#### The Tenacious Three

In June of 1972 the Heisey Collectors of America held their first convention and show at the new Newark High School. The local Newark Club had previously held shows and displays; however, this was the first official HCA national convention. During June of this year, the 20th Annual Convention, show, and display will be held.

The maiden show in 1972 featured forty dealers from nine states. Among them, only three have set up in every convention show and all three are still selling Heisey Glass. They are Irene Rauck, Bob Coyle and Jerry Gallagher. They all sold at the previous Newark Heisey Club show, featured as part of the Land of Legend festival in 1971. This event was held at the old Newark High School.

Irene Rauck was born in Brownsville, Ohio and moved to Newark while a child. After the death of her husband she opened Moundbuilders Antiques in Newark in 1968. Irene was among the first to feature Heisey glass. Since she had to raise four children alone, this was not a hobby with her, but a necessary source of income. Many share my opinion that she is the most renowned Heisey dealer in the country.

In addition to the HCA show, she does several of the prestigious antique shows in Columbus. Her shop is a treasure house of glass, fine furniture, and accessories--open year around, by appointment only. Hundreds of rare pieces of Heisey have found their way into collections with Irene's help. Many folks in Newark wonder how she is still able to come up with these rare pieces. I think the answer is that she is trusted and she is willing to pay a good price for rare items. "Mrs. Wrap and Pack" still has a double booth each year at the convention and fills it with beautiful Heisey glass. There are usually several rare Krall cuttings on display in her booth. Krall's work is rarely seen these days anywhere else. Irene's children, Barbara, Joyce, Linda, and Ed are always there to help,

when needed. Dinner at her home is always an exciting affair with the table usually set with Heisey glass. Old Colony etch on crystal is her pattern. (Of course, the kitchen chairs are another matter!) Since Irene has not been well of late, hopefully she can make the June Convention and show. We all wish her well.

Bob Coyle was born in Newark, Ohio during this century. He is a graduate of Newark High School and the University of Cincinnati with a degree in Interior Design. Like Irene, he has been familiar with Heisey glass since he was a child. He recalls that any broken pieces were replaced at Mohlenpahs (a local housewares store which sold fine crystal and china). Bob started selling Heisev in 1965. He was the coowner of "Circa 1900" with James McDermott. When he exhibited in the first Newark Club show, he was a resident of New York City. The following year he moved back to Newark. In 1973 he co-authored The Heisev Animals, Etc. (Book II) with Lynne Bloch and Art Hartman. Bob also designed the cover for the book. Currently Bob operates an interior design consultation business and sells antiques at various shows throughout the United States. Coyle did many of the original Heisey displays and the required art work for some of the convention shows. He also wrote a very interesting series of articles for the Heisev News called "Sketches of Newark History."

Bob's fondest memories of Heisey and Newark were the many hours of talking and learning about Heisey from people like Paul Fairall, Gus Heisey, Jerry Haslop, Dorothy Cramer, Loren Yeakley, Irene Rauck, Clarence Vogel, and, as he says, "our first lady," Louise Ream. Bob wanted it known that he is honored to be in the same company with his friends, Irene Rauck and Jerry Gallagher. He said, "It's been a long time these past twenty-one years. It's been a real Heisey experience."

Jerry Gallagher is our third long-time dealer at the Convention show. Jerry assures me that he is a United States citizen, in fact, he was born here, somewhere. Today he lives in Plainview, Minnesota, where he is the proprietor of the Red Horse Inn antique shop. Gallagher speaks with affection of his first year in Newark. During the 1971 show at the old high school, he recalls how much fun it was when the lights kept going on and off. He recalls that the lights weren't much good even when they were working. Charlie Wade, former HCA president and early supporter, recalls this stranger from Minnesota unloading box after box of Heisey at the 1971 show. The dealer made trip after trip from his mobile home to the gym at the old Newark High

School, lugging all the boxes that filled double booths #4 and #5. When he had finished dressing his tables, nothing but Custard and Opal could be seen on the red velvet expanse. This was a sight to behold. When the show ended, there were only two pieces of this beautiful glass left on the tables. The drab Ridgeleigh and Crystolite went under the tables. Gallagher has never duplicated his spectacular first year; however, he still presents some of the finest Heisey each year in his regular spot, booth #5.


Jerry has some memories that stand out over the years. He recalls how Ann Holman drove her car right down the steps at the high school from the upper level parking when she realized that all unloading was being done on a lower level. Many of the older dealers still get a laugh out of this. Jerry recalls the year Lynne Bloch and Art Hartman showed up with a Greek Key Flamingo punch bowl, stand, and large underplate. It was a first for this set and a sight to behold. Two Hairpin wash sets shown at the same show, he remembers, also caused quite a stir.

At the first convention, Jerry found a stray dog on the grounds of the present Heisey Glass Museum. He named the dog "Muffin." Until his death in 1983, Muffin was Jerry's companion to every show.

Gallagher has recently been busy with Old Morgantown Glass, as well as Heisey. During 1990 he and other collectors of this fine glass established the Old Morgantown Glass Guild. He is kept busy as editor and reporter for the Guild's bi-monthly newsletter, Topics. The newsletter comes with the membership. He also writes for several national publications about glass. You will find Gallagher at booth #5 again this year. I suggest you get there early because the booth is always mobbed.

There we have it, three outstanding people with the determination and knowledge to continue the presentation of Heisey glass all these years. Each is willing to take the time to explain Heisey history when asked. They all sell with integrity--if the customer is not happy,

their money is returned with a smile. I hope all the visitors to the Convention show this June take a moment to say hello to each of them and congratulate them for their perseverance and the contribution they have made to the future of Heisey glass--the finest American handmade glass ever manufactured!

#### **Book Review**

#### Ruby Glass of the 20th Century

covers most of the American and some of the foreign manufacturers which produced ruby glass (red glass). A price guide is included and it is just that, as the author points out.

The book clarified the manufacturers and values of many items I have seen at shows and flea markets-pieces I have been tempted to buy, because--as all you Heisey collectors know--there are very few pieces of red manufactured by Heisey.

Personally I found the book informative and comprehensive. There is just so much that can be covered before the press deadline and any author has to set limits. For example, Over omitted the Imperial Glass Company pieces that were produced in the Heisey molds when Imperial owned the molds. I am sure the author was unaware of these items, plus those made by Dalzell-Viking although she mentions one Sparky and has it included in a photograph. However, I think that examples of the Heisey tangerine on the red side would have been worthy of mention, as well as prize collectors' items, such as the #3404 Spanish stemware and the #3397 Gascony stemware.

I am sure that those of you who are devotees of the red ruby glass will find this book as informative as I


- No. 354 Wide Flat Panel

Having written about No. 352 Flat Panel and No. 353 Medium Flat Panel over the past couple of months, there is little left to say about No. 354 Wide Flat Panel. Once again, it is difficult to determine when it first came out, but it seems likely to have been around 1908. While not as large as the two preceding patterns, it is yet another typical colonial line and includes a number of unusual pieces highly desirable to collectors today.

The first advertisement to appear in one of the trade journals featured one of these items, the 10-inch vase. This ad can be found in the March 11, 1911 issue of Iron Age-Hardware and, as you can see from Figure 1, the vase was highlighted that month just in time for the Easter trade. As another ad in the journal on May 8, 1913 pointed out:

"Spring brings flowers and the question of displaying them. The answer Mr. Dealer, is Heisey's glassware. Vases to suit every flower from the delicate violet to the stately American beauty, are made in this Best-of-All Glassware."



In addition to the vase, the pattern also included four sizes of low footed bowls which were available with the tops flared or crimped. The bowls could be used for plants, since the crimped versions were offered with silver plated liners which allowed them to act as fern dishes. This bowl was also available with a knob cover as a crushed fruit--the same bowl with a bulbous lid (hollow inside to allow for a spoon to be left in the bowl) was offered as part of the No. 455 Quator line.

In January 1912, The Soda Fountain introduced one of the most innovative pieces in the line, the sanitary straw jar (Figure 2). As you might imagine, this item was frequently advertised in both the Confectioners Journal (in April 1912 and again in January 1913) and in The Soda Fountain, where in August 1913, the following claims were made:

During these hot, mid-summer days with dust, flies, etc., insure your customers against unsanitary straws by the use of Heisey's glass straw jar. It has all the virtues of the metal holder, without the objectionable metallic odor that is imparted to the straws when placed in a metal jar. It is just as sanitary as it looks It keeps the straws sweet and clean.



In June a patent was filed for the straw jar and was approved on October 8, 1912, as D43,108. This was not the first, nor the only, patent for this pattern. As early as February 1910, a patent had been filed for the sanitary syrup (called a "molasses pitcher" in Figure 3), which was approved April 5, 1910, and made in two different sizes, usually marked with the patent date. Then in March 1912, the cruet (Figure 4) had also been filed for and approved June 4th as D42,594. It was made in four sizes, 2 oz., 4 oz., 6 oz. and 8 oz. A third patent was filed on June 24th and approved October 8 as D43,109 for the domino sugar (Figure 5). Note the handle on this piece and how similar it is to the ones typically seen on items in the No. 455 Quator line--indicating, once again, that all of these colonial patterns really do have to be considered a single "family." The domino sugar seems to have been another very original design, since Heisey took great pains in their catalog to show it both from the front and the side as well as filled

with domino sugar cubes--almost as if they were afraid that otherwise their customers would not know what do with it! They also offered a combination domino sugar and spoon tray, which would be another rare find today.

pat which fits on top of the cream like a lid. A photograph in the May 1914 Good Housekeeping shows the No. 354 set decorated with silver overlay, suggesting that it would make "more room on the invalid's tray." It is not known who did the silver decoration; of course, it would have been some firm other than Heisey.



The forth and final patent in this pattern was not filed for until December 1913 and approved March 3l, 1914. D45,542 (Figure 6). It was for a lavender jar, which was available in seven graduated sizes, from one ounce all the way up to 27 ounces. Although difficult to assemble, that would be quite a collection to put together! As you may have noticed, the designer on all of these patents was Andrew J. Sanford, who seems to have been responsible for the creation of most of Heisey's early patterns.

Although no further ads appeared in trade journals, some later advertisements for Wide Flat Panel can be found in popular magazines. Figure 7 is from American Cookery in November 1914, but can also be found in the Saturday Evening Post. Ladies' Home Journal, and possibly other magazines. I'm afraid it won't reproduce very well, but I wanted you to see it because it illustrates the stack sugar, cream and butter sets in both the Wide Flat Panel and No. 1184 Yeoman patterns. Both of these combination sets consisted of three pieces: the sugar, which forms the base of the set, the cream which sits on the sugar, and the butter

In addition to the items already mentioned, the early catalogues also include an 8-inch nappy, a finger bowl, an individual match stand, and a grapefruit with an attached underplate. By 1915, a few more items had been added to the line, including an oval hotel cream and sugar and the cologne bottle seen in Figure 8 from the October 1917 issue of Good Housekeeping. This same ad also appeared in the Delineator, Women's Home Companion, and probably other magazines. Vogel mentions that this cologne has been seen quadruple marked--with Diamond H's on either side of the stopper and also on both sides of the neck of the bottle itself.


Vogel also pictured a funnel in the autumn 1980 Heisey Glass Newscaster, which he attributed to the No. 354 line. It reportedly came from a drug store on East Main Street in Newark. It does look very similar to other Wide Flat Panel pieces, but is otherwise un-known.


When Heisey established an etching shop in 1915, the hotel cream and sugar were among the first items to be decorated in this fashion, with the No. 9004 Iris plate etching. (The original name and number of this etching remain unknown.)

By 1928, when catalog 109 came out, there were only ten pieces still in production: the sanitary syrups, hotel cream and sugar, stack cream, sugar and butter set, grapefruit, finger bowl, and sanitary straw jar. A few of these pieces were made in color: the hotel cream and sugar in moongleam, flamingo, sahara, and hawthorne, the 16 oz. sanitary syrup in moongleam, and the stack set in flamingo. The individual butter was also produced in sahara. Other pieces in color have been reported in the past and are possible, but are not listed in The Collector's Encyclopedia of Heisey Glass. 1925-1938.



The pattern was discontinued in 1935. The only molds still in existence seem to be the hotel cream and sugar and three of the lavender jars--the two smallest ones (o oz. and 2-1/4 oz.) and the largest one (27 oz.) None of these pieces were ever reissued by Imperial.









In the 1700s here in the Yachting Center, travel was by boat or horseback. In the beginning, streets were not necessary, and when they were, the highways were mere cartways that followed the path of least resistance, swinging around obstructions trying to avoid hills. The crazy pattern accounts for some houses facing the road, some sideways, cornerwise or even in the middle of the street. Some houses are built on ledges with the interiors a series of curious ells. Very often the main door on the side street is on the second floor. The roofs are gambrel, hip, pitched or mansard and are so close together that there is an existing "droprights" statue in the town laws. This makes for an interesting and charming old town.

The Foxy Kitten is a brand new contributor to this humble column and it seems that her mother started collecting when she discovered her grandmother's punch cups were Heisey. The Foxy Kitten caught the bug once she started helping her mother. At that point most of the pieces she found were Colonial and at the time she didn't think Colonial was too exciting per se. That remains to be seen, since some colonial pieces are very exciting and most desirable. With the aid of Heisey books and the HeiseyNews she added on to her collecting and in the late Fall of 1990, she was most fortunate to muster up a few choice valuables: the #160 Locket on Chain 8" comport 1. The dealer who sold this piece did not know it was Heisey-therefore the deal was good! Also Ringneck Pheasants, not one but two. In the same shop, she found an old amber bowl balanced on the sash of a window, hidden by a bookcase. It turned out to be the #133 Swan Handled Floral Bowl, in Sahara. Boy what a find for a fairly new collector. You sure are doing a-okay

I saw the Steadfast Colleague within the last couple of weeks and he showed me a lovely tumbler, (and it would be the envy of the Cardinal, I'm sure). Although I wouldn't have said it was Heisey, now after I've held it in my hands, I will never forget how it looks and feelsit is very light weight. It is the 8-oz #115 tumbler, a terrific addition to any tumbler collection.

L & B from the Mountain State want to swagger about a piece they call their crowning glory, the #4045 6" ball vase in Alexandrite. Quite an unexpected find but that is the joy of it all. Since the Farmer has long since sowed his seeds and is now awaiting to reap the

harvest, let's see what he has from the Heisey scene: #300 Peerless butter dish, a #1404 Old Sandwich Ice lip jug; #1425 Victorian 2-oz. bar; a #4163 Whaley 16-oz. Beer mug; #305 Punty and Diamond Point 10" vase; #1205 Fancy Loop 6-oz oil, along with the #1205 8 oz. tumbler in Emerald with good gold.

While I was at the auction in Ohio this past March I picked up a tumbler for the Cardinal—the #1184
Yeoman 12 oz soda or ice tea straight, diamond optic with ground bottom, marked, and in Sahara. At this writing he has not seen it, nor does he even know about it, but by the time he reads this in print he will be the owner and very pleased I'm sure. Let's see, who is the proud owner of the #1210 Moongleam Frog handled cheese plate—perhaps it is the Energetic Countess.

The Amicable Stroller has a #1489 bitters bottle with a pheasant painted on one side, and also the #1776 Kalonyal blown salt.

Talking about bitters bottles, Yours Truly enjoys one in #1503 Crystolite, along with a Ribbed Octagon demi-tasse cup and saucer in Flamingo<sup>8</sup>; a #1191 Lobe Flamingo pickle and olive\* and the #1445 Grape Cluster bowl in crystal. The Magnanimous Chieftain has a gorgeous Daisy and Leaves 16" vase along with a Trumpet vase.

It is just about time of us to head for "Heisey Land" to the Convention. Donald and I will be at the Display waiting to talk to all our old friends and hopefully meet many new friends who have only been in touch by mail. It is so much fun to meet such lovely people and to put faces to names. This will be a banner year for HCA. Please come and enjoy the Display with Donald, Mary, and Yours Truly.

After a few trains, however, Santa was bombed and had to be removed by the security guards with the help of extension ladders.

After this incident, Clarence asked Mr. King to paint a large billboard "Seasons Greetings" for the roof of the building. The huge Santa was a part of the greetings scene. This turned out to be quite a spectacular affair and earned a lot of comment from the residents of Newark-those were the days!

#### STEM STUFF

The world of Heisey collecting is full of surprises. Gather three or more Heisey collectors in one place and one of them is sure to come up with something new. What is not so surprising is that I'm always surprised when these surprises show up. (My wife says, snidely, that this should come as a surprise to no one and I advised her, gently, to butt out...dear...please).

And at the recent National Capitol Area Heisey Collectors' "Annual All Heisey Glass Show" held in Silver Springs, Maryland on St. Patrick's Day weekend there was another surprise. The O'Sparacios were there to celebrate St. Patrick's Day along with an assortment of O'Shauneseys, O'Briens, and O'Tooles. Bringing up the rear was Walter O'Ludwig, well known purveyor of blarney and collector of green.

Almost everyone who hails from the northeast knows Walter Ludwig is the *Moongleam Maven*. His collection of green is second to none and his dedication to the pursuit of it can be described kindly only as hysterical. During his tracing o' the green, Mr. Ludwig uncovered the beautiful little wine glass featured here.

That is why, unless an official Heisey name can be documented, we're calling this stem, "Ludwig." Well, that and a couple of threats of bodily harm.

Walter brought his find to the NCAHC show so that their world famous Authentification Committee (of which I was a minor member this year) might authenticate it. We authenticators formed a circle around the little wine glass and did a lot of secret authenticating things and came to a collective conclusion that this piece was indeed Heisey. Bystanders gushed and Walter blushed and...well, you really had to be there.

As Figure I shows, Ludwig has 4090 Coventry's stem with 4004 Impromptu's Polka Dot optic decorating its bowl (or "Spot optic" as it was listed quite unimaginatively in a Heisey catalog). Polka Dot or Spot optic is affectionately known as "Belly Button" optic by collectors.

Turn to page 109 of the Heisey Stem book by Ryan, Ryan and O'Bradley and you'll note that there are two stems featured on that page, neither of which is Ludwig. There is, however, Ludwig's progenitor, pattern 4090, Coventry (See Figure 2). Lacking Heisey Stems, you might try Vogel's III, page 142 or Bredehoft's Encyclopedia of Heisey Glass, page 249. Then, if you'd like to read a brilliant treatise on other belly button optic stems, check out the November 1975 issue of the Heisey News (Egad, has it been that long?) For those of you who do not have Heisey references and were waiting for this article to get serious, here comes the dull stuff.

Without documentation from Heisey records, we cannot date Ludwig. We might assume it was made during the same time that Coventry and Impromptu were produced. Coventry was brought out in 1937 and, depending on who you read, was manufactured until 1941 to 1944. My own notes say 1946, and I'm stubborn, so I'll stick with that date. Impromptu, on the other hand, was made between 1941 and 1957. I'll throw caution to the wind and say that Ludwig is a product of the early forties (It's courage such as this that brought us victory in the Persian Gulf.)

Ludwig's stem varies slightly from Coventry's stem in that it is not as detailed between the base of the stem and the foot. This is not uncommon in production items of the smaller pieces of a stem line.

Your assignment for this month is to go forth and find a piece of Ludwig. What the heck, if Walter--who can hardly see beyond green-- can find one, so can you. Besides, a rarity such as this must be worth at least a

buck and a half.

#### National Heisey Glass Museum Endowment Fund

Introduction

Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., a non-profit corporation etablishes this Endowment Fund for the purpose of providing funding for future operation and maintenance of The National Heisey Glass Museum, presently located in Sixth Street Park, Newark, Ohio, and the connecting HCA office building facing Church Street.

Dedication of the Endowment Fund is threefold: First, to the enterprise of A. H. Heisey and Family, and to the skill, labor, and dedication of Heisey Company artisans and employees; just as the enduring beauty, designed brilliance, rainbow of colors, decor, and utility of Heisey glassware reflects always, the endowment given by those who produced this fine glass.

Secondly, as testimony to the interest, study, collecting, industry, and success of Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., members and friends.

Thirdly, to provide to all, for all time, the opportunity to share in the knowledge and appreciation of Heisey glassware.

#### Operation and Procedure

It is agreed that initial placement of the Endowment Fund be with Park National Bank, Newark, Ohio, and invested in the Licking County Foundation. Choice of the investment within the Foundation shall be determined by the Trust Department of Park National Bank.

Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., is currently and will remain a qualified corporation under sections 50I(C-3) and 170(c) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Income earned by the Endowment Fund shall be paid annually to Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., for operation and maintenance of the National Heisey Glass Museum, or may be returned to the Fund by Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., as additional principal, as determined by yearly review of the Board of Directors of Helsey Collectors of America, Inc. Principal depositied with the Endowment Fund shall remain in the Fund.

The Board of Directors of Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., may, by two thirds majority vote of the entire Board membership, change the Endowment Fund to another trustee of the Foundation as the conditions may dictate or necessitate. In the event of the

dissolution of Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., The National Heisey Glass Museum and assets of the Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., would be turned over to The Licking County Historical Society, or The Ohio Historical Society, provided that they are qualified recipients at that time. The Endowment Fund shall remain in fact as established above and shall be so administered by the successor agency.

In the event that the Licking County Foundation ceases to exist, Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., provided it is a qualified recipient at that time, shall be entitled to all of its principal and interest then existing in the Fund, which shall be payable directly to the corporation. Heisey Collectors of America, Inc., shall then be responsible for seeing that any such funds received are used to carry out the purposes as set forth in this document and in accordance with the requirements of the Internal Revenue Code then in effect.

A listing of all contributors to The National Heisey Glass Museum Endowment Fund shall be maintained at the Heisey Museum.
