
We will be closed both Monday & Tuesday for January and February of 2018.

The Open House was attended by a large number of visitors. Some were HCA members, most were not, but a good time was had by everyone. There were many positive comments about the glass and the Museum in


general. Thank you to Jack Burriss and the Museum staff for helping put on a wonderful event.





# TREASURER'S REPORT

We launched the Planned Giving Gift program during the Percy & Vivian Moore Weekend in October. This program is designed to support the Endowment and thus the Museum and the legacy of Heisey Glass.

As I was reading the beautiful brochure developed as part of the launch, I learned the Endowment Fund was established in July 1982 with a \$500 gift. The fund has grown to over \$4,000,000. At this time of year, many of us reflect on past events in our lives (hopefully not in the way Ebenezer Scrooge did with the Ghost of Christmas Past). I thought it would be interesting to reflect on the beginnings of the "Museum Trust Fund."

"Museum Trust Fund Dick Marsh

For over a year a special committee and the HCA Board of Directors have been working on setting up a trust fund to guarantee the continued operation of our museum. The progress has moved slowly but this is a new venture to all of us, and there are many aspects to consider. Proposals from the banks have been examined and our club attorney has offered his advice.

Within the next year the Board expects to set up this trust fund for the museum. The principal of this fund would be out of the reach of the Board of Directors and only the interest could be spent. The break even costs would be about \$1200 in the fund which the club does not have to spare at this time. There has been much interest shown in this fund by a number of HCA members.

To get this fund started, a special account has been set up with a local bank. This account has been set to run until the trust fund is started, or one (1) year. If at the end of one year the trust fund is not in operation, all donations will be returned to the donors upon request.

This fund will keep the museum operating for future people to come and see the great museum which we now enjoy. The Heisey glass we all love!

Donations to the special fund can be made either through HCA or straight to the bank and, as always, it would be tax deductible. Please donate! No amount is too small. The National Capital Heisey Collectors Club has already donated \$500 to start the ball rolling.

Make checks payable to: Heisey Collectors of America, Inc. Trust Fund and mail to either HCA or the bank. If mailed to the bank, the account number of <u>5104124</u> must appear."

In 2017, much remains the same.....The Endowment helps with the operating expenses of the Museum, people enjoy the Museum, we still love Heisey Glass and no donation is too small!

On a personal note, I want to wish everyone a wonderful holiday season. I hope it is filled with family, friends, love and Heisey.


PS My jaw dropped when I saw that the bank account number was included in the Heisey News. Ah, the '80s...a much simpler time....I remember it well!!!

# ITEMS FOR EVERY PURPOSE IN

# Graceful Patterns Make Appeal

When you offer your customers the charming 1401 design in Heisey's glassware, you are bringing to their attention a pattern that affords a complete table service.

There are items in this design to meet every use in serving a small luncheon or a large dinner. Some of the pieces are illustrated on this page and others have been shown in previous issues.

# French Lily Motif

A customer can buy an entire service or part of the service, such as plates, or cups and saucers, or stemware. If she buys a portion, she can add to it from time to time, until she has the whole pattern.

You will find the design of this glass particularly appealing on account of the delightfulness with which it has been executed. The motif of the graceful, scalloped edges is the delicate flower of the French lily.

# Crystal and Colors

All the items of this design can be obtained in clear crystal, or in the four colors: Flamingo, Moon Gleans, Sahara and Alexandrite. The idea of selling more than one color can be well used with this glass, for rainbow events, or for setting the table with different colors on different occasions.


The moderate price at which the 1401 line can be offered opens a good field for it, and the store or department which displays it to advantage will find a real demand for it.

# Rainbow Effects Favored

T luncheon, a salad service of glass is much favored. For entertaining at luncheon a popular scheme is a rainbow effect in glassware. Thus the hostess uses a different color for each course. If colored whip candles are part of the decoration (and they are now used unlit at midday!) the low crystal holder frequently matches. It is quite a vogue, indeed, to group pairs of whip candlesticks on each side of the floral centerpiece. Contrast is another attractive plan with table glassware. Applied to luncheons, the glass may be placed on cloths of contrasting color.




Top row, left to right: No. 1401 After Dinner Coffee Cup and Saucer, Celery Tray, Three-handled Sugar, Cream.

# Editor Pays Tribute to Alexandrite Color

THE following excerpts from an editorial about Heisey's distinctive Alexandrite color, in the Montrose Daily Press, of Montrose, Colo., furnish an example of the favorable notice enterprising store owners may secure for their merchandise:

"A walk very early in the morning took the writer into the Lathrop Hardware Company where John Harris told a most interesting story as to how the marvelous colors are acquired in some high-priced glassware on the shelves of the concern. The tumblers and cocktail glasses in question are a sort of lilac-colored crystal with various colors such as blue, amethyst and topaz showing in certain lights. According to Mr. Harris a lilac-colored lead ore contains the color materials which are blended with the melted sand and soda of which glass is manufactured.

### Indescribably Lovely

"A. H. Heisey & Company have been able to secure this very rare lead ore, which gives an indescribably lovely coloring to some of their fine glassware. Doubtless the drinking goblets and the wine pitchers and the fruit bowls on the table of the mighty Alexander were gorgeous in the extreme, but they could not have been more graceful and attractive than the lliac-colored goblets and glasses on the shelves of the Lathrop Hardware Company."

#### Uses Advertising

The Lathrop Hardware Company, who are Heisey glassware headquarters in Montrose, believe in newspaper advertising to acquaint the public with their offerings.

In one advertisement, Mr. Harris used this copy to promote glassware sales:

"We have just received a new line of all the latest colors and shapes in gift glass. Come and let us tell you about the famous Heisey Alexandrite—tell you how and where it is made. It is interesting and you will enjoy it.

"The largest line we have ever shown in the following colors — Marigold, Sahara, Alexandrite, Peach, Emerald. Everything suitable for lovely gifts,"

For example, he searched through many books and catalogs to identify an unusual ashtray that was marked with the diamond H. After a long search, he finally found it in one of the Vogel books - the No. 437 ashtray made in 1924, which is described simply as "an extremely heavy ash tray." Items he hasn't been able to identify for certain include a container possibly used for mustard or horseradish, a mug, a screw top jar, and a water bottle. He also recounted the experience of taking some unidentified items to the Heisey Museum and getting assistance from Walter Ludwig to identify them.

Show and Tell included a nice variety of Heisey glass including mugs featuring Lady Golfer, Tally Ho and Tavern etches, a tumbler with a sailboat cutting, a Lodestar nappy in Dawn, a New Era goblet with a Venus cutting, a Coleport oblong bowl with unknown cutting, a Wabash sherbet with Frontenac etch in Hawthorne, a Dolphin fishbowl, a Prince of Wales Plumes egg cup, and a Cabochon oval floral bowl with cutting.

To end the meeting, Marv and Joann served a variety of refreshments using their beautiful Crystolite and Victorian tableware.
