



One of the more scarce of the early colonial lines this pattern is very plain, the only mold design being approximately a quarter inch band in relief along the scalloped rim of the items, thus the name, cupped scallop. On the cruet or oil bottle and the tumbler the scalloped rim appears on the body of the item. It is interesting to note that the finial of the covered butter and the sugar lid contain the scalloped rim but the stopper for the oil bottle is the very plain #6.

The glass is usually very heavy and the brilliancy stands out due to the simplicity of the pattern. The pressed items will have a star bottom and the plates and nappys will have star ground bottoms. Most common items found are the various size nappys, more than 30 being offered. In addition, one early catalog offered the four piece table set, jug and tumbler (no stemware) plates, oil bottle, pickle tray, cnady tray, celery tray and salt or pepper shaker. I've asked my Secret Santa to find me a toothpick.

Since most items found will contain the Heisey trademark, the exception being the blown items, we are estimating the dates of production for this line to be circa 1900 to 1912. One early catalog, with a penciled-in date of 1916, contains no items in this pattern. On display at the National Heisey Museum is the oil bottle, covered butter and what is purported to be a ladies spottoon, probably made from the spoon mold.

No items have been found in color and due to the age of the pattern the molds have likely been destroyed.

Hope to see many of you at the Museum Benefit Auction next month. There will be plenty of goodies for everyone. And for the real advanced follector it is reported that a genuine Heisey gun will be offered for sale. Percy Moore informed us that since there will be pigs offered for sale he will be there with his Heisey truck.

## PROFILES of FORMER HEISEY EMPLOYEES

# "NEIL DRISCOLL" by FRANCES LAW

Neil Driscoll was born in Wheeling, West Virginia, in 1896, the year Heisey opened the factory. His family moved to Newark, Ohio when he was five years old and he attended school in Newark. His father went to work at Heisey in 1901.

Neil also went to work for Heisey when he was fourteen years old. He began his career as a "carry-in" This seems to be-the-trend boy. with young boys starting work at Heisey. As a "carry-in" boy he took the glass to the annealing oven where they warmed the glass to get it ready for the finisher. At seventeen he went to work in the hot metal department. This was to be his vocation until he retired. gathered glass out of the furnace using a punty. A punty is a long rod with a head on one end and a larger piece welded on the other end to give a good grip on the rod.

The hot metal department had one large furnace with sixteen separate pots in one oven. Mr. Driscoll gathered the melted glass to pour into the molds. Seven pounds was the maximum gather at one time.

Neil stayed in this department until he went into the army in 1917. He was in the Light Artillery Corps and served in both France and Germany. After his discharge in 1919 he headed back to Heisey. However, at this date there were no openings, so he worked for one year at Holophane across the street. After this year he went back to Heisey, working again in the hot metal department. He ovviously was very talented in this phase of glass mak-

ing.

Oftentimes work slowed down at Heisey's so he looked for a job with other companies. He found work once at Wheeling, with the Crystal Glass Co. Also he was employed by Fostoria in Moundsville, West Virginia. We asked him what caused the slow downs at Heisey's. He said that at times there were slow orders; also if a glass company came up with a new pattern they would work full time. We think the same is true with Heisey; new patterns or new colors, business was full steam ahead. Neil said at times the furnaces had to be shut down for repairs and this, of course, slowed production.

In 1962 after the closing of the Newark plant in 1957, he went to work at Tiffin Glass Company. He soon retired as the driving back and forth was too much for a man of nearly seventy.

It is interesting to note that his father learned his trade as a finisher in Wheeling. He elected to come to Newark and work for Heisey. He was a night boss for Heisey at one time.

In order to work in the hot metal department one had to "gather" for a year, then he received a card to show apprenticeship as a gatherer. However, it took three more years at gathering before you could advance further in this area of glass making.

Mr. Driscoll does not remember making any red or black glass; and he was there long enough to know. This underscores our belief regarding these two colors.\* He did say A.H. Heisey was adventurous and tried everything. He must have been quite a guy according to our reports from employees.

The thing that is most impressive about Neil Driscoll is the pride he still feels about Heisey glass. There was a gleam in his eyes as he told us they made the best glass around, (just as we believe). He said that if you had been employed by Heisey, you could get a job with any other glass company. This is a pretty good recommendation, isn't it?

Mr. Driscoll is married to a charming lady whose name is Margaret. He has one daughter living in Newark, who is a public health nurse. He also has three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. He and his wife live at 834 Steel Avenue and I am sure he would be glad to visit with you about Heisey.

We asked him if he had any stories left over from plant work. He waid there were many, but we better not get into that. I am sure if a person had more time to visit he could come up with some good ones.

We salute Neil Driscoll as a man who contributed much to our present hobby of collecting what he termed the best glass made. We couldn't agree with him more. One last thing; he was very impressed with our museum. He wants to go back and take his wife this time.

" #5058 GOOSE STEMWARE "



February there is still the "blahs" as far as the weather is concerned so it's back to the grapes.

The #5058 Goose stemware line consists of four items; loz. cordial, 2 oz. sherry, 3 oz. wine and 4 oz. cocktail. This item has never been reissued by Imperial Glass Corp. They do not carry the Diamond H trademark as do none of the figurine stems. They were made in crystal and with crystal frosted stems. None has been reported in color.

The shape of the bowl varies with the items and they are blown. The foot is cast making the stem the only pressed part. It has an oval out-cropping just as the stem begins representing the feet. From the top of the feet its belly swells out and back in to the start of the neck.

The lower section of the neck is puffed out with its bill laying on the top of this section as it curves back in. There is a bridge across the top of the bill before the head begins. The eyes are very small dots of raised glass. The top of its head and neck is where the bowl rests. The neck and back are the shape of the letter S with the lower section much larger than the top. Its tail protrudes from the back then cuts into the foot.

That the #351 Pilsner shown in the Table Talk in the Dec. 1974 issue was listed as being made in cobalt, moongleam, flamingo and sahara as well as crystal? What colors do you have?

That #1231 Octagon was made in a water jug with #92 stopper in both cobalt and sahara? Has anyone seen it?

That a basket in #1533 Wampum was listed in a 1939 catalog on a list of about 15 or 20 items in a handwritten addition to the miscellaneous items on page 45 and was priced at \$42.00 per dozen? It was also

shown in a picture of a store display in an old photo album belonging to a salesman.

That the #5022 stemware was called Oceanic in a 1941 catalog?

That there is an Ice Skater deep plate etching, #505, not pictured in anything we have seen, but listed? Also #466 Athletic Scene in border is listed in a catalog and we have a mug in the museum.

That #3312 Gayoso(Augusta) is listed as being made in marigold? This is a pulled stem pattern.


That the #4044 New Era Rock and Rye

bottle could be purchased with a special "Christ and Flag" cutting? Rather strange for such an item, it would seem.

That there was in Amafula Tree carving? Anyone know what it was?

That Columbia (#4090) stemware was first introduced in 1937? Also #1486 Coleport was listed in 1937. A five piece cigarette set was mentioned.

That #473 Narrow Flute with Rim dates back to at least 1911 since it is pictured in "Table Glass and con't to page 8

# DETAIL OF PATTERN



What fun it is to learn the pattern name and number for one-formerly unknown! Since early in our collecting days we were aware of the pattern and knew that it had been made exclusively for Montgomery Ward. We were able to place it in the forties because museum visitors spoke of ordering at that time from Wards

Pieces of the pattern are on display in the national museum. Another researcher had given it a number and named it Reverse Ess. Other authors had called it "S" Repeat which was also the name for an old pressed patterns.

Thanks to three different sources we learned both the name and number

in the space of a week or so. First a letter arrived from A. E. Hardin of Texas who said he had found the pattern in the 1947 Montgomery Ward catalog. Then the next day the newsletter of the Heisey Club of California arrived with a full page picture of a catalog page from 1945. This had been located by Clyde and Marjorie Smith of that club. Then a few days later a very knowledable former Heisey employee, Paul Fairall, came through the museum and gave us the pattern number.

Paul said that the pattern was copied from Lariat which is #1540 and that it had been numbered as close as possible, #1541. On close examination it is easy to see the similarities. The continuous border of "esses" replaces the loops of rope on the Lariat pattern. The cream and sugar follows more closely the same design as the Plantation sugar and creamer which may have been copied from Athena in later years. At least the bowls are the same shape.

The catalog states that it was created by Wards Bureau of Design. If so they surely were using Heisey Lariat drawings and adding the dif-

ferent border rather than creating an entirely new design. "Smooth clear Heisey crystal-nationally known for it's purity and fine workmanship. All pieces are made of fine potash crystal, fire-polished to glow like fire itself. The fluid beaded design reflects points of light from the candlelight of your table and makes any dinner a fest-Designed by expert ive occasion. craftsmen to have a special place in your hostess life and compliment your fine china and linen". That was the description in the catalog.

The 1947 catalog showed four pieces of stemware but "not available" was printed over the listing. Stems shown were goblet, footed iced tea, high sherbet and cocktail. The blown bowl was used with a stem consisting of one or more "esses".

Another item shown setting on the large snack plate is the #1447 Rococo compote which turns up in two or three other patterns.

We are not sure that the copy from the 1945 catalog which we have will photograph well enough for the newsletter but we will try. Refer to Heisey News, Vol 3, number 11, page 6, upper left hand corner for picture of the #1541 Athena double candle stick.



# Sandwich Glass



A quote from page 177:

Ohio Art and Artists
Edna Maria Clark, M.A.
Richmond: Garrett and Massie,
Publishers 1932

"An industry closely allied to ceramics that has made marked progress, even more than pottery, along art-istic lines in recent years, is glassmaking. The Heisey Glass Company, Newark, stands supreme in this country as makers of blown and pressed glass in the plainer styles. Their glass product is excellent in finish, produced under formulas for rare and beautiful colors; they make charming etched decorations, and an interesting output of their factory is the clever reproduction of early American pressed glass from the old Sandwich glass pattern molds."

(Horace King's note: In the Clark

reference to "old Sandwich" - does she mean the 1238 Beehive plate which Vogel dates 1927 and classifies as relatively rare? I remember Beehive very well because my Zodiac design was based upon this pattern and, according to my best knowledge, Beehive was produced from the factory iron molds, not from old Sandwich glass pattern molds, as Clark seems to state.)

Editor's note: Mr. King is correct. Heisey had Sandwich glass models. Several items were copied from them. However, the plate to which he refers differs from the originals in size, color and the fact that the stippling is much coarser. Heisey also copied the large dolphin candlestick, the petticoat dolphin and other items. We hope to have an article on this in the future if a certain "lost" piece of information turns up. Keep hunting, Kay.

## Questions & Answers.

What is the procedure for making the Sweet Adeline design?

 $oldsymbol{\mathcal{A}}$  First of all the Sweet Adeline shown in the December Heisey News was a pressed pattern. There is also a Sweet Adeline carving to which you probably are referring. It is done by coating the glass with a rubber like material and then cutting out the pattern by "carving" with a sharp knife. Then the uncovered areas are sandblasted to make the design. Other carvings include Chevy Chase. Nimrod, Sailboat, Nymph and Satyr, Stars and Stripes, Stripes, Swan Dive, Lily, Bachhus and Vanity Fair. In the museum there are one of two carvings not listed in catalogs.

Is much stemware signed?

Much more was signed than most people think. The old Colonial patterns had large lines of pressed stemware and most was signed on the bottom or on the stem. Some later pressed stemware was signed the same way and once in awhile inside the bowl.

Pulled stemware was never signed. However many Heisey stems have blown bowls with the addition of pressed stems which were easy to sign, since the stem was made in a mold. It usually is knowing where to look that creates the problem. Also sometimes you may have a set with only one or two pieces being signed.

It may be necessary to use a magnifying glass since the marks are often quite small but a close examination of the stem itself may yield a peek at a mark. Earlier pressed stems had larger marks and they could be on the fat part of the stem, as on a lady leg stem or just above it. They may be at the top of the stem near the bowl, or toward the bottom of the stem. It all depends on the pattern. When Bob and Steve get their book out I imagine it will tell you where to look.

Get out your magnifying glass and examine those stems carefully. Chances are you will be surprised. Remember any part of a mark should be good enough for a true collector to recognize. The mark should not make any difference to you but unfortunately it may help in reselling should you ever wish to, so it is nice to know it is there.

Of course some stems have never been seen signed, including #3381 Creole, #3411 Monte Cristo, #3416 Marriette, #5042 Corinthian, #3389 Duquesne, #5010 Symphone, #4090 Columbia, #4083 Stanhope and no doubt others. Has anyone seen these signed?

I would like to have a list
 of items made in the various
colors. Is this possible?

 $oldsymbol{\mathcal{A}}$  These lists are found in every copy of Vol. I of the Heisey News, a different color each month. There are also two in Volume II, the February and March issues. These tell about the color and list all items known at the time for each. The lists have been updated from time to time in subsequent issues and these should be added to your color lists. Volume I is available (third reprinting) for 80¢ a copy or \$8.00 for the set. Volume II is also available at the same price. It is in short supply just now but is to be reprinted again soon.

These back issues are a good investment for new members. 25 patterns were written about in Volume I alone and this included many of the earliest unmarked patterns as well as many from the later period. 28 patterns appear in Volume II, both early and late patterns. The very information you are seeking may be in those earlier issues.

That Heisey made mugs for Stewarts Root Beer -- about a turn a year. They were very good quality glass. Heisey did not put the name on them.

That Heisey was one of the first to advertise in Ebony magazine? The last four items were from Paul Fairall.

Mr. Fairall reports that a large bowl with a horsehead in the center was made in this design but did not sell well so it was discontinued.

There will be a console set in this pattern listed in the March 15 benefit auction.

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


