"ON THE ROAD AGAIN" Carl Sparacio

Just as Willie Nelson sings about being, "on the road again," we too burned rubber. We've headed west for the annual HCA Convention. We left about four days ago on our 500 mile trip but we didn't make great time (we were delayed by antiques shops and antiques centers). This is embarrassing when you figure we could have come this far in little more than an hour had we hopped a plane. But that's not counting the three hour trip to the airport and, if we were lucky, a two hour wait to board our flight and another hour to take off. Then you have to tack on as much time after landing to go through the luggage wait and the car rental routine. Actually, if we drove straight through it would be faster than flying. No matter that there's not a major airline on earth that flies to Newark, Ohio - but that's a small detail.

The further west we came the more practical an airplane seemed to be from an economy standpoint. When we left home I paid \$1.59 for a gallon of regular gasoline and I thought that was outrageous. When I filled up again in West Virginia I had to pay \$1.69 and that was for "self serve" – an abomination foisted on the public by oil companies who told their customers they'd pay less for gas if they served themselves - a promise kept by raising the price of "full serve" gasoline. By the way, the station we stopped at didn't even offer full service by an attendant. If they had it could have been at least 40 cents more per gallon.

Just outside our motel window in Newark there's a gas station offering regular unleaded at \$1.84 per. I feel like I'm being robbed.

But I digress. Our trip was long by design. Our intention was to visit a couple of glass collectors groups' annual shows first -Morgantown's and then Fostoria's. We've done this for a few years now, combining non-Heisey events to those that coincided with our Heisey itinerary, and it's been an education. Morgantown has always been the most fun because we know so little about it. Every year we come away with more information and are able to spot more and more of their product along the antiques trail. Another plus at Morgantown is the spread of hors d'oeuvres they put out on opening night. Some of us make a meal out of it (me) but I'd guess that that is their intention or they wouldn't have put out dessert and coffee, too. There is enough Heisey offered on many of the tables to make a visit worthwhile for a Heisey collector. We were able to pick up a piece of Heisey I had almost given up finding.

The Fostoria show and sale pretty much echoed the Morgantown affair when it came to early Fostoria patterns. Much of the show consisted of Fostoria's American and Colony and Coin Dot patterns and a ton of Navarre etched pieces. There was Heisey glass available but not as much as in previous years and there, as at Morgantown, Heisey prices were awfully high. My hope of seeing pieces shown in early Fostoria's Victoria, Hartford, and Alexis patterns was not realized. I noted one piece of Victoria (Fostoria's first pattern) and a half dozen rather common Alexis toothpick holders. The Fostoria show is beautifully mounted and a good deal of the credit for that must go to the room it occupies in a museum. It lacked a display room as featured at Morgantown and is something they should consider in the future.


All in all, the inclusion of older patterns at our Heisey show reflects the maturity of our organization (the HCA is old, not us). I remember in the early years of national Heisey shows thinking how one could believe that the only pattern Heisey made was Empress (hey, this is my memory – don't knock it). What a joy it is to see Fandango, Fancy Loop, Punty & Diamond Point, Cut Block, etc., etc., etc. We're fortunate indeed that Heisey history is preserved and recorded in more than just the printed word. Fortunately, as soon as we arrived here in Heiseyland, the fun began even though we arrived a couple of days early. Checking into our motel we ran into Heisey folks and swapped stories of the past year. There are many fascinating prospects for glass collectors to begin a collection.






It might be a certain color of glass. Or it might be glass animals. What about cut or etched items? Just think about <u>your</u> Heisey friends for a minute. Who collects only items in sahara or moongleam? Who collects Rose etch? What about baskets and candlesticks? So many choices!!!

A nice collection could be put together if you are interested in space! Ah, you say, little items! Well yes, that would be another good choice, but I was thinking more of Heisey glass for the "outer space" connection! A stellar idea, don't you think?

Depending on your inclination, you could have quite a bit of space right in your own home! Just take a look at the solar system. From the inner solar system begin a collection with Mercury, Mars, (both above) and Venus. From the outer solar system you can add Saturn (p. 8) and Pluto (above).

After capturing those planets, go directly to the stars. **Ridge and Star, Star and Zipper, Star Base** punch cup, **Star Relish, Star plate and Starburst plate**. Each of these items would be a great grouping. But don't forget to add something from the **Sunburst** line! (See

plate at right.) All these items will make a wonderful display in your space. Of course, with all these stars, you might even find you have a **Comet**!



To add a

bit more interest in your space, catch a ball vase with **Stars and Stripes** carving (see photo on previous page). Or add a Lady Leg stem etched **Zodiac**.


And we know what can happen with a collection...one desires MORE. So, for filling up more space, grab some candles and light up your **Empire** (see below) or even the **World**. Still not enough? Go for the entire **Galaxy!**♦

1252 TWIST, Part 2 Walter Ludwig

Editor's note: This continues Walter's series on the Twist pattern and picks up where his article in the May 2000 issue left off. Keep watching your *Heisey News* for more on this fascinating pattern.

Design Features

Let's discuss some of the design features that set the 1252 line apart from other patterns. The most distinctive feature that all items in the pattern share is the lines that separate plain areas into bands that create a spiral effect. Many earlier and contemporary patterns of both Heisey and other glass companies are based on spiral effects. Examples include Imperial's Twisted Optic, U.S. Swirl, Duncan's Spiral Flutes, and Fostoria's Queen Anne which became their Colony Pattern. Heisey's pattern is distinguished because of the width of the spirals and the gentleness of the curve. If one examines the pieces you will find that the number of spirals varies from 8 on many pieces to 16 on the largest plates (other pieces have 10, 12, or 14 spirals). There is one piece that one could say has 24 spirals. The displacement of any spiral from its start to end is always less than 45 degrees and usually much less.

The second distinguishing feature is the handles that are slightly open and come to a single point. You see these handles on the mint, nut, and two-handled sandwich and several other pieces. I will come back to talk about these handles later in these articles.

The other features of the pattern are ones that give the pattern a definite Art Deco flair. Art Deco was a major design trend of the twenties and thirties. The hallmark of good Art Deco design is the rejection of the curve and the presence of strong geometrical features. The name Twist implies curves but a close examination of the lines that divide the bands reveals that these lines are always straight even though they may follow the contour of the piece as they do on sodas and tumblers. The plain bands within these lines give the illusion of spirals without sacrificing the Art Deco restriction on curves. Heisey's designers obviously wanted this pattern to echo its time and Art Deco was in. Heisey added zigzag handles, stepped bases and finials, and stacked pyramids in the stems.

All of these features make the pattern stand out and make it look modern and up to date but maybe not so up to date that it would scare away the more traditionally minded. As one commentator said at the time "modernistic but not bizarre." The zigzag handles can be found on two sets of cream and sugar, oil bottles, cream soup, and cup (see photo below). The stepped bases are on the mayonnaise, footed floral, stemware and footed sodas, and footed salt and pepper. The stepped effect is echoed in the finial on the top of the mustard and the sugar bowl lid, as well as the stopper of the oil bottles. The inverted pyramids are used in the stems of the stemware.



consider a good piece of Marigold now will often look crackly when examined closely. When first made the formula had volatility that would cause the hot glass to pop making working conditions difficult. Within a year of introduction, the Marigold color was discontinued. These two factors make finding good condition pieces of Marigold difficult today. Fortunately Flamingo ("with the delicate glow of sunset") and Moongleam ("with the cool green of summer meadows") are the colors most easily found in Twist today and the most collected in sets. Given Twist's start in 1928 and the end of production in these colors in 1935, the pattern was abundantly made in both colors. In 1930 Heisey introduced Sahara and Alexandrite. Sahara, a much more pleasing pastel tone, replaced Marigold as Heisey's yellow representative. Alexandrite is an exotic color blending pinks, blues, and lavenders. Sahara was used for 1252 but not all pieces were available in this color. Only three pieces are available in Alexandrite. Only one piece of Twist remained in Heisey's line in the 1950s and that piece is rarely seen in Dawn, Heisey's smoke color from that era. Tangerine, a bright orange color, is know in a few plates and a few pieces are known in a seldom seen color, Gold, a variation of Marigold that will glow under black light.

Colors

Twist being developed in 1928 comes right in the middle of Heisey's second color era. While crystal was made and advertised, one sees very little for sale now. Twist and Marigold ("sparkling with golden sheen") seemed to have been developed together and Marigold was probably the predominant color for the ware when the pattern was first made. You would think it would be easy, therefore, to put a set together in Marigold. Unfortunately Marigold with uranium as one of its component chemicals proved not to be a stable glass Over time many pieces have taken formula. on a sugary appearance. Even what we would





Nuts in moongleam and flamingo; #1401 Empress d.f. bowl with Rosalie etch; #1503 Crystolite candleblock made into a bookend; #1506 Provincial mustard; #1566 Banded Crystolite candleblocks; #3380 Old Dominion wine in Sahara; Goose wings half with painted roses; #15 floral frog with Duck insert in flamingo.

As always, Show and Tell, conducted by Steve Pescatore, produced an impressive collection of material: #1519 Waverly oval comport with gold decoration (not done by Heisey, but very pretty); #315 Paneled Cane custard cup (unusual); a #350 Pinwheel & Fan hotel sugar; #393 Narrow Flute 2 oz. wine (remember, Narrow Flute has 21 stems!); #1533 Wampum torte plate; #300 5" orchid vase (the smallest); a #341 Puritan 5" footed jelly, <u>cut</u> (oddly enough, cut Puritan is not common); a #466 Panel & Double Pleat shallow 7" nappy; #343 Sunburst hard-to-find <u>Diamond</u> bonbon; and #1220 Punty Band 6" pickle, "geometric bottom" – a Ruby stained souvenir piece from "New London, N.H." Non-Heisey finds included a small Duncan & Sons #331 Block 3-sided bowl, plus a Duncan Three-Face oil lamp (original); a Duncan & Miller Mardi Gras salt shaker and 4" rose bowl plus a "Diamond Ridge" 8" covered bowl; a Fostoria juice in Wisteria, and a Cambridge cigarette holder with the "Achilles" cutting.

David Steer, the Club's acknowledged expert on Heisey and other glass animals, presented a very informative program on the subject, covering animals "from all walks of life." From Heisey, we had a Rooster vase, Rooster-head and Rooster-Stem cocktails, a Fish candlestick, a Giraffe, head back (which David explained was done <u>by hand</u>, not in the mold), a Bunny with head up, and a Rabbit paperweight (frosted, with Crystal eyes.)

From Imperial, there was a Caramel Slag pony and a storybook mug; Boyd was represented by "Crystolite" swan nuts (out of the Heisey mold), and Viking (only recently defunct) by an excellent bunny figure.

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
