Heisey glassware, most in the original factory carton, is shown here stacked in the yard of the Moore's Hudson Ave. home waiting to be loaded on to the truck. Percy is pictured holding what appears to be an Oxford ice tea. Percy Moore passed away in August of 1989. At the September 1991 HCA Board meeting, the Board voted unaminously to rename the September dinner, formerly known as the Souvenir Dinner, The Percy Moore Memorial Dinner in memory of him. 

Keeping in Touch Louise Ream

In the later years of production, the A. H. Heisey Co. began making a variety of items which included the use of animal figures. These were very interesting and have become quite popular with collectors over the years.

Many of these were used as stems for cocktails and some for sherries and cordials. These include the more common the Rooster Tail cocktails (fig.1), and Rooster Head (fig.2) Others were: the Goose, Bantam Rooster, Standing Pony, Dancer Leg, Horsehead and Sea Horse cocktails (fig. 3). The Horsehead and the Goose were also made as sherries and the Goose as a cordial.







There were also several interesting stoppers, including the Rooster, Goose, Penguin, and two sizes of Horsehead stoppers made for cocktail shakers and decanters. The rarest of those for shakers were the Rams Head (L) and the Girl Head (below).

Other items include the Elephant handled child's mug. There was also a panelled elephant handled myg in Crystal and Amber, and a plain "Dumbo" handled mug also in Crystal and Amber. The latter was made for a political campaign and was very limited. It was never sold in the catalogs.




Miniature horseheads were used in the center of the #1489 Puritan ashtrays and on two sizes of cigarette boxes of the same pattern. A real rarity in this category was the "sitting Pony", on the lid of Puritan cigarette boxes. This is a rare item.



The little horsheads used with the #1489 items were also sold separately and were listed as "Toy Horseheads". They came with or without the rectangular base used on the cigarette boxes.

The #1489 4-1/2" ashtray with back-to-back horseheads in the center is probably the most unique item in this category. Very few of these ashtrays have ever been seen.



HCA owns the mould for these double horseheads and is having the finial made into a paperweight for the Souvenir at the *Percy Moore Memorial Dinner*.

Post Convention Musings

Remember the 1992 HCA Convention? It seems so far away already. I got to see some stems there I'd never seen before (more about that another time) and we had a great time. Even the usually unpredictable and explosive Ohio weather cooperated.

As happens at most of our HCA conventions, there are pieces available for sale on the show floor that are not usually seen. They stand out even though

they may not be one of a kind. The dedicated collector's goal is to spot one before someone with faster feet and a better eye beats him to it. Part of the fun of collecting, after all, is owning something few others have. That's why an Amber Horsehead bookend brought half my annual salary at the Apple Tree auction.

There were a few of these unusual collectibles at this year's convention. I won't use the word *rare* because that has come to imply a dollar value which may not necessarily be so. Besides, too many *rares* and this might easily be mistaken for an article on Depression glass. There were surely more of the seldom seen at the show than I spotted which, if the truth be known, was not much.

I don't get around a show floor as quickly as some people and I'm not a good spotter. I'm distracted too easily. Food distracts me the most. I can spot a bowl full of candy or nuts in a booth quicker than I can spot a Tangerine Gazelle. Show me to the snack bar and you've brought me home.

Loren Yeakley, you know Loren, he's the tall fellow who put his name on his wife Virginia's book, Heisey Glass in Color. Anyway, he stopped by to show off what he found. He came up with the lovely #479 Petal cream and sugar in Crystal. This set is more often seen in color, Flamingo or Moongleam usually, but what also set this pair apart was a cover on the sugar bowl.

"Big deal", you say, "I've had one of those". "So what ", I say, "I've never seen it". That's the trouble with what I think is unusual, there's always someone who says, "big deal!" I thought the cover was unusual, so did Loren and I thought you might too. A covered #479 sugar is something for the cream and sugar collector to hunt for.

Always great at one upsmanship, Loren came around a second time with an unusual crushed fruit jar that I'd never seen before and, obviously, neither had he. Loren and I are much alike in that regard, we can get excited over little square Ridgeleigh ashtrays. In this instance, he was walking about a foot off the ground with a grin so wide it had to be painful.



Now that's a piece I can easily covet. I hope it shows up in the photo (L), I'd hate to have to draw it. Loren and Louise think that the Pattern is #461 Convex Circle.

There are two pieces of this pattern in the Museum: a short straw jar and a large nappy.

The next piece is a Moongleam decanter snapped up by Walter Ludwig who collects green. Behind his back we say that Walter collects green because it matches his complexion. Walter also says big deal! a lot. Needless to say, but I'll say it anyway, Walter was thrilled with his Moongleam #4028 30

oz. decanter. I had not seen this decanter before but Walter pooh--poohed that with a look that said, "I'm not surprised." Walter is like that. He also looks down his nose a lot. Walter was one of the experts at this year's Stump the Dummies program. Big deal.

I did find one piece all by myself. Probably because it was in my booth. It's the #1280 Winged Scroll pitcher

viousley, is not unusual. Of course, Emerald and Ivorina Verde are nice, too, but a Winged Scroll pitcher collection wouldn't be complete without the Crystal one (I won't even mention Vaseline).

The Bredehofts showed a clock which was set into a glass holder for which records indicate Heisey made the mold. It's questionable whether they made the glass for this particular piece, the quality was not what you'd expect from Heisey. I did not think to take a picture of it until just now. Perhaps we can put something together on it in the future.

There was one other Heisey gem that I thought to include here but I'd really like to feature it at a time when I can be sure I'm not peddling misinformation. Will the lady who came by to show me the lovely Three Little Pigs deep plate etch please drop me a note so I can fill in the blanks? Thanks.

Thanks, too, to the nice people who took time during convention to stop by to say they enjoy my musings. Actually, "enjoy" might be too strong a word-tolerate is probably closer to what was said.



Book Review George Reynolds

Heacock, Measell and Wiggins-- <u>Harry Northwood's</u> The Wheeling Years, 1901-1925. 207 pages, Antique Publications Box 553, Marietta, OH 45750

Soft cover \$34.95, hard cover \$42.95 plus \$3.50 postage and handling. Four page price guide included.

Northwood is a familar name to most glass collectors in this country. Antique Publications released their first book about Northwood in 1990. Harry Northwood's The Early Years, is a history of the Northwood firm while it was operating in Ohio, Pennsylvania and Indiana. The Wheeling Years is the second of a series of three books about the firm and its successors.

The authors are now working on the third Northwood related volume: *Dugan/Diamond*, to be released in the future.

David E. Richardson, the publisher, gave many plaudits to the late Bill Heacock and credited him for a lot of the early research for this book. Richardson also reviewed the Harry Northwood's The Early Years, before outling Northwood's return from England.

Readers will quickly realize that this is not just another glass book with a price guide. The 965 color photographs alone are worth the price of the book. Many patterns, although listed in other editions of Northwood books, are shown for the first time in beautiful color. Kamm, Hartung and Heacock have authored books whick include the patterns identified previous to this volume. However, this is the most extensive listing seen to date in one volume. In addition to the color photos, there are numerous reprints of early Northwood ads and photos. Several clear pictures show the glass workers and the machinery they used. It is hard to believe that such beautiful glass could be produced under such primitive conditions.

The text, general layout, and overall presentation is excellent. Any avid collector of high quality Ivory (Custard), Carnival, clear or decorated glass will find this work a must to include in their collectible library.

Price guides are not a true representation of market value and should be used for reference only; this price guide is no exception.

The publisher and authors are to be commended for their serious research into this famous glass makers family and product. Their hard work has resulted in a fine research tool which will serve for years to come.

Heisey Baskets

Baskets made by the Heisey Glass Company are an interesting topic of study for the speciality collector. There are twenty items Heisey called baskets that one could collect. If one considers size and color, then there are thirty nine different types of baskets that were made by the Heisey Glass Company. TABLE 1 lists the twenty baskets and the 39 types or variations.





What is a basket? A basket has a bowl with a handle that goes up over the top of the bowl. The two ends of the handle are fastened to the bowl, one on each side. The shapes of the Heisey basket bowls are: round, oval, rectangular, hexagon, and octagon. The basket bowl can be short or tall and small or large. There are eight other Heisey items that fit a basket description, but Heisey did not call them baskets. The 8 items are listed in TABLE 2. You may or may not want to include these in your Heisey basket collection. It depends on your own personal preference. Ice buckets are considered as buckets, not baskets.

Heisey basket #456 does not have a handle that goes over the top of the basket bowl. It has two vertical handles, one on each side of the rectangularly shaped bowl. This basket is pictured in Heisey catalog #76, supplement to catalog #75 (circa 1915) on page 32. The catalog describes it as a basket vase with side handles. While the pattern of the basket is #465 Recessed Panel, Heisey gave this basket the separate stock number #456 and pictured the basket on a page headlined vases. The descriptive words Heisey used with the other 19 baskets are: fruit basket, basket vase, flower basket or just plain basket.

There are five known basket whimseys. They are

- 1. #350 Pinwheel & Fan glass handle applied to a flared 8" bowl in the #350 pattern, (on display at the museum).
- #1201 Fandango glass handle applied to a flared floral bowl in the 1201 pattern.
- 3. #1401 Old Sandwich glass handle applied to a flared 12 oz. soda glass in the 1404 pattern, (on display at the museum).
- 4. #1533 Wampum Glass handle applied to Wampum bowl.
- 5. #4054 Coronation glass handle applied to a flared 1/2 gallon jug, (on display at the museum). Two other sizes exist.


Of the twenty basket items listed in TABLE 1, I have written articles on ten of them. The specific articles and their location in the Heisey News are listed in Table 3. My article on the #1184 Bowtie items is inluded in TABLE 3, in the event one wants to include them in their basket collection.



Heisey produced one catalog just for baskets. It is Basket Catalog #81 dated March 1, 1916. Baskets #458, #459, #460, #461, #465, #473, and #477 are pictured. Several Heisey cuttings and etchings are shown on some of the baskets. A copy of catalog #81 is in the HCA Library. The booklet, Table Glass and How to use it, circa 1916, also pictured Heisey baskets. It appears that the eight pictures in this booklet came out of Catalog #81.





Heisey used the word "basket" in about 1905. This date is before Heisey actually produced any of the baskets dicussed in this article. In catalog #50, circa 1905, listed under vases is a #351 6" vase, flared. The vase is circular at the top and bottom. In another picture, the #351 vase is squeezed in to form an oval at the top only. The bottom remained circular. The catalog called this modified vase a #351 6" basket shaped vase. In Catalog #75, circa 1913, page 263, the same #351 vase is shown. This time it is called a #351 7" carnation vase, basket shape.

Over the next year or so, I plan to write articles for the remaining ten baskets.


