HEISEY ON-LINE

It's a given that converts are very intense. A convert to Catholicism or Judaism can be counted on to out devout those born to those faiths. So it is with one who first embraces the World Wide Web and e-mail. Just as a convert, I, too, am born again.

I've used a computer for many, many years but it was never more than a work tool (unless you're going to get picky and count Solitaire). Once I succumbed to the call of the Web I was hooked. And once I saw that an e-mail address put me in touch with more people in a time frame the US Postal Service doesn't even dare to dream about, I became an apostle.

Unfortunately, my enthusiasm is not infectious. At a recent meeting of our Heisey study club I asked to say a few words about e-mail and surfing the web for Heisey. I said I was having fun with the neat Heisey people I've already traded e-mail with but before I could expand on it, the Luddites drowned out the speaker. I learned from them that the internet, the web and e-mail will be the downfall of all social graces, personal communication and probably mankind. Protest would have been futile. These arguments were heard in the early days of radio, the telephone, movies and TV, too.

So this is for the rest of you, those who are not afraid to taste the future.

Assuming you have a computer and have access to the web, you need only type the word "Heisey" to bring up a list of Heisey sites. Some are for people named Heisey but most are related to the glass we collect. Stop at the National Heisey Glass Museum's home page first (www.ahheisey.com). There's so much to see and learn there.

Besides information, there are places to shop for Heisey on the internet. There are auctions featuring Heisey. I was directed to an auction to check out a "Heisey" clock. By the time I logged on the bidding was up over \$200. The clock's body wasn't Heisey as you'd expect but a type of white plastic. It had a Heisey decal covering the clock face. The decal (without the clock) can be seen at the museum—it pictures two glass blowers facing each other encircled by the company name. It looked like a marriage.

Another time a Heisey Vaseline vase was listed on the auction list. I clicked on it right away to view a photo. The Vaseline part was true but the Heisey part was a sketch—it was either Fostoria or Westmoreland. Again, the bid was close to \$200 when I checked it out.

I don't mean to give the impression that internet auctions are filled with phonies because that's not the case. The items auctioned are overwhelmingly genuine and there are some rare pieces, too. A Heisey Bantam Rooster cocktail comes to mind. I got out of there quickly before I was tempted to send my car payment to someone other than General Motors. Most items have a reserve bid and bidders are advised when that reserve has been met. There is a time limit on bidding and it varies but bidders are kept aware of the time remaining before bidding is closed.

Rules and instructions on how to participate are clearly spelled out. There's no reason to hesitate if you see something you can't live without. The New York Times recently printed a guide for on-line bidding called, "Let the Bidder Beware." Below is some of the information offered.

"A checklist for protecting yourself at on-line auctions:

PRICE. Research the product and set a limit on what you will pay—and stick to it. Resist getting caught up in the frenzy.

TERMS. Always check guarantees and return policies, which may vary for every item. CREDIBILITY. Research the reputation of the seller. Some auction sites have extensive reporting systems in which buyers rate individual sellers and post comments. Sellers should allow you to return the item if it does not match the description. Be wary of sellers with free e-mail accounts, like those from www. hotmail.com, which can be used to mask the sellers identity. Ask the seller for a phone number and call before buying. SHILL BIDS. If the bidder has the same email address as the seller, or if you see that too many bids are coming from email accounts at the same internet service provider, there may be a shill in the audience. Report suspicious activity to the auction manager for investigation.

PAYMENT and SHIPPING. Whenever possible, pay by credit card, which can offer you a better recourse in dispute than money orders or personal checks. And determine before buying whether the shipping charges are reasonable."

One of the best web auctions and among the most reputable is eBay (that's the way they spell it) and www.ebay.com is its web address. Once you get there you will be offered many kinds of auctions—you'll have to choose the one that will lead you to Heisey glass. I like the fact that photos are available for most items. There are many other more specialized auctions, of course, and you'll have fun checking them out.

Besides auctions there are the home pages that offer Heisey for sale. Again, just type "Heisey" and you're half way there. An excellent place to start is at the Depression Era Glass Megashow! (www.glassshow.com—Yep, 3 esses.) When you reach the site just click on *Dealer Booths* at the top and you're on your way to a shopping orgy. You'll be led to a list of show "aisles" and each one notes the dealers you will find in that aisle. You can browse all the aisles and my guess is that you will. You will be amazed at how many familiar Heisey dealer names you'll recognize. Knowing that they are well known Heisey entities allows you to shop in confidence. Even so, it goes without saying that it's wise to use the same caution you would use when buying from an ad or at an actual show. We bought an item out of an ad in the *Heisey News* and later found it for twice the price on the internet. Let the buyer beware still implies.

Let's switch gears here before this ends. Back in February I wrote about Heisey's Sussex stemware. I mentioned a look-a-like which I suspected as Steuben. Well, my suspicions were confirmed. Tom Bredehoft emailed that he owns the phone and it *is* signed Steuben. Thanks, Tom.

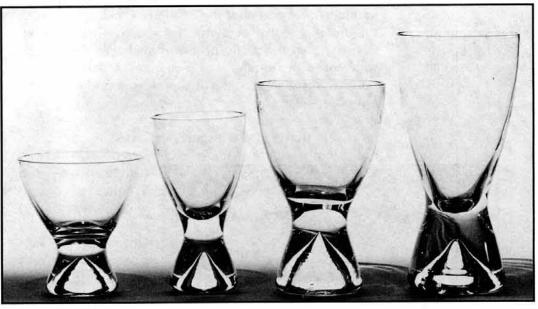

FROM THE ARCHIVES—SHOW AND TELL

DON VALDES

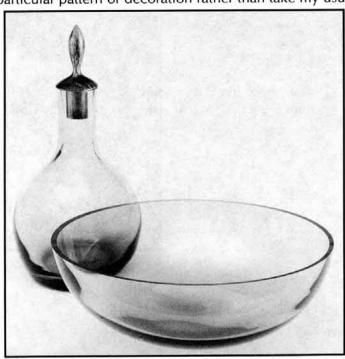
Pictures, pictures, pictures. Other than the Valdes' family collection of color slides going back more than half a century I don't think I have ever had a sorting responsibility like this one. At least this task shows some signs of progress. The carousels and boxes of

slides at home still await the first bit of attention. I keep putting that job off, assuring myself that I can identify Mayan temples in Mexico much more quickly than a Wampum floral bowl or Gardenia etch on Waverly. I had the dickens of a time with Hourglass tumblers and still haven't discovered the appropriate pattern number. For the decanter with a wooden stopper I had to run to Molly. She steered me back to Gallery and the Roundalay

(6009A) pieces. With all the rotten weather we've been having over the past four or five weeks I've substituted running up and down stairs to ask Molly if she can identify a particular pattern or decoration rather than take my usual daily walk.



Of course there frequently are some clues. Both of the previously mentioned patterns were designed by Eva Zeisel and the photographs were taken by Walter Civardi of the Pratt Institute. Rather than just a clue, however, it is always nice to find the photograph has been done by the factory for the sales force which, on the adverse, has not only the decoration pattern and/or numbers, but even the price. Usually these can be identified with certainty although there are some puzzlers.

Roundalay items.

#3416 Goblet with mysterious cutting number.

No. 3304 Icer and No. 5010 Wine glass with Minuet etch. One picture of an array of Barbara Fritchie pattern no. 3416 shows various cuttings, among which is one labeled "cut #797." As I usually check cuttings with the Bredehofts' book I discovered a discrepancy. The picture in the book isn't the same as the photograph. Cut no. 797 in the book is labeled Killarney. The photograph shows, according to the book, no. 799 Manhattan. As neither no. 797 nor no. 799 has a shamrock, a harp, or Statue of Liberty, I don't know where the error lies. (If this error has been corrected at some time or another, my apologies and promise to publicly respond to any correspondence indicating the error of my ways.)

One of the nicest discoveries was a group of photographs of the Minuet etch pattern no. 503. In

particular, one on a Symphone stem wine glass no. 5010 and one on a

Universal no. 3304 icer are just super jobs of photography. It isn't very often the clarity of a etch

comes through in a photograph.

I have tried to illustrate my examples with pictures not previously shown, a guessing game at it's best. Other than the Hourglass pattern I think all are firsts. Perhaps the long time members will forgive me. •

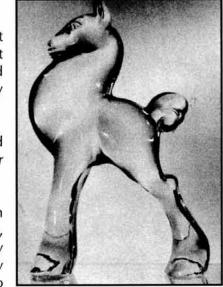

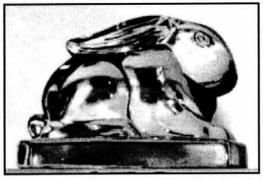

INTERVIEW WITH FRED BOSWORTH—PART VI

Here is the conclusion to the continuing articles on Fred Bosworth, a former Heisey salesman.

As I play these tapes back, I get a feeling that I'm sorta casting a spell that working for Heisey was one great big family affair which made quite a bit of money and had a very

good time. And of course, there were always those days—I'm an optimist and I feel they will go on, but all these things were all so great you may well ask why did Heisey go out of business.

I have to go back a little bit. Not only Heisey went out of business, but a lot of other glass factories and practically all the potters along the Ohio River as most of you know also went out of business. I don't know, over in East Liverpool I guess there were twenty five or thirty potters gathered around that neighborhood and they are all gone. You can't blame Heisey or the Heisev management for failing.

We struggled along through the Depression— I'm now speaking about Heisey—doing a fair

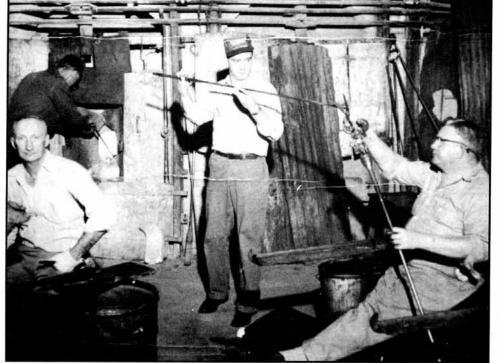
amount of business and pretty ingenious as I think I've indicated in these tapes, though we never hit the big bucks. Nobody got rich. World War II came along and as I've

indicated, Canada—we felt it in Canada first—we had this desperate need for merchandise with all the European and Japanese sources cut off by the war, and I mean cut off. There was just nothing shipped as you can well imagine. People had to turn to the domestic producers and as I've indicated also on the section about Rod Irwin, we went on a quota.

Business kept pouring in and people kept coming to the factory and shaking all kinds of orders in front of us. This went on from 1942 when I quit taking the road until well into 1950. Even when the war ended in 1945, there was still a backlog of orders to be filled. Retail business was very good and

there was a shortage. Women wanted glassware and there wasn't any to be had—period—not according to the needs. And we got the feeling, all the producers and I must admit even the salesmen—we got the feeling that we were some kind of geniuses—that my goodness, all we had to do was show up and the orders kept pouring in. And finally we didn't even have to show up—the orders kept pouring in anyway.

Now here's where I quarrel with management. The same thing happened, even more so to General Electric, General Motors and other Fortune 500 companies as they are called, but these people, most of them I think, had the knowledge and they were in corporate form, not family health concerned. They were corporations who kept planning departments working who, while they were making tanks and so forth, they knew it wasn't going to last. They had to go back to selling light bulbs and Plymouth cars and they took some money apparently (I'm particularly knowledgeable about General Electric because I have family there) preparing for post-war.

They were just taking the money and just a quotation—I was out there at the factory one time and Howard Muller, the treasurer said, "You know Fred, I make a deposit every

day now the size of the deposit I used to make by the month." It's probably an exaggeration but maybe it wasn't. It was fabulous the business we did. I can remember when the biggest orders that Heisey took were when somebody came out and bought all our color to sell.

A certain percentage of this merchandise must go into the batch and we had always kept it barreled up or loaded in bins. Somebody came in and bought it, door knobs, ink wells, broken pieces, and they bought it and sorted it out, and paid us a big piece of money for it. Everybody in the factory was very happy to sell it so I'm just giving—this is background—this is the situation in the 40's. This is all perfectly legitimate.

Where I am making the complaint with my 20-20 hindsight is that you know it was an old-

fashioned business. The Heisey factory had three great big 16 pot furnaces—in all the years I was with the factory, never more than two worked. One was always idle, and even though we were so busy now during the wartime, we didn't have the help to keep the third furnace going. It was a very old fashioned factory with rope elevators. We made pressed ware on the ground floor and you trundled it by a hand truck up to bins or you took it to the cutting room or the etching room where it was worked on, put back in trucks and pushed down to the elevators which pulled up.

It was a very inefficient factory. It was planned in 1895 and I think very little was added to it. After the war Europe was making rapid technological strides helped by the American government, mind you, and we were still operating with an 1895 plant. And,

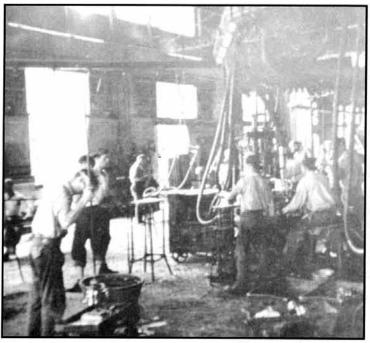
This worker is heating an item in the glory hole.



This picture is from the HCA archives. Though not in good condition, the photo depitcs a typical scene in the glass factory. it seems to me that somewhere along the line, someone should have said, "Hey, we're making all this money, let's take 12% of it or 15 or 20 or 10 percent of it and sock it in the bank, getting ready for when this war is over. The honeymoon will be over and we'll make a streamline factory on one level and you can take it down south were labor is cheaper."

Anything—all kinds of things—could have been done. General Motors did it; General Electric did it. They had cars, I can remember, took a long time to get one if you older people will remember—but they were ready to go right back to work as fast as they could, making merchandise for the American consumer, The glassware companies did

not do this-they did not do it.



I'll say Duncan tried to make machine glassware, but machine glassware was not the answer. Nobody needed machine glassware. What they needed was smart, good looking patterns, colors-colors were coming back-and we weren't at all prepared. I remember a conversation I had with Clarence. At this time I was Eastern Sales Manager and was out at the factory very frequently at least once or twice or three times a month. The conversation went something like this-and I remember it very distinctly-this was probably 1948, "Clarence, we need color. We've got to make some color so we've got to make some smart, House and Garden type colors for the American consumer, and I think we ought to start with 1506 Whirlpool and make some really good looking pastels, not the old blue and green and amber, but smart, good looking colors."

He said, "Fred, let me tell you something. My brother and I decided back in the 30's that we would never again make a piece of color. We lost our shirt on colors. We lost it a couple of times, and we'll never lose it again. We're going to make it—we're going to make it in crystal." Very honestly when I heard that and saw the direction the factory was taking, it came to my little mind that maybe this was the time to leave Heisey and go someplace more progressive. We weren't going any place. In addition to that type of mind, that type of attitude, we had the very, very great handicap, and we all had it—that this would go on forever the way it was. It would go on forever. We weren't developing any new patterns, we didn't have time. We didn't need it. We were busy making figurines; we didn't need new patterns.

Well, this is one man's story of his life from 1937 to 1953, and what a world of transition there was during that time. What a thrill to be working with Heisey, selling glassware in that time, and what a preparation for life and business and resourcefulness, if you will, working for the A.H. Heisey and Company turned out to be. I don't know if anybody will ever read this, but I promised HCA I would write this—my honest recollection as I saw it, as I see it now, and I hope you will enjoy it. This is Fred Bosworth, April 27, 1986.◆

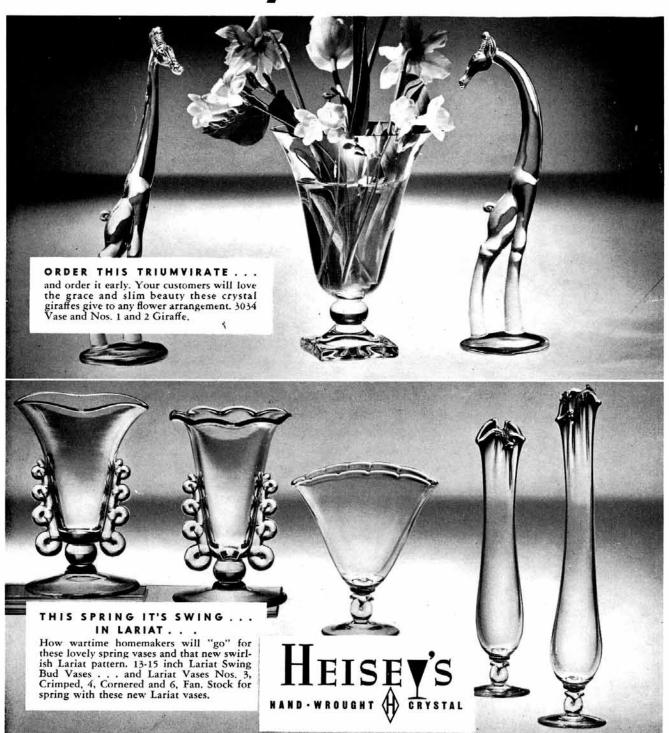

FAKE AND MISLEADING ITEMS

MOLLY KASPAR

One of the most often asked questions by new collectors is, "How can I tell the difference between Heisey, Imperial and impostors?" Now, many of you longtime Heisey collectors know the answer to this question. For a new collector who hasn't seen

much Heisey, if they find something marked with the famous Diamond H they will probably go out on a limb and purchase the item.

Of course, after years of studying reference books and looking at glassware it becomes much easier to spot the real thing. Plain and simple, Heisey is just a better quality glassware and this is often very evident.

Many people swear by the black light to judge the authenticity of Heisey glassware. It's rumored that all Heisey glass will fluoresce yellow when placed in ultra violet light, and Imperial and other companies won't. I have to disagree with this statement, as I know others will too. I've seen other makes of glassware fluoresce yellow, not just Heisey.

I don't buy into this theory. I've had Imperial glass fluoresce yellow as well as another company

After searching through the *Heisey News* archives, I found several notorious fake and misleading items which still baffle new collectors.

1. Copy of a Winged Scroll butter, miniature size. Heisey never made the butter in this small size. This item has been

seen in a pink opaque color and emerald. It was reported that Robert Wetzel of Zanesville had this piece produced at the Guernsey Glass Company in Cambridge, Ohio. The base of the butter is marked "RW".

2. Copy of the Cabochon advertising sign. When sitting side by side, it's easy to tell the real from the fake. The differences arise in the lettering and the shape and size of the Diamond H.





- 3. Fake toothpicks/candle votives, at least three or more types known. The poor quality of these items should tip you off instantly, though the Diamond H mark is bound to add confusion.
 - A. Stars and Stripes, marked with a (faint) Diamond H. Made in blue, green, pink and crystal. Lines of stars run diagonally around the piece.
 - B. Don't let these pieces fool you, they are not Heisey. These were made by Harold Bennett at the Guernsey Glass Company. The toothpick and individual cream are generally found in crystal or milk glass with ruby
- 3a. Stars and Stripes toothpick
- 3b. Toothpick and individual cream

stain. They are marked like souvenir pieces, A.H. (or A.J.) Heisey and Company Founded 1896. Look for the faint "B" marking on the bottom rim.

C. Strawberry toothpick. This is a Cambridge pattern, signed sometimes with a faint Diamond H. This was made in crystal, pink, cobalt and green.

D. This particular toothpick is a knockoff of Heisey's Beaded Swag, copied by the Mosser Glass Company of Cambridge. The first tip off to the



fake is it's color; Mosser made is in milk glass, a very white, dense color. Though Heisey produced an opal-milk glass color, the Mosser piece is much different, not at all opalescent like Heisey. (No picture available.)

3c. Strawberry toothpick

4. Nappy



4. Creamer and nappy look-a-likes. These are machine made pieces of very poor quality.

Though signed with the Diamond H, these are not genuine Heisey. Generally, the shape of the Diamond H is a tell-tale sign that the item is a fake. Make certain the diamond is indeed a diamond shape, not squatty. Don't overlook the size and shape of the H either.



4. Cream

5. Milk glass mug

5. Small milk glass mug, signed with a Diamond H. This was never produced by A.H. Heisey and Company—this was reportedly made in the seventies by

Guernsey Glass Company for a Newark man.

6. The notorious animal covered dishes. Heisey never made a covered dish of this type. Someone in Japan produced the items, marked them with a

Diamond H and shipped them off to the states. These are very common so don't be fooled.

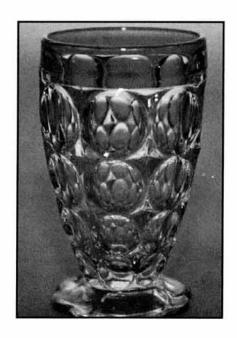


6. Hen on Nest dish

Whirlpool tumbler. Heisey ground and polished the bottom of these. Copies are sometimes only ground not polished.

These items are just a few of the misleading Heisey collectables you might find. There are a few other items included, by picture only, following this article. 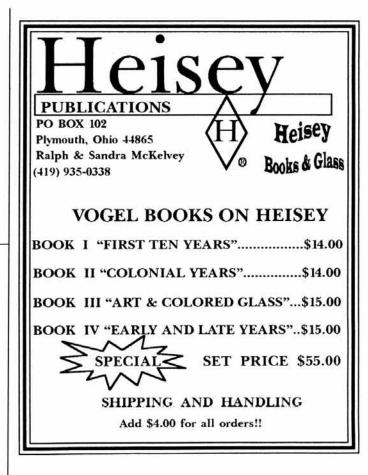
