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
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Narrow Flute was one of the leading patterns during Heisey's colonial era. Production of this pattern started in about 1910 and lasted till about 1935. A few items lasted till the end of the plant. Almost all items in this pattern are marked with the diamond "H".

After Heisey's success in the use of wide panels for colonial patterns #300 Peerless and #341 Puritan, the next logical step would be the design of a colonial pattern based on narrow panels. Thus, I feel the Narrow Flute pattern was developed.

There were 5 design patents by the A.H. Heisey Company for the #393 Narrow Flute pattern. Design patent #42,665 dated June 25, 1912 is for a series of pitchers (Vogel II, p. 55), #42,711 dated July 2, 1912 is for the two handled dish (II 53), #43,-852 dated April 15, 1913 is for a series of nappies (II 51), #43,854 dated April 15, 1913 is for a straight sided hotel pitcher (#109,9.63) and #46,733 dated December 8, 1914 is for a parfait T. Clarence Heisey was the inventor for Nos. 42,665 and 46,733 and A. J. Sanford for Nos. 42,711, 43,852 and 43,854.

HEISEY by IMPERIAL

Below is listed all current production by Imperial from the Heisey molds. This year there is probably less than in any previous year. Imperial has gone to a computer system and changed their numbering but for purposes of informing our mem-bers what is being made we are using Heisey numbers.

All Provincial has now been discontinued. All Zodiac has also been discontinued. Antique Blue is discontinued and nothing in a Heisey mold is being made in Blue Haze. Two new colors have been added to the Imperial line but only Ultra Blue has been used for Heisey items. Fern Green is the other new one.

Imperial did not start to make Heisey Rose this year as was mentioned at last convention.

The price of the new candelbra is nearly as much as the original sells for and if you are observant you can detect the differences. For one thing the bobeches are flat rather than slightly cupped as Heisey's were.

Don't Let This Fool You

A new item came out a week or so ago that may not be called a fake but may be most misleading to beginning collectors. The mold was made by Robert Wetzel of Zanesville and the item was made by Guernsey Glass Co. in Cambridge. It is a copy, rather poor, of the Winged Scroll butter dish in a miniature size and in Crown Tuscan. Crown Tuscan is a pink opaque glass originally made by Cambridge Glass Co. There is actually an R. W. on the bottom close to the center by the raised base, which is hard to see. We'll try to have a picture by next issue.

Before anyone starts to jump up and down in rage because of this, please remember that this is not illegal. Heisey never made this item in a miniature size. It is not signed Heisey. It is rather cute and a limited number are being made to make it collectible. You have been forewarned. If you like it buy it. Rumor has it that it may appear in mild glass or emerald.

Items which really should make you irate are those poor items made with the Heisey trademark which are meant to deceive. The extremely poor quality of the fakes should also steer you away from them.

"DOE HEAD"

DOE HEAD BOOK END

As the glass rises from the bottom it curves inward forming what would be its neck. The head sits on this area and swells out from same. Its chin rests on the neck. The mouth is shown slightly open and the upper lip and nose are shown as one piece, which protrudes from the head and is turned upward. Its forehead is nearly straight up and down. The eyes are round raised areas in cupped recesses. The ears are large with the right one slightly in front of the left and they are cupped out towards the sides, as large ears are characteristic of the deer.

The Imperial Corporation does not show this animal as having been made by them.

Those people in "Sudsville" are at it again and are finding great Heisey outside their own ballpark now...how about a #4225 with the CIRCUS ETCHINGwow...the "Findin Illini" found a #1469 RIDGELEIGH round decanter..nice find.....

An upstate New Yorker who claims to be a new collector has really come across some good Heisey in a bunch..33 pieces of Sahara, luncheon set in #1401 EMPRESS, a console set in #1404, OLD SANDWICH that's a beautiful set4 #3390, CARCASSONE sodas and OLD SANDWICH tumblers...that's worth writing about anytime...also found sound asleep a #1205 FANCY LOOP water bottle...man that's a gem...says she got her start from her husband's grandmother's sahara #1405 IPSWICH gobletswhat a start.....I just heard a couple of Ipswich collectors fall off their chairs....keep hunting and writing.....

One of my faithful reports a good month for some unusual items from out of the hills of Pa...an amber flashed #4211 irridescent diamond optic 8½" vase.....a great find in #116 floral bowl with etched maple leaves in flamingo....rare in any color.....even crystal...a #1193 Yeoman conserve in hawthorne and a ruby flashed #337 TOURAINE toothpick and that's a very rare toothpick......

Man those Okies must have really thrown the Heisey around cause a couple have sure been finding some right fancy pieces #1205 FANCY LOOP claret jug...haven't seen that before..#1255 PINEAPPLE AND FAN emerald table set #1245 RING BAND custard table set.. ..a #3397 GASCONY sahara tomato juice pitcher....#1280 WINGED SCROLL emerald spooner....a very nice item.... #1205 FANCY LOOP punch glass..a #1540 LARIAT cologne with enamel decoration done by A. W. Charleton Company 6 TWENTIETH CENTURY dawn juices, #1415 and a butter cover for #433 GRECIAN BORDER (GREEK KEY) very good haul, hope that wasn't on a weekend...maybe I should go to Oklahoma instead of...

This pattern contained eleven items that were available in a series of sizes from small to large: there were three styles of nappies, plates, two styles of jugs, stemware, tumblers, two styles of sodas and cruets. The 393 Narrow Flute pattern was one of Heisey's largest patterns in terms of the different types of items $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right) \left($ expected, Catalog 56 makes no reference to the 393 Narrow Flute pattern since this catalog was issued sometime between 1900 and 1908 prior to the introduction of Narrow Flute. The 1911 Booklet "Table Glass-And How to Use It" shows five items of the 393 Narrow Flute pattern (III 9, pg 7). Heisey catalog No. 75 issued around 1913 has 12 full pages showing 133 different items in 393 Narrow Flute. Pages 50-55, 57-59 of Vogel's Book II are copies of pages 220-225, 228-230 from Catalog 75. Catalog No. 76, a small catalog issued around 1915 has 5 pages showing Narrow Flute. Catalog 102 issued about 1924 has 10 full pages showing 142 items of 393 Narrow Flute. Page 56 of Vogel's Book II is found in Catalog 102, page 100. Heisey Catalog No. 206 issued about 1922 offers 154 items of 393 and 3931/2 for sale. Pressed ware Catalog 109 issued about 1930 shows 119 items of 393 on 9 pages. The 1935 Heisey catalog reprinted by Virginia Mc-Lean shows 24 pieces in 393. The 1952 catalog still pictured 8 items of Narrow Flute. The jugs pictured in the 1952 catalog were designed and placed in the pattern line at or very near the beginning of the pat-This, they were offered tern. for sale for at least 40 years.

I made a survey to determine what items in the 393 Narrow Flute pattern were made in colored glass and in what color of glass. I wrote to 50 collectors of Heisey glass and over 50% responded. Of the many items made only six have been found in colored glass; the 6" footed almond (Vogel II, p 56), individual almond (II, 56), individual cream/sugar (II, 59), 9" footed banana split (II, p 56) and the bitters bottle (II, 58). The 6" almond was in flamingo and moongleam; the individual almonds in flamingo, moongleam, marigold, sahara, heliotrope and

hawthorne; the individual cream/ sugar in flamingo, moongleam, marigold and trial 'blue; the footed banana split in flamingo and the bitters bottle in cobalt. The colored items seem to be more in the gift category than anything else. Colored items would have been produced after 1924.

The 6" footed almond and the individual almond in the 353 Medium Flat Panel pattern (VII 35) are of the same style or design as the ones in the 393 Narrow Flute pattern. The same molds must have been used to produce these items for both pattern lines.

There are only 3 types of items in 393½: 5 each of three series of nappies covering regular, flared and shallow; three 4½ oz. low footed sherbets; and a 2 piece oyster cocktail set. All are re-designs of original 393 items.

A few items have been seen with silver overlay designs. Some items have been seen with an applied organic coating. One pitcher in particular I've seen had a coating near the color of marigold. Items have been seen with small painted enamel floral decorations. I've even seen 10" plates that had a mirror coating on the underside. Jokingly, you could watch yourself eat dinner.

Items in the stemware series are so close together that the

various sizes are not easy to identify. The 2 oz. wine is 4½" tall and 1-7/8" in diameter at the top. The 5 oz. claret is 6" tall and the 9 oz. goblet is 7" tall.

Complete dinner place settings accompanied by a four piece table set, serving bowls and other accessories can be collected in the 393 Narrow Flute pattern, if desired.

Previous articles discuss the 2 handled dish (III 8, p 2) and the 2 compartment relish(III 10, p 7) of the 393 pattern in detail.

Colonial pattern #602 (VII, pg 133) looks much like the 393 Narrow Flute pattern because it has the narrow flutes and, when needed, the square shaped handles. However, the plain band around the top is much larger than that of 393.

There is some confusion that can be caused by pattern #472, Narrow Flute with Rim. The pattern is quite different from 393 as the flutes are much narrower and the plain band at the top is usually wider. However, short circuiting the 472-473 pattern name by dropping the "with rim" has lead to one party thinking 393 pattern and the other party thinking 472-473 pattern.

I think our display will prove to be most interesting this year. Two clubs have used their meeting nights to set up on a trial run and they look great. It will be nice to see a whole collection of candlesticks, or pitchers and early colors, vases, gem colors, tumblers, ash trays etc. etc and may give people new ideas on what to collect. The color tables will again be there. For more complete pattern identification the museum will be open during show hours and you can browse there all you like.

Bob Ryan is back this month with his column. His father-in-law, Elmer Howard (Heisey News Vol 3 #7 page 3) died on May 8.

Our attorney, Stan Darling, is much improved and we hope he will be able to emcee the dedication ceremony.

In our very first issue of Heisey News I wrote about 1428 Warwick. I mentioned the color Hawthorne as being one of the colors made. Loren and Virginia Yeakley had a pair of double candleholders in a purple color in their book "Heisey Glass in Color." When the book was

published there was not as much known about color as there is today. They now know, of course, that they are Imperial Heather and we have them in our cabinet of Imperial at the museum. Apparently Imperial never made Warwick for production though it is known in both Heather and Verde but it is not on their list of Heisey by Imperial. So many new things have been learned in recent years that corrections sometimes need to be made and we will update our information if it is found to be incortect

The board of directors authorized the printing of a business type card for HCA which gives some information on the club and museum. These are for members to pass out to prospective members. You may pick up some at the convention. Those not planning to attend may send an SASE. (25 take 20¢ postage.)

Postage is one of our biggest expenses. As you may know, we have mailed once by second class and the newsletters arrived very late. 

But whatever type of Heisey Glassware you choose . . . hand-blown or hand-cast . . . etched, rock-cut or plain . . . you can be confident that your pattern is a rich design, the product of precision craftsmen, and will survive each passing trend.

The patterns shown in this book, plus many additional patterns of Heisey Hand-Wrought Crystal can be found in jewelry and department stores throughout America.

HEISEY LORE

One of Heisey's designers in the early 1950's was Jane Wilson Scott, one of my art majors who graduated from Denison in 1949. Clarence asked me to employ her as my assistant because I was swamped with work. Here is a quote from her letter of April 7, 1975, in answer to my request regarding the work she did under my direction. I had almost forgotten about her until I saw some drawings in Emogene Shomaker's collection signed "Jane Scott". They were displayed at the June show.

"For your archives, my main work for Heisey was producing the last catalog, which I start-ed in September of 1949 (which would have been better looking in blue and white matte, as you and I wanted, instead of that ghastly glossy yellow.) I believe I spent a year doing scale drawings of everything they were producing-no-you had already done a lot before I came. Then I did several glassware demonstrations (Detroit, Cincinnati and Canton) of how handmade glassware is made. Incidentally, I started a book once based on the big poster sign boards of the steps in making glassware which you did. I suppose these were lost in the fire too. (Was the whole plant destroyed?*) I've still got them (the notes and sketches) somewhere. I didn't do much designing. In fact, the very few things they ever produced were a Plantation mayonnaise and ladle, and a Cabachon center-hand-led sandwich plate. Jane Phil-lips was the "Jane" who design-ed Heisey Rose. I still have the catalog and enjoy looking at it, and wool gathering."-end quote.

Jane Scott is now Mrs. Robert H. Reed, the wife of a Presbyterian minister. She is still an active artist in Portland, Oregon.

* There was no fire at the Heisey factory. We do not know to what she is referring.



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

I can remember as a small child going from Zanesville to Newark on the interrurban to see the Heiseys on a Sunday with my mother, brother and grandmother. How well I remember Augustus Heisey and his wife. We often had fried chicken and all the trimmings for dinner and peach-There es and cake for dessert. was always happiness and much laughter. Major Heisey would take us to the plant at 303 Oakwood and, so to speak, load us with the latest to lug home on the interrurban, but I can't remember going through the plant when it was really in action to see things made.


Heisey pieces became very common stuff in our household. Everywhere you looked and every thing you touched was Heisey, marked and unmarked. My dear mother had so much of it (and now I shudder) that she used wonderful colonial pieces as common ashtrays.
