
Happy Valentine's Day

FROM THE CLUB/ MUSEUM DIRECTOR BILL DOUGLAS

There are several news topics that I'd like to share with you:

New Phone System – On January 8th the new phone system was installed at the new Museum. The new system has several features that are improving our business operation.

All the staff now has private voice mail boxes. Messages can be left for each staff member in a private mailbox. You can now leave messages for staff if they are unavailable, or anytime 24-hours a day.

We have also implemented an automated attendant. I know many of you are not fond of these, but we have made every effort to make ours as user friendly as possible. First, we have made the option to talk to a staff member one of your first options. Second, if you use a rotary phone, just stay on the line and you will be automatically routed to a staff member. Third, we have been able to add Museum hours and directions to the museum for those just wanting information. We have received many favorable comments from people calling in.

We have included the extension numbers for the staff in the staff listing on page 2 of the Newsletter.

Submitting information for the Newsletter – Many of you spend a lot of time formatting news stories and ads for the Newsletter. This may be hard to understand, but doing so actually takes more time for us to re-format to insert your information. If you are faxing or mailing in items, make the font at least a 12-point size if at all possible and use a plain font like Arial.

There is a short article with examples on page 5 that gives examples on ways to submit your information that will help us get the information into the Newsletter with a lot less work.

Videos Available – Adelphia Cable has supplied the Museum with three copies of the video they produced on the Museum in December. If you would like to borrow a copy for a Club Meeting let me know. First come, first served. For those of you who don't get to the Museum for the Holidays, it would be a great way to see the Museum decked out in all its Holiday splendor.

NEW IDENTIFICATION POLICY

The Executive Committee recommended and the Board approved a change in the Identification Policy for those requesting identification of glass. The following policy will take effect March 1st, 2003. The Policy will have no effect on HCA members.

Effective March 1st, 2003 the Heisey Collectors of America and the National Heisey Glass Museum will no longer provide free identification of glass to non-members. Complimentary identification will continue to be a valuable benefit for HCA members.

Individuals may submit identification requests by visiting the Museum, regular mail, or E-mail to curator@heiseymuseum.org, please include or attach a photo of the item whenever possible. The fee to non-members for identification will be \$5.00 per item. Payment can be made by Master Card, VISA, Check, Money Order, or Cash. Requests received without payment information will be sent a reply informing them of the policy. Request will not be forwarded for identification until payment is received.

Identifications are made for informational and educational purposes of the requester only and are not to be used in advertising the item for sale.

HCA and the Museum will continue their policy of not providing appraisals or values of items presented for identification. If appraisals are needed, a Dealer Directory from the Heisey Newsletter will be provided for the requester's use.

SUBMITTING ADS AND ARTICLES FOR THE NEWSLETTER

When preparing an ad or news item that you are going to either E-mail or send as an attachment, here are a few things you can do that will decrease the time it takes to do the Newsletter and make your job a lot easier.

Do Not:

- Take the time to make things look justified in your document
- Use multiple tabs or spaces to make things line up
- Use small fonts that are hard to read

Do:

- Use at least a 12 point font or larger. This is easier to read and the scanner can pick things up better
- Use two spaces after a period within a paragraph
- Use a plain font such as Arial, or CG Omega if possible
- Send as word document if sending as an attachment
- Send pictures in a JPEG format whenever possible

We have not visited the warehouse in a couple years to look at the finds that were made during the inventory. So let's talk about the remaining items that were found. We know little or nothing about these so you may find them interesting. Today's visit has one item that has been seen. The #1 Tea Ball Drip Holder. When this item was made is unknown, but production did happen. It has been found with silver band on the top rim. It has 12 panels and is 3" wide and rests on 3 peg feet. It is pictured in the Bredhoff's latest book.

The following are unknown items to me and are not included in HCA's pattern index of known pattern numbers.

Pattern #0 (none) name "L" prism. It looks like a spear thinning to a factice end being 5 7/8" by 1/4".

Pattern#1000 a creamer. This item has pressed diamonds and a spade shaped leaf for side pattern design.

Pattern #1631 is a divided relish. This pattern looks like pattern #1495 Fern, but not the same.

Pattern#1574 is an ashtray. This pattern looks like Ridgeleigh. The difference being that the ridges are very large, and should not be confused.

Pattern #1622 is a tumbler. It has what looks like a fern (plant) on its side.

We have two colognes, both a pressed and a blown one.

Pattern#1422 is a pressed cologne that is 4 1/2" tall with 4 sides including a 7 panel view the large being 1 1/2" wide.

Pattern #4022 is the blown one. It looks like what one would find in a blown stopper. The size being 2 1/2" wide by 3" tall. It would have a cast foot and a tooled top so finial appearance is unknown.

I have no idea what stoppers were used in either of them. While we are on colognes here is a tip on getting the correct pattern numbers on the 300, 400, and 500 series. The pattern number changes with each stopper. The stopper number changes if it has a dodder or not. The colognes with long dodders have odd number endings and without have even number, i.e. #485 has a long dodder and #486 does not even though they have the same stopper top. ♦


For you newer members, we plan on having the entire auction catalog completed so you will receive



Heisey introduced the Plantation Pattern in 1948 and was still offering the pattern when the plant closed in 1957. The purpose of this article is to give you a listing of all the items that were offered in the Plantation Pattern. 



FASCINATING INSIGHTS INTO EARLY HEISEY HISTORY

- TAKEN FROM EARLY TRADE JOURNAL REPRINTS

This is a continuation of early reports which began in the December, 1980 issue of HEISEY NEWS.

CHINA, GLASS & LAMPS, September 9, 1896

"The factory of A. H. Heisey & Co. has been having a good run since starting, and while the new patterns of imitation cut ware this firm started out with have by no means become slow sellers, another very fine set of table-ware has been put upon the market for the fall run. No old molds are being are being worked, because the firm has no old or second hand molds, but proposes to put a new set on the market at least every six months, or as fast as new molds can be designed and executed in their shop. For years to come, therefore Mr. Heisey will be able to supply his patrons with new goods constantly, and the factory is large enough to enable the firm to ship orders promptly."

* * *

CHINA, GLASS & LAMPS,

September 26, 1896

"The factory of A. H. Heisey & Co., at Newark, Ohio, closed down on Saturday last, owing to dullness in trade in the lines of ware manufactured."

* * *

NATIONAL GLASS BUDGET,

October 3, 1896

"A. H. Heisey, of the glass firm bearing his name at Newark, Ohio, is looking for the man who started the report that his plant had been closed down owing to dullness in trade, with a razor. Mr. Heisey states that a three day's stop was made for the purpose of making necessary repairs and that trade conditions had nothing to do with (the) matter."

CHINA, GLASS & LAMPS

January 13, 1897

"One of the best high class exhibits in pressed tableware in the house, or elsewhere, for that matter, is that made by A. H. Heisey & Co., of Newark, Ohio, in room 79, Their new pattern, No. 1205, is an imitation cut, the characteristics of which are the beaded or pillar line of light, supplemented with diamond pointed double incut parallel and cross lines, filled in with faceted hobnails, and quartered faceted squares, which, by their deep cutting and angular structure, show off the crystal to fine advantage. The bowls are made in 10, 11 and 14 inches, serving for orange, fruit or punch bowls, and are made with or without foot. The nappies and square dishes of the set are exceptionally fine, are without mold mark, and are made to deliver in a manner which has puzzled the oldest glassmaker's. The pattern in the square dish has an exceptionally bright, pearly square line crossing pattern, which has been admitted by rivals to be among the choicest pieces of pressed ware ever made. The 1205 pattern is very strong in nappies, bowls, celeries, creams, vases and rose bowls, and the water and wine sets, tumblers and goblets, in which the handsome figure of the pattern is finely brought out, make it one of the best high class lines on the market. The exhibit contains a few advance pieces of the new No. 1220 pattern, a combination of plain and figured line, or for engraving and decoration. The new ware is finished so as to give it a blown shape, which ends it additional attractiveness."

(Ed. Note: #1205 is the Fancy Loop pattern and #1220 is the Puntly Band pattern.)

A. H. Heisey & Co.
Samples of modern pressed glassware

Among American manufacturers who are fully up to date in their lines of pressed glassware, prominence must be given by virtue of merit, to the A. H. Heisey & Co., of Newark, Ohio. Mr. Heisey

was for many years identified with the old house of Geo. Duncan & Sons, for whom he sold goods on the road before becoming an active partner and officer of the company, and the experience thus gained as to the taste, requirements and demands of jobbers and consumers, has stood him in good stead ever since. The 16-pot factory built at Newark was started last spring, and one advantage of the new company consisted in the fact that there was an entire absence of old molds, patterns and designs to work off and sandwich between a few new patterns. Every pattern put on the market since last spring has been of original design, and while some old glassmen thought it a mistake in the management to spring its third new tableware line on the market early in the fall, it has been found that the line is of sufficient merit to hold its place among the finest patterns shown this year, while new pieces have been constantly added to round out and keep the pattern No. 1205 fresh and brilliant as the best. A glance at the various samples herewith shown will disclose its strong light reflecting qualities, the design consisting of crossed parallel incut lines looped and returned, with a round raised pillar line, making a strong contrast between the deep cut lines and the filled in spaces of hobnail and faceted squares, which, with scalloped edges, make a very pretty and strong imitation cut pattern, showing off the excellent and clear metal to fine advantage. ♦



In January Carole Stepinski presented the topic "Covered Dishes & Jars". She shared many items from her collection for discussion (examples include Colonial Sanitary Syrup in Moongleam, Tudor Lemon Dish; Planation Marmalade, & Colonial Powder Jar with celloid cover).

Kim Stolp hosted our March meeting and the topic was "Divided Dishes". This was a popular subject, as we had more than 20 different examples of dishes brought by members to share.
