NEWARK -- The annual Heisey Collectors National Convention is as much about people as it is about buying and selling the famous glass pieces.

The joy in the face of 92-year-old Thelma Heisey Loomis, of West Covina, Calif., made the weekend a success for the descendants of Heisey Glass founder A.H. Heisey signing autographs Saturday at the Heisey Museum.

Brothers Tom Heisey, George Heisey and John Heisey, along with cousin Gus Heisey, spent three hours Saturday signing oval labels, featuring an image of the Heisey factory, for Newark Bicentennial platters. They signed more than 400 labels for people who had purchased the platters.

## Heisey Boys Sign Newark Bicentennial Platters at Museum During Convention

Loomis, who said she is a distant relative of the Heisey family, has been attending the convention since 1995, but the first-ever signing session made this year special.

"This is really a wonderful thing. I think it's wonderful to see these men together," Loomis said. "The glass is superb, and so are the people. We made friends here from Texas, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Arkansas, Oklahoma and South Dakota. I'm enjoying every minute of it."

The signing and an antique appraisal, both at the museum, were part of the Heisey Collectors National Convention, which included a Heisey Glass display and the 32nd annual Premiere Glass Show and Sale at Adena Hall at the Newark Campus.

The Heisey Convention is always a major event anticipated well in advance for collectors, but was obviously special to the Heisey quartet signing autographs and socializing with collectors from all over the country.

Another year, another successful Convention. I'd like to thank everyone who stopped by the archives to visit or for an information request during Convention. I'd like to especially thank the people responsible for bringing the *superb* chocolate-covered toffee to the Hospitality Room!

During Convention and the rest of the year when I receive reference requests, I realize that although we have a lot of materials in our archives, we are still missing quite a bit. For example, we do not have a complete run of catalogs, price lists or turn records.

Although many items have probably been destroyed, I know there is useful material in the hands of private individuals. Members and others have told me that they have old Heisey materials in their possession. Some items that have been mentioned include photos, advertisements and old factory records. They have found these at auction or simply by good luck.

I am writing to make a plea for donation of these materials to HCA for the Museum Archives. If these records remain scattered in private collections, other members and the general public will not benefit from their use. HCA and the Museum exist for the study and promotion of Heisey glass. By sharing these items, you can help bring knowledge about Heisey glass to light. Help us to fulfill our mission by donating original materials from A. H. Heisey & Co. These might include old catalogs, sales records, advertisements or photos. We are particularly lacking materials from the company's early years, from 1896 through the 1920s.

If you are congratulating yourself on a fabulous find of Heisey print materials, or if you have had materials in your possession for some time, why not share the materials with others who will be able to appreciate it down the road? We would even be willing to accept photocopies of significant items, if they fill a gap in our collection.

"We'll sign till our hands drop off," said George Heisey, a retired college professor living in Massachusetts. "They're enthusiastic and we're happy for them."

Hazelwood Elementary teacher Gus Heisey, whose dad was a salesman for the Heisey factory, said, "I like seeing the people come through and hearing their stories. Some of them say 'My dad knew your dad.'"

Tom Heisey, of Newark, remembered four years ago, when some of the Heisey family members signed autographs at the Longaberger Homestead barnraising, after Longaberger used a Heisey mold to make a Clydesdale horse in ruby red.

"Dave Longaberger told me what got him interested in Heisey was the Heisey story was so similar to him," Tom Heisey said. "The collectable market has demanded people's signatures. The zeal of the collector is really what this museum is all about."

Some of the collectors' zeal was seen at the antique appraisal, when a rare Heisey mug was appraised at \$4,000 and loaned to the museum.

Enthusiastic collectors were also plentiful at Newark Campus, where they came from Kokomo, Ind., South Portland, Maine, Burlington, Conn., West Palm Beach, Fla., and many other cities around the country to set up their Heisey Glass collections in Adena Hall. Some have been coming annually for 20, 25 or 30 years.

"We missed the first year," said Eileen Schamel, a seller from Boonsboro, Md. "The appeal is finding what you can't find someplace else to complete a set, a lid for a sugar bowl or that very rare piece."

Ron Leitheiser, of Sioux Falls, S.D., has been coming to the convention for years, but this was the first year he'd set up a booth in Adena Hall to sell Heisey glass. He said he's still looking to buy. "It's the allure of finding something new, adventurous and exciting," Leitheiser said. "You're never completely satisfied, but always on the hunt."

Jean Walter, of North Andover, Mass., said she looks forward to meeting people from all over the country at the convention.

"It's not just the glass, but the people we've met over the years, people from all over who've come to know what the Diamond H (logo) means. "A lot of the dealers are getting older and we sort of hope young people get into it. We've enjoyed it immensely."

## Antique Appraisal Event

Saturday morning burst forth bright, sunny and hot, which did not deter people from bringing their treasures to the Heisey Museum to have the pieces appraised by a willing group of independent appraisers. They came early and stayed late, and what they brought would have made the original appraisers on *The Antique Roadshow* envious.

At 8:45 a.m. a woman came through the doors carrying a package that contained a celebrity quilt (actually a celebrity comfort). It had names like Gene Autry, Barbara Walters, Barbara Bush, Liza Minnelli, Bill Clinton, Barbara Mandrell and many others. In all about 24 famous people with their autographs and some of the famous people included caricatures or other decor.

Sharon Orienter had a couple waiting for her when she came aboard and did not have an opportunity to sit down before she began opening the three items wrapped in cloth that the people had brought. The first item was a beautifully cut card box, very nice. Secondly, something none of the collectors had seen before, it was made of heavy cardboard and was a Heisey parade sign with ribbons like the Heisey sign. Wonderful item. Then we were all drawn to the table as Sharon unwrapped the third item and said "oh...my" and gasped, it was that kind of an item, a #3405 Coyle Mug in Alexandrite with the Big Bad Wolf etching and personalized "Elmer." That would stop anyone in his or her tracks. You can view the item after the convention at the Museum, as the couple has agreed to put in on loan for all to view

But that was not all folks, there was a Hair Mourning wreath in fantastic condition with the design layout in a frame with all the names of the people who contributed the hair and schematic indicating where it was located on the wreath, truly amazing. A presentation cane with a gold handle inscribed with the date and 1871 and presented in Ohio's 11<sup>th</sup> district to an outgoing Internal Revenue Director. Even back then they had taxes collectors. A stunning example of canes.

Another woman had three items to show, one was a gold filled watch, a Weller wall case and three Toulhouse Latrec block prints, original ones. Two of them had been cropped, the third was complete. I was dazed and could not believe that they were the real thing, but Lynn Welker said, "They're for real Bob. They are the real thing." I was going over them with my magnifying glass trying to prove I don't know what, shocking. Oh yes, she has another at home. They were hanging on her bathroom wall. She was thrilled.

There was also a lot of Heisey, deep plate etched sets, a large ice pitcher, seldom seen, shot glasses and aqua calientes. A set of Haviland china, an English vase, from Bristol area, a cross between Burmese and Peachblow, hand decorated with the decorator's initials. A large hand painted vase signed Hawkes.

A magnificent set of CopelandSpode in light blue, set for eight with serving pieces that a woman brought from Columbus. The people still in attendance were happy they had stayed to see this set, and there was obvious drooling.

Another woman brought a wonderful booklet from New York with the autograph and photo of Eleanor Roosevelt. She also had a beautiful hand painted oriental picture in a great frame. Her third item was an English serving spoon, sterling with Sir Walter Raleigh character on the handle.

There was a Zircon parade cane and a Cobalt parade cane. These people were really pulling some stuff out of the blankets. A landscape done by Arnsberger, oil on canvas worth several thousand dollars, an unreal folk art still life melon, peaches and grapes that was the cream of the crop. It was framed and the backing held the piece in place with square nails and the glass covering it was very old. No way I was taking the glass off and having that great item disintegrating in my hands! It was headed for Cincinnati and the Cincinnati Art Gallery for further study.

I saw one woman having some Donald Duck hankies appraised. There was so much going on that the Heisey people who came for breakfast stayed and enjoyed the proceedings. They were in for some real treats, and some of them were even pressed into service as appraisers. There is so much talent in this club, you would not believe. People had rings appraised and there was an amethyst necklace. A really nice walnut buffet from the twenties that a young lady brought a picture of. Joe Lokay assisted me on this one. It was really neat how people joined in and had a good time. We all learned a great deal. I learned that a large bulbous cut glass vase is called an "onion" vase. Man was that some piece of glass, must of weighed 10 pounds. Steve Pescatore was reflected all over that one.

There was much more that space did not allow me to include everything. Each appraiser was challenged with the quality of the items placed before them. It was fun, and we were so happy to see everyone enjoying him or herself.

I cannot forget to mention the person who started all this at the front door, Natalie Dall, who staffed the front door and responded to the doorbell. Their pre-event advertising and appearances helped tremendously. ♦

## Special Offer: Cobalt Sleeping Fox ashtray commemorating Newark, OH Bicentennial - 1802-2002

These items were originally made by Mosser in 1999 for the Museum's 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The anniversary ashtrays were custom etched and the fox was decorated in silver. Some unmarked extras were left undecorated. To keep these from being confused for original Heisey items (even though Heisey did not make this piece in Cobalt), the extras were custom etched in 2002 for Newark's Bicentennial.
