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

Heisey Q & A

Α. This is in reply to Larry Huey's question in the Q&A section of the March 2000 issue of the Heisey News regarding the identification of a Heisey cocktail shaker. I have one just like it. The cocktail shaker is similar in appearance to the Cobel #4225 shaker but with a slightly different bottom shape and with the Diamond H mark on the ground bottom. I bought my cocktail shaker many years ago and have been trying to identify the pattern number and name ever since. I believe these could be the prototype for the Cobel #4225 Cocktail Shaker design. The base is almost identical to my Cobalt Revere #1184 cocktail shaker, which has a metal strainer and top in place of the glass strainer and glass stopper. The bodies of both shakers are the same size in width and height. They both have a similar foot which has a ground bottom and is marked with the Diamond H. To accommodate the newly shaped glass strainer with its separate glass stopper, the top of the Revere bowl was reshaped to fit the glass strainer. The Cobel 1 pint Shaker body is similar in shape to the shaker in question except for the foot which is similar to all Cobel shakers and does not have a Diamond H mark.

I have looked through all the Heisey factory daily turn books trying to find some reference to such a shaker but was unable to find any information. I did find when the first Cobel #4225 shaker was produced in the turn books and that on 12/3/1931 all three pieces were made in Sahara. On 12/26/1931 all three pieces were made in the Rose color and then on 1/23/1932 in Crystal and then on 1/30/1932 they were made in the Green color.

The strainer in my Shaker has only six holes in it; however, checking some of my cocktail shakers I have a Sahara shaker with a nine hole Sahara strainer and other Crystal shakers with both six and nine hole strainers. I don't have any answer to the strainer difference.

I believe the shakers in question are older than the Cobel and were made to check out the design and problems which would be encountered when put into production. I have given mine the name Cobel Prototype and #4225A.♥

EVERY LITTLE BREEZE: THE PERSONAL SIDE OF LOUISE REAM

Back a long time ago there was a popular song that started, "Every little breeze seems to whisper Louise, birds in the trees all are singing Louise." Whenever I think of Louise Ream, the words of that song pop into my mind. The reason is that that's the way it was in Heisey-land when my wife Marian and I made our first pilgrimage to the Mecca of Heisey, Newark, Ohio.

The year was 1975 and on that trip we learned a lot, including how to pronounce certain things. We learned that "Heisey" was pronounced as though there was a "Z" in it rather than an "S." We learned that the Heisey factory, HCA's headquarters and the Heisey Museum were located in a town called by its natives "Nerk, Aha." We learned that in those days, if you really wanted to buy the Heisey of your dreams, dealers in the Newark area were your best source. And we learned that Louise Ream was a giant figure in the affairs and operations of the fledgling organization we had recently joined, "Heisey Collectors of America." In Heisey-land, truly, even the birds in the trees were singing "Louise."

The fascinating, and one might say improbable, story of how a little group of ordinary people from a small town in mid-America banded together to start an organization that has become the titan of those collectors' clubs devoted to brands of handmade American glass has been told before. Their vision, courage, energy and determination have been well documented. Likewise, the role of Louise and Russ Ream as members of that pioneer group is well known.

Memory needs only a slight jog to recall that in the crucial first years of HCA and in the careful and prudent building of the foundation upon which our club thrives today, Louise Ream seemed to be more the one individual. She was the President and Administrator of HCA. She edited the club's newsletter and wrote a lot of the material in it. She also acted as the Curator of the Museum. And for quite a while her salary for all of this was an incredible bargain, zero dollars and no cents.

Strangers, as were Marian and I, coming on the scene saw in Louise Ream a strong, forceful, confident leader. The truth is that she needed all of those characteristics and more to accomplish all that she did. Louise was born In Powell, Ohio, a small town just west of Columbus. Her birth date is July 5, 1915. Until quite recently she kept the year of her birth a closely held secret. Not out of vanity, but because at the time she began to be active in HCA she already was fifty-five. She was concerned that if people knew her age they might feel that she was not capable of meeting the demands of leadership. Nothing of course was further from the truth.

Louise grew up in small-town, middle class surroundings. Her father was a selfemployed house painter and paper hanger. Not being held down to a specific location, he liked to move from one small town to another, but always within the Columbus, Ohio area. Louise went to grade school at the Orange school and to high school at Willis High, both located in Delaware county.

Then there came a day when Louise caught the eye of a young man named Russell Ream. Russ wanted to become acquainted with Louise and to do so he came up with a very interesting ploy. Russ appeared at Louise's parents' house with his .22 rifle and offered to shoot rats in back of the chicken coop. This creative and enterprising approach to courtship must have been appealing because eventually Russ and Louise became husband and wife. Their union produced two children, a son, Roger, who lives in Annapolis, MD and a daughter, Phyllis, who lives in a suburb of Columbus.

One of the most intriguing questions I can ask of anyone who got started with Heisey glass early and who has amassed a large collection over the years is, "What led you to start collecting Heisey glass?" In most cases I have found they came from that segment of the population who are born collectors. Typically they have collected this, that and the other all their lives. While Heisey glass has become the culmination of their collecting, in the beginning Heisey glass was one more thing to collect rather than a be all and end all in itself.

This was not the case for the Reams. When they reached the age at which family responsibilities had lessened and they had time of their own to do with as they wished, they discovered that it was fun to do a little traveling in the reasonably nearby area. To enjoy traveling, usually some sort of destination is desirable. Since Louise and Russ both liked glass in a general sort of way, and since a variety of glass making plants were still operating within their reach, during the mid fifties they chose factories such as Imperial, Fenton and Westmoreland as their travel destinations.

The Reams began to acquire glass about the time that the Heisey plant shut down. They regularly visited the "hay shed," which was a close-out store, to see what was on the shelves and to take a few things home. At first their purchases were in the utilitarian category, that is they bought things that they could use at home such as a dessert set or stem ware.

In a little while, however, their shared love for Heisey glass led them to begin to acquire items for their beauty rather than for their usefulness. In fact it was their recognition of the beauty of Heisey glass which moved them from casual buyers to avid collectors and the then on to preservation and documentation of Heisey glass through their roles in the formation and development of HCA. One fondly recalled early purchase in the category of beauty is that of a Whirlpool candy jar in Limelight for which they paid seventy-five cents.

Russ developed a particular liking for cut glass, particularly glass that had been cut by the master, Emil Krall. He also began to collect cordials and accumulated an outstanding collection of them. Louise has trouble deciding what her particular "likes" are. Truthfully, she likes it all. She did, however, become enamored with the "little things" such as individual nut cups and put together a large collection of them. The appeal of "little things" for Louise was that each

showed how a pattern looks, they don't take up much space and they are "cute."

As far as colors are concerned, Louise has no real favorite although she does admit

that Alexandrite is just a bit special for her. This is

evidenced by the nine inch Alexandrite ball vase which is displayed prominently amongst her collection. When asked about patterns, once again Louise says that she likes them all. If the questioner persists, Pinwheel and Fan gets a small nod.

Louise does admit to making one mistake as she and Russ put their collection together. She never bought any animals and once turned down an opportunity to acquire an Amber Flying Mare at a price which she cannot recall today, but which clearly would be categorized as absolutely ridiculous.

During the late sixties, Heisey began to be more than just something to collect, both for the Reams as well as for other people in the Newark area who were captivated by the beauty of Heisey glass. The result was that this small group of dedicated people banded together to form a national club for collectors of Heisey glass. Heisey Collectors of America was the result. Someone needed to look after the day-to-day operations of the club and Louise Ream, with a lot of help from Russ as well as other Heisey aficionados, became that person.

Three things happened to Louise as a result. First, she and Russ discontinued dealing in Heisey glass. Many of the pioneers traded

or sold surplus glass from their collections. Louise felt that her role with HCA was such that it no longer was appropriate for her and Russ to act as dealers. Second, the Reams moved to Newark, Ohio in 1974 in order to be close to HCA headquarters and the burgeoning HCA Museum. Third, in order to fulfill her own expectations and dreams for HCA, Louise, who had no previous business experience, developed new organizational and leadership skills.

One thing that did carry over from Louise's life before she became active in the affairs of HCA was her passion for studying the history of Heisey glass. She poured over every resource she could get her hands on and committed much of what she learned to memory. Often an evening's entertainment in the Ream household was to drill and challenge each other as to pattern names, numbers and key details. Her goal was to identify everything that was genuine Heisey glass and to be able to prove it from written records.

She also wanted to clear away confusion regarding items that some people thought had been made by Heisey but for which this was not the case. At the time that Marian and I started our career as collectors of Heisey glass there was a great deal of discussion as to whether or not the so-called "Mike Owens bust" had been made by Heisey. Eventually Louise found references to this item in old Heisey records acquired by HCA, thus establishing the Mike Owens piece as legitimately Heisey.

Considering her own approach, it is not surprising then that the first piece of advice Louise offers to novice collectors is "learn your glass." She has no trouble at all in understanding why so many people have been attracted to Heisey glass in the past or why newcomers continue to come into the fold today. It is the beauty of Heisey glass that draws them says Louise, remarking that of all the brands of collectible glass, "Heisey is the most beautiful."

At present Louise makes her home with her daughter Phyllis, just outside of Columbus. It's a very good thing that Phyllis and her family like Heisey glass because in addition to Louise they also have made a place for her extensive, awesome and dazzling collection of Newark's finest product. Large, lighted display cabinets have been installed wherever possible and the visitor is assured that the glass on display is only a portion of that on hand. Most of the Ream collection is packed away because even a good size home doesn't have enough room to allow everything to have its place in the sun.

There were quite a few people who played major roles in the birth and development of HCA as well as in the growth of interest in Heisey glass among collectors. Thank goodness for all of them. Yet there was one whose name seemed to be sung "by the birds in the trees," Louise Ream. ◆

FROM THE ARCHIVES DON VALDES

September 20, 1944

Hence, the donkeys!

I'm glad you liked Bricker. I think he is getting better as he goes along. I didn't hear Dewey last night but I understand he said a mouthful, and really put himself on record as far as labor is concerned. I imagine you read the speech so I won't go into detail.

I'm glad for Randy Stambaugh that he is back in New York. Give him my best when you see him.

I'm glad to learn that retail sales are still holding up and I believe they will. The dropping off of orders placed will no doubt give us a breathing spell and let us catch up with our orders of back dates that we have on file. "Corpus Christi", if we could only get more help we could certainly go to town and make everybody happy. I imagine when this thing is over the people will knock one another off the gang plank to get on the first boat that goes to Europe.

Father was right when he siad you can wine and dine the trade and send them Orchid and what not and they'll favor you as long as they can make money on your product but if you can't deliver the goods, no amount of entertainment will help you. 

TWENTY-ONE PUNCH BOWLS AND OTHER STUFF Carl Sparacio

We spoke last time about my brother sighting what he thought was a Banded Flute punch bowl (see catalog illustration below) in a TV ad for an upcoming Martha Stewart TV show. He reported this to me because he knows I'm a nut about Heisey sightings where you don't expect them. As I told you then, I watched the show and never saw the punch bowl in question but found instead that Martha was messing up a purple flashed large Heisey Bee Hive plate with Scandinavian cookies.

I just figured then, since my brother Vince doesn't usually recognize anything beyond Ridgeleigh, that he was mistaken. Well, it seems I judged him too harshly, too quickly. I received an e-mail from HCA member Diana Rose of Michigan who confirms the existence of a Martha Stewart Banded Flute punch bowl. Diana said, "I have seen it more than once. Heisey punch bowls attract my eye very easily - I own 21 complete sets. She [Martha] did not actually put anything in it, she just showed it as a vessel in which she *would* serve something."

Diana also tells us that she has noticed several other Heisey serving pieces on Martha's show. How about that !? Now we can all feel more kindly towards Martha than we used to. I guess I owe Vince apology for an believing he didn't know what he was



talking about but, like most siblings, we don't apologize, we lean more towards throwing punches or insults at each other.

What impressed me most about Diana's kind response was her offhand remark about owning 21 punch bowl sets. This tells me that Diana and her husband, Charles, do not live in a trailer. At our house we might be able to handle 21 punch cups - but punch bowls? I don't think so. If I assembled 21 punch bowl sets you would likely see me and the Mrs. on TV but not with Martha Stewart.

We'd be on *Divorce Court,* or at the very least we'd be chatting, for all the world to see, with Judge Judy.

Actually, a punch bowl collection is not as strange as I've made it seem. I know of at least one other punch bowl collector and I'm sure there are more. I'd be interested in knowing if Diana is missing any. Twenty-one seems like an awful lot if we're talking only Heisey.

While we're on the Martha Stewart subject we noted the other colors in other sizes we've seen in that Bee Hive plate she was using. Kim Carlisle of Sheridan, Indiana e-mailed that he has had the 14" plate in Moongleam on two occasions. Some of you may know Kim as a glass restorer extraordinaire. He does a great job with "sick" glass (I wonder if he can do the same with a brother). Another reader, who shall remain nameless, reported a sighting in Hawthorne but later notified me that his information was incorrect. I appreciate that he took the time to keep the record straight. I will note here, though, that he has a great fashion sense (this is not anything you are expected to understand).

OK, I've got one more sighting for you and then we'll lay this subject to rest. On the English TV show, *As Time Goes By*, in a scene in the kitchen, I spotted on their counter what looked very much like a No. 341 1/2 Colonial Half Gallon Squat Jug (that's a Heisey catalog description - it's a pitcher we're talking about here). If it wasn't Heisey, somebody has filched somebody else's design. One wonders how this beautiful Heisey pitcher turned up on an English TV show. Being a poor loser, I'm counting it as a sighting until someone proves me wrong. It won't be my brother - he doesn't watch PBS. He's into Nickelodeon.

As I write this, we are preparing for the National Capital Heisey Collectors Club (with the National Capital Heisey Study Club) All-Heisey Glass Show to be held in Gaithersburg, Maryland this coming weekend. As you read this, the show was over a couple of weeks ago. It is arguably the finest all-Heisey antiques show staged anywhere. Some unusual pieces of Heisey always show up at this Heisey-fest. I'll report on the show and what we saw the next time and with luck I'll have some pictures too.

Because I have just a couple of days to finish packing for the show, I'll have to cut this short. In the meantime, keep spotting that Heisey the kind you see on TV or in home decorating magazines - it's cheaper than buying. ◆

The Bay State Heisey Club held its January meeting on Tuesday, the 11th, at the Follen Church in Lexington, Mass. President Doug Wynne was "out sick," so the meeting was conducted by Steve Pescatore (past President Emeritus and Extraordinaire).

After a productive business meeting, we proceeded directly to Show and Tell and as usual were inundated with "fabulous finds," including: a #1483 Stanhope tray with black knobs and Swingtime etch (stunning); a beautiful Waverly cigarette box in Orchid, with Seahorse handles; #1200 Cut Block creamer and sugar, souvenirs from the Pan American Exposition, both inscribed to "Mabel" but found by the member/owner two months apart; a #1637A Town and Country 8" plate in Limelight, topped by a #3806 blown cheese cover--itself a very difficult item to identify but shown with the plate in a Heisey catalog. Two nice tumblers--The #3791/2 Urn and the #417 Double Rib and Panel, plus a #5057 Suez cocktail, cut. And for a find which really speeded up my pulse, a pair of #3961/2 10 oz. sodas (shown in Catalog 17), a probable variant of #393 Narrow Flute and very similar to Coke glasses in shape.

In the non-Heisey category, there was a gorgeous pair of D&M Blue Caribbean salt shakers, along with an early Duncan "Barred Oval" large oil lamp.

Finally, Steve brought an interesting cut 9" candlestick, almost identical to Heisey's #2 (O.W.), but very probably English-an excellent example of the questions which surround the origins of certain designs (similar cut treatments of <u>non-Heisey</u> "Georgians" can be found). The evening's program--Heisey by Imperial--was conducted by David Steer, the club's undisputed expert on the subject. Along with discussing the history of the two factories and especially Heisey's acquisition of its molds after Imperial closed, David presented numerous pieces belonging to members and from his own extensive collection: Zodiac candy jars in virtually every Imperial color, Old Williamsburg goblets, animals, and for the truly unusual--a pink Cathedral vase and a Swan handled pitcher in Stiegel Green. •



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
