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
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#### National Heisey Glass Museum



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# Through the Glass Looking: Heisey's Adventures in Optics Wonderland, Part Eight

We're nearing the end of the optic story, which coincides with the end of the Heisey factory. Just a few more 1950's variations wrap up the tale.

An unusual and bold optic of this period is *Carlene*, which appears only on a goblet by the same name, #8101 Carlene. The goblet and its optic were first discussed by Carl Sparacio in the February 1977 issue of the Heisey News. At the time, Carlene the goblet was not assigned an HCA pattern number, so one has been assigned to it now. The goblet looks at first glance to be #5072 Rose (fig. 1). Even though Carlene and Rose share identical stems, the bowls are distinctly different. Carlene's bowl is cone-like with an unusual heavy sham.

If the bowl isn't enough, the Carlene optic really sets it apart from Rose. The #5072 Rose stemware has the 14-panel Medium Optic, a blown internal optic. (Carl's original article called this Narrow Optic. Maybe he was in no mood to count that day.) #8101 Carlene has an optic of unusual design. Exactly how the optic was made is unknown, but the effect is clearly noticable on the outside of the bowl, not inside as with most optics.

The Carlene Optic consists of four plain, softly contoured panels alternating with four wider pebbled panels (fig. 2). The panels are swirled to the right. The pebbling may be the same fine grid pattern seen in Screen Optic, but stretched. (We'll get to Screen Optic in a moment.) Carl wrote that three examples of the Carlene goblet were found at the time of their discovery; so far as I know, there have been no further examples. I estimate the date of this optic as anywhere from about 1950 to 1955.

The next optic in my list is one which I suspect is related to Carlene. While more common than Carlene, it is still hard to find. That is the Screen Optic. Why it is uncommon is hard to say. As with many other Heisey rarities, we don't have the full story behind it. While Screen Optic is often called experimental, I suspect that "limited production" is nearer the truth, since the optic has been found in some quantity on a variety of pieces. It is found mainly on #4054 Coronation and #6060 Country Club (fig. 3), mostly in Dawn but also in Limelight. Screen Optic has also been seen in crystal on #2351 Newton sodas. All the examples I have seen have been swirled in differing degrees.

The story often told is that Screen Optic was made by rolling the glass, still hot and pliable, directly on actual wire screen. The regularity of the optic made me dubious. It isn't just a fine screen mesh overall; instead, the optic is broken into sections by four regularly spaced vertical ribs. The four sections fit perfectly around the circumference of the items they are on, no matter the size or shape. It would be very unlikely to find any off-the-shelf screen that would form such a tightly fitting pattern with no overlap or irregularities and would do it for whatever size of piece was made. That would have required custom-made screen, and several different kinds at that.

If pieces were rolled over screen, careful examination should reveal a starting or stopping point, but the optic is smoothly continuous all around, with no breaks, overlaps, or other anomalies. The optic even covers the bottom of the Coronation oldfashion used for the photograph (fig. 4), and you can see (or could if I had photographed it) seams that come together in the center of the bottom. Rolling couldn't have done that.

These observations led me to suspect the Screen Optic was made from a mould as other blown optics were. A search of the HCA mould inventory revealed just such a mould was in storage, and Michael Maher photographed it for me (fig. 5). The mould has a strong screen pattern, divided into four sections, just what we see on the actual pieces, assuming a swirl was applied between dipping the gather in this mould and blowing in the final pattern mould.

The notion of rolling the glass on screen may still have some truth behind it. It is entirely possible, for instance, that someone had the idea for a screen optic. But before going to the expense of making a mould, it might have been tested using ordinary screen wire. A concept piece used in that test would not likely have the four sectiondividing ribs and might look somewhat irregular. That would be а true experimental piece and a real prize in anyone's collection.

What remains unclear is why the texture of the Screen Optic produced from the mould is apparent on both the inside and the outside of these pieces. It may be that the optic mould was used to impress the screen pattern very deeply, and blowing the final shape didn't completely smooth the texture on the outside.

The Country Club soda shown in this photo is much taller than the Coronation old fashion, and that accounts for the stretching seen in the soda's screen texture (fig. 6). It clearly shows the same optic, but it has been stretched lengthwise. This is what you'd expect from an optic originating from a mould.

If the four heavy-gauge lines dividing Screen Optic into sections were replaced with wider smooth panels, the resulting four-part optic would be very close to the Carlene Optic. For that reason I suspect the two optics are somehow related. No other mould has so far surfaced which seems to have any resemblance to Carlene.

Since Screen Optic occurs on both Dawn and Limelight pieces, it probably dates from about 1953 or later.

Before A.H. Heisey & Co. closed, there was at least one more optic, so inconspicuous that we generally don't even think of it as being an optic. It appears on #1637A Town and Country. Heisey recognized it, however, when they grouped the Town and Country

salad set (fig. 7) together with Saturn pieces in their last catalog and called the whole list "Saturn Design."

Most Town and Country pieces have a gently thickened ring just inside the rim, and another even less obvious ring near the center. Tumblers in the pattern do the opposite, having thick walls but thinning out deliberately (not just as a consequence of the flaring) right below the rim. This produces a very muted optic affect. These gentle swells are characteristic of Eva Zeisel's designs. We can think of this optic as a variable **Town** and Country or Zeisel Optic. In addition to #1637A, the #6009A Roundelay pitcher was made optic for inclusion with Town and Country pieces.

There are two different patterns of plates made in Dawn (fig. 8). Both have been called Town and Country. How to tell them apart? Since this series is about optics, I bet you can guess. Neither pattern is marked, so that doesn't help. The optic, of course, separates the two Dawn plates. The plate with the subtly thickened band of the Zeisel Optic is the authentic #1637A Town and Country plate. It was offered in at least two sizes,  $6\frac{1}{2}$ in. and 8-in.

The Dawn plate without the optic is #1609. The 8-inch size in crystal was used for many cuttings and sold as an under plate for Fig. 8: #1637A Town and Country, 6<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" (left) and matching cut sherbets. The same plate was #1609 (#1183a), 8", both Dawn offered plain as part of the Revere pattern, where it was called #1183a. They had smaller centers relative to the overall diameter of regular #1183 Revere plates. In Be aware that other companies, such as Revere, the #1609 (#1183a) plates were Seneca and Fostoria, made grey or smoke offered in three sizes (7-in., 8-in., and 10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>- plates. But colors are not identical to Dawn, in.), all of which have been seen in Dawn.

If you have Dawn plates with a thin foot rim Town and Country plates (#1637A) also underneath (no more than an eighth of an were made in Limelight. although that is certainly possible.

We've come to the end of the factory. Is this the end of the optics? Of course not. Yet another came to my attention thanks to Walter Ludwig after I was already well into this series or I might have fit it in earlier.

The museum has a #3355 Fairacre sherbet, seen here (fig. 9) in the tender but firm grasp of Walter's fingers. You'll notice a distinct pebbling or hammering. We may as well call this the **Hammered Optic.** It does look a little inebriated, after all. In the second photo (fig. 10), the same piece is shown with the bowl inverted. You can see the irregular effect more closely. As far as I know, it's a one-of-a-kind piece—until someone finds another one.

I've tried to cover every Heisey optic possible in this series. I've pored over all the available catalogs and price lists. I scoured all of the usual sources (and some unusual ones). With Walter's and Michael's help, yet more could be included. I've even managed to throw in a few extras, besides. But we've seen how adventurous Heisey could be. Have I gotten them all? Almost certainly not. How would we ever know if we've found the last optic? We can't. Never stop looking. There is still the chance that other optics are lurking in someone's collection or on a dusty roadside mall's shelves. All you have to do is, like Alice, always to keep through the glass looking.





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
