

Museum Expansion Committee Update Bob Rarey, Recording Secretary

The Committee report this month will be brief. The architects are now preparing the construction drawings of the museum expansion. At the last meeting with the architects, the discussion again was the layout of the interior of the building. To meet new federal regulations, we must include an elevator to meet handicap requirements. This requirement will increase the total cost of the project, but until construction bids are received, the total cost will not be known. The Committee is confident that this requirement will not delay or make the total cost prohibitive.

Representatives of the local Sons of Italy Lodge were present at the last Expansion Committee meeting. This group has expressed the desire to assist the Expansion Project with the landscaping and maintenance of the courtyard as a community service project. The Committee is grateful for this offer of assistance from the Sons of Italy. Plans have not yet been developed for the landscaping.

Norman Thran reported that the direct fund raising was still in progress and that his committee was meeting

on a regular basis.

Ground breaking is planned for Wednesday, June 17. The Expansion Committee plans this as the kickoff for the 1992 Convention. We wish all of you could attend. A further update will appear in the July issue of the Heisey News.

HCA Convention time is here! Check page 22 for the schedule of events. The Convention registration form is on page 23. Now is the time to register. If you need additional information regarding scheduled events, see the May issue of *Heisey News*, page 5, or call the museum, (614) 345-2932 between 8 AM and 4:30 PM.

Views From the Fund Raiser

Last month's total dollars, pledges and fund raising projects placed us at \$190,000. Today, May 13, as I write this article, we are at \$197,087. Here is a summary of how we grew by \$7,000 in the past month.

April 1992 level	\$190,000.00

Profit from Rosalene signs	5,600.00

May 13, 1992 Total \$197,087.00

Remember, at the \$200,000 level, The Building Fund will receive a \$25,000 gift from the Evans Foundation. Thanks to all of you for your help! Keep up the good work. I hope to see many of you at the Convention.

Together we can *Build for the Future!*Be sure to read the chronology for an update on events and meetings held during the last three months.

Museum Expansion Chronology Update

- This update covers Expansion Committee meetings and other significant events during February, March, and April 1992.
- February 5, 1992 According to Chairman Frank Frye, 70% of the Cadillac-Lincoln Dinner tickets have been sold to date. Early sell out of the tickets predicted. Final plans for the Gold Animal Series in progress for March 3, 1992, sale date. The direct fund raising mailing to all HCA members has been prepared by Norm Thran and Sam Schnaidt and is ready to go to the printer.
- February 6, 1992 Open House was held at the museum, with local residents of Old Towne West and neighbors in attendance (approximately 25 people attended.). The Expansion Committee explained its plans and answered questions and concerns from the neighbors and local residents. All seemed pleased with our efforts and commitment to the community and neighborhood.
- February 10, 1992 The direct fund raising mailing to all HCA members, outling the broad based program to support the expansion, was mailed today. Sam Schnaidt's mother and brother handled the folding and inspecting the brochure, Ann Holman handled the stamping, sorting and mailing of the 2,600 plus pieces. The efforts of all of the volunteers has made this project much easier and has contributed to its success.
- February 12, 1992 Charlie Wade reported that the sample set of the Gold Animal Collector's Series, on display in the museum gift shop, has generated a tremendous amount of visitors and questions. Sam Schnaidt reported that only 16 dinner tickets are left to sell. The remainder of the meeting was devoted to a detailed layout of the main level of the proposed museum expansion.
- February 19, 1992 The Expansion Committee met and Frank Frye announced that all Dinner tickets had been sold and a waiting list with four names, (some with checks), had been established. The Gold Animal Series was discussed and a separate meeting was scheduled to handle the details of the sale to commence on March 3, 1992. The remainder of the meeting dealt with the layout of the second floor library and archival storage. Sam Schnaidt reported that a letter from the Evans Foundation

- has been received committing a pledge of \$25,000, when the Committee reaches the \$200,000 plateau.
- February 26, 1992 All sub-committees reported that they are on target. Dinner sold out, final plans being made for March 14th event. Gold Animal Series meeting set for March 2nd. Sale to begin at 8:30 A.M. March 3rd. Norm Thran reports \$28,000 raised to date. The balance of meeting dealt with the internal layout of the proposed expansion with a local contractor.
- March 2, 1992 Gold Animal Series meeting was held in lower level of museum to arrange tables and assign jobs to the volunteers for sale of animals to commence at 8:30 A.m. on March 3rd. All is set, volunteers set up to process walk-in orders, mail orders, and telephone orders simultaneously. Larry Stickle set up two phones in lower level for phone orders. Kathy has volunteers available for gift shop and museum duty during sale. The excitement is building. It is difficult to express how much.
- March 3, 1992 Finally the date for the sale of the Gold Animal Collector's Series arrived. The line up began at 6:00 a.m. outside the front door to the museum. At 8:25 a.m. Liz King, our door person for the day, opened the door and sent the first twenty five in line down to the lower level. At 8:30 a.m. the walk-ins, mail and telephone orders started to be processed—all orders were random, so that it would be as fair as possible to all who wanted this beautiful set of animals. When the rush was over in the early afternoon, over 225 sets had been sold. Total sales for the day were 247 sets. The gift shop and museum were busy with the walk-ins and did a good business. There was a renewed interest in the museum because of this sale and over ten new members were welcomed to HCA during this week.
- March 4, 1992 Discussions at this meeting centered on the museum expansion building, both the exterior and interior. The architect and a local builder were in attendance to help the committee formulate its plans and ideas. The architect felt it would take four weeks to prepare the construction drawings and plans. The contractor stated that when these plans and drawings are available it would take them two weeks to prepare bids for construction.
- March 10, 1992 The Expansion and Dinner Committees met at Sam and Heidi Schnaidt's home to review both programs. The Dinner Committee finalized these plans for the dinner scheduled for March 14, and worked on decorations coordinated with the "Las Vegas Night" theme. Norm Thran reported that the donated glass for the building fund would be set up on the 12th of March at Apple Tree Auction Center. The Expansion Committee to prepare a report for the Board meeting. Sam Schnaidt and Norm Thran to work up an outline and a report for the board.
- March 14, 1992 The donated Heisey glass for the Building Fund was sold at the end of the March Benefit Auction. This event raised \$3,266 for the fund. Thanks to all of you who donated glass. We are continuing to accept glass during the fund drive and it will be sold as received.
- May 14, 1992 The Cadillac-Lincoln Dinner was held the evening of March 14, 1992 with over 375 guests in attendance. The hall was beautifully decorated by the committee in a "Las Vegas Night" casino theme. The dinner and social event was terrific but the main event commenced shortly after dinner and continued until the final five names were left for a chance on the new car. The winner was Jacquelyn Smith, an HCA member from Bartlesville, Ok. A small auction (in place of door prizes) was held following the drawing which allowed those lucky winners from

- the crap and black jack tables to spend their fortunes (play money) on the wonderful door prizes. At the conclusion of the evening, the comments overheard were: "great food", "good evening", "lots of fun", "will it be held next year?"
- March 15, 1992 At the Board of Directors Meeting, Sam Schnaidt presented the Expansion Committee update and forward plans. Approval for ground breaking on June 17, 1992 was obtained. Additionally, the committee requested and the Board approved the making of 450 Diamond H advertising signs in Rosalene for the ground breaking event. These will be offered only to the HCA membership and to those who purchased the Gold Animal Series. The Board of Directors thanked the Committee for its efforts and work to date on the museum expansion. March 16, 1992 The remaining sets of the Gold Animal Collector's Series were sold. The 450 sets were sold in 13 days, with 80% of these paid in full up front. The remainder were on the payment plan. The Committee recommended that all the animals (sets) be made and be available for the June '92 Convention. A waiting list for the animals was established because of the continued demand for the beautiful animals.
- March 25, 1992 The Cadillac-Lincoln Dinner and Expansion Committees met at the home of Phyllis and Frank Frye. This meeting was a wrap-up to dicuss the events of the dinner and the sale of the Gold Animal Series. The committees decided to hold the events again next year with minor improvements such as: more tables for the play gambling and more shuttle buses. Final plans will be established later in '92. The hall at Denison University has been reserved for March 12, 1992. The Gold Animals will be available for distribution during convention--watch the newsletter for time and place. Those on the payment plan will have their animal mailed in late June.

- April 3, 1992 The Direct Fund Raising Committee met to review its progress to date and to redirect its activities. Donated Heisey glass received since the March Benefit Auction for the Building Fund was cataloged. A review of outside HCA sources for donations was discussed and a series of contacts will be made over the next two months.
- April 10, 1992 The Direct Fund Raising Committee met to discuss what else could be done to raise money for the Expansion.
 A letter is being prepared to be sent to all non HCA members who have supported the museum or mold fund in past projects.
- April 15, 1992 The Expansion Committee met to review with the architect the final layout of the rough drawings for the Expansion. The layout was approved and the architect will work up the plans for the construction. Preliminary plans will be sent to the Engineering sub-committee for review. The rough plans have been approved by the City of Newark and will be forwarded to City Council for approval during April. The contractor should have the final drawings and plans in May for review and bids. Ground breaking is scheduled for June 17, 1992. A local Newark social organization has stepped forward and notified the committee of its interest in helping the expansion. They plan to donate money for the court yard landscaping, supply the workers for the project and provide the maintenance on a yearly basis. Two of the clubs representatives attended our meeting. They need to take their recommendation to their membership for approval. If all goes well, they should be on board by the June 17 ground breaking. We have invited them to attend and participate in the Ground Breaking Ceremony.
- April 17, 1992 The Direct Fund Raising Committee met to prepare a letter to all HCA study clubs and to set the times for meetings with outside sources for support of the Expansion.



EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPORT

With a huge shot in the arm provided by: #13 Heisey Club of CA, #6 Heisey Club of S.E. MA, #44 National Capital HCC, and #34 Connecticut HCC, the Education Committee began its huge tasks with an organizational meeting last September.

The primary objective became the review of all slide and video programs; evaluating them as to popularity, clarity of presentation, and educational content. Twentythree old presentations need to be updated into present day video so that they become viable instruments of education to our membership or groups. The task at hand is huge--the future holds wonderful possibilities.

By the end of 1991, all existing slide presentations had been reviewed by Hugo Wenzel, Louise Ream, Kathy McCracken, and Jo & Jim Ear nshaw.

Work began immediately on Candlestick #1 & #2 by Tom Felt and Bob O'Grady. An updated narration was written and corrected by Hugo and Louise. These two videos should be ready in June 1992, for distribution to our membership. Hugo Wenzel is also working on his Jelly Dish presentation.

Heisey "This is Your Life" originally done in 1982, has been redone into "Heisey--HCA, The First Ten Years", by Jim & Jo Earnshaw and will be ready for distribution in late June 1992. A segment of this, done by Hugo Wenzel and Kathy McCracken, will be shown at our 1992 Convention Banquet by Bob McClain as part of the dinner program.

When I was in Silver Spring in March for the All Heisey Show, some-



one brought a small round ashtray to me for identification. I said that it was #1506 Whirlpool. Others said that it was not that pattern, but they didn't know what it was. I want to apologize for this error on my part. I especially want to apologize to Walter Ludwig. He was sure that it was not #1506, but he wasn't sure what it was.

I kept thinking about the ashtray and on the way home it came to me. I had seen such an ashtray in #212 Catalog and that the number was #1500. I also remembered that this had been talked about several years ago.

Almost the first thing I did when I got home was to get out the #212 Catalog and turn to the ashtrays. There it was on the second row. The picture is very poor but hopefully you can get an idea what it looks like.

The only ashtray shown in this catalog, which shows the whole pattern, is a 3-1/2" square one.

In their last catalog, Heisey changed the name of #1506 from Whirlpool to Provincial. No ashtrays were listed. However, Imperial produced items in #1506. A 5-1/2" ashtray is listed but not pictured. This ashtray was made in Crystal, Amber, and Verde, from 1968 to 1971.

I may not be able to remember pattern names as well as when I was working, but I usually know where to look for them, which is almost as good.

I received a letter from David Curley which included the obituary of Hans Zeisel, husband of Eva Zeisel. Eva was a designer for Heisey in the later years. Next month I'd like to tell you more about Eva and Hans.



Is it a Heisey Stem?

I've been asked to write about stems and those who ask that I do so are becoming increasingly insistent. It's not that I'm the world's greatest stem maven, more likely they are tired of my musings and are too kind to say so. Perhaps if I mix it up-- a potpourri of stem stuff and Heisey observations, this space will take on the desired educational aura.

A dear friend--scratch that. A fan mailed a stem to me and asked if I would confirm its Heiseyness. The piece in question is the still unseen (well, I've never seen it) #3516, Trum-



After looking the piece over, I concluded that, yes, it looks like #3516 Trumpet but it is not a Heisey stem. I called its owner to stomp on his dream. I expected my ruling would be accepted without question but the ingrate asked, "Why do you say it's not Heisey?"

His question was justified but, being unexpected, it caught my pants somewhere between the knees and the rump. I hadn't expected to be questioned. After all, would he have the temerity to question Einstein on his relativity conclusions? Or worse, would be question God? Heavens, no!

Searching for an answer to his question, I realized that the opinion I jumped to had been made instinctively. I hadn't even considered it would need to be verbalized.

"What do you mean, 'Why?' ", I replied in my best how dare you doubt me voice. It was a stall.

"What makes you say it's not Heisey?" he repeated all too logically. I had to think fast or risk exposing his idol's incompetence and shatter yet another dream.

I explained between stutters that the glass had that greenish tinge usually associated with lesser quality-definitely not Heisey-like, which almost always shows a grey cast. Then, on a design that should have been very smooth, there were doeskin wrinkles, rippling common to inferior production. This is not to say you'll never find the doeskin effect on Heisey, because you will--not often, but it's not unheard of either. Over the years, however, when I've seen this on a Heisey piece, I've found that the same item was also among Imperial's reissues. Draw


your own conclusions, I'm not about to mess with those Imperial people.

Another un-Heisey feature of the ersatz Trumpet stem is an indented line which circles the very edge of the foot between its top and bottom. This is peculiar even on this. I've never seen anything even remotely similar on a Heisey stem. Probably the most compelling this is not Heisey clue is the lip of the glass. It is slightly swollen, much like Libby's Safety Edge feature, though not so apparent. Heisey's stems always have straight edges and may even lean toward sharpness on some blown stems.

Finally, Heisey glass has an oily feel. This is an important identification criteria to those who have been collecting Heisey for a number of years. This stem does not have the feel of Heisey.

The icing on the identification cake is its cutting. It is indeed similar to Heisey's Midwest cutting but the differences and the quality are enough to say it isn't a Heisey cutting. Cuttings and etchings do vary with the size and shape of the glass they decorate but the design elements remain the same and quality should be consistent. Heisey's #1059 Midwest is a polished cutting and the pretender's is a grey cutting.

One other detail about the cuttings is their time frame. It may not be relevant but, though Heisey's cutting is found on stemware issued in the early 1950s--its Trumpet sherry production is placed in the early 1930s. That's quite a stretch.



There you have it. Stem-Man has struck again! Yet another victory for the keeper of the Heisey flame. My correspondent vowed to kneel and kiss my ring when we meet again. Feigning humility, Stem-Man drove off into the sunset in a shower of twinkle dust.

So, what have we learned here? We've learned that there are many things to consider when identifying unmarked Heisey. We've also learned that pseudo experts are not always as pseudo as you may think they are. Sometimes we're pseudo-er.

How about that, perhaps this column can be educational after all.

Excerpt from <u>Heisey News</u> Feb., 1977—No. 2, page 2 HEISEY ANIMALS—FIGURINES

This article was prepared with the kind help of Louise Ream. Most of the information was taken from catalogs, "Wartime Salesmen", (flyers used for ordering during WWII), ads, notes from sales meetings and letters to salesmen. The largest single list of animals appeared in the 1949 catalog No. 30, (pictured right). Much of this information is also on the micofiche at the museum.

Most of the animals have numbers, but they only indicate their place on a list. A few of them do have regular pattern numbers. They are as follows:

#100 Asiatic Pheasant	#1538 Rabbit paperweight
#101 Tropical Fish	#1540 Plug Horse
#103 Tiger paperweight	#1550 Fish Bowl
#104 Gazelle	#1550 Fish Candlestick
#1522 Standing Pony	#1550 Fish cigarette holder
#1527 Kicking Pony	#1554 Fish bookend
#1529 Balking Pony	#1557 Rooster vase

Even though they had pattern numbers, most of them were generally listed as, No. 1, No. 2, No. 3 etc.

Some of the animals had names, other than what we generally know them by. At a sales meeting on July 1, 1941, the salesmen liked the Plug Horse and Scottie figurines and wanted to call them, Oscar and Scottie. The scottie dog was also called Sealyham. One price list calls the donkey a mule. The fishbowl and candlesticks were called dolphins and they were designed by Royal Hickman. The Fighting Rooster was called Chanticleer Rooster, and the Airedale was called a terrier.

All of the animals, except two, appear in our reference material. The two animals that do not appear are: the Doehead and Rearing Horse bookends. The Rearing Horse bookend was never put on the market, according to our sources of information.


All of the animals were made in Crystal, so it is possible that any of them could be made frosted but some would be rare. The #2 Madonna was listed as frosted only. The #1 Madonna was made in Limelight frosted (called turquoise in the 1956 catalog), and is the only figurine in this color. Four animals came in Cobalt--the three ponies and the plug horse. Amber or Sultana was more popular for the animals and several animals were made in these two shades of Amber; they are:

Standing Pony, Balking Pony, Kicking Pony
Plug Horse
Clydesdale (Rare)
Flying Mare
All three elephants: Baby, Medium, Large
Horsehead Bookends (Rare)
Giraffes: head forward, head back (unseen but catalogued)

The Rabbit paperweight has been reported in Amber, but unseen, and the Pig reported in Flamingo, (not seen by me) but the possiblity is slight since it was not made until 1948, ten years after Flamingo was discontinued. #1 Madonna has been rumored in both Flamingo and Amber. For several years there was a story in Newark about a former maid of the Heisevs having a Dawn Bull. We met this woman and she does have a Dawn Bull. The bull is free form, not molded. There are a few blanks in the available information as to the dates the animals were made--some years catalogs were not printed. So for simplification, we will assume that when any item was originally issued, it was generally made continuously until it was discontinued. Seeing the dates during which the animals were made will give you some idea as to why some of them are so hard to find.

It is known that some of these items were available from the old stock for some time after they were discontinued and there were a lot of piglets and chicks, also some Amber Flying Mares when the factory closed out its stock in the late fifties.


While we know positively that Royal Hickman designed the Pouter Pigeon, Asiatic Pheasant, Clydesdale, Swan, all three Mallards, the Wood Duck Family, Gazelle, Fish Bookend, and the two aforementioned dolphin items, it is also probable that he did some of the others. All the information in this article is based on some form of printed material we have researched.



Book Review

G. Wallace Chessman and Curtis. W. Abbott, <u>Edward Hamlin Everett--"The Bottle King"</u>. Granville, Ohio: The Robbins Hunter Museum, 1991.

A new book entitled Edward Hamlin Everett--"The Bottle King" is an important contribution to the history of Newark, Ohio and its long association with the glass industry. Most of the original research for the book was compiled by Curtis Abbott, an Owens-Corning retiree, and the story was woven together by G. Wallace Chessman, Professor Emeritus of History at Denison University.

The story of Edward Hamlin Everett and his flamboyant exploits is fascinating indeed. Born in Cleveland in 1851, Everett came to Newark in 1880 when he purchased the struggling Newark Star Glass Company. It would prove to be a fortuitous acquistion. In 1905 Everett installed the new automated bottle-making "miracle", invented by Mike Owens of Toledo, Ohio. In the same year, the company was incorporated as the American Bottle Company, capitalized at \$10 million. In the years that followed, Everett's fortune grew as he continued to invest in the glass industry, but as well made other fortunes in oil, gas, sand and orchards.

Everett's world quickly expanded beyond Newark and he began buying and building homes to suit his grand lifestyle. His mansion in Washington, D.C., his country estate in Bennington, Vermont, and his chateau in Switzerland were fabulous centers for entertaining the rich and famous. The sudden death of his wife, Amy, in 1917 was followed in 1920 with his marriage to Grace Burnap, 29 years his junior. His last years were a whirlwind of activities, including establishing the largest orchard in the country and contributing to schools, hospitals and museums. Everett died in 1929 and is buried in a mausoleum in Bennington, Vt.

The book is full of wonderful photographs from Everett's life. Although he did not leave many personal papers, the book is thoroughly researched and documented. It also dispells many of the myths that have developed about Everett by relying on carefully collected evidence. Essentially a local history that happens to span the globe, the story of Edward Hamlin Everett and his contributions to the glass industry in Newark, Ohio, will be of interest to all Heisey collectors.
