Hope you had a good time if you were part of the festivities in Newark and that you got a few of those desired items on your list. The Museum Expansion Committee Update

The Museum Expansion Committee held four meetings during February 1992. In addition, the various sub-committees have been meeting on a weekly basis.

Norman Thran, Chairman of Direct Fund Raising, reports that as of March 10, 1992, more than \$31,000.00 in cash and pledges has been received. This does not include any funds from other projects being promoted by the Expansion Committee. The committee has received a letter from the Evans Foundation pledging \$25,000.00 to the Expansion Project.

Frank Frye, reporting on the Cadillac-Lincoln Dinner, stated that all 200 tickets were sold by February 19, 1992. Eight names are on a waiting list in case of cancellations and tickets become available. It is interesting to note that 60% of the tickets were sold to non-HCA members.

The Gold Animal Series sale will be in progress when this report reaches you. The committee feels that this project will be a sell-out prior to the closing date for orders. Interest has been tremendous as evidenced by the phone calls to the Museum. Plans were in place to handle the rush of orders on March 3, 1992. Orders by members of the committee were placed with the mail orders received and were not placed by the Committee members themselves. A check received the week of February 16, 1992 was returned to sender, as the order form specifically states--no postmarked orders prior to March 1, 1992 will be accepted.

A meeting was held on March 4, 1992, at which time the architects and the building contractor who are assisting with planning, discussed the internal layout of the proposed expansion. Construction plans will be drawn and the bidding process will follow.

The Committee is grateful for the continued support being received from you, the members, and welcomes your questions and comments. Another update will appear in the May 1992 issue of the Heisey News.

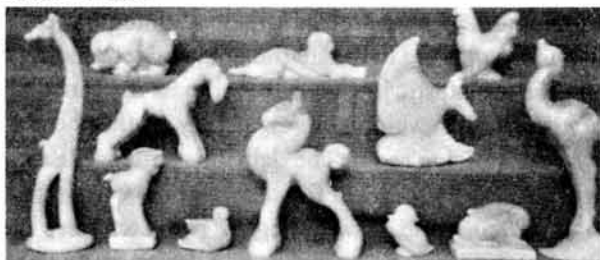

Views From the Fund Raiser

As of today, March 10, 1992, the Expansion Fund has reached \$31,000.00 in cash and pledges. This amount is from direct gifts and does not include monies from the sale of donated Heisey glass or the other fund raising projects (Cadillac Dinner/Gold Animal Series). A letter prepared by Sam Schnaidt and me was sent to all current HCA members on February 10, 1992. The cost of this mailing, including printing, was \$1,661.25. I hope the information in the letter and the articles in the newsletter have informed you and helped in your decision to fund this project. All gifts large and small are needed. It is important for the membership to support this expansion in any way you desire.

The Expansion Committee has received a generous \$25,000.00 pledge from the Evans Foundation. This pledge will become real when we reach the \$200,000.00 level. Ground breaking for the new museum addition will take place on the evening of June 17, 1992, providing we raise \$150,000.00 by that date. We have had a good start and need your support prior to ground breaking. Remember, this program for the expansion can be supported by direct gifts or pledged monies. We welcome your donated Heisey glass for sale. Box it and send to HCA, 169 W. Church St. Newark, OH 43055 Attn: The Building Fund. Or, bring it to the Convention in June.

I would like to remind the membership that the expansion project is self supporting. All the work is done by volunteers and all of the expenses incurred are from monies donated for the expansion. A good example is the mailing to the membership in February and the mailing to the voting members in December 1991. The postage and printing alone for these two informative letters cost the project \$2,000.00. You can help defray these costs with your donations and help build the fund. The Expansion Committee thanks all those who have contributed time and money to date and looks forward to hearing from all of you. Lets all think *Building for the Future*. Next month's newsletter will include an update of monies received from Auction glass and donated monies from the letter to the membership.

Keeping in Touch

Many exciting things have been happening in *Heiseyland* in recent months. Progress is being made by the Expansion Committee which is hoping to break ground for the new building in June.

Apparently the Rosalene animals have made a big hit with HCA members, as well as other collectors. They will very probably be sold out before you receive this newsletter. These proceeds have given the building fund a big boost.

In the March issue of *Heisey News* there was a fine report from the Gulf Coast Heisey Club. This group seems to have great meetings and a whole lot of fun.

I thought that perhaps I could straighten out the puzzle about the name for the Moongleam double-handled relish dish mentioned in the club report. This was shown in Loren and Virginia Yeakley's first book, *Heisey Glass in Color*, published in 1970.

The name of the pattern was listed as *Oceanic* in this book. Knowledge of Heisey was rather limited at that time and this pattern was often referred to as *Oceanic* because of its swirled appearance. The pattern later was named #1252 *Twist*. I believe that Clarence Vogel gave it that name, because of its twisted appearance. The pattern was introduced in 1927 and was made until 1937. Moongleam was first made in 1925 and was made until 1935.

Graceful is the name of a blown stemware pattern of the later years which was usually used for the Orchid etching.

Waverly is the name of both a pressed pattern and a line of stemware. Both have swirled patterns in the glass. The pressed pattern was used for both Heisey Rose and Orchid etch.

These two patterns were mentioned as probable names for the *Twist* pattern in the Gulf Club article--but they are much later patterns than the #1252 *Twist*.

Susan asked me to give you an update on what I am doing now. Since having three eye operations and spending some time in the hospital after a blackout, I am gradually getting back to normal except that I am not allowed to drive my car as of yet.

Heisey Musings

Sometimes we Heisey collectors can get to feeling smug and superior. Who can blame us, we have it all. Especially the beautiful glass we collect--a glass that wasn't produced to be a collectible, which makes it even more collectible. We have the best documented American made glass and a cadre of knowledgeable dealers unrivaled in any other venue (I picked up that word from the Olympics).

We also have the best collectors' organization in the country: the HCA. I'd say *the world*, but the Heisey collectors code doesn't permit bragging except for *Show and Tell*. And, arguably, we have the most beautiful museum ever put together by a bunch of rank amateurs.

The icing on the cake is that the glass we collect is easily identifiable. That's a big plus-- it's marked. Don't laugh, poetic license allows this point to be stretched. If you collect the other half of Heisey's production, the half made without the Diamond H, I'd appreciate it if you'd keep quiet about it. I'm not into helping the novice. No sense letting them know Fandango belongs to Heisey, it's bad enough they've heard about Winged Scroll. Selfish is what I am. It's my one fault. Aiding the beginner is the single point on which the HCA and I differ. An amateur loose with a price guide can be a formidable adversary. It's amazing how fast they can flip pages.

We're agreed, then, Heisey collectors have it all. So how come I can't shake a disquieting feeling that all is not right in our Heisey World? I've given this a lot of thought and narrowed it down to one of two possibilities. One is that I'm needlessly nervous, which we can discount because I'm never needlessly nervous--there are valid reasons for my shattered nerves and Heisey isn't one of them.

The second possibility does involve the glass we collect. Try this experiment. Ask someone not into any kind of collecting about "Tiffany" and you'll get instant recognition. Then ask about Heisey. Dollars to doughnuts the response will be, *Say what?*

What I'm saying is we have an identity problem. The name Heisey, to the uninitiated, is a head scratcher and leaves a whole lot to be desired. Half of the uninitiated think it's a fruit drink and the other half believes it's either what a soprano aims for or the condition of roads in winter.

Don't misunderstand, I wouldn't insult Heisey as a family name. It's a wonderful family name. A bit guttural, perhaps, but honorable. Besides, an old Italian proverb taught me not to mock the names of others. An Excerpt From The Dec. 1984 *Diamond Dust* The Spelling of "Moulds", Colour it Archaic

"...Some months back the *Heisey News* began spelling molds, *moulds*. We noticed it about the time that purchasing the molds became an issue. We found *moulds* irritating...

When you want something done, do it yourself... We called the Research Library at the Corning Glass Museum in Corning, NY... We were told that our suspicions were correct, m-o-u-l-d is archaic and m-o-l-d is the accepted spelling in the glass industry. They added that *mould*, though in use early in this century, was gradually replaced by the simpler spelling... There you have it--we have struck a blow for the preservation of American English."

Children at Work--

In Turn of the Century Glass Factories

During the latter part of the nineteenth century, it was common to find young boys employed in glass factories. The 1900 census reveals that over 13% of all labor employed consisted of boys under the age of sixteen. Private research indicates, the percentage was much higher, in many cases 20% or higher. There were glass factories in many states, but the bulk of the industry was centered in rural areas of Ohio, Indiana, Pennsylvania and New Jersey. Since these plants were usually located in small towns and the only source of employment available, parents felt they were helping the community by allowing their children to work at such an early age. However, in many cases their own jobs at the plants were threatened if they opposed the bosses when the so called *little imps* were hired.

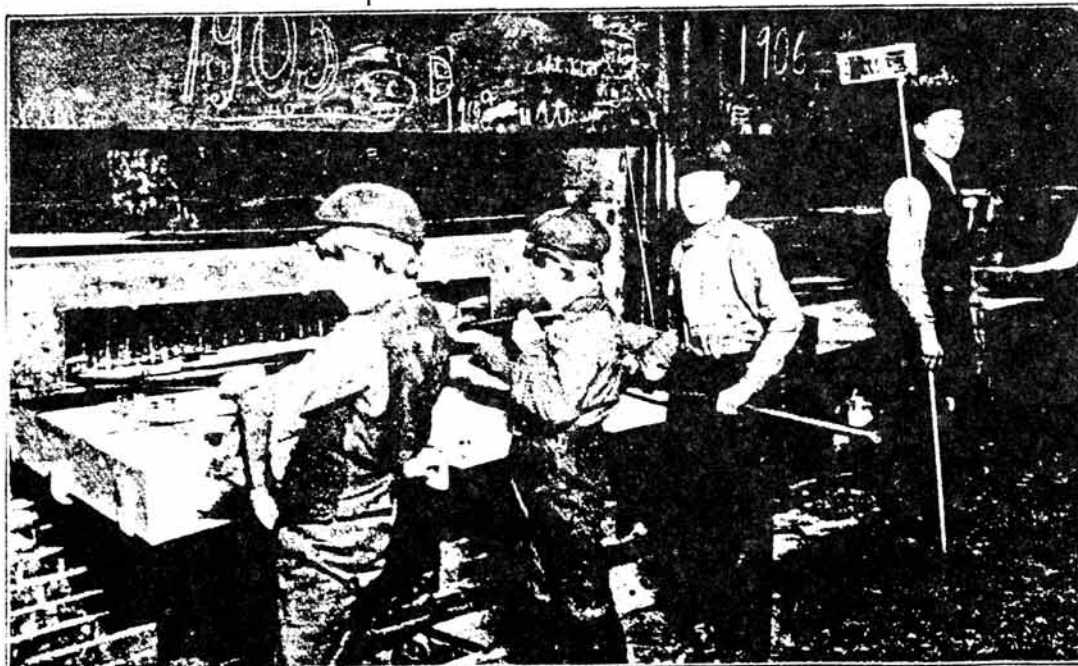
The failure to enforce the child-labor laws was more evident in the glass trade than in most of the other manufacturing areas. The location of the glass house in rural areas and the shifting nature of the business were contributing factors which perpetuated the problem. The location of cheap and abundant fuel governed the location of the plants. After a few wooden buildings were thrown up, the next problem for the factory owner was to find cheap labor to produce their cheap glass. The glass factories brought new industrial life to these small towns and villages which soon became very dependant upon them. Then a new feeling was developed that for the good of the town, it would not do to antagonize the plant owners. The owners felt they knew this and constantly threatened to move their plants if they were interfered with or prevented from hiring young boys.

A trip back in time will give the reader a small sense of what it was like for a young boy to work in a glass factory in the early part of the 20th century. Remember, we will describe a cheap bottle glass plant.

The building was usually a large wooden structure, so loosely built that it afforded little protection from the draughts, surrounded by a high fence.

Several rows of barbed wire were stretched along the top of the fence. The job foreman, when asked, explained that the fence was to keep the young ones in once they had reported for the night shift. Of course, the young ones were the boys of twelve years or younger employed at the factory. They usually worked the night shift, because they were seen less by the public and because they were required to attend school. It was a cheap bottle factory and the proportion of boys to men was higher than was usual with the higher grades of glass. Cheap products and boys went together during this sad period in our history. The hours of labor for the night shift were from 5:30 pm to 3:30am. When the shift was over, these children just disappeared into the night. The tragic significance of cheap glass bottles was apparent as you watched them leave.

The interior of the plant consisted of a large round furnace with a number of small doors, three or four feet off the ground, forming sort of a belt around the furnace. In front of these doors the glass blowers were working. After they had completed their work and placed the glass in moulds, the young boys took over. By the side of each mould sat a *take out boy*, who with tongs, took the half finished-bottles, not yet provided with necks, out of the moulds. Then other boys, called *snapper ups*, took these half finished bottles in their tongs and put the small ends into gas-heated moulds until they were hot. Then the boys took them out with incredible quickness and passed them to other men, finishers, who shaped the necks of the bottles into their final form. The *carrying-in boys* sometimes-called *carrier pigeons*, took the red hot bottles from the benches, three or four at a time, with large asbestos shovels to the annealing ovens. There the glass was gradually cooled to insure proper contraction and to

prevent rapid cooling and breakage. The work of these *carrying-in boys*, several of whom were less than twelve years old, was by far the hardest. The distance from the furnace to the annealing oven was one hundred feet. The boys were kept on a slow run over this one hundred feet the entire time they were working. They made the trip seventy two times an hour for a total distance of nearly twenty-two miles per shift. Since few grown men could keep up this pace, the boys were a necessity until automatic machinery was put in place.

The personal long term effect on these children was catastrophic. The boys were paid an average of sixty cents to one dollar for a days work. Many of them could not stay awake during school hours, thus rarely finishing school. The temperature near the ovens was extremely hot, while areas away from the furnace were very cold in the winter. There were many cases of pneumonia caused by the extremes in temperature. Accidents from burning and the loss of sight were regular risks of the glass making trade. Since the boys were earning their own money, they felt that their parents could not tell them what to do. The result of this was a lack of discipline and respect for all authority. Many of the boys died at a young age or were put in institutions to try to train them. The glass-blowers realized this and prevented them from ever taking their own children into the glass houses. One rarely found the son of a glass blower employed as a *snapper-up* or *carrying-boy*, unless the father was dead or incapacitated by reason of sickness or injury. The demand for boys was so great during this period, that it was possible at almost any time to get employment for just a single night. So called *one shifters* were so common in some areas, especially in New Jersey, it was the custom to import boys from asylums and reformatories to supply the manufacturer's demands. These boys were placed in laborers' families and their board was paid by their employers, who deducted it from their wages. Consequently, a veritable system of child slavery was developed, similar to the old English pauper-apprentice system. These imported boys were under no supervision when not working and were wholly unrestrained. They formed street gangs, were in and out of courts and jail. The harsh treatment imposed on these children and the destructive practices of the industry were responsible for the creation of a situation which placed a burden the community. Perhaps it was indicative of an era when profit was the only concern.

The A. H. Heisey & Co. hired young people as well. Mr. Foster Wyant was one of those people who started at a young age with Heisey. Although it was not easy work, Mr. Wyant reports that he was always treated fairly by Heisey. Wyant was born at Jersey Shore PA. in 1894. In 1906, at the age of eight, he started work at Heisey as

an apprentice. His duties included *carrying-boy*, *finisher* and *presser*. He was offered a job as a glass blower but turned it down and spent most of his life as a salesman. With some of the diseases reportedly suffered by blowers, this may have been a good decision. He also spent time sorting coal after school and remembers that those were the days of nickle beer and a free lunch. Wyant recalls that A. H. Heisey delivered free coal to the needy in those days and was most gracious to all his employees. Foster Wyant still lives in Granville, OH and has plenty of get-up and go for a man of his years.

W.E. Porter is another former Heisey employee who started at a young age. Porter was born and raised in Newark, OH. His first job at Heisey was during World War II. He and many other young people in their teens were hired to replace the men who had gone to war. He was the third of three generations to work in the plant. He recalls that it was very hot, and had inadequate ventilation. The large partition doors to the outside were left open to help ventilate the plant, summer and winter. There were few windows in the factory area and conditions were rather primitive. Porter's Grandfather was Santa each year for Mr. Heisey at his home on Granville Road. Porter remembers the great picnic put on every year by the Heisey plant, with everything furnished by the Heisey's. W.E. Porter now has his own freeblown glass business in Huber Heights, OH, where he specializes in one of a kind paperweights. He speaks very highly of the Heisey Company and of the good treatment he received as an employee.

Although child labor is a problem in some countries around the world, we who live in the United States are fortunate that our children and grandchildren are not subject to the sort of slave labor practiced by the cheap glass manufacturers of yester year. Thankfully, there are laws in this country to prevent the use of young people by greedy factory owners and others of their kind.

Editors Note: Photos which reflect child labor practices in the early 1900's seem to be a rare commodity. Perhaps the reason is because the subject of child labor was one that factory owners chose to keep *undercover*. A Visit with Horace

On a spring-like day in March, I had the pleasure of chatting with Horace King at his home in Granville. Kathy McCracken and I visited with him in the living room of his Greek Revival style home which was built in 1847. He explained that he has lived in the house for 57 years. He also shared the fact that he will be 86 years old on his next birthday. We listened intently, as he shared one interesting tidbit of information after another with us. I brought a copy of the March issue of the *Heisey News*, which I presented to him. Right away he recognized Ray Cobel on the cover. "Good fellow, Ray," he said. "When I first came to Heisey, Ray didn't quite know what to make of it. I was a designer..... Insecure is the word, I guess you could say. But after we got to know each other, we got along fine. He was blunt. He would come right out and tell me I was wrong. Most of the time he was right. 'It won't pull' Ray would say. He knew molds. We had a lot of fun experimenting with different hinges. That is what made the mold work, the type of hinge."

As I glanced around the room I noticed that not one piece of Heisey was on display. Curiosity led me to inquire as to why this was the case. Horace replied simply, "I gave Heisey away with both hands. Now I only have about four pieces."

Our conversation then turned to the list of patents which Horace assigned to A.H. Heisey Co. Horace had sent the list to me for possible use in the *Heisey News*. I

had several questions in regard to the list so I wanted to speak with him in person, to make sure the list would appear accurately. Horace has a notebook in which every article he wrote for the *Heisey News* is cataloged. The notebook also contains the list of his designs.

Horace explained that he signed the rights over to the company on all his designs. "It was customary in those days. Clarence would call me in to sign the form. I'd tell him that I wouldn't sign a thing until he gave me my dollar. (Ha,Ha) That was a joke between us. You see, the wording on the form referred to dollar value....."

As we continued to chat, Horace answered all of my questions with regard to the list of patents. The list below comes from Horace King's personal records. The patents cover a five year period, 1947 through 1951.

Horace ended our visit with a story about a visit to New York. It must have taken place in the early 50's. "I went into Bloomingdales. I didn't see a Heisey display, so I asked the girl where it was. 'We quit buying from you', she said. 'We can go down to the dock and buy English made goblets for \$16.00 a dozen. Heisey would charge us \$32.00 a dozen'. Well, Heisey couldn't compete with that."

As Kathy and I were leaving, Horace apologized for rambling. We assured him that we didn't consider our conversation with him rambling. We let him know that we would be delighted to return someday to chat with him again about his interesting experiences at A. H. Heisey & Co. In 1991 I asked Horace to write for the *Heisey News*. His response was that he'd written all there was to write.

But as we were leaving, he told us that maybe he would write something someday. "I still have a pretty good typewriter upstairs", he boasted.

One year ago this month, Horace King was the subject of the feature story in the *Heisey News*. The cover photo of the April 1991 issue pictured Horace at work at the Heisey factory. Though many years have passed since that picture was taken, Horace is just as sharp as anyone half his age could possibly be. Horace has had some health problems though. He is quick to let you know that he only has "one good ear". In addition, he suffered a serious bout with pneumonia last winter. Horace's wife, Ginny, underwent hip replacement surgery last fall. But, he and Ginny have managed to remain in the house they love. Ginny is looking forward to working in the garden on warm spring days. Horace enjoys reading, relaxing and visiting with their five great-grandchildren. (See patent drawings on next page)
