

# HEISEY CANDLESTICKS Cabochon - 1951








#1951 2-lite

The Cabochon line was introduced by Heisey in about 1950 or 1951 and was produced to some extent until closing. Designed by Horace King, it was touted as "the ideal combination of two perfect shapes." (I.E., the circle and square) Heisey seemed to think well of the simplicity of the design and part of the line is covered by patent. To the best of my knowledge none of the candleholders was produced in color, although the colors amber, dawn and limelight are known in a few pieces of the pattern.

Three and one-half candleholders were produced by Heisey in this pattern, and two and one-half are shown above. First, there is the one-light candlelette which was produced for the entire span of Cabochon production and is probably the most common. The candelette was offered with the Arcadia and the Moonglo cut-

Secondly, the two light was produced from the beginning until about 1954. This is a fairly massive piece of glass, with large base, flat ground on the bottom,

and the ornamentation in the center between the two candleholders. ornamentation is unusual in that only two items in the entire line had any ornamentation at all. Note also that the decoration was adapted by Horace King and produced as a popular Heisey advertising sign.

The third Cabochon candleholder is a 1951 hurricane lamp and globe. The hurricane lamp is listed only in the 1951 catalogue supplement #31 and has proven to be quite an elusive item. No picture is shown with the listing and I have never seen one personally. All hope is not lost however, as a picture of the globe is shown above. In the reprinted 1953 catalogue #32 is shown a Domesti-Cator line including a #1951 hurricane globe, thus accounting for the one-half Heisey candleholder. So all you have to do is imagine what a proper base for a #1951 Cabochon hurricane lamp would look like, mentally place the #1951 globe on it, and there you are. It should prove to be a substantial item, though, since the candelette lists at \$11.40 per dozen and the hurricane lamp lists at \$144.00 per dozen!!!




In 1934 Heisey brought out as new wares to the trade six new Silhouette etchings done in a Circus motif. The etchings are all closely related and available on the same pieces of glass. I suspect that a "set" could have consisted of all of one design or pieces of any of the six designs since all matched. All the Circus motifs have a decorative scalloped band around the top of the glass reminiscent of the scalloped edge of a circus tent. This unique feature will quickly and positively identify a Circus etching.

In November, 1934, a trade journal gave the following report: "A.H. Heisey & Co. have just introduced a new line of glassware which is interesting. The decoration is an etching that pictures a series of circus scenes, and is available in both old-fashioned and high-ball sets. Six assorted scenes, just as they appear in a regular three-ring circus, are shown in the group, with clowns, performing elephants, camels and horses, and other ideas. It is the only thing of its kind on the glassware market, and it can be recommended as a charming novelty for Holiday business."

Each etching has several designs about the piece of glass and none is repeated. Thus #471 Rube has a Tuba player, a "Rube" (or maybe clown), and a unicycle rider. The Lion Tamer (#472) has the Lion Tamer and 3 poses of Lions or large cats. #473 Camel consists of a Camel, Strongman, and a Snake Charmer. Clowns (#474) has a Horse, Acrobat, Clown and Dog. An Elephant holding a lady on his trunk and a midget are shown on #475 Elephant. The Western Scene has a Cowboy and an Indian, both on horses and a Fat Man.

These etchings were available only on a barware assortment. They are very popular with collectors and most often found on one of the sodas. When found, the decanters and ice buckets are striking. The designs are definitely of a "fun" type and were certainly produced as novelty glassware with great appeal as

gift ware. Availability is fairly limited and a collector who has an example of each Circus etching may count himself as fortunate.

The Circus etchings are known only on crystal wares and on unsigned pieces except for the \*1401 Empress ice bucket, which may be signed on the foot. The etchings were produced from 1934 until circa 1938. The etchings may not have been made for four years since availability is relatively poor. Circus may not have been a particularly popular seller when new.

#### To SII Salesmen:

The factory closed down Friday, June 30th, for annual vacation, and before the close down we were able to make most of your new samples. Attached hereto are photographs of the new lines together with price lists.

We are hooked up with Vernon Kilns on two promotions; one is Etch #518. "Pan American Lei", on a new stemware shape. Vernon has a dinner line that matches this etching and we have a place setting for our offices and a dinner plate for all salesmen to show with this etching. The Pan American Lei promotion is sponsored by the Pan American Air Lines. The premiere showing was made in Honolulu on June 26th and the American premiere will be shown in New York on July 10th at the Plaza Hotel. This Lei promotion is a store-wide deal that will cover china, glass, Dirilyte flatware, linens, draperies and quite a lot of other kindred lines on which we do not have full information as yet. But, there will be large brochures, posters, other material for the dealers. Pan American Air Lines is to fly fresh Leis to the various shows and when the store promotions start they will continue this.

Personally, I don't think this deal is going to sell any too well although there are any number of big buying groups tied in with the promotion and we will get a lot of publicity. Vernon Kilns had considerable trouble in working out decals for this pattern. This idea was then abandoned for prints and fill-ins, hence our delay in getting necessary samples, having photographs and other material ready by July 1st.

The other promotion we are working on with Vernon is "Winchester '73". This is tied in with the movie of the same name, which opened at the Paramount Theatre in New York on June 7th and is being released throughout the country during July, August and September. We will send you a big brochure put out by Universal-International Pictures and this

shows the tie-in with glass.

This Winchester '73 silhouette etching I think will make a big hit. A number of important buyers have seen it and all like it. It is going to be photographed and publicized in many ways, showing the stars of the picture -- Shelly Winters and James Stewart. This picture was not supposed to be released until the middle of August but as another film called Colt-45 beat them on the opening, they decided to put this picture on the market at once. Another reason why we are not ready to send you all the material on these two promotions.

We are getting any number of letters from various theatres throughout the country wanting to know who handles this Winchester '73 line in their respective cities.

You will note that every piece in this etching had a different western cowboy theme and as Hop-A-Long Cassidy, Roy Rogers and Gene Autry pictures are leading box offices, television and radio programs, there is a tremendous interest in this type of merchandise all over the country and I am sure you will have no trouble in placing this with your important accounts.

We have four new stemware shapes, plain blown. I think you will have good reception on #5082 Mid Century. It is priced right and has a low stem, which seems to be the trend on all types of stemware today.

The #5097\* and #5083 are also unusual stem lines and should have a good market with the modern type of furnishings so popular today.

The #6060 is our #4004 shape and the plain sodas and cocktail items have been added. #6060 is a good line for ranch type homes and should go very well with the modern California dinnerware patterns. There are three new cuttings on this shape which are in a better price range than we have had for some time. They are not made to tie in with any particular

dinner or silver line but will go with most any of the important patterns. The trend today seems to be getting away from conventional period type cuttings and floral cuttings are losing ground. It seems that simple bands have the nod over any other type decorations and cuttings.

We would like to have your reaction on these patterns as soon as possible as we have a lot of others in work that we don't want to sample out at this time as it looks like we are going to be just as busy this Fall as we ever were during the War years. Business is coming in in wonderful shape.

There are a few other new items such as #2351 Double Old Fashion and the two new cocktails. The moulds for these items have been made for several years but we have never put them on the market until just now.

We are reinstating the old #1187 Epergne with vase as this was always a good item and if you will use one of the epergnettes in this item instead of vase, it brings up another new idea that has lots of possibilities.

Don't forget to follow up on The Glass Menagerie picture which opens in August at Radio City for the premier showing of four weeks. We will have newspaper mats, radio spots and a merchandise letter to send out to the trade. A lot of stores are hooking up with this promotion. Warner Bros. think this is going to be one of the big pictures of the year and your dealers can get displays in the theaters where the picture is showing and this will result in selling a lot of additional bowls and candlesticks for table settings. So, don't overlook this bet.

We hope to have our Fall Advertising Portfolios ready in the next three weeks. We are changing the tempo a bit on this new advertising program and as soon as we get proofs back, we will rush them to you and tell you what is behind it. We can't give you this information until

# British Registration Marks

My articles about the British registration numbers on Heisey glassware appeared in the "Heisey News" issues of March 1975, page 8 and August 1975, page 7. As was indicated, Rd No 350676 was found to be associated with the #300 Peerless colonial pattern and that Rd No 350676 was granted on December 28, 1899. The purpose of this article is to describe where the registration numbers are located on the #300 Peerless covered sugar and covered butter.

First, there is met a single specific spot or position where the registration number was placed on the #300 glassware. For the #300 footed stemware, the Rd No was formed in the shape of a circle, usually around a diamond H, and was placed in the center of the bottom on the underside surface. A sketch of this mark was shown in my first article previously mentioned. In the case of the #300 bowl, there was a large diamond H on the inside surface of the bottom at the center. However, the Rd No 350676, also on the inside, was located out at the circumference where the side and bottom of the bowl meet. The Rd number was not in a circular form, but was essentially in a line form that followed the contour of the bowl.


The covered butter and covered sugar, when and if marked with a British registration number, are marked in an


interesting location. The two pieces I know of were marked in the following way. The butter bottom had a large diamond H located at the center of the bottom on the inside surface. The registration number written as Rd No 350676 was located on the inside surface of the butter cover, well inside the cover near the finial as shown in the sketch with this article. The covered sugar was marked in the same way. The sugar bottom had a large diamond H on the inside surface of the bottom at the center. The Rd No was located on the inside surface of the cover. again, well inside the cover near the finial as shown in the sketch. For both items, the Rd Nos were essentially in a line form following the contour of the covers.

Let me know if you have an item in Heisey's #300 colonial pattern not previously mentioned that has the registration number. Indicate the location of the Rd. number. So far I am aware of 7 stemware, an 8" bowl, the covered butter and covered sugar with the Rd Nos in the locations as indicated in this article.

Ed. note - The illustrations are taken from a pre-1900 catalog showing only Peerless. The lid shown in Joe's drawing looks more like that of the honey dish. Items before 1900 were NOT marked.



## Questions & Answers

Could you tell me in what colors the Ridgeleigh pattern can be found? Was it made in flamingo and moongleam?

Ridgeleigh is most often seen in crystal. A few pieces were made in Sahara and Zircon. These are the 12" oval floral bowl, the 6" candlevase, 8" vase, coaster, 4" cigarette box, square ash tray and cigarette holder.

Items in color that look like dawn is Imperial's charcoal and only cigarette holder and ash trays can be found. These were also made in heather, a purple shade. Cigarette holders in cobalt are also probably Imperial. They are finished on the top like the Imperial charcoal and heather and not at all like Heisey. There is, however, room here for a little doubt. It was not made in flamingo or moongleam.

## #6009A Zeisel Roundelay

See December 1977 issue, pages 2 and 3 for more on this pattern. When we printed the pictures I neglected to look on the back of the original picture where the name "Roundelay" was written. With so much material to go through and so little time I also had not seen this original factory list which gives the item names and original prices. It is interesting to note that Zeisel designs seem to be designated with an "A" after the number. "1637A Town and Country is her design as well. Then there is another one, "6007A but we



have not yet discovered just what it is except that it is a blown tumbler line.

Neither of the two blown patterns,

#6007A and #6009A apparently achieved any success since neither is shown in the supplements or catalog of later dates.

That the apple ash tray has a number. It is #1549 and is listed in our 1976 INDEX OF HEISEY GLASSWARE. It was also pictured in one of the Wartime Salesman which we reprinted in 1977, though no detail can be seen.

That HCA had nothing whatever to do with the production of three blue colts made in Ultra Blue by Imperial.

That the Fighting Rooster with sev-

eral colors in it now sits in a museum cabinet with the other Heisey animals and has for some time. There is also an amber rooster on the shelves, an amber Clydesdale and a blue and crystal fighting rooster.

That Heisey did not make Fancy Loop for Sears Roebuck, it certainly sold them some for resale since it is pictured in their 1897 catalog which is in the museum.

## LETTERS, we get letters....

I really enjoyed the reprint of the Irwin and C. Heisey letters in the July issue. Just want to encourage you in continuing this basic kind of information.

In several places "this was done" was evidently added to the copy. I have some additional observations:

Proposed 14" Egg Plate was made from 14" Sandwich (as noted) there was also an egg plate made from the 15" Oval Platter. I have one of these.

Proposed Cream Soup was also made. I have the same shape as the sugar -- only wider and more squat. Plate was the same as the 7" Mayo underplate.

Proposed larger sugar may not have been made per this request but there is quite a variance in sizes, weights, and foot shapes. This is mostly noticeable on the sugar but the creams follow the same pattern of differences. As of this point I have made no attempt to classify the changes but of the eight sugars I have been studying only two of them might be classified as "identical" -- all of the others have distinct differences of one kind or another. Some of these are probably the result of several mold reworkings over a period of time to take care of wear and tear of constant use. Others may be the result of a deliberate change.

Proposed small nappy from 6" plate was probably made. There is a 5" bowl with vertical loops.

I have basically come to the conclusion that the "heavy" stem pressed items were the first production stems in the Lariat pattern. So far all of the "heavy" ones have been marked. I have seen them (heavy) in goblet, ice tea, wine, cocktail, oyster cocktail and have had a champagne reported but haven't been able to add it to my collection or seen it "for real!" The purchase dates that I have been able to determine verify this. A "heavy" item has never been reported in any decorated form. All of the vases and other items made from the stemware is of the "light" version. All of the ads I've seen so far, even the earliest announcing the pattern, have been with the "light version."

I got a "1540 Lariat Ice Tea in the HCA Auction with "Maryland" cutting. When the item arrived a note from Bob was attached -- "not Maryland, a late variant, will be in cutting book." Is there any

possibility of getting some "advance information" on this one?

In a previous letter I mentioned a cutting on Lariat that I have dubbed Moonwind. Just added another piece to the known list: (#42) 13" Gardenia (Others are Cream/Sugar, Crimped Floral, 14" Sandwich, Oval Floral, and 11" Cookie)

Dennis L. Headrick, OR Ed Note - The "Moonwind" was named by Mr. Heedrick. It is not a known Heisey cutting.

This unusual item is a padded brocade box with a piece of glass inserted inside the lid. In the bottom is a #411 Rib and Panel oval candy box which just fits. This piece was brought to the museum by Theresa Callahan of Westerville, Ohio, a new member. This box would not have been made by Heisey but apparently some company bought the Heisey glass for this purpose. Since the glass in the lid fits down against the oval bottom it may have been used for candy.






