The plates and cups and saucers are #1483 pressed Stanhope and the stemware is #4083 blown Stanhope, a short-lived pattern of the late thirties. It appeared only in the supplement to 211-16 which was dated 6/1/37. The ball vases are #4045 (which is sometimes numbered as #4085 with the saturn optic as the large one is). Note the small ones used as individual vases. The one in the foreground has an unknown cutting. Stanhope was designed by the Von Nessen firm of New York City. Sometimes these were plastic knobs inserted in the handles. These knobs were black, ivory, blue, yellow or red.

All that stemware with the #865 Florentine cut isn't too shabby either. How can we not be intrigued with a Vaseline candy jar (item 49), a Beehive plate in Sahara (item 388), a Victorian relish in zircon (item 488) or a pair of Ipswich footed center pieces in Cobalt with Cobalt vases included. Oh! Yes -- a flying mare in crystal. I could go on and on but Debbie says Louise will be angry if I don't get this to her by tomorrow. So, look the list over carefully. It is full of goodies!!!

'OSCAR' 1979

For the benefit of our newer members perhaps a more complete explanation is needed concerning the Oscar souvenir. This is the third of a series of convention souvenir plug horses made in the original Heisey mould by Imperial Glass Corp, a division of Lenox, and are dated 1979 and marked "IG".

k The first of this series was made in a limited quantity of 2115 in Fern Green in 1977. Last year there were 2831 made in Rose Pink. Both editions were sell-outs by the end of the convention.

We have ordered approximately 2500 for this year in Sunshine Yellow. There is no way to predict exactly how

many we will receive because it depends on the number made per turn plus other factors involved in making special orders. We have a sample at the museum. As of Feb. 23 when this is written there have been only 30 made as samples and we do not know exactly when we will receive the rest. It is quite probable that they will not be sent to you until late May or early June. When you get them remember that places on the bottom where the "bust-off" has been broken off do not qualify as damage. An animal is made with this added base which must be cracked off and sometimes it leaves a "scar".

You may order one for each member

in your family who has a current membership card. If you wish to add members you may do so at \$1.00 each. DO NOT SEND THESE WITH YOUR OSCAR ORDER. Send them directly to HCA at the club address. Yet another unusual item is a cologne bottle with a tall triangular-shaped stopper made from a #1632 (#1543) Satellite candleblock -- beautiful!! We have also obtained a piece of #3408 Jamestown stemware, with a cutting, which has a paper label of the Kruth Cutting Co. which further proves that many other companies cut on Heisey blanks. This

STEMS

If I were forced to pick a favorite among Heisey's stems, #4090 - Coventry would undoubtedly be near the top of the list. Though I have a Coventry champagne in Zircon and a magnificant little sherry in my collection, the goblet has so far eluded me. Perhaps the fact that it has been unattainable makes it more desirable to me. No doubt that has something to do with it, but there's no denying the fact that this line was among the most regal looking of all Heisey's stemware.

You will see many stems on the market that might pass for Coventry. I can think of some I've seen which were beautifully cut and were signed "Hawkes". It's possible that these were Heisey but without Diamond H, how can you be sure? Coventry is usually not marked so you really must depend on cuttings, etchings and color to be positive of identification. Of course, many of you have a "feel" for Heisey and can be just as sure of any undecorated piece.

Coventry was only made for four years in the late thirties and early forties, which accounts for its' scarcity. Why it wasn't a big seller is beyond me. Perhaps it was too elegant for its' time.

A complete stem line was offered which included a 3/4 oz. brandy, 1 oz. cordial, 2 oz. sherry, 2½ oz. wine, 3 oz. cocktail, 4½ oz. claret, 4½ oz. oyster cocktail, 5 oz. soda, 6 oz. sherbet, 6 oz. saucer champagne, 10 oz. goblet, 10 oz. low footed goblet and a 12 oz. soda. The only color known is Zircon but I'll keep my mind open on color and you'll see why later on in this article. (See catalog reprint 212-17 for pictures of full line)

The bowl was made either plain or with Saturn optic. I suspect that the Zircon pieces will be found with the optic and the crystal pieces will be plain, though I really haven't made a study of this. It's just a thought.

The bowl of the goblet fairly begs to be decorated and though there are not too many stock etchings or cuttings known on Coventry, it must have been used extensively for custom work because many unfamiliar decorations have turned up. Etchings used on Coventry were #500 Belvedere and #507 Orchid. The "Heisey Stemware" book pictures an unusual combination of the Minuet and Belle-le-Rose etchings. A couple of pieces have turned up with an overall etching of an oriental scene and, in these instances, the etching was filled in with what appears to be a rose colored enamel. The effect was quite beautiful and it was done experimentally by Ronald Wooles who was in charge of the etching room.

Four cuttings could be had on Coven-

try. They are #902 Orlando, #903 Zeus, #930 Narragansett and #934 Olive. We've seen other cuttings on Coventry but we have not been able to identify them. The most striking cuttings we've seen were on a set of three goblets. Each was intricately cut with a rose design and yet each was quite different from the other.

If you'd like to collect a set in this pattern you're probably a born optimist.

For awhile it seemed that I had something new to report about stems almost every month but its really been months since there's been something I could get excited about. Early in January I got a call from a friend - well, not really a friend unless you can call someone a friend who leaves you green with envy everytime you see him - he told me what he thought he had found and asked if I

would bring a *3440 Portsmouth goblet to the next meeting of our "study club" (there's a laugh). I snickered to myself and thought "Oh you poor hoob, there's no way that piece is going to be right." To make a long story short, we met, we measured, we compared and, I'll be darned, it was right.

Had a nice letter from Ronell Lyng of Montana concerning my comments about Empress and Queen Ann. Don't despair Ronell, when it comes to crystal I'm never on firm ground either. I'm sure if we both took the time to go throught the back issues of this paper, we'd find that our editor explained it very clearly somewhere. In the meantime, I'll just keep taking the easy way out and call all crystal Queen Ann. It doesn't do much for the truth in advertising I was spouting off about but then I don't really think it matters to anyone who is collecting Empress/ Oueen Ann in crystal.

That ought to do it for this month. I can't think of anything else to dazzle you with. "WHAT ABOUT THE PORTS-MOUTH!" Who said that? Sorry, it slipped my mind. My friend's find turned out to be Portsmouth, alright, with only one slight difference from any other known piece of this stem - it was in TAN-GERINE. That ought to shake up the troops.

Ed. note: While most Coventry may be unmarked at least some pieces are. One purchased at the factory in 1958 and with an unknown cutting is marked at the spot indicated in the picture. In our cutting research we have found several uncatalogued cuttings and have rubbings of them but have not seen them on glass. We have a listing for a #4090 cordial with #799 cutting but no other items in the pattern were mentioned. #901 Delft Diamond came on the full line as did #908 Rondo and #936 Cathay. It is possible that only samples were cut for special orders. As far as we know only the cordial was etched with #507 Orchid. The full line was made at one time in Zircon. It was listed in an additional page of the price list for the 1937, 212 and 17 catalog, the date on the page was 7/9/37. It was marked "out" and since this particular catalog was the one used at the factory to add and delete items and was used in making the next one we must assume that it was made in Zircon for a very short time. Sahara and cobalt were the only other colors being made at this time and it was not listed in them -- but then anything is possible.

HEISEY CANDLESTICKS

Candlestick #104 is unique in one respect as compared against all other Heisey candlesticks. It has the largest size socket of any candleholder. In general the size of the hole for the candles is just over three quarters of an inch and there is little variation from, say, a #21 desk to a 15" tall one. The reason of course is that candles are of a standard size. The toy candlesticks, of course, are much smaller and a few patterns have a larger diameter hole at the top, but even then the hole tapers so the candles fit.

The diameter of the #104 candle socket is a full one-and-one-half inches in diameter, thereby making the area four times as great as usual. It looks huge and takes a really fat candle.

"Bertha". as I call this candlestick, is five inches in height and is pictured in Catalog No. 109. This catalog has been reprinted and shows quite a few candle-

holders. Catalog 109 fixes the production date at around 1928, since "Bertha" appears in neither the preceding nor succeeding catalogs. As there is quite a time span indicated for these latter two cat-

alogs the introductory and phase-out dates are difficult to ascertain. Since this candleholder is not common, it would seem that the production span was not long.


The diamond H mark appears at the top of the stem just under the socket and all seem well marked so there should be no difficulty in identification. Interestingly enough, moongleam seems to be the most common, and several have been seen in crystal. I have had a report of flamingo, but for the life of me I can no longer place who it was that told me. Confirmation on the point would be appreciated if you could send data. Also would like to hear any stories on the purpose or reason for the oversized candle holder. There is, I suppose, always a possibility of other colors, especially sahara. Would really like to see that! Write if you have information.

Signed With a Diamond H Four Times

There are many, many pieces of Heisey glassware marked with the Diamond H. Quite a few pieces are marked with two Diamond H's. Are you aware that there are several pieces of Heisey marked four times; yes, four Diamond H's.

One such piece is the four compartment spice tray in the #473 "Narrow Flute with Rim" pattern. The tray is 8" in diameter and about 11/4" high. There are glass partition walls in the shape of a "plus sign" on the inside to form the four compartments. The bottom of the tray contains a large 54 point typical Heisey star and is ground and polished. When there is a star on the bottom, Heisey pieces of this type and vintage are usually marked at the center on the inside surface of the bottom. However, because the glass partition walls on the inside cross at the center, the Diamond H mark could not be placed at the center. Moving off center places the mark in one of the compartments. Since there are four compartments, someone decided to place a Diamond H mark in each of the four compartments rather than just one. The sketch of the tray with this article shows the location of the four marks.

The #473 Narrow Flute with Rim pattern was produced from about 1915 to 1928. I checked three Heisey catalogs; catalog 76 - circa 1915, catalog 102 - circa 1923 and catalog 109 - circa 1928. While many pieces of #473 were shown, none of the three pictured the 4 compartment tray. Most likely, the piece was only made for a short period and thus missed the catalog printings.

There is a similar four compartment spice tray in the #1183 "Revere" pattern shown in Vogel II, page 108. This tray might contain four marks. I haven't seen

one so I'm not sure what it has. The #1540 "Lariat" pattern has a 8" diameter 4-compartment tray. The one Lariat tray I saw had no marks. There are four compartment bowls in the #1181 and #1186 patterns which, in theory, could also have 4 marks. The 6" diameter, 2 handled, 4-compartment perserve dish I saw in the #1186 "Yeoman" was signed only twice in two diagonally opposite compartments. I have not seen the larger size bowl in #1186 or any of the bowls in #1181. Has anyone seen some other Heisey pieces with four marks on them?




The item which you picture has been found by many people who have written in about it. Since you are the first to include a good picture we will answer it here.

The item itself is a #1509 Queen Ann lemon Dish. In October of 1953 Farber Brothers purchased some of these from the Heisey Co. They added the metal frame and the knife to turn the lemon dish into a butter dish. We have no way at present of knowing whether this was their first order for this purpose or whether they may have used earlier the #1401 Empress butter dish which is similar. If there are vertical ridges inside this dish it is Queen Ann.

Many, many silver, metal, and decorating companies bought Heisey glassware, as well as that of other glass companies, to use in making novelty items, to add silver tops, to etch, cut, enamel and to make lamps. That is why you find it with so many varieties of decorations.


Heisey Paperweights Circa 1900




No. 6. Oblong Paper Weight.

These were used for pictures or for advertising which fit face up in the recessed bottom of the weight. No doubt many companies made similar weights. Not marked. The catalog did not give the sizes. Workers often made paperweights in their spare time which were quite fancy and sometimes had their names inside. The above are the only commercial weights made by Heisey.

CAVEAT EMPTOR

Several paperweights of this exact size and shape have been reported lately. They are of clear crystal of questionable quality with the underside stained red in the indented area. The stain appears worn. The wording in gold letters says "A.H. Heisey & Co. Founded 1896". The whole sides are scalloped, not just the base. There is no Heisey mark on them. They in no way resemble the four early weights known to be Heisey.

In years past all major patterns in the numerical sequence from #8 Vertical Bead and Panel up to, and including, #400 Colonial have been written up in HN with the exception of #331. The names was not given by Heisey. They called it #331 Colonial

Very probably #331 was made first shirtly after 1900 and it continued for the better part of 20 years. It is the second of the group of Colonial patterns for which Heisey became famous. It differs considerably from #300 Peerless which was the forerunner of colonials. Peerless usually had broad flutes topped by scallops which were also edged with tiny scallops. It also had little ridges around the base of most pieces which some people refer to as a "petticoat boarder".

Some pieces of the #300½ pattern, an extension of Peerless, seem to actually be more at home in the #331 pattern which followed it, particularly a cream, sugar, and plates which are pictured here with the pattern. The main characteristic of #331 is that the plain flutes or panels

go all the way to the top of an item and end in plain scallops. The glass is quite heavy and of the fine quality of most early colonials. It is practically always marked. In fact, nearly all of Heisey's colonial patterns are marked with the exception of Peerless which was first made before the mark was designed so can be found both There are always some items which were seldom or never marked and these include water bottles and oil bottles. You can't buy colonials for Heisey just because they LOOK good, for Westmoreland, Cambridge, Fostoria, McKee and U.S. Glass also made similar patterns, to name only a few. If you are in doubt it is best to just leave it alone. This applies to colonials ONLY since many other early patterns were never marked and must be identified by pattern alone.

Most patterns in the #300 to #355 series can be labeled as colonial. also be remembered that any pattern with flutes and panels is considered to be a colonial. Some items appear in two or more different lines. The #331 toothpick for instance

appears from the catalog to be the same as #300. In reality it is doubtful that it has the pleats at the base.

#331 is a fairly small line and most of the articles are pictured here. The nappies are flared, straight and shallow. The jugs are more squat and bulbous than #300. The square individual salt is unmarked and is one of the finest examples of Heisey's beautiful crystal glass. The top and bottom are cut and polished. The pickle jar, syrup, and straw jar are fine pieces for a collector. The cruet is nice but not as desirable as some of the old ones.

I have included pictures of the #300½ cream, sugar and plate to show that they look more like #331 than #330 Peerless. It would be unusual to find any piece of #331 in any color.

 #335 Prince of Wales Plumes, #343 Sunburst and #350 Pinwheel and Fan are notable exceptions.

Recent Reproductions

Beware of Rams Head Stoppers being offered for sale in milk, blue or crystal. They are NOT being sold as HEI-SEY so let's hope they don't end up that way. They are made for someone in the Newark area and are nationally advertised, particularly in the Glass Review. The real stopper is 15/8" in diameter and 31/2" high. The repro is 11/8" in diameter and 36/8" high. The orginal is merely a stopper while the repro looks more like it was setting in the strainer with a flange under the head. The repro also has a letter "B" on the back under the horn at the right when you are looking at it from the back. There is no mark on the real one. Take a good look at the ones shown so that you can tell the difference. The new stopper is much bulkier in appearance.

Also beware of some piglets that are being offered for sale, primarily at auctions so far, in the central Ohio area at least. As far as we know they are not marked in any way. Know your Heisey piglets before you buy.

HEISEY DECORATIONS

by NEILA BREDEHOFT

Minuet etching was designed by Ned Newman, introduced in 1939 and enjoyed a long life since it was in production until 1956. It was apparently as popular when it was new as it remains with today's collectors. Many people are assembling sets of Minuet. Due to its long popularity it is found on a fairly large variety of pieces and so gives the collector a chance of finding a piece he doesn't have.

Minuet is found only on crystal items, many of which are not signed so recognition of the etching is essential. It is the last double plate etching produced by Heisey and really appeared after the popularity of the others had ceased. Only Pied Piper had a few years overlap in production with Minuet.

Minuet is available only on Symphone stemware but was used both on #1509 Queen Ann and #1511 Toujours pressed ware. Addition of the Toujours line brings many unusual pieces to the Minuet line - the apple marmalade, the center vase and prisms, the candelabra to

mention a few. I have not seen the Toujours footed vase with Minuet, but imagine it would be darling. Another unusual item etched with Minuet is the #1514 oval bowl. I doubt if most collectors would buy this piece for Heisey unless they found it with the Minuet etching. The bowl is perfectly plain, no foot, plain edge, and about 1½ inches high.

Minuet is a perfect blending of design and name. After seeing the cameos of the design, you could hardly find a more appropriate name. The small figures in the cameos appear in full court dress - the ladies in beautiful elaborate gowns and fancy hairdos; the gentlemen in waistcoats and wigs. Heisey ads described Minuet with glowing praise. One quote follows: "A pattern inspired by history's gracious days of curtsies and Beethoven, light music and light laugh-Chic....charming....enchanting, Minuet's loveliness has made it an outstanding favorite with hostesses everywhere."





Ed. note - So far as I know this is the first report on the pattern. It is always a little disappointing that more of you do not write in when we ask for information on what you have. This adds more to everyone's knowledge of Heisey which is what this club is all about. Anyone have something else not mentioned in this pattern please write us. We have asked Betty to send a better picture of the pitcher so that we can publish it. It is nothing at all like the #411 Rib and Panel pitcher.

In the January newsletter, which had the WRONG DATING (please change the date to January, 1979, since it was misdated December, 1978 and you will avoid future confusion).
