

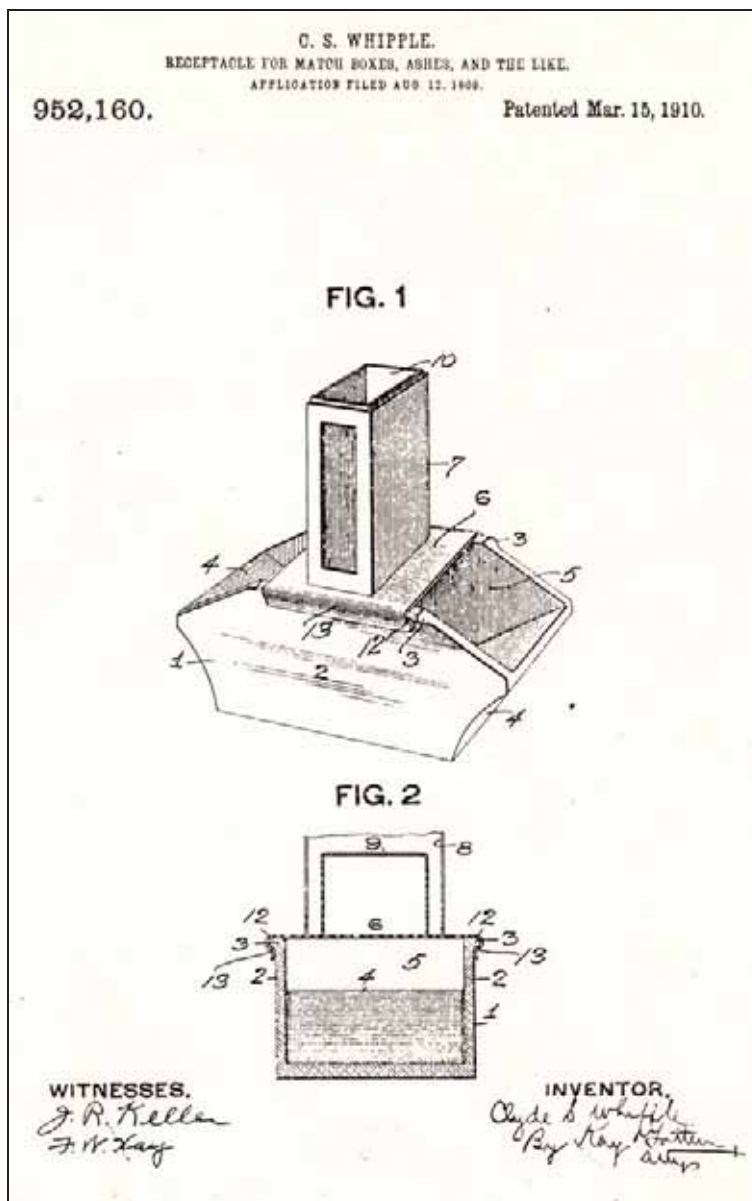

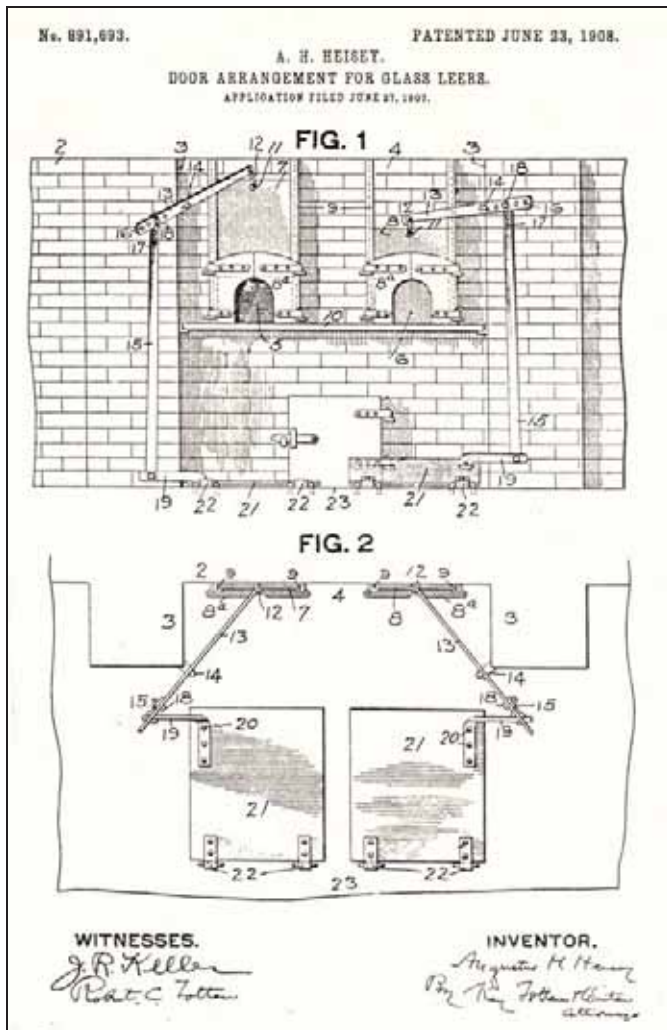

But, there are so many others yet to show off their finery before they too give way to later blooms. This is the reason that I like living in the northern part of the United States, the change of the seasons is such a great display.

We have just wrapped up a very successful Benefit Auction here in Newark. It is always great when Heisey folk get together for these events. Many of you traveled quite a distance to be here with us and it is appreciated. Because of the high quality in this auction, HCA was able to surpass its budgeted expectations for this fund-raiser. This is so important in keeping the Museum in good economic health in these times. Convention is now just a bit over a month away and we really have a great one planned for you this year. I have something rather exciting to announce to you concerning Convention. I have been in contact with one of the Krall family members. The family has agreed to lend some of the family owned Krall cut pieces to the Museum so that we may display them during Convention this year. I will be putting them into a case in the Multi-Purpose Room so that all may see these treasures when they stop by for refreshments. This will be a rare opportunity to see these pieces.

As you know, the theme of this year's Convention is "Artistry in Glass: The Heisey Etchings." The Museum has a very good collection of etched Heisey pieces but we do not have examples of all of the ones that Heisey made. Search your collections and see if you can either lend or donate an example of one of these etches that the Museum does not have. Even if you can only bring it to the seminars to be shared with other collectors it would be appreciated. Missing needle etches include 1 Braid, 17 Zig Zag, 19 Double Loop, 27 Crochet, 31 Roman Key, 35 Lacy Band, 38 Tallahassee, and 41 Braided Loop. Missing pantographic etchings include 151 Zeus, 155 Neptune, 158 Barcelona, 161 Somerset, 164 Salem, 169 Biltmore, and 172 Dover. Early plate etchings include 342 Barberry, 343 Julie, 349 Margaret, 350/351 Mums, 352 Anne, 370 Nile, 384 Iroquois, 314 Zouave, 402 American Beauty, 403 Chartiers, 404 Muskingam, 406 Duquesne, 407 Morning Glory, 408 Lincoln, 415 Classic, 421 Rose, 422 Cumberland, 423 Violets, 425 Dogwood, 428 Simplex, 432 Londonderry, and 433 Dutchess. Later etches include 453 Inca, 457 Springtime, 461 Concord, 509 Lily, 512 Helen, and 518 Pan American Lei.

I hope everyone is visiting those outdoor flea markets now that the weather is fine. I am sure there is a treasure out there for you. Remember that it will not find you, you have to go out and find it. ♦



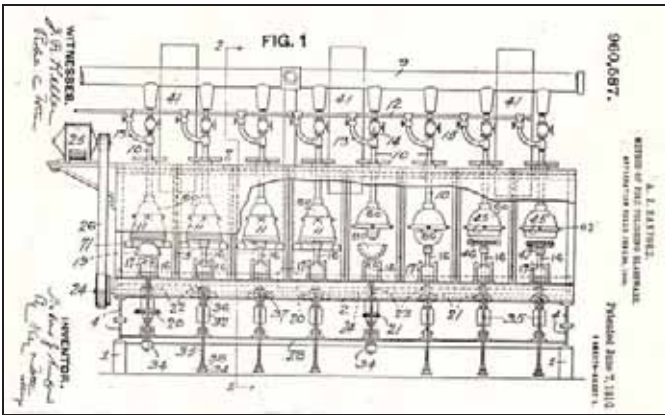
Patent 891,693

The first patent we will look at is No. 891,693 which was granted on June 23, 1908, with Augustus H. Heisey of Idlewood, PA, listed as the inventor. It is interesting that even at this late date A. H. had an address in Pennsylvania. The invention is described as a "door arrangement for glass-leers (sic)." We are accustomed to spelling the cooling or annealing ovens at the factory as "lehrs" now, but obviously "leers" was an acceptable alternative spelling at that time. The traditional doors on a lehr were swinging doors that were left open while the glassware was loaded into the lehr. The innovation that the patent covers is the installation of a sliding door behind these swinging doors that was operated by a platform upon which the loader had to stand to insert the glassware into the lehr. This prevented the introduction of cold air into the hot lehrs and therefore cut down on the amount of waste of heat and breakage of ware. This is all very ingenious given that the person loading in the ware would be carrying the hot ware that was prepared by the molders and he would not have his hands free to operate levers to open the doors. Now his own body weight as he approached the lehr would open the door as he stepped on the platform.

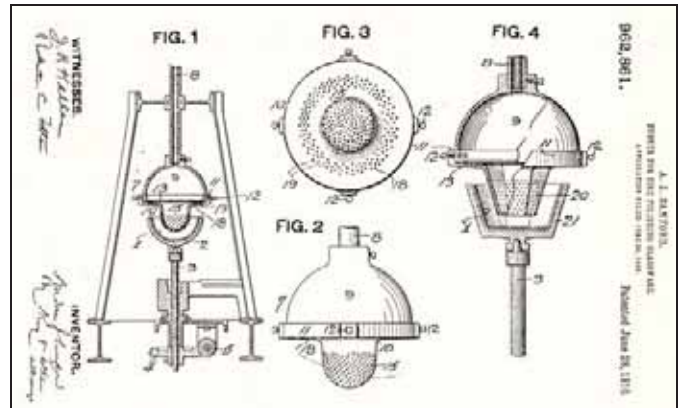
UTILITY PATENTS ASSOCIATED WITH A.H. HEISEY & COMPANY (PART 3) Walter Ludwig

We will continue to look at the utility patents that were issued to people associated with A.H. Heisey & Company or which were assigned to the factory. The patents we will look at in this article were granted in the period 1908-1910. We have one patent for a new design for lehr doors, one for a combination metal and glass ashtray, and then several more dealing with innovations in the methods of finishing glass. It is obvious that any efficiency that could be achieved in the finishing process of making the glass would mean both a better product and savings in terms of labor costs.

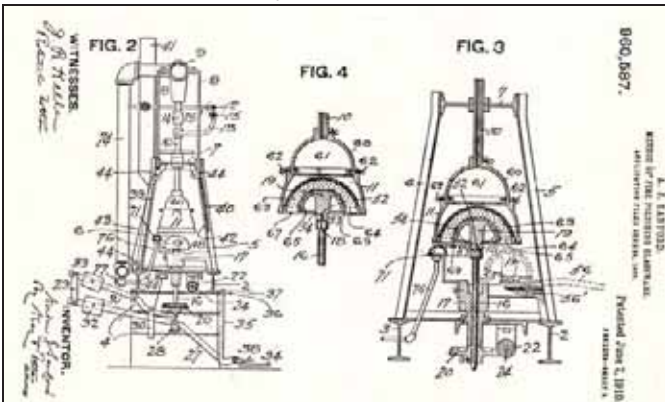
The next patent is No. 952,160. This patent was granted on March 13, 1910, to Clyde S. Whipple of Portland, Indiana, and assigned to A. H. Heisey & Co., Inc, a corporation of West Virginia. It appears that Mr. Whipple had an ingenious idea to combine a glass receptacle with a metal stand to make a combination match holder/ashtray. He must have brought it to Heisey who probably paid Whipple for his invention and the right to manufacture it. Since the metal parts to this piece were not made at Heisey, Mr. Whipple may have had something to do with the manufacture of the metal part of the invention. Heisey did produce and market this piece as the 352 Flat Panel match stand. It appears in Catalog 76 (1915). Interestingly, the bottom was sold separately by Heisey as the 424 almond dish (see Vogel IV, page 157).



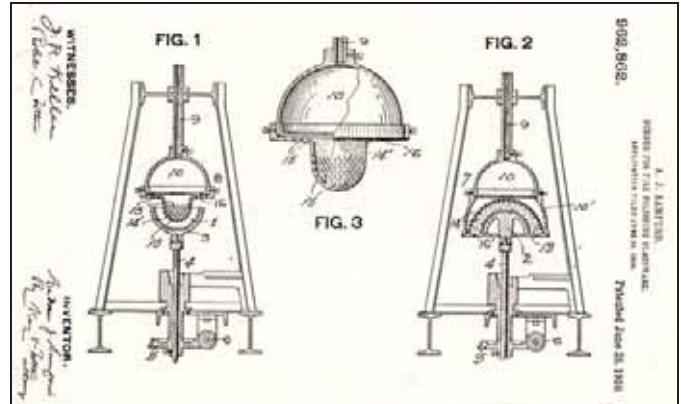
Patent 960,587 – Illustration 1



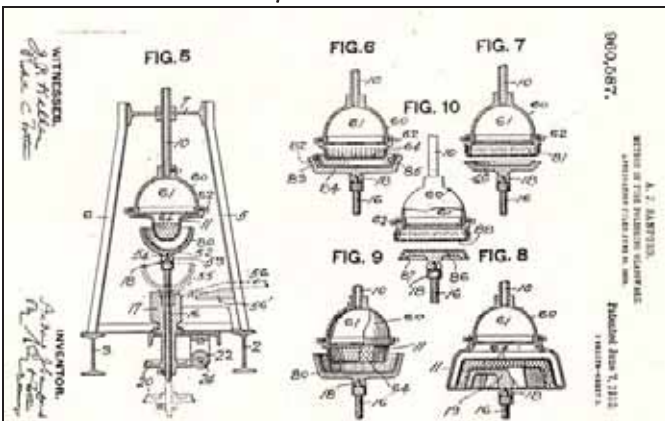

In part, patent No. 960,587 reads, “My invention relates to apparatus for fire polishing glass articles, its object being to provide for the proper fire polishing of both the interior and the exterior surfaces of articles of glassware, such as hollow bowls and the like, also including flat dishes with upwardly extending rim portions.

“It consists, generally stated, in supporting the article within a hollow burner and projecting from the hollow burner multitudinous flame jets distributed substantially evenly over the outer surface of the article to be fire polished.

“It also includes the finishing of bowl shaped articles by first projecting the flame jets against the interior thereof while supporting the article in a former conforming to the desired outer shape of the finished article.

“It also comprises the slow rotation of the article in fire polishing the exterior thereof so as to hold the same to the former on which it is supported, and the rapid rotation of the article when fire polishing the interior thereof so as to cause it to

The next four patents were all granted in June of 1910 and relate to fire-polishing glassware. The fire-polishing of glass was one thing that set the Heisey factory apart from its competitors, giving the final product a better finished look that caught the eye of the consumer. All of the patents were granted to Andrew J. Sanford of Newark, Ohio, and assigned to A.H. Heisey & Co, Inc, of Newark, Ohio.

Patent No. 960,587 was granted on June 7, 1910. On June 28, 1910, patents No. 962,861, 962,862, and 962,863 were granted.

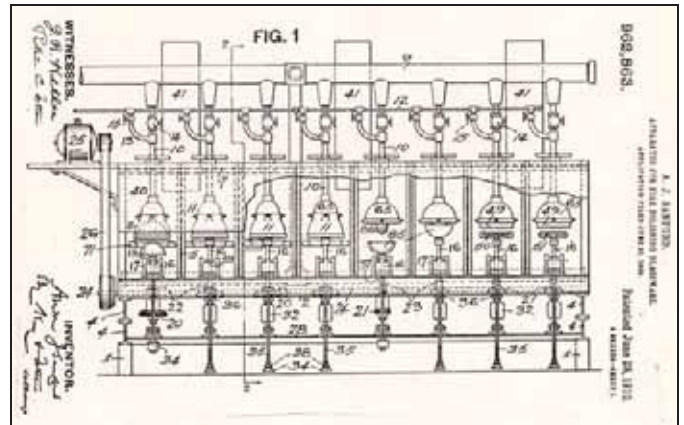
conform in shape to the hollow former in which it is held."

Doing a little translating here we have a machine that will rapidly rotate a glass bowl while directing jet flames at the bowl for the purpose of fire-polishing the bowl. The exterior, rim, and interior of the bowl will all be subjected to this fire polishing. Patent 960,587 covers the basic machinery to support the bowl in the various steps of the fire-polishing process.

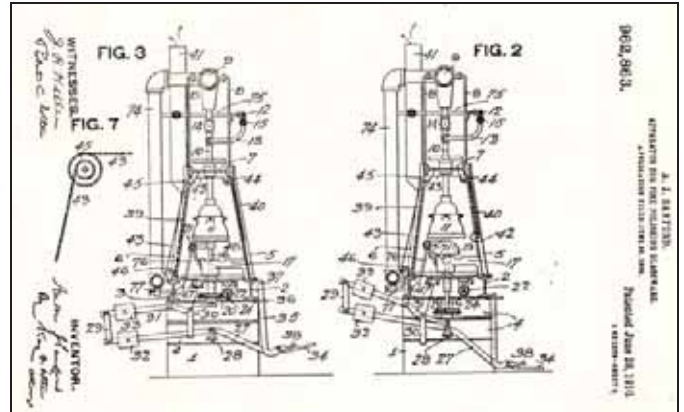
Patents 962,861 and 962,862 provide two different burners to go with the apparatus covered by patent 960,587. Patent 962,861 covers a "burner body having a cone or central projecting body portion adapted to enter within the article to be polished and having multitudinous jet openings for the escape of mixed gas and air on its bottom and side faces to project small flame jets ignited on the outside of the burner directly upon the interior of the article to be polished, as well as upon the top edge thereof, to secure the proper and even fire polishing of the interior of the article, and also the proper melting of the edges thereof to remove fins and cause proper rounding of such surfaces."

In patent 962,861 the "burner body has jet orifices of slit form formed in the body thereof for the escape of gas and air, such slit openings providing for the formation of longitudinal flame jets overlapping each other and so providing for the positive contact of the flame jets with the entire surface of the article to be polished. It also includes the combination therewith of means for rotation the article so as to expose its entire surface to contact with such longitudinally extending jet flames..."

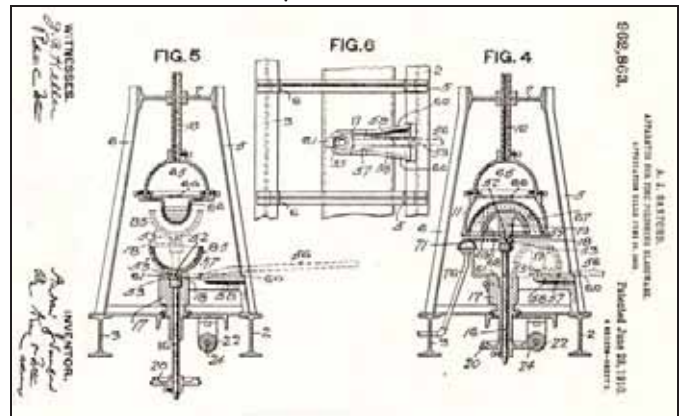
The final patent in this series, No. 962,863, deals with the method of support for the article to be fire polished within the general framework of the previous patents. It also provides for control of the gas and air used in the process. The exact specifications run for over five pages in great detail so I will not go into all that here.

These inventions provide the other part of the Heisey glass making story. They show how the company came up with ways to make their products better through the way that the glass was made.

379 URN

The 379 Urn pattern was introduced in late 1907. It was first offered in Heisey Price List #142, circa 1908. Production continued to about 1910 giving Urn a life span of around three years. A total of 53 items were offered in the pattern. The Urn pattern was named by early Heisey researcher Clarence Vogel.

There were 16 nappies in normal and shallow varieties of various sizes, a four piece table set, two styles of water pitchers, and two styles of tumblers. One tumbler was given the number 379 ½ to differentiate it from the other tumbler that was given number 379. There were three sizes of table salts, three styles of salt shakers (although the glass was the same in all three, only the tops varied), a cake plate, a syrup, two sizes of oils, molasses can, and a toothpick. There was a custard (punch cup) but no punch

bowl that was called a punch bowl. Everything was produced in crystal, there was no color being made during the production period for this pattern. Most of the 379 items were also offered with a gold decoration done by Heisey. The gold decoration was listed separately in Heisey Price List #42.

The Price List divides the items into two categories: (1) items with “cut tops” and (2) items with the “tops not cut.” Cut tops refers to the top rims having been ground and polished to give a perfectly flat and smooth edge or surface. Uncut tops are as they come out of the mold. The hot glass tends to slightly flow giving a slightly rounded edge.

There were 24 items offered in the “top cut” category and 51 items in the “not cut top” category. A total of 22 items were duplicated on both lists.

Urn is a colonial style design with vertical panels around the body of the item. The panels vary in number from 6 to 12 depending on the piece. There are three sets of closely spaced, raised bands that go completely around the body. Depending on which piece, there may be 1, 2, or 3 sets of closely spaced bands. For example, the nappy has three sets of bands: one set forms the top, a second set forms the base, and a third set is about 1/3 of the way up from the bottom. The toothpick has three sets of band, the custard has only two, and the finger bowl has only one. Where applicable, the bottom of a piece has the typical Heisey star.

I want to talk about a few of the pieces of this pattern. This is a transitional pattern in the serving of syrup/molasses. It has the last of the traditional large molasses cans with the domed tops that Heisey developed. It also has the first of the smaller syrups with the metal flip tops to be made by Heisey. In this case, the top is a flat lid with a small thumb tab that attached to the bottom just over the handle. It is rare now to see this syrup with its original metal lid. Heisey

would soon develop the more common lid that we see on later syrups that snaps onto the top.

Another interesting piece is one that never appeared in any of the Heisey catalogs. It is unusual enough to have a pattern that has three salt dishes (called large table, small table, and individual in the catalog), but there is another piece of about the same size that occasionally makes an appearance although the piece only has six sides whereas the salts have eight. It has a base about the same size as the small table and a top a little smaller than the large table. This results in a piece that is taller than any of the other salts and has a definite flare to it. The only pieces that appears on the "cut tops" list and does not appear on the "not cut top" list are a small salted almond and a large salted almond. It is easy to think of this unknown piece as the large salted almond. But that just raises the question of what the small salted almond might be because no other small piece has shown up. Could the small salted almond just be one of the salts (possibly the small table)? See page 17 for a picture of three of these pieces.

I mentioned above that there was no punch bowl in the pattern that was called a punch bowl. Instead we have two footed orange bowls, one 14" shallow and one 13" flared. The descriptions of these items are not elaborated upon, but one collector has assured me that these are actually two piece items with separate bases. Obviously, these would work perfectly as punch bowls for the pattern.

Finally, it is interesting to note that the hotel sugar came both with a lid and without a lid. The table sugar has a lid that sits on a ledge just below the top rim of the piece. I would assume that the hotel sugar with lid would have a similar ledge. I know of no other creamer that goes with two different sugar bowls that Heisey made. There is a ½ gallon jug with cover also listed in this pattern. There is not a catalog picture of this cover. One could assume that it is designed to look like the covers of the sugar bowls in which case the jug would have been made with a ledge for the lid to rest on. I have never seen an Urn jug with a lid.

Urn is a truly beautiful pattern that plays off of the simplicity of the design. Pieces in the pattern seldom reach the marketplace today. Consider yourself lucky to own just a single piece of this pattern.

BENEFIT AUCTION WRAP-UP

Those who attended the 36th Annual Benefit auction had a great time - or so they said! Our two-day auction was held at the GMP Local #244 Union Hall on 350 Hudson Ave in Newark on Friday-Saturday, April 17-18. This is the second year using this great site. Our auction was well attended - approximately 120 guests and members each day and we had 11 absentee bidders. We had 936 lots of glass available from 35 consignors. We again heard many great comments about the glass we had again this year - our consignors sent in nice clean glass and we only had to reject a few unsuitable pieces. This year we had the preview on Friday, April 17, from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. with the auction starting at 4:00 p.m. by auctioneer Craig Connelly. On Saturday, we opened the doors at 8:30 a.m., had our HCA Membership Meeting chaired by President Bryan Baker at 9:00 a.m., and started our auction at 9:30 a.m.

How did we do financially? At press time, we have only preliminary numbers. We grossed over \$63,545 and after consignors and expenses are paid, we estimate we will net somewhere around \$15,250. We had a budget estimate of \$13,800. With the economy the way it is affecting us all, I feel we did very well. FYI, last year we grossed \$56,415 and netted \$13,371 with our budget being \$14,000.

I want to publicly thank, on behalf of the HCA Board of Directors and Staff, the forty-four volunteers who worked with us starting in January identifying, cataloging, and repacking the glass and before, during, and after the auction! You make this event a success and HCA's largest fund-raiser. I have listed those who helped in a separate block. If you helped and are not listed, I apologize.

I would like to give special thanks to several individuals: Joe Harner, president of the Dayton Study Club and Dick Marsh, Buckeye Club president, both who helped me in all phases of the auction and did all the little things which need doing with little fanfare; to Board member Karen Taylo who ran the clerk's office and effectively and efficiently ran the computer auction program, and finally to Russ Reopell, who put our auction catalog on the HCA website.

A hardy thank you must also go to Craig Connelly, Auctioneer, and his three cohorts Jeff Baird, Tim Hughes, and Gary Babcock. They sold our glass and kept us in stitches! Concessionaire extraordinaire Gerry Dush and his gang again served the world's best pies and other food, and GMP Local #244's own Jerry West did everything he could to provide us great facilities and went the "extra mile" to make our auction a success. Lastly, thanks to the Dayton Heisey Collectors Club who, as always, worked diligently from January helping in all phases to make this auction a success!

Finally, I would like to thank all the consignors who consigned and donated glass to HCA and to all the auction attendees and absentee bidders who purchased that wonderful Heisey Glass. You make it all possible. See all of you at the Convention in June - until then, Happy Heisey Hunting!! ♦

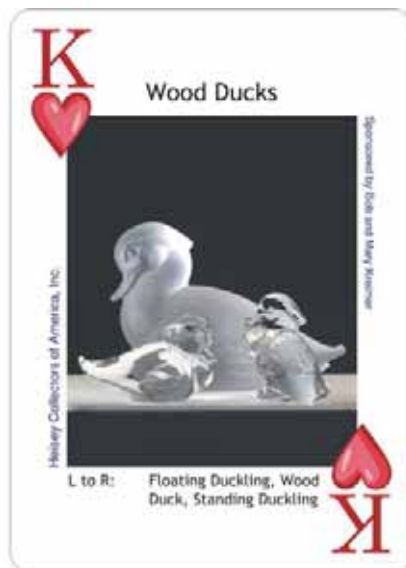
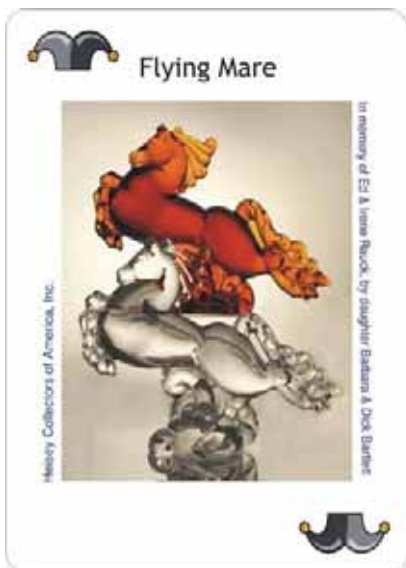

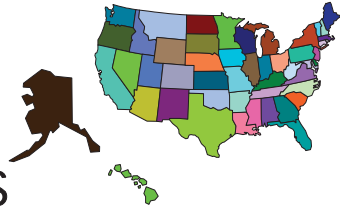

Trudy Mock presented her "Martha Moments" showing Heisey featured in Country Living and Paula Deen magazines.

The program for the meeting was Heisey plates. Sounds simple but we had no idea Heisey made so many plates. Eric alone brought about 60 plates and other members chimed in with different styles, sizes, and colors. We had little plates, big plates, plates in most all the colors, plates with cuttings, etches, and carvings, plates with decorations – so many plates we had to bring out more display tables and start stacking the plates to save space. Some of these plates we had only seen in books – it was much more informative to see them in person and study the designs up close.

Since this was our first meeting since last November, members had a long winter to acquire Heisey for Show and Tell. Here's a few of the pieces shown: 393 Narrow Flute orange juice, 150 Banded Flute 3 pint jug with silver overlay, 1511 Toujours apple marmalade with extensive silver decoration, 493 cologne with cutting, 1567 Plantation candleblocks, 1425 Victorian 2 oz. bar, #12 salt and pepper, 1201 Fandango 8 oz. oil, 355 Bordeaux bon bonniere stem, two 1020 Phyllis cream and sugar sets with the same grey cutting (actually one cream

was the 1190 piece with the same cutting), Imperial Clydesdale in Salmon, 1413 Cathedral flared vase with 855 Fuchsia cutting, 5048 Rooster Head cocktail, 1170 Pleat and Panel compotier in Moongleam, 325 Pillows salt dip, 1112 Sparta footed sherbet, 310 Ring Band tumbler in Custard with decorative picture, 1614 Plume candlesticks, 305 Puntty and Diamond Point spoon, and other pieces I was drooling over and forgot to record.

We passed the Heisey hat (bowl) and held an auction to add some money to the treasury. One item sold was a hand-tooled step stool made by John Mock of wood from his father-in-law's barn. We'll sell most anything to raise money for HCA. ♦

The Heisey Collectors of Texas headed west of Dallas in March, to Bedford, TX! Mike and Cindy, who live down near Houston, enjoyed seeing Candy & Greg's wonderful collection for the first time. When you go to a home that has soooo many cabinets full of Heisey, no one is able to see it all, even if we went once a year to Candy & Greg's!! Plus, they are always adding to their collection! We had 15 members present, who had a great day enjoying talking "Heisey"!

During our serious time at this meeting, we talked about HCA Convention coming up real soon! Sally reminded everyone that we would be having the HCA Benefit Auction at her home, on the 1st Saturday in May. She also noted the instructions on our "Wrapped and Unwrapped Auction."

Our Program was on "Heisey Cuttings." The Heisey Cutting Shop started around 1914. The Engravings are somewhat easier to find, than the Gray, Rock Crystal and Gray and Polished cuttings. Greg had many goblets with many cuttings; one very outstanding cut was 4055 Park Lane goblet with 863 Contessa cut, ca.1935. Some of the hard-to-find cuttings, that I remember seeing: 844 ½ Cromwell, 801 Wakiki, and 859 Cohasset. The 781 St. Anne was quite elaborate. St. Anne was the first cutting to reflect the influence of Emil Krall, according to our "Heisey Production Cutting" book. From 1933 to early 1940s The Heisey Company enjoyed Emil Krall's elaborate and exquisite work. Thanks, Greg, for a very interesting program, enjoyed by all of us lovers of "Heisey Cuttings."

The Crystolite people George & Barbara, brought a 1503 Crystolite ball vase, a small punch bowl, and a sweet pea vase for Show & Tell. Also, they were educating us on the difference between Duncan's Radiance pattern and Heisey Crystolite, so similar!!

Show & Tell went on with Mike & Cindy, who love the animals, as do most of us! How many of us have the Amber Doe Head bookend or the Amber Elephant, both marked with the Diamond H? These are Rare whether they are Heisey Amber, or Heisey by Imperial Amber, just beautiful! Topping that off, was the Bull also marked with the Diamond H, very nice find also!

We saw an elaborately cut 1430 Aristocrat low-footed candy jar, also a 1183 Revere candy jar with cutting, and the 1483 Stanhope candy box with 605 Frosted Matte etch. A 13" cut 1228 Swirl plate, a cut 4069 Ridgeleigh

goblet, and a 5013 Shasta goblet with 924 Daisy cutting. We also saw a very seldom seen etching; it was the 9012 Victory on an old fashion. Next, was a neat 1404 Old Sandwich popcorn bowl, a Sahara 7" 1428 Warwick vase, and a Flamingo 2516 Circle Pair pitcher. What a fabulous "Show & Tell," now we can keep those pieces in our mind and get out there and find that special Heisey piece!

We ended the afternoon with Candy's homemade goodies, delicious as always! Thanks to Candy and Greg for having HCT over today! Next meeting will be May 2, in Plano, TX, at Sally's, which will be our "Wrapped and Unwrapped" Benefit Auction for HCA! Remember wrapped items must be Heisey, and worth at least \$50!
