope, and seal it. Put this envelope into a new envelope, addressing it back to the address above. *Note: To be included in the election, your Absentee Ballot must be received by the Membership Clerk by 4:00 pm (EST) on Friday, June 10, 2016.*

After the polls are closed, the absentee votes are combined with votes cast by the voting members present at the Annual Meeting and the ballot tallying begins.

Please note that according to HCA By-Laws, Article VII, Section f, as approved in June 2011:
“If the number of nominees equals the number of Director vacancies, the ballot voting shall be deemed unnecessary if approved by the majority of voting members present.”

Two featured Bridge challenges and offered prizes of Heisey glass to those who sent in correct bids!

Virginia served an assortment of delicious refreshments. While drinking juice from Victorian goblets, members could gaze at her New Era goblets. What an interesting contrast!

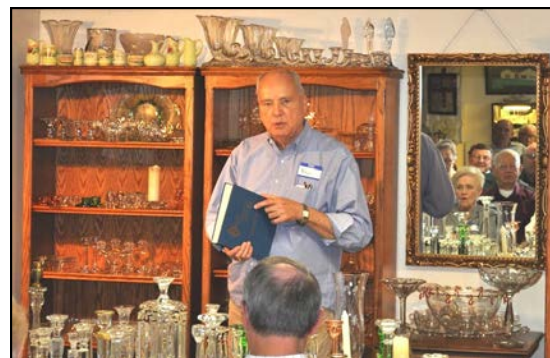
The next meeting, May 14, will feature the club's annual fundraising auction and raffle of Heisey glass.
