We have now embarked on our tenth year with the Actual Founding date being October 15, 1981. We plan to celebrate all year long. This is the 109th issue of Heisey News which has been printed. Very few things have ever been repeated, except for updating, so you can imagine the amount of Heisey information in 108 issues. We would not have believed in 1971 that this would be possible but knowing the amount of material which we have, I suppose we can keep on writing forever (?). We still have extra copies of Heisey News printed every month and at present, eight volumes are available (all but 1974) and are only \$8.00 per set. New members are amazed at the wealth of information in these.

We are rapidly approaching 5200 members and with a little help from all of you perhaps we can make it by Convention time. We remain the largest handmade glass club, and by far the most active, in America today.

The Golden Gate Heisey Collectors Club will be chartered in June as #33. This is the second study club in California and promises to be another large and active club. We welcome all of you, and Congratulations! We look forward to meeting many of you and to presenting your Charter in June.

After a little over three years of working for HCA, Debbie Delaney has resigned to take another job in Columbus, Ohio, where she plans to move. We wish her the best of luck in her new position. Merrell Strawn, who was doing our shipping, has taken over Debbie's job and will be keeping your memberships. We have hired another woman, Margaret Weber, to do the shipping.

Merrell asks that you be patient with her until she learns the ropes. There was a backlog of December renewals since that is our biggest month but as of today, January 15th, she is caught up and you should have all received your membership cards. If you have any problems, just write to us. A few people may have received blue cards instead of red, if so, let us know. (Red cards are for Voting members).

Many of you apparently have not read the notice in the last three of four newsletters to the effect that dues, as of January 1, are \$12.00 for the first member and \$2.00, each additional household member. It would help us all very much if from now on you would send the proper amounts.

1980 was our biggest year to date in the Gift Shop and Mail Order Sales, over \$18,000. It was a year of expansion in terms of membership and, of course, we went from one full time paid employee to a paid staff of three, including Wanda Lybarger, our bookkeeper. And the part time help seems to be expanding to near full time for at least one of them.

In corresponding with HCA, please be sure to look at the updated masthead and many of your questions may be answered. Take special note of the new Advertising rates! The same price for $\frac{1}{2}$ and $\frac{1}{2}$ page ads may be confusing but you will be able to put much more description in the horizontal half page. The $\frac{1}{4}$ is not large enough for so much added information. PLEASE send PAYMENT with your ads.

We advertise a 24 page newsletter, and so it is, but this month's issue has the 1980 index which caused us to cut the rest of it to 22 pages to stay within 28¢ Postage.

There is a lot of Auction Glass on hand, but more here to be unpacked, so we don't know what we have nor if it is enough for a 2 day affair but judging from the amount of boxes there must be. We will be sending out a separate mailing on the Auction in plenty of time for you.

We've heard of an 1150 8" plate in Alexandrite, a real goodie, the seldom seen 3334 Sexton goblet with a cutting, a 1637A Town & Country plate in experimental black, and 110 Dolphins in Flamingo. You'll be reading all of this in your list when it arrives. It is sure to be a good Auction and will be worth attending. See the rules for mail bidding in this issue. Bob Johnson, Mailman #1, has agreed to do the bidding again this year. Auction Co-Chairmen are Ray Ziegler and John Eshelman.

The Oscars are in and are beautiful. We have started sending out those already ordered as we need to get them out of the shipping room to make more space. The "March" Cygnet, which was made early this year, has already arrived so we will be selling them now as well. They are light blue and the cost is \$13.25 plus 10% Shipping and 5½% Sales Tax in Ohio. Tax went up 1% and Newark already had 4½% tax. Exact counts cannot be given on these animals as we don't have the complete orders, but Oscars should be 2600 or less, and Cygnets 1500 or less.

George Long of Dayton, Ohio sent us the Article about Wilson Heisey's Cabin. There were newspaper pictures with it but we are afraid they would not copy well. Later we may be able to find some original pictures of this fabulous Cabin (?).

Thank you for all of the Christmas Cards and letters. Eventually when we get settled down again I'll get them all answered.

We have had cold and snow here but the Office has been open every day. You can also come to the Museum Gift Shop any day by coming first to 169 W. Church, our Office Building. Beginning March 1st we will start our Spring and Summer schedule for the museum rather than waiting until April.

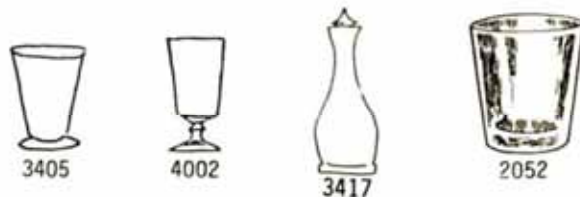
Heisey's new type of decoration for glass and the Repeal of Prohibition resulted in the production of many new giftware items aimed at the now legally drinking public. It was now chic to have attractive glass bar accessories. The frosty look of Heisey's carved designs seemed tailor-made to decorate barware. Also the resulting silhouette-style designs lent themselves to a masculine style of interpretation - an advantage for barware. The hostess had her lovely glass tableware. The host was provided with sturdy, attractive drinking accessories.

Sweet Adeline (5002) is the most comic of the Heisey carved series. It features three very happy imbibers returning (?) from a night on the town. They are well-dressed - all sporting top hats, two still with cocktail glasses held aloft. In this imaginative caricature all appear to be singing lustily - singing "Sweet Adeline" no doubt. How well they could sing in their obvious condition is a matter of conjecture. The main portion of the glass surrounding the figures is frosted while the figures remain clear. An unusual cocktail shaker has been seen on which the 3 figures were etched and filled with a pale yellow-green enamel (almost iridescent).

Sweet Adeline was introduced in 1934 and had been discontinued by 1937, thus being scarce. It is found only on crystal with most items unmarked.

The following four carvings are quite interesting and were specifically made for bar bottles for various liquors. Unfortunately, catalogs and price lists only illustrate one design - the Rye. We had always felt that each liquor had its own design. While we still cannot illustrate all the designs for you, we can at least describe them all.

5004 Scotch Carving was the last I had to document. It is still known to me only by a description in an old trade journal article dated September, 1934, being "a highlander and his bagpipes."

5005 Bourbon carving proved to be what you might expect. A representation of a Kentucky Colonel, elegantly dressed, enjoying a glass of his favorite drink.

5006 Gin carving shows a portly black bartender or waiter. Here much of the design is left clear and the background frosted, but it is possible that the design could also be reversed.

5007 Rye Carving is the one known catalog illustration, showing a farmer with a 3 tined pitchfork.

All of these carvings are hard to find. They were new in 1934 and discontinued before 1937. All are found on the #4033 bar bottle. #5006 Gin has also been found on a #4044 New Era rye bottle, so it is possible that the others might be also.

#9 HEAVY OCTAGON*

This is one of Heisey's earliest shakers. Heavy Octagon is not an original Heisey name but one I have chosen to give this shaker. It's shape is basically square (in fact at least one Heisey price list describes it as "square") with each corner having a rather large chamfer causing it's shape to become an octagon with four wide panels and four narrow panels. The glass is very thick in this shaker and it weighs much more than it appears to - hence "heavy" in the applied name.

This simple shape is not exclusive to Heisey. Just the opposite, in fact. The shape seems to be one of the many shapes of early glassware which was in the public domain. Many companies made this shaker, Fostoria and Duncan to name only two. It was also made by companies producing a lower grade of glass as I have seen some in lime glass containing many ripples and bubbles.

Heavy Octagon was made only in crystal and was made from circa 1900 to 1929. It was available with several different style metal tops and #1 and #3 sanitary tops.

When it comes to dimensions and description of the Heisey version of this shaker, I have some problems. I have two of these shakers in my collection - bought at different times - both from what I would consider "unimpeachable" sources. The first I cannot question as Heisey since it is marked on the inside bottom; the second was dug from the Heisey dump. It is not marked. Each shaker is of excellent quality glass with the possibility that the one from the dump is slightly better.

The following is a table comparing the two:

	Marked:	Unmarked (from dump):
Height:	3 1/16"	just under 3"
Width:	1 1/2"	1 7/16"
Base:	16 point indented star	12 point indented star
Quality:	Excellent	Excellent - more rounded on top of broad panels.

When I first compared these two, I felt that knowing the number of points on the base stars might help collectors distinguish Heisey shakers from those of other companies. However, I still believe both of these shakers to be Heisey, but the points on the stars vary in number. Even though the shaker from the dump is not marked, I feel it is of Heisey manufacture. The design of the shaker is so common I don't feel Heisey would have kept a competitor's shaker on hand for study. As a final note, the bases on the non-Heisey lime glass shakers I saw were plain (no star).

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WHAT'S IN A NAME ? . .

KIMBERLEY

A principal city of South Africa noted for its diamond mining.

It was founded in 1870. Originally there were three mines: one at Dutoitspan, one at DeBeers, and one at Colesberg Kopje. In 1873 the Colesberg Kopje mine was renamed the Kimberley in honor of John Wodehouse Kimberley who was the current secretary of state for the British colonies.

The DeBeers Group purchased the Kimberley mine in 1880 and thus controlled all production from the Kimberley fields.

Heisey used the name Kimberly for their 4091 stemware line which had a diamond motif at the base of the stem. It differs from Kohinoor in that it has a flared bowl while Kohinoor has a straight sided bowl. It was new in June, 1937.

If you get a birthday greeting on Christmas day it's for one of two reasons. The first is that you were born on Christmas or, secondly, you were not born on Christmas but everybody celebrates your birthday then because your name is Jesus. I received a birthday greeting on Christmas day and I wasn't even born in December! It was a most humbling experience. I began bestowing blessings all around until my wife, Helen, brought me back to earth with one of my Christmas presents. A goblet (one of those covered in this month's column) was to be a birthday present and Bob Ryan, who used to be known as the "Heisey Hunter" but I like him anyway, knew this so he inserted a birthday greeting in the bowl. Then Helen, ever practical, decided that the leaf blower she had planned to give me for Christmas would make more sense for my October birthday so the gifts were switched. That's how my Christmas goblet came to say "Happy Birthday" and, since I've been deflated and no one seems to care anyway, I'll get on with the column.

No. 6010 Finesse was one of the last new designs to be distributed by Heisey and like most of the late offerings it was designed by Horace King. My weak memory has been telling me that I've covered Finesse already - if not on these pages then in "Another Club's Newsletter". Bear with me and I promise something new.

Finesse has a square stem which tapers slightly as it rises towards a bowl which is shaped almost like a hemisphere. At first glance the bowl seems to be too large for the stem. After studying the elements of the design for awhile you realize that though you definitely wouldn't want the bowl to be any bigger it would surely lose its character if it had been made smaller.

Finesse was not made in color and was never etched. The only choices for the buyer seem to have been plain or with either the 980 Moonglo or 1094 Ultronic cuttings and both look good on Finesse. A cordial, cocktail, claret, soda, sherbet, champagne, goblet, ice tea and wine were made and they are all hard to find. Finesse was never signed so you have to be particularly sharp if you hope to find it.

The goblet sketched life size here came out of a group of Heisey samples. The stem is identical to 6010 Finesse but the bowl, obviously, is different. Heisey has many lines which share stems but vary in their bowl shapes. Perhaps this was the intention here or it could quite possibly have been the loser when a decision had to be made as to which bowl would be used for Finesse. Either way it is fascinating and probably one of a kind. Let's call this one # Dayton.

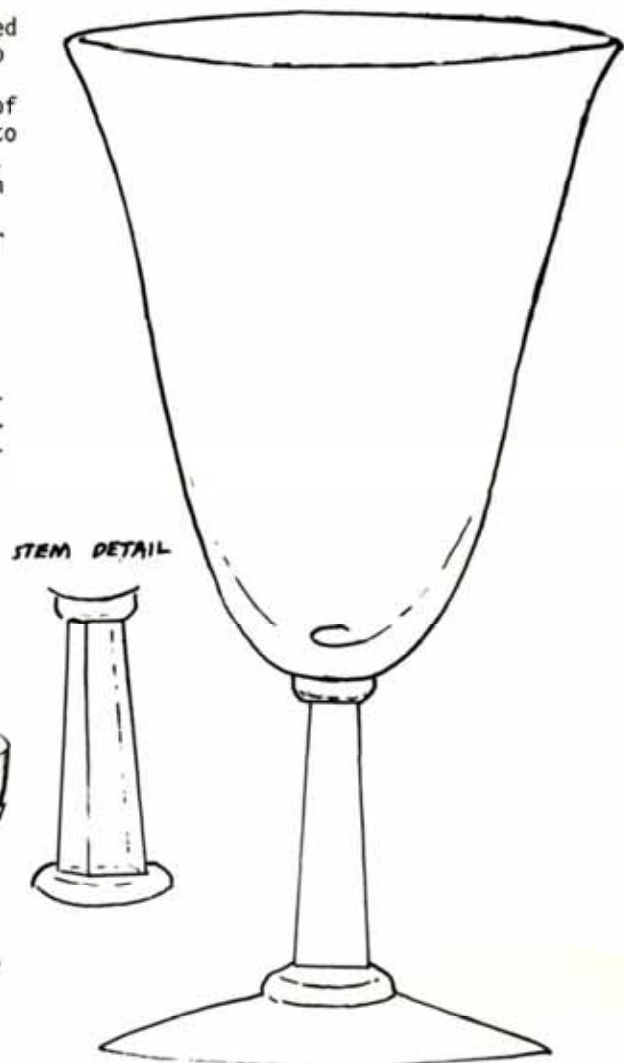

PUNCH CUPS IN THE #341 PATTERN

Let's first look at the names that were used with the 341 pattern. Items were produced under the number 341 from 1903 till the plant closed in 1957. In Heisey catalog 50, circa 1905, pattern 341 was named Puritan. This was the name assigned to the pattern by the Heisey Company. The name Puritan was dropped by the Heisey Company sometime around 1909. Price list 150, circa 1910, referred to pattern 341 as Colonial. The name Colonial continued till about 1937. Then the name Old Williamsburg was assigned to 341. This name continued till the plant closed in 1957.

There were five styles of punch cups in the 341 pattern. The five cups which are pictured with this article are:

- A. 3 oz., straight, pressed handle
- B. 4½ oz., straight, pressed handle
- C. 4 oz., flared, stuck handle
- D. 3 oz., tall, pressed handle (341½)
- E. 4½ oz., shallow, pressed handle

From here on, I will refer to the punch cups by one of the letters A through E corresponding to the above list. This should simplify discussion. Note that punch cup D was given pattern number 341½. I believe the ½ was used for ease of order form identification between the 3 oz. punch cup A (341) and the 3 oz. tall punch cup D (341½).

All five cups have ground bottoms, and all are signed with a diamond H on the inside bottom. I cannot say that the five cups always have typical Heisey stars in the bottom as I have a cup A with a star and a second one without a star. One may think that the star was ground away when the bottom was polished. This is not the case, as the cup without the star has a polished bottom rim. So far I have seen all five with a star and only the one style without a star. If you are a punch cup collector, what is your experience with stars in the bottoms of these five punch cups?

Price list 104, circa 2/15/1904, and catalog 50, circa 1905, are the first references to show the five punch cups. Therefore it is my estimate that production of the five cups started in about 1903.

Punch cup E has been identified by Heisey in two different ways. In catalog 50 (Vogel I, p 23), it is pictured with the handled custards with the sub title handled water ice shallow. In catalog 75, circa 2/1/13, it is pictured with the pressed handled custards with the sub title colonial shallow. Other catalogs refer to cup E as colonial, shallow. Thus, I included cup E in the punch cup category.

Production of the punch cups ended at various times. Based on examination of the catalogs and price lists available in the HCA Library, my estimates for when production ended are: Cup C in about 1915, cups D & E in about 1920 and cup A in about 1925. Punch cup B was still in production when the plant closed in 1957. Thus, the estimated production periods are: Cup A-22 years, Cup B-53 years, Cup C-12 years, and Cups D & E-17 years.

The five punch cups were made in crystal only. The references in the HCA Library showed no information to indicate otherwise.

Price list 142, circa 1908, lists punch cup C available with a #1 or #2 shaped handle. Since cup C was made using a stuck handle, different handle styles are possible. I could not find anything in the price list that described the shape of the two handles nor have I seen the two different handles on cup C. So, I can't define the two shapes at this time. Has anyone seen or detected two different shaped handles on cup C? The picture of cup C must show one style of handle. Price list 142 was the only reference that mentioned two shapes of handles.

Imperial made the Type B punch cups from 5-15-58 - 1-1-62.

"WILL ANDERSON CELEBRATES 105TH BIRTHDAY

Will Anderson, rejected by the army in 1898 because he had varicose veins and told by his wife to quit smoking in 1970 because it wasn't good for his health, is celebrating his 105th birthday today.

l Though Will walked all of his life - he never owned an automobile - he now spends most of his time in a wheelchair at LPN Health Care Facility on Price Road.

His hearing is impaired and eyesight failing, but age hasn't dimmed his appetite.

"He still loves sweets and eats very well," Meg Nabors, director of nursing, said.

And she added that his family is "very good to him."

Will's family - his son, Willis, granddaughter, Patricia Deardurff, her husband, John and son, Matthew, age 9 - agree that Will is a special person.

Patricia said she has fond memories of the companionship Will gave her when she lived with him and her grandmother.

"My grandfather walked me everywhere - to the Pennsylvania station to meet trains, shopping and the movies. He'd take me to the courthouse square where I'd roller skate or ride my tri-cycle."

Patricia said she remembers her grandmother, Will's wife, as a hard-working woman who had a flair for life and cooked everything in heavy fat.

But the high cholesterol diet must have agreed with Will. Last year on his 104th birthday, a visitor said to him, "You'll probably live to be 200."

Will replied, "I'd like that." "

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DID YOU KNOW THAT . . . BY LOUISE REAM

The cutting shown on a plate in Vogel's 1979 summer issue was called Crysanthemum by him. He said that 679 has no name. It was named 679 WINDSOR by Heisey and so listed in catalogs. Much of this pattern was cut through the years on Heisey and other glass.

1295 BEAD SWAG - We have a listing for the 2" rose bowl which was probably made from the toothpick mold. The lamps in this pattern are made from the little molasses jug by putting a kerosene lamp burner instead of the usual top. The same thing has been made from molasses jugs of other patterns. The Museum has the rose bowl in opal and the lamp in crystal.

The 1183 REVERE candlestick and the 1511 TOUJOURS candle vase are the same with the exception of the top rim.

Thousands of 337½ goblets and sherbets were made in Harvey Amber in 1948. Where are they now? They were made by J. Maurer, W. Reinbeau and H Loughman.

William Hartman and William Fairall, G. Hartman and H. Foreman made most of the animals being made in 1948-49. W. Lavelle and Mr. Klein made the 1 HORSEHEADS during 1948.

F. Gamble made hundreds of 1536 MILITARY CAP ash trays in 1948.

In 1948 and 1949 Authur Kessmier was making hundreds of puff boxes for Hope Glass Co. There is no way to identify these boxes at this time. Heisey made many puff boxes for this company.

Did you know that the 353 Medium Flat Panel vase was actually made in Hawthorne?

It was traumatic, a choice had to be made, an exciting James Bond movie had just eased into its thundering finale as the program "Antiques" began on Public Broadcasting's Channel 21. Normally there'd be no problem. Just stick with the picture in which you've already invested an hour and forty-five minutes. But things were different this time. "Antiques" listed "Heisey Glass" as its subject and with the vagaries of PBS scheduling, who knew when we'd ever see it offered again. So it was goodbye James Bond and hello Heisey.

Now Dave Curley, that dedicated Heisey booster from Albany, New York, is no James Bond. But as guest expert on "Antiques" he certainly rivaled 007's aplomb. George Michael, the show's weekly host, is far from a Bikini-clad Bondian helpmate but he too functioned in exemplary fashion. After a brief but very interesting discussion of Heisey history, Dave took a chronological path through the Heisey patterns, colors and decorations. The first piece presented was a Fandango rose bowl. It showed up all glittery and magnificent on our cable-fed TV screen. This was followed by other unsigned pieces in the early patterns and colors. The first marked piece was a brilliant Peerless compote which was followed by a soap dish, hair receiver and a beautifully cut 3-light candelabra.

There was some very informative give and take on Heisey and Sandwich glass and those patterns that Heisey "adapted" from that pioneer manufacturer. (W. Boland would have flipped over the dolphin candlestick). Dave also charted a course through all of Heisey's production colors which gave him the opportunity to show off some very fine examples. The more popular etchings like Rose and Orchid were shown and even the rare and unusual, such as Heisey/Verlys, a frosted Grape Leaf plate and an Amber and Zircon cane whimsey, came in for some intelligent discussion. The program closed on a very attractive necklace made from the handle of a Zircon Fern dish.

It was an excellent show, one that could make the advanced collector swell with pride and bolster the novice's enthusiasm. But more important it let the uninitiated know what our great glass collectible is all about. Hopefully, the program will make a lot of converts and that, dear reader, will benefit all of us.

Thanks, Dave, I may never learn how 007 thwarted the villains but you proved to be an even more enjoyable substitute.

Why, you ask, would anyone go to such extremes over a lousy pair of #112 sticks? Well, first of all, no Heisey is lousy, and especially not these sticks!! They are the most gorgeous alexandrite color I have ever seen - bar none!!

Rumors (actually grumbling) are still coming through the lines about the Bay State Club. Seems they're doing more than sitting around drinking tea and plotting ways to get the Indians in trouble. (Beware, this here writer's grandma was a Cherokee.) Mr. Lloyd and Mz. Janet found a 6" pickle boat (pickle boat??) in #473 Narrow Flute with Rim in - flamingo - a Victorian champagne in sahara (grumble, grumble) a Plantation sandwich plate, and another 6" pickle in #365 Old Queen Ann. 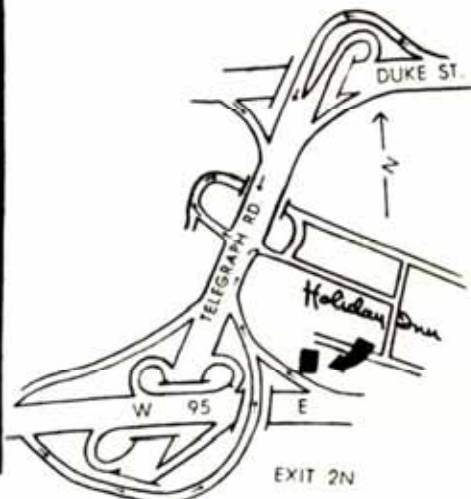

DOOR KNOBS BY HEISEY

Recently while doing other research in the old turn ledgers now belonging to HCA, I kept finding numbers for doorknobs. It has been known for many years that Heisey made knobs but I was fascinated by the apparently large numbers in which they were produced and also the apparent variety.

Unfortunately, we can't show you pictures of these knobs - we do not have any and we would have no way of matching the numbers found with the correct style of knob anyway. If you are able to visit the Museum, a great many of these knobs are on display in the lower level. Several styles are also pictured in Viola Cudd's book "Heisey Glassware."

For of whatever interest it may be, the following numbers were used by the Heisey Co. from as early as 1911 to as late as 1946 for doorknobs.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS . . .

Q. Did Heisey make napkin rings?

A. No, Heisey did not make any napkin rings. You often see the glass ferrule for lamps being offered as a napkin ring.

Q. Did Heisey make two color glassware which gradually blend?

A. No. Heisey made very few items in combinations of two colors and they didn't gradually blend.

Q. What is meant by "ground bottom"?

A. "Ground" is done by grinding wheels which cut the surface very flat and smooth. This made the glass gray. Polishing restored the shiny surface. "Polishing" was done by hand, usually with cork wheels. Glass "fire polished" was put back into the "glory hole", a very hot flame, which melted off mold marks and other roughness. Often bottom rims, or entire bottoms were "ground", then polished to make them shiny again. A "punky" is usually an oval indentation (or possibly a round one) such as on Punky Band or Old Sandwich. (A punkied bottom is usually a polished indentation such as on the bottom of a blown pitcher or on candlesticks.) On a pitcher the punky kept the pitcher from sticking to the table when damp.

TIPS FOR MAIL BIDDERS - MARCH AUCTION

BY BOB JOHNSON

With the approach of March and the Annual Auction, it's time again to review the procedures for mail bids. Although primarily aimed at the first-time bidder, this can also be a refresher course for the "repeaters" (present company NOT excepted)! With the use of mail bids we are able to extend the opportunity to participate in the Auction to all members, whether or not they are able to attend. A review of auction results the last few years shows that mail bids have won on a significant number of items, so you DO have a good chance.

Each mail bid is handled competitively; that is, we start at a reasonable level and bid only as high as necessary to buy the item or lot. Of course, each bid has to have a limit - set by you, the bidder - and we can't bid above that limit. Sometimes, due to the sequence of bidding, a competing bidder will hit the exact amount of the limit and win the bid. This is always frustrating, but an unavoidable part of the game!

To anyone who would like to submit one or more mail bids for the coming March Auction, we would like to suggest the following tips:

1. Lots containing multiple items (such as cream and sugar, set of goblets, pair of anything, console sets, etc.) are usually sold as "so much a piece, the set (pair, lot, etc.) to go". Therefore the final lot price will be a dollar multiple of the number of items in the lot, and a bid limit should be set accordingly. (example: a pair of candlesticks at \$20.00 each make a lot price of \$40.00).
2. There are minimum limits to raises that will be accepted in the bidding, depending on the price level of the item. These limits range from \$1.00 possible on an item under \$10.00 to \$25.00 or higher on items over \$100. Therefore a limit of \$10.25 is no better than one of \$10.00.
3. Multiple item lots are not normally split up, but sold as a lot to one bidder.
4. A separate check may be sent for each lot to be bid, or one check may be enclosed for the total of the maximum bids for several lots, but in either case, include a sufficient amount for shipping. Be sure to stipulate how much is the maximum bid for each lot and how much is for shipping. Any surplus from the bidding and/or shipping will be refunded.
5. Since HCA can accept BancAmericard/Visa or Mastercharge, we'll try something new this year. If you have either card, you may just send a list of maximum limits for each lot you wish to bid for, along with your card type, number, and expiration date. Then the total cost, including shipping can be charged to your account.
6. An "SASE" is requested to return unused funds and your letter giving the results of your bids.
7. The glass for all successful mail bids will be packed and shipped by UPS from the Administration Building. Therefore a complete street address is required. (No P. O. Box addresses, please).

Due to the large volume of mail bids, we will be unable to comply with special requests, such as calls to give results.

Only mint items will be bid on - if damage is noted on an item before it is put up for auction, we will not bid on it. However, if any mail bids are received for items noted with an "X" in the original list as imperfect, we will bid on an "as is" basis.

In case of duplicate mail bids, the one with the earliest postmark will be given preference. All mail bids must be received by Thursday, March 12, at the following address in order to be prepared for the Auction:

" "A LOG CABIN WITH A PAST AND A FUTURE"

"Everything in the realm of objects with age, from the old-time, home-fashioned meat block to the highly-polished and impressive highboys, have interested Wilson Heisey for the past 30 years. In that time he has acquired probably the most comprehensive collection in central Ohio.

Scarcely an object used in the past 100 years but that it has found its way into his possession. Even vehicles that have long since passed from existence or utility are among his souvenirs of the past.

And the motivation for collecting he has found in a desire to preserve these objects so that future generations might not lose sight of the fine old things which pioneer Americans used in fighting the frontier and conquering new lands for the present generation to enjoy.

That's what makes Mr. Heisey's collection so interesting. He is head of the Heisey Glass Co., at Newark, and one entire portion of the factory is devoted as storage space for his old vehicles and other antiques, which are not yet restored to their original utility. However, thousands of them have been restored.

To see the results of his untiring efforts to preserve America's past history in the form of these old vehicles, implements and household furnishings is a revelation even to one accustomed to visiting museums and the homes of antique collectors.

Among Mr. Heisey's acquisitions, the old vehicles are perhaps the most unusual, although the scores of various kinds of stirrups, saddles, oxen yoke and harness all appreciably to its value. (sic)

As a suitable setting for his antique furnishings, he also reverted to the past. He scoured the countryside and finally purchased seven log cabins, representing more than 700 years in age. These he dismantled and transported to a beautifully wooded site about 15 miles east of Newark and a mile north of Route No. 16, where huge boulders are jutting out of the grassy hillside to form a picturesque background for the "composite" cabin.

Taking the road to Baughman park, eading north from Route No. 16, the motorist climbs a steep hill and at the top finds the Baughman park road cutting back to the right. At the left is a lane which leads to the Heisey cabin. It is located on a level spot in the hillside, the front porch overlooking a magnificent view of the rolling countryside and the back, a spacious and well-kept yard with benches and jars and two dog houses made from huge hollowed-out stumps set endwise and with the door scrolled out of the side. In the back also, and at the right of the lane entering the grounds, is a spring flowing from the natural rock. Here Mr. Heisey has built a protecting arch for this spring and a rock wall and stepping stones leading to it.

The main cabin required two years for building. Stones for the terraces were taken from the old canal locks at Trinway.

There also is another cabin, a smaller one, located farther up the hillside. The larger one is used by Mr. Heisey for a country home and for entertaining guests and the smaller one for additional sleeping quarters and smaller parties.

There are five large fireplaces in the main cabin, two upstairs and three down, the one in the downstairs living room being extra large. On either side of it are double Dutch ovens and on all five are sufficient antique ladles and other kitchen utensils of the bygone ages to cook an ample meal for a large number of guests.

A novel feature of the cabin is the treatment of the lights. In each room, electric lights have been wired into the center of the loops in oxen yokes and the entire yoke suspended from the ceiling.

One of the most unusual pieces in Mr. Heisey's possession is a solid iron sea chest which is in the upstairs hall. The lid remains open, revealing the intricate mechanism of 13 different locks, all of which are operated by a huge key fitting into the keyhole secluded by a false covering. Built about 1700, the chest was purchased by Mr. Heisey in Baltimore.

In this same hall is his collections of stirrups numbering nearly 100. Doors from this hallway lead to two bedrooms, one at the west, equipped with a fireplace, and the master bedroom at the south. To the east is the upstairs living room and in the east wing a dormitory with a half-dozen four-poster double beds, each with its antique quilt.

The upstairs living room is equipped with settee before the fireplace, a reading table, ladder back chairs, old time rockers, spinning wheel and hooked rugs - a cozy place for an afternoon with your favorite book or magazine.

The beamed ceiling in the downstairs living room adds an intriguing touch to the general atmosphere. Beside the fireplace are two large candle moulds and on top of the mantle reposes an old coffee grinder, numerous pewter pieces and earthenware.

The dining room is located at the east end downstairs and at the west end is a den, or writing room, furnished with antique desks and an unusual type of bookkeeper's stool used a century ago.

The stairway to the second floor in the cabin is made of solid hewn logs, while the stairway to the cool basement is made of stones.

"The cabin itself is a veritable museum, containing as it does, samples of early American life in such an array it dazzles the visitor. Antiques run the full gamut of types, including Sheraton, Chippendale, Duncan-Phyfe, Hepplewhite, early American and others. Pictures, also are antique and give a touch of quaintness which has a distinct allure.

Such is the cabin which is visited weekly by numerous persons who have heard of Mr. Heisey's collection and have come perhaps a thousand miles to see it.

At his factory in Newark, Mr. Heisey has a window taken from an old post office. It shows a pony express rider etched in the glass.

"I found it in Elizabethtown, Ky., in a saloon operated by a man known as 'Jake,'" Mr. Heisey told me. "They claim that Jake was the only man who ever socked Carrie Nation when she was crusading against saloons. She came in to tear his up and he hit her squarely on the jaw."

Another piece in his collection is a stove from the old Marianne furnace east of Newark, one of the few remaining ones turned out by his establishment.

Everything with age and history behind it interests Mr. Heisey. He has traveled extensively and is always on the alert for objects of value. He explains his hobby with a convincing argument:

"There have to be so many people," he said, "who are jackasses. If we didn't have them, then we wouldn't have any pure-bred horses, or cattle or any of the original strains preserved. It's the same with these things (pointing to his collection) if someone didn't save them, they'd be destroyed and no one in the future would have them."

Following this principle, his collection stands as a rare exemplification of one man's devotion to a purpose.



WHAT'S IN A NAME ?

481 LANCASTER

Lancaster Silhouette Etching was named for the Heisey's horse trainer - William Lancaster Smith, who was always known as Willie Lancaster. He did not work exclusively for the Heisey's, but did come to Newark to train their horses.

463 EQUESTRIAN

This Etching featured one of the Heisey horses, Rexanna H. Peavine.

"Heisey Horse Wins Top
Honors

Rexanna H. Peavine, the bay mare owned by T. Clarence Heisey, president of A. H. Heisey & Co., Newark, O., scored an upset at the Atlantic City Horse Show April 16 when she walked off with the \$1,000 championship stake under the nose of Rhododendron, long the reigning eastern queen. A sensation was created in the presence of 14,000 spectators when Rex Peavine was crowned queen in the five-gaited saddle horse grouping and her rival went down to defeat. The mare is eight years old, stands 15.2 hands and the show was her first. "

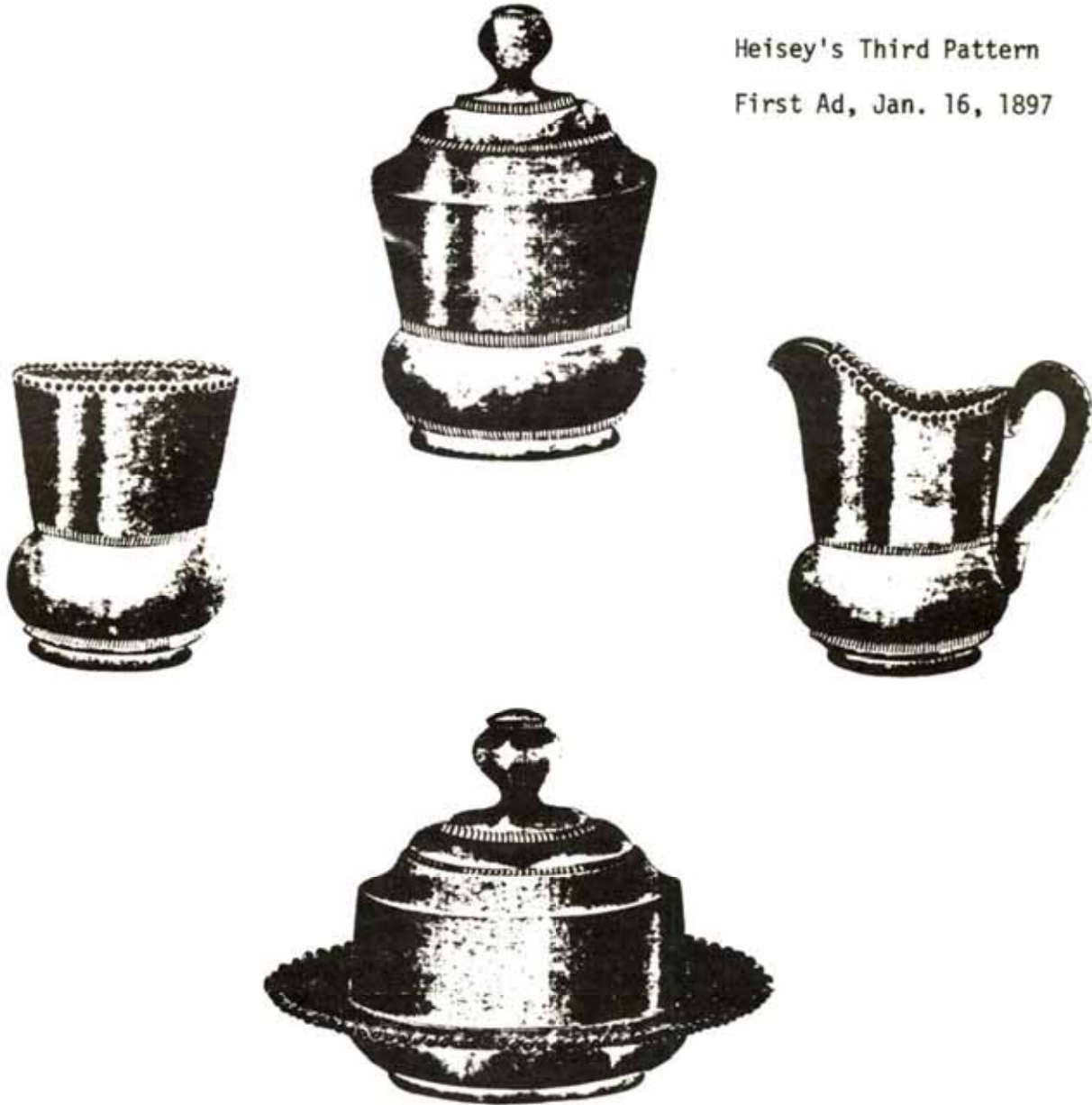

MAIL BIDS WHEN BIDDING BY MAIL PLEASE FOLLOW THESE PROCEDURES:

Each mail bid is handled competitively; that is, we start at a reasonable level and bid only as high as necessary to buy the item or lot. Of course, each bid has to have a limit-set by you, the bidder-and we can't bid above that limit. Sometimes, due to the sequence of bidding, a competing bidder will hit the exact amount of the limit and win the bid. This is always frustrating, but an unavoidable part of the game!

To anyone who would like to submit one or more mail bids for the coming March Auction, we would like to suggest the following tips:

1. Lots containing multiple items (such as cream & sugar, set of goblets, pair of anything, console sets, etc.) are usually sold as "so much a piece, the set (pair, lot, etc.) to go". Therefore the final lot price will be a dollar multiple of the number of items in the lot, and a bid limit should be set accordingly. (example: a pair of candlesticks at \$20.00 each make a lot price of \$40.00).

2. There are minimum limits to raises that will be accepted in the bidding, depending on the price level of the item. These limits range from \$1.00 possible on an item under \$10.00 to \$25.00 or higher on items over \$100. Therefore a limit of \$10.25 is no better than one of \$10.00.

3. Multiple item lots are not normally split up, but sold as a lot to one bidder.

4. A separate check may be sent for each lot to be bid, or one check may be enclosed for the total of the maximum bids for several lots, but in either case, include a sufficient amount for shipping. Be sure to stipulate how much is the maximum bid for each lot and how much is for shipping. Any surplus from the bidding and/or shipping will be refunded.

5. Since HCA can accept BancAmericard/Visa or Mastercharge, we'll try something new this year. If you have either card, you may just send a list of maximum limits for each lot you wish to bid for, along with your card type, number, and expiration date. Then the total cost, including shipping can be charged to your account.

6. An "SASE" is requested to return unused funds and your letter giving the results of your bids.

7. The glass for all successful mail bids will be packed and shipped by UPS from the Administration Building. Therefore a complete street address is required. (No PO Box addresses, please).

Due to the large volume of mail bids, we will be unable to comply with special requests, such as calls to give results.

Only mint items will be bid on-if damage is noted on an item before it is put up for auction, we will not bid on it. In case of duplicate mail bids, earliest postmark will be given preference.
