## ALL HEISEY - Benefit Auction

MARCH 6 and 7, 1987



It is time to prepare for our 14th Annual All-Heisey Museum Benefit Auction. The Auction will again be held at The Apple Tree Auction Center. It will, as usual, be held in conjunction with the Quarterly Meeting.

The Annual Christmas Dinner and Quarterly Meeting on December 5th would be a good time to bring your consignments to the Museum in the afternoon, or after the dinner, and avoid the Christmas rush. Deadline for glass is January 1, 1987.

The same policy as the last few years will again be followed. LIMIT is now TWELVE (12) LOTS PER FAMILY (excluding donations). Items such as 8 goblets or 12 plates together would constitute one lot. Any consignments OVER 12 lots will be considered as donations. The consignment fee remains at 20% with a \$5.00 minimum per lot. HCA receives the 20% selling fee. Please consign only Heisey or Verlys by Heisey. No Imperial Please.

Be sure to include a list (including pattern number, name, color etc., if possible) along with your name and address. Arrange the list in desired lots and identify which lots are consignments and which are donations. Don't forget to make a duplicate copy for your records.

The Benefit Auction is one of the major fund raising projects of the year and all proceeds go for support of your Museum. There is very little expense associated with the Auction. You can help by donating items for the Auction. Remember, donations are full value tax deductible. The consignment fees are also tax deductible. So, get your glass in early and plan to be at The Apple Tree Auction Center on March 6 and 7.

Glass will be sold in the order it is received.

We have several big events coming up within the next few months. On Friday, December 5, the Annual Christmas dinner and quarterly meeting will be held at "The Mansion at Bryn Du" (the Welsh pronunciation is Bryn Dee). This is just east of Granville on the north side of Granville Road. You turn on Jones Road to reach The Mansion. It is the former home of the Jones family, most recently of Sally Jones Sexton who at one time also owned the Granville Inn and the Granville Golf Course. It is under new ownership and has been turned into a fine restaurant used mainly for parties and special events. We are fortunate to be able to get it. Get your reservations in early if you can. The form is on page 23. Also read the notice on page three concerning the All-Heisey Museum Benefit Auction to be held on March 6 and 7 at the Appletree Auction Center. Send up to 12 lots on consignment and as many donated lots as you can. The latter will benefit the museum 100%. If you send good, undamaged glass it will be a big help in getting better prices. We need the glass by January 1st to give us time to get the list in the February newsletter. Several auctioneers will be donating their services as usual.

We also need gifts of glass for the gift shop. This has proven to be a good source of income to HCA and it usually goes fast. Plates, nappies and other small pieces sell well and, as most people know, they are not big sellers at shows or auctions. Many people who visit us like to have one piece (especially if it is marked) to take home as a souvenir of the museum.

We have had many tours through the museum this fall. These come from all around the state and vary in number of people from about 15 to large bus tours of 45-50 people. A few weeks ago we had six tours in two days with 50 in each bus. These came from Columbus where Welsh people from all over the United States were holding a convention.

During the month of September we had visitors from Japan, Brazil, Hong Kong, The Netherlands and Ontario. There were also visitors from thirty-one states which include Ohio. The most out-of-state guests were from California, Florida, Michigan and Indiana followed by Texas, Arizona, Pennsylvania and Maryland in that order.

One day a man who had had a heart transplant four weeks earlier went through the entire museum. We thought that was unbelievable. I haven't checked the book completely for October visits but I have noticed that people from other states are still coming. Of course the convention week is when our parking lot looks like a map of the U.S. with all of the out-of-state plates. We are truly a national museum.

A. H. HEISEY & COMPANY - A CHRONOLOGY  
Part 7, 1922-1930

1922 - January 1. Price list 206 was issued.

February 13. A. H. Heisey died at his vacation residence in Atlantic City.<sup>1</sup> He had been ailing during the past winter, but his condition had not been considered serious and his death was sudden and unexpected. The factory was closed for a week in his honor. E. Wilson Heisey assumed control of the company when it reopened.<sup>2</sup>

October. The Heisey company was granted a decision in the U. S. Court for the Southern District of Ohio, sustaining their claims of infringement against the Imperial Glass Corporation on a line of nappies made by that factory similar to Heisey's no. 393 and 393½ line.

No. 3350, Wabash stemware was new in 1922.<sup>3</sup>

Two new plate etchings were also introduced: No. 439 Pied Piper<sup>4</sup> and no. 440 Frontenac.<sup>5</sup>

T. Clarence Heisey became active on the Board of Directors of the Ohio National Life Insurance Company at about this time, serving in this capacity for 45 years.

Paul Fairall became head of the shipping and stock department, a position he held until the factory closed.

Emmett Olson became chemist, remaining with the company until 1956.

1923 - January. No. 406 and 407 Coarse Rib\*<sup>6</sup> was shown in Pittsburgh.

February. The recently organized Associated Glass and Pottery Manufacturers, which was created to handle and perpetuate the annual exhibition of glass and pottery in Pittsburgh each January and to work for other interests of the manufacturers, named T. Clarence Heisey to its committee on publicity.

April. No. 411-414, Tudor was first advertised in House and Garden.<sup>7</sup>

December 4. The U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati reversed the lower court decision of October 1922 and dismissed Heisey's suit for infringement against the Imperial Glass Corporation.

Other new patterns for 1923 included no. 417 Double Rib and Panel\*<sup>8</sup> and no. 1193 Inside Scallop\*.

1924 - January 1. Price lists 13B and 208 were issued. Catalog 102 probably came out at the same time.

New stemware patterns included no. 3440 Portsmouth and no. 3478-3479 Cone\*.

Two new pantograph etchings, no. 168 Adam and no. 169 Biltmore were introduced.

New cuttings included: no. 740 Hermitage, no. 741 Chantilly\*, no. 745 Media, no. 746 Mt. Vernon, no. 748 Euridice, no. 751 Avalon, no. 752 Camelot, no. 753 Trieste and no. 754 Seville.

1925 - March. An additional furnace was placed in operation, doubling the factory's production schedule.

May. It was announced that Heisey had acquired the original wooden models from the Boston and Sandwich Glass Company. Later in the year, the no. 110 Sandwich Dolphin\* candlestick and the no. 1238 Beehive\* plate both went into production.

June. A new plate etching, no. 442 Diana, was advertised.

Flamingo and moongleam were introduced this year. As a graduate of Washington and Jefferson College in Washington, PA, with a background in chemistry, E. Wilson Heisey was anxious to be a pioneer in the development of new lines of light pastel tableware.

New patterns included no. 419 Sussex, no. 1170 Pleat and Panel\*<sup>9</sup>, and no. 1229 Octagon\*<sup>10</sup>, as well as no. 3355 Fairacre, no. 3357 King Arthur<sup>11</sup>, no. 3480 Koors\*<sup>12</sup>, and no. 8046 Queen Guinivere\*<sup>13</sup>.

One new pantograph etching, no. 170 Cleopatra also came out.

1926 - Heisey began supplying glassware for the Fred Harvey restaurant in Union Station in Chicago.

December. Heisey's booklet for consumers, Gifts of Glassware, was issued.

No. 1231 Ribbed Octagon\* may have come out this year.

New stemware lines included: no. 3324 Delaware, no. 3325 Rampul\* no. 3359 Plateau\*, no. 3360 Penn Charter, no. 3362 Charter Oak<sup>14</sup> and no. 3366 Trojan.

1927 - February. Susan Duncan Heisey, A. H. Heisey's widow, died.

Hawthorne went into production sometime between March and May.

August 1. William J. Kennedy resigned as Heisey's New York representative and was replaced by E. G. Nock, who had previously been a southern salesman for the firm.

No. 3365 Ramshorn\* stemware was new this year.<sup>15</sup>

1928 - May. A new edition of Gifts of Glassware was produced.

By summer, production of hawthorne had ceased, after little more than a year.

New patterns included no 500 Octagon\*<sup>16</sup> and no. 1252 Twist<sup>17</sup>. The latter was variously described as a new "modernistic line"<sup>18</sup> and an "interesting study in art moderne"<sup>19</sup>.

New stemware lines included no. 3368 Albemarle and no. 3370 African.

New plate etchings included no. 1 Sport, no. 445 Trojan and no. 447 Empress.

1929 - January. Catalog 109 may have been issued about this time.

February. Marigold was advertised for the first time.<sup>20</sup>

August 8. Andrew John Sanford, Heisey's designer and foreman of the mould shop, died at the age of 64. As an employee of the company with more than 34 years' experience, he was among the oldest workmen on the payroll in point of service.

September 1. Price list 209 was issued.

November. The no. 3380 Old Dominion stemware line was advertised.

December 1. Price list 14B was issued.

No. 3376 Adam stemware was new this year.

1930 - February. No. 1401 Empress was advertised as new.<sup>21</sup>

Marigold was probably discontinued early this year, after little more than a year.

April. Sahara and alexandrite were advertised as new colors.

The no. 3381 Creole Stemware line was also advertised<sup>22</sup>.

July. The Hawley-Smoot Tariff Bill was passed and E. Wilson Heisey responded that it inadequately cared for glassware interests. "Yet taken as a whole, there is prevailing opinion that the recent tariff measure is the best tariff law ever passed and that business expansion will follow."<sup>23</sup>

August. No. 3390 Carcassonne was advertised as new.

The no. 448 Old Colony plate etching was also advertised this month.

November. No. 1404 Old Sandwich was being shown as a new line of stemware.<sup>24</sup>

Other new stemware patterns in 1930 included no. 3386 Diamond Rose\*, no. 3387 Genie\* and no. 3389 Duquesne.

New plate etchings included no. 451 Lafayette.

E. Wilson Heisey became the treasurer of the State Executive Committee of the Republican Party.

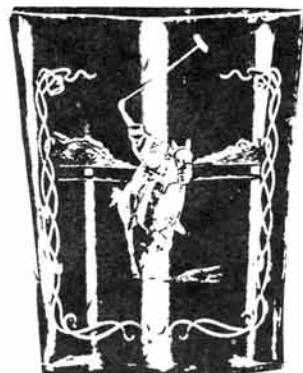

1. Some sources give the date of his death as February 14.
2. In addition to information already reported on, Heisey was a founder and director of the Newark Heat and Light Company, a director of the Newark Consumers Gas Company, and actively interested in the American Tribune Publishing Company. At one time, he was a director of the Franklin National Bank of Newark and, for a period of years, president of the Newark Trust Company. At the time of his death, he was vice president of the Ohio National Life Insurance Company of Cincinnati. He was one of the founders of the Southside Hospital of Pittsburgh, chairman of the committee which raised the finances to build the City Hospital, and reportedly was one of the founders of the Newark YMCA. In addition, for years he was one of the leaders in the American Association of Flint and Lime Glass Manufacturers.
3. Patent applied for on April 29, 1922 and approved February 16, 1926.
4. Patent filed for on December 16, 1922 and approved February 10, 1925.
5. Patent filed for on December 16, 1922 and approved February 26, 1924.
6. Patents for this pattern were filed in March 1923.
7. The earliest patent for this pattern was filed March 12, 1923.
8. Patent filed November 15, 1923 and approved February 19, 1924.
9. Some sources have dated Pleat and Panel\* as early as 1924.
10. Patent filed for on October 27, 1925 and approved December 22, 1925.
11. Patent filed for on January 23, 1925 and approved June 23, 1925.
12. Patent filed for on June 20, 1925, with checker optic, approved September 29, 1925, and without optic on August 1, 1925, approved September 22, 1925.
13. Original pattern number unknown. A patent was filed for the goblet in this pattern on January 23, 1925 and approved June 23, 1925.
14. Patent filed for on May 25, 1926 and approved August 3, 1926.
15. Patent applied for on September 22, 1927 and approved February 12, 1929.
16. Which some sources have dated as early as 1926. A patent for the ice tub in this pattern was filed for on May 31, 1928 and approved March 19, 1929.
17. The earliest patent for this pattern was filed for on September 10, 1928.
18. Crockery and Glass Journal, February 1929.
19. China, Glass and Lamps, January 28, 1929.
20. Production probably actually begun at the end of 1928, when no. 1252 Twist was first made, since this seems to have been the first pattern to be made in marigold.
21. The earliest patent for this pattern was filed for on March 29, 1930.
22. Patent filed for on May 16, 1930 and approved September 30, 1930.

24. The full line was not advertised until the following year.

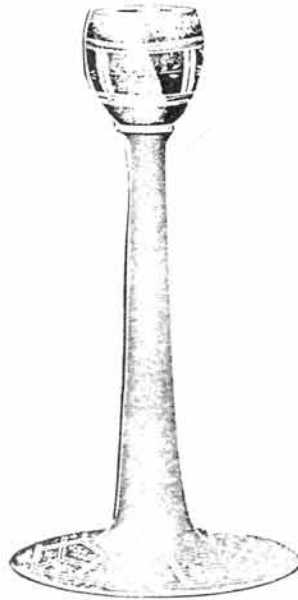

This past summer the Mr. and I took a Sunday and, instead of hunting Heisey, went to New Hampshire and took a 3½ hour 50 mile scenic cruise around Lake Winnepesaukee on the Mount Washington. While on board we enjoyed a lovely Champagne Brunch. Mind you it was a very relaxing, fun trip. The cost was \$10.00 per person for the cruise and \$6.50 each for the Brunch, or for the package \$33.00. Back in 1850 the Yachting Center offered "day trips" on a steamship between the Yachting Center and Lowell, Mass. Now I have no idea how many miles that would be by water or the number of hours, but it must have been many because it was a "day trip". The cost - 12½¢ a trip!

Now, it is almost November and much too cold for a cruise on the lake. In fact the lake freezes over and people "ice fish", but it is just right for all those great "Indoor Fleas".

"Our Rebel Cousins" (KY) report several nice things; a pair of #1483 Stanhope Candelabra; #4225 1 quart Cocktail Shaker, cut, and just a bit ago he found the lid for his #1253 three cornered mint. The bottom he has had for several years. Didn't I mention the color? Well, I will, Marigold! Excellent find Cuz!!

From "the Point" I hear of the #351 Priscilla Mayonnaise with a marked ladle and the 21" #1425 Victorian Buffet Plate.

"Mountain Grandma" (CA) has had a lot of crazy weather where she is; besides earthquakes there were "flash flood" warnings. When the rains started, her road turned into a river and for a while she thought rescue by boat was going to be the order for the day. Fortunately the rain stopped. Nevertheless - Heisey! #341 Puritan 6" high footed jelly; #1225 Plain Band covered butter; #429 Plain Panel Recess tumblers, (4) four of them measuring 6 oz to the brim; #13 Floral Plateau with #20 5" Block in Moongleam and a #1469 Ridgeleigh 8" square plate - frosted entire outside edge, clear center.

"The Hanging Judge" (MA) sentenced a pair of #1401 Empress salt and peppers in Alexandrite to life behind closed glass cabinet doors because they didn't have any tops. Now really!! His sweet wife, on the other hand, took pity and added to her growing #1205 Fancy Loop collection with the ½ gallon tankard and the ½ gallon jug. Both crystal, but the jug had gold trim. She didn't sentence them... good girl!

Can't remember when I last heard from "the Pelican State" (LA) but it is a real goodie and also a real steal, #461 Banded Picket Basket in Hawthorne, and excellent condition. The dealer remarked that it was very old glass and possibly flashed. Wrong!

Now let's skip to the Bay State (MA) for just a bit. "My Sharp Eyed Friends" have the #1567 Plantation Butter Dish and the #1252 Twist footed individual sugar in Flamingo. While "Mr. Crystolite" came up with a pair of #31 Jack-be-Nimble individual candlesticks plus the #21 7" sticks.

"The Midnight Riders" have much to brag about, their little escapades certainly do pay off - #325 Pillows large Rose Bowl; a #5024 Oxford Wine and, "sigh", a pair of #1401 Empress 6½" Candlesticks in Cobalt.

"The Wiz" has an iridized #411 Tudor two handled Bon-Bon; a #1503 Crystolite Cheese dish; #1509 Queen Ann two compartment relish; the #1166 Punch cup and a #1205 Fancy Loop Mustard - no cover, also

a #427 Daisy and Leaves 4½" Nappy.

We haven't heard from the "Social Climber" for a while but she is still collecting and has a large #8 6½" diameter Pitcher Coaster. The Social Climber only collects Colonial serving pieces.

Last month I promised you another great find from "Eagle Eye" that is the Buckeye State, (OH) you know. This one was not sleeping - - - but who cares, he didn't! A #1401 Empress Coffee Cup. As far as Eagle Eye knows it is one of three now known. Oh, what is the matter with me, I forgot to tell you the color. How does Tangerine sound? There is one more surprise left for the next installment, so be waiting.

Now it is time for the "Mr." to brag a little: #300 Peerless 8 oz Hotel Syrup; #353 Soap dish with cover (so often I see them without a cover); and a #3411 Monte Cristo 1½ oz Sherry with a paper Label. It is a fact that when you hold a piece of glass in your hand it is a much better learning experience than glancing at a picture in a book. That is just what happened to him a while back. He saw two Old Sandwich Cruets with Maltese Cross Stoppers and he was able to actually hold them in his hands. This way things become etched in your memory much better. I reported these to you about two months ago. We were at a Co-op a few weeks ago and he spied, on the shelf, two cruets (who knows what kind, very poor glass) and the stoppers were Maltese Crosses.\* The cruets were poor, the price was right, the stoppers were wanted, so - Buy! Now our two stopper-less Old Sandwich cruets can boast real nice stoppers.

"The Keystone Cops" (PA) are at it again, running around in circles but managing to now and again stop long enough to trap a few prisoners; an #1170 Pleat and Panel 5" compotier in Flamingo and best of all a very grand #1401 Empress ashtray in Alexandrite. This last piece makes up for all the times they come home empty handed, and lonely.

"The California Kid" hunts Heisey between classes and has come up with a #1483 Stanhope Luncheon set which consists of four (4) Luncheon plates and four (4) Cups and Saucers having black buttons in the cup handles.

The "Two Guys" (CONN) reported the #351 Priscilla 1 quart decanter and in the color department walked away with the #1495 Fern Tidbit in Zircon with silver overlay!

"The Shy Gal" (MA) isn't very shy when it comes to her Heisey glass. I hear she just plunges right ahead of all the other troops to get at what she wants. This time it was the #15 Moongleam Floral Block and Duck Stopper.

"The Pilgrims" (NH) are riding high on "cloud nine" with a couple of nice Alexandrite pieces; the #1401 Empress 6" plate and a beautiful little Glenford #3481 1½ oz Bar.\*\*

"A friend in deed" showed up with an Alexandrite 4" Ball Vase and another in Crystal while "the Wiz" showed off with the #133 6" Swan handled candlestick in Crystal. Delectable!

As for "Yours Truly" What can I say, there have been some splendid finds this month. It seems as if we are playing "Can You Top This"? There were a few things I couldn't resist - here goes - a #1469 Ridgeleigh 4" Cigarette Box in Zircon (paid dearly for that one); two pieces of #1503 Crystolite, the Ice Bucket/handle and a 5" high Compote plus a beautiful #1466 5 compartment Star Relish. My most exciting find for the month was a piece that neither of us ever thought we would own; it is the



#1540½ Lariat 3-lite Candleblock. What a beautiful piece of glass! Excitement Plus....

#### BAY STATE HEISEY COLLECTORS CLUB

The Bay State Heisey Collectors Club held its first meeting of the Fall last evening Sept. 9th at the Follen Church in Lexington, Mass. There were about twenty-eight members present all bubbling over with their summer finds.

TUMBLERS

Two of the 200 series of tumblers I wrote about last month are the NO. 212 CHEVRON and the No. 206 DIAMOND SIX (Sometimes names don't come easy). The tumblers both were made in 1924, and never offered in catalogs, although No. 212 was penciled into Price List 212 then crossed off, as if it were planned to be introduced in the next price list then withdrawn. The time doesn't seem right, though, because PL 212 came out in 1936, twelve years after the mould was first used.

There is a Chevron tumbler in the museum's lower level, but I don't think I have ever seen one of the 206 Diamond Six tumblers. Both the moulds are signed with the Diamond H, so if the tumblers ever turn up, there should be no problem in identifying them.

The chart of the 200 series contains all the information we have on these tumblers except illustrations. I will try to print them as they become available. I'm including the mould drawings for those of you who enjoy puzzles. Try to determine from the drawing what the tumbler looks like.

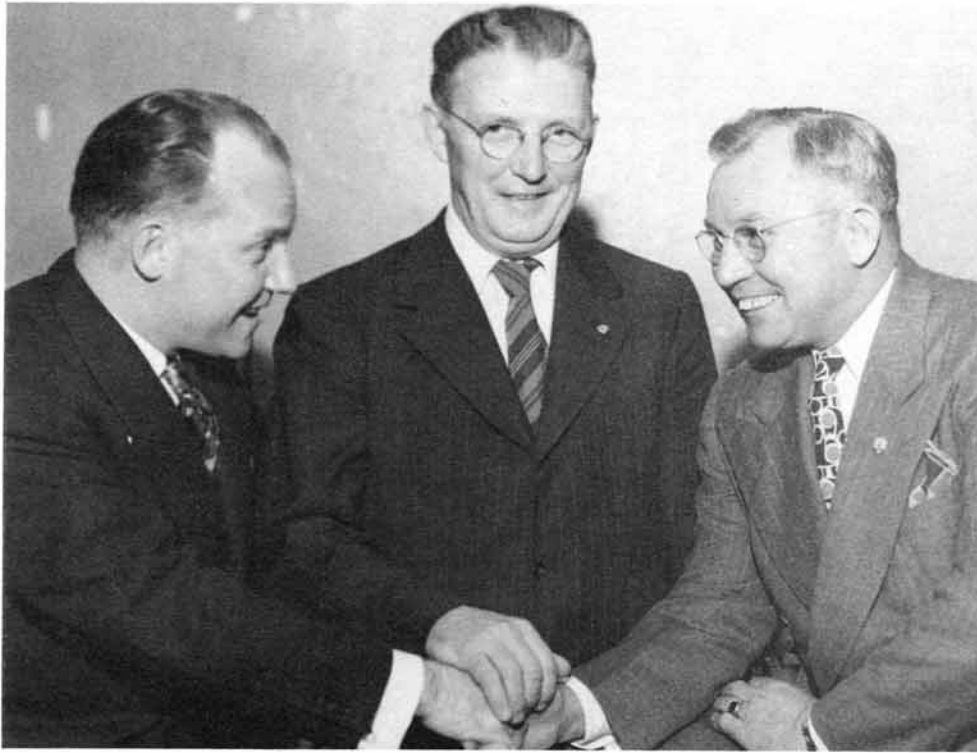

#### PROFILES of FORMER HEISEY EMPLOYEES #1

"My Visit with Paul Fairall"

Before I start telling about the things Paul and I talked about I would like to say, "You have to know Paul to love him." At first meeting I sure didn't think much of him, but, determined to know more about him, I went back to his little Antique Shop and found him quite a human being. On first meeting he told me I couldn't afford a #1401 cobalt ash-tray he had for \$15.00 (this was in 1967). I had news for him, I could afford it but he couldn't have given it to me after that remark. Now, at the price they are selling for, I wish I had bought it just to show him. Since then I have been in his shop and purchased some very nice pieces of Heisey because Paul really does know his Heisey. Now to pass on to you the information Paul gave me about a little of his "life" at the Heisey Plant.

Paul Fairall was born January 28, 1902. He graduated from the 8th grade at the age of 14. After that he had some private tutoring, went to night business college, and took a correspondence course. Soon after his graduation from the 8th grade his brother William (who friends knew as Pidge) came home from the Heisey plant one night and asked Paul if he wanted to go to work. Paul, who was just enjoying summer and the horses on the farm, reluctantly said "yes". The next day William asked Louise Adkins, the manager of the grinding and finishing department, if she could use a boy.

She said to send him into the factory. He did so and she put him to work the next day. This was August, 1916. Later on Louise Adkins was plant manager.

His first title was "wash-out boy". His duty was to wash glassware in big wooden tubs of hot and cold water. He worked nine hours a day from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., six days a week, for \$8.00 per week. He wore knee pants and long socks. At this time Heisey was making thousands of door-knobs and Paul was washing them. Also it was the era for glass baskets and he handled many of them. Many of the older patterns had been discontinued, Paul said; probably the first ten.

His next job was on the stock-wagon. A good buddy, Harold Wolfe (now deceased) worked with him. Paul said he and Harold remained good friends right to Harold's death. He didn't stay on this job long until another promotion came along. He was to work in the office of George Smeltz figuring percentage for hot metal workers, as they were paid prize money each year. These percentages were figured on perfect ware sent through the lehrs. Consequently the Shops and workers involved in the shop that had the least imperfect ware were awarded a higher bonus. This system was evolved by Mr. A. H. Heisey, the founder. Mr. Heisey was a stickler for high quality and had a passion for cleanliness and good house-keeping. He had "No Smoking" signs posted all over the plant. Every year he had all the walls in the different departments white washed, the bricks around the hot metal furnaces were given a coat of white wash and "Lord pity the fellow who spit tobacco juice on the wall." In spite of all these restrictions the workers had deep regard for "Cap-

tain" as he was known to some of the workers. His kindness was overwhelming. He always kept a carload of coal on the railroad spur in the plant and whenever a worker needed coal or couldn't afford it, he would have his drayman deliver a free load of coal to his home. No one in need went without, if he knew about it.

Mr. Heisey passed away in 1922 and shortly thereafter the prize money bonus was discontinued. This also was the year Mr. Frank Sprague passed away. Mr. Sprague was head of the shipping and stock department. They promptly elevated Paul to shipping and production in his place. Paul was twenty years old at this time and kept this position until the closing of the plant. This was the year two new plate etchings were brought out, #439 Pied Piper (or Dancing Girl), the other #440 Frontenac. When Paul took over shipping and production, none of these two lines had been filled. Paul had stacks of back orders to fill. His job was to schedule production of blanks which were blown and to route them through the etching department for etching. Both designs were made by Josef Balda, an Austrian. Mr. Balda not only made the designs but made the steel etching plates and was also manager of the etching department.

In the twenties Heisey brought out two colors, flamingo and moongleam. These were very popular and they had a huge stock of it. Machine houses\* came out with it and hurt the sale of the two colors. The Heisey Company closed it out to the R. H. Macy Co., New York. Seven carloads were shipped to them with a reduction 20% on the dollar. Macy's sent their man, Mr. R. H. Shapiro, to the Heisey plant and Paul was assigned to helping him make his catalog list of items they were buying. Macy Co. sold the ware almost immediately. Mr. Shapiro stayed at the Granville Inn. He was amazed at the worker cooperation and the close knit relationship between owners and workers. Paul felt Heisey glass was superb in quality and was very happy with his job at the plant.

The oldest living glass worker for the Heisey Co. is Mr. William Coen, who Paul thought must be close to 94 years old. He was a hot metal worker.

Now, Paul, thanks to you for all this kindness on your part to give our Heisey News an interesting article in the first issue and let us, "the Newark Heisey Collector's Study Group" wish you a very Happy Birthday.

\*Editor's note: "Machine houses" refers to mass production of glass made by machines. Heisey glass was hand-made and this was probably the start of the Depression Glass Era.

Note: Paul Fairall has now been deceased for several years. We still refer to him often as a man who was very knowledgeable about Heisey glass. A "No Smoking" sign from the Women's Rest Room at the factory is now in the lower level of the museum.

In Heisey News, Volume I, No. 1, 1972 I wrote a short article on the 1428 Warwick pattern. Colors listed at that time were crystal, sahara and cobalt which were often seen. Colors listed as rare were moongleam, flamingo and hawthorne.

Since this article was written, 15 years have passed and much more has been learned about Heisey Glass. The candlesticks which were then believed to be hawthorne were a double one and the small individual one. These turned out to be Imperial's Heather, a shade of purple. We have learned that the individual candlestick, the double one and the 7" vase were made in both heather and Imperial's verde green. Since these are marked with the Diamond H they do have "collectible" value. They apparently were only made experimentally since so few are seen and they never appeared in Imperial catalogs. Of course, Imperial is also out of business.

Flamingo and moongleam have proved to be as rare as was then thought in 1972. We were also able to purchase a large Warwick vase from a former employee, which is in beautiful alexandrite - a real rarity.

Only the large cornucopia was still being made in 1956.

## Lightning fire snuffs out home, business, antiques

### Fire consumes antiques, business.

WAUSAU (AP) — Only a portion of the antiques were saved as fire destroyed a three-story former icehouse that Elmer Puestow had called home.

"This is the first time in my 67 years I am completely broke," he said while watching flames consume personal belongings and his home-furnishings business.

Lightning was blamed by firefighters for starting the blaze Thursday evening.

The collapsed building continued burning Friday. Assistant fire chief Frank Lewitzke said it was too risky to send personnel into the debris to clear away burning material.

The wood-frame structure was built in 1901 as the Kiefer Cold Storage Plant. Puestow and his wife used part of it for an antique and furniture business.

About 50 neighbors helped rescue more than 100 antiques from a shed before flames reached it. Also, about \$3,000 in antiques had been shipped Wednesday to a show elsewhere in town.

Puestow, estimating the loss at \$100,000, said he has fire insurance, but no ready cash.

The Puestows of Wausau, WI are members of HCA. We are so sorry to hear about their devastating fire. We certainly hope that they will be able to get a very good settlement from their insurance company. L.R.

### Findlay Glass Book Published

James S. Measell and Don E. Smith have combined their efforts in a significant new study in American glass, Findlay Glass: The Glass Tableware Manufacturers, 1886-1902. During this period, five major factories in Findlay were devoted to the production of pressed and blown tableware.

Published by Antique Publications of Marietta, Ohio, the book discusses the products of these pattern glass factories--Columbia Glass Co.; Bellaire Goblet Co.; Dalzell, Gilmore and Leighton Co.; Model Flint Glass Co.; and the Findlay Flint Glass Co.

The volume contains 148 pages of clearly written, well-documented information, plus many photos, including color plates of Findlay's most famous glassware products. Findlay Glass, is \$19.95 plus \$1.50 for postage/handling. It can be ordered from James Measell, Box 1052, Berkley, MI 48072.

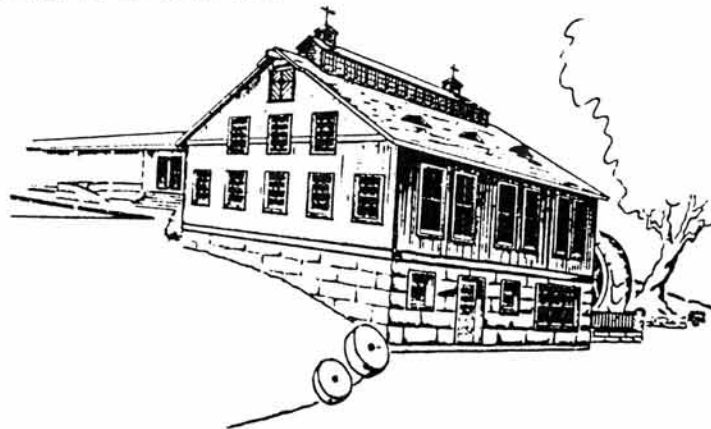
Smith produced the only previous study of Findlay glass in 1970. The new book makes extensive use of Smith's research into newspapers of the 1890s and adds much new information gleaned from original advertising in the glass trade periodicals of the 1880s-90s.

Measell is well-known throughout the Midwest as a glass historian and lecturer. In 1979, he authored Greentown Glass, a book-length study of a nineteenth-century Indiana plant. A professor at Wayne State University in Detroit, Measell contributes frequently to various publications on antiques and collectibles.

## Brothers' project to restore history

"We started with nothing and today we lost part of (our) history, but we'll rebuild the old mill." — Joe Dager, executive vice president of Velvet Ice Cream Co., following the April 28 fire that destroyed Velvet's Ye Olde Mill.

UTICA — Designs have been completed, work has begun and a new-old mill should be in place late winter, according to Velvet officials.

Mike Dager, Velvet's vice president, gets that familiar gleam of pride in his eyes as he describes the work that will go into the new mill.

"We're bringing in beams from old buildings around the state," Dager explains, so the structure will have not only a touch of history, but the look of an old mill. The beams will be used in a 10-foot high ceiling with open joists.

Harry Dailey, "an architect with a sense of history," as Dager describes him, completed the mill designs and his brother, Harold Dailey, is supervising the work; both are from Mount Vernon. The selection of the Dailey brothers was a bit ironic, Dager points out, since it's the Dager brothers working on the project with the Dailey brothers.

"We've had a lot of fun getting this going," Dager says.

The new-old mill will house an ice cream parlor, Velvet's corporate offices and a museum featuring the history of ice cream, the history of Velvet and the history of Ye Olde Mill, an 1817 grist mill. Dager said there also will be an area for community use.

The only remains of the grist mill left by the devastating fire — the foundation and an 18-foot water

wheel brought to Utica in 1961 — have been incorporated into the new design, Dager says. The large blocks that not so long ago held the 3½ story mill are being numbered as they are taken from their place and put back during the reconstruction work. That way, Dager explains, as much as possible of the old mill will remain.

As the reconstruction continues, Velvet's corporate offices remain in a trailer in front of the Ohio 13 plant. Before the fire, those offices were in the third floor of the Velvet plant, adjacent to the mill, but they too were damaged in the blaze.

When the new-old mill opens, however, company officials will move to the first floor of the mill where they will have twice the space they had previously. Other plans call for the moving of general offices to the mill so production space can increase.

More than 1 million gallons of water were poured on Ye Olde Mill April 28 as firefighters from nearly all of Licking County's fire departments tried to stop the flames. Less than 30 minutes after the 10 a.m. fire broke out, the word was that the mill could not be saved.

Officials blamed a faulty furnace for starting the blaze.

From a pre-World War I confectionary in downtown Utica to its present location on Ohio 13, Velvet continues to grow under the same "never say die" spirit that Joseph Dager brought with him when he came to America more than 80 years ago. It's a tradition that, despite adversity, lives on in Licking County.

The Dagers will celebrate their ground breaking for the new-old mill Wednesday in a private ceremony at the mill.

Many of you who come to convention will be glad to know that the new "Ye Old Mill" will be open by that time. As you can see the water wheel remains.

They will still be serving their "Heisey Sundae".

In accordance with Article IX, Section I of the Constitution, this is notice to you as a voting member of Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., that at the quarterly meeting to be held at Newark, Ohio, on September 6, 1986, the following change in said Constitution has been recommended by the Board of Directors and will be submitted to the voting membership for approval or disapproval.

ARTICLE II, SECTION I of the Constitution presently reads:

Section I - The members of this organization shall meet together regularly, for the purpose of acquiring a broader knowledge of glassware manufactured by the A. H. Heisey Glass Company in Newark, Ohio (1896-1957) and through instruction, discussion and study, actively promote the preservation and collection of Heisey glass.

ARTICLE II, SECTION I of the Constitution, if amended as proposed (add "and associated items" to last sentence) would then read:

Section I - The members of this organization shall meet together regularly, for the purpose of acquiring a broader knowledge of glassware manufactured by the A. H. Heisey Glass Company in Newark, Ohio (1896-1957) and through instruction, discussion and study, actively promote the preservation and collection of Heisey glass and associated items.

This amendment requires a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the active members in good standing present and voting at any regular meeting of the organization.

Also in accordance with Article XI, Section I of the By-Laws, the following change to the By-Laws has been recommended by the Board of Directors. Under the functions of the Board listed in Article III, Section 2 of the By-Laws, the following change is proposed to include an addition:

"(f) It shall give prior approval for the manufacture of any items in any mould owned by H.C.A."

Passage of the above By-Laws change requires a majority vote of the active members in good standing present and voting at the September 6, 1986 meeting.

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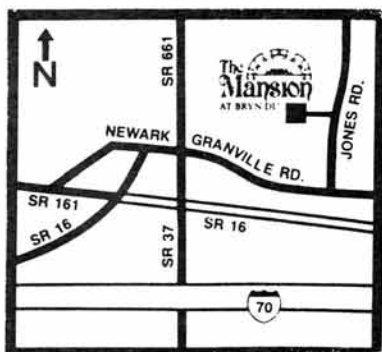
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A subsequent owner, Francis Birkham, made several alterations and additions before selling the property in 1905 to John S. Jones, a coal and railroad magnate. An established Columbus architect, Frank L. Packard, was hired by Jones to remodel the building. Packard spent three years adding rooms and altering the style of the building from its original Italianate style to one reflecting Georgian influence. Jones, of Welsh descent, named the property Bryn Du, pronounced Brin Dee, and meaning Black Hill. He meticulously matched stone quarried from the property for all remodeling. The same stone was used to build the neighboring Granville Inn, which Jones also owned. The Mansion soon took on a Georgian Federal style.

Jones was very involved in the Granville community. He died in 1927 and passed the property on to his daughter, Sally Jones Sexton, who operated the property as a horse and cattle farm until 1976. At that time the property, including the Granville Golf Course which was designed by Donald Ross and developed in the mid-1920's, was sold to William and Ortha Wright. The Mansion has been fully restored by the Wright family, with the assistance of architectural historian Roger Davis of Louisville, KY. It was opened in July of 1985 as a restaurant and banquet facility. It features dinners on Friday and Saturday evenings from 6-9 PM, a Sunday Dinner Buffet each Sunday from 11:30-2:30, and private events throughout the week. The adjacent land is today an operating farm, with Simmental cattle and Arabian horses. A regulation-size polo field at the front of The Mansion hosts polo games from June thru September.



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
