CURATOR'S REPORT

Walter Ludwig

Well, this past month provided another chapter of the on-going saga of Walter coping with Ohio. A storm that could not make up its mind just before Christmas left everything covered with a layer of ice bringing down tree limbs and power lines all over the Newark area. Many, including members of your Museum staff (Shelly, Bill, and Liz) got to spend the holiday bundled up in their homes without electricity. The Museum and my house were among the few that did not lose electric, but my backyard and roof are covered with tree limbs. The Museum was luckier with only a few limbs down in its parking lot. What will be next?

Cataloguing for the Heisey Benefit Auction has begun and we have seen many wonderful things. Besides the items mentioned in Dave Spahr's article later in this issue, there are two great Fred Harvey Amber items: the 1170 Pleat and Panel cruet and a 337 Touraine 5 oz juice. A great collection of Fox Chase etch pieces arrived yesterday. With many boxes still to be unpacked we know that there will be many more treasures.

Glass cleaning is progressing nicely, and next Monday will see the finishing of Gallery one leaving only Gallery two remaining. Of course as many of you know that will include the Moongleam cases – I cannot wait to get to them. This time around we are doing a lot more than just cleaning the glass --- a thorough inventory check as well as re-tagging is being done of the pieces. When finished, we will have a much better understanding of what we have and where it is located.

On January 28, the Columbus Museum of Art will open its special exhibition, *Bringing Modernism Home: Ohio Decorative Arts 1890-1960*. This show will feature the contribution of Ohio artists, designers, and companies to the decorative arts. The National Heisey Glass Museum has loaned five pieces of Heisey glass to represent how the Heisey factory was part of this movement. Pieces of 1485 Saturn, 4044 New Era, 1483 Stanhope, and 6009A Roundelay will be in good company. This is a comprehensive exhibit including ceramics, enameling, furniture, metalwork, and jewelry as well as glass. The show will run through April 17, so if you get the chance, do take the chance to see how

Heisey glassware fits into the framework of the twentieth century American decorative arts movement.

With Heisey glass, there is always a new surprise awaiting you. Given all the years of study and research, you would think that we would know all there is to know about what the factory made. Well, this past month provided two new surprises for me. The 134 Trident two light candlestick is one of the most ubiquitous pieces turning up in many variations – so many etchings, so many cuttings, so many colors. We thought Tangerine was a real find when the first one turned up in the 1970s. Then a set with Sahara tops and Alexandrite bases was acquired by the Museum in the 1990s. Another set in Trial Blue was soon after added to our collection. All wonderful, but in December a pair with Sultana (dark amber) tops and crystal bases was sold on eBay. They were truly magnificent – just gives us all something else to look for.

The other surprise came to the Museum in the form of a loan. A set of 1186 Yeoman nested ashtrays. The 4" size is well documented and very easy to find. But this set had, in addition, 3 ¼" and 2 ¾" size ones, and they all fit inside of each other making a nice stack. If there was any doubt that this set was truly a Heisey factory production (after all, this ashtray was made by other companies and it is only Heisey quality that really sets it apart from the imitators) that was immediately banished because all three pieces have 5009 Diana carvings on them. WOW!! Diana carving was only documented on the rarely seen 4222 Vase and here we have it on three more pieces two of which we had not even known existed. Now, that is a great Heisey find.



I hope in your next trip out, you turn up another Heisey surprise. It is there to be found and you will only find it by looking. Enjoy. ♥

UNIQUE ITEMS IN PATTERN #393/394 NARROW FLUTE

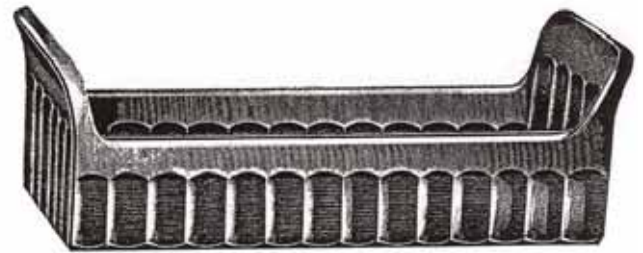
Narrow Flute goes by Pattern Nos. 393, 393 ½, 394, and 395. Production started in about 1910 and lasted until 1935. A few items lasted until the end of the plant. There were five design patents granted for this pattern. Catalog 206 (1922) offers 154 items in Narrow Flute. Some items were produced for a short time, others for a longer time, and a few for the entire life of the pattern. For more information on this pattern, see the articles on Narrow Flute in the May 1975 and August 1991 issues of Heisey News.

What's a unique item? If you were going to purchase a set of china, you would buy the items needed to make complete place settings, plus various serving pieces. The serving pieces would be the salt and pepper, cream and sugar, platters, large bowls, etc. My definition of unique pieces are things beyond these normal pieces.

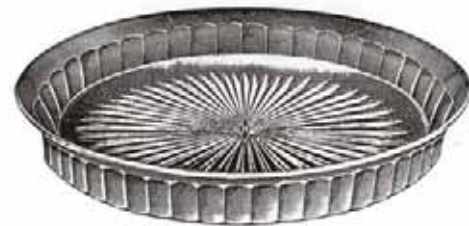
There were 18 items in the Narrow Flute pattern that I believe are unique items, and they are listed below. The pictures of these 18 items were taken from Heisey Catalog No. 75 (1913) and Catalog No. 76 (1915), which is a supplement to Catalog No. 75.

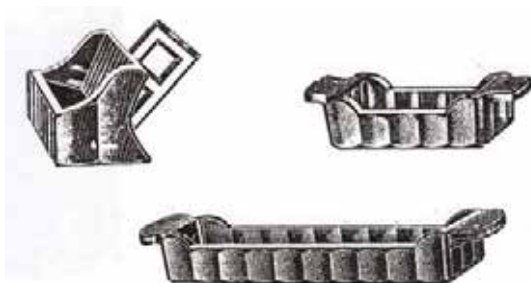

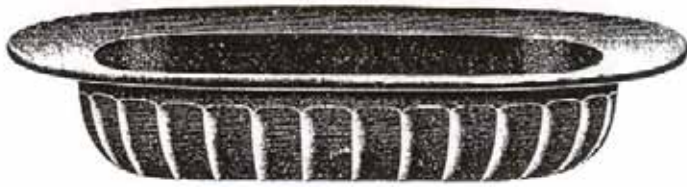

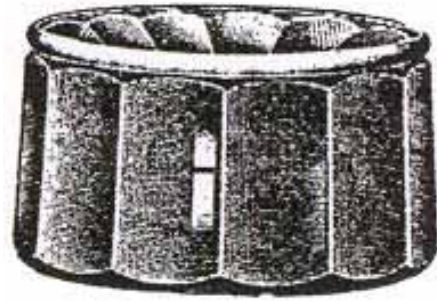

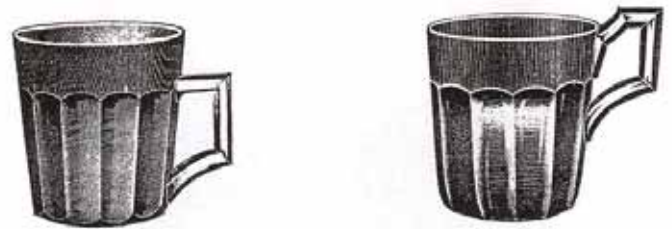

Hopefully you have marked your calendar and made those reservations. If you haven't, there is a list of hotels/motels in this Newsletter. As we did last year, our staff has been working with the hotels, and some have agreed to give discounts to HCA members. A "Well Done" for our staff-again!

At press time, we have just finished our first cataloging session. We have two more sessions scheduled and hope we have enough glass remaining to schedule a fourth! We are still receiving glass, but it looks like we will have close to the 1137 lots we had last year. I know of one or two consignments we have yet to receive and know they will be great! In the meantime I thought I'd just whet your Heisey appetite a bit.

For those of you with a sweet tooth, we have received two beauties-a 325 Pillows 7 oz. molasses and a 343 Sunburst 16 oz. molasses. We have many lots of 1401 Empress Moongleam including service for six in plates, cups and saucers, and rarely found sherbets. We have a wonderful rare Crystal 160 Locket on Chain toothpick. We have three lots of Antarctic etch including 135 Empress Candlesticks and 1401 Empress Marmalade (with frosted spoon) and 8" D/F mint. For you candlestick collectors we have a nice pair of #8 Jacobean 9" candlesticks. That's all for now-will share more treasures next issue!

1231 Ribbed Octagon Candlestick – Variation

The 1231 Ribbed Octagon candlestick is the first candlestick that was made to go with a full table pattern. In the 1920s it became a trend in the glass industry to develop patterns that included cups and saucers as well as plates of all sizes. Additional go-along pieces were then added to these patterns. Prior to this time glass tableware was used mostly as a compliment for ones china service, or to perform a specific functional purpose like candlesticks, cruets, or even nappies.



These new patterns were developed to go along with new social trends that were being established. Women found they had more leisure time to socialize with friends and entertaining took on a more informal air. Bridge, canasta, and maj jongg were all attracting devotees and women would invite a group of friends for an afternoon of socializing, game playing, and of course, gossiping. The hostess could now buy attractive glass tableware in lovely pastel colors to serve on at these functions.

Earlier full patterns like Pleat and Panel and Yeoman did not incorporate candlesticks in the pattern, although one could purchase candlesticks that were not part of a specific pattern to go with. Ribbed Octagon pattern was first developed in 1925, but the candlestick was not added until 1929. This candlestick is in the mushroom shape that Heisey earlier used in the 1205 Raindrop, 121 Pinwheel, and 122 Zig Zag. In the same year, Heisey developed the 1252 Twist pattern which included an almost identical candlestick.



The regular and variant candlestick both came out of the same mold, so many of the measurements are identical. The round base is 4 ½" across and the candlesticks stand about 1 ¾" high (Heisey catalogs list it as a 3" candlestick). The top of both candlesticks is 8 panels. On the regular candlestick, the top is folded over and flared out to 3 ¾". On the variant, the top is just folded over forming a truer mushroom shape. The top is 3" wide on the variant. The edge of the top on the regular candlestick forms straight sides making the octagon that the pattern is named after. On the variant the edges form a more scallop effect obscuring the octagon.



Ribbed Octagon candlesticks were made in Moongleam and Flamingo as well as crystal. I have seen the variants in both Flamingo and Moongleam. The ones in the Museum are Flamingo and located upstairs in case G2 C2.

Fostoria made a candlestick similar to the regular Ribbed Octagon candlestick only with a much larger top, which comes in pink, green, and blue. ♥

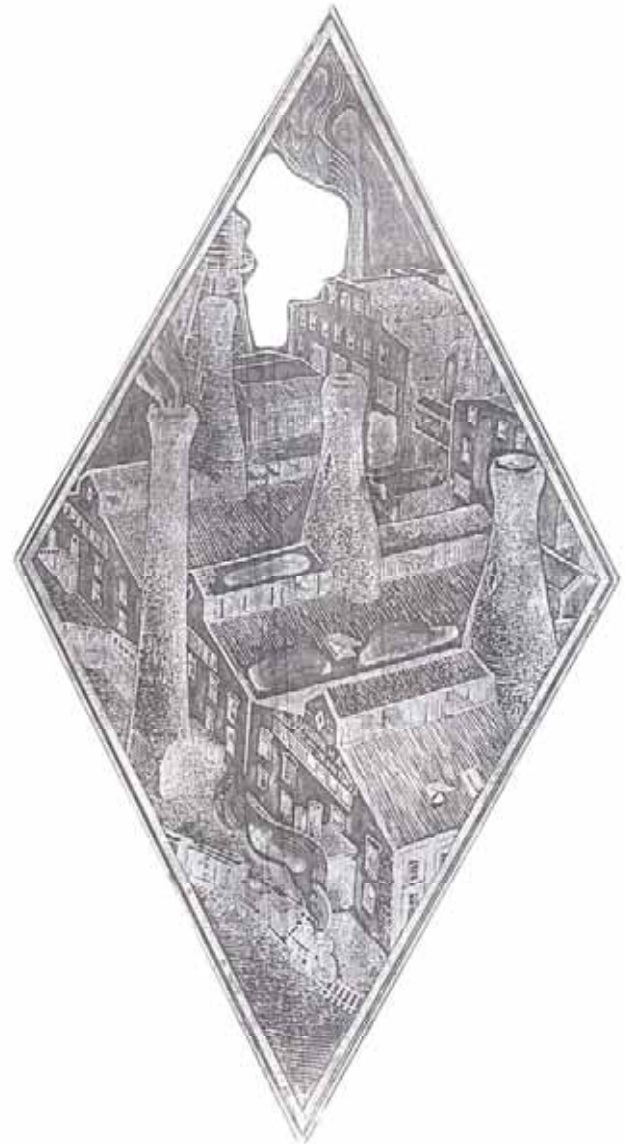
It is February and in only a few short months you will find yourself on the midway looking for the world renowned "ALL HEISEY BLIND AUCTION TENT."

AN UNUSUAL HEISEY SIGHTING

From Gary:

The Seattle Public Television station, KCTS, aired an episode of "The American Experience" series titled, "Miss America," a history of the beauty pageant. Early in the show was a film of the 1921 contestants parading along the Boardwalk in Atlantic City in the first Miss America contest. As the camera moved quickly, I thought I saw a very large sign on the roof of a building that said, HEISEY'S. It went by so fast, I thought I must have misread. Could it have been HERSHEY'S? Several minutes later, another view of the same general area revealed the sign again, this time for one or two seconds longer, enough to confirm, it did indeed say, HEISEY'S. The sign was on top of a building probably three or four stories high. The second scene was later in the 1920s. Other scenes of the Boardwalk from the 1930s and later decades showed different skylines, but no Heisey sign.

Walter Replied:

Thanks Gary. There is no question that the sign was for Heisey's. There are postcards of Atlantic City from this era that do show the sign. I think we have shown it once in the Heisey News but I am not sure when. The Heisey's summered in Atlantic City during this time when it was a fashionable resort, and the Atlantic City horse show was one of the big stops in the horse show circuit, so it is not surprising that the company had an advertising presence in the city, also. ♥

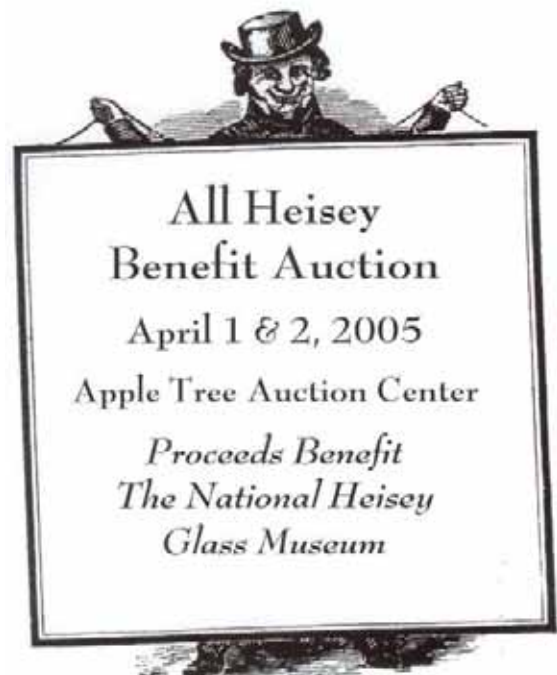

TREASURER'S REPORT

Dave Spahr, Treasurer

When I reported to you last month about the 2005 budget, I anticipated I would have the final 2004 numbers in time to report them in this issue. Unfortunately, we didn't have the final numbers by press time, but feel we still need to let you know now what financial condition we are in. I will hopefully have the report finished and published in next month's Newsletter.

REVENUES: We had budgeted revenues of \$190,450 for 2004 and received \$169,946, which was a shortfall of 11% or \$20,504. Our sales increased in December, so we nearly reached our target but we fell short in memberships, newsletter ads, benefit auction, and convention receipts.

RESERVE/ENDOWMENT TRANSFER: We had \$50,500 set as funds to balance the budget. We withdrew \$29,600 of 2003 earned income from the endowment fund and used \$25,400 from our money market account for a total of \$55,000.

EXPENSES: We had budgeted \$240,950 in expenses and spent \$226,781 netting out cost of goods sold and inventory purchases. This is 5.9% or \$14,169 less than budgeted. Most of the savings were in our salary accounts since we did not have a curator the first six months.

OVERALL CASH POSITION (all net of not yet transferred monies for the endowment fund): We started 2004 with \$39,247.51 in our checking and money market accounts. We drew down the 2003 earned endowment fund income of \$29,600. We have a year end balance of \$7,463.53 in our checking and money market accounts. Our cash available (carryover) funds have dropped by \$31,463.53.

HCA ENDOWMENT FUND: The HCA Endowment fund increased in value from \$1,496,873.76 to \$1,587,066.84 at years end. Contributions into the fund totaled \$30,835.05 and we withdrew \$29,600.00 of last year's (2003) earned income to support operations.

General Comment: Our financial decline began, so I'm told, beginning in 1999 when gift shop revenues began to annually fall over time from a \$105,000 level to a \$65,000 level. The financial

picture has gotten worse since, for we have had no high revenue special projects with Longaberger (or others) last year or planned for next year. As with most organizations, our membership has been declining at the same time. We started using endowment fund earned income in 2003 to help balance the budget. We have had to use this money earlier and earlier each year. We have transferred endowment fund income last year and will also have to do so again in 2005. We had all hoped things would turn around but they haven't.

All available cash will be used in 2005 along with 2004 earned income (est \$32,000) from the endowment fund for operations and leaving no funds for inventory purchases for the gift shop. Clearly our organization is in financial trouble for 2005.

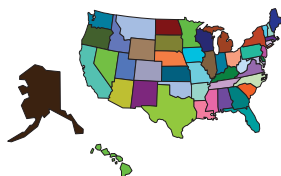

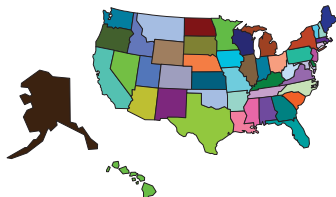

With the advent of factories producing molded glass in the mid to late 1800's, elegant appearing glassware was available to the common man. Table Sets were part of the standard production of every glass factory. About the same time, bananas became common, and new, easier to grow strains of celery were developed, so the up right "Celery Vase" became a low, horizontal dish, and was no longer included in the Table Set. The "Banana Boat" disappeared as well.

Rog had five Heisey Table Sets on display; he told the dates Heisey manufactured them, name, color and etc. All of these patterns, except one, were out of production by 1920. This coincides with the

decrease in popularity of Table Sets by the late teens and early 1920s.

SHOW & TELL:

The Powells were ready and waiting for this! They walked in with a large container full of sugar and creamers – a lot of neat ones too, I might add! We saw hotel creamer and sugars, we saw Flamingo Yeoman, Toujours with Minute Etch and on and on! Other members brought cream and sugars too, such as Medium Flat Panel and Quator. Our visitors entertained us with a beautiful selection of Heisey; Plantation stems and compote, Moongleam Octagon nut, Lariat platter etched with Poinsettias, etc. Other folks had some hard-to-find pieces: Fandango salt, Moongleam Old Sandwich Catsup bottle, Emerald Winged Scroll cruet, Cross Lined Flute tumbler, Punty and Diamond Point tumbler. 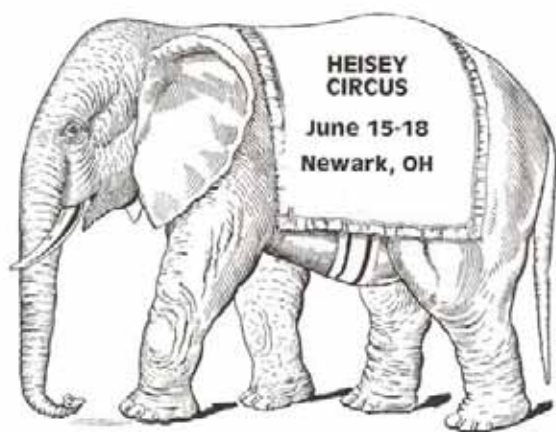
