





COMMENTS: This is another of the imitation cut patterns. When fire polished it sparkles brilliantly, but if not well fire polished, it looks like hundreds of other tumblers of the same period. As with many others, #115 Catseye has a star bottom and a ground rim. Unmarked, with a very faint possibility of existing marked.

Yes, Mary Gabriel is 103 years old, and is in remarkably good health for one of her years. She was born in Delaware county Ohio on March 8, 1873. She attended a one room log cabin school for a while, but she couldn't attend for very long, as she had to help with the chores at home. She walked ten miles to get books to read after she dropped out of school. Mary continued to be a great reader until about three years ago, when her eyesight became poor. 

The dish is shaped like a "punkin" seed. It has a ground and polished bottom rim. The side curves up to a flat rim around the dish and around the frog. The frog is shown in outline with one large raised eye. The front leg is raised with three toes raised with four toes.



HEISEY BAR BOTTLE #1489

The #1489 Puritan pattern line included a bar bottle. This all glass Heisey bottle was invented by T. Clarence Heisey for which he was granted U. S. design patent No.129,-730 on September 30, 1941. The patent was assigned to the A.H. Heisey Co. of Newark, Ohio.

The bar bottle was available in two sizes: a 24oz. Rye bottle and a 4oz. bitters bottle. Figure I with this article shows a perspective view of the rye bottle. Figure 2 is a vertical sectional view taken along the center line, and Figure 3 is a top plan view of the rye bottle. The stopper with the rye bottle was the #111 solid glass stopper while the bitters bottle had a short metal tube device for the top. There was also a 4 oz. cologne bottle almost identical to the rye bottle. It had a #112 stopper.

The 1956 Heisey catalog and Price list #33 (page 22) offered the rye and bitters bottles for sale with three degrees of surface finish. The most costly of the conditions was called "fully ground and cut". In this case, all of the flat surfaces of the bottle were ground perfectly flat and, in the case of the rye bottle and cologne, all the flat surfaces of the stopper were also ground perfectly flat. After that, all the sharp edges on the bottle and the stopper were cut. A better description might have been to say that all the sharp edges were beveled. Thus, the fully ground and cut bottles and stoppers have a very beautiful finished look to them. The three figures show the fully ground and cut rye bottle.

The least costly of the three finishes is where the flat surfaces and edges as moulded are merely fire polished. The third surface condition is between the two already mentioned and only the top and bottom of the bottle are ground, the rest of the bottle and stopper being fire polished.


In 1956, the rye bottle with #111 stopper, fire polished only, was retail priced at \$10.50 while the fully ground and cut bottle was retail priced at \$17.95. Thus, \$7.45 was added to the price of each bottle for the grinding and polishing operation.

#600 CANDLESTICK by JACK METCALF



The number 600 candlestick is very similar to the #150 saucer foot. The overall size and configuration are about the same. The single most distinguishing feature is the handle. The #600 has a squarish handle attached to the candle holder and the #150 has a round handle attached to the saucer. Some less important differences are that the saucer for the #600 is not set up on a foot, nor is there a set of bands around the saucer. The bands around the top of the candle holder are included in the #600, though.





The immediate 'reward' was a substantial raise in salary and an excellent training by Rod that proved invaluable through the years ahead. Rod trained me in salesmanship, knowledge of product, how Heisey was made, what it was composed of, why was it the best handmade glassware on the market.

Eventually I was given a territory, and after my first road trip, my wife Pat asked Rod, "Do you think Ernie will make it as a Heisey Representative?" He commented, "Yes, after we take the rough edges off the diamond and polish him up! He will be one of our best." (Rod had a way of building up confidence in a neophite and his family!) He often told the salesmen, "Get to know people, take an interest in them. They are the ones, the buyer or owner of the store, who will make you a success. Also don't forget that you need the men and women who work in the factory, whether they work to make the glass, decorate it, pack it, or ship it. You are NOW part of the HEISEY FAMILY and we all have to work together."

A short time after I had started on the road as a 'Heisey Man', I was hospitalized for an infection of the lymph glands. Rod flew in from Newark, Ohio immediately and informed the Evanston Hospital that I was one of 'his boys' and told me not to worry about any hospital or doctor bills, he would take care of them. The little black book he pulled out to make notes, quote: Life is too short.



After eleven fruitful and enjoyable years with the Heisey Company, I have built up my Heisey glassware collection, as my experience with Rod made me a confirmed collector.

Again, I don't mean to be critical as we really appreciate Heisey and the Heisey News. We must keep the Heisey News accurate.



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
