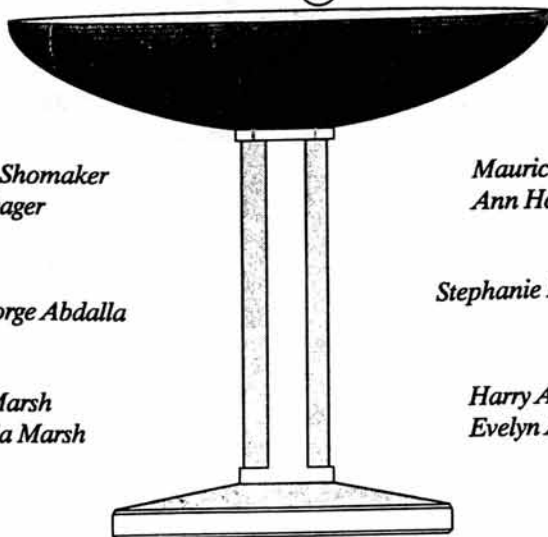

## **From the National Heisey Glass Museum Curator, Sally Ballog Staruch**

Along with the increased activities associated with the convention, the regular work of the museum continues. As we go about our daily tasks, we work to fulfill the original goals of the founding members. Even before the museum was started, they were getting together to share their knowledge of Heisey glass. They put up displays, made presentations, and planned a national association which would publish a monthly newsletter. Currently, the museum contains hundreds of pieces of glass, glass craftmaking tools, as well as records and memorabilia from the Heisey company and the Heisey Collectors of America organization. The museum has a small library

with a steadily expanding collection of books; several members have personally committed themselves to contributing more books about glass and related items.

Over the past month Elaine Cobel gave the museum an exhibit which belonged to her husband, Carl Cobel, who was a former employee (featured in the May Heisey News). Carl put the exhibit together using his father's tools--Ray was a moldmaker at the Heisey Company. The exhibit was on display here in the museum several years ago and is now the property of the museum.

Another recent donation to the Library and Archives is a set of microfilm of Heisey records. We cooperated with the staff at the Corning Museum of Glass, who were interested in expanding their library collection on Heisey glass. Corning microfilmed a bulk of the Heisey records and in return for our "loan" to them, they have given us a copy of the microfilm. This material increases our accessibility to the material and helps us preserve it too.

Today a museum visitor donated four Heisey ads from magazines published in 1928 and 1929. All four ads belong to the *20 Glass Secrets Series*, which contained a total of six ads. Several ads from this series are displayed in the museum. We also carry two of the ads in this series (#5-28 and #6-28 --poster size) in the gift shop. Included in her collection, however, is the ad #4-28 *Marietta Betrays the Secrets of Colored Glass*. This is one ad in the series which we here at the museum hadn't seen before. People also continue to donate glass and other Heisey memorabilia to the museum and for sale in the gift shop.

We thank everyone for their donations and we also thank the volunteers for the month of May. Volunteers were: Marcia Booth, Myrtle and Warren Burgess, Jim and Karen Clark, Ginny Hague, Stan Holmquist, Jim and Helen Kennon, Liz King, Frances Law, Connie Makris, Phyllis and Bob McClain, Mary McWilliams, Mollie Miller (special thanks to Molly for helping with the Newark Old Towne Tour on May 19), Vivian Moore, Jim Pennington, Alva Pennington, Bob and Helen Rarey, Frances and Dick Stotler, Jamie Van Winkle, Hugo Wenzel, and Arlene Zipperlen. My daughter Larisa Staruch volunteered and also a young woman who is a friend of our family, Susanna Gabajova from Czecho-Slovakia. We welcome Connie Makris to our volunteer staff; we met during the Old Towne West tour.

## HEISEY MUSINGS

In celebration of the 20th anniversary of the HCA, I searched through my archives (two cardboard shoe boxes and a Sunshine Uneeda Biscuit tin) and dug out a few old Heisey auction catalogs.

Most Heisey auctions back then, as now, were held in conjunction with HCA conventions and meetings. The F & S Auction Service did the honors. Today F & S operates under the name of "Apple Tree." I don't actually know if, as some have suggested, its name change was part of the FBI's witness protection program, but if I find out I'll let you know.

My earliest catalog was for the auction held on June 17, 1972. It's just shy of 20 years old but it's as close as we're going to get. The next oldest catalogs after the June 1972 piece of antique ephemera are from November 11, 1972 and April 28, 1973. The 1972 auctions were held at the YWCA in, to use the local dialect, *Nerk, Ahia*, but by 1973 the auction was moved to the Granville Opera House. When a fellow asked for directions to the "Grand Old Opry House," I knew exactly where he wanted to go.

The YWCA is still located at the corner of 6th and Church Streets--an auspicious address. We really should treat the "Y" as a monument. It did, after all, hold the first HCA meetings as well as the early auctions. We might have the building bronzed, that would be a nice touch, or maybe erect a McDonald's on that corner in its honor.

The auction catalogs unearthed for this column were bound in heavy covers and almost every item was pictured. Those were classier days.

The first ten items offered at the June 1972 auction and the prices realized are noted here for their historical interest. Item #1 was a Greek Key water bottle (the one with funny teepee shape) and it sold for \$50. Even then Heisey collectors were big spenders. The second item was a #4164 Diana etched water jug and it was bought for the princely sum of \$20 (the big spenders were already on break and Sam Schnaidt, the auctioneer, was sweating). Next came four tumblers, also Diana etched to match the water jug. "Slight roughness" was noted in the catalog which might explain the \$3 each the tumblers brought, though I suspect the price was due more to "slight cheapness."

Item #4 was a Fancy Loop water bottle at \$25 which was followed by a Rabbit paperweight at \$35 and a Flamingo #372 sanitary syrup at \$15. Can you detect a trend here?

Item #7 is interesting. It was listed as a Flamingo cream and sugar but a parenthetical note says, "(found this may not be Heisey so won't be sold)." It was neither

Heisey nor sold. Number 8 was a #1489 bitters bottle which broke the bank at \$7.50 (when the less than one dollar increments begin you can tell the auctioneer has lost it).

Finally with item #9 prices began to soar. A crystal Scotty went out at \$27.50 followed by #10, a Greek Key 5" handled jelly for \$15. I didn't buy anything. You can tell how astute I was in those days.

Skipping around that first catalog I'll note some prices which will either be of interest or bring tears to your eyes: an Amber stem Wabash goblet at \$15--couldn't you just die? As expected, auction biggies were the rarer animals: Show Horse \$275, Mamma Rabbit \$250 (the babies went off at \$30 and \$35 each), Airedale \$175, Goose wings down \$85, and a Gazelle, the highlight of the auction, brought \$400.

A pair of Sahara Gascony candlesticks sold for \$40 and everybody gasped (it's noted right in my catalog--"gasp," I wrote). Too high, huh? Well, would you pay \$40 for a one quart Orchid etched cocktail shaker? Then you shoulda' been there.

Taking a quick peek at the two following auctions, it's interesting to note that the same Greek Key water bottle that sold for \$50 in June went for \$25 at the November auction. Hard to figure, a Greek Key goblet sold for \$40 at that same auction and there was not near as much glass in the auction.

This'll grab you--a #5013 Shasta cordial with the #924 Daisy cutting for \$20. Talk about inflation, at a more recent auction the same piece brought \$150. There were a lot of baskets and most of them sold in the 20 to 30 dollar range. Would you believe an Empress ash tray in Alexandrite for \$55? Back then \$90 bought a the large #353 Mongleam Tobacco Jar.

You understand, of course, we're just talking about the high priced stuff here. For bargain hunters there were the more unusual crystal favor vase shapes, #4228, #4229 and #4230, at \$5, \$6, and \$8 apiece respectively. Thanks to Betty and Burl Whaley's Auction Comparison Prices list, we know that last year the top auction prices for those same tiny favor vases were a respectable respectively \$140, \$110 and \$200 apiece.

I don't think I can go on.



## THE ORIGINAL TWENTY... AN INTRODUCTION

The 20 members who founded HCA began as a study club, researching Heisey glass and sharing their findings with each other. Over the course of the last twenty years, many of them wrote articles for the Heisey News--scores of articles. We have selected news articles from Vol. 1, No. 1 of the Heisey News, which highlight the early events and articles from the very first issue of the Heisey News written by the founding twenty. The first article is by Evelyn Allen telling you how it all began. Other articles focus on Heisey glass. Dick Marsh points out in his article that just talking about the different figurines would take four years of monthly articles. Frances Law choose to feature the Heisey colors. ( We refer you to that first issue of the Heisey News and to a long article written by Evelyn Allen about Heisey Employee, Paul Fairall.) Loren Yeakley's article is about the Fandango pattern--the Fandango pitcher was to become the symbol of HCA. In the center of all this activity was the HCA president, and editor of the newsletter, Louise Ream.

### HOW "WE" THE NEWARK HEISEY COLLECTOR'S CLUB BEGAN

In the early part of November 1969, Ann Holman approached me at an auction (where a lot of Heisey glass was being sold) and said, "Let's start a Heisey Club." Of course I, being a collector of sorts, immediately was interested. We stood at the auction and began to talk about how nice it would be to share our interest with other collectors. Following the auction we called Virginia and Loren Yeakley and asked them if we could talk to them about a club. They invited us to their home and on November 12, 1969, the four of us sat down and with great

enthusiasm, started plans to invite a few collectors to the Yeakleys and try a meeting. On November 29, 1969 nine collectors met and formed our own local club. Little did any of us know that we would ever develop into a national organization. We had several study meetings and everyone seemed to enjoy it immensely.

In the early part of 1970 the Historical Society approached Loren Yeakley, seeking our club out for a display of Heisey Glass. With great enthusiasm and fear we started making plans. June 27th through July 5, 1970, we had our first display. The display was a very successful and rewarding experience with 2239 people from 24 states coming to see "OUR" display. When it was over a very tired but elated club went back to the books only to be approached again, this time by the Land of Legend Committee, for another display in June 1972. Another display! Mixed emotions! Then enthusiasm again! The long hours of planning began. We began to wonder, "Where are we going from here?" Now we know!

June 17 thru 20, 1971, we had our second display and added an antique show with 2800 paid guests from several states. At this time so many requested we start a National Club from the heart of Heisey country, that very reluctantly we started exploring the idea. We sent out letters to interested Heisey collectors that we knew and our response was overwhelming. At a meeting October 15, 1971, with a lot of discussion, we decided to give it an honest try.

This brings us up to our first issue of Heisey News, published by the Heisey Collectors of America's news staff, which will be sent out monthly. We, with the help of fellow collectors, hope to make as much success with the national club. Now we can go back to having our own study group meeting once a month and encourage fellow collectors to start their study groups. You can see they can be quite rewarding.

### HEISEY FIGURINES--ANIMALS

In the months to come we will discuss a different figurine or matched set of figurines in each issue. This will take over four years !!! The decorative ones will be first, followed by others used as flower frogs, decanters, stems of cocktail glasses and cocktail shaker stoppers.

Items which have been reproduced by Imperial Glass Corporation will be noted. Imperial has made 22 different figurines in crystal glass starting in 1964 and continuing until January 1, 1968, and is still making a lesser amount in caramel slag. The latter are presently being signed with IG trademark but they may be found with the Diamond H or unsigned. Miss Lucille Kennedy, assistant to the president of Imperial, tells us that the molds are in too poor condition to make more animals in crystal as the defects show up too much. Also the workers do not like to make them as it is too hard to make the rate because of the difficulty in removing them from the molds.

Most of the Heisey figurines were designed by Royal Hickman, a glass designer who first designed for Kosta Glasbruk of Sweden. When he began designing for the Heisey firm there was already one animal in production, which was the horsehead bookend. This being our first issue, it is fitting that this bookend be covered first. (See Fig. 5, Pg. 10)

This animal is usually found in clear crystal although it can be found frosted. Regarded as a rare find, it has also been found in amber. If anyone has seen it in any color, we would like to know of it. The horsehead bookend is a solid figurine approximately 6 7/8 inches tall, 6 inches from nose to back of mane and 2 5/8 inches across the solid base. Seldom is the Diamond H. found on this item but when it does occur it is found midway on the neck, just above the base.

The glass in this piece does not always show the quality we generally expect to find. If one will look closely he will notice that there are many fine waves on the exterior of the glass but the center is quite clear and free of lines.

This condition was caused in removing the animal from the mold.

Our friend, here, is not as pretty as the rest of the Heisey stable of horses as he is rather ferocious looking. He has a rough jagged mane, large eyes, large flared nostrils and his mouth is opened wide. Even though, for the most part, he is plain in detail, there is a well defined tongue on the lower jaw.

This piece is seldom seen damaged but, when damage does occur, it is usually to the mane. To check whether any grinding has been done to repair such damage, the

### Heisey's 75th Anniversary To Be Marked At Newark, O., June 27-July 5

The Licking County Historical Society will commemorate the seventy-fifth anniversary of the founding of one of Licking County's best known industries, Heisey glassware with its "Diamond Jubilee for the Diamond H", beginning June 27 and continuing through July 5.

More than 1,000 pieces of Heisey glassware will be displayed, including a complete set of animals, a representation of the major patterns, and pieces of every production color, as well as pieces of experimental colors which were never put into production. Most of the items on display will be from the Newark Heisey Collectors Club, a branch of the National Heisey Collectors Club, an organization which has gained more than 300 members since its origin in September 1969.

Founded in 1895, the Heisey Company began making glass on April 23, 1896. An H enclosed in a diamond was not used as a trademark until 1901, but since that time the Diamond H has become a well-known symbol, and closing of the Heisey plant in 1957 brought about a great diamond rush among glass collectors.

The display may be seen daily during the Diamond Jubilee from 10 a.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. at the Historical Society meeting house located in 6th Street Park in Newark, Ohio. Newark is about 25 miles east of Columbus, O.

mold seam which runs up the center of the mane will probably have been removed.

Clarence Vogel, in his fourth book, indicates that the bookends were designed by T. Clarence Heisey around 1935. In a catalog of the late forties they are listed at \$90.00 per dozen. This item has not been reproduced by Imperial.

## COLOR OF THE MONTH

Vaseline or Canary?

This color by any name is lovely to look at. The scarcity of the greenish-yellow glass (chartreuse) also makes it very collectible. It is questionable whether Heisey referred to this shade as vaseline, for nowhere in price lists or catalogs is it mentioned as such. But make it they did! Quite a few marked pieces have turned up, and some unmarked but definitely Heisey patterns.

However, in a pre-1900 catalog, printed in color, a piece of #150 (Pointed Oval in Diamond Point is shown in a definite vaseline color, but called CANARY by Heisey. Some of the Newark people spoke about canary glass but until the purchase of a #465 candy jar (Recessed Panel) called canary by the dealer, this color had been elusive. Believe me, it looks exactly like the color we call vaseline. It is entirely possible that the Heisey company made vaseline but to be a bit different, labeled it canary. This explains the question mark after the title.

It is truly hard to conceive that such a good glass company as Heisey would turn out this color by accident or as bad batches as some authorities indicate. The pieces in collector's china cabinet are almost always a beautiful color of glass. It may be possible but it seems illogical. Until further evidence disproves this theory, this shade might be called canary by Heisey and vaseline by the layman. It glows under the black light like custard.

The following patterns have been seen in the vaseline color. All references are to Vogel's four books.

#1280 Winged Scroll Book 4 p. 125-127

#465 Recessed Panel, Book 2 p. 99

#150 Pointed Oval in Diamond Point Book 1 p. 102 and Book 4 p. 133. (This pattern in canary has been seen only in the catalog mentioned. Wouldn't it be a great find if some collector turned up with it in canary?)

#160 Locket on Chain, Book 1 p. 101 and Book 4 pgs. 131 and 132.

#1201 Floral bowl (second use of this number by Heisey), Book 3 color plate 3. Also Book 2 p. 153.

#1020 Cream and Sugar, Book 2 p. 121.

#351 Priscilla, Book 2 p. 17. The tall compote in this pattern is magnificent in canary.

#473 Narrow Flute with Rim, Book 2. Item seen is small oval plate.

#105 7-inch candlesticks, Book 3 p. 31

#1193 Inside Scallop. Large Bowl, Book 2 p. 153

#4182 Low bowl, Book 2 p. 141.

#12 Bowl (Never seen)

#451 Cross Lined Flute, Book 2 Color plate 1

#1184 Yeoman Book 2 p. 112 -handled bouillon.

There are also two sizes of very plain plates, usually marked, and a simple bowl for soup or grapefruit. These plates and bowls are much lighter in shade than the other patterns named but fall into the vaseline category.

Good luck for your search for this color and let us know if you have it in other patterns than those mentioned here.

Many items in this color are also shown on plate 3 of "HEISEY GLASS IN COLOR" By Virginia and Loren Yeakley.

# Museum Ultimate Goal Of Heisey Collectors

Columbus Dispatch Sunday March 26, 1972

NEWARK, Ohio — A museum for Heisey glass is the ultimate aim of the Heisey Collectors of America, a newly formed nonprofit corporation.

The Heisey Collectors initiated a monthly publication featuring news of clubs, interviews with former glass workers and stories of collectors and how they got started.

THE PARENT club is in Newark where the A. H. Heisey Co. manufactured quality glass from the early 1900's until 1958. Three clubs in the Columbus area and one in New York City are the other member clubs.

Officials say several other clubs are in the process of joining. They believe many other groups will be formed as collectors learn of the organization.

Mrs. Russell Ream of 1472 Mariner Dr., Reynoldsburg, says collection of Heisey glass has mushroomed in recent years and several antique shops far from Newark devote their activities to the sale of Heisey glass.

THE ORGANIZATION has

The Newark club has started a Heisey museum fund with a \$2,500 donation from money earned during the Land of Legend Festival last June.

The club earned \$6,600 from the sale of souvenir plates at the festival. Members are using part of the money to buy more plates for sale this year.

THE PLATES are made by the Imperial Glass Co. of Marietta, using old Heisey molds and the diamond H trademark.

The Heisey Collectors are holding their national convention in conjunction with the festival June 15-18.

## FANDANGO

Heisey's First Pattern?

by Loren Yeakley

Minnie Watson Kamm in her fifth book on pattern glass illustrates a pattern, not identified to a particular glass company, called Diamond Swag. To quote her description, "Four long swags extend from the rim to the base; with inverted arches across at the base, each broad arch overlapping the adjacent one on the center-side very near the base a diamond is inserted at this crossing. The glass sparkles and is crystal clear." In her sixth book on pattern glass she includes a page from a trade magazine which identifies this pattern as Heisey's No. 1201. It was at this time she stated this was Heisey's first pattern. In her seventh book on pattern glass she includes several plates from Heisey trade catalogs, one of which is No. 1201.

Ruth Webb Lee, another student of American Glass, included this pattern in her book on Victorian Pressed Glass and called it Fandango. Most of today's collectors call this pattern by this name. The early trade catalogs contained only the numbers of the different patterns. Most of the names were applied by the collectors and authors.

Whether Fandango was actually the first pattern manufactured by the A. H. Heisey Co. in Newark, Ohio, we will probably never know. If one uses the numerical sequencing then No. 1200, Cut Block, could be one of the first major patterns. Minnie Kamm shows this pattern in her sixth book and calls it Heisey's No. 1200.

We have seen a complete early Heisey catalog, undated of course, containing only the complete line they made in No. 1200. We own a complete early Heisey catalog showing the complete lines of four major patterns, 1201 (Fandango), 1205 (Fancy Loop), 1210 (Punty Band) and 1225 (Plain Band). This catalog contains more than 90 different molds in Fandango. The

early patterns were made to resemble cut glass so popular at this time. The design pressed into the glass is usually very sharp and detailed. Many times the glass is very brilliant and clear. This pattern has become very collectible and in this part of the country it brings a very good price. The complete line in this pattern is included in Vogel Book IV and has been found only in crystal, sometimes decorated with gold. This pattern has not been found bearing the Heisey Trademark.

Even though factual proof is lacking, Fandango is generally considered to be Heisey's first major pattern among today's collectors.

Many of you have written expressing your desire to continue with a national association located in Newark.


Tentative plans are underway to organize such a group if enough interest is shown.

There is a saying in our picturesque town "Hollyhocks to Hottops," how true! The houses in the old town down on the harbor are very close together and the front doors come right up to the sidewalks. Over the years these sidewalks have been "hottopped" or paved, but the Hollyhocks still grow through any crack in the ground between the house and the sidewalk. State Street just seems to bloom with a myriad of color from these tall stately flowers. Hollyhocks are everywhere you look, a welcome greeting for the numbers of townfolk and visitors walking our quaint historic by-ways. Even though I've always lived here, I still find myself on paths or lanes I've never traversed before. For instance, when two friends were here visiting, we took a driving tour of the old section, my friend took a wrong turn, and we ended up on a path I've never seen before--an education for my friends as well as myself.

Heard from the *Steadfast Colleague* by phone and he was excited as usual regarding some interesting pieces of Heisey he was able to scoop right out from under the noses of a few dealers. The #1519 Waverly footed cheese with the Rose etch; the #134 Trident Candlestick--only one--Tea Rose etch, but that now makes a pair. Joy! He also unearthed a couple of pieces of #1205 Fancy Loop, which he claims are "keepers." He also has the #18" vase and the footed orange bowl (see Vogel IV, pp. 88 & 87).

The *Gator Guy and Gal from the Sunshine State* went diligently searching all over Florida and southern Georgia to find these gems: two 2-oz footed bar glasses in Sahara with the Empress etch #447 with #3380 Old Dominion stems (these were picked up at a depression glass show). A two-light #1504 Regency candlestick was picked up at the end of the day at a flea market--plus a pair of 7" #21 Aristocrat candlesticks. She claims these were still waiting for her even after the extravangaza had been picked clean by the whole Ohio crowd.

Remember the *Arkansas Razorbacks*? I haven't heard from them for a while. They came across a first rate piece of Heisey, the #1521 Quilt candy dish with a pewter lid. They found this in a used furniture shop on a dusty shelf

behind some old cabinets. Later, while shopping in another state, they found the Quilt ash tray (Burns, p. 50).

*Yours Truly* found the #10 salt and pepper along with a #1469-1/2 Ridgeleigh 3" round candleblock (later I was able to pick up a mate, which is what makes hunting interesting); two #3480 Koors 12 oz sodas in crystal with moongleam foot (quite a buy--for less than a pair of movie tickets); the #1125 Colonial 9" plate with 42 rayed star bottom; also a #1405 Ipswich candlevase insert. The *Amicible Stroller* strolled down the avenue and brought back a #1200 Cut Block individual cream in Custard, souvenir of Newport, HH, #500 Octagon 6" nappy in flamingo; #1121 salt dips and the #1401 Empress Sahara demi-tasse cup and saucer (this was received as a birthday present)--it is shown on page 97 of *The Collector's Encyclopedia of Heisey Glass, 1925-1938*.

The *Farmer* was out in the North Pasture and was turning over his rich soil and low and behold dug up a #201 Harvey amber Colonial 8-oz tumbler, a #485 Cologne with cutting, a #300-3 Old Williamsburg candelabra along with a #433 Greek-key oval creamer. The *Rebel* and his wife were very excited about a couple of items they now have in their possession, four #1205 Fancy Loop punch cups and a pair of Windsor 9" Candlesticks. The *Cardinal* has a #2329 Navy Glass with inside optic and a curved in rim. He also has the 8 oz #379-1/2 Urn tumbler.

*Mr. Crystolite* has a #10 carnation vase, the Crystolite #1503 Master Swan and the #1245 Spiral round sandwich plate in Flamingo. The *Orchard Lady* has an unique piece. It is a glass paper weight with a small Heisey Ad inside--very interesting. *My Sharp Eyed Friends* found the #44 salt and pepper with #57 top in crystal, a #1506 Provincial individual sugar, a #1776 Kalonyal spooner and the #602 Colonial 8-oz soda in Crystal.

How about that *Hanging Judge* and where has he been? Maybe his Court was on recess--if so he is back on the bench and up to his old tricks. He sentenced a few things to life behind a glass case--a #1509 Queen Ann 7" oval comport, a #1205 Fancy Loop nut bowl, plus a Fancy Loop orange bowl and an individual relish in Marigold with three compartments.

Another convention is over, but the memories still linger on. Sure hope you all enjoyed the many changes and surprises that awaited you. Thank you for stopping at the Display to talk to Donald and *Yours Truly*. We always enjoy meeting and talking with you.

## Book Review

English Toy China

Author: Doris Anderson Lechler

Publisher: Antique Publications, Marietta, Ohio

216 pages, 112 in Color

Soft Cover

English Toy China is a beautifully presented book--easily read with easy to follow price guide, which is very accessible, unlike many books that have separate and contrived price guides. One does not have to read far into the text to feel confident that the author really has a handle on her subject. She writes with confidence gained from years of dealing with collectible antiques. The color plates are very well done. Photographs of the patterns, including decorative design and colors, capture the detail of the pieces, a feature which is exceptional for most antique publications.

It was especially appealing for me to find all the material pertinent to the pattern included with the price text. There was no going back and forth from the main text, or the color plate. My only criticism is that the soft binding on the book will not last because it certainly will be a well-used book, by any collector who uses it. By the way, the author agreed with me, when we talked at a recent antique show, were we met by chance. She is a very gracious lady and her booth was the hit of the show for my wife.

In some ways the English Toy China book is dangerous to peruse because the subject is so well presented and so interesting, that one could easily become a collector of English Toy China.

## Heisey in the Trade Journals

- No. 355 Quator

by Tom Felt

After writing about #352 Flat Panel, #353 Medium Flat Panel, and #354 Wide Flat Panel, almost the only thing remarkable to note about #355 Quator is that Heisey chose to design yet another colonial pattern so similar to the other three which preceded it. True, the pieces that we think of as most distinctively Quator (a name assigned to the pattern by Clarence Vogel because of its form) are square-shaped, which does set them apart from the other lines, but even the characteristic handles on the cream and sugar (figure 1) can be found on the #354 domino sugar. And other pieces shown as part of the #355 pattern in the catalogs are actually borrowed from other lines, such as the one quart crushed fruit, which combines the #354 crushed fruit with a #352 cover. The sanitary syrups are also identical to the syrups in the #353 and 354 patterns, except that the Quator syrups are larger, and are available in 24 and 32 oz. sizes. (The latter is shown in one catalog with a "removable rubber shoe," or ring. I don't know if this was unique to the largest syrup or if it was also available on the smaller sizes.)

The only other unusual aspect of the pattern is that it was a very limited one, in comparison with most of the other colonial lines which tended to be quite extensive. In addition to the pieces already mentioned above, Quator initially included a hotel cream and sugar, an individual cream and sugar, five square nappies, ranging from four to nine inches in size, and an individual butter. (The latter was also sold as an individual ash tray in later catalogs.)

The pattern was probably new in March 1923 when Figure 1 appeared in the Hardware Dealers' Magazine, featuring the hotel cream and sugar. A patent was filed for the cream on March 22, 1912, and approved July 9 as D42,752. The cream and sugar was also advertised fairly extensively in the popular press, with ads appearing in the Fashion Book's fall 1912 issue, in the Boston Cooking School Magazine in December 1913 and April 1914, in both the Ladies' Home Journal and House and Garden in May 1914, in American Cookery in October 1914, and again in the Ladies' Home Journal in May 1916. Of the two sizes of cream and sugar, the hotel size seems to be less elusive than the individual ones.


The 1913 catalog also shows a #355 match stand and ash tray, but includes it on a page of miscellaneous items rather than with the rest of the Quator pattern, perhaps indicating that it was a late addition to the line. Since this item is completely round, without panels, one might be jus-

tified in wondering whether the use of the pattern number wasn't merely coincidental, except that it does appear in later catalogs associated with the rest of the line. (It should be noted that as early as 1905 pattern #355 had been assigned to two styles of 5-ounce extra high footed champagnes and to a pair of shallow bon bonnieres. Although these are both colonial in style, it is clear that they predate and do not belong to the #355 Quator pattern.)

The 1913 catalog also includes a #355 vase, which could either be used by itself or inserted inside the #351 rose bowl. A typically colonial style, without any particular relation to other pieces in the Quator line, this vase may also predate the rest of the pattern, since it was pictured as early as March 1909 in the American Pottery Gazette. It is known to have been sold to Rebel & Frank, a company in Cleveland that used various Heisey pieces as parts in the manufacture of lamps.

On October 29, 1913 a second patent was submitted for a domino sugar tray (Figure 2). This one was approved

January 6, 1914 as D45,138. Although T. Clarence Heisey was listed as the designer for both this and the hotel cream it is likely that the actual designer was Andrew Sanford or some other employee of the company. Like the domino sugar in the #354 pattern, this one was also devised to hold rectangular cubes of sugar, but in a two-sided tray. Even though it was smaller, it held more sugar. This piece was later advertised in the May 1914 issue of the Ladies' Home Journal and the April 1915 issue of American Cookery.

By 1917, a blown mustard and cover was added to the line, also square in shape, and by 1923, a 7-inch conserve was being offered. The latter is rectangular in keeping with the dominant design element of the rest of the pattern. Finally, a footed cream and sugar set was also added to the line and shown in the 1938 catalog, once again rectangular in shape and similar in design to the conserve. By this time, only the three styles of sugar and cream and the two sizes of sanitary syrup were still in production. (The new footed sugar was also offered as a bon bon.) These remaining pieces were discontinued by 1935.

Despite this late production period, the footed cream and sugar are the only items known to have been produced in color, having been made in Moongleam, Flamingo, Marigold, and Sahara. The individual ash tray has also been reported in experimental light blue.

The older hotel cream and sugar sets are sometimes found etched or cut, generally by decorating companies other than Heisey. An example of a cutting by Lewis and Neblett Company can be seen in the March 1976 issue of the Heisey News.

None of the pieces in the Quator pattern were ever reissued by Imperial, nor are any of the molds in existence today. However, at least three of the molds were at some point redesigned. A ribbed version of the hotel cream and sugar were sold as pattern #1206, known as Ribbed Quator today. And in 1934 the individual ash try was reissued as #1435, without the star bottom, and was used for a variety of cuttings and etchings up until 1957. (This is the ash tray which the HCA had made by Imperial in 1981 as a souvenir of our 10th Anniversary, with an etching adapted from Tally Ho.)

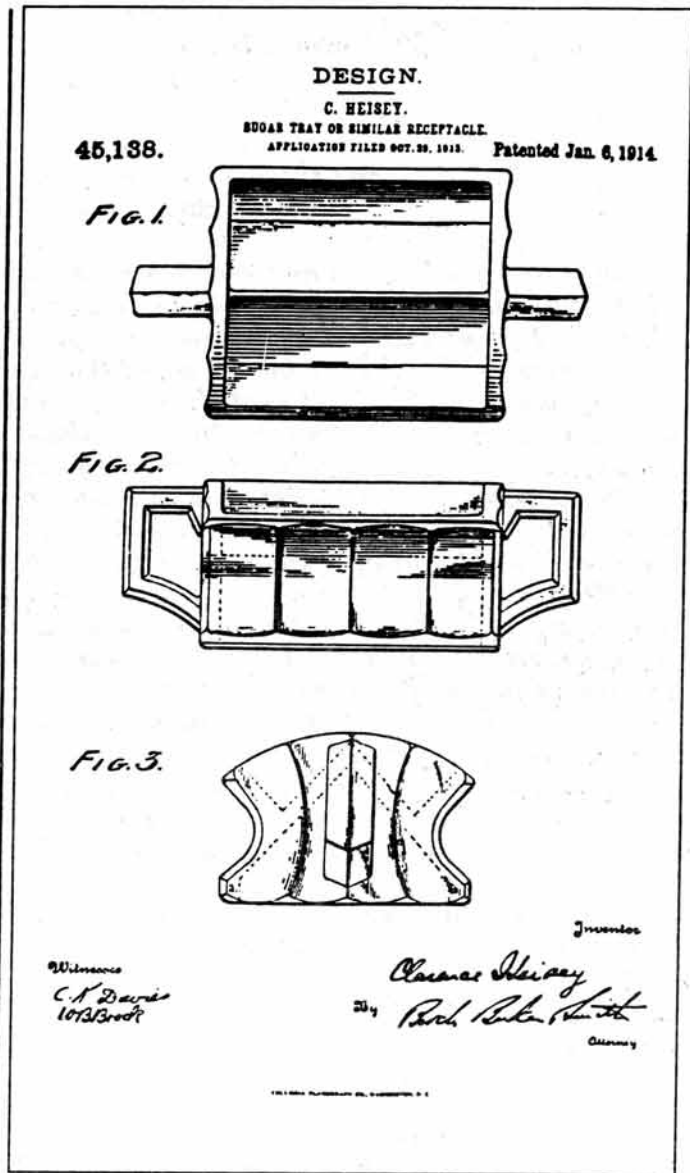

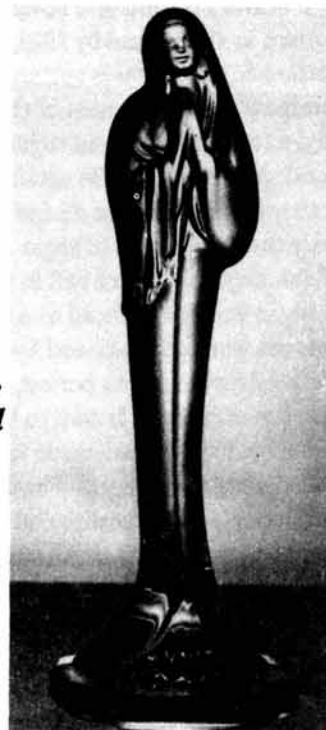

Heisey's No.1 Madonna is an interesting piece and one that was very popular. Production began in 1942 and continued until the factory closed its doors in 1957. Imperial began production of the Madonna in 1960 and continued to produce it until 1972. In 1978-79 production resumed. This represents nearly a thirty year production period for this item.

The Madonna is 9" high and solid. Heisey originally made the item as clear Crystal and frosted Crystal. These are seldom marked. The frosting by Heisey covers the entire figurine, including the face. In 1955 Heisey began producing the Madonna in Limelight, and these are generally marked. The mark is on the the back, in the center, at the base of the robe. Frosted Limelight Madonnas have also been seen. The Heisey Madonna has a ground and polished bottom. Some crystal ones have been seen with a gold overlay done by an outside company.

When Imperial made the Madonna, both clear and frosted ones were made. On the frosted ones, the face was left clear. Many of these are marked with the Diamond H. On the Imperial Madonnas, the bottom is ground only on the center, apparently where the bustoff was located. The bottom is not polished. In 1978, production resumed with both clear and completely frosted items produced. Most are marked with IG and LIG trademarks. None of these have a ground and polished bottom.

**No.1 Pheasant-Ringneck\***

Production years from 1942 to 1953. Reproduced by Imperial sometime after 1964 when Imperial bought the Heisey molds. The Ringneck Pheasant was often used in pairs as a table decoration. It measures from 4-3/4" to 5" tall, 2-1/8" across and is 11" from the tip of the beak to the tip of the tail. An eye on each side is a raised dot. At the rear of the eye the glass is raised and scalloped giving the appearance of roughed feathers. From here to the base of the neck it is plain. At this point a double row of ruffles is formed from which the Ringneck Pheasant gets its



name. The body sweeps back to the wings. The wings start smooth going into three tiers of raised glass feathers descending, and the wing droops. The tail is plain with a groove centered on both sides. The last inch of the tail drops about half an inch. This is the place most often damaged on this figurine. There were no short tailed Ringneck Pheasant made. Often sold with the No.1558 rolled end bowl to be used as a console set.

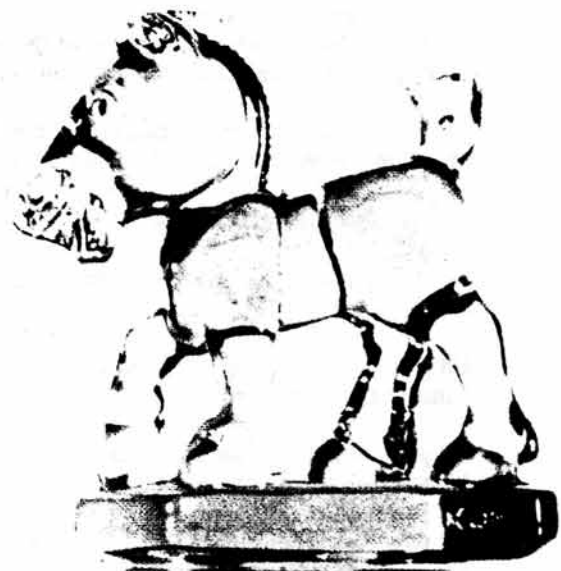

The 1984 Oscar in Ruby was both made by Viking and signed Imperial as were the 1983 Tangelo Oscars, because the mold was still owned by Imperial. Imperial was in the process of bankruptcy and was no longer making glass. That is the reason for the Oscar being made by Viking instead of Imperial. In 1985 Imperial tried to get going again. Unfortunately, the business soon failed.

Please do not abbreviate Heisey pattern names.

Please use H to indicate Marked.

Please use words like *each*, *all*, and *set* in reference to quantity.

Please refrain from including personal opinion concerning items listed for sale

Please avoid use of personal inventory information

Excluding name, address, and other information that appears at the top of the ad, the amount of information in an ad will be measured by lines instead of by items. See chart below for number of characters per line per display space. Characters are: all punctuation, letters, numbers, symbols, and spaces.
