ANOTHER UPDATE ON THE STATUS OF LOCKET ON CHAIN, HEISEY #160 THOMAS MANLEY

(Editor's Note: In last December's *Heisey News*, we published a similar update on Locket and Chain. This update includes even more current figures for the locket on chain toothpick.)

In June of 1997, the *Heisey News* published the article entitled "Locket on Chain, Heisey 160, The Mystery Pattern" by Thomas R. Manley. The article was later published by Heisey Club of California's *Pony Express*, and *Antique Trader*, 3 September 1997. An abbreviated copy of the article was published by the National Toothpick Holder Collector's Society in February 1996 providing a broad announced recognition of the rarity of Locket on Chain pattern, especially the toothpick holder, throughout North America.

A request was made, asking persons having a Locket on Chain toothpick holder to contact the author or Heisey Collectors of America, Newark, Ohio, so that an account of the number of these toothpick holders could be ascertained. The Heisey staff has been most cooperative in reporting the existence of the various forms of Locket on Chain communicated to them by their members.

The year 2000 report will inform Heisey members and holder toothpick collectors of the current status of reported Locket on Chain toothpick holders on the 100th anniversary



of the introduction of the pattern (1897-1900), the exact date is questionable.

Locket on Chain was produced in crystal, emerald and canary. Finishes of ruby stain and gold were applied by outside firms.

The count currently is:

Clear: 14, eight are mint, three are chipped or cracked. No gold trim has been reported on this form.

Emerald: 4, three are mint, one tiny chip on base.

Emerald and Gold: 7, six are mint, one small rim chip. All report gold expertly applied probably by an outside company.

Canary: 2, one is mint, one chipped.

Ruby and Gold: 12, nine are mint, three are chipped or cracked. Some reported the gold was carelessly applied by an outside firm using clear blanks from Heisey.

To date, we have accurate data on 39 Locket on Chain Toothpick Holders. As John Woytowicz states in his e-mail to Heisey Glass Museum "Even though this is considered to be the rarest of all Heisey toothpick holders, I imagine that there are more in existence than we realize."

I urge anyone having a Locket on Chain toothpick holder not yet reported to do so. We need an accurate account. The value of this toothpick holder continues to increase. Accurate accounting of its numbers tends to justify their current value. If you do not own one, but know of the existence of a Locket on Chain toothpick holder, urge the owner to report same or you report it. I currently have the names of a majority of the owners, thus avoiding duplicate reporting.

The mystery continues, where are the canary Locket on Chain toothpick holders? Certainly there are more than two in Heisey Glass Collections in North America! ◆

HCA QUARTERLY MEETING MINUTES OCTOBER 14, 2000, KENNESAW, GEORGIA

This Percy and Vivian Moore Quarterly meeting was held in Kennesaw, Georgia at the fairgrounds. We enjoyed the great southern hospitality, the delicious barbecue, and the beautiful elegant glass show. This was all made possible to <u>all</u> HCA members by the Dixieland Heisey Study Group.

The evening program started as Sam introduced Percy Schnaidt and Vivian's daughter-in-law, Susan Moore, and her son and daughter-in-law, Greg and Gloria Moore. Sam told of his recollections of Percy Moore. Percy and his brother, Glen Moore, had a tire alignment business and when his cars outgrew their Newark area, they opened an auction car location at Etna, Ohio. Percy also bought the remaining Heisey items when the plant closed, along with Zanesville area pottery. He closed his car museum in 1961 and continued selling glassware.

When Heisey came back on the scene, Percy was also involved. The Newark Heisey Club gave \$10,000 to do a \$20,000 renovation for the King House. When Park National was not as interested in our renovation as we were, Percy came to our rescue with \$10,000 along with \$10,000 from Miriam Balo. Percy was always supporting HCA and their projects. Often he would open the Museum front door and announce an arriving bus load (whether there was indeed a bus or not). ALL if us in the HCA family have many very fond memories of Percy and Vivian.

Host Sid Edwards of the Dixieland Club followed with information on their club. In 1993, the Dixieland Heisey Study Group formed with nine members and now has 40 members. Their First Annual Elegant Glass Show was in 1999 with a dinner for the dealers. Their club presented \$3,000 to HCA for the Endowment Fund from this year's show in honor of Lee and Dick Schwan for their continued support and leadership in forming this club. Sid and Mary Edwards also donated a Moongleam #107 Wellington candlestick to the Museum in the Schwans' honor.

President Charlie Wade opened the quarterly meeting. He mentioned that two board officers were not in attendance this evening as Dick and Marilyn Smith were here but needed to return to Newark at the illness of Dick's mother and Amy Jo Jones broke her ankle and was unable to attend.

Charlie called the meeting to order and asked for the secretary's report. Sid Edwards made a motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes, seconded by Helen Freeman, accepted.

The treasurer's report was given by treasurer Jack Metcalf. He reported a balance of \$75,523.61. A motion to accept the treasurer's report was made by Phil Abrams, seconded by Dick Marsh, accepted.

Jack also gave an Endowment Fund report. The 3rd quarter balance is \$1,286,226.37. Jack reminded us that this balance fluctuates with the stock market.

Benefit Auction report was given by Dick Marsh. Not much to report at this time except the importance of getting your glass to the Museum as early as possible. The deadline for receiving glassware is January 1st. We will be doing phone bids at the auction this year. Bob Dickman and the Dayton Area Heisey Study Club will again have a mini-show following the Benefit Auction.

Convention report by Jack Metcalf. Jack had the following information to report following the board meeting this morning:

-Display and Glass Show will be at Adena Hall this year

-The Theme will be "Heisey Garden"

-Swap Meet moved to Hopewell Hall at O.S.U.

-I.D. Breakfast will be at Hopewell Hall at O.S.U.

-Dates are June 13-16, 2001

Next Thursday, October 19th, there will be a Strategic Planning session if anyone is in the area and wishes to attend. You would be very welcome.

Motion to adjourn by Phil Abrams, meeting adjourned.

OFF THE WALL LARIAT CARL SPARACIO

The photo we've included here is of a piece of Lariat that appears to have just had a Halloween scare.

I was tempted to say I made it myself by heating a Lariat plate in the oven, letting it get mushy and then pulling up the sides to make it look like a handkerchief vase. My wife wouldn't let me tell you that even though I promised to say, "Don't try this at home." At any rate, it is unusual enough to be brought to your attention.

We're not sure if this was a production piece but, since we can't find it pictured in any of our reference material, we'll assume that it is a whimsy (please note: we've been known to assume wrong in the past). I wouldn't have given it a second thought if the Lariat loops were sticking out horizontally as one expects them to be but, seeing them all akimbo as if someone pointed a gun at them and yelled, "Stick-emup!" caught my attention.

It is marked on the base with a Diamond H, which usually is good but can be bad at times (bad because it would have been much less expensive if it weren't marked). It's about the size of a regular handkerchief vase if measured against a regular



handkerchief. It is 8" across at its widest and 5" high to the top of the loop that apparently was most frightened.

HOW NEW ITEMS ARE BORN R.C. IRWIN

(Editor's Note: This article ran in the July 1978 issue of the $\it Heisey~News,~$ it was produced from a collection of correspondences between a Heisey employee and TC Heisey.)

October 28, 1942

I hereby offer some suggestions which I think would be of importance in strengthening some of our patterns and still make some very desirable items for January. Most of these can be made without new moulds or equipment.

As these items are made, I would like to see a few samples made of these new items. I don't expect to adopt all of them, but we could adopt the most desirable and the ones that cause the least trouble.

Take our #1503 6" footed vase and swing this into a 12" and 15" size.

Take our #1503 13" oval utility tray, flatten this item perfectly flat so it will make a nice beverage, cocktail, or sandwich tray. As this bowl does not have to be ground, I think we could get a very handsome piece.

Take #1509 10" sunburst bowl and deepen this shape and crimp. Then stick a nice handle on it, so we can get a good looking basket. In fact this particular item can be made flared, crimped and even in bon bon shape with handles. We should pick out one or maybe two of the best shapes and if they are satisfactory, we should etch this item with ORCHID.

I would like to experiment with the 5" #1428 horn of plenty vase. If snaps are available, I would like to see this swung up into about 10" or 11" size. The more irregular it is, the better-looking it will be.

Take our #1519 footed mayonnaise and flatten the foot out. This would be a very pretty little basket. Several shapes can be made from thisoblong shape, flared, and this can be etched ORCHID. There will be a handle on it.

Take our #1519 footed fruit bowl and make perfectly flat salver. By taking the #1519 torte plate ORCHID etching plate, this will fit exactly on this salver and be a splendid new addition to the pattern. We are making, or I hope we are, three sizes 9", 12" and 15" #1540 swung vases. We etch in ORCHID our #4191 12" vase. Take this plate and etch the #1540 12" swung vase. This etching does not have to be perfect and true as the vase will vary and so will the etching, so a patched job will be just as satisfactory as a special plate.

Some time when you are working #1506 footed ice tea, I would like to see this item swung into a 10" and 12" vase. With the big bull's eye stretched and distorted, it may be a very handsome item.

Also #1506 1000 Island could be swung into an attractive wide-mouth bowl or vase, maybe around 8" or 9" high.

I would like to see our #1540 sugar and cream reshaped. These should be made a little larger in diameter, if this is possible. They are in demand in the #1540 pattern. We also have numerous calls for nice rock crystal cut sugars and creams and salts and peppers. #1540 would be one of the better items to cut. Also #1519 footed sugar and cream can be cut.

I believe a nice nappy could be made out of our #1540 6" plate. Our present #1540 baked apple is quite large and we have calls for smaller nappies in this pattern.

We still do not have desirable cordials and wines to go with our #4036 pint and quart decanters. Also the Penguin bottles and I suggest that we use our #3318 3 1/4 oz. wine and the #3318 1 oz. cordial. These two items should be adopted and put back in the line so we can make up the proper cordial and wine sets for January. These sets should be cut with bold, man-type cuttings.

I believe that we could make a beautiful light-weight egg plate out of our #1540 sandwich plate, by making "former" with egg-shaped depressions and getting the plate hot and letting it sag into the "former" depressions. This is something for Ray to figure out, but I think it would be far more practical and good looking than a special mould. (This was done.)

We have had numerous requests for a good cup and saucer in #1540 and I suggest if moulds can be procured and we do make one, that we should copy a good English shape and I will be glad to furnish you with an English bone china shape that we should carry out. Same applies to a cream soup. We have plenty of plates to be used with the cream soup, (Cup and saucer were made.) We also should have for early Spring a good-looking blown lightweight jug in LARIAT pattern - half gallon size with an ice lip.

I understand that we have about completed the #1540 cigarette box cover and this box must have an individual ashtray to go with it. I suggest that we make a light-weight slightly oblong tray that will nest. Keep the bottom of the ashtray plain so it can be monogrammed. The LARIAT rope can go around the edge.

ORCHID etching needs a good blown compote. Could we stick our #3404 compote bowl on a lighter weight stem and etch with ORCHID? This is an important item and needed badly even if we have to make a new mould. Fostoria and Cambridge do a big job on their compotes in all their etched and cut patterns.

We also need a nice 6" compote In the #1540 line. This compote must be made to use one of our blown covers so we could have a tall footed candy box or covered jelly in the same item.

I have given Howard Mueller all the information on the Keifer Company Brooklyn prism, and these should be adopted and used on our Colonial sticks such as #301 2 and 3-light, and #300, etc. They are the best-looking prisms on the market for the money and I believe we could materially increase the sales of our candelabra if we adopted this prism.

Howard also has information on plastic salt tops. These should be adopted. They are betterlooking than glass as they are daintier and they are more practical and durable.

Since our special etched #511 and #512 console sets have about seen their day, I merely suggest that we should have something to take their place. The #1533 specials are also through. Whether or not we will want a special next year is questionable, but we are going to be continually asking for something to use for anniversary and special sales. Since Cambridge, Duncan and U.S. are all in the special business now, I believe that we should have something to offer instead of letting our competitors get all of this business. From experience, we find that etched console sets that retail for more than \$5.00, the volume drops in proportion to the increase over that price. Therefore, we should work out something that should not cost over \$2.75. Could we re-shape one of our older footed bowls and use the new #1540 2-It. candlestick? Possibly something could be worked out in \$2.75 range with this stick.

This about concludes suggestions I have picked up and which were brought to my attention by the salesmen. I don't expect you to make all of these items, but I believe if we could make up a nice line of swung vases and some additions to LARIAT and an etched special, we would have about all the necessary new merchandise needed for the first half of next year. When these items have been experimented with, they should be laid out in a spot where they can be inspected and decided on for adoption.

Gentlemen:

In going over a letter which Rod left with us, I think he has some very excellent suggestions. I believe it would be wise for us to get out samples of all these items that he has suggested. Then we can get together and consider them and the possibility of being able to accomplish what he suggests. Also, get the necessary paraphernalia ready to produce these different shapes if they can be produced so we will not go off half cocked when we get to experimenting.

I am of the opinion that the #1503 6" footed vase can be swung from twelve to fifteen inches in height very nicely. (made 12 -15")

The #1503 13" oval utility tray, I fear will be difficult to flatten because it is finished on a former and not stuck up. In fact, there is no place to stick it up. If it could be whirled around over a heavy frame, maybe this result could be obtained. In other words, centrifugal force and a flame might flatten it right out.

I think the #1509 10" sunburst bowl can be crimped and handled O.K.

The #1428 vases, I would suggest the 7" would be better than the 5" for swinging, but that can be decided at our discussion. (This was made. Listed in 1944 catalog 8 - 10")

The #1519 footed mayonnaise can be made, but again we run into the same trouble that exists on our #1540 vase.

The #1519 fruit bowl presents a problem. If I recall rightly, our previous experiments along this line weren't successful, but maybe we can get a salver made out of it.

I imagine the #1540 swing vases can be etched all right with the plates that we have. (This was done.)

#1506 iced tea of course, will look well, likewise the 1000 Island on this same pattern. I don't have much hopes for the #1540 Sugar and Cream reshaped to make it larger. It can be done of course, but what will it look like. This is something for our judgment at the meeting.

I think he has something in a nappy out of the #1540 6" plate.

The cordial and wines suggested are very good. These should be gotten together and photographed.

I am afraid the #1540 egg plate is more or less of a dream, but they do this sort of thing with plate or window glass. I don't know whether we could warm this torte plate in real hot and then drop it in a former under a severe blast and have it settle into egg receptacles. If you could do this, you would have a mighty nice looking thing. (This was done for Production.)

The other items are a matter of new moulds. We will talk these over when we get together.

I suggest you see Ray and ask him if the #3404 comport bowl could be put on the #3316 goblet stem. This should fit in with the #5025. It is pretty much the same.

As to specials, we already have a casting and mould for candlestick and bowl in a special. We have the design, etc.

I believe that about covers what Rod had to offer, and we will get together early next week and make our decisions. In the meantime, please get the samples together so we can give them our serious consideration.

MORE CONVENTION EVALUATION RESULTS

These results are based on the 23 completed forms we received back. A summary of comments and a sample comment have been provided for each question.

Do you have any comments on any of the items you rated on the previous page?

There were a variety of responses to this question that ranged from positive comments on the Show & Sale, Swap, Seminars, and Speaker Don Hall, with room for improvement in areas such as: moving Show & Sale, more opportunity for activities, better registration packets, more study club registration, moving Show back to include Sunday, more vendors for the antiques in the Park, air conditioned halls for the Show & Sale, and a vote to leave the Show & Sale separate so as to not interfere with one another.

-"It's always great to see so much Heisey for sale in one room. Antiques in the park was disappointing-not enough vendors. Factory tours should be done again- not enough options to get everything in."

What did you think of the theme, "Heisey: Looking Forward, Looking Back?" Do you feel developing a Convention theme is useful and should be continued?

The majority of responses to this question agreed that it was a good idea and that it helped with continuity. Almost all agreed that it should be continued.

-"We enjoy the 'theme' very much. Gives a slant to the conference and a theme can bring all events together."

What events were your favorites or the most helpful to you, and why?

The majority of respondents were pleased with first the Auction, then the Seminars, factory tours, Show & Sale, and ID session.

-"Seeing all phases of the Heisey history- plant, house, moulds, and Museum."

Which event do you feel most needs improvement? How would you improve it?

There were a variety of comments on this question including: speaker at the banquet, better food at events, wine and cheese to be held at opening of show, antiques in the park, antiques in the park back to the courthouse, city and state listings on registration tags.

-"Display, because-been there and it's like pulling teeth to get help. Local people are burnt out-the rest of us have too far to bring our glass. Little tables maybe."

What topics would you like to see covered by seminar or banquet speakers in the future?

Suggestions included: the future of HCA, individual collectors, other glass companies, less popular colors, naming and numbering and sizing of patterns, differences between glassblowing in the past and currently.

-"Invite the authors of the leading books on Heisey for a round table discussion on 'Heisey collecting trends'."

Can you recommend any individuals or groups whom we might contact about doing a presentation?

There were only a few responses to this question. They included favor vases, decanters, similar Heisey/Cambridge seminars, round table discussions.

-"PR-expanding membership-internet for HCA members."

What type of events would you like to see added in the future?

Responses included: demonstrations of glass made in Heisey mold, new collector seminar, children's show, fundraiser, casual events.

-"A fundraiser by offering to endowment members a piece of slag (I think that's what the huge hunks of colored glass found at the factory, were called." \blacklozenge



The Bay State Heisey Club met on October 10 at the Follen Church in Lexington, Mass., President Stephen Pescatore officiating. After a productive business meeting, George Fogg was drafted to conducted Show and Tell, which had the usual great finds we expect from our members: #121 Pinwheel candlesticks in Hawthorne; a #1405 Ipswich cruet with the "ecclesiastical" cross stopper (Heisey origin still unproven); a pair of apparent #22 Windsor candlesticks with matching lamp, which proved to be by Libbey (incredibly similar); (2) Fancy Loop wines; a #1295 Beaded Swag syrup in Opal; a very rare and early #9 salt; a #341 ½ 1-pint jug, along with a #341 7" bonbonniere; a nice #1951 Cabochon sugar & creamer with the Jungle Flower cut, along with a #1951 goblet, cattail cut; there was a beautiful pair of Medium Elephants, plus two unusual pieces-a #5083 El Rancho champagne and a #7025 "Twelve-Rib" compote (marked).

Noteworthy among non-Heisey items were a Duncan Mardi Gras cracker jar, a Tiffin Twilight modernistic bowl, and a Duncan Scallop Six-Point restaurant sugar bowl with the "flip-back" metal cover.

Next, David Steer, with assistance from George Gleason, presented a very informative program on Heisey colors, with particular attention to their chronological and stylistic history. Members brought illustrated examples.

The early opaques-Opal and Ivorina Verde were shown in a #1220 Punty Band sugar and creamer, A #310 Ring Band salt, and two finger lamps-#1280 Winged Scroll and #1295 Beaded Swag.

Emerald (also early) appeared as a #1245 Star and Zipper bowl, a #1205 shot glass, and a #1255 toothpick, while in Moongleam (the first popular 1920s color) we had a #110 Dolphin lamp, an Old Sandwich beer mug, a #3370 African goblet and a #15 flower frog with duck insert (among other pieces). It was noted that Emerald and Moongleam are often quite similar, despite the time difference.

In Flamingo, there was a #411 Tudor handled mug, a #3312 Gayoso Russian coffee, and a #433 Greek Key punch cup (plus others).

Hawthorne's short production was mentioned while discussing a Trojan goblet, Zigzag and Mercury candlesticks and again, the #15 duck/flower frog combination.

The even more ill-fated Marigold color was represented by a #3380 Old Dominion goblet #132 Sunburst and #128 Liberty candlesticks, and a #393 Narrow Flute individual sugar, <u>All</u> items were mint.

Sahara was next in line with #1428 and #1433 two-lights, a 33397 Gascony candlestick (scarce), and a #1184 Yeoman blown cruet (a short list).

Because attendance was somewhat light, some of the rarer colors were under-represented, but there was an Old Dominion goblet in Alexandrite, a Cobalt #3390 Carcassone cigarette holder, and a Saturn Zircon goblet. There were, however, four examples of Tangerine: a Gascony sherbet, an Empress 8" plate, a #3389 Duquesne footed tumbler, and a Spanish oyster cocktail.◆


