



# TREASURER'S REPORT



Sales improved in April mainly on the strength of Bead and real Heisey sales. Bead sales accounted for \$1010 of the total sales of approximately \$2700. Real Heisey sales totaled \$922.50. Overall sales are still below budget.

# **Digging Up Heisey**

A mid April day at the Museum seemed like any other early spring day, but it soon turned into an unexpected archeological excavation. Just when we think we know and have all the details about the Heisey Glass plant in this small industrial town, we are surprised, and humbled. The Museum received a call that a local man who lives just down the street from the Heisey factory was excavating his back yard for a home addition. While digging he kept hitting pockets of glass chunks and fragments of pieces bearing the "H". He called the Museum to inform us that he had discovered a Heisey dump. Jack and I went to investigate and sure enough, there was lots of cullet (large glass pieces used for feeding the glass furnace and starting a batch of glass). These are the large chunks of glass that were busted and Jack hammered from each furnace once cooled to reset for the next batch of New "hot metal" glass. We found several pieces of cullet with the furnace lining still attached.

Most all of the glass cullet is of Heisey crystal and some "lime" glass which again was a base ingredient in making crystal glass. It had a green tint to it, hence it's name. There was also some Vaseline, but not a lot of it. There are many small pieces of discarded Heisey riddled through the man's excavated yard. He told Jack and I that he was going to use the medium size cullet pieces for gravel in his driveway because there is so much of it. The freshly turned dirt just sparkled with Heisey pieces, parts and chunks!





The best and most exciting part of this is that Heisey is still being discovered in Newark and residents are excited about it. The man told us that his original 1920 deed states that the home is part of "the Heisey Addition", which were houses built for the workers of A.H. Heisey and Co. Our best guess is that this was a workers home and he had need for fill dirt, and these were the scraps that were not able to be reused to remake quality ware, and he was able to have it removed for free fill to raise the elevation and grade of his yard.

It was fun to pick through, the Heisey fragments, and different size chunks of cullet glass that littered this man's yard. We will reserve some of the larger and better pieces for the Museum collection and factory display (the pieces with furnace lining still attached). The other items and pieces of cullet we would like to share our fun findings with YOU! look for a special silent auction collection of these items and some Heisey cullet at the National Convention in June.

The items we found matched the vintage of the house, they include: pieces of Hawthorne, Vaseline, Tudor, Colonial tumblers, candelabra threaded arm pieces, star bottom bowls and cut off tops of stemware from the blow pipe.

This just goes to show you that Heisey can be found anywhere, although, I don't recommend digging for it in this manner, but if you do, just know your odds are always better in Newark!



### 1519 Waverly Sugar and Cream

By 1940, Art Deco was pretty well over. Fashion demanded designs that were fluid, organic. One of Heisey's contributions was a pattern numbered 1519 and first called Oceanic. That was a fitting name. A languidly swirling optic featured on all pieces, suggesting ocean swells. The edges frothed with bubbling waves breaking on shore. Shells clasped some pieces, while sea horses frolicked on others. Wave crests burbled to the tops of yet other pieces. (A lion surveys from the top of a trinket box in an absurd contradiction to the general theme. Perhaps he thinks he is a sea lion.)

Regrettably, the name didn't stick, lasting through most of the war but disappearing sometime after that. Was "Oceanic" prone to mispronunciation? Did Pacific Theater war operations sour thoughts of Oceania? Did the name simply not appeal to customers or store buyers? For whatever reason, the pattern name was changed to Waverly. The new name wrapped the wave motif up with the American love of British coziness and class by referencing Sir Walter Scott's Waverly novels, which were still widely read at the time. It might have also been a nod to the town of Waverly, Ohio, some distance south of Newark, which may have also been named for the Scott novels. Exercising my inner curmudgeon, Oceanic was the better name, making clear what the design was all while the punniness of Waverly about, needlessly dilutes the intent of the designer, Horace King.

Heisey made two sizes of cream and sugar sets in Waverly, both footed. The larger set was what would have been called a hotel size just a few years earlier, but by 1940 the "hotel" designation was hardly ever used.

There was also a set in individual size. The individual set was sometimes sold with a #1509 Queen Ann condiment tray, since Waverly lacked one of its own. (Fig. 1)

In most patterns it was typical to make the individual size a scaled down version of the regular size. That wasn't exactly the case for Waverly. The bodies and handles are about the same shape. What is unusual is that the foot of the large size is not the same as the foot of the individual size. The large set has feet that are eight-sided, but not strictly angular. The slightly irregular contour echoes fins. enhancing the naturalism the whole pattern strove for. The small set has round feet (fig. 2). perfect circularity, their geometric Their conformity, is jarring when compared with the soft contours of most other Waverly items. The circular foot looks as though it was applied from a separate dollop of glass, much like many pieces of stemware, but in fact the foot was moulded in one piece with the rest of the body.

Both sets feature handles inspired by jets of seawater, joining in a bubbly union to make each handle. Shells and bubbles cusp the bottoms of the bowls, although in the creams and sugars the detail is often lost. Go to a large piece like the cake salver to see the detail better.

Waverly sugars and creams were made in crystal. A few pieces of Waverly were made in honey amber, but I don't believe the creams and sugars were among them. You are invited to brag if you know otherwise. Creams and sugars may or may not be marked; if they are, the mark will be on the underside of the foot.

The sugars and creams of Waverly were fully pressed, the handles and foot pressed as part of the body, rather than stuck on in a separate operation. The individual creams and sugars were pressed in two-part moulds; the seams are often still apparent, either by sight or touch, running along the handles. Sometimes the mould mark on the foot of an individual size piece will have been twisted, probably as the foot cooled or was being smoothed in a finishing operation.

The large-size sugar and cream deserve some extra attention when it comes to mould marks. Now, that is something most collectors don't give much attention, unless it is to criticize the seam for still being evident. In the case of Waverly, most examples, probably the vast majority, were made in two-part moulds. A few, however, were made in four-part moulds. The mould seams are most apparent on the foot, so check there first if you want to know which variation you have. Both kinds of moulds will show seams along the handles and on the ridges of the foot immediately below the handles. Four-part moulds show an additional set of seams perpendicular to the first set. In some four-part examples the additional mould seams can be seen going up the middle of the sides, but it will nearly always be most obvious on the foot (fig. 3).

I have seen four-part examples with #507 Orchid or #515 Heisey Rose etches or with #965 Narcissus cutting, but there is no reason to suppose those are the only possibilities. If I were guessing—which I am about to do—I would guess that the four-part moulds were the earlier version of the large sugars and creams. Popular items typically had multiple moulds, and Waverly was certainly popular. The scarcity of the four-part examples suggests that the original moulds were either abandoned, probably for some technical reason, or that at least one additional set of moulds was made in the two-part style. Only one set of the large-size moulds survive in the warehouse. One of these days, we could always take a look at them to see how many parts they have. So far as I know, the individual sugar and cream were made only in two-part moulds.

If you are really fastidious about checking off all the boxes in your cream and sugar checklist, you will want to keep your eye out for the fourpart examples, but be prepared to wait a while before finding them. Thanks to Dennis Headrick for bringing the four-part versions to my attention.

At least eight cuttings were used on Waverly sugars and creams. The large set was made with #883 Royal York, #913 Everglade, #939 Festoon Wreath, #941 Barcelona, #947 Enchantress, and #957 Oriental. Both size sets were made with #942 Harvester or #965 Narcissus. More popular, however, were the #507 Orchid and #515 Heisey Rose etches, also found on both sizes of sets. Etched sets are probably more common than plain ones.

Waverly's popularity barely wavered. (Sorry-Wait. No, I'm not.) Except for a brief hiatus during the war, Pattern No. 1519 (as either Waverly or Oceanic) had a place in every price list or catalogue from 1940 until the factory's 1957 closing. Imperial continued to make some pieces in the pattern for a few more vears. Imperial made the large size of cream and sugar with the Heisey Rose and Orchid etches. Plain ones probably exist, too. Imperial doesn't seem to have made the individualsized set. If in doubt who made yours, grab your ultraviolet light and look for Heisey's vellow-green glow or Imperial's whitish reaction.

#### Vital Statistics

All in crystal. All fire-polished. Mark, if present, on bottom of foot.


Footed (regular) sugar: height—4"; width at top— $3\frac{1}{2}$ "; length, handle to handle—5". Foot, angle to angle— $2\frac{1}{2}$ ". No consistent differences between two-part or four-part versions.

Footed (regular) cream: height— $4\frac{1}{4}$ "; width at top— 3"; length, handle to spout—5". Foot, angle to angle— $2\frac{1}{2}$ ". No consistent differences between twopart or four-part versions.

Individual sugar: height—3"; width at top— $2\frac{1}{2}$ "; length, handle to handle—4". Foot diameter—2".

Individual cream: height— $3\frac{1}{4}$ "; width at top— $2\frac{3}{8}$ "; length, handle to spout— $3\frac{1}{2}$ ". Foot diameter—2".



### **Percy and Vivian Moore Weekend** will be as dazzling as the Northern Lights!

Even if you don't see this phenomenal light display, you will see plenty of dazzling glass in colors echoing the Northern Lights - Flamingo, Moongleam, Sahara, Hawthorne, Tangerine and more.

Members of the Northwoods Heisey Study Club, hosts for this year's PVMW, have been gathering beautiful glass to entice you into bidding high at our silent and live auctions, thus raising dollars to support our beloved museum.
