

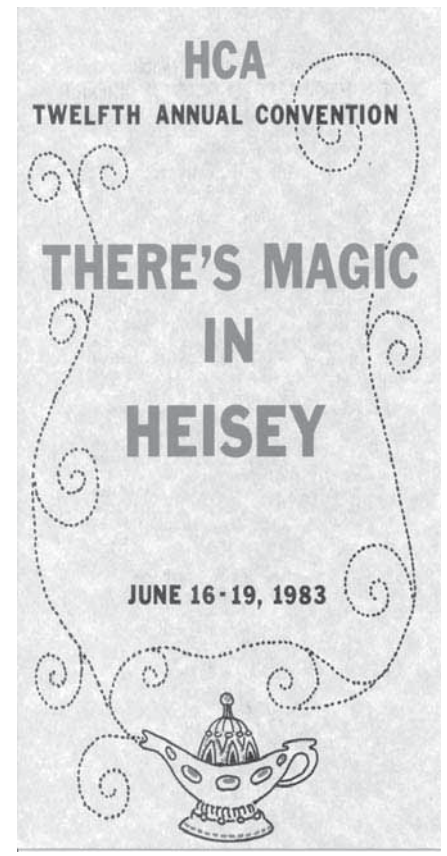
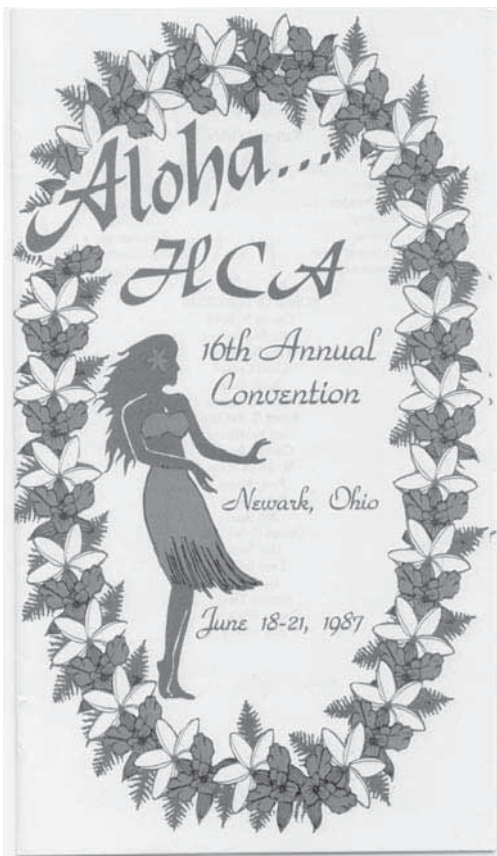

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Greetings! It seems like I no more get done writing one of these monthly articles, and it is time to do another one.

First, I want to thank everyone who volunteered his or her services at last month's Benefit Auction. I will not attempt to name everyone, but I just want to thank all of those who helped. If you have not heard, there is a fellow in California (Gene Moenning) who got lucky and won the beautiful Alexandrite goblet with the Chintz etch. I don't have a final tally on the money raised from the sale of the goblet, but it was several hundred dollars. Our thanks to Keith Bradbury for donating this piece.

At the Board meeting a couple of folks from Park National Bank who manage our Endowment Fund put on a presentation. The meeting lasted about one hour and was very informative. If you have any questions about the fund, contact one of the Board members as everyone was presented with documents explaining the investments and the bank's position as directed by the Board. We hope to do this once a year as it should help everyone understand exactly where the fund stands, and recommendations for changes can be reviewed at the same time.

The Strategic Plan is very close to being finalized for presentation to the Board at the June meeting. Each Board member will be given a final draft before the meeting. Many long and hard hours went into this final presentation. I would like to thank everyone involved for their time and ideas for this plan. This plan, if approved by the Board, will require a large participation of its members in order for it to bear full fruit. I am sure your President next year will need everyone's help in order to meet the timelines established under this document.

The Board also approved an increase in associate membership dues from \$22 to \$25 effective August 1, 2001. This increase is necessary as we can no longer eat the cost of postage as it continues to rise each year. You do have the option of renewing early at the old rate. Additional household member dues (\$5 each) and endowment level dues (see back cover) will remain the same.

The continued increase in postage is one reason your board is considering posting the *Heisey News* on the internet. We have much work to do with this yet, but rest assured it would be for members only and available by subscription, password, etc. There are still many details to work out. I will let you know more as the Board approves or disapproves the final resolution. Please give me your



thoughts on this subject. Whether you are in favor or not in favor, please contact me either in care of the Museum or you can email me at cswade@alltel.net.

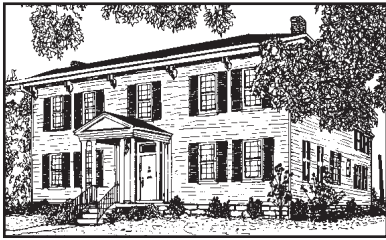
Speaking of increased costs, we have just learned that further production items from Mosser will go up an average of about 30%. I cannot remember the exact figures, but their gas bill for the month of January went up almost ten times between this year and last. Not only did theirs go up, but the Museum's went up as well. If an individual or club would like to help out or underwrite the gas bill for the Museum for a month, year or whatever you desire, give us a call. If you have been thinking about purchasing an item from the Museum Shop, now might just be the time.

The Ohio Historical Society is providing us with an intern for the summer to work in the Archives. The cost to the Museum will be very small, as the largest part of the salary will be picked up by the grant that has been obtained. Cost to the Museum will be \$500.00. Here is a great opportunity to help out and underwrite this cost.

Finally, I have one last item for your information. Cheri and her husband Thomas welcomed their first child in May. I think this is very exciting for all, and our best wishes go out to Mom, Dad and the grandparents. ♦

Back in February, the big news in my column was that we had hired our new Archivist, Vicki Meehan. This month we received some more good news on the Archives front. HCA was one of three organizations throughout the state to receive a grant for the Ohio Association of Historical Societies & Museums/Ohio Humanities Council's summer internship program. As a result, for a 12-week period starting the week of Convention, the Museum will have a full-time intern assisting Vicki in the Archives.

Having a full-time summer intern will certainly help us get things in order in the Archives, and since the grant provides for \$2,000 of the intern's \$2,500 stipend, the cost to HCA will be minimal. Our intern's name is Amy Shaw, and she is a graduate student in history at The Ohio State University, as well as a former historical interpreter at the Ohio Historical Society's Ohio Village. Look for her biography in the July newsletter, or stop by and say hello when you're here for Convention.

Speaking of Convention, the past month has had all of us here busy with final preparations for the big event. If you haven't yet registered for Convention, please do so soon! FROM THE ARCHIVES: Dinner Bells Again

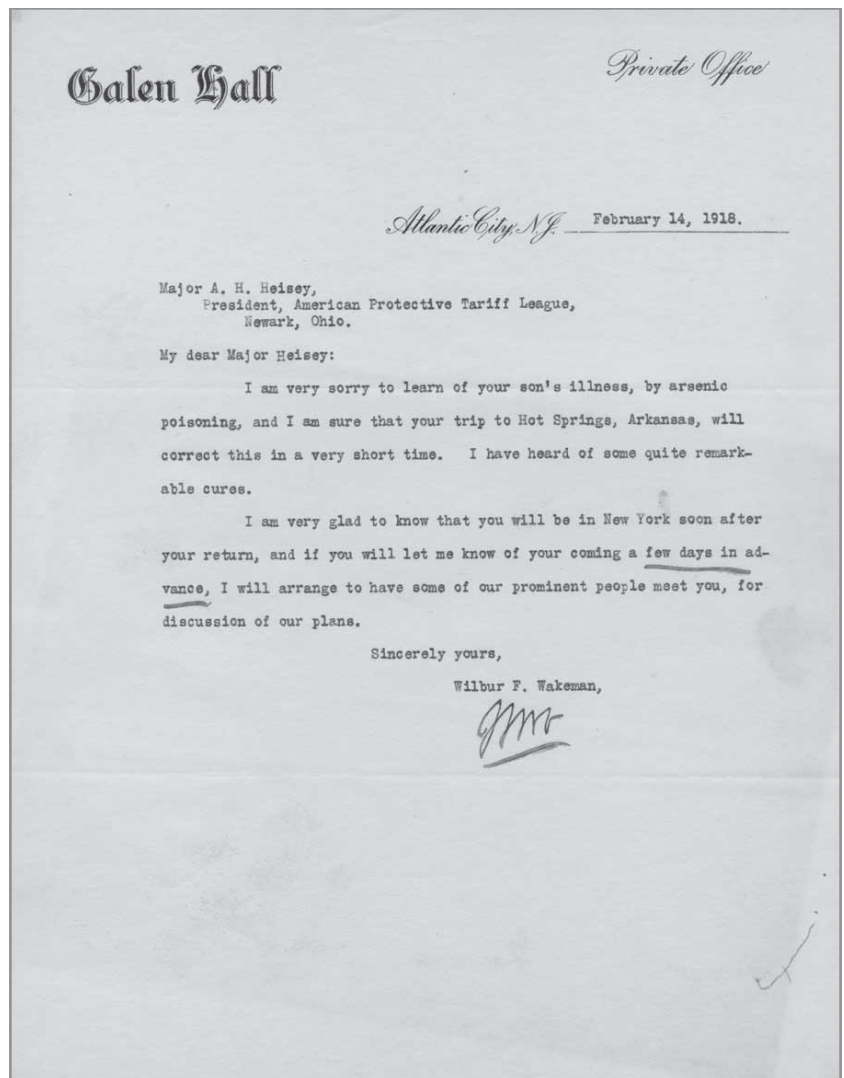

THIS 'N THAT

First a note on the National Capital Heisey Collectors' Club all Heisey show this past March: "For the third year, the show was held at the Bohrer Park Activity Center in Gaithersburg, Maryland. It's an ideal facility for an antiques show, dealer friendly (no stairs) and antiquer friendly (easy parking near the entrance—good for running back and forth to stash your purchases). The folks of the NCHCC who put the show together do a great job. This should not come as a surprise, after all, they've had 29 times to get it right (and I think they got it right from the very first try)."

That's what I wrote about this show last year. It still applies. Your *Heisey News* was filled to overflowing since that show and there was not space to include this year's report. No matter—it was the same old stuff: great show filled with the world's finest glass. If you've never been to an all-Heisey show, mark this one on your calendar for next year. It's always around St. Patrick's Day, and it'll blow your mind.

While we're on the subject of shows, there's another wonderful all-glass show that happens every April in Old Greenwich, Connecticut. It's put on by the Early American Pattern Glass Club of Westchester, NY. At this show, glass of all periods is permitted—from early Egyptian and Roman to early American and art glass through (I refuse to say "Elegant") Depression. You can find almost anything your little heart desires at this show. I saw a couple of things that would surely light the fire of any self-respecting Heisey collector.

How about a Winged Scroll cruet in Emerald? Or can you picture an Emerald Pineapple & Fan toothpick? Even better, I couldn't believe my eyes when I came upon a red and gold flashed Locket On Chain pitcher (see photo on next page). You may ask why I didn't acquire one or all of these gems. It's a sad story—my wallet had already collapsed from over-use, and I had to take it out to the parking lot and shoot it to put it out of its misery. You wouldn't believe the prices! Don't cry for me, Argentina; I did manage to find

something nice in my price range—more about that later.

There are a couple of Heisey people who deserve recognition and I intend to do that here. The first is John Martinez, President of the previously mentioned National Capital Heisey Collector's Club. Besides heading a fine group, John has contributed a series of articles to *The Heisey Herald*, his club's newsletter. I particularly enjoyed those on Fandango and Beaded Panel & Sunburst. On the latter, John reminded us that the official Heisey name for Beaded Panel & Sunburst is "Chrysanthemum." Unfortunately, we weren't aware of this before Clarence Vogel christened it BP&S. Vogel's name stuck. I make a motion that we make every effort to use the "Chrysanthemum" name for this pattern—it's much prettier than the name we're used to.

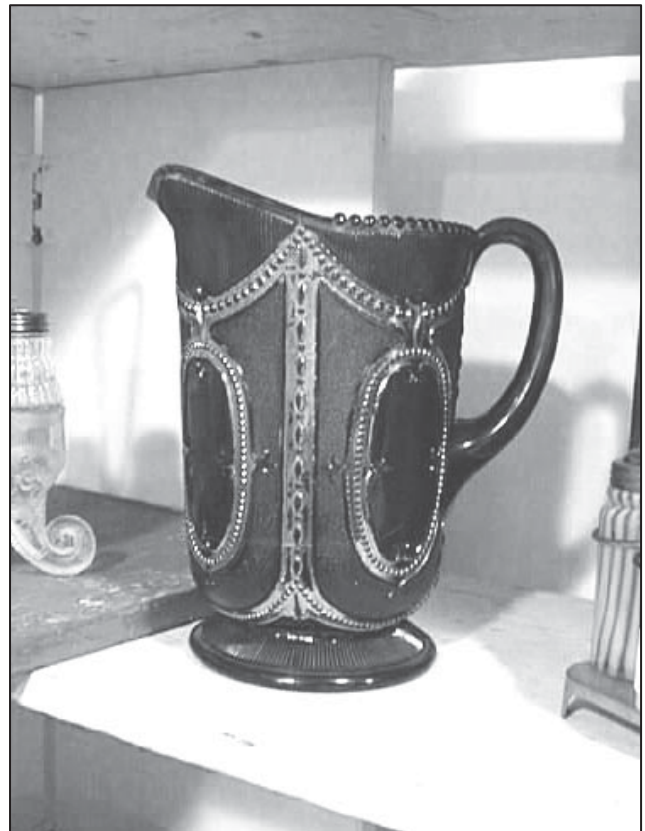
At the previously mentioned Locket on Chain pitcher show, there was a Chrysanthemum Handled Decanter complete with stopper. The price was right, so this big spender went for it. The sign said "two pieces" so I counted the stopper and the decanter as two. I was wrong, the dealer corrected me--it came with one wine glass. Now it really seemed like a bargain. When I checked it over I discovered a Diamond H under the base of the wine. I didn't have to wrestle with my conscience for long to keep it a secret between me and the wine glass.

In Vogel's and in John Martinez's article on Chrysanthemum, the decanter and wine glasses are shown in their catalog drawings. A beaded panel line on either side of the lower portion of the sunburst is indicated in these drawings. The two-piece set (hey, that's what they called it) I purchased does not have beading in the grooves that flank the sunburst. If the wine had not been marked with a Diamond H, I would have thought I had a ringer since some of this pattern is of questionable origin. The goblet in my collection does not show beading either. It's interesting, too, that in the photos accompanying John's article, a plate shows the beading but the cake salver does not.

I also wish to express a debt of gratitude to Fred Olsen of the Northwest Heisey Collectors group. Fred's discovery, reported in the last issue of the *Heisey News*, of a Heisey paperweight on

an Internet site featuring nude women was a revelation. It has expanded my Heisey hunting boundaries! I have searched these sites diligently since I learned that Heisey may be found on them. Best of all, now, when the Mrs. S. sees naked ladies on my computer screen, she does not berate me--she knows I'm Heisey hunting.

We're looking forward to seeing all of our Heisey friends this month at the annual HCA convention. Please stop by and say "hello." We'll be at our usual place in Adena Hall—near the back door (they're afraid we'd bother the other exhibitors).♥

A "TOWERING" DESIGN

Being members of HCA and members of a Heisey study club allows us to expand our horizons and learn of many interesting facts linked to glass. I have found that the eBay auction site also allows us to add to our ever-increasing base of information. Hopefully, everyone read the article "An Ebay Treasure 'Exposed,'" which was so well-written by Fred Olsen and printed in the April, 2001 *Heisey News*. The article concerned searching various links which might produce results pertinent to glass. One never knows where a link might lead, right Fred?

And speaking of links and never knowing, have you seen the new program "The Weakest Link?" It is interesting and frustrating and somewhat embarrassing. While I am not concerned with being or knowing the weakest link, I am interested in another link. Can you guess what might link together the following people: Leland A. Bryant, A. H. Heisey, Ray C. Cobel and Dorothy C. Thorpe? (I hope it is safe to presume you have heard of three of the names.) The link goes something like this: Bryant created the building, Heisey provided the glass, Cobel designed the shaker and Thorpe designed an etch for the item.

At our February study club meeting this year, Fred Schaefer presented a program on Eva Zeisel and Dorothy Thorpe and their link to Heisey. It was coincidental that an auction on eBay was offering a Cobel cocktail shaker with the etch "Sunset Towers." The following is a partial offering from the seller:

TOTALLY RARE HEISEY COCKTAIL SHAKER - DOROTHY THORPE SUNSET TOWERS ETCH!!

DESCRIPTION: This is Heisey's #4225 Cobel 3-piece cocktail shaker. It stands 12 inches high, therefore I believe it to be the two-quart size one. It is decorated with the ultra rare Sunset Towers etching done by the Dorothy Thorpe Company. I am told that each room of the Sunset Towers, legendary for the exploits of the movie stars it housed, was outfitted with one of these cocktail



shakers. Known today as the Argyle Hotel, the Sunset Towers building still stands over the Sunset Strip, casting its Art Deco charm on an appreciative Los Angeles. This cocktail shaker has a sandblasted profile of the building, palm trees, and — get this — a ZEPPELIN floating through the sky. This is NOT a Heisey factory decoration, and as far as I'm concerned, it trumps any standard Heisey cutting or etching in terms of rarity.

You can see by the accompanying picture that this is a fabulous etching done by Dorothy Thorpe. The Cobel shaker was a *perfect choice* to display this etch! According to an article about

Mrs. Thorpe in the *Los Angeles Times Home Magazine*, November 2, 1941, her first tracings on glass were only straight lines, as she had not designed before. Her designs certainly progressed from straight lines--look at the Hydrangea stem--but thank goodness for those straight lines when wanting to do a rendition of an Art Deco style hotel.

I wanted to print out a picture of the shaker and take it along to my club's meeting, but I had forgotten to bookmark the eBay link. So I did a search and asked for "sunset." I did not get the Heisey shaker on that search, but I did find a pamphlet featuring the Sunset Hotel in 1948 being offered for auction. I now had a great comparison for the etching which lead me to look for links to the hotel itself.

While researching the hotel, I discovered that Sunset Towers was designed in 1929 by Leland Bryant, an architect who specialized in luxury apartments. Now known as the Argyle Hotel, the building stands at 8358 Sunset Blvd. in West Hollywood, California. There were attempts to have this wonderful building demolished in the late '70s and early '80s, but thank goodness it was saved when it was purchased in 1986 by the St. James Club of Great Britain and was completely renovated. The structure is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. You can find very interesting reading and a deco taste of Hollywood history if you use the following link on the net: www.argylehotel.com and click on History and Architecture.

Ray C. Cobel, "master mechanic," worked for Heisey for 42 years. The patent information on the number 4225 shaker was filed December 19, 1931, without action although Prohibition was still in effect until 1933. The patent was renewed May 31, 1934, and was granted a month and a half later, so the earliest date for the Thorpe Sunset Tower etching could have been 1934, but I have no actual dates for her design production. However, I have no doubt that Cobel cocktail shakers with a Sunset Tower etch could very well have been in each room at that grand hotel. With 64 rooms in the hotel and using the final eBay auction price from February for the Cobel shaker with Sunset Towers etch, it would cost \$42,560 to put a shaker in each room today! (And you think

people remove towels!) From the link to which you were referred above: "Architecturally, the Sunset Tower represents the moment when Los Angeles, Art Deco, and Hollywood came together, their combined qualities produced elegance, sophistication, and fantasy."

Former Employees Reception

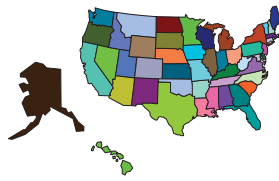

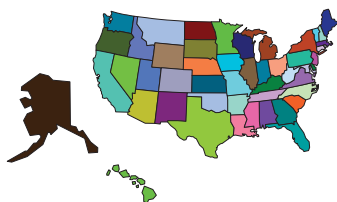

## Heisey Q & A

Each day, the Museum staff receives numerous requests regarding Heisey. Below are just two such requests we've received recently. To submit your own question or answer, just call the Museum or send your comments via mail, fax or e-mail to "Heisey Q&A." Your name and city and state of residence will be printed unless you request otherwise.

Question: I received as a gift a beautiful Heisey epergne that stands 24" tall and 10" in diameter. The piece has 4 separate sections which all attach together. Could help me find out some information on the piece such as years of production, pattern, etc?

Answer: The epergne is a No. 49 and consists of a No. 46 base, a 9 in and 11 in. saucer and a No. 6 vase. Originally your piece would have been sold with three tiers rather than two. Unfortunately, we do not have a lot of information on these pieces.



Question: I purchased a pair of vases that I believe to be Heisey Verlys. The sizes of the vases are approximately 8 3/4" high and 8 3/4" across the top and the design appears to be a flower. Can you please provide me with any information on these pieces and Heisey Verlys?

Answer: There were two places where Verlys was produced, France and Newark, OH. The US factory produced Verlys between 1935-1951. All completed and authentic Verlys have a frosted and clear mixture and they were always signed. The name of the pieces you are describing are Alpine Thistle vases made in Opalescent, Amber, Topaz, Directoire, Blue, Crystal etched and Dusty Rose.♥
