NO. 8 JACOBAN AND HEISEY'S EARLY "UNKNOWNNS"

Charting the course of production of Heisey's earliest candlesticks is intriguing and sometimes frustrating--and leaves unanswered the question why some of the early candlesticks were so long-lived while others disappeared from the market almost immediately.

Heisey's first candlestick was introduced in 1900. Now known as the No. 1, it was actually originally issued as part of the No. 300 Peerless line. It was followed 2 years later, in 1902, by three additional Peerless candlesticks and the four candlesticks were then designated respectively, as the 1-300, 2-300, 3-300 and 4-300. They must have been a successful addition to the line because, in the years that followed, Heisey began to rapidly issue additional candlesticks and, by the time the next one came out (ca. 1903) it was simply called No. 5 and from then on the candlesticks continued to be released in numerical order, and the identification of the first four with the No. 300 Peerless line was dropped.

All of the candlesticks mentioned so far had varying production periods ranging from around 15 years to over 79 years (in the case of the No. 2 which is still being made by Imperial today) so it is obvious that they were immediately accepted by the public. And apparently in response to this popularity, sometime around the year 1905 or 1906, Heisey introduced a total of eleven more candlesticks. Of these eleven, all but one were apparently discontinued less than a year later. And here is where the frustration comes in: only 4 of these candlesticks are pictured in Catalog 50, and the other seven are all

unseen.

All eleven candlesticks appear in price list 120, which probably came out sometime in 1906. They include candlesticks numbered from 6 to 15 and one additional candlestick belonging to a pattern group (which for some reason was numbered completely out of sequence with the other patterns dating from that period), No. 1776 Kalonyal. The latter is pictured in Catalog 50 (which was reprinted by Vogel as Book I of his series of books), but the page on which it appears is probably a later replacement page, since the other pages picturing Kalonyal pieces are all added pages. Catalog 50 probably dates to about 1905; PL 120 probably came out in 1906; and the replacement pages and added pages to Catalog 50 can probably be dated to late 1906 or early 1907. This is based on the sequence of candlesticks shown on p. 111 of that catalog (which include the No. 8 and No. 11 but not the intervening candlesticks, which appear in PL 120) and the fact that, according to the trade journals, Kalonyal was new in 1906. Sometime between that date and the date on which page 111 was printed, the other candlesticks in the sequence must have already been discontinued, but it must be before the next candlestick in the sequence (No. 16) came out, which was late in 1906 or early in 1907. (It's possible that we may never be able to date these early catalogs and price lists with absolute accuracy.)

At any rate, the other candlesticks appearing in PL 120 include the No. 6, which is described as being 9" tall and "square." We do not have a picture of this candlestick, but we do have a pretty good idea of what it looks like, since there were also three candelabra made with this same number and one of them is pictured on p. 113 of Catalog 50. Presumably, the candlestick would be the same as the base of the candelabra.

The No. 7, however, is the first one we encounter which is entirely unknown to us. It is described as being handled, with a 4½" base. Maybe someday a candlestick matching this description will be found marked; but since so many of the early colonial candlesticks were not marked, it is equally possible that we will never know what it looks like. (See what I mean about frustration? If anyone has such a candlestick, I sure would appreciate hearing from you!)

The No. 8, which I will return to in a moment, is the only candlestick in this group which was produced for an appreciable period of time.

The No. 9 and 10, which are both also unknown, present an even greater problem. That is because both of these candlesticks also appear in PL 142 (which may have come out as late as 1907, though I am more inclined, at this point, to date it to 1906) and the information given about them in the two price lists is contradictory. They are both listed as being 9" high, but in PL 120, the No. 9 is described as being a "candleholder with saucer drip or bobèche attached," with only

the height being given for the No. 10, whereas in PL 142, the descriptions are reversed, with only the height being given for the No. 9 and the note about the saucer drip or bobèche appended to the No. 10.

The No. 11 candlestick does appear on p. 111 of Catalog 50. Like all the other candlesticks mentioned above it seems to have been discontinued later in 1906 or early in 1907. From the catalog picture, it appears to be identical with the No. 8 except for the candleholder portion, which has what appears to be loops (or maybe they should better be described as teardrops) surrounded by fields of cross-hatching -- the latter reminiscent of the same type of cross-hatching used on various early patterns, such as No. 1201 Fandango, No. 1205 Fancy Loop, and No. 1255 Pineapple and Fan. It could have been used with any of these patterns and, in fact, if it was designed to be sort of catch-all candlestick to go with any or all of these patterns, that might help explain why it was produced for so short a period, since all three of these patterns were discontinued themselves within just a few years.

The other four candlesticks in PL 120 are also unknown. The No. 12 is described as handled, with a square base. The No. 13 is handled, with a puntied bottom. The No. 14, which came in two sizes, was available in a 5" height ("plain") or 6" height (with puntied bottom). And the No. 15 was available in a 5" or 6" height (both "plain"). All of these candlesticks must also have been discontinued in 1906 or 1907.

After this, beginning with the No. 16, which appears for the first time in PL 142 (which, as mentioned above, can probably be dated to late 1906 or 1907) we mercifully return to the sequence of known candlesticks and life becomes easier for the now-frustrated candlestick collector who can't bear to think that there are at least eight candlesticks he may never be able to add to his collection - unless, as I say (and there is always hope) they turn up marked someday and can be matched with the descriptions in the price list.

And, at last, we turn to what was intended to be the subject of this article, even though it seems to have been relegated to a footnote. The No. 8 candlestick, which we have named "Jacobean," was the only one out of the eleven appearing in PL 120 to be produced for more than a year or two. It continues to be listed as late as PL 200, which is dated July 1, 1917. It does not appear in PL 206, indicating that it must have been discontinued sometime before Jan. 1, 1922. So we can roughly assign a production period of eleven years and possibly a little longer. Even so, it is not very easy to find, which is rather surprising, since it is one of the most attractive of the early colonial candlesticks (at least, in my opinion). It may be that it just isn't generally recognized since, to my knowledge, it is always unmarked.

The No. 8 has a six-sided base with the same number of panels on the column and a flattened knob or lozenge between the column and the candleholder. The latter is slightly flared and is relatively deep in comparison with other candlesticks of the same height. The bottom, of course, is polished and puntied.

The No. 8 candlestick was made in a 9" height. However, here's an additional rarity to be on the lookout for: PL 120 also lists the No. 8 in a 7" height. Now, there's another one that would be worth hunting for....



THE COLORFUL MUSTARDS

Heisey's colorful period was from about 1925 to 1935. Yes, Heisey produced colored glass at other times, but during that ten year period, they produced nine colors: namely crystal, flamingo, moongleam, marigold, hawthorne, sahara, alexandrite, tangerine and cobalt blue. The colorful mustards are in the #1252 Twist, #417 Double Rib & Panel and #1401 Empress patterns.

Twist was a major pattern of the Heisey Company. In the Heisey catalogs and price lists, the pattern was known as #1252. The name Twist was established for the pattern later by Vogel. There were over 60 items offered in this pattern of which one was the mustard & cover.

The #1252 mustard is pictured in catalog #109, circa 1929. It measures 2½ inches in diameter by 3 ¾ inches in height to the top of the cover. The bottom is plain, that is, no star and has a ground bottom rim. The mustard is signed with a small diamond H in the center of the bottom. The cover is not signed. My estimate of the production period for the 1252 mustard is 1927-1935.

Price list 209, circa 1929, offers the 1252 mustard & cover in crystal, moongleam, flamingo, and marigold. Later, in price list 210, circa 1933, the mustard is offered in sahara. Thus the 1252 mustard was available in crystal and 4 colors.

Mustard spoon #5 was available for use with this mustard. It was available in crystal, moongleam, flamingo and sahara; but not in marigold. A crystal spoon could be used with the marigold mustard or, if desired, with any of the colors. The spoon is signed with a small diamond H on the top side of its handle.

Double Rib & Panel #417 appears to be a pattern line that never caught on. While there is little information on this pattern line, much of what is available does cover the mustard.

The 417 mustard and cover was pictured in catalog 109. It measures 2 inches in diameter by 3 inches in height to the top of the cover. The bottom is plain and not ground. The mustard bowl is signed with a small diamond H in the center of the bottom. The cover is also signed in the center on the inside. My estimate of the production period for the 417 mustard is 1924-35.

Price list 209 offered the 417 mustard and cover in crystal, moongleam and flamingo. A 417 mustard in hawthorne has been reported.

While no specific spoon is specified in the Heisey catalog to go with this mustard, it appears that the #5 spoon was used with the 417 mustard. Again, the #5 spoon was available in crystal, moongleam and flamingo. Since there is no evidence of a mustard spoon offered in hawthorne, a crystal spoon was most likely used with the 417 hawthorne mustard.

I do want to mention that there was also a #1 mustard spoon that could have been used with the 417 or 1252 mustards. It was produced only in crystal. Production of the #1 spoon was discontinued around 1930.

Empress #1401 was also a major pattern line of the Heisey Company. There were over 90 items in this pattern including the mustard and cover.

The 1401 mustard was first shown in the addendum to catalog 109. It measures 2½" in diameter by 3 ¾" in height to the top of the cover. The mustard is signed with a small diamond H in the center of the plain bottom. The cover is not signed. There are two styles of 1401 mustards: with or without a series of glass dots. Around the top of the mustard bowl are six lily designs. The lily design could be called an open fan design. The series of dots in question, when present, appear below three of the six lilies, starting from the bottom of the bowl and coming about halfway up the bowl. The mustard without the dots was pictured in the catalog 109 addendum. I believe the mustard without the dots was produced first with the dots added to this particular piece at a later date. My estimate of the production period for the 1401 mustard is 1929-1936. I have one in flamingo without the dots and ones in crystal and sahara with the dots.

Price list 209, supplement #1, circa 1931, and price list 210, circa 1933, both offered the 1401 mustard & cover in crystal, moongleam, flamingo and sahara. Nothing was listed in the alexandrite color column for the mustard in either price list. So it is believed that the 1401 mustard was not made in alexandrite. The tangerine and cobalt blue color columns in price list 210 were also empty for the mustard.

Both price lists offered the #5 mustard spoon as an option with the mustard. The 1933 list prices the 1401 mustard, cover and #5 spoon set in crystal, moongleam or flamingo at \$5.70 and in sahara at \$7.10 per dozen. I'll take one dozen each.

Around 1937 the 1401 Empress pattern was replaced by the 1509 Queen Ann pattern. The crystal mustard & cover was continued in the Queen Ann pattern. Catalog 212-17, circa 1937, pictures the 1509 mustard with a #10 mustard paddle. The Price list 214, circa 1939, offered and priced the #5 mustard spoon with the 1509 mustard.

In summary, the colorful mustards are:

- #1252 Twist in crystal, moongleam, flamingo, sahara and marigold
- # 417 Double Rib & Panel in crystal, moongleam, flamingo and hawthorne
- #1401 Empress in crystal, moongleam, flamingo and sahara (dots variation)

Other patterns that included mustards in crystal only during this period are:

- #300 Peerless
- #351 Priscilla
- #352 Flat Panel
- #393 Narrow Flute
- #394 Narrow Flute
- #407 Coarse Rib
- #411 Rib & Panel

The color information I have is based on the catalogs and price lists available in the HCA Museum Library. It appears reasonably complete for the time period covered in this article. For the unexplainable, if there are any, it is always possible that Heisey made a few items including mustards in other Heisey colors or experimental colors for research or for sales market testing.

#450 CHINTZ PLATE ETCHING

#450½ FORMAL CHINTZ* PLATE ETCHING

These two etchings were both called Chintz by Heisey. We added the word "Formal" to 450½ to help differentiate the two for collectors and dealers. Formal Chintz uses many of the same motifs as Chintz but many are enclosed in fancy rings about the tops of stemware and about the edges of flat pieces.

The trade journals of 1931 and 1932 gave fairly wide coverage to the new Chintz etching - often calling it "Colonial Chintz". The following are two quotes from trade journal articles of the period. 1. "...Colonial Chintz, a name ideally suitable since it resembles a crystalized bit of etching with its all-over design of informally arranged decorations. Among them you will find butterflies, bowls of flowers, birds-of-paradise on branches, and tiny floral sprays--delicately designed and exquisitely etched."

2. This quotation actually refers more to the cocktail set rather than the etching, but the entire quote is quite interesting. "Distinctly eye-catching is the chintz etching recently made by A. H. Heisey & Co., of Newark, Ohio, and applied to a number of their offerings. Now it is being shown on a three-piece cocktail shaker with glasses to match. Here is a particularly effective decoration. It is a real chintz pattern featuring cunning little flowers of the type so much used in chintz decoration. The individual groups are naturally small but well distributed and are particularly effective in crystal but will doubtless be shown in all the Heisey colors as well.

The cocktail shaker to which it is applied is of 1-quart capacity. It is jar-shaped, with inset strainer made entirely of glass and ground-in stopper. The simplicity is almost austere, but naturally any suggestion of austerity is taken away by the chintz decoration.

The eight cocktail glasses selected to go with it are short stemmed and straight-sided, being of 5-ounce capacity. They, too, are very austere in form; but here again is the austerity taken away by the decoration..." -- from THE POTTERY, GLASS & BRASS SALESMAN, July 7, 1932.

Neither of these is a particularly rare etching (with 450 Chintz being the more common) but since they are more available than many, it makes it easier for collectors to assemble sets. Many items are available for the hostess, one of the most unusual being the 450 Chintz etched hurricane globes.

Both Chintz and Formal Chintz are plate etchings and were introduced in 1931 on stemware lines also new at that time. Chintz is found on 3389 Duquesne and Formal Chintz on 3390 Carcassonne. 450 Chintz was available from 1931 to 1942. Matching was offered after December, 1942. Chintz was etched on both crystal and sahra items.

450 CHINTZ Found On:

- 3389 DUQUESNE stemware, full line -- crystal and sahra
- 1401 EMPRESS -- at least 34 items in crystal and sahra
- 1509 QUEEN ANN -- at least 19 items in crystal (Queen Ann replaced Empress after 1937)
- 134 TRIDENT 2 lt. candlestick
- 135 6" 1 lt. candlestick
- 300 PEERLESS candlelamp with 9" or 12" globe
- 301 Hurricane lamp, 2 light with 9" or 12" globe
- 1503 CRYSTOLITE hurricane block with 9" or 12" globe

Formal Chintz* (450½) was available from 1931 to 1938. It was available on crystal, sahra, moonglean and flamingo with a very limited amount on alexandrite.

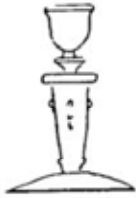

" A. H. HEISEY & CO.

Some New Etchings of a Classic Nature
and a New Color Added to the Line

For years A. H. Heisey & Co., of Newark, Ohio, have devoted a great deal of attention to their etching department and have produced numerous lovely examples of the etcher's art. Three new numbers which have just been added to the line are worthy companions of those that have gone before. All three, it might be mentioned, are pure classic Greek, and each one is different from the other, though all are of the all-covering description. One that is very unusual shows the god Pan in characteristic pose with his pipes. He is set in an appropriate "frame," if it may so be called, that is somewhat suggestive of vine leaves. The work, it might be noted, is beautifully executed and shows up well on a handsome Heisey blank. The second also has a Greek mythological figure as its center motif. This is a horn of plenty done after the manner of the old Greek styles with severity of lines. This too, is set off by an all-covering frame.

The third etching, while also purely Greek, is without mythological significance of the two first named, featuring as it does a trellised iris. The trellis is quite unusual and severely Greek. The floral treatment is as true to nature, as it is possible to be in an etching and still be artistic. All three of these new numbers are shown on a beautiful line of Heisey stemware, samples of which have just arrived at the local showrooms in the Fifth Avenue Building, 200 Fifth Avenue, in charge of E. G. Nock.

Mr. Nock has also received from the factory a new complete range of table and stemware in a blue color which is a new Heisey product. Strangely enough, while Heisey has always pioneered in colors, the concern has never before brought out a deep blue. This is a real royal blue. It might even be referred to as a cobalt. Certain it is that it would tie up well with a dinnerware service carrying a rich cobalt band. Possibly the concern had that in mind when the color was produced.

Stemware is made with crystal stem and foot, jugs with crystal handles, and the candlesticks are hung with crystal bobaches. Certainly these new things are worthy additions to the Heisey line. "

TEN YEARS OF PROGRESS BY LOUISE REAM

Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., a non-profit corporation for the collectors of Heisey Glassware made by A. H. Heisey & Co. in Newark, Ohio from 1896 to 1957, is now in its tenth year and will celebrate its birthday all year long.

Having begun in 1971 with a small group of people in and around Newark, the club has had a steady growth with the membership now approaching 5200 with members in every state. There are also 33 affiliated study clubs across the country as far south as Texas and Florida, as far west as Washington, Oregon and California, north to Michigan and Wisconsin and east to Massachusetts, New York and New Jersey. The biggest benefit the club offers is its 24 page monthly publication, "Heisey News", which is filled with factual information on Heisey glassware and related information, as well as a dealer directory and ads for buying and selling Heisey glassware.

In 1973 the club accepted the donation of a lovely 1831 house which was moved to Newark's Sixth Street Park where it was restored and refurbished and lighted cabinets were added to show off the glass to the best advantage. All colors, including the experimentals and nearly every pattern are on display. Visitors from all over the US and many other countries have come to visit.

In 1977, an open U-shaped area at the back of the Museum was closed in to make a lovely gift shop. Cabinets were added to the lower level and more shelf space for glass was added to the second floor. The first paid employee was hired in November 1977 to take care of our membership.

In 1978 the brick and stucco house adjacent to the Museum was purchased and converted to the Administrative Offices of HCA. There are three offices, library and shipping and storage area in the building which is connected to the Museum by passageways on two levels. The cost of remodeling the two buildings was approximately \$220,000 but the value is much more than that at today's prices.

In 1979 we hired another part-time employee to do the shipping since we have a mail order department in conjunction with our gift shop. We sell many books on Heisey glassware as well as animals and other items made in the original Heisey molds by Imperial Corp. These are all marked IG or LIG for Lenox-Imperial.

In 1980 a part-time bookkeeper was hired. So now in 1981, we have three paid employees and a host of volunteers, plus our cleaning lady.

HCA has published two books, one "The Encyclopedia of Heisey Glassware, Etchings and Carvings" by Louise Ream & Tom & Neila Bredehoft, and the other "Heisey by Imperial" by the Newark Heisey Collectors Club. We are presently working on several more.

The exact count will not be known until all are unpacked. Imperial stopped at the point where another "turn" would have made more than we wanted. These animals are marked HCA '81 and I.G.

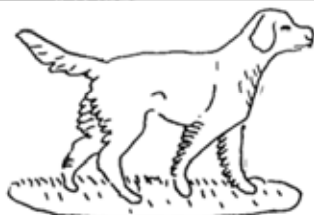

New-Style Cocktail Set is Built Along
Unique Lines

Something rather out of the ordinary in the way of cocktail sets has just been developed by A. H. Heisey & Co., of Newark, Ohio. This set consists of a 16 ounce shaker and six 3 ounce cocktail glasses. The distinguishing feature is the base portion, which is constructed along the lines of an inverted cup. As a matter of fact, the cocktail itself, when inverted, would serve as an English egg cup. This base part is treated with a matt finish in the Lalique style and is quite effective. The

bowl portion is in conformance and can be had in "Sahara", a golden tone, or else in green. The set is very effective as well as unique, and makes for a most attractive offering for those looking for something out of the ordinary. It is on display at the local showrooms in the Fifth Avenue Building, 200 Fifth Avenue, in charge of E. G. Nock.

A considerable number of new things are now in course of manufacture at the Heisey factory in Newark and will be uncovered to the trade from time to time. These include both staple and fancy numbers, the majority of which will be shown in a full line of Heisey colors. "

These two toothpick holders were made for a brief period around the turn of the century. That is about all they have in common. The #1280 Winged Scroll toothpick holder is the only one that was produced in all six of Heisey's earliest colors, and #310 Ring Band is the only Heisey toothpick holder not produced in crystal!

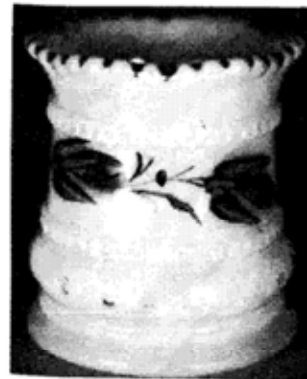
The #1280 Winged Scroll toothpick holder was produced from 1899 to 1901 in crystal, ivorina verde, ivory, emerald, opal and canary. This item was never marked with the Diamond H trademark. The most distinguishing feature is the four "winged scrolls" on the body of the toothpick holder which were often decorated in gold or sometimes with green. A very pretty decoration is the painted red rose with green leaves. The Heisey match holder in this pattern is about the same size but has nearly vertical sides, while the toothpick holder bulges out from a narrow base and then has a crimped throat and a flaring rim.

The #310 Ring Band toothpick holder was produced only from 1900 to 1901 but the quantities must have been large since many survive to this day. It was produced only in ivory and is infrequently marked on the bottom of the base. This item is usually found with gold trim and a red decal with souvenir inscription. It is less commonly encountered with green trim (like #1280 Winged Scroll) or enameled flowers.

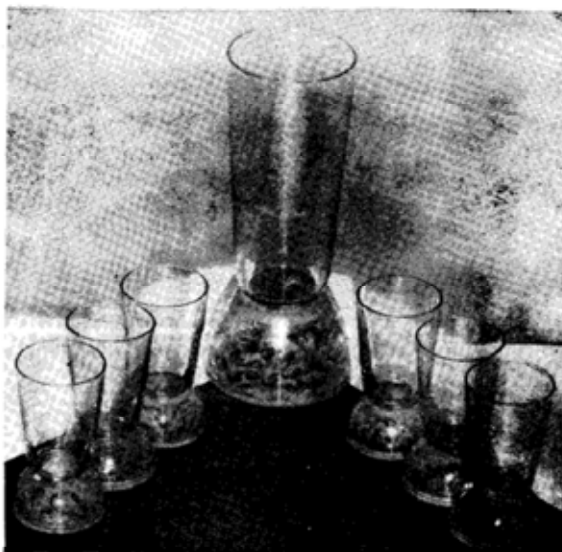
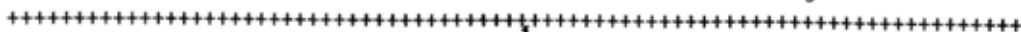

MORE ON FLORAL BLOCKS

Dear Mr. Lokay,

In your article on floral blocks, I think I may have a #3. It is ground on the top and has a raised rim on the bottom with three notches like you say is on the #2.

My block is 4 1/2 inches across and 1 5/16 inches high. It has 31 holes.

I took a pencil and went down through the holes to show how the holes were arranged. I had to find a real small pencil to go down in the twelve outside holes as they are smaller than the rest.

I have had my block for quite a time and kept it because I thought it might be Heisey. It seems better glass than a lot of the other glass blocks. Hope this is of some help to you.

The floral block that you have appears to be the Number 3 block. Thanks for the information that the #3 block has 31 holes laid out in a hexagon pattern. The 6 holes for the largest hexagon are not included, thus only 31 holes rather than 37.

MARCH AUCTION MAIL BID REPORT

Once again, the mail bidders made a significant contribution to the success of the HCA Museum Benefit Auction. This year we received 390 bids from 68 individuals. With more than one bidder on several lots (ten people actually bid on one particular lot) we wound up bidding on 250 out of the 720 total lots in the auction. Mail bidders won 99 lots for a total cost of \$5400, or almost 14% of the gross sales. In many cases the mail bid was the "back bidder", so the overall effect was even greater than just the winning bids would indicate.

Anne and I wish to thank two people who made it possible to handle this volume of bids. Once again, Jon Heron ably assisted in the bidding, allowing me to eat, stretch my legs, and other such incidentals. And much appreciation to Chris Maskaleris for her very excellent help to Anne in the bookkeeping department.

Again, this year, the Buckeye HCC got together shortly after the auction to sort and pack the glass for quick shipment by JPS from the Museum.
