Annual Meeting Highlights

Amy Jo Jones

The meeting was convened at the Granville Inn, on Sunday June 23, 1991. Congratulations to Tom Bischoff, Virginia Johnson, Jim Jones, Phyllis McClain, and Louise Ream, our newly elected Board members.

Twenty-three study clubs responded during the roll call, giving reports of club activities and/or donations to HCA. The Southeastern Michigan Heisey Collectors Club was acknowledged as a newly established club, and will be receiving a charter.

A report, accompanied by preliminary drawings, was presented by Sam Schnaidt and the Museum Expansion Committee on a proposal to expand the present facility to include more space for displays, meeting facilities, library, research and archives. (See Museum Committee Report on page 4 &5). The general membership was asked to approve the plan as a concept. Further study would be conducted through more complete architectural drawings and on fund raising methods. The vote was 77 for and 24 against the proposal. Following the vote, donations were taken totaling \$9,248.37 - to go to the building fund for start-up costs. \$1400.00 to the building fund had been realized from the sale of banquet centerpieces the evening before. Services were also volunteered for pre-construction needs, and for services needed during the construction phase.

Acknowledgement was given to the work of the convention committee chairmen and members, who produced the convention and to those who attended and enjoyed it. I would like to list the chairmen, who coordinated all activities: Weiner Roast - John Eshelman - Over two hundred people happily munched on hot dogs, watermelon, and s'mores at Sam and Heidi Schnaidt's party barn. Show chairmen - Jim Reynolds and Frank Harper, assisted by the Dairyland Club - Another outstanding show was enjoyed by hundreds of visitors. The work coor-

dinating the show goes on all year long! ID Breakfast -Mary Jacobs - Every year this event continues to be one of the most popular. Marv was able to name a panel of "unstumpable" experts. Swap and Silent Auction - Jim Kennon - Proceeds from the silent auction resulted in a \$576.00 donation to HCA. Feature Presentation - Bob Ryan - Bob put forth a super effort to coordinate the feature presentation for the display, along with the seminar and banquet program. Display - Janet Caswell - A stunning display. Janet scheduled an impressive array of exhibits by study clubs and members alike. Donald Macomber devised a special lighting arrangement wich made the feature display really sparkle. For the banquet, Jo Rogers from Colorado worked many months to etch the glass centerpieces for the tables. She was thrilled to donate the centerpieces for the auction that night, to kick off the building fund - especially when the results were in... \$1400.00 Not many people forgot their badges this year thanks to the system Karen O'Hare used instead of tickets. A code system was devised to indicate on each badge which events the conventioneer was registered to attend. Once again, Sharon Orienter designed our striking poster and programs. Marilyn Smith represented the Museum Hospitality Committee, by taking over the lower level of the museum and turning it into a Heisey deli. Bill Tumblin and Mary McWilliams diligently manned the HCA booth during the convention, ensuring great success even in the scaled down version of the gift shop.

Of course there were many people who volunteered to act as docents and greeters at the museum, those dependable golf cart drivers, and those who helped the above mentioned chairmen as they went about the business of staging Convention 91. On behalf of Sam Schnaidt, Convention Co-Chairman (who was invaluable as my local contact and solver of problems), we would like to salute all the volunteers for a job well done. Thanks to all the members who came to enjoy the festivities and to support HCA. See you next year!

The Museum Expansion Committe Report

Sam Schnaidt, Chairman

In 1990 a committee was formed to look into an expansion of our facilities. This committee was enlarged and announced at the March 1991 board meeting. The committee then met with a local architect.

The committee presented preliminary sketches which were approved by the board and the membership at the annual meeting. Following the vote, enthusiastic members contributed over \$8,000 for preliminary project costs.

The committee feels that a major expansion to the present facility is needed. We would very much like to

continue the vision of our founding members. There is a need for more display space and better educational facilities. The space for archival and library materials is inadequate. Office space and meeting rooms need to be designed to be more functional. Our present museum has about 3000 square feet of display area and our office building has less than 1500 square feet of usable space.

The proposed expansion would create a museum complex in which most display areas would be located on one level. The new complex would provide handicap accessibility. Our proposal offers a three story building to be built entirely on our own property, with connections to the present museum building at all levels. This facility would encompass about 4,000 square feet on each floor. Most of our present land would be used for this building.

The top floor could be for offices, library, research and archives. The lower floor which would be very close to a walk out at ground level could serve as board and meeting facilities with an area large enough to accommodate many of our functions as well as study clubs and committee meetings. This complex will allow for a major growth of club functions and special displays. This kind of space should carry us well into the 21st century.

The architectural firm of Wachtel and McANally have designed preliminary drawings and sketches. This firm has a reputation of being able to blend the old with the new. A good example of their style is their own new office facility on the south side of the courthouse square. It is built between two century old buildings.

Beginning immediately, the committee will have architects develop building specifications and determine estimated costs, committee members will seek professional fundraising counseling and advice, as they ask for contributions, and the committee will establish sub-committees of members to carry out the construction and fundraising.

Costs will have to include site preparation, construction, lanscaping, equipment and operational costs.

Fund raising would include solicitatation of members, businesses, foundations, grants, projects, study clubs and any other possible means.


Your help and suggestions are needed. Any ideas for a theme would also be useful.



The annual 1991 HCA convention got off to a whizbang start. The convention was at once more of the same (familiar and comfortable) yet brand new in many respects. HCA conventions are always exciting but this one, because it celebrated the 20th anniversary of the Heisey Collector's of America, was especially special. Somebody, anybody, had to play Clark Kent and take notes and I was the one with the proper physique who had a pad and pencil.

Having contracted to set up as dealers at the HCA's annual antiques show, Helen and I (that's my wife) arrived promptly at the OSU (Ohio State University to the uninitiated) campus at 12 noon on Wednesday, June 18th. That was the day, place and time designated for dealers to unload their wares. We found others already lined up for their turn to unload and still others, who were obviously more prompt, already unloaded and out of the midday sun.

Meanwhile, at Hopewell Hall on the OSU campus, a quieter but no less dedicated group was setting up displays designed to dazzle conventioneers.

The Granville Antiques Show is not an official HCA function but over the years it has become an important part of the Heisey convention week. Mainly it keeps those arriving for the convention out of everyone else's hair.

The next day, Thursday, was very busy for this reporter. We were back at Adena Hall at 6 am unpacking glass onto our dressed tables for the big official Annual Heisey Antiques Show. If there was something going on elsewhere, I missed it because promptly at 4 O'Clock, ready or not, HCA members poured into Adena Hall waving cash and check books as dealers tried to appear nonchalant.

Everything from ubiquitous little square Ridgeleigh ashtrays to a magnificent Flamingo Greek Key party set - a punch bowl on a stand and a humongous torte plate and a zillion punch cups.

Would you believe a show with not *one* Custard Beaded Panel and Sunburst punch bowl and base but *TWO* of the same in Heisey's Opal? If that's not enough to stagger the mind, consider a Bead Swag toothpick in Emerald Green and in the same booth, a Locket on Chain toothpick in the same color. Toothpick collectors left puddles of drool all over the place. For stem collectors there was a # 1776 Kalonyal goblet to die for. There were too many beautiful things at the show to list. Enough for everyone to find something he or she could not live without.



After the usual reports, a roll call of clubs was held. This is a feature where each club head (that's not a physical description) tells what his or her club club has been doing. We heard of many unusual meetings and fund raisers and were awed by the contributions made. It was fascinating.

After the results of the vote was announced, the new board members were sworn in.

Members expressed their desire for better information concerning board activities on behalf of the HCA. The board assured those concerned that the situation would be corrected.

The greatest amount of time was spent on a give and take between the members of the Expansion Committee and the audience. Money, as always, reared its ugly head. Members were assured that no funds, from endowment to general, would be used for the project. When everyone had their say and it was finally brought to a vote, an overwhelming majority voted to support the feasibility study of

the museum expansion. In true HCA fashion, those for and against backed the vote with more than \$8,000 in monetary contributions and an inestimable amount in work contributions right then and there at the meeting.

"Magnificent" may sound trite but, what the heck, remember I work cheap. There was a spread of Heisey glass in every imaginable category. A new arrangement at the display made room for much more glass than ever before and I particularly liked being able to get closer to the tables set with individual colors and patterns.

I could not cover all the programs and you'll note that I have avoided using the names of those who contributed to the many convention functions. The Yachting center has just geared down from our yearly "Festival of the Arts." This is a whole week of celebration giving adults and children the opportunity to display their artistic talents along with enjoying the efforts of others. We have art exhibits and camera photos along with sculpting and needlework--all displayed in the halls of our historic buildings. There are concerts every evening under the stars at Crocker Park along with singing and dancing. On Sunday when the week-long festivities wind down there is the "Festival in the Street" for children of all ages, complete with clowns, comics, and even an old calliope, sitting securely inside an old circus wagon. The children, enthralled at the sound listen in awe. A wonderful time of year here by the ocean. With the festivals over, we get ready for "Race Week." Sailors from everywhere come to our harbor to compete, one against the other. Their sails billowing in the wind, sailing toward the finish line waiting for that gust of wind that will take them over the line to victory. The harbor is filled with boats of all classes, sail-boats, motor boats, dinghies, even little wind surfers. The boats and the water are very enjoyable to me, but then nature is a wonderful thing, if only we take the time to stop and smell the roses.

Are you Hooked on Heisey? I know someone who is. Let's just tarry awhile and see just what that avid collector got hooked on these past weeks. A # 1469 Ridgeleigh, rounded covered cigarette box, a #1540 Lariat bon-bon plus the one-light candleblock, the #394 Narrow Flute individual salt, the #1229 Octagon individual nut in Sahara, the #1252 Twist individual bon-bon in Flamingo, the #394 Narrow Flute 6" pickle dish and the #1183 Revere individual salt in Flamingo. Perhaps a collection of "Little Things" is in the making.

Sometimes when I look back on my years of collecting, and there have been many--just about 20--I wish I had done things differently. I tried to acquire a piece, or pieces, in every pattern, plus each color. This gave me a myriad of different pieces. In retrospect it would have been much more to my advantage to have collected the animals--at that time they were much more affordable, or "Little Things." When collecting the "Little Things" you can attain a great many of the patterns and colors, taking up a much smaller space, but that is hind-sight. Now I

have several different items I collect, such as creams and sugars, candlesticks, cruets, and of course, Old Sandwich.

The Tudor Nuts have been out: poking here, poking there and to their great delight they have come up with some real nice items: for their Tudor #413 collection, the covered cigarette jar in Moongleam. Remarkable! Also the 6' ball vase in Cobalt, the #355 1 qt. crushed fruit footed and the 4-1/2 #4220 Janice vase. Oh, I'm sorry, perhaps you would all like to know the color of the Janice vase--ready? Alexandrite. (A picture can be found on page 63 of Bredehoft).

The Cardinal hopped from his nest just long enough to pick a beautiful #1506 Whirlpool 8 oz. goblet from an unsuspecting dealer. Zircon is the color, least I forget to mention it.

The Benevolent Philosopher has a #394 Narrow Flute 9" cottage cheese along with the #393 4-1/2 lemon dish. Now in his pattern, which by the way is #343 Sunburst he has the very stately water pitcher. What a beautiful piece of glass.

The Stalwart Stem Collector didn't really report any stems as such, but he did find the #300 Peerless juice and a #32 handled stick, skirted.

The Industrious Believer-- and he really believes in Heisey--says he has a 7" Recessed Panel basket.

Now that summer is half over, the Farmer has to begin thinking about his harvest, wonder if he will have any time for his other past-time? Knowing him, he'll find the time even if its after the sun goes down--#433 Greek Key 12" celery, #354 Wide Flat Panel sugar and cream in Moongleam, #300-1 Old Williamsburg 1 lite candelabra (two of these), plus two #1951 Cabochon sugar and cream in Dawn, a #1201 Fandango 4 oz oil and the #1255 Pineapple and Far salt with sterling top.

The Gator Guy and Gal report that while on a foray into Southern Georgia, they stole a pressed oil--actually the #1425 Victorian 3 oz. cruet, and it was marked.

The Foxy Kitten who caught the Heisey bug while helping her mother collect, has branched out in her collectingwith help from the Heisey books and the Heisey News and by being in the right place at the right time, she managed to acquire a pair of Marlboro #3 candlesticks. These were at a sale by a dealer who thought they were good glass, but didn't know what kind of glass (you'll find them on page 31 of the Candlestick book). They are 9" tall and only come in crystal and were produced from 1902 to 1921. Probably not marked. It is a rather rare stick.







Samuel Dennis King

1800-1880

Samuel Dennis King was born on his father's plantation at Martinsburg Va. in 1800. He came north to study law at Ohio University in Athens. In 1829 he settled in Newark where he became a well known attorney, famous for the Latin and Greek he used in his arguments. S.D. King served as prosecuting attorney and was a member of the state legislature. He died in Newark on April 20, 1880.



Mary Ann Irwin King

1811-1891

Mary Ann Irwin King was born in Pennsylvania in 1811. She attended school in Germantown, Pa. At the age of seventeen, while visiting her sister in Newark, she met Samuel D. King whom she later married. Mrs. King was the mother of eight children. She died in 1891 at the age of eighty.

Heisey in the Trade Journals--No. 393 Narrow Flute by Tom Felt

One of the largest and most popular of Heisey's colonial patterns--and as we'll see in a moment, one of the most fiercely protected by the company, was #393, known to collectors today as Narrow Flute. Various sources have dated its introduction to 1909 or 1910, but I suspect it probably came out first in late 1911. It was heavily advertised, both in the trade journals and in popular magazines as follows: (the list below is an incomplete list) - #393 was a large pattern, intended both for home and commercial use. The 1913 catalog offered 133 items and eventually, over its long production history, there would be well over

150 different pieces available. Quite a number of these were featured in the advertisements listed above.

The May 1912 issue of *The Soda Fountain* (Figure 1) makes the same claim that most of Heisey's trade advertisements from this period proffered, namely that "service considered," Heisey was "the cheapest glassware on the market". That is, it might cost more than its competition, but it was so well made and durable that in the long run it would prove the better investment. The #393-1/2 sherbet is shown in the ad as being a 4oz size, but according to the catalog, it is actually 4-1/2 oz. (The "1/2 designation is apparently used here to differentiate this sherbet from the 4oz low footed sherbet which was probably made from the same mold. Similarly, there were a series of nappies and an oyster cocktail set given this designation, all of which



were probably just reworkings of the "regular' items in the pattern.) The banana split, of course, is a piece that would have been primarily made for the soda fountain trade.

Figure 2 is from the October 3, 1912 issue of Iron Age-Hardware and shows a cross section of the many items available, including the regular sherbet, the goblet, the hotel cream and sugar, the 3-cornered jelly, lemon dish, mustard, finger bowl, 2-handled jelly, tumbler, 3-pint jug, and two sizes of nappy. There was an extensive selection of stemware to choose from, including a larger goblet, champagne, claret, burgundy, wine, cordial, sherry, cocktail, footed tumbler, parfait, a various sizes of sherbet and saucer champagnes-at least twenty-three different items for the stem collector to look for! There were also three other creams and sugars, including an oval hotel cream and sugar set, an individual cream and sugar, and the regular ones which were part of the table set. There were two sizes of the lemon dish produced. Both were available with or without covers. Even the finger bowl was made in two different sizes, while the tumbler was one of fifteen sizes available. The jug was one of six sizes offered, along with four straight sided hotel jugs and a tankard which we will see illustrated in a later advertisement. (It should be noted that the hotel cream is also shown in the catalog as an 8 oz jug.) Nappies, as was usual with these early patterns, were offered in a myriad of sizes, deep, shallow, or flared. The salt pictured in this ad is the #24 salt, though there was also a #393 salt, available with a choice of five tops.

The 2-handled jelly appears again in (figure 3) from the February 5, 1914 issue of *Hardware Age*, along with the French dressing dish, celery tray, and domino sugar. A different style of domino sugar is shown in the 1913 catalog, with the rectangular version being a new piece added to the line in 1914. Another new item was the pickle dish advertised in the *Hardware World* in March 1914 (figure 4), along with the grape fruit and low footed jelly. Another ad from *Hardware Age*, dated April 26, 1914 (figure 5), showed the tankard and ice tea tumbler with the timely reminder that "The ice tea season will soon be here. Why not anticipate your wants?"

Other pieces in the 1913 catalog include three styles of punch bowl, offered with either footed sherbets or custard cups, a whiskey jug, a 2-piece cheese and cracker set, a marmalade jar, two styles of oil (in various sizes), a bitters bottle, an individual salt, an individual butter, a pickle jar, and both an individual and hotel ice tub. As extensive as this selection is, further items continued to be added to the line over the next several years. Footed sodas with handles, an orange juice glass, a combination relish with a

cover, a biscuit tray, and a water bottle were all available by 1915. The latter was used as part of two different bedroom sets. The #1 set contained the Narrow Flute water bottle and tumbler along with #352 10-inch tray, #32 handled candlestick, and #354 match stand. The #2 set consisted of the water bottle and tumbler with a 12" #352 tray, a #150 handled candlestick, and #353 match stand.

By 1924 an individual almond, a 6 inch footed almond, and covered preserve were also being shown in the catalogs.

There was an allied line #394, that came out sometime around 1915, which included a variety of additional items, most notably a Doctor Johnson punch bowl, as well as at least sixteen other pieces.

Considering how extensive this pattern was (and its apparent popularity) it is not surprising to learn that there were perhaps more patents taken out on this single line than on any other.

Although T.C. Heisey is identified as the designer on a couple of these patents, most of them correctly reflect Andrew J. Sanford as the true creator of this pattern.

Taking out these patents was not an empty exercise on the part of Heisey. The Heisey News, June 1988, p. 12-14, reprinted a series of letters between Augustus H. Heisey and Marion G. Bryce, president of the United States Glass Company. Heisey's first letter, written in December 1914, quite pugnaciously accuses U. S. Glass of copying his #393 line and it is followed up by Bryce just as adamantly denying that their #15156 pattern (which is known as

Alpha to collectors today) was an infringement of Heisey's line, since narrow flutes, in and of themselves, were not design protected and none of Heisey's shapes had been copied. Besides, as Bryce was quick to point out, they had been making a narrow flute goblet for at least twenty years. (Although he did not state this, that would mean that such a goblet had been in production at U. S. Glass when Heisey was that company's general manager.) Heisey's last letter in the series, dated January 6, 1915, was just as intransigent as his first, warning Bryce that "if you make anything which our attorney thinks is in conflict with ours, we propose to bring suit, for we intend to establish our rights through courts..." I've found no evidence to indicate whether they followed up on this threat, but it seems to have had no effect on U.S. Glass who proceeded to

market their #15156 pattern until at least 1919. (Examples of this line can be seen in Heacock and Bickenheuser's U.S. Glass from A to Z, p.160)

Whether Heisey ended up in litigation with U.S. Glass or not, they did take the Imperial Glass Corporation to court claiming a similar infringement of their Narrow Flute nappies. The suit was filed in 1914 and wended its way through the courts for years. In December 1922, the United States for the Southern District of Ohio ruled in favor of Heisey, but a year later the verdict was overturned by the United States Circuit Court of Appeals. Two major arguments were cited for this reversal: (1)catalogs from various companies published prior to 1911 were introduced by Imperial proving that many similar designs were common to the glass trade and that the difference in design being claimed by Heisey was "trifling"; and (2) a nappy had been made by Imperial as early as 1908 which differed from the one patented by Heisey only in the width of the flutes and in the topes of the flutes, which met in an arch rather than a flat topped arch, neither argument impressed the court as "substantially changing the appearance of the design."

Losing their suit did not prevent Heisey from continuing to market their own narrow flute pattern for many years to come. The 1928 catalog continues to offer 136 items. By 1939, only 24 pieces were still in production, but these continued to be made on into the 1940's. 1952 was the last year that Narrow Flute was offered, with eight in production, including the jugs which had been in production for more than forty years. One might expect that, having been made throughout the twenties and thirties, there would be considerable amounts of Narrow Flute available in color. However, that was not the case. Only about half a dozen pieces are known, as follows:

Individual almond--Moongleam, Flamingo, Sahara, Hawthorne

Bitters bottle --Cobalt Individual salt-- Moongleam Banana split-- Flamingo

Individual cream--Moongleam, Flamingo, Sahara, experimental light blue

Individual sugar--Moongleam, Flamingo, Marigold

Salt shaker-- Moongleam, Flamingo

In addition, a few items in #394 have also been reported in color:

Domino sugar--Moongleam, Flamingo, Sahara

12 inch celery tray--Moongleam, Flamingo


12 inch 3-part combination relish--Moongleam, Flamingo

Over the years, a number of decorating companies purchased blanks in this pattern from Heisey and applied cuttings, Marigold stain, silver overlay, enamel flowers, and even in the case of clinner plates, a mirror finish to the undersides of the pieces

Molds for a number of items are still in existence and are owned by the H.C.A. To our knowledge, however, none of these molds were ever used by Imperial--which is slightly ironic, considering that they could have legally produced the pattern that Heisey had spent ten years in the courts attempting to entail them from using!
