TUDOR (411-414) PART 2 Walter Ludwig

We will continue the story of Heisey's Tudor pattern that we began in last month's issue of the Heisey News. We have covered the beginnings of the pattern in about 1924, but now we want to see how this pattern evolved during its life.

In 1925, Heisey began its second color period with the introduction of Moongleam and Flamingo. In 1927, Hawthorne was introduced. A supplement to the 208 price list was produced at about this time which shows that several of the pieces of the Tudor pattern were made in color. More pieces were made in Moongleam than any other color, a few were made in Hawthorne, and only a very few were made in Flamingo. It is hard to understand why more of this pattern was not made in color at this time.

This is the listing from Price List 208 Supplement 3. I have denoted a color code after each item (M – Moongleam, F – Flamingo, and H – Hawthorne):

- 1. plate, 5 ½" (M, H)
- 2. plate, 7" (M)
- 3. jelly, 5", 2-handled (M,H)
- 4. mint, 6" (M,H)
- 5. cheese, 2-handled, 6" (M,H)
- 6. bon bon, 2-handled, 6" (M,H)
- 7. lemon dish with or without cover, 5" (M,F)
- 8. preserve, footed with cover * (M,H)
- 9. jelly, 5", high footed (M,H)
- 10. mayonnaise, footed, 2 handles (M,H)
- 11. jug, 3 pt. (M handle only)
- 12. soda, ice tea, 12 oz. (M)
- 13. cream, hotel (M handle only ,H)
- 14. sugar, hotel, handled, with cover (M handles only ,H)
- 15. floral bowl, ftd, 12 1/2" (M)

- 1. tankard, footed, 1 qt. (F)
- 2. tankard, footed, 3 pt. (F)
- 3. ice tea, handled, footed, 12 oz. (F)

1. Cigarette box & cover (M,F,H)

In addition to these items I am aware that most of the 411 stemware line was made in Moongleam. The 12 ¹/₂" footed floral bowl comes in a 10" cupped variation in Moongleam. The 411 cigarette jar & ashtray cover is known in Moongleam. The footed preserve with cover is known in Flamingo. The bottom of the covered preserve (which is identical to the footed grapefruit) has shown up in Marigold. The 413 covered cigarette jar shows up occasionally with a marigold stain that was not done at the Heisey factory.


There are two additional pieces that appear in no catalog or price list. There is a teardrop syrup/sugar shaker that was special made probably for Reed and Barton. You can see an example on the cover of the January Newsletter. Different metal tops could transform it into either a sugar shaker or a syrup. This has been seen in both Moongleam and Flamingo. The other piece is a cover piece which is known in Flamingo. It looks like a covered sugar with straight sides – it may be a covered marmalade.

By the time Price List 209 came out in 1929 the only items listed in color were the 412 footed and handled ice tea and the 413 covered cigarette box.


Price List 209 in 1929 still had an extensive listing of items in the Tudor pattern. Items that had not been on the Price List 208 which was published last month:

Price list 210 from approximately 1933 shows almost all of the items that were included in Price List 209. Missing are the punch bowl and base, 11" plate, jelly, mint, cheese plate, bon bon, preserve, marmalade, nut bowl, footed preserve and cover, pickle or olive, individual almond, and the footed banana split. Two new items show up on this price list. They are a cover for the 1 quart 411 jug and a 412 9 oz. beer mug. The beer mug is pictured on the cover of the January 2011 Heisey News in Sahara. All items in the 210 price list are listed as only being available in crystal. The jug with cover is the only item in Tudor that is

known to have been made by Imperial Glass from the Heisey mold. They made it special order for Fisher-Bruce & Co of Philadelphia.

The last appearance of the Tudor pattern was in Catalog 211-17 (1937) and Price List 213 from about 1928 At this

about 1938. At this time the line had been reduced to various stem and soda items as well as the 1 qt jug/cover, sugar shaker, salt and pepper, 4 oz. oil, and a few nappies.

> Before we leave the Tudor line, I want to mention one final piece that is known to

fall into the Tudor pattern. The Museum has a goblet that does not conform to any of the regular Tudor lines that appeared in the catalogs. This goblet is just like a 411 goblet, but instead of having a paneled stem the stem is round. The Heisey Stemware book by Bradley, Ryan, and Ryan assign this stem to pattern number 414. It is the only Tudor piece with that number.

As you can see the Tudor line was one of the more extensive ones that Heisey produced. Its approximate 14-year life span is very unusual for a Heisey pattern. The pattern also seemed to be constantly changing over the years, adapting to the customers desires.

Tudor is a beautiful pattern that is relatively affordable even today. The pattern has so many useful pieces that can be used even today.

1180 DEBRA CREAM AND SUGAR Eric Tankesley-Clarke

This set belongs to one of those very small patterns that helped fill out the Heisey catalogs, price lists, and (presumably) coffers. In Catalog 102 (1924), we find illustrations of the 1180 cream and sugar in a grouping of "Miscellaneous Hotel Creams and Sugars." Later in the same catalog, again on a page of "miscellaneous" items, is a covered mustard. And that's about it. (In Cat. 109, we also find the 1180 nut dish, now called 1180 Brazil. It isn't unthinkable that the nut dish was considered by the company as part of the same pattern as our cream and sugar, but they share little in design and collectors typically do not group them together.) We know the cream and sugar, as well as the mustard, as 1180 Debra, though no pattern name was ever used by the company.



Debra is typical of the range of pattern numbers from about 1180-1189, those that included Revere and Yeoman, all with simple, fluid lines. Using a frequently employed trick, Heisey got the most out of this particular design. The handles of both the cream and the sugar were stuck; that is, they were separate pieces of glass, formed and stuck to the body while both pieces were still hot. Thus, using only one style of body, two handles created a sugar, one handle gave us the cream (along with some handwork to make a spout), and no handles – *voilà* - the mustard. The cover got multiple use, too. Popped right out of the mold, as is, it covered the sugar; cutting a notch in the piece yielded the mustard cover. Two molds, five easy pieces.

Much more than for other covered sugars, 1180 sugars often appear with no covers. In fact, the large majority are coverless, leading one to suspect that Heisey sold many of these with no covers to begin with. The rim is finished simply, with no lid-supporting ledge, so even topless, the sugar doesn't look embarrassed, and if you are its owner, neither should you be. This seems to be an early example of what became a normal practice, offering some sugars both ways to suit the buyer. The lid, when you find it, has a simple, six-sided knob, wider at the top than at the bottom. The top of the knob is not perfectly flat, but has a slight circular depression in the center.

The photographed set of Debra is marked, on the outside of its plain concave bottoms. (I have seen a few plain-bottomed pieces in other patterns that are double-marked, both inside and outside the bottom. I don't know whether 1180 Debra is ever marked this way.) The lid in the photographed set, at least, is not marked, but some possibly could be. So far as I know, 1180 Debra has not been seen in color. It is frequently decorated, usually with other companies' cuttings, although I wouldn't be surprised if someone's collection had a piece with a Heisey factory cutting of the 1920s. Well, maybe I'd be a little surprised. So, surprise me already. (Editor's Note: No, Eric, do not be too surprised. In the back of Catalog 102 are a few pages showing pieces with Heisey cuttings and there is the 1180 Debra cream and sugar without the lid - with 679 Windsor cutting.)

Diameter at rim (each piece, not including handles), $2\frac{3}{4}$; Height (without cover, each piece), $2\frac{3}{4}$; Height of sugar with cover, $4\frac{1}{2}$.

1486 COLEPORT INDIVIDUAL ASHTRAY Eric Tankesley-Clarke

Among the smaller ash trays made by Heisey is the 1486 Coleport individual ash tray. Some of the little ash trays were made of rather thin glass, but in this one, the company did not stint. Proportionately, it is as massive as its heavier, larger relatives. The glass is brilliant and refractive, much like we find in 1489 Puritan.

The ash tray never appears in the catalogs, at least not in any of the ones I have. However, one can go back to a Table Talk (Heisey's house organ to its dealers), this one dated March, 1937. (For those playing along at home, this issue is reproduced in the *Heisey Newsletter*, June, 1975.) The cover shows the Coleport cigarette set, consisting of a round cigarette holder and four individual ash trays, all nicely gift boxed in sparkling red and white. (In fact, a major point of this particular Table Talk issue wasn't so much to sell the glass, but to promote the boxes! They were pushing boxes for Ridgeleigh cheese dishes, Fern relishes, even Kohinoor and New Era candelabra. Oddly, the boxes don't seem to have had any sort of Heisey imprint, inside or out.) Not that there is a great need for proof of what this piece is. Even without those gift box listings, there can be no doubt. The ash tray is marked, it clearly is an ash tray (since it has two cigarette restshmm, doesn't sound exactly individual, does it? More like a cozy *tête-à-tête*, perhaps?) and has the characteristic four cut-away sides that gave Coleport its modernity. Given that the individual ash tray escaped the catalogs and most price lists, one wonders if a larger one was ever made. Has anyone seen one in a larger size?

In 1937, times were still rough, but the glass companies were trying new patterns to stimulate business. Then came war, and items in production were cut back. Looking at a 1945 price list, 1489 Puritan's heavy little ash tray was still represented, but the comparably weighty 1486 ash tray is nowhere to be found. A few items not currently in production were listed in 1945 as unavailable "for the duration," as the phrase of the time had it, evidently to forestall inquiries about unavailable items still in demand. Coleport ash trays, however, are not mentioned at all. Immediately after the war, one looks in vain for them, and we never see them in subsequent lists, either.

The Coleport ash tray is not particularly common. Not only was its production cut short, but, if the gift box promotion is a guide, the Coleport cigarette holder was also offered with 1489 Puritan ash trays, cutting further into the Coleport share of the sales.

In the 1950's, a couple of 1486 Coleport pieces were made in Dawn (and when so made, they were re-numbered 1487). It is doubtful that the ash tray was among this lot. If you should come across one in a color other than crystal, be either very surprised or very dubious. Imperial continued the Coleport barware, but there are no records that they made the ash tray.

The entire ash tray is fire-polished, although it shares a square, concave base with some larger pieces that were ground. Possibly the less expensive ash tray wasn't thought worth the extra cost that grinding entailed. I'm waiting. As soon as I say that, one of you is going to show up with a ground one. *(Sigh.)*



486 EDWILL REVISITED

In the September, 2010, issue of the Heisey Newsletter, Walter published his own and other observations on the 486 Edwill pattern and illustrated a few of the pertinent pieces. That article got me thinking. (You may all groan at this point. I'll wait.) It reminded me of a piece that I can add to the list of extant Edwill items, and that is the half-gallon jug. I especially prize this piece, not just because it represents a hard-to-find pattern, but because I relish the sleek elegance of the contours. It is one piece I can hardly keep from caressing when I go by it, so I usually don't (keep from it) and do (caress it). Going back to the August, 2007, issue of the Newsletter that Walter pointed out, there is an illustration from Catalog 100 of the 485 Dunham jug (in the 3-pint size). The Dunham jug has the same graceful shape. The much-felt-up jug I have differs from the Dunham illustration only in having a low foot. It appears that the Edwill and Dunham nappies differ in exactly the same way, since we have the price

list and catalog illustrations to compare, so there's little doubt of the jug's pattern. At any rate, here are photos of the half-gallon 486 Edwill jug and a detail of its base. (I was careful to wipe the fingerprints off before taking the pictures.)

So, does the jug's appearance do anything to confirm the identities of the 8068 Shamel covered butter and Vogel's 7050 spoon? Not exactly; at best, it adds circumstantial evidence. Unlike the jugs and the nappies, both the butter and the spoon have shapes that differ from the corresponding Dunham pieces. What strikes me about the Vogel spoon is that its contours and foot echo, if not exactly imitate, the jug's shapehardly confirmation, yet one step closer. But what about those lines at the base? Those apparent facets or flutes would be an odd bit of detailing not seen, as far as I know, in any comparable Heisey low foot. My guess is that either (a) the lines are intended to be shadow lines to emphasize the foot or (b) Vogel was showing reflections and refractions of the star bottom. I think (b) is more likely, and here is why. I was comparing the 397 Colonial Cupped Scallop covered sugar and spoon with Vogel's piece. I got them out because, besides having a similar sensuous silhouette that begs to be held (and I was tired of listening to their begging), they are just a few years older than 486 and have the same low foot that we see in the 486 jug and in the Vogel drawing of the 7050 spoon. When viewed from the side, straight on at foot level, each of these 397 pieces shows exactly the same lines in the foot that Vogel drew, and the illusion is due to the star on the bottom; the foot itself is smoothly rounded. (Looking at the 397 sugar and spoon makes me wonder whether the molds for these short-lived items might have been reworked for 486 Edwill. However, the 397 butter cover is too different for that treatment.) The 486 jug displays the illusion, too. I vote for Walter's first explanation, that the Vogel illustration is not true to the original piece, because of the apparent (but not real) lines derived from the star bottom. If the Vogel piece's foot has no flutes or lines, then it is exactly the same sort of foot that the jug has and is almost certainly 486. It makes perfect sense that the butter, footed the same way, should have softened lines to complement the spoon, which the rounded knop achieves. While I'm guessing, I'll guess that there are more 486 Edwill pieces afoot in collections now, just unrecognized.




